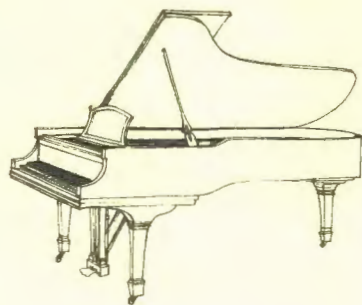

He taught several of today's prominent young pianists at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, and as the President and Artistic Director of the Marlboro Festival and School of Music in Vermont, he is the guiding spirit of its various expert ensembles. He is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and is a recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

The prodigy of Rudolf Serkin is all-encompassing and timeless.

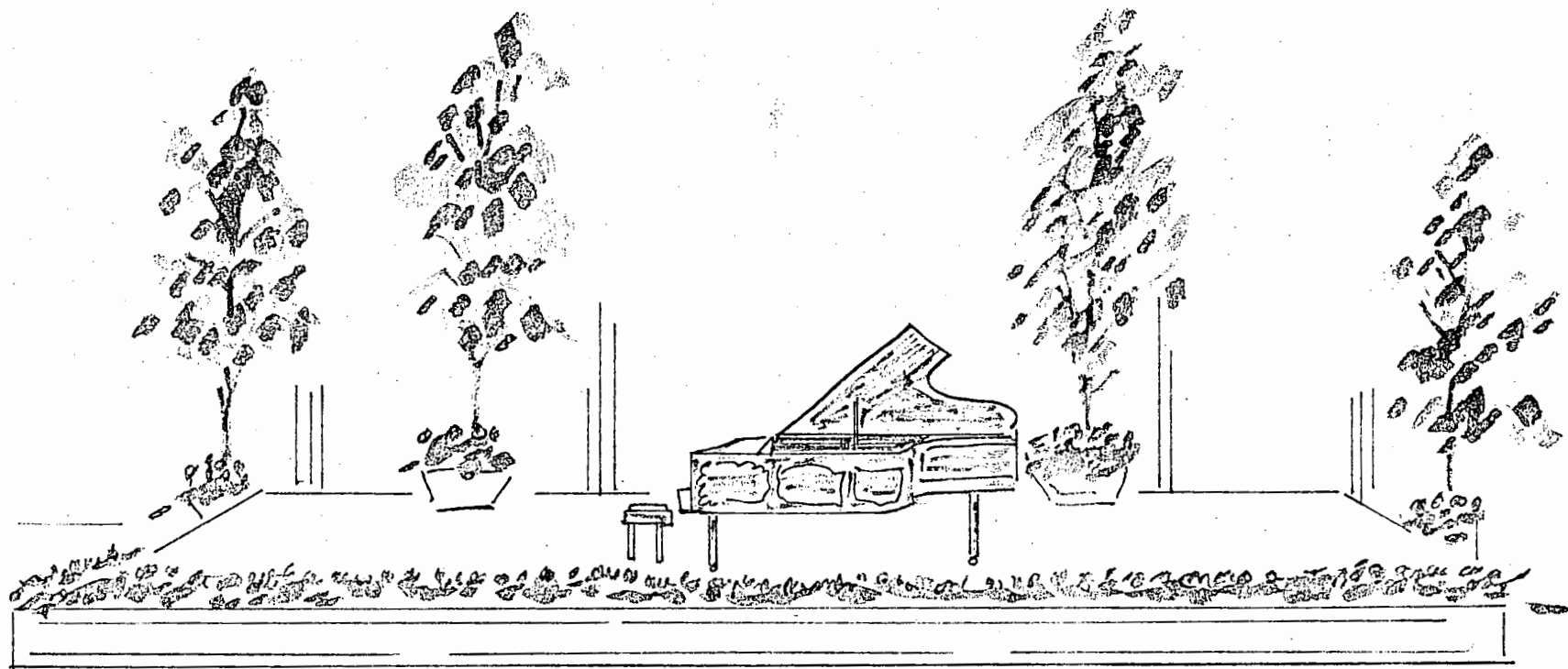

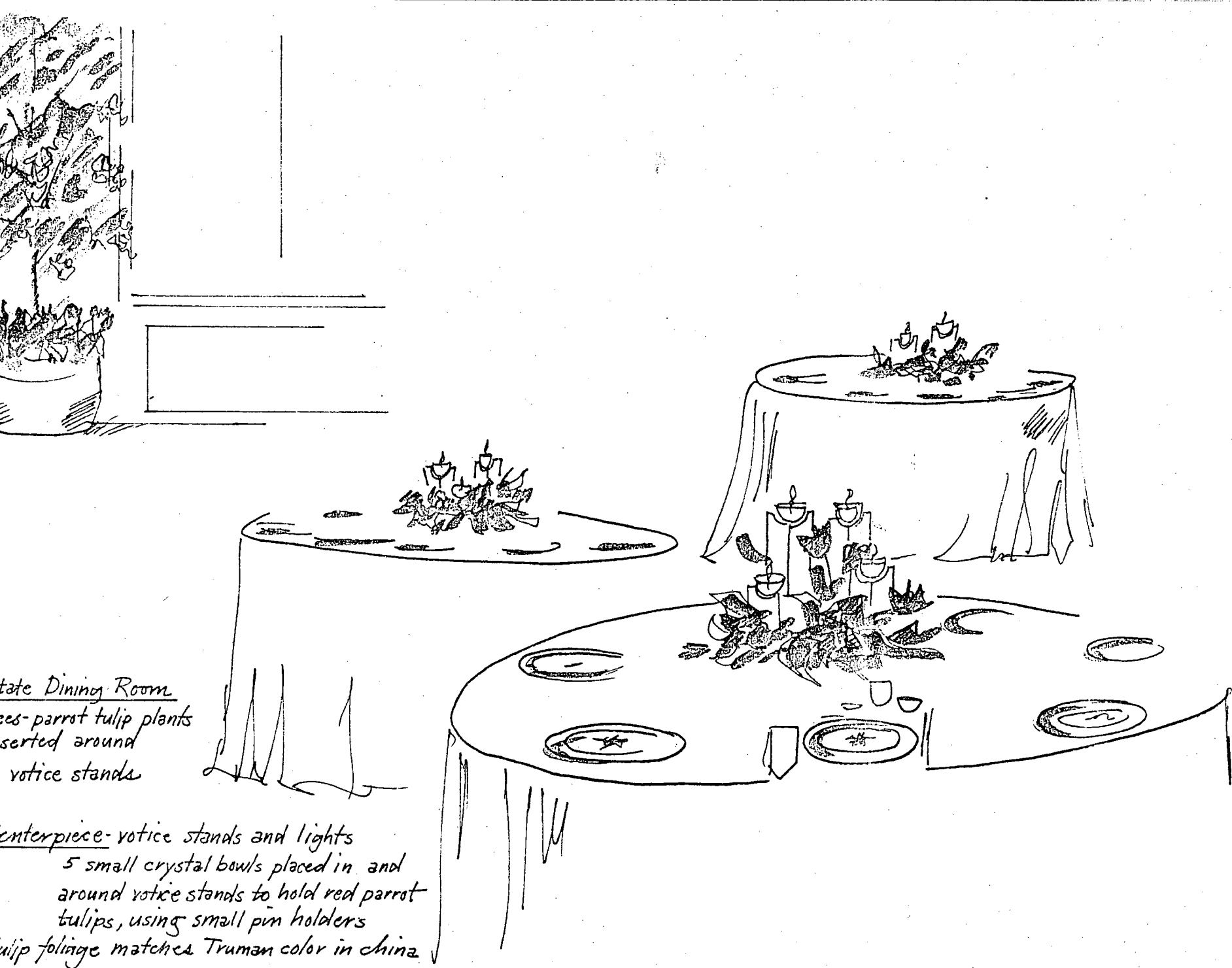

FACT SHEET

For the visit of The President of the United Mexican States and Mrs. Lopez Portillo, President and Mrs. Carter will entertain in the following manner:

- Only American food will be served.
- The menu will be printed in English instead of French.
- Dinner guests will receive personalized programs, that include the menu, as well as escort cards.
- Wine will be served both prior to and during the dinner.
- Dinner will begin at 7:30, a half-hour earlier than usual.
- After-dinner guests will also receive personalized programs for the entertainment.
- The Color Guard will no longer precede the President and Mrs. Carter when they descend the staircase to receive their guests, nor will the herald trumpets be played. The Honor Corps will no longer line the north driveway. The Social Aides have been reduced from 24 to 18.
- At the conclusion of the entertainment and after President and Mrs. Lopez Portillo leave the North Portico, President and Mrs. Carter will go directly to the Residence. The guests will then depart.

The State Dining Room:

Approximately 100 dinner guests will be seated at round tables.

The centerpiece on each table has been designed with a contemporary lucite candelabrum holding five votive candles with five small crystal bowls of twenty red tulips placed in and around the candelabrum.

Individual place settings will include the Truman china, which matches the tulip foliage. Morgantown crystal and Gorham's King Charles silver pattern will also be used.

Ficus trees with potted red tulips and votive candles will line the outer edges of the room.

In addition to Mr. Serkin's after-dinner recital, the U.S. Marine Band, a 25-piece orchestra, will play light classical music in the foyer during dinner. The U.S. Army Strings will stroll through the Dining Room during dessert. A Marine Corps harpist will provide music in the Diplomatic Reception Room where the guests enter.

Please study this carefully -- we will have a staff meeting at 11:30 to go over details and make necessary changes.

May I suggest a few -- probably not that necessary but maybe helpful -- rules for our staff.

1. Each of you will be totally responsible for your part of the scenario. A 2-3 minute delay can mean disaster for all of us.
2. We are not guests.
3. We should not stand around and be visible to guests, but we must somehow always be available to the Press.
4. If there is a problem -- and there will be -- do not flap. Rather say you will find someone to solve it. Do not waste any time in finding me or Ann. We will be the heavies for the night. Do not, repeat do not, get into arguments with the Press.
