Mrs. Carter will attend a reception hosted by Ms. Hillary Rodman, wife of Arkansas Governor Bill Clinton; Mrs. Betty Bumpers, former First Lady of Arkansas and Mrs. Nell Balkman, Director of the Arkansas League of Nursing. The reception will honor the more than 8,000 volunteers who assisted in immunization program, "Every Child by '74".

The "Every Child by '74" immunization program was started by Mrs. Bumpers, under whose leadership approximately 300,000 children were immunized against preventable diseases.

Many of those present at the reception are participating in the "Every Child by '79" immunization program. In 1979, Arkansas reached 93% immunization, the highest in the nation.

Representatives from the following state organizations whose services were used in the programs will be present:

- ...county school officials
- ...county extension agents
- ...the Arkansas National Guard

The childhood diseases referred to are polio, DPT, measles, rubella and mumps. In 1974, the Arkansas average of immunization was below 50%. The national average of immunization today is below 60%.

Mrs. Carter will visit the YMCA's Camp Carter in Fort Worth. The United Way of Tarrant County is sponsoring the event where the First Lady will observe four outdoor programs for children with special problems. The programs are administered by United Way affiliate agencies in Fort Worth. Following the tour of the programs, Mrs. Carter will attend a reception hosted by the President of the Board of United Way for Tarrant County volunteers serving in the human service areas.

Mrs. Carter will first observe the YMCA Confidence Course on the camp grounds. It is a modified Outward Bound program in which the participant must master a series of difficult obstacles and team tasks before they can graduate. The tasks, such as rope ladders, tightropes and sheer walls, require coordination, courage and team work. During this summer, 15 young people, referred by school principals with behavior problems, are enrolled in the two week course.

The First Lady will also observe a beep baseball game played by children with multiple handicaps. The special program is sponsored by the Tarrant County Association for the Blind.

Beep baseball was designed for the blind in 1964 by an employee of Mountain Bell Telephone Company. Tournaments now taking place throughout the country are sponsored by the Telephone Pioneers, a volunteer group of active and retired phone company employees who made the special equipment.

Mrs. Carter will also observe the swim therapy program of the Tarrant County Multiple Sclerosis Association, which began in June, 1978. The program is run by fifteen volunteers who donate over 100 hours per month. The need for recreation was identified after a concentrated in-home visitation program of home-bound victims of multiple sclerosis was conducted by students from Texas Wesleyan College. The swim therapy has both improved the physical condition and helped restore the self-image of its participants.

The United Cerebral Palsy Association of Tarrant County conducts a therapeutic horseback riding program at Camp Carter which the First Lady will observe. The program started in 1977 for people with cerebral palsy and other mobility problems has succeeded in providing many participants with their first chance to move about without wheelchairs and crutches.

Prior to leaving the Camp, Mrs. Carter will attend a reception for volunteers in the service programs of Tarrant County. At the reception, Mrs. Carter will present certificates to the graduates of the YMCA's last two Confidence Courses.

Mrs. Carter will visit the first Arkansas Grassroots Jamboree in Pine Bluff, Arkansas. The Jamboree is sponsored by the Governor's Office of Volunteers Services, the City of Pine Bluff and SHARE, a coalition of volunteer and human service agencies.

Mrs. Carter's visit to Pine Bluff underlines her continuing interest in recognizing the importance of community services beyond the structure of the Federal government. She will be joined by Governor Bill Clinton and his wife, Hillary Rodham, in touring eleven demonstrations and displays which feature locally-initiated self-help and volunteer projects. The citizens involved with these projects will receive Certificates of Appreciation from Governor Clinton which will be presented by Mrs. Carter.

The projects will be located beneath tents and canopies at the Union Railroad Depot in downtown Pine Bluff. They will include live farm animals, a vegetable co-op, slide demonstrations, and craft items. In addition, the Jamboree will feature local musical talent singing gospel, barbershop quartet, bluegrass, and native mountain music as well as other entertainment. Ethnic food prepared and donated by members of the community will be sold with profits going to the Depot Action Revitalization Team for the improvement of the train station.

Certificates of Appreciation will be presented by Mrs. Carter to the following organizations:

Arkansas Delta Project - a community-based program to promote rural and small town development in eight Arkansas delta counties. With support from the Save the Children Foundation, the Rockefeller Foundation, and the Winthrop Rockefeller Foundation, the Delta Project is presently working with the East Arkansas Produce Marketing Association and the City of Madison to strengthen the ability of small farmers and other minority land owners to maximize land utilization. The Arkansas Delta Project was founded in March, 1979, and programs are planned to assist city officials in dealing with the complex federal system in order to ensure that small communities in the Arkansas delta receive a fair share of the federal dollar.

Arkansas River Valley Area Council and Rural Industries - the major thrust of ARVAC has been the development and expansion of native craft industries in the area through the production of handmade toys, soft dolls, quilts, and other items by low income residents. ARVAC Rural Industries was organized in 1974. Approximately 200 people who earn an average of \$100 a month are involved in the program. Sensitive to family life, ARVAC Rural Industries provides an important source of supplemental income to these families without removing the family members from their homes.

ACEDA, Arkansas Community Education Development Association - was started in 1978 and has developed a five-year plan now underway to provide a variety of experiences to small communities through the utilization of their school facilities. The projects are located in 40 communities and respond to the need for closer ties between schools, communities, local governments and service agencies. The state-wide non-profit organization trains community residents,

school teachers and administrators during non-school hours. The program stresses citizen involvement in making the school a center of the community.

Arkansas Vegetable Growers and Marketing Cooperative Association - in 1978, 88 farmers from six rural counties participated in this program for low to middle income farmers. The program enables the farmers to sell their fruits and vegetables to local consumers at the Pine Bluff Train Depot.

Lee County Cooperative Clinic - began in 1969 in answer to a crying need for medical attention and information among the poor people in Lee County. Since its inception, the personnel of Lee County Cooperative Clinic have reduced the infant mortality rate, hypertension, and numerous other diseases among the citizens of Lee County, whose incidence of poverty is 74%. Today, the clinic has four doctors, nine nurses, a medical secretary and a desk clerk working to insure quality care at an affordable price.

Ozark Institute - is engaged in a variety of rural development activities. Specializing in appropriate technology and energy conservation, the Institute has assisted in developing farmers markets, community canneries, three solar greenhouses, passive solar and photovoltaic technology, and a community-based broadcast network. Ozark Institute is a member of the Arkansas Solar Coalition, a group of volunteer leaders in the field of renewable energy.

SHARE, Sharing Human Agency's Resource Experiences, a coalition of volunteer human service agencies. Its purpose is to share information, training, publicity, resources, recruitment ideas and an increased understanding of programs and agencies in Pine Bluff.

The Progressive League of College Station - located in an unincorporated city on the outskirts of Little Rock, it performs many of the same functions a city council or chamber of commerce would perform in an incorporated area. The League was formed in the 1960's from the early civil rights drive to secure the right to vote for black members of the community.

Rosston Swine Producers Association Cooperative - organized in 1969 by limited resource farmers who wanted to supplement their income by producing feeder pigs. The primary goal of the RSPAC, is to provide means of additional income for small farmers. More than 700 small family farmers have benefited from the project in twelve southwest Arkansas counties. Some members earn as much as \$200-\$300 a month, an amount that may mean the difference between a family losing or keeping their farm.

Col-O-Cal - is an agricultural cooperative in which livestock is dispersed among low income families to supplement the family's protein diet and their earned income. The coop consists of members in five counties in south-central Arkansas. Animals are donated by the Heifer Project International. In the case of dairy cattle, a cow ready to calve is given to a family. After the calf is born, the family keeps one of the animals and passes the other on to another family, thereby producing a perpetual self-help program.

Newton County Wildlife Association - organized by local citizens in an effort to stop aerial spraying of herbicides by the U.S. Forest Service which converted forests from hardwood to pine. Last fall, the Forest Service voluntarily agreed to stop the conversion practice. Recently, the Association has been focusing attention on halting the practice of clear-cutting on National Forest Land.

