GREETINGS FROM THE PRESIDENT!

IT HAS BEEN ONLY A LITTLE MORE THAN 2½ YEARS SINCE JIMMY HAS ~~BECOME~~

A Byrne warning for Teddy

MAYOR BYRNE'S public promise to endorse President Carter was a surprise. It caught politicians, including some in the White House, off guard.

Chicago TV's babytalk commentator superficially sketched an explanation compatible with good-government motives. But there is a darker, more intriguing thesis consistent with Byrne's carnivorous politics. It stems from evidence that she recently had a falling-out with Teddy Kennedy and his local backers.

Byrne's commitment to Carter was startling because she has always surrounded herself with Kennedy memorabilia. She was initiated into politics as a campaign worker for President John F. Kennedy. A month ago her office was lined with pictures of John and Bobby. Only two weekends ago Byrne conducted a seance in her City Hall office, reading from speeches by the dead Kennedys and playing a recording of Teddy's voice.

Associates of the mayor have told me she often showed strong sentiment for the Kennedys. Two associates said the mayor originally planned to remain neutral. One said Byrne had predicted Kennedy would prevail over Carter and indicated she wanted to end up running the Kennedy campaign here.

BUT WHEN THE MAYOR greeted Rosalynn Carter Monday at O'Hare, she praised the President. "Are you going to endorse him?" a reporter asked. "Yes, I am," Byrne blurted out, also predicting that party chairman George W. Dunne and other key Chicago Democrats would do the same. The next day she tried to blur what was said, but she can't argue with the memory of network TV tapes.

The good-government explanation for Byrne's surprise is that Carter controls all federal bucks going to cities and she wants a big cut. In political jargon, this is called the power of the incumbency. Here, Byrne is following other mayors and governors who must fight over \$80 billion in federal loot distributed annually to cities and states.

While party operatives across the nation are groaning over Carter's bungles, mayors

and governors have come out for him. Carter has been endorsed by New York Mayor Ed Koch, Los Angeles' Tom Bradley, Detroit's Coleman Young and San Francisco's Diane Feinstein. Twenty Democratic governors and one lieutenant governor also endorsed him.

The more sinister thesis for Byrne's surprise is rooted in her practice of chewing up potential male competitors, most recently Sen. Richard M. Daley. Byrne has noted that the Kennedy draft in Illinois is being run by Bill San Hamel, a close buddy of former County Assessor Tom Tully. Tully is regarded as the mainline Kennedy contact in Illinois.

WHEN BYRNE LOOKS at Tully she sees still another potential Irish rival. She has been fuming about him, frustrated because she can't chop off his legs, as she has done with elected officials. She can't touch Tully, a private lawyer with no patronage. Pouring gas on the flames recently, Tully's buddy hired Stacy Ivers, dumped as the mayor's speechwriter, for the Kennedy campaign.

Byrne reportedly told Rosalynn Carter that she talked to Kennedy recently. One source said that Byrne, fuming over Tully's moves, told Kennedy he had not asked her permission to come here, as is traditional in Democratic campaigns, and warned him to stay away unless he had it. Kennedy's office confirmed Kennedy talked with Byrne, and said he has no Chicago visits on his schedule.

Did Byrne promise to endorse Carter only because she wants to do all she can for Chicago? Or did she also send Kennedy a message to ditch Tully and his pals, or else?

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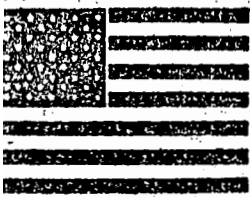

Mayor Byrne: Now you say it . . .

Byrne boils over and clams up

MAYOR BYRNE stopped talking to newsmen again Wednesday after telling reporters that she was upset with two Chicago newsmen who had suggested that she be quiet.

The mayor announced her press boycott at a press conference called to announce the planned construction of a 60-story building at Superior Street and Michigan Avenue, which will contain a Neiman-Marcus department store.

After giving a statement about the building, the mayor was asked a ques-

tion about a letter sent to her by a group of Downstate legislators asking her to join their campaign to override Gov. Thompson's veto of a bill to eliminate the sales tax on food and medicine.

"I WOULD ONLY say this with all due respect," she said. "And I really would like you to be very cognizant of this.

"Last night, Walter [Jacobson, of WBBM-TV, Channel 2] said that it would be wonderful if I could keep quiet until July till we go to the [Democratic National] convention, but he doubted if I could keep quiet for 24 hours." Report-

ers at the press conference began to laugh.

"The last time I kept quiet, Walter had an editorial saying I was in a snit," she said.

"So I've got a lot of problems this morning and that is how I can answer your questions and not say too much.

