PAROLES AWAIT AMERICANS LEAVING MEXICO PRISONS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29 (UPI)—About 50 of the 240 Americans who are to be transferred from Mexican prisons in December will be given paroles when they reach the United States, a Justice Department official said today.

Early parole hearings will be arranged for the others who are eligible, and the rest will take up residence in United States prisons, according to Michael Abbell, who is directing the prisoner transfer program.

"We don't anticipate the people who are not mandatory parolees will be out before Christmas," Mr. Abbell said. "At the earliest they will be paroled sometime in January."

The prisoners — 95 percent serving terms for drug violations — will be returned under a treaty and a law signed yesterday by President Carter. Provisions call for an exchange of Mexican and American prisoners with more than six months remaining on their sentences. Excepted are those held on immigration offenses or crimes regarded as political.

United States authorities in Mexico said that approximately 240 of the 575 Americans in Mexican prisons are eligible and have expressed a desire to return to the United States.

ILLEGAL ALIENS AMNESTY IS OPPOSED BY 52% IN POLL

President Carter's proposal for amnesty for illegal aliens who have been in the United States since 1970 is opposed by 52 percent of the American public, according to the latest Gallup Poll.

In a face-to-face survey involving 1,509 persons 39 percent said they supported a proposal "that illegal aliens who have been in the United States for seven years be allowed to remain in the United States." Nine percent had no opinion. Among nonwhites and people with a college education, however, the vote was evenly divided.

The survey also asked the question, "Do you believe everyone in the United States should be required to carry an identification card such as a Social Security card, or not?" A majority, 65 percent, of those interviewed said yes, while 30 percent said no and 5 percent had no opinion.

Support for the required identification card was strongest among nonwhites, 74 percent of whom favored it, and people with only a grade school education, of whom 77 percent were in favor.

As in past surveys, the respondents

overwhelmingly endorsed making it "against the law to employ a person who has come into the United States without proper papers." In April, 82 percent favored such a law while 14 percent opposed it. In the most recent poll, taken Sept. 30 to Oct. 3, 72 percent said they supported such a law, 23 percent said they did not and 5 percent had no opinion.

I am confident that our consultations today will add a new and lasting dimension to the living memorial we commemorate at this beautiful spot on the border between our countries.

SUBJECT: Q's and A's for Mexico Trip

I suggested some questions for State and asked them to prepare some comments for your trip to Mexico. I think they're pretty good as is, and so I'll just forward them.

Possible Press Questions for Mrs. Carter at the Border

Transfer of Prisoners

Q. The US-Mexican Treaty for the Execution of Penal Sanctions goes into effect at the end of this month. Is it correct that some of the Americans expected to be transferred from Mexico in December will be released as soon as they arrive home? If so, is this consistent with the Treaty and acceptable to Mexico?

A. I am informed that about 20 percent of the 240 U.S. prisoners likely to be transferred will have served sufficient time and met other conditions to qualify for immediate parole in the U.S. A significant number of the rest may become eligible for parole in the future and may be released when the U.S. Parole Commission so determines. The Treaty provides that the laws of the U.S. will apply in carrying out the sentences of returned Americans, including matters of parole, just as Mexico will apply its laws in carrying out the sentences of returning Mexican prisoners.

Undocumented Workers

- Q. Isn't the Carter Administration concerned that its proposal to make it illegal for U.S. employers to hire undocumented workers, most of whom are believed to be from Mexico, will lead to discrimination against Mexican-Americans and Mexican legal residents of the U.S.?
- A. The Carter Administration is concerned that this not happen. For this reason the legislation is drafted to minimize any cause for discrimination. Federal agencies working in the civil rights field will also have the special obligation of seeing to it that existing anti-discrimination laws are fully enforced.
- Q. Why are you trying to deny Mexico's undocumented workers the opportunity to work in your country? U.S. employers obviously need them, since most Americans will no longer do the jobs that they will do.
- A. It's true that many of those in the U.S. illegally are good workers and have made a contribution. But our first concern must be to see that job opportunities

are open to our citizens and legal residents. In cases where it is clear that there are no citizen or legal resident workers available to do certain jobs, our laws provide means for bringing in foreign workers with all due legal protection and labor standards.

Q. Will the Ku Klux Klan be allowed to act against undocumented workers on the border as they have threatened? Is this one more indication that the undocumented workers are becoming "scapegoats" in the U.S.?

A. The enforcement of immigration laws along our borders is the exclusive responsibility of the Federal Government. There is no intention to allow private groups of any kind to assume law enforcement responsibilities there.

We deplore any mistreatment of undocumented workers and our government will act firmly against it. In this regard the Administration's policy to control illegal immigration and to adjust the status of those illegal immigrants already in the U.S. has a strong humanitarian basis. We want to make sure that no one who lives in our country

need run the risk of exploitation or mistreatment from any quarter because he is afraid to avail himself of the full protection of the law.