## FIRST LADY TO VIEW UNITED WAY AGENCY PROGRAMS DURING TOUR OF SOUTHERN SELF-HELP GROUPS

ALEXANDRIA, VA. (July 19) -- First Lady Rosalynn Carter as part of her nationwide inquiry into voluntary programs, will review the work of United Way-supported agencies and several other projects next week in Arkansas and Texas.

Mrs. Carter's visit will be part of a two-day tour beginning Sunday, July 22, of voluntary human service programs in three Southern cities. United Way programs were included because of their heavy reliance on volunteers and their grassroots origins.

Governed by volunteers, United Ways plan and raise money for a broad range of local human services. Volunteer citizen review boards allocate these funds to programs meeting important community needs.

On Sunday afternoon Mrs. Carter will tour displays featuring four United-Way supported agencies in the Pine Bluff, Ark. area: the Area Agency on Aging, SCAN (Suspected Child Abuse & Neglect), RSVP (Retired Senior Volunteer Program) and Volunteers in Court, a program assisting juveniles who are first offenders. These agencies are participating in an area-wide volunteer group fair called the Arkansas Grassroots Jamboree.

"We're getting pretty excited. Everyone in the community has donated time and money to put this fair together," said Phil Derrick of Volunteers in Court, "It's

probably our biggest community event in the seventies." Mr. Derrick said Mrs. Carter's visit would put "national focus on the self-help volunteer movement and motivate volunteers across the country."

Mrs. Carter will then travel to Fort Worth, Tex. on Monday afternoon to attend a United Way-sponsored event at the YMCA's Camp Carter. There, she will observe outdoor recreational and rehabilitative programs funded by the United Way of Metropolitan Tarrant County. These include a YMCA confidence-building obstacle course for inner-city youth featuring rope and ladder climbing, beeper softball sponsored by the Lighthouse for the Blind, swimming therapy for people with Multiple Sclerosis and horseback-riding instruction for those with Cerebral Palsy. Country-and-western-style entertainment will be provided by the Pickers and Singers of the Halton City Senior Citizens Center, also funded by United Way.

Following the outdoor event, Mrs. Carter will meet informally with volunteers and other community leaders to discuss the future role and needs of the voluntary sector. At the meeting, Robert Decker, president of the Tarrant County United Way and a local attorney, said he would like to "commend Mrs. Carter for her strong support of human service programs and the entire volunteer effort. After all, that's what United Way is all about, people helping their communities without government intervention."

There are over 2,200 autonomous United Ways throughout the United States. Pledges to United Ways last year totaled over \$1.3 billion, a 9.37 percent increase over the amount pledged the previous year. These contributions help to support approximately 37,000 agencies and programs providing human care services.

## Fact Sheet

Su Clinica Familiar (Your Family Clinic) is a community-based clinic providing high quality health care to the medically underserved residents of Cameron and Willacy counties. Seventy-six percent of the residents of these counties are Mexican-Americans, many living in rural areas, and in 1970, 47% of the residents fell below the poverty level, placing the counties among the poorest in the nation. More than one-third of the target population are migrant farmworkers, and local employment, itself, is often seasonal and intermittent. Adapting its services to these conditions and the needs of its patients, Su Clinica Familiar provided services last year to nearly 23,000 people who, ten years ago, received very limited health care. It is a symbol of good health care to the Hispanic population of the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Su Clinica started as a volunteer and community effort a decade ago. A federation of community grass roots organizations, "Organizaciones Unidas", collected signatures to establish medical services for low-income and medically underserved people. In 1970, community leaders approached Catholic Charities of the Catholic Diocese of Brownsville. Operating in a room donated by the Diocese, the clinic was initially staffed by volunteer doctors and nurses and received its first grant in 1971. It remains a cooperative effort of the community and the church.

Mrs. Carter will tour the clinic and learn about its innovative practices, such as the use of nurse midwives, an aggressive health promotion and prevention program, an effective social service referral system, and prepaid health care program for migrant farmworkers. This plan, El Valle Community Health Plan, was the first prepaid plan for migrants and permits them to receive care when they work in other states. She will be met by the Board of Directors before the tour and she will receive an award entitled, "Nuestra Hermana en Salud" (Our Sister in Health), from the clinic for her support of self-help community organizations.

The mobile clinic van which Mrs. Carter will ride to Su Clinica Familiar allows services to be extended to the rural colonias, unincorporated hamlets throughout the Rio Grande Valley. Project MANO (Medical and Nutritional Outreach) is staffed by a full-time family nurse-practitioner, a nurse's aid, a laboratory technician, receptionist and driver, all under supervision of the central clinic physicians. Services rendered through the mobile clinic include interim care for the chronically ill, treatment of common illnesses, well baby and child medical care, health education and referrals.

Mrs. Carter will tour the Maternity Services unit of the Harlingen Clinic. Maternity Services of Su Clinica Familiar were begun in the Raymondville satellite clinic in 1972 by a local nun who was a nurse midwife. The early years were very difficult because there was such a shortage of staff and money. The Sisters of St. Mary allowed a certified nurse midwife to work for three years without a salary to get the maternity services off the ground. In July, 1978, the three nurse midwives were joined by three OB gynecologist physicians from the National Health Service Corps. 326 deliveries were made in 1978.

Su Clinica Familiar believes that quality comprehensive health care cannot be provided without caring for the basic causes of health problems. The Social Service Department in each clinic serves in a supportive capacity to the Medical Services delivery system by providing counselling and related services, coordination of referrals, acting as liaison between the administration and the medical staff, and coordinating patient transfers.

The clinic also now has ten CETA employees teaching good sanitation practices and home health techniques to residents of the colonias, which frequently have no sewage. The clinic staff have also been involved in the community-based efforts to provide fresh water to the colonias. Both these efforts ameliorate the water problem that causes many diseases among the rural patients.

The new adolescent health program is also counseling teenagers on their particular health problems, such as overweight caused by the high starch diet of the local Hispanics.

This total approach to health care, efficiently using physician extenders, valuing health prevention and education and working to attack the other social and environmental causes of poor health, has enabled the clinic to maintain a relatively low cost per patient visit of \$26.00 in 1978.

RE: Report from the (Southern Left) Field

I know ya'll have been wondering what I was doing for the last ten days. I have often wondered myself. I have been in four states and about fifteen cities and seen twenty-five projects. There seem to be about five events that have some real possibilities. I will describe them below and then outline my preferred options.

My idea at this point is that we try to start a communities part of the trip with an Urban League speech that talks about the problems of the effect of inflation and the balanced budget fever on government social service programs, and emphasizes that we have to figure out ways in which people can also help themselves and use government funds as leverage for bringing in private funds to solve the problems of poor people. I think Mrs. Carter might then introduce her trip by saying that she is going to look at examples of how different parts of the private and non-profit social service sector help solve community problems. Then, I think we can choose projects which demonstrate the role of self-help of the church and private volunteer programs in meeting human needs. These different institutions comprise the spectrum of services outside the government available to people. This kind of speech could turn into a real gutsy one by taking the problem of limitations on government directly to the folks most affected, and also could provide an opportunity to talk about some of the urban policy concepts such as UDAG grants, National Cooperative Bank, CETA unemployment programs, and the more activist VISTA volunteers. Most of the possible events that I found can claim some attachment to one or more of these Carter programs.

Here are the best events:

1) New Orleans - The local Urban League and one of the Community Action Agencies have jointly formed a community development corporation called the Heritage Square Development Corporation. This corporation is developing a plan to establish a Mahalia Jackson Gospel Center and a renewed business strip in one of the mixed black and white areas of New Orleans near the French Quarter. This project is being encouraged by Vernon Jordan of the National Urban League and he has gotten planning assistance from Prudential Insurance Company, IBM and Xerox to decide whether the Gospel Center and business ideas are feasible. The first project of the Development Corporation is to establish a food-buying coop for the poor people in the neighborhood. The food coop will be tide in with some rural vegetable-growing coops in Louisiana, run by poor people, that have been financed by the Southern Conference Development Fund, a black cooperative bank that was one of the models for the National Cooperative Development Bank that Carter is reproposing this year.