5. Never change the scenario. If it is wrong, we will have to take the flak. We will get lots of flak. Make note of possible improvements for a debriefing session.
6. Read the scenario carefully so that you know who is responsible for what. Do not move out of your own territory or change positions.
7. Remember that any observation, comment, reaction that you may make may be the lead for tomorrow's story. Repeat, the Press will be judging the professionalism of the Press Staff as well as the attire of the guests. I cannot stress this too strongly. Keep a low profile. Don't speculate, talk about other East Wing activities, or comment about the party or the guests. Never answer a question unless you are positive you are right. The best answer always is, "I do not know, but I will try to find out for you".
8. I will have the following kinds of information if you are asked. I will give out this information during dinner:
 - a. A sampling of guests, where they come from, who they are.
 - b. A roundup of a few of the minor changes in entertaining style of President and Mrs. Carter.

Please note -- we should all confer briefly before this period to exchange any information that might be useful for the Press. Please use your eyes and ears to our advantage.

Responsibilities in Advance of the Dinner

1. East Wing Theater set up

Responsibility for setup, champagne, glasses, mechanical procedures for piping in the toast (call Usher's Office, other) Faith Collins

2. Guest List

Responsibility for obtaining, duplicating, distributing, no later than 5:00 p.m., guest list to West Wing Press Office, Washington Post, Washington Star and others (call local papers and ask how best to expedite). Luraner Little

3. Gate List

Responsibility for keeping accurate count and names of all who need to be cleared and/or admitted on grounds. Faith Collins

4. Roped Areas to Contain Press

(Late afternoon?) Check with Usher's Office about roped areas in lower corridor, main lobby, North Portico, and any others. Remember that writers and photographers need assigned areas that are equally prime. Barbara Heineback

5. Brief Biographies on President and Mrs. Lopez Portillo

Responsibility for writing, duplicating and distributing in theater during dinner (see me for State Department info). Coates Redmon

6. Transcribers for Toast

Responsibility for contacting transcribers and making arrangements for distribution of toast -- where, when, how? Barbara Heineback

7. Toast Text

Responsibility for obtaining, duplicating and distributing in theatre during dinner (Jim Fallow's office). Luraner Little

8. Fact Sheet

Responsibility for distributing in theater during dinner. Luraner

Other: Ann and Mary

1. Will float throughout the evening.
2. Will brief Press in theater during dinner.
3. Will be sure stills and writers have grand staircase shot.
4. Handle still photographers at doorway to State Dining Room.
5. Be sure lights are "up" for shots of entertainment.
6. Be sure Press is moved out quickly but gently at end of party.

