THE STORY OF HEALTH ADVENTURE IS AN IMPRESSIVE EXAMPLE OF THE "GOOD" THINGS GOING ON. I DON'T NEED TO TELL YOU ITS HISTORY . . . YOU KNOW IT WELL. BUT I WANT TO PERSONALLY CONGRATULATE THE MEMBERS OF THE BUNSCOMBE COUNTY MEDICAL AUXILIARY, WHO RECOGNIZED THE NEED FOR THIS KIND OF PROGRAM, AND WITH THE HELP OF THE MEDICAL SOCIETY, ST. YOUR GENEROSITY, YOUR WILLINGNESS TO STEP IN AND FILL A COMMUNITY NEED, IS MOST HEARTENING TO ME.

BOTH JIMMY AND I HAVE HAD A LONGSTANDING INTEREST IN HEALTH PROMOTION. under that system, along with a little detail about where their strengths and weaknesses lie:

Rosalynn remains No. 1 in the hearts of Iowans no matter how you slice it.

Fifty-two percent of the state's adults are convinced she's highly admirable, far and away the best score.

Admiration for the first lady holds fairly consistent in each of the poll's 24 subgroups. She has fewer fans among the state's 18- to 24-year-olds, only 40 percent of whom give her a 5 or a 6. But she picks up that slack with high marks from Iowa's women and elderly.

The results are good news for Rosalynn, but questionable tidings for the family: She is the only one of the six without Carter blood in her veins.

Jimmy, buoyed by a large group here who give him a 5, climbs into a respectable No. 2 position as a result of the new calculations. But he's still 10 percentage points behind his bride.

Perhaps predictably, Jimmy fares best with his own political party: 55 percent of Iowa Democrats consider him very admirable.

But he's pulled down to his statewide average (42 percent) by low marks from the enemy camp: Only one in four Republicans renders high admiration to the president. Farmers also usually give him lower marks.

Just two percentage points back comes Lillian, Iowa's No. 3 Carter.

The president's mother draws her highest marks from retired Iowans. Forty-seven percent of them consider her highly admirable.

Guilt-ridden?

Lillian, you'll remember, went to India with the Peace Corps when she was 68 and worked as a nurse in a clinic, frankly admitting she was bored with Plains, Ga.

That may have cost her some support.

The poll shows she gets lower than average marks from possibly guilt-ridden Iowans making more than \$20,000 a year and possibly offended Iowans who live in towns with populations (like Plains) below 2,500.

Amy finishes as No. 4, not a brilliant performance certainly, but better than her showing in a recent relay race where her team finished last.

Good runner or bad, Amy is still admired by 35 percent of Iowa.

Amy's greatest achievement is her status as the first presidential child.

QUESTION:

On a scale of 1 to 6, with 6 the best score, how much do you admire the following Carter family members?

It may come as a rude awakening 202 years after the fact, but royalty has a purpose.

The Iowa Poll proves it, as you'll soon see. But first we've got to lay a little foundation:

Any right-thinking Englishman will tell you that Queen Elizabeth earns every shilling of her annual stipend. Oh, not for making the crucial decisions of state. Instead, the British keep the bluebloods on the payroll so they'll have someone around to admire. Or to ridicule.

Elizabeth and her kin fill that function well. There are loveable ones and loathable ones. Some marry and some divorce. Some ride horses well.

IOWA POLL

Others, it is said, simply look like horses.

Always, however, they amuse the nation, they get admired or get ridiculed — and the nation's real rulers are free to rule.

Our founding fathers, lacking the foresight to establish an American monarchy, have forced this country's leaders to provide the frivolous distraction as well as to pilot the ship of state.

Along came the Carter family, looking ideal for the job. It was a sort of living soap opera complete with feisty matriarch, freckle-faced daughter, dutiful wife and ne'er-do-well brother. The show was a hit.

But now, if Iowa represents the nation, the ship of state may be sailing into stormy waters. Here's the evidence.

The Iowa Poll asked a representative cross section of Iowans to rate their admiration for each of a half dozen prominent Carter family members on a scale of 1 to 6, with 6 representing the highest admiration and 1 the lowest.

Who is the most admirable Carter? Who ranked up the most often?

Iowans admiring Amy most are those whose educations ended with grade school: 49 percent of them give her a 5 or a 6. That stacks up against 32 percent of college-educated Iowans.

Behind the first daughter in Iowa's estimation comes her "born again" aunt Ruth, 48, and her uncle Billy, 41, a fellow some members of the president's staff wish had not even been born once.

Ruth Carter Stapleton is a practitioner of "inner healing" and is credited with helping both the president and porn publisher Larry Flynt find Jesus.

Billy's blues

But the poll, based on 600 in-home interviews across the state Mar. 15-18, shows Ruth still has some converting to do here: One Iowan out of four is unable to rank her at all.

She finds more admirers among Iowa's farmers than other groups. But for the most part, her grades are uniformly low. Only 21 percent of the state considers Ruth highly admirable.

Bringing up the rear is the family's Clown Prince. The poll shows Billy has about as many admirers of his person as admirers of his beer, which is a commercial flop here.

Only 16 percent of the state considers him worthy of a 5 or 6. More than half of Iowa thinks he's not very admirable at all: 52 percent hand Billy a 1 or 2.

For all you gossip mongers out there who were wondering how the first family stacks up, well, now you know. Weighting all the scores — not just the 5's and 6's — given to each Carter produces the same finishing order.

But if there are others of you out there who think this whole exercise is a little demeaning to the high office of the presidency, address your complaints to Mr. Jefferson.

It would never have happened if America just had a Queen Mother to admire and a duke or two to kick around.

Well, 18 percent of the state's adults think Jimmy, the man they've entrusted with the nation's top job, is sufficiently admirable to merit a 6.

That looks pretty good, perhaps, until you discover that wife Rosalynn, mother Lillian and daughter Amy each fare better than that, drawing sixes from 25 percent, 21 percent and 20 percent of the state, respectively.

Repercussions

Jimmy does outrun brother Billy and sister Ruth (10 percent each), but that's pretty small consolation for the head of a country.

So what are the poll's repercussions on the course of that ship of state?

Put yourself in Jimmy's shoes. There you are in Moscow, trying to negotiate a new SALT agreement with the Russians, trying to command their respect.

But suddenly, one of the boys from the Politburo comes in waving a copy of The Des Moines Sunday Register and announces to the crowd that, back there in the middle of America, the people give the highest level of admiration to the president's wife and the president's mother.

"Even Carter's 10-year-old daughter outpolls him," the Russkie bellows. The negotiators all have a good laugh.

"Send Amy over to bargain," they chortle. Jimmy's face turns red. The talks collapse in confusion.

That's the sort of international crisis a good healthy American monarchy could have averted.

Without royalty, the president's relatives had become celebrities in their own right. They had become more admirable than he.

Composite scores

Well, to limit the proportions of this disaster, we added up the fives and sixes Iowans handed out to each Carter family member. (After all, 5 isn't bad on a scale of 1 to 6). The sum is the percentage of Iowans who consider that person "very admirable."

