AGNES DE MILLE

MASTER CLASSES IN THEATRE-DANCE



Agnes De Mille's name has become synonymous with theatrical achievement of the highest magnitude. The choreographer of such great classics as OKLAHOMA!, ONE TOUCH OF VENUS, CAROUSEL, BRIGADOON, GENTLEMEN PREFER BLONDES, PAINT YOUR WAGON, and many others, Miss De Mille is undeniably the Grande Dame of Theatre Dance. Miss De Mille has choreographed numerous ballets and has won the Woman of the Year Award, New York Critics Award, and the coveted "Tony" Award twice. Appointed by the President of the United States, Miss De Mille was a member of the National Advisory Council on the Arts, and is a former President of the Society of Stage Directors and Choreographers. Agnes De Mille has written for VOGUE, ATLANTIC, GOOD HOUSEKEEPING, McCALL'S, THE NEW YORK TIMES, and ESQUIRE, and holds over thirty honorary degrees.

LEE THEODORE

Lee Theodore has choreographed a number of Broadway musicals including BAKER STREET; FLORA, THE RED MENACE; and THE APPLE TREE.

She directed the Broadway production of NOEL COWARD'S SWEET POTATO, and provided both original choreography and direction for the Lincoln Center revival of WEST SIDE STORY. Miss Theodore directed and choreographed Gian-Carlo Menotti's THE UNICORN and Stravinsky's L'HISTOIRE DU SOLDAT, produced by Jerome Robbins for the Festival of Two Worlds in Spoleto, Italy.

In 1962, the State Department's People-to-People program commissioned Miss Theodore to create an evening of dance for the International Jazz Festival in Washington, D.C. This led her to form her own company, the JAZZ BALLET THEATRE in which she trained and developed the dancer/choreographers Michael Bennett, Eliot Feld, Alan Johnson, Jay Norman, and Jaime Rogers.

She founded The American Dance Machine in 1975.

As a performer, Miss Theodore appeared in many Broadway musicals including THE KING AND I, DAMN YANKEES, and is best remembered for having created the role of "Anybody's" in the original WEST SIDE STORY.

HISTORY

The American Dance Machine began as the dream of Lee Becker Theodore. Her vast experience as a dancer, choreographer, and director had led her to believe that great Broadway dances could be reconstructed and restaged by calling on the memories of the very dancers who originally performed them. Once the dances had been reconstructed, notation, video tape and film would ensure that they would never be lost again. Then, by training today's dancers in the various choreographic styles used by such great artists as Agnes De Mille, Michael Kidd, Bob Fosse, and others, the dances could be preserved in a Living Archive.

As archivist of some of this country's greatest choreography, The American Dance Machine has become a project of cultural and historical significance, which more than justifies the five-year preparatory effort. But Miss Theodore's vision is more all-encompassing, with a practical as well as preservational side. The dance reconstruction effort provides choreographers with a vehicle for licensing their work in-tandem with the script and the score. It lays the foundation for a special Training Facility dedicated to instructing future generations in the styles and techniques of Broadway Theatre Dance. It ensures the theatre-going public that the revivals they see contain all the elements that made the original productions worth remembering. These are all goals to which The American Dance Machine addressed itself when it embarked on its pilot project in 1976: Jack Cole Interface.

In order to continue its work, The American Dance Machine had to answer three questions:

1. Is it actually possible to reconstruct these works?
2. Can The American Dance Machine do work of sufficient quality to be worthy of preservation?
3. Is there enough support in the artistic and funding communities to warrant an ongoing project with full time staffs, dancers, and major facilities?

By December 31, 1977, The American Dance Machine will have completed its twelve month feasibility study having answered all these questions with resounding affirmation. During the course of the year, fifteen works were reconstructed to be performed in three different locations in New York and Connecticut. The critical reviews attested to the skill and quality of the reconstructions and major funding was received from the National Endowment for the Arts, the New York State Council on the Arts, several foundations, private donors, and from a benefit performance, demonstrating broad-based financial support and interest.