Amended introduction of Rudolf Serkin by the President. State Dinner. 2/14/77.

For this first White House state dinner in our Third Century, we are greatly honored to have with us not only one of the greatest pianists and musicians of all time, but his piano as well. Both arrived safely today from Philadelphia where they are performing in a concert series.

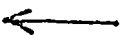

RE: Press coverage of the Lopez Portillo state dinner

We have studied the past press coverage of state dinners with the White House Photography Office, Rex Scouten, and others and propose the following kind of coverage for the Lopez Portillo state dinner.

1. We will have open coverage in the downstairs corridor for the arrival of guests. The Press will be contained.
2. At the same time, there will be open coverage of the arrival of the Head of State at the North Portico. The Press will be contained.
3. A White House photographer will take informal photos on the second floor of President and Mrs. Carter and President and Mrs. Lopez Portillo.
4. There will be open coverage of President and Mrs. Carter and President and Mrs. Lopez Portillo as they come down the staircase in the Grand Lobby and pose briefly for still photographs.
5. The White House photographer only will be allowed in the East Room to cover the receiving line.
6. All Press will be escorted to the theater and/or the West Wing during dinner. It has been traditional to serve champagne to the writing press when they are waiting in the theater during dinner.
7. The toast will be taped into the theater and covered only by one pooled television crew (who will set up in the Red Room to shoot through the door) and a small pool of American and Mexican still photographers at the door.
8. Immediately after dinner the still photographers and television minicam will be taken to the East Room to set up for the entertainment, and the writing press will be brought up and allowed to mix with guests during coffee.

SEQUENCE OF EVENTS

- a. The host will arrive approximately 10 minutes prior to the time of the ceremony.
- b. The Dignitary and the Official Party will arrive at Memorial Gate, where they will be met by the Liaison Officer, who will escort the motorcade to the East Entrance (#1 on the attached diagrams) to the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier on Roosevelt Drive. An appropriate cannon salute will be fired while the party is enroute.
- c. The host (Commanding General, Military District of Washington) and the MDW Ceremonies Officer will greet the Dignitary at the East Entrance (#2), brief him if necessary, and escort him through the ceremony. The Official Party will be organized by a Protocol Officer of the State Department and escorted by the MDW Ceremonial Officer.
- d. Upon arrival at the East Entrance, the Dignitary will be escorted to a point opposite the color of the Dignitary's country (#3). There the entire party will halt. The color team will then come to "Present Arms" whereupon all members of the Official Party will salute the color.
- e. After the color has been received, the Dignitary will be escorted toward the Tomb, stopping in a designated position near the foot of the steps (#5). The color will turn right and follow the Dignitary. The Official Party will follow the color. As the party enters the beginning (USCG) of the cordon formed by the honor guard, the troops will be brought to "Present Arms."
- f. When the entire party and the color have halted at the designated position (#5), the band will sound four ruffles and flourishes, followed by the national anthem of the Dignitary's country, during which the Official Party and all spectators will salute.
- g. Following the honors, the honor guard will come to "Order Arms", and the Dignitary will be escorted up the stairway, halting in front of the Tomb. As soon as the party moves after "Order Arms," the troops will be brought to "Present Arms." The color and the Official Party will follow, halting on the steps (#6).

h. When the Official Party has halted, the band will play the national anthem of the United States, during which the Official Party and all spectators will salute.

i. Following the national anthem, the honor guard will come to "Order Arms." At this time the wreath bearer with the wreath, and the bugler, will move forward. As the bugler takes his post, the wreath bearer will present the wreath to the Dignitary.

j. When the Dignitary has placed his hands upon the wreath, the honor guard will come to "Present Arms" and the Official Party and all spectators will salute. The Dignitary will then move forward, with his hands on the wreath as the wreath bearer backs toward the Tomb, and places the wreath in position. The Dignitary will then return to his position beside the host and assume a proper position, i.e., salute, attention, hand over heart, as appropriate.

k. After the wreath has been placed, the drummer will sound four muffled ruffles, and the bugler will sound "Taps."

l. Following "Taps" the honor guard will be brought to "Order Arms" and:

a) The host will escort the Dignitary to the right of the Tomb, around the joint color team and onto the plaza to a position in front of the west end of the Tomb where the Dignitary may read the inscription (#7).

b) The color team with the color of the Dignitary's country will follow the same route onto the plaza, but will continue without pause, on through the Trophy Room and around the colonnade to the Amphitheatre West Entrance and await the arrival of the Dignitary and host.

c) The remainder of the wreath party will move onto the plaza and halt near the base of the Trophy Room steps where they may view the inscription.