Grassley's staff busy proving he was invited to White House

Iowa Republican Congressman Charles Grassley's staff was busy Tuesday trying to prove that their man had been invited to a Democratic celebration at the Carter White House.

The frenzy was in response to a remark by Rosalynn Carter in a telephone interview with The Register Monday. She had said that some White House functionary may have invited Grassley, but only without the authority to do so, and that no formal invitation had ever been extended by her Social Office.

Grassley's press secretary, Robert Bradsell, said the Iowa congressman can't show a formal invitation or a Mailgram because he never received either.

Bradsell also released a long series of telephone logs that showed the non-invitation occupied a substantial amount of Grassley staff time for four days.

At the end of the four-day period, Grassley issued a press release, saying he had been invited along with the Iowa Democrats.

Here's the chronology issued by Bradsell:

Phone call from White House — Congressional Liaison Office, late afternoon of Jan. 10. Staff assistant Pat Carroll called, invited Grassley to "State of the Union" party for Iowans — indicated telegram would be sent prior to Jan. 19, said invitation was being extended to Iowa congressional delegation.

Monday a.m. (Jan. 10): No telegram had yet arrived. Phone call placed to White House, referred to Congressional Liaison Office, further referred to Bill Cable. Cable wasn't in; message left for call-back.

Monday p.m.: No call-back from Cable; phone call placed again. Cable unavailable. Message left for call-back.

Tuesday a.m.: No call-back from Cable; phone call placed again. Cable unavailable. Message left for call-back.

Tuesday p.m.: No call-back. Phone call placed to Frank Moore (Cable's boss and White House congressional liaison chief). Moore unavailable. Message left for call-back.

Call-back from Cable. Cable asked about invitation. Paraphrase follows:

"We haven't yet received telegram."

"You should by Thursday."

"Are you sure Grassley is invited. He's a Republican congressman, you know."

"Yes, we know. He probably shouldn't have been but Leach was invited also so there shouldn't be a problem. We certainly aren't going to retract the invitation. We don't do things that way."

"But the news reports are calling it a strictly partisan affair."

"Well it is essentially, but I don't think Grassley will feel unwelcome."

Call placed to Iowa Republican

Congressman James Leach's office: Paraphrase follows:

"Is Leach going?"

"Not sure yet."

"Did he get invitation?"

"Yes, by phone. Told that telegram would arrive by Thursday. Is Grassley going?"

"Yes. He certainly doesn't want to be the only member of the delegation not to show up."

"The invitation wasn't handled very well."

"It certainly wasn't. I think we'll call again to verify it before Grassley goes over."

Wednesday a.m.: Call placed to Cable's office. Cable unavailable, referred to staff assistant. Paraphrase follows:

"I'm calling again to verify invitation to White House reception for Iowans tomorrow night."

"Yes, the invitation is legitimate. I'm sorry the official invitation is so late. But you should receive it by tomorrow. In any event, he doesn't need it to get in."

"Are you sure he'll be on the guest list?"

"Of course he'll be on the guest list."

"Do you need any clearance information?"

"Not for the congressman, but for any staffers who will accompany him."

Marking time with juvenile justice bill

IT UNDOUBTEDLY will offend some politicians who have worked very hard on the plan, but the juvenile justice bill that has been dominating the Iowa Senate's debate time for a couple of weeks is little more than make-work to keep lawmakers out of mischief.

The purpose is to give Senate Democratic leaders the time to hammer their priorities and schedules for the rest of the 1978 session, and their private view is that if something comes of the bill, that's so much the better.

One of the bright spots of the debate came in the dark. Des Moines Republican Philip Hill had the floor when the lights went out for a moment.

"All of a sudden, I start speaking and it gets dark," said Hill, in the legislative custom of addressing the presiding officer. "Is someone trying to tell me something, Mr. President? But I can go on in the dark — I have for years."

• Hill is commonly regarded as one of the top senators and is rarely in the dark — he's retiring from politics this year — and his quip brings to mind that it's easier to find truth in jest than anywhere else.

For example, the line here a week or so ago that the only serious Washington columnists are Art Buchwald, Russell Baker and Don Kaul.

It was basely stolen, and slightly altered, and it should have carried an acknowledgement that it was William Saroyan's idea — yes, he's still around and let's hope he will be 50 years from now.

Washington Whispers.

Carter's Private Comments on Begin . . . A Big Headache For Castro . . . Turnabout on U.S. Pullout From Korea?

President Carter, whose public statements reflect increasing impatience with Israel's Prime Minister Begin, is displaying even greater bitterness in private over what he views as repeated reneges on promises about Jewish settlements in occupied Arab territory. White House advisers are discussing counteractions, including a squeeze on delivery of arms.

★ ★ ★

Unqualified—and surprising—support given Carter recently by Senator Edward Kennedy has White House aides convinced that the Massachusetts lawmaker may be the man they are seeking to replace the late Hubert Humphrey as the President's chief ally in Congress, able to swing close votes on key issues.

★ ★ ★

U.S. intelligence sources say they have spotted signs of discontent within Cuba because of casualties among that nation's forces fighting in Africa. Internal problems for Prime Minister Fidel Castro are predicted if Cuba's continued build-up in Ethiopia leads to much heavier troop losses.

★ ★ ★

The President soon may quietly bury his plan to withdraw all American ground forces from South Korea. Instead, the White House is expected to leave two brigades in Korea, limiting the pull-back to only one brigade.

★ ★ ★

Panamanian strong man Omar Torrijos will try to accept the Panama Canal treaties, if approved in amended form by the Senate, without holding a new plebiscite. With the backing of Panama's National Guard, Torrijos probably can compel acceptance.

★ ★ ★

Though he is considered a hero in Philadelphia, David Marston, the federal prosecutor fired by the Carter Administration, faces trouble from

fellow Republicans if he decides to run for Statewide office. He is on the outs with Richard Thornburgh, leading G.O.P. contender for Governor this year, and has upset party politicians by investigating prominent Republicans outside Philadelphia before his ouster.

★ ★ ★

Little noticed in the furor over the Marston affair was a Justice Department report concluding that Carter's campaign proposal to make the Attorney General independent of the Presidency—and thus less subject to political pressures—was unworkable and probably unconstitutional.

★ ★ ★

Western intelligence sources in East Europe report that Polish boss Edward Gierek is having increasing trouble maintaining his hold on the country. They do not discount the possibility of a change at the top.

★ ★ ★

Among Pentagon insiders, Army Chief of Staff Gen. Bernard W. Rogers is considered the best bet to become Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff when Air Force Gen. George Brown retires June 30.

★ ★ ★

Latest Government theory on those mysterious booming explosions off the East Coast: They were caused by military aircraft flying through unusually fast air currents in the jet stream. Sonic booms can be carried in such currents for 100 miles or more, explaining why it is so difficult to pinpoint cause of the disturbances.

★ ★ ★

The Department of Transportation is laying plans to restrict big trucks plying the interstate highway network to a limited number of such superhighways, to be designated as "freight corridors." Aim is twofold: Provide more truck-free roads to meet motor-

ists' complaints, and limit the roads that must be repaired as a result of damage by heavy vehicles.

