DELPHIN AND ROMAIN, duo pianists, have been performing as an ensemble since 1967. They made their New York concerto debut at Carnegie Hall in 1977 with the Symphony of the New World under the baton of Everett Lee. Outstanding engagements since then have included an appearance with the Atlanta Symphony, two recitals for standing-room only audiences at the Spoleto Festival, U.S.A., and most recently, the opening night recital for the Kennedy Center's First National Black Music Colloquium and Competition. They have just returned from a national recital tour which included performances in Houston, San Francisco, and Seattle among others. In the 1980-81 season they will make their debut with the New Orleans Philharmonic and will tour throughout the southeastern states under the auspices of the Southern Arts Federation.

Both pianists received doctorates from the University of Southern Mississippi. In addition to their concert careers both musicians are Artists-in-Residence at the College of Charleston in South Carolina. Wilfred Delphin is a native of Eldorado, Arkansas, and Edwin Romain is from New Orleans, Louisiana.

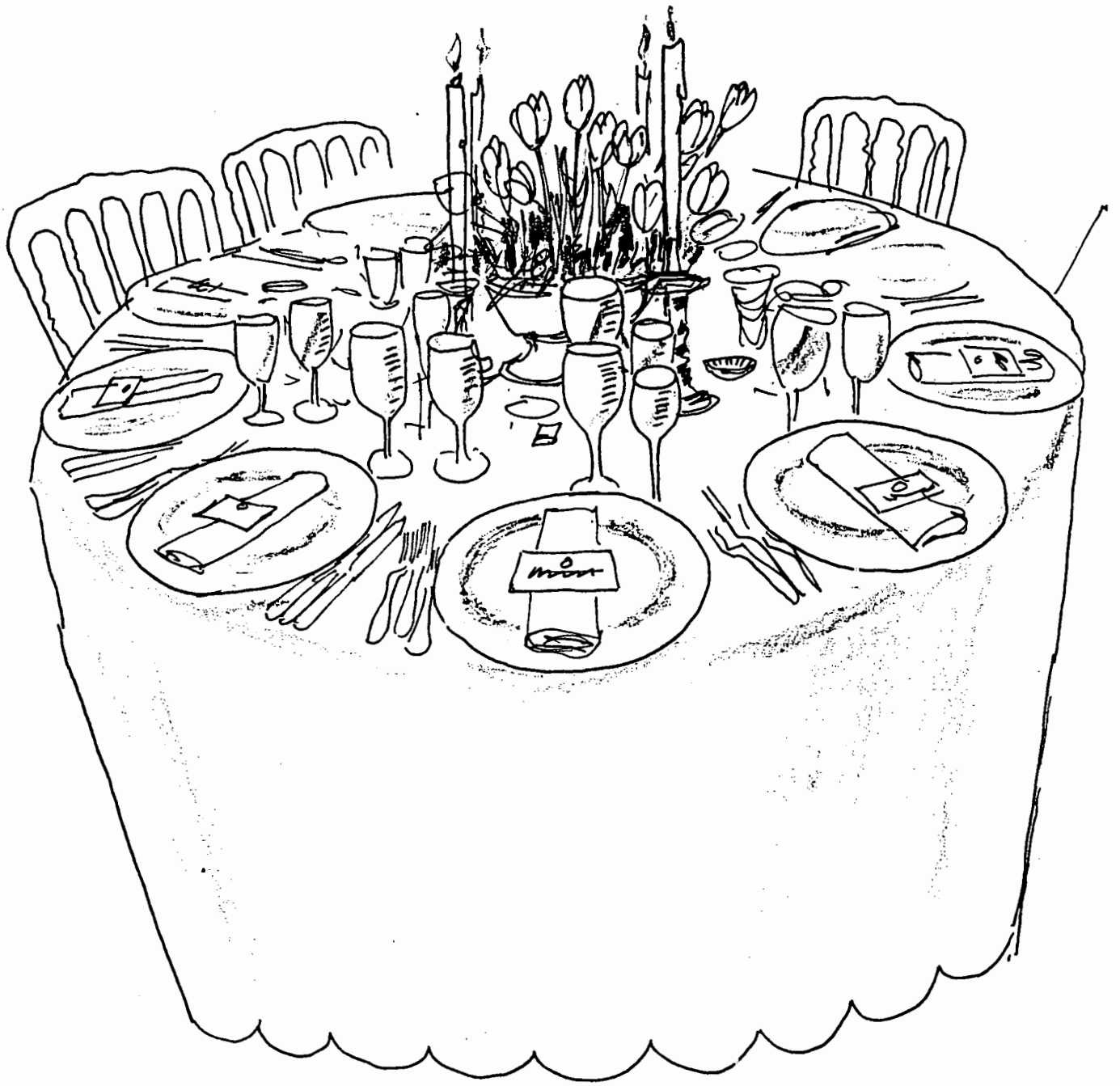

BACKGROUND-DECORATIONS

