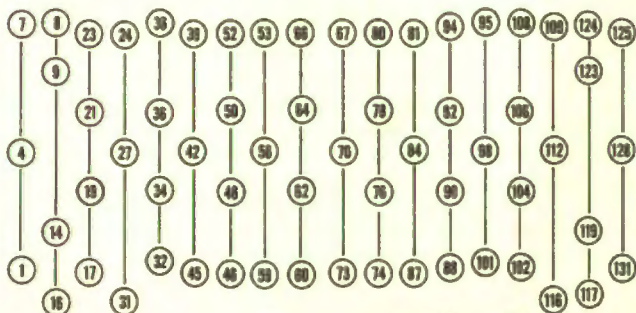

THE WHITE HOUSE

WASHINGTON

A CELEBRATION OF PEACE

At 12:00 noon, the three principals and their First Ladies will have lunch at the White House.

At 2:00 pm, the Signing Ceremony will begin with only official members invited in the East Room.

Guests arrive through the East Gate of the White House at 8:00 pm for the dinner in honor of a Celebration of Peace.

The Navy Band is playing outside at the East Portico.

As guests enter the East Lobby and proceed to check their wraps in the Family Theater, the Army String Quartet is playing.

Guests proceed into the Residence and through the Diplomatic Reception Room (where an Air Force harp is playing) to enter the tent on the South Lawn.

The tent is attached to the Residence at the South Portico.

Guests are directed immediately to their seats in the tent where aperitifs are served at their seats.

The U. S. Marine Corps Orchestra plays from the stage in the tent throughout the entire evening, augmented by portions of the Marine Band for Honors.

At 8:00 pm, an Ecumenical Prayer from the Lincoln Memorial will begin. Guests in the tent are able to view the Prayer via large video screens set up through the tent. Participants include:

Father Hesburgh - Notre Dame
Dr. Raouf - Islamic Center (Washington)
Rev. Martin Luther King, Sr. - Atlanta
Rabbi Rabinowitz - Washington

At the conclusion of the Prayer, people holding candles and flashlights will light them as the Marine Brass Band begins to play and a fireworks display begins.

The principals arrive the dinner and are escorted to their seats. The Marine Band plays Honors for each Chief of State.

Dinner begins with the first course, the fish course. After dishes are picked up, Prime Minister Begin moves to the stage and introduces the first segment of entertainment: Pinchas Zuckerman and Itzhak Perlman for a 15 minute musicale.

At the conclusion, the main course of dinner is served. Following the main course, President Sadat rises and moves to the stage to introduce the next segment for a 15 minute musical interlude.

Dessert is then served during which the Army and Air Force Combined Strings play amidst the tables.

As the dessert plates are cleared, the President moves to the stage to introduce the last segment: Leontyne Price.

All the principals then move to the stage with the First Ladies for toasts and the conclusion of the evening.

At the conclusion of toasts, the Marine Orchestra (which has been playing throughout the evening) plays and guests depart the tents.

All guests move back into the Residence via the Diplomatic Reception Room where the harpist is again playing. Those guests that wish to dance can go upstairs to the East Room and dance to the Marine Dance Band. The string quartet and Navy Band are in position and playing at the Family Theater and in the East Lobby as guests depart through the East Gate.

TABLE SETTINGS

Each of the 130 tables in the tent will be decorated with tall branches of forsythia in the middle of a centerpiece with three hurricane lamp candles.

The tablecloths are in shades of yellow with green branches on a white background.

MEMENTO

At each guest's place is a book - a beautifully-bound compilation of excerpts from each of the principal's remarks during the negotiations.

TIME TABLE

The tent will be set up on the South Lawn and completed by noon, Wednesday, March 21. The foundation was laid today. As next week draws near, refrigerator trucks, and other equipment needs will be added. 37,000 items in all will be used for the dinner.

PROGRAM

An Egyptian Trio is first on the program - representing and brought by President Sadat of Egypt

Leontyne Price is last - representing the United States and President Carter.

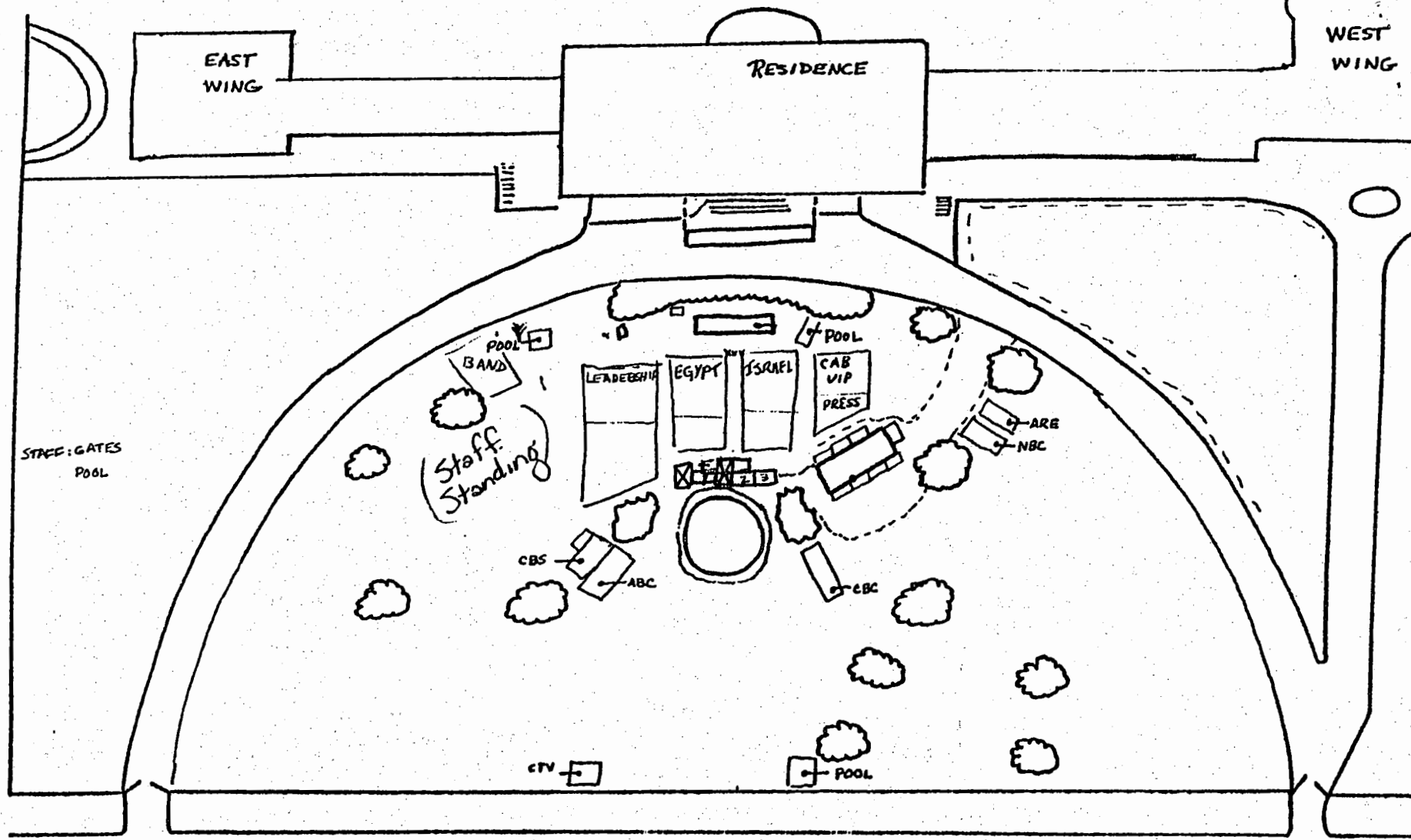

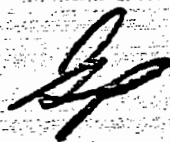

(1:15 pm Guests for signing ceremony arrive on North Lawn and move to seats. The entire Congress is being bused, dinner guests are invited as are State Dept. and Embassy staffs of Egypt and Israel. The Air Force Band will be playing.)