★ ★ ★

Rosalynn Carter, who has played a low-key role so far as First Lady, is starting to strike out on her own. She recently telephoned a reporter for a Midwestern newspaper and reprimanded him for a critical article he wrote about a White House party.

★ ★ ★

Federal experts who have been checking security at airports around the world where U.S. planes land point to five—Rome, Athens, Casablanca, Istanbul and Ankara—as posing the worst risks for hijacking.

★ ★ ★

A new analysis of Carter's work habits shows he puts in an average of 69.7 hours in the office weekly, 30 of them reading. Aides had originally mapped out a 55-hour week for him.

★ ★ ★

All but one of the 14 members of the Soviet Politburo are now old enough to qualify for pensions, payable at age 60. Average age of the group: 67.

★ ★ ★

Western diplomats in Moscow have this explanation of why much of the meat the Soviet Union is importing from the West is being sent to Soviet troops along the China border: It's a sign of high-level concern over deteriorating morale among those forces.

★ ★ ★

Why are senatorial staff members now wearing badges when they're on the Senate floor to show whether they work for Democrats or Republicans? Staffs have grown so large that lawmakers, who can't keep track of so many people, want to be sure that their private conversations aren't being overheard by aides from the opposite party.

Miami, Fla. - Mrs. Rosalynn Carter will be the key speaker at the "Community Salute to Mildred and Claude Pepper" dinner at the Fontainebleau Hilton in Miami Beach on September 28. Florida Governor Reubin Askew and Presidential Envoy to the Vatican, David M. Walters, dinner committee chairman, will also address the gathering.

Congressman Pepper said he is "highly pleased" that Mrs. Carter will be coming to South Florida to speak at the dinner.

"I have admired Mrs. Carter's work in the field of human needs, including mental health and issues concerning the elderly. Her intelligence, enthusiasm and motivation are an inspiration. She was instrumental in arranging the White House Rose Garden ceremony this April when my anti-mandatory retirement bill was signed into law by the President. The report of the President's Commission on Mental Health, which Mrs. Carter chaired, is a milestone in describing the care needed by the mentally ill in our nation.

"I enjoyed participating in Mrs. Carter's Roundtable on Aging last year very much. The Roundtable accomplished a great deal, and the exchange of views helped to focus attention on numerous problems, including deficiencies in Medicare, the pressing need for home health care and improved services at senior citizens centers, mandatory retirement, energy costs, inflation, and crime against the elderly," Pepper said.

SUBJECT: Iowa Jefferson-Jackson Day Dinner

This draft will need updating to reflect what happens on energy in Congress, last minute farm prices and conditions and other events that might overtake us.

It would also be stronger with a few more personal reminiscences about some of these stops (or others). Tim Kraft couldn't come up with any that he felt would hold up well in a crowd. If Marie Jahns is going to be there it would be good to do something beyond just this mention. I understand she did come to the Inauguration, was unable to attend the Iowa party and the J-J Dinner last year but I'm told she plans to come to this, and that she is almost totally blind now -- able to distinguish little more than between daylight and darkness.

FOR YOUR BACKGROUND

1. Issues:

As you know, we lost Iowa by only 13,000, although it has rarely voted for a Democratic for President. Catholic areas went heavily Democratic, Lutheran heavily Republican, Methodist split evenly. The President had three main things going for him among Iowans -- they thought he understood farmers (more Iowans depend directly on agriculture for a living -- most of their industry is agricultural equipment -- than in almost any state), would have a highly moral and honest administration and would manage government efficiently.

So far they do not perceive government as any more efficient than usual, and they are disturbed by incidents such as Peter Bourne saying drug use was common at the White House. Corn (corn prices are soft) and cattle farmers are not happy about our farm programs. Hog farmers seem to be prosperous and happy though the beef import decision makes some uneasy. The record corn crop apparently is something to see, so you can stress their accomplishment and avoid price discussions. The grain set-asides affect them some, but not much.

Beef

According to our agricultural specialists, the experts expected beef prices to go down even if we had not increased import quotas. Beef prices were leading the inflation spiral, and had gone way above what conditions called for. The drop was not as immediate as some farmers indicate. The import quota increase amounts to only $\frac{1}{4}$ of 1% of the beef market, and has a minimal actual long-term effect, but market prices are partly psychological and the action signalled everyone that the President did not intend to let prices just go up and up. That countered the psychology of "buy now at whatever you can get things for" because tomorrow they will cost more. This, of course, was the whole idea. Beef prices to farmers are on the way back up, and have

now recovered about half of the ground lost then, may recover more by the time of this speech. Since cattle do not have to go to market regardless of price, as might be the case with lettuce or peaches for example, it is not exactly correct to say farmers "lost" certain amounts because of the drop. They have considerable leeway on when to sell. Those who went ahead to market just after prices fell did not get what they expected, perhaps, but the number is relatively small. What counts is that they feel that after several years of losses as soon as things began to improve for them they were cut off at the pass, and will be again before they can make up for past years. They don't buy our arguments that letting in lean cattle gave them a better market to use up all the fat cattle. Livestock is a major factor in the 25% increase in farm income in the past year, but they still feel we've let them down.

The important thing to remember, though, is that had the President not acted, the psychology of inflation would have heated up the whole economy, not only with consumers but with the businessmen who make decisions that raise wages and prices all down the line. The beef import quota decision was a small adjustment in the market, but was an important gesture in relieving pressures for strong controls of beef and other food prices that would have become intense if he had not acted when he did.

Because Iowa farmers are generally specialized, almost all of them buy a considerable amount of food at grocery stores and they are hurt by food price increases in other areas. Also, Iowa has one of the highest percentages of elderly people to its total population in the country, and the elderly are hit hard by inflation. (They are also vitally concerned with Social Security.)

UAW

The UAW is unhappy because of the health insurance decision. Since they have a disproportionately high influence on delegate selection, and Chuck Gifford was an important factor in our success in that in 1976, anything you can do to improve relations there would be helpful.

2. Candidates: (See accompanying Congressional Quarterly Summary)

Clark is reportedly in better shape (his arch-conservative Republican opposition has been tied to a past scandal) Clark has always led in the polls but not as much as he would like this far ahead for an incumbent. He has been playing down his Carter ties somewhat in recent days, and just how to handle that at the time to be most helpful will take some last minute consultation with his people.)

Fitzgerald has a very uphill fight because of Gov. Ray's popularity and the fact that he has apparently been a good administrator and run a scandal-free state for three terms. Here again we'll need some last minute consultation.

Congressman Bedell is said to be the most in trouble of the Congressional candidates. Accompanying articles from the Des Moines Register on Bergman's visit indicate some of the problems there.

3. Judge:

Don O'Brien, who was campaign coordinator in Michigan and almost beat Ford in his home state, is a very popular Sioux City attorney and was on the Democratic National Committee in 1976. He was recommended by the Senators for a judgeship and everyone expected him to be appointed. There are problems, but Margaret McKenna says the final decision should be made early in September.

