Foster is perhaps the least understood famous American composer. Although a northerner, he is associated in most people's minds with the south, and although some of his best known songs are sentimental and sad, he had a capacity for humor and a keen interest in politics. Jan De Gaetani, a Professor of Voice at the Eastman School of Music, understands Stephen Foster and brings him back to us with a richer insight than we had before. She has sung with the major orchestras in the United States and Europe, including the New York Philharmonic and Berlin Philharmonic.

ROBERT WHITE, an exceptionally talented young American tenor, brings a magic touch to simple music. He reaches into a repertoire of turn-of-the-century music and tells us what the composers felt at the time. The most familiar of his songs tonight is "When You and I were Young, Maggie", an intensely romantic and evocative piece. The man who wrote the lyrics, George Washington Johnson, was married to a real "Maggie," who had been his music pupil in Toronto. His poem about his courtship of Maggie,—all of it true—was set to music in 1866 by J. A. Butterfield. Above all other tunes that Butterfield wrote, "Maggie" alone was remembered. Robert White has sung with Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic and at Spoleto, Prague, Aspen and Corfu music festivals. He now teaches at the Manhattan School of Music in New York.

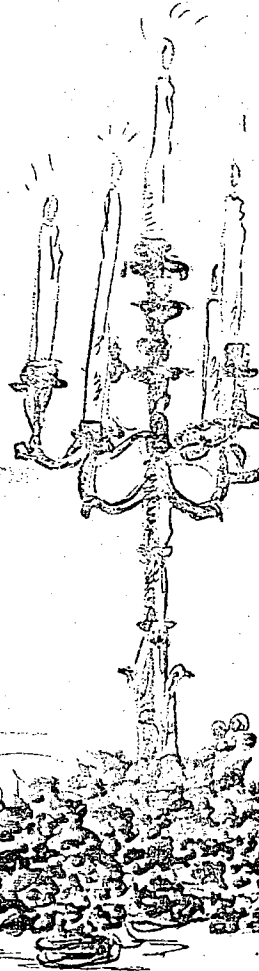

The Entertainment:

Robert White is a talented young American tenor. He draws from a repertoire of turn-of-the-century music and interprets what the composers felt at the time. The most familiar of his songs tonight is "When You and I Were Young, Maggie". George Washington Johnson, who wrote the lyrics, was married to a real "Maggie", who had been his music pupil in Toronto. His poem about their courtship was set to music in 1866 by J. A. Butterfield. Above all the tunes that Butterfield wrote, "Maggie" alone was remembered.

Mr. White has sung with Leonard Bernstein and the New York Philharmonic and at Spoleto, Prague, Aspen and Corfu music festivals. He now teaches at the Manhattan School of Music in New York. His program will include: "Maggie", "Sylvia", "Little Boy Blue", "May-Day Carol", "A Perfect Day", and "All Through the Night" (a Welsh song) in honor of Prime Minister Callaghan.

Jan de Gaetani, a mezzo-soprano with an artistic range that includes medieval and Renaissance songs as well as the music of the Baroque period, will sing tonight the lyrical and more familiar music of Stephen Foster. Foster, a northerner, is associated in most people's minds with the south, and although some of his best known songs are sentimental and sad, he had a capacity for humor and a keen interest in politics. Ms. de Gaetani, a professor of voice at the Eastman School of Music, understands Stephen Foster, who was the first musician named to the Hall of Fame of Great Americans.

Ms. de Gaetani's program will include: "Linger in Blissful Repose", "If You've Got a Moustache", "Jeanie with the Light Brown Hair", "Little Jenny Dow", "Ah! May the Red Rose Live Away", and "Some Folks". An 1850 Chickering Square Piano, on loan from the Smithsonian Institution, will be used to accompany Ms. de Gaetani.

In addition, the U.S. Marine Band will play selections from the 1890s, including medlies from Stephen Foster, in the foyer prior to and during dinner. The U.S. Army Strings will stroll through the Dining Room during dessert. A Marine Corps harpist will provide music in the Diplomatic Reception Room where the guests arrive.

The Entertainment:

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Suggested remarks for the President as he introduces Robert White and Jan De Gaetani as the entertainment for the State Dinner for Great Britain, Thursday, March 10, 1977:

What I like so very much about this evening's program is that this is the kind of music that our parents and grandparents grew up with -- before the radio, and then the television set, replaced the piano or spinet as the center of family entertainment.

In those days, around the turn of the century, people were "home musicians"; they could not just switch on some good music and passively listen -- so they played and sang themselves.

Some of the songs we are going to hear tonight used to be called "Household Melodies" or "Parlor Music". But they are, of course, much more than that. They were written by some of America's most famous early composers, including Stephen Foster. And many of these songs are deceptively sophisticated, requiring a great deal more of the artist than the ability to carry a tune.

If this were not so, we would not have asked two of America's most talented artists, Robert White and Jan De Gaetani, to come here and sing them.