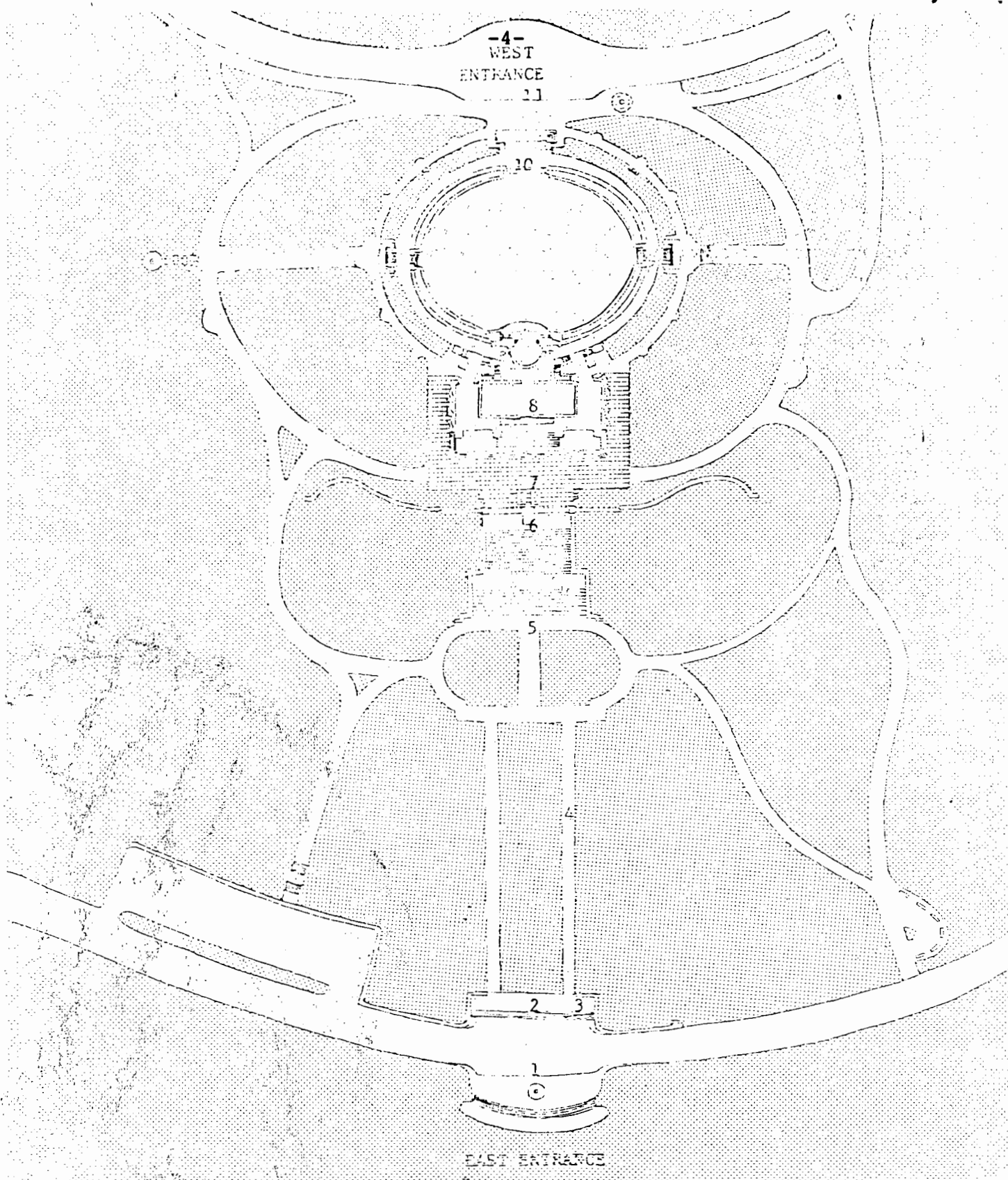
m. After the Dignitary has viewed the inscription, the host will escort him into the Trophy Room (#8) followed by the remainder of the wreath party.

n. When the Dignitary and the Official Party have completed their visit in the Trophy Room, the host will escort them around the north colonnade (#9) to the West Entrance (#10). At this point, the host will escort the Dignitary to a position facing the color of the Dignitary's country and the remainder of the party will halt a few steps to the north of the color.

The color team will come to "Present Arms" and all members of the party will salute, thus dismissing the color and concluding the ceremony. The color team will remain at the top of the steps until the Dignitary's vehicle has departed (#11).

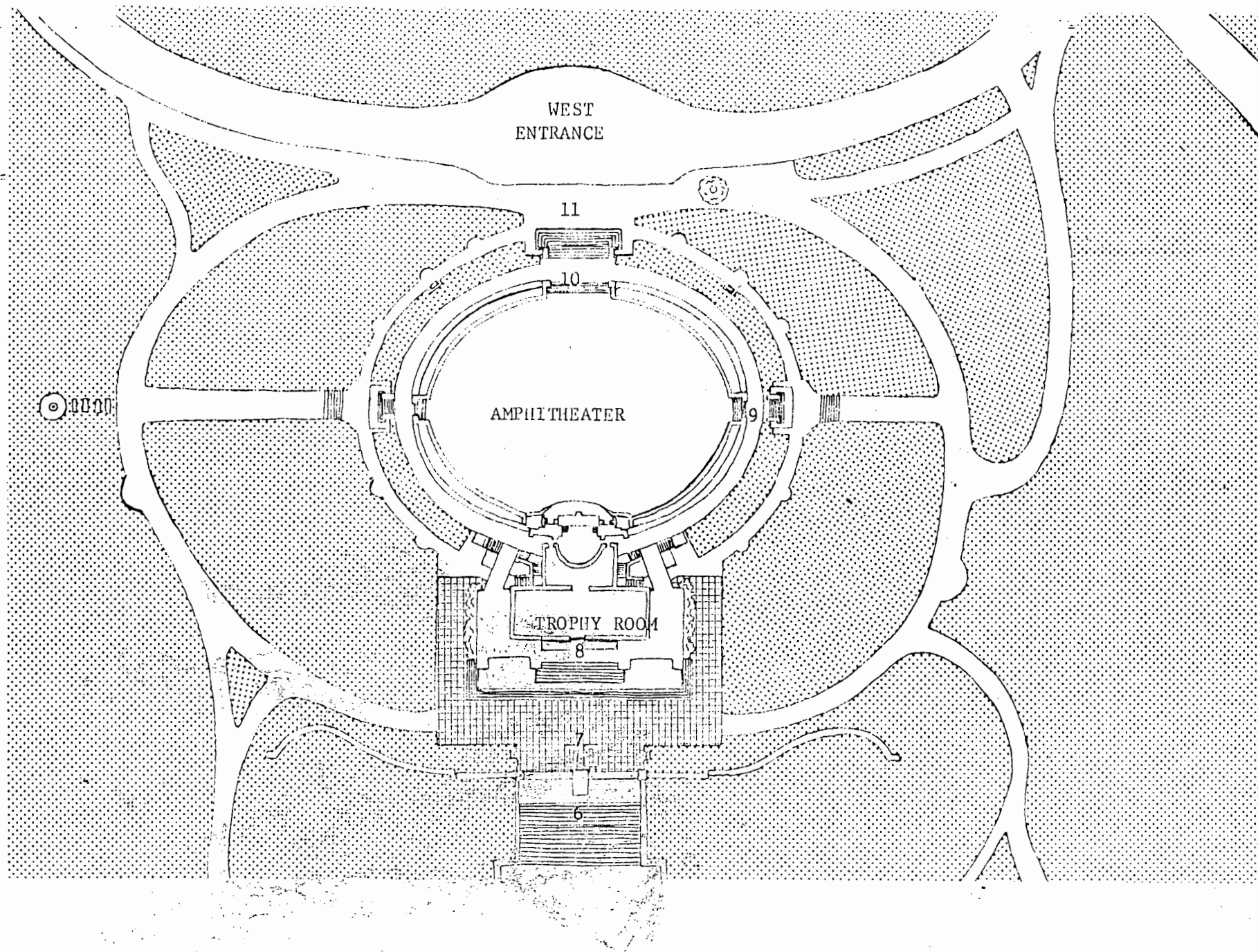
o. The Dignitary and his Official Party will then descend the steps where the official motorcade will be formed. After farewell remarks have been exchanged, the Dignitary and Official Party will enter their vehicles.

