SUBJECT: Enrolled Bill H.J. Res. 76 -- Making further continuing appropriations for the fiscal year 2002, and for other purposes

Last Day for Action

Your signature as soon as possible is recommended. Funding for the agencies and accounts covered by the enrolled bill expires at midnight on Friday, December 7th.

Purpose

Provides FY 2002 appropriations for continuing projects and activities of the Federal Government through Saturday, December 15, 2001 (excluding projects and activities that receive FY 2002 funding through the Agriculture/Rural Development Appropriations Act; the Commerce/Justice/State Appropriations Act; the Energy/Water Development Appropriations Act; the Interior Appropriations Act; the Legislative Branch Appropriations Act; the Military Construction Act; the Treasury/General Government Appropriations Act; and the VA/HUD/Independent Agencies Appropriations Act, which you have signed into law).

Discussion

At this time, eight of the regular thirteen FY 2002 appropriations bills have been signed into law. H.J. Res. 76 is a clean, short-term continuing resolution, one that is free of extraneous provisions. This continuing resolution extends the date of P.L. 107-70, the fifth FY 2002 continuing resolution, through Saturday, December 15th. H.J. Res. 76 passed the House by voice vote on December 5th and passed the Senate by unanimous consent on the same day.

H.J. Res. 76 provides funding for continuing projects and activities based on the following terms:

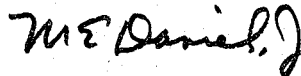
- The funding level is the current rate.
- FY 2001 terms and conditions will apply.
- This sixth continuing resolution will run through December 15th.
- The continuing resolution includes provisions that were requested by the Administration to take care of a number of anomalies, such as authorizing FEMA flood insurance.

Under the continuing resolution, programs that normally have large, up-front obligations may not make such obligations if doing so would impinge on the Congress' final funding prerogatives.

Recommendation

H.J. Res. 76 is a clean continuing resolution that provides funding to the Federal Government until regular appropriations can be approved by the Congress. I recommend that you sign the enrolled bill.

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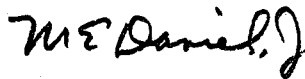
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STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

Today I have signed into law H.J. Res. 76, a short-term continuing resolution for FY 2002.

The Act provides 2002 appropriations for continuing projects and activities of the Federal Government through December 15, 2001.

My Administration has worked, and will continue to work, with the Congress to ensure that FY 2002 discretionary spending is within the agreed upon bipartisan level of \$686 billion and that the emergency supplemental funding total remains within the agreed upon level enacted in P.L. 107-38, the FY 2001 Emergency Supplemental Appropriations Act for Recovery from the tragedy that occurred on September 11, 2001. I urge the Congress to enact the remaining FY 2002 appropriations bills as quickly as possible.



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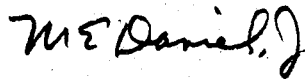