Before the radio and then the television
set replaced the piano ^{or the record or organ} as the center of family
entertainment in Americas living rooms,
it was the custom to ^{play} sing parlor music
and household melodies.

At the turn of the century, as travel by
rail was picking up, the song recital
became popular. Great opera stars made
concert tours that took them to remote parts
of the country, introducing the newest songs.
Their secret was the ability to transform
the simplest ditty into a work of art.
They had only to sing a son and the "home
musicians" rushed to music stores to buy it.

Stephen Foster was the first American composer to be known world wide. The official songs of Kentucky and Florida are by him.

Ships, parks, bridges and highways have been named after him.

It comes as a surprise to many people that Foster was a northerner. He was born near Pittsburgh on the 4th of July exactly a $\frac{1}{2}$ century after the Declaration of Independence. The furthest South he ever lived was Cincinnati. Foster was a Unionist, but a Democrat. He wrote war songs. He last lived in New York where he died in 1864 before the Civil War ended.

Suggested remarks for the President as he introduces Robert White and Jan De Gaetani as the entertainment for the State Dinner for Great Britain, Thursday, March 10, 1977:

What I like so very much about this evening's program is that this is the kind of music that our parents and grandparents grew up with -- before the radio, and then the television set, replaced the piano or spinet as the center of family entertainment.

In those days, around the turn of the century, people were "home musicians"; they could not just switch on some good music and passively listen -- so they played and sang themselves.

Some of the songs we are going to hear tonight used to be called "Household Melodies" or "Parlor Music". But they are, of course, much more than that. They were written by some of America's most famous early composers, including Stephen Foster. And many of these songs are deceptively sophisticated, requiring a great deal more of the artist than the ability to carry a tune.

If this were not so, we would not have asked two of America's most talented artists, Robert White and Jan De Gaetani, to come here and sing them.

THE PRESIDENT: I would like to say, first of all, that we are very delighted that all of you could be with us tonight to welcome our distinguished visitors from Great Britain.

We have had a knowledge, through the study of history, of many guests who come here to visit the White House from England. The first ones, I believe, were in 1314. (Laughter) And I think it is accurate to say that the hospitality has increased steadily since that time.

I don't believe I have ever met anyone who was a distinguished political leader with whom I immediately felt more at home and a greater innocence of genuine and personal friendship.

When I have had a chance to meet with a few leaders of foreign governments, I have always tried to get the better of them in our get acquainted session. I haven't succeeded at all tonight. (Laughter)

First of all, I said, "I am a farmer." Prime Minister Callaghan said, "So am I." (Laughter) I said, "I knew I had them." The next time I said, "I am a Baptist." He said, "So am I." (Laughter) I said, "I met my wife in the church yard." He said, "So did I." (Laughter) I said, "I have a very interesting sister, a Carter, who is deeply involved in religion." He said, "Well, I have a sister who is very deeply involved in religion. She is also a Carter." I said, "We have had a lot of trouble in our country with inflation." He said--he didn't have to say anything. (Laughter)

Unemployment -- he didn't say anything. And I said, "Well, we have a majority of my party in the Congress." He didn't say anything. (Laughter) Then he said, "But I have complete control of a Parliament." And I didn't say anything.

And then he said, "I represent a nation that has historically believed in human freedom," and I didn't have to respond. And he said, "I represent a country that believes in the purest principles of democracy." And I didn't have to respond.

MORE

And he said, "I represent a country that has a close friendship with your own," and he knew that I didn't have to respond.

I said in my welcoming address that we have many friends around the world, but I think it is accurate to say that the closest friends we have are in Great Britain.

I am very delighted tonight to have Prime Minister Jim Callaghan and his wife, Audrey, come to visit with us. I think we have reestablished in a personal way the genuine reasons for this intimate tie between the United States of America and our mother country.

We share common problems. We share common ideals. We share common history. We share a common future and we are mutually supportive. We are partners. When we have happy times, so does England. When our economy suffers, so does theirs. And when we are challenged from strange and alien military forces down through the generations, we have always been staunch allies.

I think on behalf of all the American people, I can offer a toast with the surest sense that I speak in a way that represents us all.

I would like to offer a toast at this point: To the Queen.

PRIME MINISTER CALLAGHAN: Mr. President, Mrs. Carter: When you entertained the President of Mexico, the after-dinner speeches began at 9:22. When you entertained the President of Canada, the after-dinner speeches began at 9:23. This evening, sir, I checked my watch with you, but you didn't know for what purpose. They began at 9:24. I hope that is no sign that you are slipping. (Laughter)

But it is a very great pleasure, indeed, to be here, Mr. President, and Mrs. Carter, for Audrey and myself. And I would like to say thank you on behalf of all our party who traveled with us this week.