p. When all members of the Official Party have entered their cars, the Official motorcade will depart Arlington National Cemetery via Memorial Gate. The motorcade will be led by the Liaison Officer. An appropriate cannon salute will be fired as the motorcade is enroute, first round fired as the Dignitary's vehicle begins forward movement and last round being fired as the car exits Memorial Gate (if the Dignitary rates a 21 gun salute).

Anyone who has ever attempted to play "Country Gardens" on the piano could appreciate the complete genius mastery of Serkin's performance at the first state dinner. But Serkin's performance somehow got mentioned as an also-ran event in the newspapers. I realize that politics and power are more important in this town than music and sex, but I think there is a story here that hasn't been done and should be.

You'll have to get Vicky to tell you the story. It was she who was assigned to shepherd Serkin around before the concert. He was euphoric. He kept telling Vicky how excited he was to be in the White House at this particular time, as the first performer at a State Dinner, and to perform for this marvelous family. He talked about the good vibrations he was getting from the White House and all the people in it. He was wearing his Presidential Medal of Freedom, presented to him by Johnson, and apparently always wears it. His gestures, how he cared for his hands, etc. It was all marvelous. But do ask Vicky.

I thought that we might tip of some trustworthy and sufficiently reverent news person to follow this up with a phone call to Serkin in Philadelphia, or better still, an interview. Serkin, with his six children, some of whom are musicians, plus the Carters, plus the State Dinner, plus Carter's regard for Serkin and Beethoven -- the whole thing. Maybe as a two-page spread in PEOPLE?

An unusual musical ensemble performed today in the main lobby of the White House while the First Lady, Mrs. Rosalynn Carter, entertained the East Wing White House press corps in the Green, Blue and Red Rooms at a tea.

This ensemble, called "Los Tiempos Pasados", has its headquarters at the University of Guanajuato, Mexico, and specializes in Medieval and Renaissance music. The 12 members of the ensemble consist of five U.S. citizens now living in Guanajuato and seven Mexican citizens. In "real life", these musicians are doctors, philosophy professors, French, English and Spanish teachers. One is an electronics engineer and one is a physics teachers.

The group has been together for three years. They perform in every state of Mexico -- in museums, theatres, churches, schools, universities, private homes. They perform at the International Cervantes Festival of Music and Drama in Guanajuato.

Mrs. Carter once saw them in performance while she was in Mexico for the inauguration of President Lopez Portillo, now on a state visit to the United States, and invited them to play at the White House.

The Entertainment:

Pianist Rudolf Serkin was chosen by President and Mrs. Carter to entertain their guests because he has made such a great contribution to the artistic heritage of the United States. Mr. Serkin has also been very active nationally in the development of the arts as a past member of The National Council on the Arts. In addition, he has been the recipient of numerous awards and honorary memberships and degrees in recognition of his superb talent and his contributions to the arts.

Rudolf Serkin made his piano debut at age 12 with the Vienna Symphony, and his first appearance in the United States at age 30 in a duet with famed violinist Adolf Busch at the Library of Congress. Since his formal New York debut in 1936 with Toscanini and the New York Philharmonic, he has regularly toured the United States and Europe, appearing in recital, with chamber ensembles and with all major orchestras on both continents. He has played in Latin America, Iceland, Israel, India, the Far East, New Zealand, and Australia.

Music critics have called Rudolf Serkin "the outstanding living exponent of the German Romantic piano tradition." Serkin's genius and musical reach extend beyond his countless brilliant performances around the world. He taught several of today's prominent young pianists at the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, and as the President and Artistic Director of the Marlboro Festival and School of Music in Vermont, he is the guiding spirit behind its various expert ensembles. He is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and is a recipient of the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

Mr. Serkin's program will include the Prelude and Fugue in E Minor by Mendelssohn and the Sonata in F minor, Op. 57 ("Appassionata") by Beethoven. Mr. Serkin will perform on his own Steinway piano.

The concert platform in the East Room will be lined with moss-covered pots of live red tulips. On each side of the platform will be a ficus tree in an oriental container with potted red tulips around the base of the tree. These potted tulips will later be planted elsewhere on the White House grounds. The dinner guests and approximately 100 guests who have been invited to the after-dinner entertainment will be seated in the quarter-round.

In addition to Mr. Serkin's after-dinner recital, the U.S. Marine Band, a 25-piece orchestra, will play light classical music in the foyer during dinner. The U.S. Army Strings will stroll through the Dining Room during dessert. A Marine Corps harpist will provide music in the Diplomatic Reception Room where the guests enter.

Lincoln Memorial Wreath Ceremony

SEQUENCE OF EVENTS

President Lopez Portillo and the official party will arrive at Lincoln Memorial where Major General Yerks will greet the dignitary at curbside and escort them throughout the ceremony.

The host will explain the details of the ceremony prior to moving up the steps of the Lincoln Memorial. While explanations are being made, the dignitary's party will form in a column of two's.

The host will escort the dignitary up to and facing the color of the dignitary's country. The color team will come to PRESENT ARMS, whereupon all members of the official party will salute the color.