1:45 pm Conclusion of luncheon

President and Mrs. Sadat retire to Queen's Room

Prime Minister and Mrs. Begin retire to Lincoln Bedroom

(Note: Possibility that Sadat and Begin staff will join them there before signing ceremony. If so, staff will already be in assigned rooms awaiting principals.)

2:00 pm Principals re-join in Sitting Room and depart family quarters to North Portico

2:02 pm All principals to North Portico

PHOTO OPPORTUNITY

Spouses are directed to front row seating

Principals move to left of driveway and proceed to their seats at signing table. (NOTE: See attached historical information on table that will be used.)

2:05 pm Ambassador Dobelle begins ceremony and officiates during signing

To the rear of each of the principals are the respective flags of each country as well as a representative of the United States, Egypt, and Israel to assist with the signing of documents.

The North Lawn will be filled with guests - primarily seated but also including White House staff and others

We are requesting Lafayette Park be secured from normal pedestrian traffic to insure protection from any embarrassing incidents or injuries to any of the principals. All permits are currently being denied. The Secret Service and the Metropolitan Police are executing elaborate and extensive security precautions.

At the conclusion of the signing of all documents, each of the principals, while seated, will deliver remarks:

1. The President
2. President Sadat
3. Prime Minister Begin

The remarks are 3-5 minutes in length.

Following remarks, the ceremony is officially ended. The spouses will join their husbands at the table for a photo opportunity.

The principals and spouses will proceed to North Portico.

President and Mrs. Sadat depart North Portico.

Prime Minister and Mrs. Begin depart North Portico.

2:30 pm President and Mrs. Carter depart North Portico and all guests depart North Lawn.

7:10 pm President and Mrs. Carter depart White House enroute National Cathedral for Ecumenical Service

National Cathedral is strongly recommended as an alternative to the Lincoln Memorial for security reasons, because of darkness and an inability to control the public. From a security and aesthetic standpoint, Cathedral is the preferred location.

The Cathedral is considered a non-denominational location and is a place where many state memorial services are held. It is large enough to insure adequate space for all guests to be seated and can be controlled. It will dignify a service of this nature.

During the ceremony itself, candles will be held by all guests. At the conclusion of the ceremony, a crowd will be outside also holding candles as an extension of the religious ceremony.

Live coverage of this event is expected. Only the principals will go from the Cathedral to the dinner at the White House.

Rabbi Rabinowitz (requested by the Israelis - Washington)

Dr. Raouf (requested by Egyptians - Head of the Islamic Center)

Father Hesburgh - Notre Dame - the staff strongly recommends there be a Catholic representative

The Bishop of the Cathedral will be the official representative from the Cathedral

(7:30 pm Dinner guests arrive through the East Entrance of the White House)

7:30 pm The President and Mrs. Carter arrive National Cathedral

President and Mrs. Sadat arrive National Cathedral and wait with the President and Mrs. Carter for the Begins

Prime Minister and Mrs. Begin arrive National Cathedral and proceed with other principals into Cathedral for ceremony.

8:00 pm Upon completion of ceremony, the principals move to one vehicle for departure

8:20 pm Principals arrive Northwest Gate and proceed to North Portico

Exit Diplomatic Reception and into tent on South Lawn for dinner

8:30 pm Dinner is served as principals are announced and seated

Dinner guests include official delegations from Egypt and Israel as well as those suggested by senior staff. Selected Members of Congress are invited as a part of the 1300 dinner guests.

Through the musical groups playing throughout the Residence and in the tent, all military branches are represented.

A booklet of excerpts from President Carter's speeches before both the Knesset and the People's Assembly will be at each guests'

plate as a memento of the evening.

A menu is attached. The tables will have cloths of yellow with green branches, and a centerpiece of forsythia.

It should be noted that Kosher plates are available.

During dinner, the U. S. Marine Corps Orchestra will play. During dessert, the combined Strolling Strings from both Army and Air Force will play.

10:30 pm At the conclusion of dessert, the three principals move to the stage for toasts. President Sadat and Prime Minister Begin return to their seats.

President Carter introduces the performing artists:

Leontyne Price - the United States

Itzhak Perlman - Israel

An Egyptian representative artist is still unknown

11:00 pm The entertainment concludes. The three principals and their spouses move to the stage to thank artists.

11:15 pm President and Mrs. Carter escort President and Mrs. Sadat and Prime Minister and Mrs. Begin to North Portico.

President and Mrs. Sadat depart

Prime Minister and Mrs. Begin depart

President and Mrs. Carter retire for the evening

Dinner guests are invited into the Residence for dancing, champagne and coffee

CONFERENCE TABLE IN THE TREATY ROOM

This walnut pedestal table was purchased for the Cabinet Room of the White House in 1869 during the administration of President Ulysses S. Grant. It remained in use as the Cabinet Room table until the West Wing was built in 1902.

A unique feature of the table were the locking drawers where late 19th century Cabinet members could keep personal papers until the next meeting of the Cabinet.

Traditionally, the President sat at the south end of the table with the Secretary of State at his right and the Secretary of the Treasury at his left. The other members of the Cabinet sat in the order of the creation of their departments.

Among historic documents signed on this table are the following:

1. The Peace Protocol ending the Spanish-American War, August, 1898. In attendance were President William McKinley, U. S. Secretary of State William Day, and the French Ambassador Jules Cambon who signed for Spain. (A painting on the north wall of the Treaty Room illustrates this event).
2. The Kellogg-Briand Peace Pact. Signed by President Calvin Coolidge on this table when it was moved to the East Room for this purpose in January, 1929. (This pact provided that the contracting powers "renounce war as an instrument of national policy" and promised to resolve "all disputes of whatever nature or of whatever origins" by pacific means.)

Subject: Acceptance of Donations for Egyptian-Israeli Peace Treaty Dinner

This responds to your request for an opinion on whether the National Park Service has authority to accept donations of money and personalty in support of an official White House dinner on the day of the signing of the Israeli-Egyptian Peace Treaty.

It is my understanding that this dinner is to be an official White House function hosted by the President on the day of the signing of the Israeli-Egyptian Peace Treaty. It is also my understanding that the dinner is proposed to be held on the south White House grounds; will be attended by President Sadat and Prime Minister Begin and is dedicated in commemoration and furtherance of peace in the Middle East.