The Development Corporation is trying to have an opening of the coop on July 29 of this summer. They want to buy an old building in a victorian neighborhood in New Orleans and refinish it and use it as the store for the members of the food coop. The building is a wooden Greek revival, three-story building with a vacant lot next door. It is also around the corner from the offices of the Neighborhood Coalition in New Orleans, one of whose neighborhoods was studied by the National Commission on Neighborhoods.

The Development Corporation is trying to buy the building this week. If they can get their act together in the next month, it seems to me that an opening of the food coop for our first stop directly after speaking to the National Urban League would be a tremendous lead-in to what we want to talk about. It could probably be arranged for some of the renovation work on the old building to get started or by in process when we arrive. We could have a kind of ground-breaking, tour the area for the proposed Mahalia Jackson Gospel Center, and perhaps even tour one of the neighborhoods near the Gospel Center which has been active in housing rehabilitation and crime prevention. We could have a natural tie to the National Urban League and even to the neighborhood movement.

2) Pine Bluff, Arkansas - Pine Bluff has a rather exceptional coalition of volunteer service agencies that provide a wide range of programs such as counseling for juvenile status offenders, pregnancy counseling, unemployment training, and housing rehabilitation. It is also relatively centrally located in the Arkansas farming community which has five to seven interesting farming cooperatives. These cooperatives are sponsored both by private foundations and by the Community Services Administration. A couple of them are going very strong ten years after the federal government put in a limited amount of money to get them started. The Winthrop Rockefeller Foundation is interested in encouraging the different coops and provides technical assistance to them, and in almost all cases low-income people have dramatically supplemented their income through these cooperatives.

One of the coops is run out of an old train station in Pine Bluff which is on the National Register of Historic Places and which the City is just getting ready to renovate. I think we could get the Governor's Office of Volunteer Services to sponsor a kind of self-help coop fair in the train station on either Sunday afternoon or Monday morning. The coop that is ordinarily in the station involves truck farmers coming in to sell fresh vegetables. The other coops in Arkansas could bring displays of what they do to the station and set them up there. Mrs. Carter could walk through the displays and then address representatives from all the coops and from the Coalition of Volunteer Service Groups in Pine Bluff. Several of the prime movers behind the coops are very charismatic people and could give interesting explanations of what they do. We might also get either the Winthrop Rockefeller Foundation or the Governor's Office of Volunteer Services to give awards to the outstanding coops.

An extra added benefit of Pine Bluff is that there is a self-help Women's Center about six blocks from the train station just down the train tracks. The Center is helping provide some counseling services to women. It is very well accepted in the community and tied in with the other service agencies. With the Governor's wives interest in women's issues and the issue of ERA ratification existing in Arkansas, Hillary Rodham (Governor Clinton's wife) and Mrs. Carter might drop by the Center for five minutes and then perhaps ride a train down to the train station to see the coops.

Pine Bluff thus offers a series of opportunities to hit several themes in a cute setting. The people there were very enthusiastic and would get excited about a visit. The State Volunteer Coordinator is also an experienced media/events person who is capable of pulling this off.

One other attractive feature of Pine Bluff is that Mrs. Carter could conceivably spend Sunday night at the Governor's Mansion in Little Rock and drive to or from Pine Bluff which is only about forty-five minutes from Little Rock.

3) Harlingen, Texas - An event could be put together here around the major medical clinic for the Mexican-American community in the Rio Grande Valley. It is called Su Clinica Familiar. This clinic is the one where Judy Lipshutz works. The clinic is financed mostly by the federal government, but the grantee is Catholic Charities of the Diocese, and the clinic started out as a volunteer effort of a local Chicano community organization and the medical community.

The clinic has several interesting programs. It is considered the best migrant health services program in the country and runs a prepaid comprehensive health plan for Chicanos who migrate as seasonal farm workers. Judy Lipshutz has developed an interesting counseling program for teenagers with special health problems, particularly with overweight which is a problem when the diet is mostly starches as it is in the area. Thirdly, the clinic has an outstanding nurse/mid-wife program in which nurses/mid-wives, led by a local nun, deliver a large number of babies in poor families there.

The clinic is very popular and now serves 20,000 families and about 45,000 people in the Rio Grande Valley in Harlingen, Brownsville and Raymondville. The clinic is parked on most days and there would be a lot of people to interact with and some special services that could be observed. We might could even arrange a delivery. (Joke!)

The Catholic church has been active in sponsoring a large number of services in this part of Texas, both through the church and society programs. The theme of this stop would be how churches have helped in low-income communities and Mrs. Carter could tour the clinic, and in a ceremony thank the local bishop for his outstanding efforts to help people.

Not too far from the clinic is the Shrine of San Juan where one of the church's social service offices is housed. The Shrine is a special symbol to the Chicano and the Mexican communities along the river. The head of the Shrine, Father Banca, gave the invocation when President Carter visited MacAllen, Texas during the campaign and is a hustler in the local community. We could tie in a tour of the Shrine and perhaps even a Spanish Mass with the visit to the clinic. The Shrine and the clinic are both in the same diocese and so we would be working with the staff of the same bishop.

There is also another opportunity for an interesting event very near the Shrine at an old folks program sponsored by Amigos des Valles. At this center, there is a special program for the home-bound elderly that is a demonstration project under Title IVA of the Older Americans Act. It apparently is one of the pet interests of Claude Pepper. At the center, there is an interesting occupational therapy program for the elderly and also two large greenhouses where horticulture and vegetable growing are taught. Disco dancing is also very popular at the

center, and the seniors there apparently dress up in traditional Mexican costumes and have a great time dancing. It might be possible to stage such a show for Mrs. Carter with several hundred seniors in the immediate area and, at the same time, show her some of the special services at the center. The center is only four blocks from the Shrine.

It might be easier to do the Shrine and the old folks center, although the old folks center has no connection with the church as the clinic does. The elderly project may cut across a wider part of the Chicano community than the clinic, which is geared more to poor people, but the clinic better represents our communities theme since it started as a community project.

An off the wall idea might be to ask Mrs. Lopez Portillo to join Mrs. Carter for a tour of the clinic and the Shrine, although I am not sure how strong Mrs. Portillo's interest in community service is or whether this is logistically or diplomatically possible on short notice.

4) Greenville, Mississippi - There are several very interesting black economic development and social service projects in and around Greenville. Most of them are sponsored by two related non-profit organizations. One, called MACE, is primarily a community-based social service organization with 23,000 members, and The Delta Foundation is a non-profit business and job development corporation established by MACE. These two organizations sponsor just about every kind of service that we would want to look at. The most interesting ones, in my view, are a blue jeans factory started by poor people in Greenville that has created over 170 jobs for poor folks in the area, and the corporation of several new towns around the community hamlets in the rural areas. There are also several services, such as literacy training, provided in downtown Greenville by black people in the Scottish Rite Temple, a Roman revival plaster building that looks like an old slave auction and off limits to black folks for many years. The symbolism of doing something in either the Temple or the blue jeans factory is obvious and very beneficial to our need to court the black community.

I think we could set something up in or around Greenville at just about any time. The best time is probably in September, and I would suggest putting off something in Mississippi until then. The Carter people there generally concur in this judgement, particularly because a September event could coincide with the Second Annual Blues Festival in Greenville sponsored by The Delta Foundation, and because Mrs. Carter could then visit some of the special Title I and Head Start programs in the schools there. The Head Start mothers were very helpful to Carter in the campaign and it seems we would be well advised to do something that included them, which would be easier after school starts.

The projects in Greenville are very exciting from the point of view of self-help and employment by the black low-income community. We could do something there on Monday morning at the blue jeans factory. There is also a gospel singing on July 29 sponsored by a black children's day care program. That could be moved to the previous Sunday, July 22, if we needed to fill in something there. The Carter people in Greenville are checking out the event for us to see what it is.