"And Madigan [John Madigan of WBBM radio, 780 AM] this morning suggested that I not say too much.

"It's happened so many times and I'm going to take the advice of the press of Chicago. Thank you all," and she turned abruptly and left the conference room.

THE LATEST PRESS confrontation stemmed from confusion arising from statements the mayor made this week concerning whether she would endorse President Carter for re-election.

On Monday, she said she planned to endorse the President, but the next day she backed away and said only that she "supports" the President.

On Sept. 24 and 25, the mayor drastically curtailed her normally vocal encounters with reporters after being angered by a column written by Ray Hanania in the Southtown Economist about

the mayor's husband, Jay McMullen, a real estate writer for the Chicago Sun-Times.

That press boycott lasted only two days.

The mayor gave no indication Wednesday on how long the current silence will last.

LATER WEDNESDAY, after a half-

hour meeting with Air Force officials in a city council committee room, the mayor kept up her campaign of silence, gesturing to reporters that her lips were sealed.

The mayor rebuffed several questions about the meeting, and indicated to reporters by holding up both hands that she may not talk for 10 months, as Jacobson suggested in his commentary.

Byrne a tough tongue to translate

There comes a time in the life of every citizen when he must put aside thoughts of personal gain and serve his city.

So I called City Hall this week and offered my services.

"I want to become the mayor's interpreter," I said.

"Why should the mayor want an interpreter?" one of her hired hands asked. "She speaks English."

"You only think she speaks English," I said. "I think she must be speaking Russian or Farsi or Tagalog. Or maybe she has divine visions and is speaking in tongues. Nobody can understand what she says."

As proof, I presented the Tuesday headlines from Chicago's two largest newspapers. One headline said: "Byrne to Rosalynn: I'll back Carter." But then a littler headline said: "But does she really mean it?"

In the other paper, a big headline screamed: "Byrne: I'll support Carter", but that was followed by a little headline that said: "Her 'yes' becomes 'I think'"

"SEE," I SAID, "nobody understands Byrne. She changes her mind right in the middle of the headline. Usually newspapers wait until they get to the story before they call the mayor a liar. Now they can't even wait for that. Maybe she speaks English as a

second language."

The hired hand said he didn't see what all the trouble was about. "When asked by a reporter whether Byrne was going to endorse President Carter, she said yes," the hired hand said.

"Then Byrne has endorsed Carter?" I asked.

"No," he said. "She only said she was endorsing Carter. She's not really endorsing Carter."

"Then why did she say she was endorsing Carter?" I asked.

"Because somebody asked her," the hired hand said.

"Do you mean if I asked her if she was endorsing Ted Kennedy or Richard Nixon or the Ayatollah Khomeini, she might endorse them?" I asked.

"She might," the hired hand said. "But don't worry. She wouldn't mean it."

SINCE THE WHOLE thing is being treated so seriously in the papers and on TV, I went right to the political record books to find out just how important the endorsement of a Chicago mayor is when it comes to getting elected President.

In 1976, Mayor Richard J. Daley, whose political coattails were as long as they could get without somebody tripping over them, endorsed Jimmy Carter. And Gerald Ford won the state by 93,000 votes.

In 1972, Daley endorsed George McGovern, whom he liked about as much as the Asian flu, and Richard Nixon took the state by nearly 900,000 votes.

In 1968, Daley endorsed Hubert Humphrey. And when the tear gas had settled, Nixon took the state by 135,000 votes. George Wallace, whom nobody endorsed, racked up nearly 400,000 votes.

One has to go back 15 years, to 1964, before we find a Daley-endorsed winner. That was when Lyndon Johnson was swept into office because everyone thought Barry Goldwater would bog us down in Vietnam. We sure showed him.

IT IS TRUE that in each losing case May-

or Daley did carry Chicago for his candidate, but Chicago doesn't have any electoral votes. And until we get this constitutional oversight changed, carrying the state is all that matters.

And it is true that endorsements may count more in the fight for the nomination, but nobody knows if Mayor Byrne has any political coattails at all. She has been in office only six months and she isn't even a duke-maker yet, let alone a king-maker.

The role she is playing now is the smart one. She is being nice to Carter so he will give money to the city. But if it looks like Kennedy can really win the nomination, her Irish eyes might start smiling on him. In other words, like everyone else, she's waiting to see what happens in the primaries.

And the more she holds out her endorsement, even up to the convention if she can, the more sought after it will be, and the more the mayor can get promised in return for it. Presidential candidates, like lovers, quickly lose interest once they have made their conquest.

So it may take some time to learn just who the mayor wants. But I did get one promise from City Hall: The next time Byrne endorses a guy for President, she's going to cross her heart instead of her fingers.