4. Recent Iowa Appointees:

John Devereaux, who was originally from Louisiana but lived in Iowa and served on Congressman Harkin's staff, until his recent appointment as executive director of the White House Conference on Small Business. Iowa has such a low unemployment rate it is considered technically over-employed. Perhaps he can help the rest of the country figure out how to match Iowa's record.

5. Other Issues:

HEW got into a controversy last year by demanding that girls basketball teams in Iowa abandon their traditional 6 players and go to 5 like everybody else (apparently scholarship eligibility, etc, was involved). Girls basketball is a very

serious thing in Iowa; fathers travel around to cheer their daughters on. Califano eventually held up a decision because of the uproar... so Iowa still has 6 girls to a team. (Lori Baux in personnel, who worked on the Iowa campaign, is remembered by some Iowans from her basketball days.)

I can find no well-known difference in Iowa and Georgia corn comparable, say, to Idaho potatoes. There are differences in varieties, they grow mostly feed but some eating corn, a little pop corn (Indiana is the major pop corn producer.) They apparently do not grow white "eating" corn like ours. Griffin Smith, our gourmet speechwriter, tells me he once ate some corn specially flown in from Iowa after it was picked at its peak in the morning dew, and swears it was better than any corn he ever tasted, even some picked while the water was boiling in the best prescribed manner. Despite this testimony from a serious connoisseur, I can find no official corn experts who can tell me why this would be so, but experts have produced many of the beautiful plastic-tasting fruits and vegetables we know so well, on the theory that consumers won't know the difference in taste, so I'd go with Griffin's assessment of Iowa corn's obvious superior flavor. I doubt that Iowans would object.

IOWA JEFFERSON-JACKSON DAY DINNER
September 1978

I was especially pleased that you invited me back to Iowa at harvest time. Your corn crop is just beautiful. I know after last year's bad weather how satisfying it must be to see those miles and miles of healthy cornfields. You have a right to be proud.

Farming can be discouraging, even heartbreaking sometimes. I know the risks and the hard work involved, but when I see a crop so healthy and abundant I remember why we endure all those risks, all the work and struggle and years of disappointment. It's for such a harvest as this.

I'm sorry I couldn't have been here last year with Jimmy, but one of my fondest memories is of the Jefferson-Jackson Day dinner in 1975 -- the great night of the straw poll.

Coming back to Iowa is almost like coming home. You all know how much your help and support meant to us. You took us in when nobody else outside of Georgia knew or cared

who we were. You listened to us and brought your friends and neighbors over to listen to us -- in all that snow. Even if we had never gotten to the convention, I'd still love you for it. And after you'd listened and decided we had something to say, you made the rest of the country listen. We wouldn't be in Washington if it hadn't been for you.

Those were some of the longest, busiest days of my life. There were many days -- and many people -- in Iowa that fall and winter that I will never forget: the reception at Fort Dodge and another at Paul Kampa's farm in September, 1975; the luncheons at Mason City and Ottumka in December. One snowy day in January stands out -- I'd spent the night at the home of Nancy (?) and Jim Schaben after campaigning the day before with Brent Wynja. Bill Ryerson picked me up and drove to Council Bluffs for a luncheon and then to a coffee at the Shenandoah library. I was supposed to fly to Centerville but the weather was too bad, so Bill drove us on to a reception at the country club in Knoxville. We were about an hour late, but everyone waited. Bill and I finally finished that night with a function at the Ramada Inn in Des Moines.

One of the people I remember best, not only because she was one of our earliest and strongest supporters, but

because she was such a remarkable person, is Marie Jahns. She wasn't able to make it to the Iowa party, or to dinner last fall, but I'm glad to see she's here tonight. Jimmy's first trip to Iowa was to a dinner honoring Marie at Le Mars for her 38 years of service as Plymouth County recorder. She holds the record for the longest time in elected office in Iowa of any woman from either party. But it wasn't her longevity that impressed us so much as her own strong character -- she symbolizes the honesty, integrity and selfless dedication that we found so typical of Iowans.

Antenna The thing I remember and cherish most about Iowa, however, is the chance we had to get to know you -- to talk to you about what was wrong with the country and what was right, to share your worries and your hopes and dreams for the future of this great nation.

I discovered that the people here worried about much the same things that occupied us in Plains -- about crops and making ends meet and preparing for their old age, that you loved your churches and your schools and took great pride in your communities and wanted to make a better world for your children and grandchildren. I discovered a wealth of friendship and strong moral values, a love of the land and a deep love for this country.

One of the things I missed later in the campaign, when the crowds got so large and the television cameras and reporters so numerous, was the opportunity to really talk to people as we could here in Iowa at coffees for 8 or 10 in a farmhouse and receptions for 20 or 30 in a big town. I won't say I'm sorry so many people are here tonight because I'm not -- I'm glad to see all of you, proud that you came, and I know the Iowa Democrats you'll be voting for in November are glad to see you and will be looking for your help and support.

But I loved those little gatherings. That's one of the reasons that in the next few months I plan to be getting out into the country more and more. I want to have a chance to really talk to people about things that we need to do in our country and how we can do them -- not how we can get government to do them, but how we can get together and do what needs doing where we are in our own communities. We each have to take responsibility for our own actions and for our demands as well, always asking ourselves "What would our world be like if everybody did what I'm doing?"

We found so much of that spirit in Iowa -- people accepting responsibility for their actions and their communities, not waiting for somebody else to solve their problems, but

working with their neighbors to make their community what they wanted it to be. You demand the same spirit from those who serve you as you do from yourselves, and that's what Jimmy is trying to do -- to take hold of the problems we inherited and take the necessary steps to solve them. Often in the past ^{problems have built up over long periods but} our leaders ignored them.

because there were no easy or popular solutions. The people assumed things were not as bad as they might seem. They rightfully counted on their leaders to warn them of impending trouble instead of putting off hard decisions. Jimmy could have delayed some of these problems still longer, but that would have made them even harder to correct. Instead he has tried to be honest with you about the issues as he saw them to get the nation to face up to its problems and responsibilities and its potential. The hopeful thing to me is that there is so much we can do as a people and as individuals to control energy use and inflation and our environment. We are not helpless. But we must work together on our common goals if we are to accomplish anything. We can not wait for the next fellow to make the first move, to accept the necessary sacrifices of temporary advantages.

It is that spirit that has made the Democratic Congressional delegation from Iowa so outstanding and so respected in Washington. Senator Clark and Senator Culver are known for their independence and integrity and their concern for the welfare of the whole nation. [insert here comments on the Congressmen closer to election] Iowa is especially fortunate to have such a distinguished delegation.

People keep saying Iowa is really still a Republican state, but I look at our two fine Democratic Senators and I see both houses of your legislature have Democratic majorities and four of your six representatives in Congress are Democrats, and I wonder where it is "really" Republican. Of course, you've still got a Republican governor, but you've got a good chance to correct that with Jerry Fitzgerald. We tried to get Jerry to come on our campaign staff but he was in the middle of a legislative session, and Jerry's not the kind of person who walks away from his responsibilities. He had a job to do and he had promised to reform Iowa's tax system to make it fairer. He kept that promise to the people of Iowa as majority leader, and I know he'll keep his promises as governor.