5) Ft. Worth, Texas - There is a YMCA camp very near Carswell Air Force Base which is doing a very interesting and visual outdoor recreation program for potential juvenile delinquents. The program is called "A Confidence-Building Obstacle Course" and puts kids in a group situation where they have to figure out how to work together to get through some difficult physical tasks. There could be some great shots of Mrs. Carter doing some of the obstacles.

This program is like a lot of programs across the country using outdoor recreation to help kids with special problems. There are a couple of other programs in Ft. Worth that could be displayed at the YMCA camp. One is "Beeper Softball" for blind kids and the other is a special swimming program for the handicapped. All of these programs are financed partly through the United Way and partly with Title XX federal funds. I think we could have a neat event of these three and maybe more outdoor programs for kids there at the camp. The theme could be focussed around what the private sector volunteer agencies are doing for kids. We might also be able to put together some kind of special picnic for United Way volunteers where Mrs. Carter could thank them for what they are doing.

There are two other things in Ft. Worth which fit the communities theme and which would be easy to do. One is an outstanding Child Study Center which was started by the Junior League and is funded by the United Way. It is a diagnosis and treatment center for kids with all kinds of special problems, such as deafness, emotional disturbance, retardation. It does most of the testing of kids in the area, both rich and poor, and also includes a Head Start program. The facility is modern and extensive and conducive to a walking tour and a reception.

The other possibility in Ft. Worth is a special "Christmas in July" program sponsored by the United Methodist women of the area. It is a church service and reception using Christmas cards and decorations to raise money and food for the United Community Centers of Ft. Worth, which are service agencies run by the Methodist Church in low-income communities there. This is a very traditional event, but it is visual. It's to be held this year in the second largest Methodist church in the area where Jim Wright sometimes worships, and is now scheduled for July 23. It directly overlaps, I am sure, with the Dallas fundraiser, but the time could be moved. I think we should probably try to place a call to the event from Dallas even if we can't go. This event is also connected to the United Way.

The United Way in Ft. Worth is apparently very well received by the community and does not have some of the problems that United Ways in other cities do.

There is also an event in Ft. Worth in October called "Pioneer Days", which has a big parade through the traditional cowboy area of Ft. Worth. Jim Wright goes to this event every year. The federal government has financed sewer lines and renovated streets for this old part of Ft. Worth, and may shortly approve a UDAG grant for the area. The local businessmen in the city are trying to develop a tourist attraction around the stockyards, the rodeo and the old cowboy bars in the area. The work, so far, has created about 900 jobs for poor folks and is a good example of the urban policy partnership idea. There are a lot of visual things to do in this area and a neat event could be put together there with the "Pioneer Days" event in the fall.

Recommendation: The above five places are the best things that I saw, although there are a few other things in New Orleans, particularly, that might work, but not at this point in time. My first recommendation would be that we do the New Orleans Urban League event on Sunday afternoon, the Pine Bluff Self-Help/Volunteer Fair on Monday morning, and the Chicano medical clinic on Monday afternoon before going to Dallas. These three projects would allow us to piece together the self-help, volunteer service, and church inner-city action themes. They also go to two important areas - Louisiana and southeast Texas. We would touch some of the Mississippi media market in Pine Bluff and could do the Delta Mississippi things in the fall at a time that is riper for touching the right bases and that contains a natural event. Because the New Orleans Urban League event may not develop on their end, my second recommendation would be to do the Pine Bluff event on Sunday afternoon and the Chicano medical clinic Monday morning, and the Ft. Worth outdoor recreation Monday afternoon. This would drop out the black economic development theme that exists in Greenville and New Orleans, but would pick up the volunteer social services theme more clearly in Ft. Worth. It would also seem to be logistically easier to coordinate.

We might talk about other ways to put two or three of the five things together. I might add, if New Orleans falls through and Pine Bluff makes more sense on a Monday morning we could, for example, go to the gospel singing event in Greenville, Mississippi on Sunday night and do a little political reception there, as well.

I might add, finally, no doubt the clincher, that both the Chicano medical clinic and the "Christmas in July" events occur in air conditioned buildings.

I do think there are some good opportunities for getting additional coverage of the July trip, similar to what the National School Volunteer Program did in March.

We have notified the national parent organizations of the local programs RSC will visit in each city: Junior League, ACTION (RSVP and VISTA), Community Services Administration, National Congress of Community Economic Development, self-help groups, CONVO, Council on Foundations in Pine Bluff; National Catholic Charities in Harlingen; and United Way, YMCA, Junior League, Multiple Sclerosis Association, Cerebral Palsy Association in Fort Worth. The YMCA, United Way, CONVO, and one of the volunteer employment services in Pine Bluff have, so far, indicated an interest in having a photo for a newsletter.

Brian O'Connell raised again yesterday the issue of CONVO's interest in having some film or video tape of RSC on the trip. As you may recall, he has wanted to produce a kind of "Salute to Volunteering" film based on RSC and John Gardner addressing the large special meeting of CONVO's affiliated organization (about 200 national groups). This was the meeting we had scheduled for early June and cancelled because of the Summit. He would like to use some footage from a trip, if possible, to make the film more visually interesting and is willing to bear the expense of this, if we are interested. He would distribute the film nationally to volunteer organizations for their use at meetings in recruitment, etc.

I particularly feel that the event in Pine Bluff will be very colorful and festive. Fort Worth may also offer the same visual excitement. We ought to have some footage of RSC on the stump that could be useful in campaigning, as well as in promoting communities, etc. We don't have to use it now if we want to low-key this trip, but should have the materials for a later use of the trip.

Is there any way we can turn this on? Do you think WHCA could do something? Could CONVO use local television station tape? Would Rafshoon want to do anything? (I will contact Schneiders, if you like.)

I want to reiterate, as well, the point that Kathy and I made on Monday: If it is at all possible, we would be well advised to invite a few of the recognized national organization leaders to accompany or meet us at these events.

The United Way case is the one where we need the most work, because we have bungled their invitations to RSC and the President to attend their national meetings and receive the de Toqueville Award. That case aside, the issue is one of shrewdly handling the Washington interest group community and magnanimously increasing their debts and sympathies to us. We could at least offer an invitation to fly ahead and meet us at the event and to walk with RSC during the event.

First Lady Rosalynn Carter will travel to Chicago, Illinois on Sunday, July 22, where she will address the Council of Urban League Guilds.

Continuing her interest in what citizens and communities do to help themselves, Mrs. Carter will then visit three cities in the South to highlight human services programs originated by community efforts.

From Chicago Mrs. Carter will fly to Pine Bluff, Arkansas, where she will attend a volunteer and self-help fair late Sunday afternoon. She will view exhibits compiled by the coalition of voluntary organizations in Pine Bluff and rural self-help programs in Arkansas. The fair will take place at the local train station, which houses a vegetable growers cooperative and several local services.

On Monday morning, July 23, Mrs. Carter will tour Su Clinica Familiar, a community health clinic in Harlingen, Texas. Su Clinica, associated with Catholic Charities of the Brownsville Diocese, was started by community volunteers in 1971, and it was one of the first health clinics for migrants. General health, maternity and nutritional services are provided at the clinic.

Mrs. Carter will be in Fort Worth on Monday afternoon to visit several outdoor recreation programs assembled at YMCA's Camp Carter. Mrs. Carter will have an opportunity to observe a confidence building course for inner-city youth, beeper softball for the blind, horseback riding used for rehabilitation, and swimming therapy. The camp is funded through the United Way, and Mrs. Carter will visit with a group of community volunteers from different agencies when she is at the camp.

Also on July 23, Mrs. Carter will attend a fundraiser in Dallas, and she will travel to California on July 24 to attend fundraisers, returning to Washington on July 25.

1. Some of America's finest hours have come as we have taken seriously the call to be neighbors and friends to each other. Here in Harlingen you have reached out to each other in generosity and sincerity. This clinic and its many services are a story that I will tell to other people across the country.