The Act of September 22, 1961, 75 Stat. 586 [reprinted following 3 U.S.C. 110 (1976)] provides in relevant part:

That all of that portion of reservation numbered 1 in the city of Washington, District of Columbia, which is within the President's Park enclosure, comprising eighteen and seven one-hundredths acres, shall continue to be known as the White House and shall be administered pursuant to the Act of August 25, 1916 (39 Stat. 535; 16 U.S.C. 1-3), and Acts supplementary thereto and amendatory thereof.

The effect of this Act is to make the White House a part of the National Park System administered in accord with the authorities applicable to that system. (See generally 16 U.S.C. 1 et seq.; 16 U.S.C. 1c). Pursuant to that Act, the National Park Service provides numerous services within the White House and its grounds. These services have included extensive participation in the preparation of official White House functions.

In the administration of the National Park System the Secretary of the Interior is authorized to accept donations of lands, personalty and money for the purposes of the National Park System. 16 U.S.C. 1c(b), 16 U.S.C. 6; 16 U.S.C. 19. Acceptance of such gifts may be made either directly by the National Park Service or through the National Park Foundation. The National Park Service has in the past utilized these authorities to accept donations for the purposes of official White House functions. Such donations are gifts to the United States and as such are tax deductible.

Accordingly, it is my opinion that the donation authorities applicable to the National Park Service permit the acceptance of money and personalty in support of the official White House function described above.

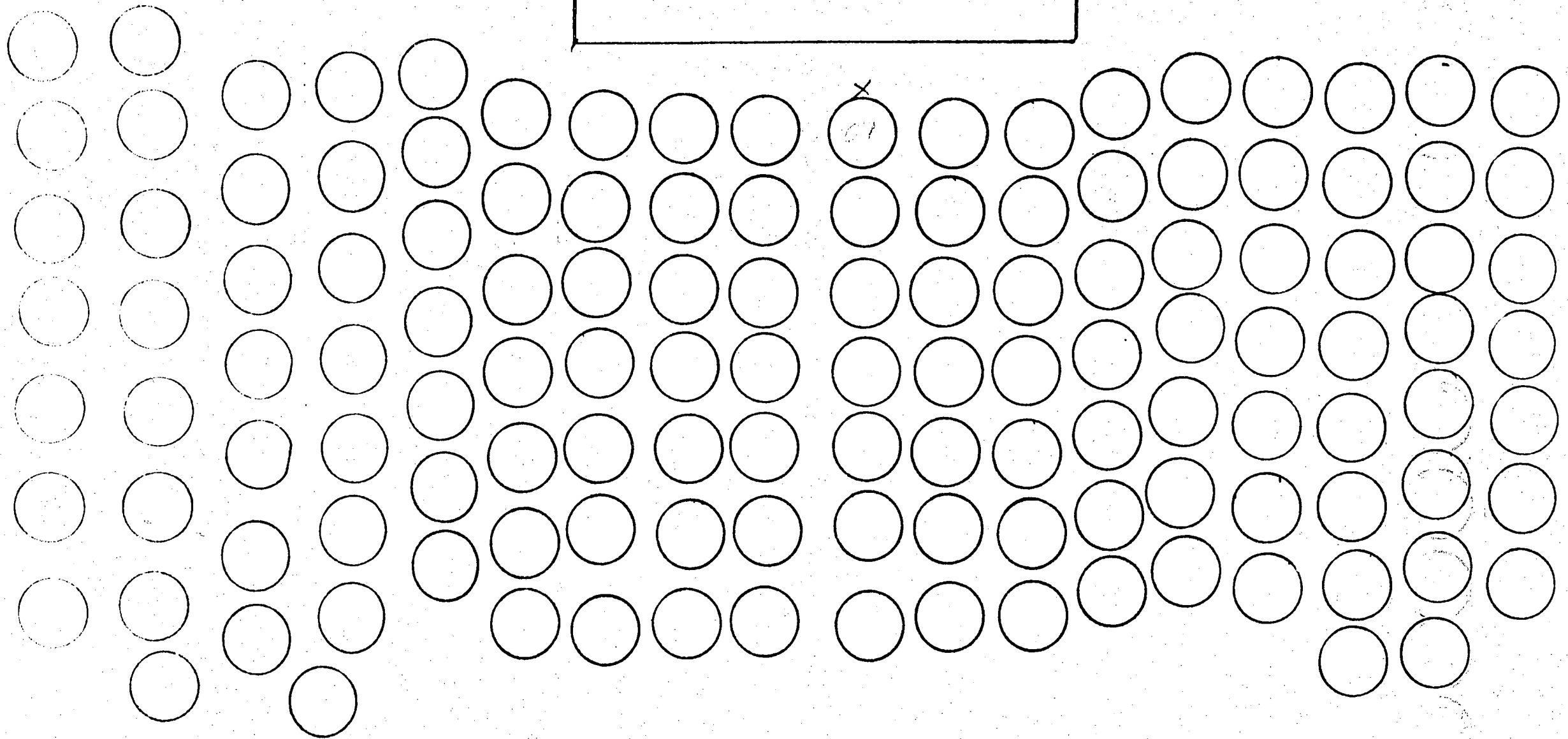

SIGNING CELEBRATION

BY MAUREEN SANTINI

WASHINGTON (AP) -- WORKMEN DUG TRENCHES TODAY OUTSIDE THE \$6,700 RENTED CIRCUS TENT ON THE WHITE HOUSE SOUTH LAWN. INSIDE THE TENT, OTHERS PAINTED THE POLES GREEN, BUILT A STAGE AND INSTALLED WIRING FOR ELECTRIC CHANDELIERS.

THESE WERE A FEW OF THE PREPARATIONS FOR A BANQUET TO BE GIVEN BY PRESIDENT CARTER FOR 1,300 GUESTS MONDAY NIGHT AFTER THE SIGNING OF THE PEACE TREATY BETWEEN EGYPT AND ISRAEL ON THE FRONT LAWN OF THE WHITE HOUSE.

CHIEF USHER REX SCOUTEN SAID IT PROBABLY WILL BE THE MOST EXPENSIVE STATE DINNER IN THE HISTORY OF THE WHITE HOUSE, BUT NO ONE WAS WILLING TO ESTIMATE THE COST. A DINNER OF SIMILAR SIZE WAS GIVEN IN 1973 BY PRESIDENT RICHARD M. NIXON, BUT COSTS HAVE SINCE ESCALATED WITH INFLATION.

"IT'S A HUGE UNDERTAKING," SAID SCOUTEN, WHO HAS SPENT MOST OF THE PAST THREE DAYS INSIDE THE TENT SUPERVISING ABOUT 30 WORKMEN.

THE RED AND YELLOW TENT, MEASURING 100 BY 180 FEET, WAS RENTED FROM A COMPANY IN SUBURBAN ROCKVILLE, MD. THE TENT WAS ONE OF MANY SPECIAL ITEMS OBTAINED FROM OUTSIDE THE WHITE HOUSE FOR THE BANQUET, WHICH WILL BE 10 TIMES THE SIZE OF A NORMAL STATE DINNER.

"IT'S THE LARGEST TENT THAT FITS BETWEEN THE TREES," SCOUTEN SAID.

FOUR SMALLER YELLOW AND WHITE SERVING TENTS WERE SET UP NEARBY.