In Georgia when I was growing up times were hard and almost everybody was poor. Absolutely everybody was a Democrat. We were born Democrats, it was part of our heritage. In recent years as people have become more prosperous, some of them thought they'd gotten rich enough that they could afford to become Republicans, but then they elected a Republican President and found they couldn't afford it after all.

When he was here in 1975 and 1976 Jimmy talked to you about a lot of tough problems that had been developing over a long period of time -- energy and inflation and health care costs. He talked about reorganizing the government so it would work for us instead of against us. He talked about farm prices that would assure farmers of a decent living and some stability so you could plan, instead of the boom or bust situation we had had.

He promised to make the Social Security system fiscally sound and he did. He promised to get Americans back to work and get the economy moving again, and he did. A record number of jobs were created over the past year -- more than 6 million. He promised you better farm and steadier income and its up 25 per cent, with livestock a major factor.

He promised he would find ways to hold down hospital costs and he would propose the first comprehensive national

energy program and he did. Those two proposals could do more than anything else we could do to hold down inflation, but special interests have tied them up for months. He has proposed reforms that will restore merit to the merit system, so incompetence and laziness will not be rewarded and even more important, so good workers will have incentives to do their best. He has proposed a gradual phasing in of national health insurance. He has been criticized for not committing himself to fully implement national health insurance even if the overall economy does not warrant it. Some people call that a failure of leadership. I think leadership involves more than just the ability to order "full steam ahead". It also involves knowing when to cut the engines, and when to drop anchor. One of the first things a naval officer learns is that a ship is responsible for its wake. We must make sure that in the wake of our programs we don't do more damage than good.

Inflation is not a simple issue. Like the energy problem, it is made up not only of major trends, but of millions of individual decisions. Wasted energy is a major cause of inflation, but so is the fear of many Americans that inflation is inevitable. Because of their fear they raise their prices and wage-demands not only to meet existing conditions, but to anticipate additional inflation. And that keeps us in a constant spiral of self-fulfilling fears.

When President Franklin Roosevelt said we had nothing to fear but fear itself, he was referring to the fear of further depression that was preventing people from starting to rebuild the economy. Whenever we over-react to real problems we make them worse. Before our country could start to rebuild then, it had to stop reacting with fear. We, too, must learn to stop reacting in fear. We must not let our fear of inflation control us if we are ever to control inflation.

There are no magic cures. The solutions have to come in hundreds of individual and group decisions to use restraint. Self-restraint is not glamorous. Americans much prefer to go all out on things, but what is needed right now is for labor and management, farmers and factor workers, consumers and government to join together to act responsibly and with restraint.

Jimmy has acted to control the federal budget, both by holding down raises for white collar federal workers this year and eliminating raises for executives, and by saying "no" to pork barrel projects and nuclear aircraft carriers we don't need and can't afford. But saying "no" at the right time is just as much a part of his job as saying "yes".

Solving problems like energy and civil service reform and inflation aren't much fun. They're like balancing your

checkbook. When you get it done no one cheers or pins a medal on you, but if you don't do it, you're on the road to economic chaos.

Jimmy has insisted that we sit down as a nation and begin balancing the books -- the energy costs and the environmental costs and the hospital costs and farm prices and consumer prices and the costs of government, and get our house in order. You elected him to get things in shape. He's trying, and he's made a lot of progress. But he needs your help to make it work. He needs your help in your personal decisions that add to inflation and energy waste and he needs your support in the national decisions that ^{must} be made and accepted if we are to get control of our nation's destiny.

ONE TEST OF CLAUDE PEPPER'S NATIVE INTELLIGENCE WAS THAT HE HAD THE GOOD SENSE AND THE GOOD FORTUNE TO MARRY MILDRED.

CLAUDE WENT TO THE UNITED STATES SENATE WHEN HE WAS 26 YEARS OLD AND SERVED 14 YEARS WITH DISTINCTION. HE IS NOW SERVING HIS 16TH YEAR IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES WHERE HE HAS ALSO SERVED WITH DISTINCTION. I KNOW OF FEW PEOPLE IN CONGRESS MORE RESPECTED BY HIS COLLEAGUES, BY LEADERS IN GOVERNMENT AND BY THE PUBLIC THAN CLAUDE PEPPER. A COUNSELOR TO PRESIDENTS, HE IS AN EFFECTIVE LAWYER WHO TREADS THE SOMETIMES NARROW LINE OF SERVING HIS COUNTRY WELL AND THE INTERESTS OF HIS CONSTITUENTS. HIS LEADERSHIP AS CHAIRMAN OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE ON CRIME IN THE HOUSE FOR FOUR YEARS AND NOW OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE ON AGING IN THE HOUSE IS MARKED WITH A RECORD OF ACCOMPLISHMENT.

THIS YEAR ALONE HE HAS BEEN INSTRUMENTAL IN PASSING A CRIME AMENDMENT WHICH WILL INCREASE PERSONAL SAFETY AND SECURITY IN PUBLIC HOUSING FOR THE ELDERLY, AND THE LANDMARK MANDATORY RETIREMENT BILL WHICH GOES A LONG WAY TOWARD WIPING OUT AGE DISCRIMINATION. THIS LEGISLATION, WHICH JIMMY SIGNED INTO LAW AT A CEREMONY AT THE WHITE HOUSE, IS A SECOND DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE FOR ELDERLY AMERICANS. NOW THEY HAVE A CHOICE AS TO WHETHER THEY WANT TO RETIRE OR KEEP WORKING AND NOT BE PUT OUT TO PASTURE BECAUSE SOME

ROLE SAYS THEY HAVE TO QUIT WORK AT 65 or 70. BY HOLDING HEARINGS EXPOSING THE PROBLEM OF POVERTY AMONG MILLIONS OF THE AGING, CLAUDE PEPPER HAS SHOCKED THE NATIONAL CONSCIENCE.

AS A MEMBER OF THE FLORIDA HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, IN 1929, HE SHOWED WHERE HIS HEART AND COMPASSION WERE IN THE STRUGGLE FOR MINORITY RIGHTS. HE WAS ONE OF A HANDFUL OF STATE LEGISLATORS IS IN FACT -- WHO VOTED AGAINST A RESOLUTION TO CONDEMN MRS. IN 1955, HE CAST THE DECIDING VOTE IN THE HOUSE RULES COMMITTEE FOR OPEN HOUSING. HE HAS FIGHTED EARLY AND HARD FOR THE EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT FOR WOMEN. JUST LAST MONTH JIMMY SIGNED INTO LAW H.R. 15 WHICH INCLUDED CONGRESSMAN PEPPER'S BILL TO EXPAND TRAINING OPPORTUNITIES FOR MINORITIES IN OUR NATION'S MEDICAL SCHOOLS.