2. As I see and feel what goes on here, two particular emphases come to my mind.

(1) You have decided to act out of concern and on the basis of American initiative to meet your own needs.

You and I know that America is built on common sense and initiative. Our founding fathers did not sit around waiting for a government official to say, "Go start a nation." Yearning to be free, hewn out of American soil and rock, our ancestors determined to create a new nation, a brand new way of life.

Our nation endures and thrives because we are still using that good sense and drive. I believe we will build a new national consensus and move on to even higher levels of service and achievement.

(2) In the United States we cherish religious liberty and separation of church and state. The freedom of the church and the vitality of the nation are nourished by this basic American principle.

# Black Leader Criticizes Shake-Up

CHICAGO, July 21 — The issue of President Carter's leadership appears likely to dominate the National Urban League's 69th annual conference, which starts here tomorrow, as it has in other national, regional and state meetings held by blacks in recent months.

In remarks to reporters yesterday, the league's president, Vernon E. Jordan Jr., argued that the nation "could have been spared the agony" of mass Cabinet resignations and that, "to the extent there is a crisis in Mr. Carter's political leadership, I do not believe the crisis stems from the President's Cabinet."

He said, "The problems of leadership and confidence are more attributable to the President himself and those around him."

Blacks gave Mr. Carter more than 90 percent of their votes in the 1976 election. The President has been severely and consistently criticized since that time by blacks who say he has failed to provide the leadership that would solve a number of national problems, especially high unemployment among blacks.

## Ups and Downs for Carter

Mr. Jordan said that he felt that the President's image had improved greatly as a result of the recent Camp David meetings and last Sunday's speech to the nation but that it had plummeted with the Cabinet changes.

The league's four-day meeting is expected to attract more than 12,000 people. Among those scheduled to be address the delegates are Rosalynn Carter, the President's wife; Secretary of State Cyrus R. Vance; Labor Secretary Ray Marshall,

and the newly named Health, Education and Welfare Secretary, Patricia Roberts Harris.

Mrs. Harris, who had been Secretary of Housing and Urban Development until this week's shake-up, had scheduled a news conference here for Monday but it has been canceled.

The outgoing Treasury Secretary, W. Michael Blumenthal, is still scheduled to speak here on Monday, Mr. Jordan said. Senator Edward M. Kennedy, the Massachusetts Democrat, will also speak here on Monday.

## National Issues Stressed

Workshops and other events in the conference will stress the issues of energy, politics, foreign affairs, jobs, economic development, education, affirmative action, health and urban affairs.

Earlier meetings of blacks in which the issue of Mr. Carter's leadership dominated include last month's annual convention of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in Louisville, Ky. There, the association's executive director, the Rev. Benjamin L. Hooks, said that Senator Kennedy would probably take more black votes in a Democratic primary than would President Carter because of Mr. Carter's failure to keep promises made to blacks.

Earlier, in Birmingham, Ala., when the National Congressional Black Caucus met with blacks from 11 Southern states, the issue was raised and hotly debated when Representative John Conyers Jr., Democrat of Michigan, declared that he would not support Mr. Carter's re-election.

# EMPLOYMENT

## JOBS

While I'm on the subject of jobs, I'd like to comment briefly on what has happened to employment in this country in the last 2 1/2 years. When Jimmy took office, ten million Americans could not find a full-time job, and almost eight million could not find any job at all. The unemployment rate was eight percent.

Since January of 1977, over eight million people have entered the work force. That's a record. Never in our country's history have more people gone to work in a similar period of time. We have also cut the unemployment rate by 25% and, in the process, we have taken almost 2 million people off of welfare rolls and unemployment lines.

We have made progress, but there is much more to do. Although our minority youth unemployment has decreased for the first time in years, it is still unacceptably high. Jimmy has asked Vice President Mondale to lead an exhaustive review of all federal youth programs, with the goal of producing new youth jobs legislation early next year. I encourage you to help the Vice President's Task Force so that we can learn from you what works and what doesn't work in cities and communities and schools all over America.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

1. President Carter personally lobbied Congress for the passage of the Humphrey-Hawkins Full Employment Act.
2. President Carter has created 7.5 million more jobs during his Administration as a result there are more Blacks employed than anytime in history. Black teenage employment which stood in January 1977 at 575,000 jobs rose to 714,000 by February 1979, a 27% increase.
3. To combat unemployment the President created a comprehensive \$21 billion package of economic stimulation legislation: \$4 billion in public works programs creating 200,000 jobs, \$7 billion in tax reductions for low and moderate income families, a \$1 billion increase in countercyclical revenue sharing, CETA, Job Corps, and tax credits for employers of youth job seekers.
4. The President has asked Vice President Mondale to head up a Youth Employment Task Force. The task force is now discussing programs with community groups and organizations to make legislation recommendations for the next session of Congress.

EDUCATION

Jimmy has increased education funding by an extraordinary sixty percent -- for elementary and secondary education, Head Start, and basic skill training. He has increased education aid for the handicapped by two hundred percent. He has doubled funds for student assistance. As we are trying to do in other areas, we are targeting a high percentage of those funds to the children and schools that need them most. Four hundred million dollars are earmarked for Black colleges from the Office of Education alone.

EDUCATION

1. The Carter Administration has increased funding for education programs in the Office of Education, HEW, by 50 percent from 1977 to 1980. Greater emphasis has been placed on programs for disadvantaged children including proposals for large increases in the Headstart program and Title I program of compensatory education.
2. President Carter's proposed Cabinet-level Department of Education has been approved by the Senate and the House of Representatives. The establishment of a Cabinet-level Department reflects the Administration's high priority on education and issues such as equal educational opportunity.
3. On January 17, 1979 President Carter issued a memorandum to every agency and department directing them to use all available resources to strengthen and enhance historically Black colleges. In addition, full funding for the HEW program designed to assist Black colleges has been continued at \$120 million.

The future of Blacks in this competitive, technological society depends on the availability and use of educational and training opportunities. Recognizing this basic fact, President Carter has greatly expanded educational resources.

The Education Amendments of 1978, supported by the Carter Administration increased funding by 25 percent. Moreover, greater emphasis has been given the programs for disadvantaged children including proposals for large increases in Title I and Headstart programs. The Middle Income Student Assistance Act which the Administration advanced expands the basic student aid programs. In education, as in other fields, the Administration sought to target assistance to those most in need of assistance.

Under the leadership of Mary Berry, Assistant Secretary for Education in HEW, new steps have been taken to enhance educational resources. A new Department of Education which would strengthen its educational thrust has been proposed by the Administration. President Carter has made a commitment to expand federal assistance to predominately Black colleges. In his new Directive for Black colleges, the President calls upon each agency of government to provide greater assistance to these institutions.

# Civil Rights

## CIVIL RIGHTS

1. The Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs (OFCCP) and the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) have been reorganized and granted increased authority. The OFCCP will vigorously enforce the guidelines which prohibit employment discrimination by Federal Contractors and require affirmative action. In addition, the EEOC will continue to provide an effective central mechanism to enforce compliance with the equal opportunity laws.
2. The Justice Department filed an amicus brief in the Wilmington Ten case. The Justice Department also intervened in the "reverse discrimination" suit brought by Brian Weber against the Kaiser Aluminum Company in Louisiana. The Justice Department's argument in support of voluntary affirmative action was recently upheld by the Supreme Court.

2.

An amicus brief was also filed in the Bakke case in support of affirmative action programs. Following the Bakke decision, all departments of the government were directed to continue vigorous implementation of affirmative action programs.

3. President Carter in the 1979 State of the Union message to Congress called for "cease and desist" powers for the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development. Title VIII which prohibits discrimination in housing is largely an empty promise because of the lack of an adequate enforcement mechanism. A White House Task Force has been formed to strengthen HUD's enforcement powers.
4. President Carter has given full support to the Voting Rights Amendment for the District of Columbia. The amendment is now before the States for ratification.