BECAUSE THE WHITE HOUSE IS NOT STOCKED FOR SUCH A MAMMOTH DINNER, CHINA, CRYSTAL AND SILVERWARE FOR 1,300 GUESTS ALSO WILL BE RENTED, SCOUTEN SAID. SO WILL THE ROUND DINING TABLES THAT SEAT 10 GUESTS EACH.

THE WHITE HOUSE HAS ITS OWN STAFF OF BUTLERS, AND 26 ARE REQUIRED TO SERVE GUESTS AT THE NORMAL-SIZE STATE BANQUET. THIS TIME 260 BUTLERS ARE NEEDED, AND THEY ARE BEING RECRUITED FROM CATERERS AND HOTELS IN THE WASHINGTON AREA, SCOUTEN SAID.

IN ADDITION, THREE EXTRA COOKS WILL BE BROUGHT IN TO HELP THE THREE WHITE HOUSE CHEFS PREPARE THE MONDAY NIGHT MEAL OF SALMON, CHEESE STRAWS, ROAST BEEF, VEGETABLES, MOUSSE, PETIT FOURS, DEMITASSE AND THREE CALIFORNIA WINES.

SCOUTEN SAID THE MEAT PROBABLY WILL BE PREPARED AT A LOCAL HOTEL.

THE TEMPERATURE FORECAST FOR THE DINNER IS ABOUT 50 DEGREES -- A BIT CHILLY FOR BLACK-TIE EVENING WEAR. SO SPECIAL HEATING DUCTS ARE BEING INSTALLED IN THE TENT TO KEEP THE GUESTS WARM.

THE LAST TIME A DINNER OF THIS MAGNITUDE WAS HELD AT THE WHITE HOUSE WAS IN MAY 1973, WHEN NIXON ENTERTAINED 1,300 FORMER PRISONERS OF WAR AND THEIR GUESTS UNDER A HUGE TENT ON THE SOUTH LAWN.

"IT RAINED FOR FOUR DAYS," SCOUTEN SAID. "WE USED CARPETS AND BURLAP AND EVERYTHING WE COULD TO PROTECT THE GRASS. IT WAS THE FIRST TIME I EVER HAD PEOPLE MOPPING GRASS."

THIS TIME, AS A PRECAUTION, WORKMEN DUG TRENCHES AROUND THE TENT TO DIVERT THE WATER IF IT RAINS.

CARTER, ISRAELI PRIME MINISTER MENACHEM BEGIN AND EGYPTIAN PRESIDENT ANWAR SADAT AND THEIR WIVES WILL SHARE ONE OF THE 130 FORSYTHIA-DECORATED TABLES UNDER THE TENT MONDAY NIGHT.

ENTERTAINMENT WILL BE PROVIDED BY EGYPTIAN, ISRAELI AND AMERICAN ARTISTS.

SADAT HAS INVITED THE MUSICAL TRIO OF OMAR KHORSHED, GAMAL SAID RAHEEM AND MOHAMED HELNY AMEEN TO PERFORM. BEGIN HAS INVITED A VIOLINIST ITZHAK PERLMAN AND PIANIST PINCHAS ZUKERMAN. CARTER HAS INVITED OPERA SINGER LEONTYNE PRICE.

THE TREATY SIGNING WILL TAKE PLACE AT 2 P.M. EST ON THE NORTH LAWN OF THE WHITE HOUSE FACING PENNSYLVANIA AVENUE, A SITE RARELY USED FOR SUCH CEREMONIAL OCCASIONS.

ABOUT 1,500 PERSONS, INCLUDING EVERY MEMBER OF CONGRESS, HAVE BEEN INVITED TO SEE BEGIN AND SADAT SIGN THE PEACE ACCORD AT A HISTORIC WALNUT TABLE WHICH ALSO WAS USED TO SIGN THE PEACE PROTOCOL ENDING THE SPANISH-AMERICAN WAR IN 1898.

A DEMONSTRATION SPONSORED BY THE ORGANIZATION OF ARAB STUDENTS AT LAFAYETTE PARK ACROSS THE STREET FROM THE WHITE HOUSE WAS EXPECTED TO ATTRACT ABOUT 1,000 PERSONS.

CARTER, WHO SAYS HE HAS INVESTED HUNDREDS OF HOURS IN MEDIATING A PEACE SETTLEMENT BETWEEN EGYPT AND ISRAEL, PLANNED TO MEET SEPARATELY WITH BEGIN AND SADAT MONDAY MORNING. JUST BEFORE THE SIGNING, THE THREE LEADERS AND THEIR WIVES WILL HAVE A PRIVATE LUNCHEON AT THE WHITE HOUSE.

THE PRESIDENT: Please be seated.

Go ahead and sit down if you can find a seat.

President Sadat, Prime Minister Begin, Egyptian friends, Israeli friends, American friends: This is one of those evenings that it has been hard for me to stay seated, also, I have been so excited. (Applause)

Most of the times in history when a peace treaty was signed, one nation has been a victor and the other nation has been vanquished. One nation has won; the other nation has lost. Today we have signed a peace treaty when both nations have won. (Applause)

This is indeed a joyous occasion. We have prayed for peace and we have worked for peace. Now we humbly give thanks to God that we can celebrate the beginnings of peace in the Middle East.

I have gotten to know these two men on my right in the last 18 months -- sometimes too well. (Laughter) We have spent days and days together, hours and hours together, planning, arguing, debating, negotiating. And I have come to know them and to respect them, to form a friendship, a sense of brotherhood and even love with both of them.

They are men of great courage, great sensitivity, great patriotism and statesmanship; men who have never feared to face difficult questions and seek persistently for the answers.

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(OVER)

They have been men who have inspired me, and who have been inspired by the people in their own great nations whom they represent.

The peace that was born today has a meaning that comes down to us through many years, or generations, even centuries.

In ancient days, God promised Abraham that from his seed would come many nations; and as you know, that promise has been fulfilled. Yet for much too long, the people of Israel and the people of Egypt -- two of the nations of the children of Abraham, trusting in the same God, hoping for the same peace -- knew only enmity between them. That time -- thank God -- is now at an end. (Applause)

Now, after 30 years, four wars, countless deaths, terrible anguish, we can see a new era ahead, an era, we hope, in which violence no longer dominates the Middle East, and the just concerns of all of us can find a peaceful solution to the problems that we share and a peaceful expression of the hopes and dreams of people who look to us for leadership.

The path for peace has brought us a long way in a short time. It was only 16 months ago that President Sadat made his extraordinary and historic journey to Jerusalem. He was received there by Prime Minister Begin and was followed by Prime Minister Begin's equally historic trip to Ismailia.

Their vision and their courage stirred hopes in the hearts of people throughout the world.

The distance we have come since then is little short of miraculous. There were difficult moments, many difficult moments; times when the differences seemed impossible to overcome. But at each of those times, just a few simple realities summoned us to renewed effort:

First of all, the knowledge that the people -- the people of Egypt and the people of Israel, no matter what the leaders might have done -- deeply and passionately desired peace; second, the awareness that the process which we had initiated was the only practical route to progress; third, the obligation that was felt to those who have suffered so much -- to the young, to the old, and to future generations; and I think above all, the depth of our common faith in a just and a merciful God.