HE WAS THE FIRST TO INTRODUCE LEND-LEASE IN THE U.S. SENATE UNDER WHICH THE UNITED STATES BECAME THE ARSENAL OF DEMOCRACY WHICH MADE POSSIBLE THE SURVIVAL OF THE FREE WORLD. AND HE WAS FOREMOST AMONG THE SENATORS WHO STOOD BEHIND PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT IN PREPARING OUR COUNTRY AGAINST THE VICIOUS ASSAULTS BY HITLER UPON THE FREE WORLD.

SENATOR PEPPER INTRODUCED THE FIRST BILL CALLING FOR RADIO AND TELEVISION COVERAGE OF CONGRESSIONAL FLOOR DEBATES, A DREAM

THAT IS FAST BECOMING A REALITY. HE IS THE ORIGINAL AUTHOR OF THE "HOT MEALS FOR SENIOR CITIZENS" PROGRAM. HE WAS, FOR FOUR YEARS, CHAIRMAN OF THE HOUSE CRIME COMMITTEE WHOSE PROPOSALS LED TO GREATER CONTROL OVER DRUG SMUGGLING AND ABUSE AND PROTECTING THE YOUNG AGAINST THE USE OF DRUGS. HE HAD INCLUDED IN THE JUVENILE JUSTICE AND DELINQUENCY PREVENTION ACT EXTENSION THIS YEAR A PROVISION CALLING FOR A NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON LEARNING DISABILITIES. THIS CONFERENCE SHOULD GO A LONG WAY TOWARD CURBING CRIME COMMITTED BY YOUNG PEOPLE.

HE WAS THE FIRST TO INTRODUCE LEGISLATION PROVIDING FOR FEDERAL AID TO THE ARTS AND THE HUMANITIES; THE FIRST TO INTRODUCE A BILL FOR A WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION - ALWAYS DEEPLY CONCERNED FOR THE HEALTH AND WELL-BEING OF THE PEOPLE. SENATOR PEPPER WAS THE CO-AUTHOR OF THE LEGISLATION ESTABLISHING THE NATIONAL CANCER INSTITUTE IN 1937 AND THEREAFTER THE PRINCIPAL AUTHOR OF THE LEGISLATION ESTABLISHING FIVE OTHER INSTITUTES IN THE NATIONAL INSTITUTES OF HEALTH FOR RESEARCH IN HEART DISEASE, ARTHRITIS, RHEUMATISM AND BURSITIS, BLINDNESS, DIABETES AND NEUROLOGICAL DISEASES. THIS LEGISLATION LED TO SENATOR PEPPER'S RECEIVING THE COVETED ALBERT AND MARY LASKER FOUNDATION AWARD IN 1967.

BASED UPON THE ABOVE RECORD THE SCHOOL OF MEDICINE OF YOUR OWN GREAT UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI IN 1974 AWARDED THEN CONGRESSMAN

PEPPER ITS DEGREE OF HONORARY DOCTOR OF SCIENCE, THE CITATION OF WHICH READ:

"Dominating his career has been his humanitarian concern for the welfare and the well-being of his fellowmen, young and old, from the community to the national and international level. The history of national health legislation could not be written without mentioning Claude Pepper. As far back as 1937, he co-sponsored the creation of the National Cancer Institute. In the following years, he spear-headed additional legislation, leading to today's National Institutes of Health which are credited with revolutionizing medical science, and medical care here and abroad. He was a prime mover in the passage of the Hill-Barton Act, to which many of our hospitals are indebted. He zealously advocated bills for community health and mental retardation, nurses training, health professions assistance, and the heart-cancer-stroke program."

HE HAS TAKEN THE LEAD IN THE SUPPORT OF PROGRAMS FOR HOUSING, EDUCATION, PROTECTION OF THE ENVIRONMENT AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT.

THESE ARE ONLY A FEW OF THE THINGS THIS UNDEPATIGABLE MAN HAS DONE.

BUT, THAT IS QUITE A RECORD, BY ANY STANDARD OF MEASURE.

AS YOU KNOW, I AM HONORARY CHAIRMAN OF THE COMMISSION AND YOU KNOW I AM PLEASED. I WILL TRY TO ATTEND.

I HAVE SEEN CLAUDE PEPPER'S WORK FIRST HAND SINCE JIMMY BECAME PRESIDENT, AND I HAVE HEARD HIS ELOQUENT PLEA FOR THOSE WHO NEED HELP, INCLUDING WHEN HE WAS THE LEAD-OFF SPEAKER AT A ROUNDTABLE ON AGING I CONDUCTED IN THE WHITE HOUSE STATE ROOM. I READ HIS TESTIMONY BEFORE THE DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL PLATFORM COMMITTEE WHERE HE MADE A SUCCESSFUL APPEAL TO INCLUDE A PLANK CALLING FOR HOME HEALTH CARE AS AN ALTERNATIVE TO INSTITUTIONALIZATION. JUST LAST WEEK, THE HOUSE APPROVED TWO OF HIS HOME HEALTH RECOMMENDATIONS BY A VOTE OF 398 to 2.

I KNOW THAT MY HUSBAND NEEDS CLAUDE PEPPER IN WASHINGTON AND COUNTS ON HIM FOR SUPPORT. AND I KNOW THAT CONGRESSMAN PEPPER SHARES JIMMY'S HOPES FOR A BETTER AND MORE PROSPEROUS AMERICA, FOR CURBING INFLATION, FOR GOVERNMENT REORGANIZATION AND CIVIL SERVICE REFORM, FOR PEACE IN THE WORLD, AND FOR A SETTLEMENT IN THE MIDDLE EAST THAT WILL BE FAIR TO ALL AND WILL GUARANTEE THE SECURITY OF ISRAEL. INCIDENTALLY, CLAUDE PEPPER, AS A MEMBER OF THE PLATFORM COMMITTEE OF THE DEMOCRATIC NATIONAL CONVENTION IN CHICAGO IN 1944, WAS INSTRUMENTAL IN GETTING A PLATFORM CALLING FOR AN INDEPENDENT ISRAEL, AND CLAUDE PEPPER WAS AMONG THE FIRST TO URGE PRESIDENT TRUMAN TO RECOGNIZE ISRAEL IN 1948 AND HAS BEEN A STRONG SUPPORTER OF THE RECOGNITION AND INDEPENDENCE OF ISRAEL EVER SINCE.

CONGRESSMAN PEPPER IS NOT ONLY A NATIONAL ASSET AS CHAIRMAN OF THE HOUSE SELECT COMMITTEE ON AGING, BUT WITH THE CONVENING OF A NEW CONGRESS EARLY NEXT YEAR, HIS SENIORITY WILL COUNT EVEN MORE. IS PROPELLED BY A FUNDAMENTAL SENSE OF DECENCY AND RESPECT FOR ALL HUMANITY, BUT CLAUDE PEPPER BELIEVES IN SOUND AND EFFECTIVE GOVERNMENT. LIKE MY HUSBAND, HE FEELS THERE SHOULD BE A CUT IN TAXES. HE HAS RECENTLY VOTED FOR A TAX CUT OF OVER 16 BILLION DOLLARS, TO REDUCE THE FEDERAL DEFICIT TO THE LOWEST FIGURE SINCE 1974; FOR CIVIL SERVICE REFORM; FOR REDUCING THE LOAD OF PAPERWORK ON BUSINESS; AND FOR THE REORGANIZATION OF GOVERNMENT TO REDUCE THE NUMBER OF FEDERAL EMPLOYEES AND MAKE GOVERNMENT MORE EFFICIENT.