Byrne eases her vow to back Carter

Mayor Byrne backtracked a bit Tuesday from her near-endorsement Monday of President Carter for renomination.

Surrounded by reporters outside the City Council chamber after earlier eluding them, Byrne refused to repeat her flat, unequivocal prediction 24 hours earlier that she would join other Illinois delegates to the Democratic National Convention next summer in supporting the incumbent.

Byrne's statement Monday got nationwide attention. After she welcomed First Lady Rosalynn Carter to Columbus Day festivities, Byrne was asked, "Are you going to endorse him [Carter]?"

"Yes, I am," Byrne answered. "I think the chairman of the Democratic Party and the delegates and everyone who goes to the convention will caucus, and I think will come out and endorse him."

Byrne, usually met by reporters on arrival at City Hall shortly before 9 a.m., slipped in at 8:15 a.m. She took a back stairway from her fifth-floor offices to ceremonies honoring police and fire heroes in the City Council chamber on the second floor. She dodged reporters a third time when she left those ceremonies through the public gallery, rather than a rear anteroom.

Pursued and overtaken, Byrne was asked, "Have you endorsed Jimmy Carter?"

She asserted, "I've stated that I support the President of the United States, and I support the President of the United States. I'm not the chairman of the Democratic Party. I'm sure they will caucus, and that's it. They will."

At the convention, would she support Carter?

"I will support the Democratic candidate," Byrne asserted.

Byrne clarifies story: I support Carter

MAYOR BYRNE hedged Tuesday on her widely reported semi-endorsement of President Carter for re-election, saying repeatedly that she "supports" the President.

During an impromptu press conference at O'Hare International Airport Monday, with First Lady Rosalynn Carter at her side, the mayor predicted that she and the Illinois Democratic caucus would endorse the expected re-election bid of Carter.

When asked if she was planning to endorse Carter, she replied, "Yes, I am."

On Tuesday, however, the mayor backtracked on her statements, the strongest she had yet made in favor of Carter, saying instead, "I said that I supported Jimmy Carter and I support the President of the United

States."

WHEN ASKED to clarify her answer about the predicted endorsement, the mayor said she had been asked two questions simultaneously, and her answer of "Yes, I am," was in response to a question about whether she supports the President.

The mayor's seeming endorsement of the President drew nationwide attention Monday, with reporters interpreting her remarks as a flat endorsement by her and the powerful Cook County Democratic Central Committee—a major plus for Carter's expected re-election bid.

But Tuesday, the mayor repeatedly ducked reporters seeking clarification, coming in early to work and, at one point, using a back door out of her office to elude a large group of reporters.

During one brief encounter with reporters, however, she clearly backed down from her Monday statements.

"HE IS PRESIDENT of the United States, and I will continue to support him," she said. "By the same token, I do not see myself as the political leader. I see George Dunne [chairman of the Cook County Democrats] as political leader, and I have stated from day one that I bow to his wishes."

As for supporting Carter in the future, she said, "I would have no reason not to support him at this time—none."

At another encounter later, the mayor said, "I will support the Democratic candidate of the State of Illinois and the caucus."

The mayor also dismissed discussion of the possible candidacy of Sen. Edward Kennedy [D., Mass.] as "speculative."

One is "Running," starring Michael Douglas as an Olympic marathon runner. The other is Stanley Kramer's "The Runner Stumbles." To add to the confusion, Douglas in "Running" stumbles at the climax. "The Runner Stumbles" has nothing to do with running. It's the story of a priest who falls in love with a nun.

QUESTION AT CITY HALL: "Will she or won't she support President Carter?" Mayor Jane Byrne's ambiguous statement about supporting Carter left many political observers and members of her staff confused, inasmuch as she previously indicated Sen. Ted Kennedy would be her choice. Best explanation: It would be impolitic for Byrne not to proclaim support for Carter at this time in view of his coming here Monday to address the Democratic fund-raising dinner in McCormick Place. (But the mayor has a right to change her mind, as she has been known to do on occasion.)

STATE SEN. RICHARD DALEY (D-Chicago), under attack by Channel 5's Dick Kay over disposition of the late Fire Comr. Bob Quinn's will, has promised to answer all questions "at the appropriate time." That's a line right out of his late father's comment when he was pressed to explain why he gave the city's insurance to two of his sons. "I'll answer at the appropriate time," was Mayor Daley's standard answer to all such questions. The appropriate time never came.

A \$250 MILLION REAL ESTATE DEVELOPMENT in suburban Itasca (due west of O'Hare Airport) will be launched with a ground-breaking ceremony on Thursday. Focal point of the development will be a 400-room hotel operated by Stauffer's. The developer is Trammell Crow of Dallas. . . . One of the features of the current Chicago Theater Festival will be the backdrop, from start to finish, at the Dirk-

virtuosity in the grand 19th Century manner.