DESCRIPTION

The American Dance Machine is a non-profit corporation staffed by theatre professionals whose purpose is to reconstruct, preserve, instruct, and perform in a continuing repertory the important choreography of twentieth century American Musical Theatre and related media. In order to more efficiently undertake this task, The American Dance Machine has been divided into three major projects, each of which furthers the principal purpose of The American Dance Machine: the preservation of the truly unique and original American art form of theatre dance.

At the center of the entire project is the Resource Archive Center (RAC). The RAC activities are: selection of works to be reconstructed, compilation of individual histories of the works and search for reconstructionists, holding of memory sessions and rehearsals of the work, documentation through video tape and labanotation, cataloguing and storage in permanent archives.

(Duplicate copies of the video tapes and other forms of documentation may be stored at Lincoln Center Library for the Performing Arts, and the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C.)

From this core of data, a repertory of the reconstructed dances can be taught to a company of dancers who may then perform the works, hence becoming, themselves, a "Living Archive." This "Living Archive" performance activity is the second major project, and perhaps, provides the highest degree of visibility for The American Dance Machine.

The Training Facility is the third ongoing major project of the American Dance Machine. The Training Facility was created in order to provide qualified performers (aspiring as well as working) with professional-level training and instruction in Theatre-Dance and related areas. The discipline and training required to perform the works we are preserving have long since ceased to be offered by commercial schools.

BROADWAY'S HISTORY, TO PLAY THE WHITE HOUSE

"THE AMERICAN DANCE MACHINE," the longest running dance company in Broadway's history, will give a command performance at the White House on Tuesday, February 6, 1979 at 9:00 P.M. The occasion is a State Dinner in honor of the Prime Minister of the Kingdom of Thailand, His Excellency Kriangsak Chamanand. Choreographer Agnes de Mille will narrate the program, which includes musical numbers from such hits as "George M!" (1968), "Walking Happy" (1966), "The Unsinkable Molly Brown" (1960), "Brigadoon" (1947) and "Carousel" (1945). Miss de Mille choreographed the original productions of "Carousel" and "Brigadoon."

P Under the supervision of choreographer/director Lee Theodore, "THE AMERICAN DANCE MACHINE" reconstructs and performs some of the most important choreography of twentieth century American Musical Theatre. Included in its repertory are musical numbers from *A* "Carousel," "Brigadoon," "Cabaret," "Can-Can" and "No, No, Nanette," with choreography by Agnes de Mille, Bob Fosse, Peter Gennaro, Donald Saddler and many others. ("THE AMERICAN DANCE MACHINE" opened at Broadway's Century Theatre in June of 1978 and ran through December of that year.) *7*

"THE AMERICAN DANCE MACHINE" is a non-profit corporation partially funded by the National Endowment for the Arts, several foundations and private donors. Following the White House performance, "THE AMERICAN DANCE MACHINE" returns to Atlanta's Theatre of the Stars where performances continue through February 11, 1979.

Character

Khunying Virat is a simple straight-forward lady with few pretensions. She is soft-spoken, pleasant and unassuming, and does not particularly like political life, but enjoys traveling and sightseeing. She is somewhat ill at ease with foreigners primarily because her English is not fluent, but she can converse on basic topics.

Washington Activities

By the time of the reception she will have seen Arlington Cemetery (to lay a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier with Prime Minister Kriangsak), the Kennedy graves, the Air and Space Museum, the National Gallery of Art (East Wing), White Flint Mall, and had lunch with Mrs. Vance at the Department of State.

Courtesy Points

You will have seen Khunying Virat twice before; at the White House Welcoming Ceremony followed by a White House tour, and at the White House dinner last night. Points of interest that may be discussed further are:

-- The recent visit of Deng Xiaoping and Cho Lin. Khunying Virat visited China in April 1978. What were her impressions? What sites were of most interest?