You were quite right in our apochyphal conversation to reveal the upbringings that we both share. When my brother-in-law, who is a Baptist minister, went to the deacons for his appointment in the Southwest of England, they offered a prayer for him which you will, I know, clearly recognize. The chief deacon got up and he said: "O Lord: Keep him humble. We will keep him poor." (Laughter)

MORE

I wasn't exactly sure about your reference to 1814. I want to assure you that on this occasion at least we arrive in peace and in concord. (Laughter) And nothing, sir, will separate us from each other.

But we do love being in the United States. I speak for all my party when I say that. And it is especially nice -- and I want to repeat what I said this morning -- to be here and feel the invigorating sweep of a new Administration such as we have felt during the last few weeks, and we want to thank you for it.

It is a very great privilege to be part of it. And I want you to know that in the generous words that you have uttered about the relationships between our two countries that there is nothing that you can say about that that we don't echo and re-echo, because your success is our success. Your failures, we share.

But when you are going through difficult times, we feel it, too. But wider than us, this is true of Europe, because what you do will have, undoubtedly have a profound effect upon the European continent as a whole. That is our history. That is our background.

So allow me just for one second to speak as president of the Community for the time being, and to say to you, sir, that -- and I speak on behalf of the leaders of all the countries of the Community -- that they are looking to you, looking to your Administration with hope, with belief, with faith in the future of the United States under your leadership.

MORE

And so we wish you well and we trust that under God's guidance you will bring not only peace and prosperity to your own people, but you will bring it to us as well. For that lies in your hands and you shall have all our support in all that you are trying to do.

Now, I dictated a fine speech here the day before yesterday, but I have got a feeling it is a little out of date now. Indeed, you scuttled my point this morning and I promise you I dictated this some time ago when I said -- I am going to read it. You built up -- I shan't read it very well -- you built up a wide network of relationships and friendships around the world and in the process, I say, we have become a little shy of using the traditional term of special relationship to describe our friendship with each other. That was true until you used it yourself again this morning.

I went on to say, I see no reason why we should refrain from using it, which only goes to show we thought alike even before we met. It isn't an exclusive relationship. It shuts no one out. But what it does is to describe with accuracy the ease, the intimacy, the common feeling, the common feeling which Americans and Britons share with each other when they meet and talk, a common feeling that comes from similar political systems rooted in the same common law.

This feeling reached its highest manifestation, Mr. President, as there are some here who know -- former Ambassadors to our country of very great distinction -- reached its highest manifestation in that great partnership during the dark days of war, and successive generations in my country will not be allowed to forget the generous aid and assistance, the massive support and power which you brought to us in those days which enabled us to come together in a way that has forged a permanent partnership.

And when, as you put on with your new world responsibilities, you put on new friends, you make new friends, and so you should, and you widened the area of your friendship.

I just say in the words of Shakespeare to you once again, and I say it from us to each other: "To thy friends thou hast and their adoption tried grappled them to thy heart with loops of steel." That is the relationship, sir, between the United States and Britain.

Politicians come and go; even statesmen, sir, they tell me fade away sometimes. (Laughter) But our friendship won't do that. It is rock hard. And you, your country, has a special place in the hearts of our people.

We have got our problems, you are right -- domestic problems -- but we don't intend to allow them to obscure our vision of the world. We intend to play our part in the world within the limits of our strength and our influence.

MORE

We have gone through a period of adjustments since the war. The empire has dropped away. Our old industrial system has got to be refurbished.

Yes, we are going to come through that, and I regard this as a passing period and which is the responsibility of my generation to see that we do come through so that we can take our place side-by-side with you in the influence that we bring together jointly to bear in the world.

This I regard as one of our responsibilities and as one that we shall seek to discharge.

So, Mr. President, I thank you, I thank our guests here and our friends, some of whom are old friends, for the great warmth of your reception. You can be assured that any help that we can give to your great country during the years that lie ahead shall be given. Any support that you need will be there to your hand.

We shall work with you, work in your interests because of the deep affection we have for the American people; work in our interests because we know that a strong and fearless America, self-possessed, self-confident, with a great faith that you have, is the surest guide and watchword for freedom in this world.

JAMES CALLAGHAN

On April 5, 1976, James Callaghan, 64, was elected leader of the Labor Party Members of Parliament, thus becoming Britain's new Prime Minister. A highly knowledgeable government administrator, Callaghan has had extensive Cabinet experience. He is the only Prime Minister in this century to have held the three most important positions in Britain's government -- Secretary of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs (1974-76), Chancellor of the Exchequer (1964-67) and Home Secretary (1967-70). During 1972-74 he was the party spokesman on foreign affairs. He has been a Member of Parliament since 1945.

AUDREY MOULTON CALLAGHAN

Mrs. Callaghan's major interest, apart from politics, is child care. She is currently chairman of the board of the largest children's hospital in Britain, Great Osmond Street Children's Hospital in London, to which she devotes most of her free time. Audrey Moulton and James Callaghan were married in 1938; they have three children and eight grandchildren. Mrs. Callaghan, who frequently travels with her husband, accompanied him on visits to the United States, the Soviet Union and Africa in 1975.