Q. Is it true that the U.S. and Mexico are planning a \$2 or \$3 billion development program to create job opportunities in Mexico for those who might otherwise emigrate to the U.S.?

A. Our policy on illegal immigration announced in August recognizes that poor economic conditions are an underlying cause of migration from the major source countries and, accordingly, offers those countries the help of the U.S. in obtaining economic assistance appropriate to their needs. Consistent with this announced policy, a number of possible ways of cooperating with the source countries is now under consideration within our government, but no specific approach has been decided on.

Panama

Q. Has President Lopez Portillo's refusal to come to the Panama Treaty signing ceremony in September in Washington been seen as a withdrawal of support,

and has it harmed his close relationship with President Carter?

A. I can only speak for President Carter. I know he continues to value his close relationship with President Lopez Portillo very much and especially appreciates his advice and his support on many problems -- including Panama.

Natural Gas

Q. Is the decision of Senator Stevenson to hold up approval of an Ex-Im Bank loan for Mexico's pipeline until there is agreement on the price of gas a way of pressuring Mexico to meet U.S. terms on the sale?

A. I cannot speak for Senator Stevenson and the reasons for his decision. The relations between the U.S. and Mexico as based on friendship and mutual respect and I don't see "pressure" as part of that relationship. I know the U.S. needs gas and I understand that Mexico needs a market. My hope is that our two governments can soon agree on arrangements for a sale that will be fair and beneficial to all parties.

U.S. and Mexico First Ladies To Meet At Border

First Ladies Rosalynn Carter and Mrs. Carmen Romano de Lopez Portillo, the wife of Mexico's President, will meet at the Mexican-U.S. border on Thursday, November 3, in Ciudad Juarez and El Paso to focus attention on the resources of the border region.

The two First Ladies will begin the day at ceremonies marking the 10th anniversary of Chamizal, a park on the Rio Grande that is a symbol of international cooperation and goodwill.

Events in the schedule will include discussions and briefings about educational, cultural, and recreational programs, a binational reception, and the inauguration of an exhibit of art and artifacts.

The meeting was suggested earlier this year to Mrs. Carter by Mrs. Lopez Portillo during the Mexican state visit in Washington, D.C. It was agreed at that time to undertake the joint effort to highlight ways in which the two countries, good friends and neighbors, can work together to enrich the life of people along the border.

President and Mrs. Carter recently asked the Governors of every state to select something that typified their particular region which would in turn be appropriate as a gift from America's First Family to the First Families of other nations:

Governor Ray Blanton of Tennessee selected a dulcimer that had been made by hand by Jesper Petersen, a respected craftsman of that state.

This one-of-a-kind dulcimer, which is made of native walnut and hand-rubbed to a high finish, has ebony bridges and frets made from imported German silver.

The sweet sound of the dulcimer is still heard today in the Appalachian and Smoky Mountain regions of the Southeastern United States.

MRS. CARTER OFFERS AN ARTISTIC
FESTIVAL FOR SRA. LOPEZ PORTILLO

EL PASO, Nov. 2 -- First Lady Rosalynn Carter has planned a gala cultural festival of art and music at 3:30 p.m. tomorrow in honor of Mrs. Carmen Romano de Lopez Portillo, wife of the President of Mexico, and for government officials of both the United States and Mexico, Ann Anderson, Deputy Press Secretary to Mrs. Carter, announced today.

Assembling artists especially noted throughout the Southwest area, as well as in other areas of the artistic world, Mrs. Carter, in special tribute to Mrs. Lopez Portillo, has attempted to reflect the artistic resources of the talented artists living along the American side of the border between the United States and Mexico.

The artistic fiesta and reception will be held in a tent adjacent to the amphitheater at El Paso's Chamizal Memorial National Park. Approximately 700 people are expected to attend.

During the reception, a special musical program will be featured in the nearby amphitheater to include music by the Dallas Symphony Brass Quintet and a piano recital by Jeffrey Swann, a native Texan and Bronze Medal winner of this year's Van Cliburn Competition.

The two First Ladies and guests will view a special exhibition of paintings, called "A Blending of Cultures," by 25 El Paso artists which the City of El Paso asked Leonard P. Sipiora, Director of the El Paso Museum of Art, to assemble in honor of Mrs. Lopez Portillo and Mrs. Carter.

The paintings, ranging in technique from the representational to the abstract, tend to a large extent to reflect the bi-cultural heritage of the United States and Mexico.

Mrs. Dobelle said that it would not qualify as a State trip because it was more of a "friendship" type trip than an official State event.

Accordingly, we shall be funding this trip out of White House funds as we would an official domestic trip, unless the First Lady's staff would like to appeal Mrs. Dobelle's position.

In the future, we should attempt to identify this type of question as early as possible so that we might have more time to work on it. If the existence of a situation of this type in the future escapes my or Bob Schultz's attention in the early planning stages, I would appreciate your pointing it out to us.