-- Khunying Virat visited the National Gallery of Art, East Wing, this morning. What is her view of our modern art?

-- Her son Phongpipat (Pohn-pee-paht), nicknamed "AEA", and her daughter Ratanawan (Rah-tah-nah-wahn), nicknamed "OR", visited the U.S. Naval Academy this morning.

-- AEA is currently attending an armed forces preparatory academy. Does he plan for a military career like his father?

LIMITED OFFICIAL USE

-- Khunying Virat was a teacher for ten years after her marriage and received a Masters Degree in Australia as a Colombo Plan scholar.

-- Responsibilities and frustrations of a political wife. Mrs. Virat does not relish the role.

-- She enjoys playing the organ and appreciates music. How does she consider the differences between Thai and Western music? Which is more difficult? Enjoyable?

-- Khunying Virat had lunch with Mrs. Vance at the State Department today.

-- She likes to grow orchids which require attentive care. Does she have any unusual varieties? Note your county in Georgia is also known for its flowers -- magnolias and camellias.

-- She is known to be very proud of her husband's reputation as a gourmet cook.

-- She will leave tomorrow for New York and then Los Angeles. She expects to see a Broadway show, Radio City Music Hall, shop in New York, visit Palm Springs, Disneyland, and Universal Studios in the L.A. area and then spend two days in Honolulu. You might suggest special things to watch for or do in New York and L.A.

-- This will be the last time you will see Khunying Virat on this visit to the U.S. You are glad she came, wish her well for the rest of her trip, and hope that she will return again, next time maybe to visit Atlanta.