CONGRESSMAN PEPPER ALWAYS CARRIES A HEAVY LEGISLATIVE LOAD, BUT HE IS NEVER TOO BUSY TO LISTEN TO SOMEBODY ELSE'S PROBLEMS. THAT'S THE REASON HE HAS EARNED THE SLOGAN — "PEPPER HELPS PEOPLE".

ON BEHALF OF OUR COUNTRY, JIMMY AND I ARE PROUD TO JOIN THE STATE OF FLORIDA AND THIS COMMUNITY IN SALUTING THESE TWO DISTINGUISHED AND DEDICATED AMERICANS FOR THE SERVICES THEY HAVE LONG RENDERED TO OUR COUNTRY.

JIMMY AND I WISH THERE WERE MORE PEOPLE LIKE MILNER AND CLAUDE PEPPER IN THE WORLD. AND WE HOPE THAT YOU WILL SEND THE PEPPERS BACK TO WASHINGTON AND CONGRESS SO THAT WE MAY BE PRIVILEGED TO SHARE THEM WITH YOU.

FLORIDA KEYS AQUEDUCT AUTHORITY
MONROE COUNTY, FLORIDA
FmHA Loan \$53,225,000

Florida Keys Aqueduct Authority was created by the State Legislature originally as the Florida Keys Aqueduct Commission in 1937. The enabling legislation was revised July 1, 1970, changing the name to the Florida Keys Aqueduct Authority. The Authority has the responsibility for providing potable water to Monroe County, commonly referred to as the "Fabulous Florida Keys."

Fresh ground water is non-existent in Monroe County. Potable water is supplied from wells and treatment facilities located on the mainland at Florida City and piped about 138 miles to Key West through an 18" aqueduct. Other water is secured from a large desalination plant located in Key West and a smaller desalination plant located at Rock Harbor.

The 18" aqueduct was constructed by the U. S. Navy in 1942 primarily to serve the naval facilities in the Key West area. On February 8, 1976, the U. S. Government transferred by quitclaim deed the facilities to the Florida Keys Aqueduct Authority. The aqueduct is old, has inadequate capacity, and leaks. It requires the services of three repair crews to repair leaks.

Energy costs are excessive to operate the two desalination plants and the five pumping stations.

Planned Improvements

The project consists of the construction of a new pipeline from the Florida City well field and treatment plant in South Dade County to Stock Island in Monroe County. The pipeline will be approximately 138 miles long or 700,000 linear feet. The pipeline diameter will be 36" from the

Florida City well field to Tavenier, 30" from Tavenier to Marathon and 24" from Marathon to Stock Island. The capacity of the water treatment plant and water storage will be increased. Three new wells will be constructed. The capacity of the main pumping station will be increased by the installation of a high volume pump. All other pumping stations will be eliminated.

Estimated Project Cost

The total estimated project cost is \$79,225,000. Planned funding consists of the following:

Energy Savings

When the improvements are completed the two desalination plants will no longer be used and five booster pumping stations will also be discontinued. * This will save 100,000 barrels of oil annually. The elimination of the desalination plants and booster pump stations will save the Authority an estimated \$2,708,000 annually in energy, chemicals, and other operating and maintenance costs. In addition, labor cost of maintaining the new pipeline will be only a fraction of the cost of maintaining the old pipeline.

Economic Benefits

The planned improvements will provide an increase volume of potable water which will permit development of residential and commercial properties in Monroe County. Development in the past has been restricted because of limited water.

Referendum Required

The Farmers Home Administration loan cannot be closed or construction commenced until a referendum election is held at which a majority of those voting vote in the affirmative for the proposed loan to be secured by bonds.

Mrs. Carter plans to return to Washington early Saturday afternoon.



I talked with the people at the mental health center this morning. They had not pursued the bowling alley at all, but had come up with an alternative proposal for an event at the center.

The visual impact is about the same as the bowling alley and I made the judgment it's better to do an event there rather than disappoint them at this time. I have discussed with Mary and Paul and both agree.

The event is a demonstration of creative drama therapy for kids. It is done by a dramatic artist who volunteers his time to do this. He is mildly handicapped himself. Volunteer foster grandparents also help with the program.

10-12 preschool kids will participate. Some are emotionally disturbed and others are developmentally disabled.

RSC will participate in the activities.

I have asked Dr. Shriner to prepare two fact sheets for us -- one on the center itself and the other on the specific program that we will see, which will also elaborate a bit on the volunteer program at the center.

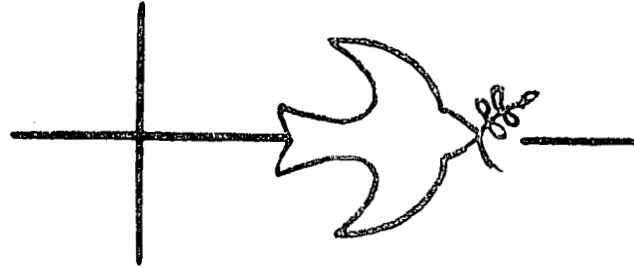

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE HEALTH ADVENTURE

The Health Adventure, a non-profit corporation, founded in Asheville, North Carolina in 1966 as the Children's Health Museum, was conceived by the Buncombe County Medical Auxiliary, with the support of the Buncombe County Medical Society, St. Joseph's Hospital and Memorial Mission Hospital.

This facility, staffed by volunteers, has provided tours for residents from the 17 counties of Western North Carolina through the years.

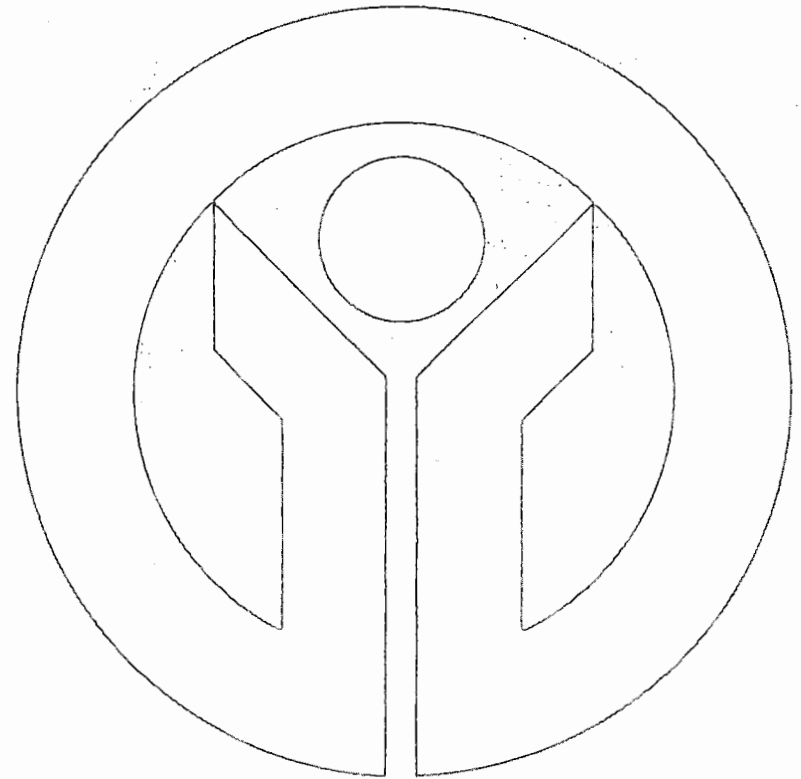
The need for an enlarged and more comprehensive Health Education Facility to aid in the improvement of personal health standards of all residents of Western North Carolina has been shown by the increased use of our old facility and also by area health surveys.

