Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater

The Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater celebrates its 20th Anniversary when the Fall 1978 season opens in New York at the City Center on November 29th.

The Company made its debut in 1958 with seven members and toured extensively in the United States and Europe.

Ailey's vision of his Company is unique - it is not solely the choreographer's personal instrument - but a repertory ensemble company aimed at providing art and entertainment, as well as institutionalizing modern dance by preserving important works of the past and commissioning new ones.

The Company boasts such dance classics as "Revelations", "Cry", "The Lark Ascending", McKayle's "Rainbow 'Round my Shoulder", and Faison's "Suite Otis", as well as 50 ballets by over 30 major choreographers.

Alvin Ailey was born in Rogers, Texas in 1931. His career in dance began with Lester Horton and after Horton's death in 1953, Ailey became the company's artistic director. In addition to the years he spent as a choreographer, he appeared in such musical productions as "House of Flowers" (1954); "Sing Man Sing" (1956) and "Showboat" (1957).

The Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater toured Morocco in 1971.

THE PRESIDENT: It is indeed a great honor for me as President of our country and for the people of the United States to welcome His Majesty, King Hassan II, of Morocco. (Applause)

Your Majesty, we are grateful that you have come to pay us a visit, along with Crown Prince Sidi Mohammed. This reminds us with a great deal of pleasure of the visit 11 or 12 years ago (21 years) when you came as Crown Prince with your own father, the revered King, Mohammed V. It is impossible for the people of the United States of America ever to forget the early days of our own Nation's existence. Our Declaration of Independence was in 1776. And one year later, in 1777, Morocco recognized our people, our new government as a nation.

Your country, Your Majesty, was the first nation on earth to ever give us this diplomatic relation and recognition. And we will ever be grateful to you for having confidence in us, and in the spirit of freedom and independence which our struggling forefathers had espoused to the world.

Only ten years later, in 1787, there was signed a Treaty of Friendship and Commerce between the United States of America and the nation, the people of Morocco.

These relationships have bound us together in common purpose, mutual understanding and friendship for centuries. But we still recognize your leadership and your great nation not only as our nearest neighbor in Africa, but we recognize your country as indeed the crossroads of north and south, east and west, because of the ancient history of your people; the ancient and benevolent nature of the reign of your family and the pride with which you espouse ideals and commitments that are so precious to the people of my country.

Ever since World War II, we have enjoyed the closest possible political and military alliance with your nation. Our sailors, our airmen, our diplomats, our business leaders, our scholars, our students have been welcomed in your country. And we deeply appreciate this ancient and also this modern special privilege of being the friends of the people of Morocco.

You have shown great courage in trying to retain the cohesion of the Arab world, and at the same time, being forceful in your expression of support for the peace initiative taken by President Sadat a little more than a year ago when he went to

Jerusalem. He was criticized by many but he was praised and supported by you. And I know that your benificent influence in the future will help our Nation, and those others who are struggling for peace, ultimately achieve success.

Your Majesty, as a statesman, admired and respected throughout the world, as a representative of a great people, as a scholar and a leader throughout the continent of Africa, and indeed, your entire region of our planet, we are grateful for our relationship with you and for your kind visit to our country.

There is no doubt in my mind that our own discussions with our advisers and other leaders and the private discussions that I intend to have with you will be very constructive both for the people of your country and my own and also for the enhancement of peace in your troubled region and indeed throughout the world.

Thank you, Your Majesty, for being here with your fine family and I want again to express our welcome to you on this wonderful day in the history of my own country.

Thank you and welcome. (Applause)

MORE

KING HASSAN: Mr. President, I have come to visit you with consideration, friendship, as much as faults in English. (Laughter) But I shall try to translate, or to write the feelings of my people and my own feelings for yourself and your country.

You have built all your election, Mr. President, on rights of men, in the time where you are, the first nation in the world.

For us, the small peoples, this philosophy and this policy is very important and it is a big encouragement because we have no weapons, we have not your army. We have only our faith and our rights. But I think that faith and rights are the best weapons to live or to die.