# Judiciary

1. President Carter has named more Blacks to the Federal judiciary than all other Presidents combined. Thus far, twenty-one Black Federal judges have been appointed in the North and South. These appointments resulted from the Administration supported Omnibus Judgeship Act of 1978 and are bound to have an important impact on the nation's criminal justice system which has been assailed as "racist" for over a century.

## Wade McCree, Solicitor General

The Administration won an important victory in the enactment of the Omnibus Judgeships Act of 1978, which has increased the number of federal judgeships by almost 30 percent. The President is making certain that minorities will get a fair share of these judgeships and for the first time Black federal judges will be appointed in Southern states.

# Regulatory Bds & Commissions

President Carter has also named more Blacks to regulatory boards and commissions than any other President: Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC), Civil Aeronautics Board (CAB), Overseas Private Investment Corporation (OPIC), Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), Merit Systems Protection Board, National Transportation Safety Board, Federal Communications Commission (FCC), Federal National Mortgage Association (FNMA), Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC), and Federal Reserve Board of Governors. Many of these powerful regulatory bodies have never had Black commissioners or members prior to this Administration.

# Rosalynn Carter Coming

Rosalynn Carter will arrive in Harlingen at 9:20 p.m. tonight and will remain overnight and visit Su Clinica Familiar (Your Family Clinic) at 2018 Pease St., Monday morning.

A clinic spokesman said Mrs. Carter will be presented the first annual Su Clinica Familiar Nuestra Award at approximately 11:30 a.m. He said the award is to honor her for her commitment and support of self-help human service organizations.

A White House representative said in Harlingen Saturday that Mrs. Carter will be met at the airport by local and other officials, but no special ceremony is planned. She will go directly to the motel where she is to spend the night.

The visit to Harlingen is part of a four-day trip that will take Mrs. Carter to Chicago, Pine Bluff and Little Rock, Ark.; Harlingen, Fort Worth, Dallas, and Fresno, San Francisco and Los Angeles.

She is expected to depart Harlingen immediately following her visit to the clinic.

A clinic spokesman said the public is invited to the ceremony during which she will receive the award.

Su Clinica Familiar is funded by a \$2.5 million grant from the Department of Health Education and Welfare.

Clinic Director Francisco Gonzalez said the facility is set up primarily to serve poor people, but by law it is mandated to serve anyone. He said patients are billed according to their ability to pay. More than 100,000 patients were served last year.

Some controversy has arisen between various physicians and the clinic with the physicians claiming that the clinic provides hospital services although it is not a licensed hospital.

Gonzalez said some physicians object to the clinic and would like to see it out of business, but added that the clinic has a very good relationship with most physicians.

RSC'S DRAFT REMARKS - NATIONAL COUNCIL OF URBAN LEAGUE GUILDS -  
CHICAGO, ILLINOIS - JULY 22, 1979

I wanted to come here this afternoon to talk about our America and our efforts to improve it.

This is a time of decision. And, a time of adjustment. We face a serious economic and energy crisis. More importantly, there is also a crisis of confidence in ourselves.

This need not exist. Our generation has put men on the moon. It has seen great revolutions in political, civil and human rights. It has begun a rebuilding of our cities.

But, other historical events have battered our generation. We have lost three great national leaders to assassins. We have suffered the agony of Vietnam. We have seen the Presidency disgraced in Watergate.

These events have shoved us away from our quiet and generous decency as a people. They have allowed doubt to seep into our spirits and replace our confident instincts to know we can solve our problems. We have too often turned inward.

And, so I fear that we have a human energy crisis, as well. It is both a crisis of the spirit that I've mentioned and a growing crisis of human service resources.

In addition to being demoralized, we have been plagued by inflation and government growth. These scourges have turned our frustrations into demands for a reduction in government and for a balanced budget. Inflation, itself, has led to a reduction in the government's capability to meet human needs.

But, we can solve the resource and attitudinal problem by the same method. America needs a rebirth of the kind of energy you represent in your volunteer work. This is why I want to speak to people like you--whose lives are examples of service to the causes you believe in.

We need to rediscover our strengths. We need to see our goals clearly and to attain them. We need to reassert the self-reliance, the courage, the generosity and the goodness of our people that has been our historical backbone.

This rebirth of the spirit will help us restore our deminished service resources. It will revive that great independent sector of American society that has always extended the role of government services, inspired innovation, and insured that newly perceived needs are met.

I am talking about our impulse to help other people and to get things done ourselves when we see a need. I am talking about volunteering and about community service. It is rooted in our morality, in our faith and in our culture. It is derived from our need to settle and control the vast resources and the vast

JIMMY HAS ALSO ESTABLISHED AN INTERAGENCY COORDINATING COUNCIL CHAIRED BY ONE OF HIS OWN SENIOR ASSISTANTS TO ENSURE THAT, IN EXECUTING HIS URBAN POLICY, THE LEFT HAND OF THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT KNOWS WHAT THE RIGHT HAND WAS PROPOSING TO DO. PARTLY AS A RESULT OF THAT UNPRECEDENTED COORDINATING AND MANAGEMENT MECHANISM, WE SAY -- WITH PRIDE -- THAT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS FINALLY GOTTEN ITS "URBAN ACT" TOGETHER.

WE ARE MAKING EXCITING PROGRESS IN OTHER WAYS AS WELL. WE WANT TO CREATE MAXIMUM INCENTIVES FOR PRIVATE SECTOR INVESTMENT IN OUR CITIES, BECAUSE, ULTIMATELY, THE VITALITY OF A COMMUNITY DEPENDS ON HOW STRONG IT IS COMMERCIALY

2. THE URBAN DEVELOPMENT ACTION GRANT PROGRAM IN THE DEPARTMENT OF HUD IS ONE OF THE BEST EXAMPLES IN THE GOVERNMENT OF THOSE PRINCIPLES IN ACTION. IN LESS THAN TWO YEARS, UDAG HAS STIMULATED PRIVATE SECTOR INVESTMENT OF OVER \$5 BILLION WITH \$818 MILLION OF FEDERAL GRANTS. UDAG PROJECTS IN CITIES AND TOWNS ALL OVER AMERICA WILL CAUSE OVER 79,000 EXISTING JOBS TO BE RETAINED IN CITIES; WILL CREATE OVER 133,000 PERMANENT NEW JOBS; AND REQUIRE MORE THAN 123,000 CONSTRUCTION JOBS.

I KNOW THOSE OF US HERE TODAY HAVE A SPECIAL INTEREST IN THAT PRIVATE SECTOR WHICH PICKS UP WHERE GOVERNMENT MUST LEAVE OFF.

OUR NATION HAS ALWAYS PROVIDED MANY HUMAN SERVICES OUTSIDE OF THE GOVERNMENT. AND, THIS IS MORE IMPORTANT NOW THAN EVER BEFORE. VOLUNTEER GROUPS; FOUNDATIONS; CHURCHES; COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS; SELF-HELP GROUPS; UNIVERSITIES AND PEOPLE JUST DOING THINGS ON THEIR OWN TO HELP OTHERS -- THIS IS THE NON-GOVERNMENTAL, NON-BUSINESS SIDE OF SOCIETY THAT CAN HELP US ACHIEVE OUR DREAM OF AMERICA. IT IS A UNIQUE DRIVE. FOR YEARS, WE HAVE SHOWN HOW WE AMERICANS CARE ABOUT OTHERS; HOW WE CAN GET THINGS DONE; HOW WE CAN SOLVE THE PROBLEMS THAT MOVE US.

THAT HAS BEEN YOUR EMPHASIS -- WHAT YOU CAN DO TO IMPROVE EDUCATION, HEALTH, EMPLOYMENT; HOW YOU CAN HELP CHILDREN, WOMEN, THE AGED.

SUBJECT: Speech Material for Urban League Conference

As you requested, attached is some information on the urban policy, jobs, and some brief paragraphs on other subjects that would be of interest to the Urban League, if you want to use them.