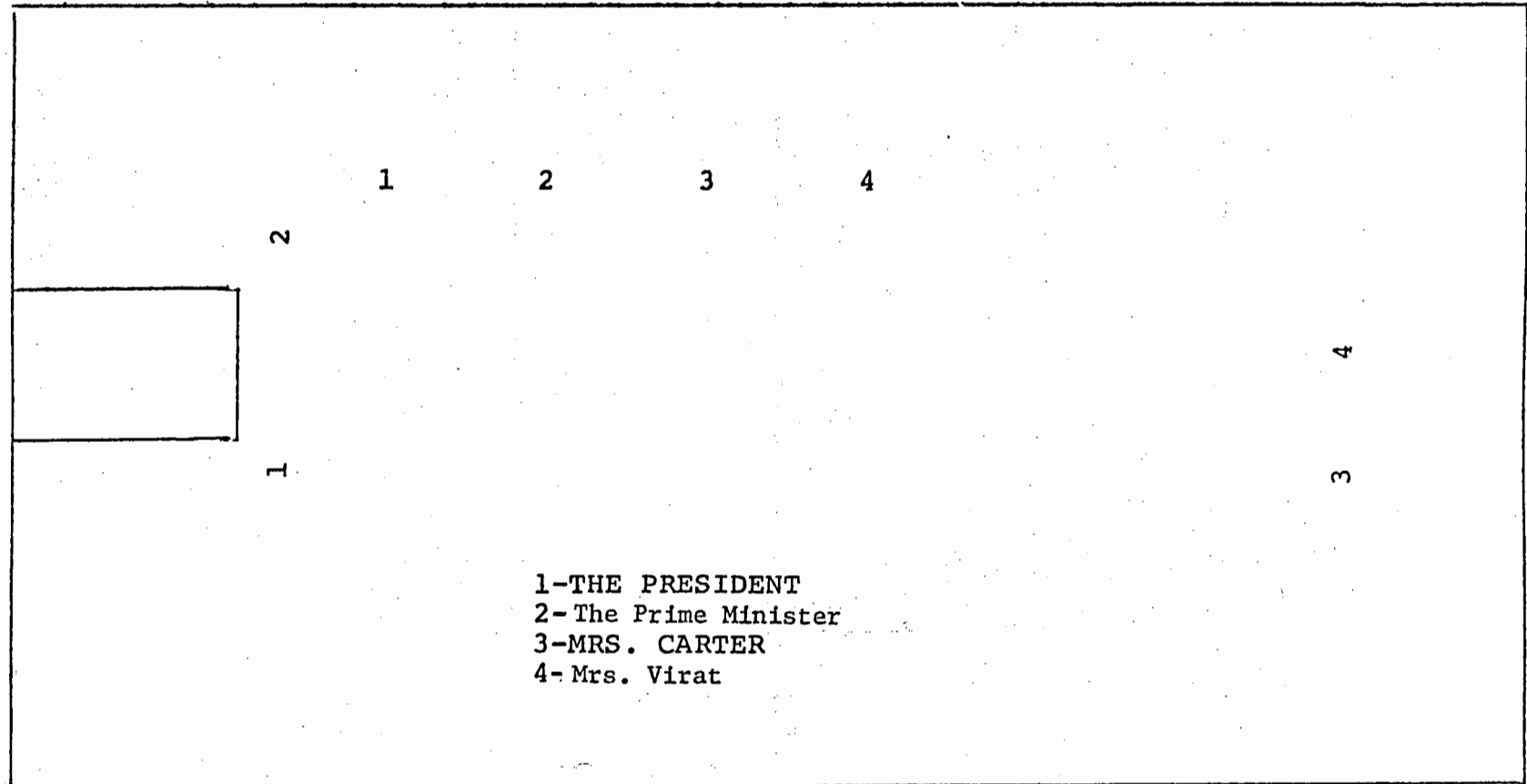

THE PRESIDENT: It is a delight for me, on behalf of the people of the United States of America, to welcome to our Nation a very distinguished international leader and a friend of our people, Prime Minister Kriangsak of the Kingdom of Thailand.

Our friendly relationships have been historically very important to our country. 143 years ago this month, for the first time with any nation in Asia, our country signed a treaty of peace with the people of Thailand, then known as Siam. This was the first peace treaty that we signed with any peoples of Asia. Since then, we have experienced years, even generations of friendship, growth and change. And throughout all these years -- sometimes years of testing and trial -- the friendship between our two countries has been very valuable to the people of the United States.

We have been allies in times of peace and war. Our distinguished visitor fought alongside American troops in Korea and I understand from one of my staff members who recently visited your home, that on your private home walls, there are photographs of you and American GIs as one of the dear possessions in your personal life.

Our Nation is intensely interested and deeply committed to the integrity and to the freedom and the security of Thailand; that your borders stay inviolate. And as you well know, the bilateral commitment and the multilateral commitments made in the Manila Pact are the bases for our security agreements with you and with your people, Mr. Prime Minister.

You come here at a very important time, when our own region of the world is again witnessing conflict at your very shores and borders, a time of mutual concern. Following the visit of Vice Premier Deng of the People's Republic of China, my conversations with you will be very valuable to me and to the people of the Nation that I represent.

You come not only representing a great country, but also the Association of Southeast Asian Nations, ASEAN countries, within which you are an acknowledged and respected leader.

We are very deeply interested in the independence and the security of the people of Southeast Asia. We believe in a stable system of governments joined in peace with independence of each nation preserved and inviolate.

So in politics and in security affairs, our relationships have been of great mutual importance. In addition, economic interrelationships have been dear to our own people and to yours.

Heavy American business investments and interest in Thailand have been very profitable for both our people.

We witness under your own benevolent administration with great appreciation a strong example of the preservation of human rights. Your country has, through great difficulty, welcomed and helped to care for 140,000 or more refugees.

Our country has received a like number. And, as you know, this is important to the people of the United States because our country is a Nation originally formed by and built by refugees.

Later on this spring, in April, democratic elections will be held under your leadership to establish a parliamentary form of government based on the principles of democracy. And the improvements in your judicial system and in the general benevolent attitude toward the rights of individuals have indeed been an inspiration to us all.