Mr. President, you told us in few words, but in full words, the history between the United States and the Kingdom of Morocco. My hope and my wish is to build with you our modern history on the same level as our old history.

I have the mission to bring on my shoulders and to convey in my heart the friendship of my people to the American people. I pray God to help me to be a good servant for my people and for the friendship between the United States and Morocco. And I pray God, I pray God to help you in your work, Mr. President, and to preserve the United States of America. (Applause)

THE PRESIDENT: Thank you very much.

SUBJECT: ALVIN AILEY AND THE ALVIN AILEY AMERICAN DANCE THEATER
ENTERTAINMENT FOR KING OF MOROCCO - NOVEMBER 14

Alvin Ailey was born in Rogers, Texas in 1931. As a child, Ailey attended Sunday school and the Baptist Young People's Union and it is out of these experiences and memories that two of his most popular and critically acclaimed works were inspired: "Blues Suite" and "Revelations."

His career in dance began with Lester Horton and after Horton's death in 1953 he became the company's artistic director and began to choreograph. With two of Ailey's works premiering as early as 1954 at Jacob's Pillow, the choreographer spent the succeeding years dancing in such musical productions as "The Carefree Tree", "Sing Man Sing" (1956); "Show Boat" (1957) Even after he formed his own Company, Ailey still had theater in his blood and found time to choreograph "Carmen Jones", "Dark of the Moon", and "African Holiday."

Ailey's seven member Company, the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, made its debut in 1958 at the 92nd Street YMHA. Well received by the critics, the Company began touring the country extensively and performing in Europe. Ailey's vision of his Company is unique - it is not solely the choreographer's personal instrument - but a repertory company aimed at providing art and entertainment, as well as institutionalizing modern dance by preserving important works of the past and commissioning new ones.

In 1972, the renamed Alvin Ailey City Center Dance Theater joined the City Center of Music and Drama. This forthcoming fall '78 season will celebrate the Company's 20th Anniversary. The Ailey Company has come a long way since their 1958 debut. They are now 27 dancers strong, with a repertory ensemble company, a well established school, and a repertory that boasts such Ailey classics as "Revelations" (they will do for us), "Cry" (they will also do), "The Lark Ascending", McKayle's "Rainbow 'Round My Shoulder", Beatty's "Road of the Phoebe Snow" and "Toccata", Faison's "Suite Otis" as well as 50 ballets by over 30 major choreographers, one could say that Alvin Ailey has brought it all together.

Most Moroccans are descended from Arabs and indigenous Berbers. The Arabs invaded Morocco in the 8th and 11th centuries, bringing with them what became the dominant culture. The established state religion is Islam. Morocco's Jewish minority now numbers about 20,000. About 100,000 foreign residents live in the country, mostly French and Spanish.

The principal language is Arabic, although Berber dialects are spoken widely in rural areas. French and Spanish are also used, particularly in government.

Population distribution is very uneven, with most of the people living west of the Atlas Mountains. Casablanca is the commercial and industrial center, and leading seaport. Rabat is primarily the center for government activities. Tangier is a port city, and Fez and Marrakech are old walled cities.

Nearly half of the Moroccan children from ages 7 to 14 attend school. More than half the population is under 20 years of age. The literacy rate is 24 percent for men and 15 percent for women.

Morocco's most important university, Mohammed V, named after the

present monarch's father, is in Rabat. Here more than 10,000 students from Morocco and other areas of Africa and the Middle East study medicine, law, liberal arts, and the sciences. Also in Rabat are the two most important Moroccan institutions of higher education in engineering and agriculture—the Mohammedia School of Engineers and the Hassan II Agronomic Institute. At the more than 1,000-year-old Karaouine University in Morocco's religious capital, Fez, Islamic students from around the world study Islamic law and theology. At the secondary school level, a large number of Moroccan and French *lycées*, or high schools,