These things sustained us, and they have brought us here tonight.

I would like to note here a simple fact: That when others could not, or would not move to end the seemingly endless tragedy of the Middle East, two men -- President Anwar Sadat and Prime Minister Menachem Begin -- dared to think the unthinkable, dared to do what others feared could not be done, dared to seize history in their hands and to turn history toward peace. And I am thankful to them both. (Applause)

MORE

Theirs is the vision of the Psalmist, who said: "Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!"

But this is an achievement not just of leaders, but of peoples, strong and creative peoples, proud of past heritage and present achievements and wise enough to know that future well-being can be assured only through cooperation and a very difficult element of mutual trust.

Tonight we commemorate, not an end, but a beginning. For a treaty between Egypt and Israel is but the first step along a long and a rough and a narrow and a very difficult road.

We hope that the Palestinians and others will soon join us in our efforts to make this treaty the cornerstone of a comprehensive peace, a true and a lasting peace, a just peace for the entire Middle East.

I welcome and invite those who have so far held back -- for whatever motive they might honor -- to join us in the future. The way is long and the way is hard. But peace is the way.

We share a vision of a time when all the people of the Middle East may turn their energies back to the works of life -- when young people can marry and start families and have a hope of seeing and knowing their own children's children -- when the old can end their lives quietly after witnessing many a gentle spring. We pray for that time. And we shall continue to work for that time.

This is a season of renewal, when the earth brings forth life. The Koran tells us of a Prophet and a King of Israel for whom God's power "made the violent wind blow tamely." The Old Testament tells us the words of that same king, the words of King Solomon, David's son: "For everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven."

For centuries the people of Israel were dispersed around the world, often despised and persecuted. For centuries the people of Egypt suffered under foreign domination. Only in the past generation have these two proud and ancient peoples again become independent nations.

But that generation, to use the words of King Solomon, has also been a time to die, to pluck up that which was planted, a time to kill, a time of breaking down, a time to mourn, a time of weeping, a time to lose, a time to hate, and a time for war.

We pray that the season of weeping is past, and to continue the words of that same king, that now will come a time to heal, a time to plant, a time to build up, a time to laugh, a time to dance, a time to embrace, a time to love.

We pray to God that at last the children of Abraham have come to a time of peace.

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And now, I would like to propose a toast: To the President of the Arab Republic of Egypt, Anwar Al-Sadat, and to the Prime Minister of the State of Israel, Menachem Begin; to the great peoples they serve, the people of Egypt and the people of Israel, now joined together in hope; and to the cause we all serve: Salaam; Shalom; and to peace. (Applause)

PRESIDENT SADAT: President Carter, Prime Minister Begin, dear friends: Only a few hours ago we laid down a solid foundation for a lasting peace in the Middle East. We did so in a determined effort to heal the wounds of the past and usher in a new era of love and fraternity.

At long last cousins will be able to revive the traditions of the glorious past when they lived side by side in peace and harmony.

Our great friend, President Carter, who was the architect of the entire process, spoke of the new reality which is dawning. We all share his hopes and aspirations. We want to see a steady progress on the road to peace. This will require a positive movement on all fronts.

Within a few weeks, we will be entering into negotiations with the goal of establishing a self-governing authority with full autonomy on the West Bank and Gaza.

The success of these negotiations will depend largely on the ability of all parties to rise to the level of events and demonstrate their good faith.

Above all, it depends upon an active American role.

President Carter has promised me to spare no effort to ensure the coronation of our efforts.

I have full confidence in him. He has been a wonderful partner and a courageous statesman. (Applause) He has shown an unparalleled understanding of the plight of the Palestinian people. He is sensitive to their legitimate call for the eradication of the injustice that was inflicted upon them in the unhappy past.

We all realize their need to be reassured that they will be able soon to take the first step on the road to self-determination and statehood. A dialog with their representatives will be very helpful. It would also be consistent with American tradition.

It is with this in mind that we proceed towards the completion of this sacred mission.

None of us can bear the responsibility of defeating the expectations of millions across the borders. None of us can interfere with the course of history or turn the clock back.

We should seize this opportunity. We should seize this opportunity, this historic opportunity in this historic

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gathering which is hosted by the American people, to pledge ourselves to the continuation of the process. We should vow to employ all the moral strength we muster, to ensure the ultimate success of our endeavor. (Applause)

Dear Friends, I ask you to rise in a tribute to President Carter, his spouse, the American people, and to the millions of people of good will everywhere, Mr. Begin and Mrs. Begin. (Applause)

PRIME MINISTER BEGIN: President Carter, Mrs. Carter, President Sadat, Mrs. Sadat, ladies and gentlemen: Amongst the many guests assembled here, there is a lady from Norway. Her name is Mrs. Lionaes. She was, until recently, the Chairman of the Committee of the Norwegian Parliament for the Nobel Peace Prize.

I invited her to come today and to be with us because when the award was granted by that committee to two men, she was under certain criticism from some circles. And I asked her, after the ceremony of signing, whether now she can say that she and her colleagues did not make a mistake. (Applause) And she said, with very characteristic bravery, "I never had any doubts." (Laughter, applause)

Now, my dear friend, Mrs. Lionaes, when you come back home, I have a request to you, respectfully, to get in touch with your former colleagues, the members of the Nobel Prize Committee of the democratic Parliament of your country. I suggest, ladies and gentlemen, that all of us -- President Sadat and myself -- members of the three Cabinets of the United States, of Egypt, and Israel, Members of Congress of both Houses, Members of the Knesset, writers, singers, all of us assembled here do decide to nominate President Jimmy Carter as a candidate -- (applause) -- I didn't yet say a candidate for what -- (laughter) -- as a candidate to receive the Nobel Peace Prize of 1979 -- (applause) -- and please, no sharing of the award. (Laughter) All the prize is due to the President of the United States. (Laughter) And, Mr. President, if on the 10th of December, this year, you go to Oslo, and you invite President Sadat and me to be witnesses for that ceremony -- (laughter, applause) -- I am positive that both of us will be in Oslo. (Laughter)

It is due to you, my dear friend, Mr. President. You deserve it amply. And I am sure on the 10th of December you will be crowned with that great international famous award, the Nobel Peace Prize. (Applause)

Now, ladies and gentlemen, I would like to pay tribute to a man who is the main adviser of the President of this great country, and his friend and my friend, and as I, knows all the goings and comings and all the legal formulations about every word or letter, or even comma, I can say to you tonight that a great service was rendered to the United States, to Egypt, to Israel, and to the cause of peace by a gentleman

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who did so much day and night with his inventive mind, with his great learning, and knowledge, and who bears another title. He is also the husband of the perfect lady whom my wife and I love dearly and respect highly. I refer to the Secretary of State, Cyrus Vance. (Applause)

And the last remark, ladies and gentlemen, will be absolutely personal. And I will apologize for making it, but I have to. In the afternoon, I spoke about survival and perseverance. Tonight, in your presence, I would like to thank for that ability to persevere one human being who is here, whom I met when she was 17 years old, my own wife. (Applause)

And again, I will quote a prophet, Yirmeyahu. This time I will translate. (The Prime Minister spoke briefly in Hebrew) "And I will remember the grace of your youth, the love of your nuptials following me into the desert, into a land sown with mines."