So, Mr. Prime Minister, we welcome you, your beautiful wife, your son, your daughter, your political party representatives to our country.

After frequent visits to our Nation, you have made many friends in the past who welcome you here today. And I have no doubt that this visit will let you depart from our Nation after an extensive tour with a large number of new friends for you, your family, and the people of your great nation.

Welcome to the United States, Prime Minister Kriangsak.

PRIME MINISTER KRIANGSAK: Mr. President, Mrs. Carter, friends, ladies and gentlemen:

This is, for us an auspicious day. On behalf of my colleagues, I want to thank you for this warm and generous welcome. It is a special pleasure to return to a country which has so many close ties with Thailand and so many happy associations for me personally.

We in Thailand look at our relationship with the United States as something special. Like you, we cherish our independence, our freedom and our way of life. Our nations have worked side-by-side to advance these cherished beliefs in Southeast Asia and throughout the world.

Our ties are based on mutual interest and respect and our peoples have benefited from our common endeavors. I am confident that they will persist. But our relations transcend politics. Some 100,000 of my countrymen have attended schools and universities in the United States. Our peoples also retain close ties with Americans through professional associations, business partnerships and frequent travel.

Throughout these contacts and shared experiences, the links between our peoples are firm and progressive. Most importantly, our peoples get along well together. We Thais enjoy your openness and informality. On our part, while I cannot say we outdo your famous Southern hospitality, Americans seem to feel at home with us.

The nations of Southeast Asia have witnessed many dramatic events during the past few years. I regret that the peace and stability that we long for in Southeast Asia has not yet been established. The killing still goes on. While the present situation has dangers, we are confident that the strength and the resiliency of the Thai people will enable us to withstand all challenges.

We also know that we have the support and encouragement of the United States and most other countries of the world. Both the material and moral strengths of the United States are vital to the peace of the world.

The Thai people are pleased with your continuing recognition that the peace and well-being of Asia is of vital interest to the United States; and with your determination to continue to play an active role in the region, we believe such an active and constructive American presence is essential if we are to achieve peace and continue with our political and economic development.

We appreciate your commitment to the security of Thailand. Your response to the unfortunate developments in Kampuchea is evidence of your concern and your values. For its part, Thailand has tried hard to improve relationships with all our neighbors, based on the principle of mutual respect, territorial integrity and noninterference. Elementary prudence requires us to improve our own defenses. We will rely on the strength of our own people.

But we will need your cooperation in improving our military deterrent. But we also recognize that the security of Thailand depends on more than weapons. It rests, also importantly, on national unity based on a just and prosperous society and on long-held Thai values.

We are working hard to move closer to such a society. We will devote major efforts and resources to improving the lot of our poorer farmers. We will protect our unique historical and cultural patterns as we protect the rights of our citizens.

We have maintained our humanitarian principles and have granted asylum to large numbers of Indochinese refugees.

My own experience is illustrative of the special relationship which exists between our nations and the warm bonds which mark personal relations between Thais and Americans.

With a number of my colleagues here, I fought with your forces under the united flag in Korea -- the United Command Flag in Korea. For 30 years, I have worked closely and intimately with the officials of your country in numerous common endeavors.

I personally am grateful to the doctors and the nurses at Walter Reed Hospital, surely one of the world's great medical centers.

Our ties with America are simply unique.

My colleagues and I look forward to meeting with you, Mr. President. We look forward to renewing old friendships, and forging new ones, with the American people.

In the years ahead, I am confident that with your encouragement and support, our two countries will build on the strong foundation of friendship to enhance and develop new areas for mutual cooperation.

My colleagues and I humbly dedicate our visit to this cause.

Mr. President, thank you for receiving us so warmly. Although this is our first meeting, we feel we are among close friends. We look forward with great anticipation to what I know will be a warm and successful visit.