After the color has been received, the host will escort the dignitary up the steps, through the State and Territorial flags. The color team will follow the dignitary and the remainder of the party will follow the color team escorted by the MDW ceremonial officer.

The party will enter the interior of the Lincoln Memorial and halt. The honor guard is brought to PRESENT ARMS.

When the entire party has halted, the band will play four ruffles and flourishes and the national anthem of the dignitary's country. During the rendition of honors, all participants and spectators will salute.

Following the foreign national anthem, the official party comes to ORDER ARMS (the honor guard remains at PRESENT ARMS), and the host escorts the dignitary forward, halting in front of the statue. The color team and the official party follows.

When the entire party is halted, the band will play the National Anthem of the United States, during which all participants and spectators will salute.

When the National Anthem of the United States is completed, the honor guard will be brought to ORDER ARMS. At this time, the wreath bearer, bugler, and drummer will move from the left. As the bugler and drummer take their posts, the wreath bearer will present the wreath to the dignitary.

When the dignitary has placed his hands upon the wreath, the honor guard will come to PRESENT ARMS and the official party and all spectators will salute. The dignitary will then move forward, place the wreath at the foot of the statue, and resume his position beside the host and salute. (The wreath bearer carries the wreath--moving backwards as the dignitary moves forward.)

After the dignitary has resumed his position, the drummer will sound four muffled ruffles followed by the playing of "Taps" by the bugler.

Following "Taps", the honor guard will be brought to ORDER ARMS. At this time, the color team with the foreign color wheels to the rear and left.

The host will escort the dignitary to a position facing the color. The color team will come to PRESENT ARMS and all members of the party will salute, thus dismissing the color and concluding the ceremony.

The host will then introduce a representative from the National Park Service who will then brief about the Memorial and surrounding area.

The host, dignitary, and official party will then descend the steps where the official motorcade will be formed. After farewell remarks have been exchanged, the dignitary and the official party will enter their cars.

When all members of the official party have entered their cars. the motorcade will depart.

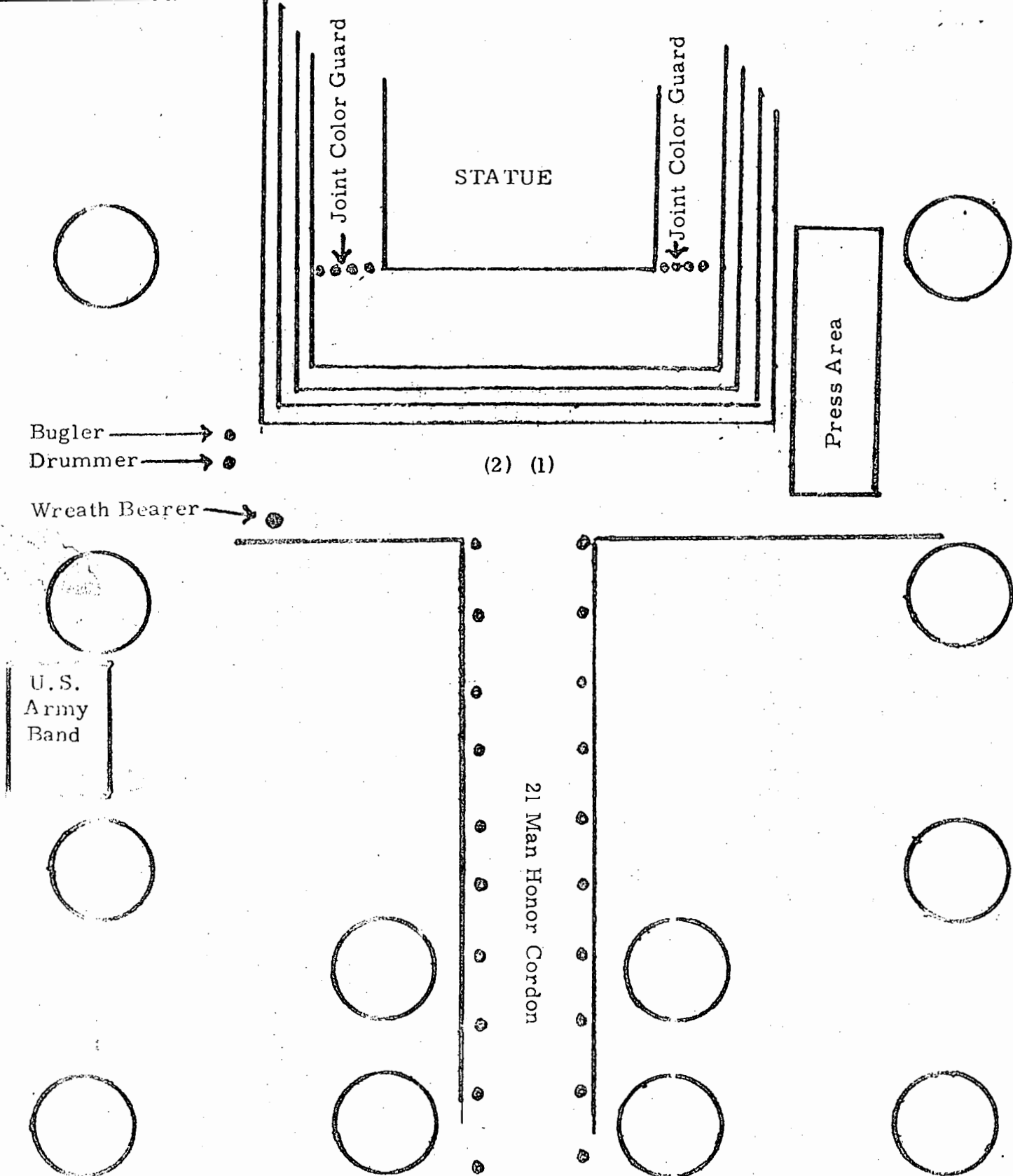

TO THE UNITED STATES, FEBRUARY 13-17, 1977

President Jimmy Carter of the United States of America and President Jose Lopez Portillo of the United Mexican States, during two days of discussions in Washington, reconfirmed the special importance each places on close and friendly relations between the two neighboring nations. The two Presidents pledged that they would examine closely in the next few months the multiple aspects of the relations between Mexico and the United States with a view to developing policies that reflected the interrelated nature of mutual problems. The two Presidents concluded that the primary objective of each government would be to develop a mutually beneficial relationship that would contribute to the well-being of their nations. To this end they agreed to meet to review progress in the development of comprehensive policies of each of their governments.