Now we arrived to be here on this day. Let us thank God Almighty that he gave us together, and our children and our grandchildren, the strength to withstand all the tests, which sometimes were quite difficult, until I could, on behalf of our people, do the greatest human act, sign a peace treaty. In the circle of friendship of President Carter, President Sadat and myself, we stand together, and we vow to continue to be always together and work for peace.

And therefore, I raise my glass. I raise my glass to President Carter, President of the United States of America, the mighty democracy which saved the world twice from the danger of tyranny, militarism and totalitarianism, and which is still the guarantee for human liberty. And to President Sadat, whom I met for the first time in Jerusalem; and since then, as it is true, it comes from my heart, I have a deep sentiment for him, and under any circumstances, I will guard it in the depths of my heart.

And let us raise a toast to friendship between America, Egypt, and Israel, forever. Thank you. (Applause)

PRESIDENT SADAT: Ladies and gentlemen, until last night, whenever I met with Premier Begin, we seldom came in conformity. (Laughter) The miracle was achieved today, and let me say this in all candor: I am in full conformity with Premier Begin and let us hope that we shall continue. I support his proposal that our dear friend, President Carter, be elected as the Man of Peace of 1979. Thank you. (Applause)

PRESIDENT CARTER: Thank you.

I might point out to President Sadat and to Prime Minister Begin that if the next nine months of negotiations -- (laughter, applause) -- are completely harmonious, constructive, cooperative, and in the spirit of friendship, and if we meet all the requirements of the Camp David agreements and the peace treaty we signed today, then I might consider

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accepting their nomination. (Applause) But otherwise, they have made their toasts in vain. (Laughter)

I think we have proven today, and in the last 18 months or so, that there can be peace between our three nations and an inspiration for the whole world. I can feel a certain sense of satisfaction and gratitude, of harmony, friendship, inspiration, kind of an electrical current of common purpose in this group tonight. And I think it extends to Egypt and to Israel, and indeed throughout the world.

Political achievement has been wonderful. But now I think it is time for us to shift our attention to another sense of harmony; to show that superb talent can indeed transcend national boundaries. Each of our nations, through the leaders, have suggested for tonight's program superb performers. President Sadat has requested Omar Khorshed to come to represent Egypt; a superb musician, a superb composer, and a superb actor.

Prime Minister Begin, to represent Israel, has asked Itzhak Perlman, a very well known and beloved performer, and Pinchas Zukerman, who will accompany him, two of the most talented men who have ever lived.

And my wife and I have requested Leontyne Price to sing to represent the United States of America.

We will witness, without further introductions, a higher reality of human achievement, beauty, excellence, high ambition reached by human beings.

Some of the performers had to overcome great handicaps, physical handicaps, racial handicaps. But they will all show tonight that what they are is the exemplification of humanity that can indeed be an inspiration to us all.

Now for a few minutes, I think we will enjoy some of the finest examples of achievement from our three countries.

I am indeed grateful that you have come tonight. It is a wonderful and historic evening. And I believe it will be an exciting and enjoyable evening as well. And you will certify that, I am sure, with your own applause after these performers give us the inspiration for which they are so greatly qualified.

Thank you again. Good evening. (Applause)

THE PRESIDENT: During the past 30 years, Israel and Egypt have waged war. But for the past 16 months, these same two great nations have waged peace. Today we celebrate a victory -- not of a bloody military campaign, but of an inspiring peace campaign. Two leaders who will loom large in the history of nations -- President Anwar Al-Sadat and Prime Minister Menachem Begin -- have conducted this campaign with all the courage, tenacity, brilliance and inspiration of any generals who have ever led men and machines onto the field of battle.

At the end of this campaign the soil of the two lands is not drenched with young blood. (Applause) The countrysides of both lands are free from the litter and the carnage of a wasteful war. Mothers in Egypt and Israel are not weeping today for their children fallen in senseless battle. The dedication and determination of these two world statesmen have borne fruit. Peace has come to Israel and to Egypt. (Applause)

I honor these two leaders and their government officials who have hammered out this peace treaty which we have just signed. But most of all, I honor the people of these two lands whose yearning for peace kept alive the negotiations which today culminate in this glorious event.

We have won at last the first step of peace, a first step on a long and difficult road. We must not minimize the obstacles which still lie ahead. Differences still separate the signatories to this treaty from one another, and also from some of their neighbors who fear what they have just done. To overcome these differences, to dispel these fears, we must rededicate ourselves to the goal of a broader peace with justice for all who have lived in a state of conflict in the Middle East.

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We have no illusions -- we have hopes, dreams, prayers, yes -- but no illusions.

There now remains the rest of the Arab world whose support and whose cooperation in the peace process is needed and honestly sought.

I am convinced that other Arab people need and want peace. But some of their leaders are not yet willing to honor these needs and desires for peace. We must now demonstrate the advantages of peace, and expand its benefits to encompass all those who have suffered so much in the Middle East.

Obviously, time and understanding will be necessary for people, hitherto enemies, to become neighbors in the best sense of the word.

Just because a paper is signed, all the problems will not automatically go away. Future days will require the best from us to give reality to these lofty aspirations.

Let those who would shatter peace -- who would callously spill more blood -- be aware that we three and all others who may join us will vigorously wage peace. (Applause)

So let history record that deep and ancient antagonism can be settled without bloodshed and without staggering waste of precious lives, without rapacious destruction of the land.

It has been said, and I quote, "Peace has one thing in common with its enemy, with the fiend it battles, with war; peace is active, not passive; peace is doing, not waiting; peace is aggressive -- attacking; peace plans its strategy and encircles the enemy; peace marshals its forces and storms the gates; peace gathers its weapons and pierces the defense; peace, like war, is waged."

It is true that we cannot enforce trust and cooperation between nations, but we can use all our strength to see that nations do not again go to war. (Applause)

All our religious doctrines give us hope. In the Koran, we read: "But if the enemy incline towards peace, do thou also incline towards peace, and trust in God: for He is the One that heareth and knoweth all things."

And the prophet Isaiah said: "Nations shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruninghooks: nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more."

So let us now lay aside war. Let us now reward all the children of Abraham who hunger for a comprehensive peace in the Middle East. Let us now enjoy the adventure of becoming fully human, fully neighbors, even brothers and sisters. We pray God, we pray God together that these dreams will come true. I believe they will. Thank you very much. (Applause)

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PRESIDENT SADAT: President Carter, dear friends:

This is certainly one of the happiest moments in my life. (Applause) It is a historic turning point of great significance for all peace-loving nations. Those among us who are endowed with vision cannot fail to comprehend the dimensions of our sacred mission. The Egyptian people, with their heritage and unique awareness of history, have realized from the very beginning the meaning and value of this endeavor.

In all the steps I took, I was not performing a personal mission. I was merely expressing the will of a nation. I am proud of my people and of belonging to them. (Applause)

Today, a new dawn is emerging out of the darkness of the past. A new chapter is being opened in the history of coexistence among nations, one that is worthy of our spiritual values and civilization. Never before had men encountered such a complex dispute, which is highly charged with emotions. Never before did men need that much courage and imagination to confront a single challenge. Never before had any cause generated that much interest in all four corners of the globe.