Please don't hesitate to call me if you need more information or want me to write up something else.

## URBAN POLICY

On March 27, 1978, Jimmy, with your help, proposed the first comprehensive urban policy this country has ever had. Acting under his executive authority, the federal agencies made more than 100 improvements in existing programs -- targeting them in better ways to the areas and people that need help most. Jimmy also signed four new executive orders to make the Federal government more responsive to urban America. As a result,

also established an Interagency Coordinating Council chaired by one of his own senior assistants to ensure that, in executing his urban policy, the left hand of the Federal government would know what the right hand was proposing to do. Partly as a result of that unprecedented coordinating and management mechanism, the Federal government really has gotten its "urban act" together.

We are making some very exciting progress in other ways as well. When Jimmy took office, the Federal government was spending

less than 15%, or only \$40 million, of its economic development funds in urban areas. In 1980, the Federal government will be investing more than 60%, or over \$1 billion, of our economic development funds in urban areas.

When Jimmy took office, HUD's subsidized mortgage program provided low interest mortgages on a first come, first serve basis, almost exclusively in the suburbs. This year, every dollar of that \$2 billion program will be spent in a needy neighborhood in a city.

Rather than talk at length about the details of our urban policy, I think I'll simply state what I believe are two of the its most basic underlying principles.

- ° One is partnership -- partnership to conserve America's communities. The partners are the federal, state, and local governments; the private sector; and the people who live in central city neighborhoods and communities. Jimmy understands that only with genuine participation from all those sectors can we do the job that needs to be done in our cities and towns. Over \$100 million in our urban legislation was earmarked specifically to help neighborhood and community groups more effectively engage in that process.

- ° The other underlying goal of the urban policy is to increase the impact of federal expenditures by leveraging them wherever possible with private sector money and by targeting our dollars to the places that need them most. We want to create maximum incentives for private sector investment in our cities, because, ultimately, the vitality of a community depends on how strong it is commercially and economically.

JOBS

While I'm on the subject of jobs, I'd like to comment briefly on what has happened to employment in this country in the last 2 1/2 years. When Jimmy took office, ten million Americans could not find a full-time job, and almost eight million could not find any job at all. The unemployment rate was eight percent.

Since January of 1977, over eight million people have entered the work force. That's a record. Never in our country's history have more people gone to work in a similar period of time. We have also cut the unemployment rate by 25% and, in the process, we have taken almost 2 million people off of welfare rolls and unemployment lines.

We have made progress, but there is much more to do. Although our minority youth unemployment has decreased for the first time in years, it is still unacceptably high. Jimmy has asked Vice President Mondale to lead an exhaustive review of all federal youth programs, with the goal of producing new youth jobs legislation early next year. I encourage you to help the Vice President's Task Force so that we can learn from you what works and what doesn't work in cities and communities and schools all over America.

WELFARE REFORM

The Welfare reform proposal that Jimmy submitted to the Congress last month, if passed, would lift 2.2 million people out of poverty by creating a uniform level of benefits across the country. It would create 400,000 new jobs for welfare eligibles, and would encourage families to stay together. It would also help state and local governments by providing almost one billion dollars in fiscal relief.

NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE

For three decades, this country has debated national health insurance, and for three decades, not one individual has benefited from that debate. Today more than eighty million Americans in the richest nation on earth still have no insurance against serious medical bills. Jimmy's national health proposals are a first and necessary step toward his goal of a universal, comprehensive program. Jimmy thinks we need to stop debating and start acting.

1. I am convinced: The only real limits to human achievement are those we impose on ourselves. Last week in Kansas City, quoting Franklin Roosevelt, the President said, "...the life of a nation is the fullness of its will to live." Our own lives are like that, also. In spite of all the various handicaps we have, and we all have some kind of handicap, the quality of our lives is determined from within, by our wills and spirits.

Today, each in your own way, you campers have demonstrated marvelous spirit, the kind of fire and determination that makes your own lives rich and that so invigorates our nation.

2. I am glad to be alive, to be an American, in an age when external limitations are being removed. Economic, racial, even physical characteristics that used to be automatic barriers to accomplishment are falling away. We must have a country in which no one is robbed of opportunity because of outwardly imposed limitations.

3. These remarkable achievements that we have seen are possible because people in Fort Worth care. All across America there are encouraging signs that we are increasingly becoming a caring society. It is true that we have been called the "me" generation. To the degree that we are the "me" generation, I want us to become the "for others" generation.

4. This YMCA Camp is beautiful testimony to what we can do when we pool our money and time through organizations like United Way. Do you realize that something like \$1.3 billion each year are channelled through our various united appeals organizations throughout the nation! Since the 1870's, Americans have been combining their efforts in this way to meet critical human needs. There is no way that government, in and of itself, at any level, could do for the people what folks like you do for yourselves.

5. This "commitment to community" will guide us as we work to find our footing in these new and uncertain times. We are a strong, caring people. We must not let problems turn us away from the fundamental values that have made us great. Keep on caring; keep on giving; keep on sharing with each other the best of who you are as a people.

Mrs. Carter's Remarks

Thank you. I have been looking forward to this luncheon for months. I knew it would give me a chance to talk with you about mutual concerns, mutual responsibilities, mutual goals -- about working together, caring for one another, and for those less fortunate than we are.

I did not know, however, when I accepted your invitation, that our common concerns would be the focal point for the intense personal and patriotic soul searching that is going on in our country today. I did not know what a great time this would be for self analysis, evaluation, sorting of priorities, patriotism, sacrifice -- for all our people.

This is a time also of excitement and challenge when we are called upon to join together in a common purpose to restore our American values and regain our confidence as a nation. And I think that every individual in this room and at this convention will look back and remember this time with pride and a strong sense of involvement in the course of history.

For many months now, Jimmy has been thinking about the problems in our country -- problems of energy, inflation, unemployment, yes -- but problems that go deeper -- such as loss of faith, loss of values, loss of confidence in ourselves, in our Government, and in our future.

Camp David suggests an isolated place -- and it is -- but it is also a place where one can become extremely close to the American people because, in a few days, people who represent you and others in our society can be brought together in a personal and informal way.

Our ten days at Camp David were an extraordinary and emotional experience. And, in these days, I can assure you we felt a sense of communication with our country and with people who love our country as much as we do.

I wish all of you could have been there with us. Some of you were. All of you were represented with persons such as Mayor Tom Bradley, Mary Berry, Unita Blackwell, Pat Harris, Jesse Hill, Carl Holean, Vernon Jordan, and Louis Martin. Jimmy listened (and I sat in on most of the meetings) as others talked, analyzed, debated, reflected about our country -- about our problems, our opportunities, the challenges we face. And, I might add, none were called to talk about politics. The matters of importance to our country today transcendent politics.

No, we were talking about the country as we see it -- now and in the future. And a central theme emerged from each and every discussion. And it confirmed the thoughts that Jimmy has been having over the past months. It was a theme, clearly a consensus, that our problems are deeper even than energy, inflation, unemployment. That we as a nation are losing our confidence -- we are losing our values -- but there was also a consensus that even if we are rocked by the economy, even if we are locked into gas lines, even if there is a loss of confidence in our institutions, America is good and America is strong.

And America needs us desperately to join together in a common effort -- and that with strong leadership, we can regain our confidence and our values. We have that leadership in the White House today -- and I am proud of Jimmy and the job that he is doing. I am confident that he can lead our country through this time of crises.

I'm proud of the accomplishments we've seen in the last two and a half years. We have added more than 8 million new jobs. One million of those have gone to blacks. We've cut the unemployment rate more than 25 percent. We've increased black teen-age employment more than 17 percent -- not nearly enough, as you and I both know, but we are working on it.

We have special programs for Vietnam Veterans. Under the local public works program, more than 14 percent of the contracts have been given to minority-owned businesses. Our major job programs have been directed in the Labor Department by the Administrator of our CETA program. His name is Ernest Green. He happens to be Black.