The tables will be set on white linen cloths with the Truman china and vermeil flatware. All of the centerpieces and candlesticks are from the vermeil collection which was given to the White House in 1958 by Margaret Biddle. (Vermeil is the process of overlaying sterling silver with gold) A variety of containers are used for holding flowers in centerpieces such as wine coolers and urns. The piece in the center of the President's table is a bowl dated 1830 made by the Scottish firm of D. C. Rait. A hunting scene is depicted complete with hounds chasing a rabbit, and riders on horseback. The rest of the containers are English-made during the same period of time. There are mythological scenes depicted on these - both Roman and Greek - and neo-classical in feeling. The candlesticks on all the tables are English-made during the early 19th century. The designs are mostly floral and leaf carvings.

White tulips are arranged all over the State floor, in particular, around the platform in the East Room. These are used in combination with buddlea (the fragrant flower) and white glacier ivy in the centerpieces.

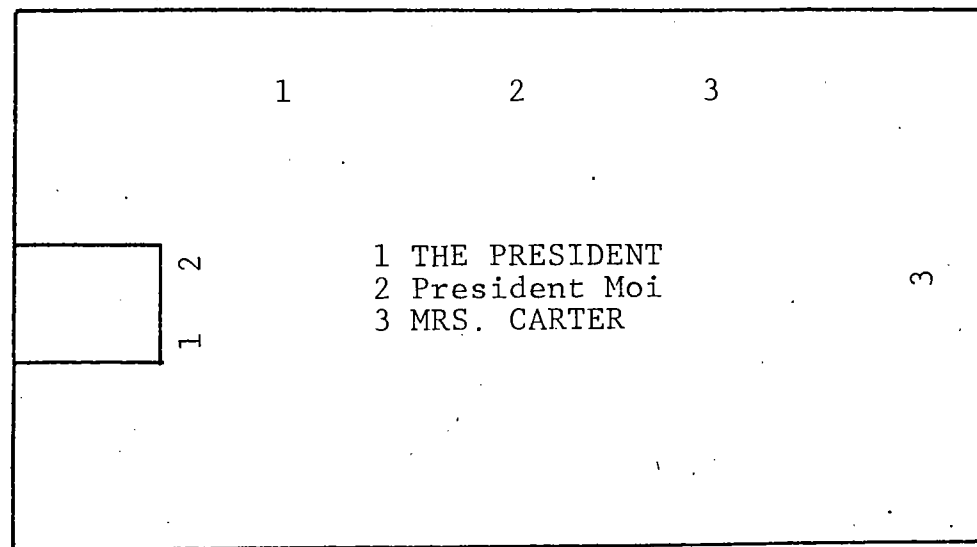

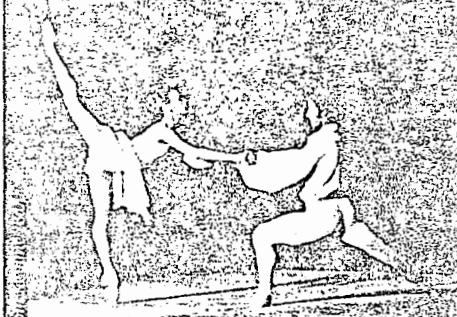