Men and women of good will have labored day and night to bring about this happy moment. Egyptians and Israelis alike pursued this sacred goal undeterred by difficulties and complications. Hundreds of dedicated individuals on both sides have given generously of their thought and effort to translate the cherished dream into a living reality.

But the man who performed the miracle was President Carter. (Applause) Without any exaggeration, what he did constitutes one of the greatest achievements of our time. He devoted his skill, hard work, and above all his firm belief in the ultimate triumph of good against evil to ensure the success of our mission. (Applause)

To me he has been the best companion and partner along the road to peace. With his deep sense of justice and genuine commitment to human rights, we were able to surmount the most difficult obstacles.

There came certain moments when hope was eroding and retreating in the face of crisis. However, President Carter remained unshaken in his confidence and determination. He is a man of faith and compassion. Before anything else, the signing of the peace treaty and the exchanged letter is a tribute to the spirit and ability of Jimmy Carter. (Applause)

Happily, he was armed with the blessing of God and the support of his people. For that we are grateful to each and every American who contributed in his own way to the success of our endeavor.

We are also heartened by the understanding of hundreds of thousands of Israelis who remained unwavering in their

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commitment to peace. The continuation of this spirit is vital to the coronation of our effort. We realize that difficult times lay ahead. The signing of these documents marks only the beginning of peace. But it is an indispensable start. Other steps remain to be taken without delay or procrastination. Much will depend on the success of these steps.

We are all committed to pursue our efforts until the fruits of the comprehensive settlement we agreed upon are shared by all parties to the conflict.

President Carter once said that the United States is committed without reservation to seeing the peace process through until all parties to the Arab-Israeli conflict are at peace. We value such a pledge from a leader who raised the banner of morality and ethics as a substitute for power politics and opportunism. The steps we took in the recent past will serve Arab vital interests. The liberation of Arab land and the reinstitution of Arab authority in the West Bank and Gaza would certainly enhance our common strategic interests.

While we take the initiative to protect these interests, we remain faithful to our Arab commitment. To us, this is a matter of destiny. Pursuing peace is the only avenue which is compatible with our culture and creed.

Let there be no more wars or bloodshed between Arabs and Israelis. (Applause) Let there be no more wars or bloodshed between Arabs and the Israelis. Let there be no more suffering or denial of rights. Let there be no more despair or loss of faith. Let no mother lament the loss of her child. Let no young man waste his life on a conflict from which no one benefits. Let us work together until the day comes when they beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruninghooks. And God does call to the abode of peace, He does guide whom he pleases to his way. (President Sadat spoke briefly in Egyptian.) (Applause)

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PRIME MINISTER BEGIN: Mr. President of the United States of America, Mr. President of the Arab Republic of Egypt, Mr. Vice President, Mr. Speaker of the House of Representatives, Mr. Speaker of the Knesset, Members of the Cabinets of the United States, of Egypt and Israel; Members of the Congress and the Knesset; Your Excellencies; Chairman of the Board of Governors of the Jewish Agency; Chairman of the Executive of the Zionist Organization; Mrs. Gruber, the mother of the sons, distinguished guests, ladies and gentlemen: I have come from the land of Israel, the land of Zion and Jerusalem and here I am in humility and with pride as a son of the Jewish people, as one of the generation of the Holocaust and redemption.

The ancient Jewish people gave the world a vision of eternal peace, of universal disarmament, of abolishing the teaching and the learning of war.

Two prophets, Yishayahu Benamotz and Micah Hamorashti, having foreseen the spiritual unity of man under God, with these words coming forth from Jerusalem, gave the nations of the world the following vision--expressed in identical terms -- "And they shall beat the swords into plowshares and their spears into pruninghooks: nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more."

Despite the tragedies and disappointments of the past, we must never foresake that vision, that human dream, that unshakable faith.

Peace is the beauty of life. It is sunshine. It is the smile of a child; the love of a mother, the joy of a father, the togetherness of a family. It is the advancement of man, the victory of a just cause, the triumph of truth.

Peace is all of these and more, and more.

These are words I uttered in Oslo on December 10th, 1978, while receiving the second half of the Nobel Peace Prize. The first half went, rightly so, to President Sadat. (Applause) And I took the liberty to repeat them here on this momentous, historic occasion.

It is a great day in the annals of two ancient nations, Egypt and Israel, whose sons met in battle five times in one generation, fighting and falling.

Let us turn our hearts to our heroes and pay tribute to their eternal memory. It is thanks to them, to our fallen heroes, that we could have reached this day.

However, let us not forget that in ancient times, our two nations met also in alliance. Now we make peace, the cornerstone of cooperation and friendship. (Applause)

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It is a great day in your life, Mr. President of the United States. You have worked so hard, so insistently, so consistently, to achieve this goal. And your labors and your devotion bore God-blessed fruit. (Applause)

Our friend, President Sadat, said that you are the unknown soldier of the peace-making effort. I agree, but as usual, with an amendment. (Laughter) A soldier in the service of peace, you are. You are, Mr. President even, mirabile dictu, an intransigent fighter for peace. (Applause)

But, Jimmy Carter, the President of the United States, is not completely unknown. (Laughter) And so it is his efforts which will be remembered and recorded by generations to come. (Applause)

It is, of course, a great day in your life, Mr. President of the Arab Republic of Egypt. In the face of adversity and hostility, you have demonstrated the human value that can change history -- civil courage. (Applause)

A great field commander once said, "Civil courage is sometimes more difficult to show than military courage." You showed both, Mr. President. (Applause) But now it is time for all of us to show civil courage in order to proclaim to our peoples and to others: No more war, no more bloodshed, no more bereavement; peace unto you. Shalom, Salaam forever. (Applause)

And it is, ladies and gentlemen, the third greatest day in my life. The first was May 14th, 1948, when our flag was hoisted. Our independence in our ancestors' land was proclaimed after 1,878 years of dispersion, persecution, humiliation and ultimately, physical destruction.

We fought for our liberation alone, and with God's help, we won the day. (Applause) That was spring. Such a spring we can never have again.

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The second day was when Jerusalem became one city and our brave, perhaps most hardened soldiers, the parachutists, embraced with tears and kissed the ancient stones of the remnants of the wall destined to protect the chosen place of God's glory. Our hearts wept with them in remembrance. (Prime Minister Begin spoke briefly in Hebrew.) (Applause)

This is the third day in my life. I have signed a treaty of peace with our great neighbor, with Egypt. The heart is full and overflowing. God gave me the strength to persevere, to survive the horrors of Nazism, and of the Stalinite concentration camp, and some other dangers, to endure, not to waver in, nor flinch from my duty, to accept abuse from foreigners, and what is more painful, from my own people, and even from my close friends. This effort, too, bore some fruit.

Therefore, it is the proper place and the appropriate time to bring back to memory the song and prayer of thanksgiving I learned as a child in the home of father and mother that doesn't exist anymore, because they were among the 6 million people, men, women and children, who sanctified the Lord's name with the sacred blood which reddened the rivers of Europe from the Rhine to the Danube, from the Bug to the Volga, because, only because they were born Jews, and because they didn't have a country of their own, and neither a valiant Jewish army to defend them; and because nobody, nobody came to their rescue, although they cried out, "Save us, save us" -- de profundis, from the depths of the pits, and agony. That is the Song of Degrees, written 2 millenni and 500 years ago when our forefathers returned from their first exile to Jerusalem and Zion. (Prime Minister Begin spoke briefly in Hebrew.)