Two and one half years ago in the Federal Government the programs for Equal Opportunity Employment were in shambles. There were tens of thousands of cases in backlog. People searching in vain for their basic rights as human beings in our democracy. Now those programs are being administered properly. Equal employment is being enforced. We have a strong and dynamic woman in charge. Her name is Eleanor Holmes Norton. She happens to be Black.

We have a superb volunteer Army. Young men and women, in a time of high unemployment, can obtain a job with a career-training program and, at the same time, serve our country with dignity and self-respect and a true sense of patriotism. There is no racial discrimination in the Army. We have an outstanding gentleman as Secretary of the Army. His name is Clifford Alexander. He happens to be Black.

The largest nation in Africa is Nigeria. It has a population of 100 million. It is a dynamic, forceful nation -- shifting rapidly now toward democracy. Four years ago the Secretary of State of our nation was refused entry into Nigeria because that country was not a friend of ours. Now Nigeria is a great friend. My husband and I have been there to visit. More than fifty other nations -- lesser developed countries -- now look on the United States as either a close friend or a potential friend. This has been a remarkable transformation in the international policy and esteem of our country. The man responsible is our Ambassador to the United Nations -- a member of my husband's Cabinet. He is not afraid to speak out! His name is Andy Young. He happens to be Black.

Recently there was a landmark legal case: Weber vs. Kaiser Aluminum. Its outcome can affect the future of everyone in this audience. The favorable decision guarantees that affirmative action programs to correct racial injustice will be legal in the United States. Our Department of Justice fought for this decision in the courts. The brief was prepared by Drew S. Days III. He is in charge of the Civil Rights Division at the Department of Justice. He happens to be Black.

The case was argued in the Supreme Court by Wade H. McCree. He is the Solicitor General of the United States. He happens to be Black.

There has been an increase in education funding by an extraordinary sixty percent -- for elementary and secondary education, Head Start, and basic skill training. We have increased education aid for the handicapped by 200 percent. We have doubled funds for student assistance. As we are trying to do in other areas, we are targeting a high percentage of those funds to the children and schools that need them most. 400 million dollars are earmarked for black colleges from the Office of Education alone. We have an outstanding Acting Commissioner of Education working to formulate these policies and administer these decisions. Her name is Mary Berry. She happens to be Black.

We are rejuvenating our cities. New federal facilities are being located in central cities instead of in the suburbs. This brings much-needed new jobs and new income into the cities. We are buying more goods and services from businesses located in high unemployment areas; and we've developed a program that calls for every major government program to be measured to see if it has a positive or negative effect on urban America.

The Urban Development Action Grant Program in the Department of Housing and Urban Development is a good example of the government in action. In less than two years, UDAG has stimulated private sector investment of over \$5 billion with \$818 million of federal grants. UDAG projects in cities and towns all over America will cause over 79,000 existing jobs to be retained in cities; will create over 133,000 permanent new jobs; and require more than 123,000 construction jobs.

URBAN POLICY

On March 27, 1978, Jimmy, with your help, proposed the first <sup>since Mar 1978, when the U.P. was first prepared,</sup>

*Productivity*

The Urban Development Action Grant Program in the Department of HUD is one of the best examples in the government of those principles in action. In less than two years, UDAG has stimulated private sector investment of over \$5 billion with \$818 million of federal grants. UDAG projects in cities and towns all over America will cause over 79,000 existing jobs to be retained in cities; will create over 133,000 permanent new jobs; and require more than 123,000 construction jobs.

That is what urban policy is all about.

## Urban League Guild Luncheon - Chicago, Illinois

## Mrs. Carter's Remarks

Thank you. I have been looking forward to this luncheon for months. I knew it would give me a chance to talk with you about mutual concerns, mutual responsibilities, mutual goals -- about working together, caring for one another, and for those less fortunate than we are.

I did not know, however, when I accepted your invitation, that our common concerns -- those things that are important to you and to me -- would be the focal point for the intense personal and patriotic soul searching that is going on in our country today. I did not know what a great time this would be for self analysis, evaluation, sorting of priorities, patriotism, sacrifice -- for all our people.

This is a time also of excitement and challenge when we are called upon to join together in a common purpose to restore our American values and regain our confidence as a nation. You are here today because you are important. Vernon has called on you for great sacrifice and great achievement. I call on Vernon for sacrifice and great achievement. Our President calls on us all for sacrifice and great achievement. And I think that every individual in this room at this convention will look back and remember this time with pride and a strong sense of involvement in the course of history.

For many months now, Jimmy has been thinking about the problems in our country -- problems of energy, inflation, unemployment, yes -- but problems that go deeper -- such as loss of faith, loss of values, loss of confidence in ourselves, in our Government, and in our future.

Camp David suggests an isolated place -- a quiet place -- and it is, but it is also a place where one can become extremely close to the American people because in a few days people who represent you and others in our society can be brought together in a personal and informal way.

Our ten days at Camp David were an extraordinary and emotional experience. And in those days, I can assure you we felt a great sense of communication with our country and with people who love our country as much as we do.

I wish all of you could have been there. Some of you were. All of you were represented with persons such as Vernon Jordan, Dick Hatcher and Louis Martin. Jimmy listened as others talked, analyzed, debated, reflected about our country -- about our problems, our opportunities, the challenges we face.

And, I might add, none were called to talk about politics. The matters of importance to our country and to our people today transcend politics. No, we were talking about the country as we see it -- now and in the future. And a central theme emerged from every discussion --

We've cut the unemployment rate more than 25%. We've increased black teen-age employment more than 27% -- not enough, as you and I both know, but we are working on it.

We have special programs for Vietnam Veterans. Under the local public works program more than 14% of the contracts have been given to minority-owned businesses. Our major job programs have been directed in the Labor Department by the Administrator of our CETA program. The administrator of the CETA program is a man named Ernest Green. He happens to be black.

Two and one half years ago in the Federal Government the programs for Equal Opportunity Employment were in shambles. There were tens of thousands of cases in backlog. People searching in vain for their basic rights as human beings in our democracy. Now those programs are being administered properly. Equal employment is being enforced. We have a strong and dynamic woman in charge. Her name is Eleanor Holmes Norton. She happens to be black.

We have a superb volunteer Army. Young men and women -- in a time of high unemployment -- can obtain a job with a career-training program and, at the same time, serve our country with dignity and self respect and a true sense of patriotism. There is no racial discrimination in the Army. We have an outstanding gentleman as Secretary of the Army. His name is Clifford Alexander. He happens to be black.

Four years ago the Secretary of State of our country was refused entry into Nigeria because that country was not our friend. Now Nigeria is a great friend. My husband and I have been there to visit. More than fifty other countries -- lesser developed countries -- now look on the United States as either a close friend or potential friend. This is a remarkable transformation in the international policy and esteem of our country. The man responsible is our Ambassador to the United Nations -- a member of my husband's Cabinet -- who is not afraid to speak out! His name is Andy Young. He happens to be black.

Recently there was a landmark legal case: Weber vs. Kaiser Aluminum. Its outcome can affect the future of everyone in this audience. The favorable decision guarantees that affirmative action programs to correct racial injustice will be legal in the United States. Our Department of Justice fought for this decision in the courts. The man who prepared the brief in this case is in charge of the Civil Rights Division at the Department of Justice. His name is Drew Days. He happens to be black.

The case was argued in the Supreme Court by the Solicitor General of the United States. His name is Wade McCree. He happens to be black.

① There are critical moments in the history of any great nation. The Depression, World War II and the civil rights revolution were all important turning points for our country. *Jimmy believes that* ~~today~~, our country is at another crossroads.

When Jimmy spoke to the nation last Sunday night, he knew that it would be a very important speech -- perhaps the most important one of his Presidency. He knew that this was not time for more of the same or business as usual. He knew that the most important job of any President is to bring out the best in the American people and the country we love so much.

That's what he did last Sunday night. He called forth the best in our country. As President, he saw that it was

imperative that he speak to the moral crisis of our times --