The two Presidents also discussed the global situation and agreed to consult regularly on the search for world-wide peace, economic betterment and respect for the rights of man. They reaffirmed that the principles governing relations between the United States and Mexico were non-interference in internal affairs, respect for the sovereign rights of each nation and the recognition of the particular nature of the relationship of neighboring countries.

The two Presidents considered carefully a number of important subjects including economic and monetary questions, investment, trade, immigration, narcotics, smuggling, and some illicit activities, agricultural exchanges, energy, nonproliferation of nuclear arms, Mexico's desire for increased and improved access to international financial institutions and capital markets and the need to seek a better balance in trade between the two countries. They also agreed that it would be of mutual benefit to both countries to contribute to Mexico's development through an increase in the flow of trade between Mexico and the United States, and to stimulate tourism in both directions.

President Carter was impressed by the determination and ability of the Mexican Government to deal with these problems and offered his cooperation in seeking solutions.

President Carter and President Lopez Portillo agreed that the Secretary of Foreign Relations of Mexico and the Secretary of State of the United States should maintain close and frequent personal contacts to assure high-level coordination on actions that might affect both countries. They also agreed that other high officials in both countries should have direct access to each other to discuss pertinent issues when necessary and that mechanisms would be established to study these issues in detail.

The state visit of President Lopez Portillo and the open and friendly discussions between the Presidents of Mexico and the United States served to underscore and reaffirm the close and friendly relationship between the two countries.

PRESIDENT CARTER: First of all, I want to welcome to our country Mr. Jose Lopez Portillo and his beautiful wife Carmen.

This is the first foreign Head of State who has come to visit the United States since I have been President. It is an indication of the importance that we attach in our own country to our neighbors to the south. For many years -- decades, generations -- we have been close friends with our Mexican neighbors.

Recently, when President Lopez Portillo was inaugurated, my wife went to Mexico City to represent me there early in December, and last month when I was inaugurated President of the United States, President Lopez Portillo's wife, Carmen, came to be with me during that ceremony.

This exchange of personal friendship, I think, has been apparent to all of our people, and it is just the first stage of an increasingly close relationship that President Lopez Portillo and I, and the people of Mexico and the United States of America, will enjoy in coming months.

I believe that the basis of our own economic and social and political progress, as we seek harmony among the nations of the world, has to have as a basis a close, continuing consultation and sharing of opportunity in the solution of problems between natural allies and friends, and particularly neighbors.

Just a few days after my own inauguration, Vice President Mondale took an extended trip to Europe and to Japan, and shortly after this visit from the Mexican President we will welcome to our country the Prime Minister of Canada. I believe that this first demonstration of our friendship is obvious to the world, a demonstration of importance.

We also feel that we have an opportunity now to correct some of the long-standing economic problems of our two nations, because we know that when Mexico makes economic progress, the United States is aided in our own effort to make economic progress. There is no way to separate our own nation's future from the future of our allies.

This happens to be the first time in more than 25 years when Mexico and the United States have both elected new Presidents at the same time, and I believe it gives us a unique opportunity for the close personal friendship to show that there are new ways to deal with old problems.

Immediately after this ceremony, President Lopez Portillo and I will meet in the Oval Office to begin long discussions about many items that are of mutual benefit and interest to our countries, and before and after that meeting President Lopez Portillo and his Cabinet officers will be meeting with the leaders of our own country, other than myself.

Recently we had a very serious problem with an energy shortage, and in an almost unprecedented demonstration of concern, President Lopez Portillo called and offered to us an extra allocation of oil and natural gas to tide us over a temporary energy crisis.

I have expressed to him already my personal thanks for this demonstration of sensitivity and friendship and concern.

Our problems are mutual. Our future must be shared, and I pledge to you, President Lopez Portillo, that in the coming months and years I will go even further than is required through diplomatic courtesy to work closely with you on a personal and an official basis to tie our countries together in an unprecedented and continual demonstration of common purpose, common hope, common confidence and common friendship.

Welcome to the United States, one of my close friends. I will look forward to strengthening this friendship in the future.

PRESIDENT LOPEZ PORTILLO: President Carter, I know that it is a great honor to be the first official visitor to be received in this country. I know that there is recognition of the circumstances that are brought about by our neighborly position. To be neighbors means to share everything, the good things and the bad things, too.

We are absolutely convinced that it would not be correct to enhance the bad things that life brings on its own.

On the other hand, friendship makes it possible for us to make progress by deepening and enhancing all good things. Therefore, it is advisable for good neighbors to be good friends. And we, the Mexicans, wish to be very good friends of the American people.

We had the great privilege of receiving Mrs. Carter in Mexico on the occasion of the Inauguration of the President of Mexico.

I wish to thank you deeply for this personal gesture of friendship in sending to us such a distinguished visitor.

I also wish to thank you for the many kindnesses you dispensed to my wife when she came to Washington to be present at all the events of the Inaugural session for the Inauguration of President.

These are some of the many coincidences that prevail in our two administrations. I, too, for the first time am on a state visit. I would like to deepen our coincidences and, therefore, our friendship.

During our coming meetings no doubt we shall analyze many suggestions. I am absolutely convinced that if these conversations take place within a framework of good faith, we shall be able to overcome and transcend and solve many of the problems which it is natural should exist between neighbors.

The prudent, wise and good men of our two countries no doubt want us to pose our problems in an adequate manner and solve them well.

I am sure that it depends on us for the men that are awkward and are not good intentioned not to avoid the possibility of solving our problems. That is why I am greatly interested in cultivating our mutual and good friendship.

I wish to win your respect in order to be able to bring up our problems as they are, and I want for us to find solutions to these problems together.

My country accepts and expects a great deal from this visit. We want to make progress in the solution of the problems, and these are problems that will affect one side and the other. I wish to convey my gratitude, President Carter, for this magnificent reception.

