Remarks for the First Lady on Wage-Price Controls

Let me turn to something that should concern us all.

In recent weeks, we have heard proposed comprehensive controls over wages, prices, rents, interest, and dividends. Government just puts on the brakes, and inflation stops, once and for all.

It promises not to cost anything. It promises that you don't have to sacrifice anything. Nobody has to restrain themselves. Government will do it for you.

It sounds great -- until you begin asking questions about how it will affect your life.

If you're a Pennsylvania steelworker renegotiating your contract, what will controls do to that contract? What happens to the cost-of-living clause it took decades to get into the basic contract?

What happens to workers at the minimum wage? Will their wages be frozen? Their only hope of a better life is minimum wage laws that were a key accomplishment of the New Deal. Will we just abandon the work it took to get annual increases for millions of workers at the bottom of the scale?

What happens when you decide to retire after a lifetime of hard work? If you decide to sell your house and move to Florida, will the government dictate the price of a house it took years to save and pay the mortgage for?

When you retire, will controls freeze Social Security for you? It was a major reform to include cost-of-living adjustments in the Social Security program, so that old people did not have to go hat-in-hand to Congress every year for a needed increase. Would controls abolish that progress?

What about interest and dividend controls? Many of

you have saved or invested some of your hard-earned wages for retirement or college for your children. Will controls freeze those too?

What about farmers, who have been hit hard by rising costs of fertilizer, equipment, feed, and just about everything else? How long can we expect them to grow the food and fiber this country needs if controls freeze the prices paid them by the giant food companies?

What happens when foreign oil producers raise prices? Obviously, wage-price controls cannot dictate what OPEC decides to charge. Neither can we dictate what other nations charge for coffee or copper or tin or phosphate or natural gas or the hundreds of other basic materials we import.

An economy frozen in time by controls cannot pay higher prices for imports without paying less for something else. Nor can we adjust the economy or apply innovative

solutions or use any of the ingenuity the American people have used to face economic challenges of the past.

From the same people who propose controls over wages, prices, dividends, rents, interest rates and everything else -- from these same people, we hear proposals for expensive new Federal programs.

After we have frozen everything, where would the massive amounts of tax money needed come from? National Health Insurance, in one version, would cost over \$100 billion a year. Where would the money come from, when people make the same incomes next year that they made this year? How would a frozen economy generate the money to make even a down payment on such a massive new program?

The President and I support national health care. We have worked for it over three years. But is something we must phase in, and make sure the economy is strong enough

to generate the sustained growth needed before we can afford it.

In short, comprehensive controls they promise a simple, cheap, easy way out. But they will put the heavy hand of government directly on every aspect of your personal lives.

The next time somebody proposes wage-price controls, ask them how it will work. Ask them how it will effect you, and what the real costs will be. Ask them tough, honest questions, and expect the truth from them.

There is nothing liberal or compassionate or humane about controls. They just stifle you, the economy, and jeopardize the future that you have devoted a lifetime to building.

They are simply a distraction from the real task -- self-restraint, patience, and hard work in making the needed structural changes in our economy. That's what President Carter is doing, and that's why he needs your help.