I will not translate. Every man, whether Jew or Christian or Moslem can read it in his own language in the Book of the Books. It is just Psalm 126. (Applause)

President Sadat, Prime Minister Begin, Egyptian, Israeli and American friends:

Welcome, everyone, to this joyous occasion. We have prayed and worked for peace. Now we humbly give thanks that we can celebrate the beginnings of peace in the Middle East.

The peace that was born today has a meaning that comes down to us through time.

In ancient days, God promised Abraham that from his seed would come many nations, and that promise has been fulfilled. Yet for much too long, the people of Israel and the people of Egypt -- two of the nations of the children of Abraham, trusting in the same God, hoping for the same peace -- knew only enmity between them. That time -- thank God -- is at an end.

After thirty years and four wars, after countless deaths and terrible anguish, we can now see a new era ahead -- an era, we hope, in which violence no longer dominates the Middle East, and the just concerns of all can find peaceful expression.

The path of peace has brought us a long way in a short time.

It was only 16 months ago that President Sadat made his extraordinary and historic journey to Jerusalem, followed by Prime Minister Begin's equally historic visit to Ismailia. Their vision and their courage stirred hope in the hearts of people around the world.

The distance we have come since then is little short of miraculous. There were difficult moments, times when the differences seemed impossible to overcome. But at each of those times, a few simple realities summoned us to renewed effort:

- The knowledge that the people -- of Egypt, of Israel, and of the whole world -- deeply and passionately desired peace;
- The awareness that the process we had embarked upon was the only practical route to progress;
- The obligation we feel to those who have suffered so much, to the young, and to future generations;
- And, above all, the depth of our common faith in a just and merciful God.

These things sustained us, and they have brought us here tonight.

to seize history in their hands and turn it toward peace. Theirs is the vision of the Psalmist: "Behold, how good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity!" (Psalms 133:1)

This is an achievement not only of leaders but of peoples -- strong and creative peoples, proud of past heritage and present achievements and wise enough to know that future well-being can be assured only through cooperation and mutual trust.

Tonight we commemorate not an end but a beginning -- for a treaty between Egypt and Israel is but the first step along the road.

We hope that others will soon join us in our efforts to make this treaty the cornerstone of a comprehensive peace -- a true and lasting peace for the entire Middle East. I welcome and invite those who have held back -- for whatever motive -- to join us. The way is long and hard -- but peace is the way.

We share a vision of a time when all the people of the Middle East may turn their energies to the works of life -- when young people can marry and start families with the hope of seeing and knowing their children's children -- when the old can die quietly after witnessing many a gentle spring. We pray for that time; we shall continue to work for that time.

This is a season of renewal, when the earth brings forth life. The Koran tells us of a Prophet and King of Israel for whom God's power "made the violent wind flow tamely." (S.XXI:81) The Old Testament tells us the words of that same king, the words of Solomon: "To everything there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven." (Ecclesiastes 3:1)

For centuries the people of Israel were dispersed around the world, often despised and persecuted. For centuries the people of Egypt suffered under foreign domination. Only in the past generation have these two proud and ancient peoples again become independent nations.

But that generation has also been a time to die, to pluck up what is planted, a time to kill, a time of breaking down, a time to mourn, a time of weeping, a time to lose, a time to hate and a time for war.

We pray that the season of weeping is past, that now will come a time to heal, a time to plant, a time to build up, a time to laugh, a time to dance, a time to embrace, a time to love. We pray that at last the children of Abraham have come to a time for peace.

And now I would like to propose a toast:

- To the President of the Arab Republic of Egypt, Anwar al-Sadat, and the Prime Minister of the State of Israel, Menachem Begin;
- To the great peoples they serve, the people of Egypt and the people of Israel, now joined together in hope;
- And to the cause we all serve: Salaam; Shalom; to Peace.

TEXT OF REMARKS OF PRESIDENT CARTER
UPON SIGNING THE PEACE TREATY
BETWEEN EGYPT AND ISRAEL

During the past 30 years, Israel and Egypt have waged war. For the past 16 months, these two great nations have waged peace. Today we celebrate a victory -- not of a bloody military campaign, but of an inspiring peace campaign. Two leaders who will loom large in the history of nations -- Anwar al-Sadat and Menachem Begin -- have conducted this campaign with all the courage, tenacity, brilliance and inspiration of any generals who ever led men and machines onto the field of battle.

At the end of this campaign the soil of the two lands is not drenched with young blood. The countrysides of both lands are free from the litter and carnage of a wasteful war. Mothers in Egypt and Israel are not weeping today for their children fallen in senseless battle. The dedication and determination of these two world statesmen have borne fruit. Peace has come.

I honor these two leaders and their government officials who have hammered out this peace treaty which we sign. But most of all I honor the people of these two lands whose yearning for peace kept alive the negotiations which today culminate in this glorious event.

We have won, at least, the first step of peace -- a first step on a long and difficult road. We must not minimize the obstacles that lie ahead. Differences still separate the signatories to this treaty from each other and also from some of their neighbors who fear what they have done. To overcome those differences, to dispel those fears, we must rededicate ourselves to the goal of a broader peace with justice for all who have lived in a state of conflict in the Middle East.

We have no illusions -- we have hopes, dreams, prayers, yes -- but no illusions.

There now remains the rest of the Arab world whose support and cooperation in the peace process is needed and honestly sought. I am convinced that other Arab people need and want peace, but some leaders are not yet willing to honor these needs and desires. We must now demonstrate the advantages of peace, and expand its benefits to encompass all those who have suffered in the Middle East.

Obviously time and understanding will be necessary for people, hitherto enemies, to become neighbors in the best sense of the word. Just because a paper is signed, all the problems will not automatically go away. Future days will require the best from us all to give reality to these lofty aspirations.

Let those who would shatter peace -- who would callously spill blood -- be aware that we three and all others who may join us will vigorously wage peace.

So let history record that deep and ancient antagonism can be settled without bloodshed and staggering waste of precious lives, without rapacious destruction of the land.

It has been said:

"Peace has one thing in common with its enemy,
with the

Fiend it battles, with war --

Peace is active, not passive;

Peace is doing, not waiting;

Peace is aggressive -- attacking;

Peace plans its strategy and encircles
the enemy;

Peace marshals its forces and storms
the gates;

Peace gathers its weapons and pierces
the defense;

Peace, like war, is waged."

It is true that we cannot enforce trust and cooperation between nations, but we can use all our strength to see that nations do not go to war.

Our religious doctrines give us hope.

In the Koran we read: "But if the enemy incline towards peace, do thou also incline towards peace, and trust in God: for He is the One that heareth and knoweth all things." (S.viii.61)

The prophet Isaiah said: "Nations shall beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruninghooks: nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war any more." (Isaiah 2:4)

Let us now lay aside war. Let us now reward all the children of Abraham who hunger for a comprehensive peace in the Middle East. Let us now enjoy the adventure of becoming fully human, neighbors, even brothers and sisters. We pray God that these dreams will come true.