I also wish to state that I will lead our

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relations within a spirit of good faith and good will.
I am certain that we can solve our problems and consolidate
our friendship based on this framework of good faith and
good will.

PRESIDENT CARTER: A hundred years after the University of Mexico was founded, the pilgrims landed on Plymouth Rock, and it was just shortly after the university was begun that the first Spanish settlers came to Georgia and to Florida and to several other States in the Deep South.

Because the history books were written by historians from England, we don't remember the historical background of the early Spanish-speaking settlers who meant so much to our countries.

We declared our independence in 1776, about 200 years ago, and shortly after that, in 1810, the Mexican people declared their independence as well. So we share a great, common history with our friends and neighbors and visitors from Mexico, and we also share a tremendous commitment to the early vision of those who sought equality and who sought freedom, who believed in individuality, and the rights of common people to make their own decisions.

Our sharing of history and our sharing of a common purpose has always bound us together. The Mexican people know what Yankee imperialism means, and being from Georgia -- (Laughter)~ I have also heard the same phrase used. But we also share the realization that that is a time of ancient history and the equality of opportunity within our own Nation in recent decades is the same sort of spirit that exists among all the nations in our hemisphere.

This is a good change, and now with a common border we see renewed opportunities to bind ourselves ever closer together to face the future with confidence, with hope, with the feeling of friendship and with the feeling of common purpose.

This is the first state visit that Rosalynn and I have enjoyed having in your White House and ours and it was not any accident that those that we wanted to come first of all were our close friends from Mexico.

About 12 years ago, I believe, our family took the best vacation of our lives when my oldest son, Jack, finished high school. He and my other two sons, my wife and I traveled for three weeks through Mexico. We all can speak a little Spanish.

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We went to the small towns and villages where not many people could speak English. We had a hard time communicating in language, but there was an instant sense of appreciation for our being there and for the interest that we showed in those who took us into their hearts and into their homes. We have always looked back on that experience with great appreciation and fondness and pleasure.

I believe that the future holds an even closer opportunity for mutual enjoyment and to get to know one another and to share a common destiny.

There has been a saying of one of President Lopez Portillo's predecessors, "Pobre Mexico. Tan lejos de Dios, tan cerca de los Estados Unidos," which means in English, "Poor Mexico. So distant from God, so close to the United States." But I know that under President Lopez Portillo's administration the distance from God has become much less and the proximity to the United States, I hope, will become a blessing and not a curse. So we believe that we are very fortunate to have with us tonight Carmen and Jose.

I would like to repeat, to show what kind of person he is, something he told me at supper tonight. He is a very talented artist, and when his daughter was three years old she was the one that he was so much in love with that he wanted to paint a special painting. He had just outlined her little face and he had to go to work. She had never been outside at night and he left her there with her grandmother, and she went out on the terrace and she looked up, and for the first time she saw the evening star Venus. She said, "Grandmother, what is that?" and her grandmother said, "That is a star." She said, "Give it to me," and her grandmother said, "I can't give you a star, little girl," and his daughter said, "When my father returns, he will give it to me."

So when President Lopez Portillo came home and he was told about this story and recognized the faith that his daughter had in his ability, he drew in the painting her little hand and darkness all around the back of her head and a star in the palm of her hand.

I think this illustrates very well what he means to the people of his country. The people have put their faith in him and they are beginning to realize the fruits of his tremendous intelligence, his talent, his ability, his sensitivity to their needs, and I think in the future the people of his great nation will know as his daughter did, that he is capable of delivering to them the things that they cherish so deeply.

I would like to propose a toast to President Lopez Portillo and his wife, and to the people of the great nation of Mexico.

PRESIDENT LOPEZ PORTILLO: President Carter has just referred to ancient history and he has drawn this picture with very generous lines.

I would now like to refer to the history that is being made and written at this particular point in time. I would like to ask all of you to reflect on what is happening here and now in order to measure the enormous responsibility that lies on the shoulders of this great Nation .

Today President Carter has done a great honor to my country by inviting me to visit the United States on a state visit, the first statesman to come to the United States during the Administration of President Carter.

Responsibility has to be faced in two ways: By facing the problems that this Nation has, which is not only geographically a neighbor, but also a neighbor that is undergoing a process of development and we have studied the characteristics of this problem in depth.

On the other hand, and a few minutes back one of his very distinguished Secretaries, the Secretary of State, Mr. Vance, has had to leave for the Middle East in order to participate in negotiations that are to bring about order and peace in the world.

In these few hours in this very place, contemporary history is being made, the history of American responsibility, the great responsibility that was brought about by power which is being written here at the White House that now houses an exemplary family full of unity and love, understanding in which a lovely and intelligent child, Amy, has been reading "The Mystery of the Screaming Clock" right here at the table.

We have had the privilege of being able to spend some time with this lovely family in spite of the distance, geographic distance, in spite of the differences in language, the differences in culture, and in spite of these differences I feel that they are very close to me and very dear and I think that I am speaking also for my wife.

As a human experience it is a privilege to be present in moments when the distance in responsibility is no longer. On the one hand in spite of being at such a high level and having such a high position as this family does they are able to give their love, affection and warmth to the small child.

They facilitate communication among the members of the family in spite of protocol, and this family that is observing of their child while waiting for an increase in grandchildren in two weeks time, and at the same time is praising all the loveliness of the small child, begins within that broad spectrum to have in its hands the participation of the United States in making the future for humanity.

For a Mexican it is very comforting, a Mexican that to a certain extent in some way is representing Latin America, who in a certain sense represents the developing world -- it is very comforting, I repeat -- to know that he who has the

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greatest responsibility in this country is not only a statesman, but a man of solid moral principles who is brave enough to state that God and the United States must come close to Mexico, a man that loves his wife, a man that believes in the institution of the family.

It is my conviction that with a man of this nature, the role of the United States in the history of humanity will be outstanding and exemplary. That is why for me it is a great honor to raise my glass and propose a toast to the health of the Carter family, and so that wisdom will always be a guiding light for the President of the United States, Mr. Carter.

I thank you.
