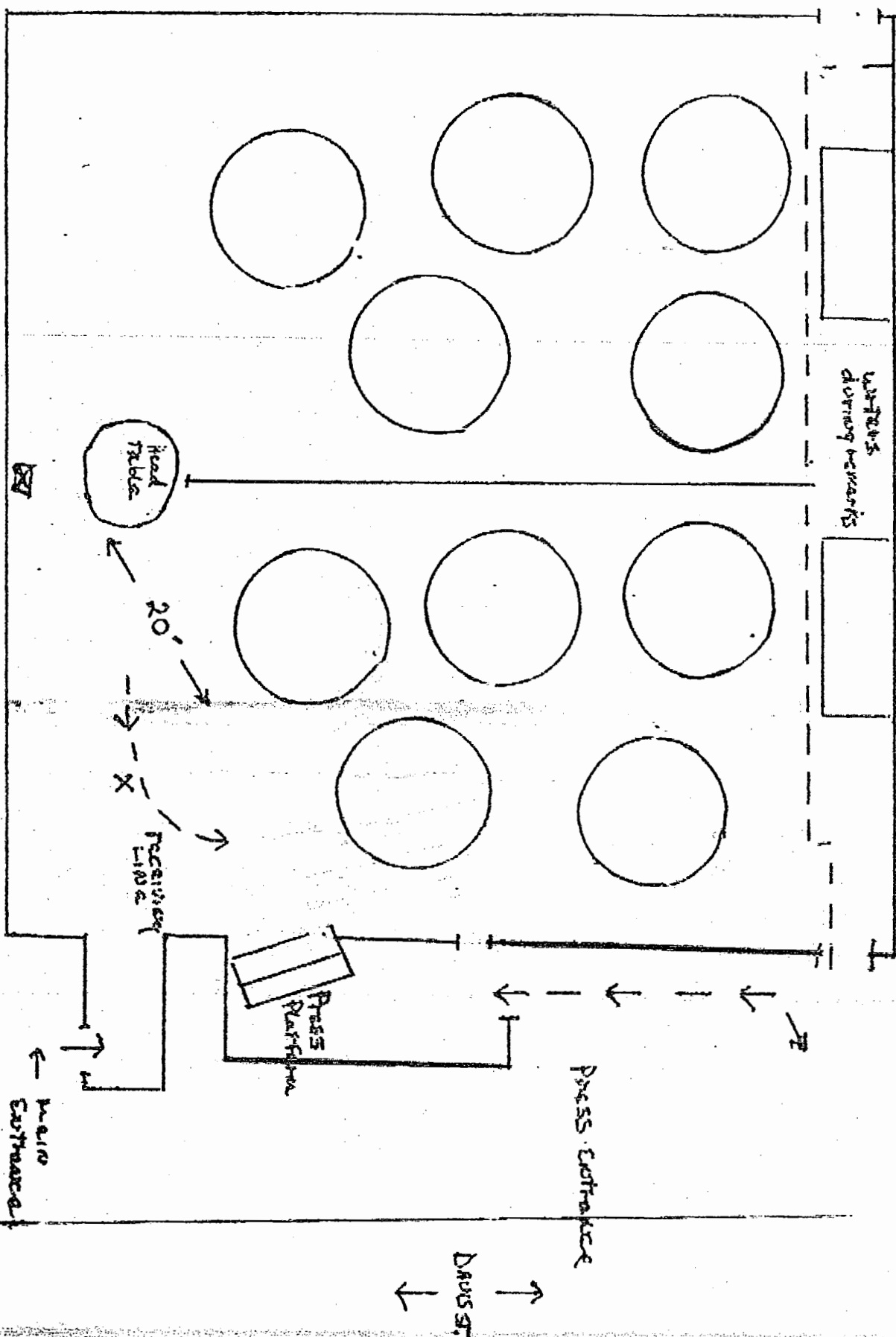

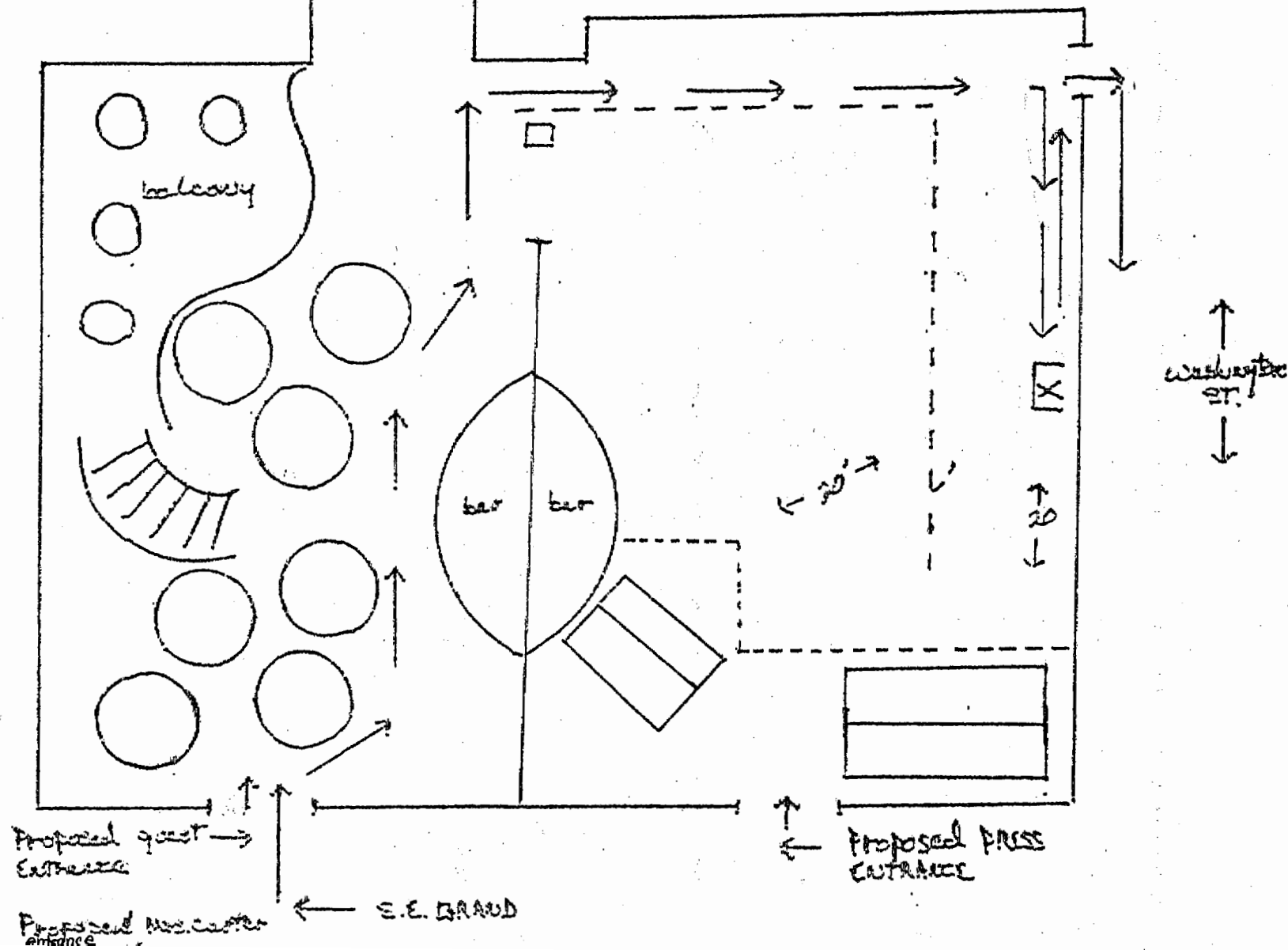

Mrs. Carter's Statement

After centuries of believing that retarded people are helpless, hopeless, even too dangerous to be at large, we now recognize that they are people first -- people who feel, hurt, laugh and cry, people who have the same constitutional rights as all our citizens.

The National Association for Retarded Citizens has led the fight to change public attitudes about mental retardation.

Since the first parents of retarded children organized more than twenty-five years ago, we have seen a dramatic shift in public perceptions about those who are mentally retarded. You can take great pride in the strides that have been made.

But, old fears and prejudices die slowly. And, the sad truth is that many people still feel threatened by a retarded person and uncomfortable in his or her presence.

In towns and cities -- even in my own state of Georgia -- retarded individuals confront ignorance and discrimination. It touches on all aspects of their lives -- education, housing, employment, recreation -- and continues to hold back progress in this field.

I urge all Americans today to join me and The National Association for Retarded Citizens in a renewed campaign to change negative attitudes toward the mentally retarded.

We must fight suspicion and hostility in communities with facts and accurate information about mental retardation.

We must widen our definition of what is normal in our society and create a climate in which retarded citizens are accepted and cherished -- friends, neighbors, valuable human beings.

You have my full support in this most important effort.