The problem is to go beyond the opportunities for technical display that these works provide and show us their musical content. Horowitz has been doing that increasingly in recent years by playing down the fireworks and playing up the lyric and poetic ideas of the works.

Wild followed in much the same manner, although there were plenty of fireworks when they seemed really necessary for the composer's intended effect.

In a way, the entire afternoon was summed up in the Three Grand Etudes after Paganini. One must applaud the lightness and delicacy Wild was able to bring to these pages, his willingness to explore the soft end of the dynamic range, and the deft rhythmic thrust with which he kept well-shaped phrases in motion.

Then one must applaud the technique, which in "La Campanella" suggests that the pianist must have an extra finger or two, if not a third hand at work. But primarily one must applaud the artistry: Each of these works is also a miniature tone poem, full of images and colors and fresh ideas. Wild made them clear, giving us an increased appreciation for the composer as well as the performer.

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Monday parade for Columbus Day

A PARADE down Clark Street, a holiday for most of the city's school children, and a shutdown of banks and government offices will mark Chicago's observance of Columbus Day Monday.

First Lady Rosalynn Carter will be the honored guest at the parade, which begins at 1 p.m. at Clark Street and Wacker Drive and marches south to Congress Parkway.

More than 100 floats, bands, and other marching units will pass a reviewing stand at Washington Street, where Mrs. Carter and other dignitaries, including Mayor Byrne, Gov. Thompson, and Paolo Pansa Cedronio, Italian ambassador to the United States, will be assembled.

The two-hour parade will be televised by WGN-TV [Channel 9].

All city, county, state, and federal government offices and courts—except holiday courts—will be closed during the day.

ALL PUBLIC SCHOOLS in Chicago and suburban Cook County will be closed. Some of the city's and county's Catholic schools will be closed, according to a spokesman for the archdiocesan school board. She said the holiday is an optional day for Catholic schools, and the decision to stay open or to close is up to individual schools.

Also closed will be the City Colleges of Chicago, as well as the system's Chicago Urban Skills Institute, which offers classes at 450 locations in the city, including 16 evening high schools.

Most Chicago area businesses will be open for the holiday, according to a spokesman for the Chicago Association of Commerce.

Parking meter regulations will be in effect in Chicago Monday.

A funny thing happened on the way to the parade...

Enclosed are the day-after newsclips on the parade and "other happenings" of October 8. I would like to think we would have made the front page of both newspapers anyway.

There was tons of television coverage, both network and local. On the early local news, we were the lead story on all three major stations. On network news (Mon. afternoon), we were the lead on NBC (Jim Cummins); 5:42 P.M. CDT on CBS (Chris Kelley); and 5:50 P.M. CDT on ABC (Betina). We were the lead on all 6:00 P.M. local newscasts. At 10:00 P.M., we were the lead on WBBM-TV (CBS) and the fourth story on WMAQ-TV (NBC). We were the first story on the WLS-TV (ABC) late newscast after the football game.

Most TV accounts used the Byrne "Yes I am" footage, which included her saying: "The Cook County Democratic Chairman, the delegates and everyone that goes to the Convention will caucus, and I think we'll endorse him." There was quite a bit of use of RSC's "good solid record - will run on it" quote.

To provide emphasis, WBBM-TV ran the Byrne "Yes I am"(endorsing him) quote twice during the same news report ("You determine what she really said and meant," the anchor said to viewers).

In addition, WBBM-TV anchor and commentator, Walter Jacobson did a "Perspective" last night in which he said that "Jane Byrne will vote for him (Carter) at the Democratic Convention and urge others to do the same." He (Jacobson) said he had learned exclusively that Mayor Byrne talked privately

with President Carter and she told him that an incumbent President deserves re-election. Jacobson went on to say that Byrne plans on turning out the entire town when the Carters come on the 15th. "The dinner, which was supposed to be a fundraiser for the Mayor has instead turned into a rally for Carter." Jacobson alluded to the things that Carter will do for Byrne in return -- things like federal funds for mass transit and other Byrne "pet projects." Jacobson concluded the commentary by saying that "Teddy Kennedy may have charisma, but Jimmy Carter has the cash -- and that's all there is to it."

Today (Oct. 9), Byrne was cornered by reporters and said: "I said I supported Jimmy Carter, and I do support the President of the United States. I have no reason not to support him at the present time." She said she does not see herself as a political leader and that she defers to George Dunne in that regard. She said she expects to endorse the candidate supported by the Democratic Party. She had high praise for the Carter Administration and said that the President could not be blamed for the nation's energy and inflation problems.