The Mountain Area Health Education Center, a continuing education training center for medical and dental professionals, in Asheville, responded to this need by donating 6,000 square feet of space to house a new health education facility. This is the new home of The Health Adventure.

The Chicago firm of Richard Rush, recognized designer of health education displays and facilities, was retained to design The Health Adventure. The facility utilizes instructors to explain and present the graphic and mobile displays.

The TAM Theater, which was funded by the Kate B. Reynolds Foundation, has added a unique dimension to our facility. Housed in a carpeted amphitheater, TAM (Transparent Anatomical Mannikin) presents the stories of growth and development, family living, and drug abuse prevention.

The new home of The Health Adventure is a center capable of providing a sustained educational and referral program regarding health, health needs and health services. It is community based, non-institutional and "people oriented".

Background on Farmers Home Administration ~~Grant~~ Announcement

Phil Wise and Mike Hightower, Florida Director of the Farmers Home Administration of the Dept. of Agriculture and early Carter campaign worker, have suggested that you announce the largest community facility loan in the history of its Capital Facility Loan Program. The announcement will take place at the hotel on Friday morning.

The ^{LOAN} grant is \$53 million for a new pipeline of 138 miles in length for the Florida Keys (Monroe County). No freshwater is available in this area, and the old pipeline, built in 1942 for a lesser demand, is no longer adequate. It leaks.

The increase in cost of water to consumers would be unfeasible if the local community were to absorb the cost of this project. The project is in Congressman Dante Fascell's district. This announcement is compatible with the recent emphasis on rural development issues from the White House.

When the improvements on the pipeline are complete, two desalination plants will be closed as well as five booster pumping station. 100,000 barrels of oil will be saved annually. \$2.7 million annually in energy, chemicals, and other operating costs will also be saved.

Ladies and Gentlemen -

I'm glad to be back in Florida today. I spent so much time here that I was eligible to vote here in the Primary.

There are three things I want to make clear:

First, I'm not running for anything; second, I was for Jimmy Carter before Iowa; and, third, I'm not going to pretend to be objective, because I'm not.

My father said over and over again during the campaign that the American people deserve a responsive government, a compassionate government, and a streamlined, effective government.

That may have sounded new, but it wasn't. It was just a new way of expressing a very old idea -- the idea of government of the people, by the people, and for the people.

That kind of government is the best guarantee of our liberties. And, that kind of government is the only kind that has a real chance to make progress toward putting people back to work, protecting our environment, preserving our health, and conducting a foreign policy that is a source of pride to Americans and a source of hope to people everywhere.

Those are the goals of the Carter Administration. I think most Americans share those goals.

My father has been the President only nine weeks and we are off to a good start.

I think the Administration has already shown a firm stand on human rights and majority rule highlighted by the United Nations' address and the repeal of the Byrd Amendment.

In January, the Administration announced its economic stimulus package which, we hope, will boost the economy by 23 to 30 billion dollars. Some major components are:

1. A 50-dollar rebate to individual taxpayers, Social Security recipients, low-income persons receiving earned income credit, and to recipients of supplemental security income.
2. An increase in public service jobs to 725,000 in two years.
3. Training and youth programs under CETA will be increased by 346,000 people in two years.

The Administration Budget Revisions included:

1. Greater assistance to state and local government.
2. Increases for lower and higher education, particularly for disadvantaged and handicapped children.
3. Increased funds for health programs.
4. Increased subsidies for housing programs for 400,000 units.
5. \$312 million more in social services overall; \$200 million to the states for day care centers for the poor.
6. Dropped Ford proposals to cut costs in food stamp, school lunch and other nutrition programs.
7. Increased funds for the rental subsidy program.
8. Increased funds for juvenile justice and delinquency prevention programs and increased funds for the Legal Services Corporation.

There are many new programs that my father is proposing in trying to carry out his campaign promises.

For~~st~~ instance:

We have no energy policy. We haven't even had the machinery to make and carry out such a policy. Responsibility is spread over more than fifty boards, agencies and committees.

The Carter Administration has moved to pull all that together into a single Department of Energy so that our efforts in this critical area will have the unity and coordination and importance they need.

Sometime around the end of April, my father will present to Congress and the people a comprehensive energy policy. This is a step that is many years overdue. The energy crisis is going to be with us for the rest of this century, probably longer. Dealing with it will be one of the great challenges of our nation's history. This policy will call for difficult and sometimes painful adjustments, and for sacrifices that all of us will have to make. But, it will make sure that the sacrifices are shared fairly and that nobody gets a free ride at somebody else's expense.

We need to reform the tax structure that is, in Dad's words, "a disgrace to the human race". The way it's been, the average laborer thinks the only time the government is interested in him is Election Day and April 15th. Those who are rich and can hire their own lobbyists seem to get all the breaks. That is going to change, and you can depend on it.

The last thing I want to talk about is Universal Voter Registration.

The basis of our democratic system is the right of every eligible citizen to vote. We have, in recent years, witnessed a disturbing trend toward lower and lower levels of voting by our citizens. This cannot be remedied by any one solution, but it is a fact that millions of Americans are discouraged from voting in every election by overly restrictive Voter Registration laws.

The Carter Administration is proposing to remove the unnecessary and unfair barriers by creating a method of Universal Voter Registration whereby citizens qualified to vote under state laws could go to their polling places on Federal election day and register there after proving their eligibility.

Under this plan, state and local officials will still register as many people prior to the elections to avoid congestion at the polls.

As a part of this plan, stiff penalties would be applied in case of voter fraud, and the Federal Government would pick up the cost of additional registrars.

It is a fact that four out of five states with the highest voter turnout in the 1976 elections permitted citizens to register and vote on election day. I was in North Dakota during the campaign where this plan is already in place. When I asked if they had any problem with voter fraud, the reply was. "Nobody in North Dakota thinks there is a politician worth voting twice for."

In closing, let me say that in writing this speech I decided that because it is my first chance to talk about what interests me since the campaign to just come and tell you what was on my mind.
