Talking Points with Cardinal Sin

-- The United States encourages more emphasis upon fulfilling the needs and dignity of the Philippine people; we deeply respect the Cardinal's important and continuing role in this field.

-- U.S. leaders continue to advocate the achievement of these goals whenever there is an appropriate occasion. Cardinal Sin will remember that Vice President Mondale, with whom he met during the former's trip to Manila in early May, raised human rights with President Marcos and others in authority.

-- We understand that in recent weeks there has been some improvement in the human rights situation in the Philippines -- such as the release of detainees, and a new dialogue between the government and opposition leaders.

-- We are concerned over serious problems which remain and will work for further improvements.

-- We would appreciate the Cardinal's evaluation of the current human rights situation.

-- What does Sin view as the role of the Catholic Church in the Philippines where the large majority of the population is of that faith?

-- What is Sin's assessment of the position of the Catholic Church in Southeast Asia today?

THE WHITE HOUSE

Mrs. Rosalynn Carter will head the U.S. delegation of five dignitaries who will attend the funeral of Pope Paul VI in Rome on Saturday.

In addition to Mrs. Carter, the delegates will be Senator Edward M. Kennedy (D-Mass.); Governor Hugh L. Carey (D-N.Y.); Congressman Robert N. Giaimo (D-Conn.); David Walters, personal representative of the President to the Vatican; and Leonel J. Castillo, Commissioner of Immigration and Naturalization.

On Saturday, August 12 at 6 pm (Rome time), the representatives will attend the state funeral for His Holiness Paul VI at St. Peter's Square. On Sunday there will be a reception for the Sacred College of Cardinals in the Consistorial Hall of the Papal Palace, Vatican City, in order to receive condolences from foreign delegations. The American delegation will attend the reception.

With the exception of Senator Kennedy, the delegation will leave by military jet from Andrews Air Force Base at 9 pm tonight, and arrive in Rome at approximately 1:30 pm (Rome time) Friday. Senator Kennedy will remain in Washington for legislative work Friday, then fly to Rome in time for the funeral.

The entire group will return to Washington Sunday evening, August 13.

Italy

OFFICIAL NAME: Italian Republic

PEOPLE

Italy is a country in which linguistic and religious homogeneity combines with cultural, economic, and political diversity. Although 99 percent of the people are nominally Catholic, political power is distributed among six major political parties, ranging from neo-Fascist to Communist.

Italian culture, which reached a high point in the Renaissance (of which evidences are to be seen all over Italy), has exerted an uneven influence on the development of Western civilization in the last 350 years. Today Italian artists, critics, writers, sculp-

tors, filmmakers, architects, musicians, composers, dancers, and designers continue to make a considerable contribution to Western culture.

Italy has the fifth highest density in Europe—some 483 persons per square mile (186 per sq. km.). Minority groups are small, the largest being the German-speaking people of Bolzano Province and the Slovenes around Trieste. In addition, there are ancient communities of Albanian, Greek, Ladino, and French origin. Although Roman Catholicism is the official religion of the Republic of Italy, the Constitution provides that all religious faiths are equally free before the law.

OFFICIAL NAME: State of the Vatican City

GEOGRAPHY AND PEOPLE

The Vatican City occupies an area of 109 acres situated entirely within the city of Rome. In addition to St. Peter's Basilica and the Vatican Apostolic Palace, its museums, archives, and library, the Vatican City consists of a number of administrative and ecclesiastical buildings, a "village" of apartments, and the Vatican Gardens. In accordance with the Lateran Pacts of 1929, the Italian Government extends the right of extraterritoriality and tax exemption, but not papal sovereignty, to certain churches and buildings located outside the confines of the Vatican City.

Population is about 1,000, which includes more than a dozen nationalities, but Italians and Swiss predominate. Citizenship is usually accorded only to persons who reside in Vatican City by reason of office or employment and, with certain restrictions, to their families.

Italian is the language of common use, although official acts of the Holy See are drawn up in Latin.

HISTORY

For many centuries the Popes held temporal sovereignty over the Papal States, which included a broad band of territory across central Italy as well as the city of Rome. In 1861, at the time of the general unification of Italy under the Kingdom of Sardinia, almost all of the papal dominion was acquired by that kingdom, following popular plebiscites and conquests by the Italian army. The Pope's sovereignty was then confined to Rome and its environs. In 1870 Rome itself was incorporated forcibly into the new Kingdom of Italy. In 1871 the Italian Parliament enacted the Law of Guarantees, which assured the Pope's spiritual freedom, an income, and special status for the Vatican area. However, Pope Pius IX and his successors refused to acknowledge the validity of these laws, preferring instead to impose on themselves the status of prisoners in the Vatican. This state of affairs lasted until February 11, 1929, when the Holy See and the Italian Government signed in the Lateran

Holy See signed with Italy on February 11, 1929. **SUFFRAGE:** College of Cardinals elects Pope for life. **FLAG:** Vertical bands of yellow and white, with crossed keys of St. Peter and papal tiara centered on the white band.

Economy

The Vatican City does not engage in the economically productive activity common to other states. It is almost entirely dependent for income from charitable contributions.

Palace three agreements regulating the dispute: (1) a treaty recognizing the independence and sovereignty of the State of the Vatican City; (2) a concordat fixing the relations between the government and the church within Italy; and (3) a financial convention providing the Holy See with compensation for its losses in 1870.

GOVERNMENT

Pope Paul VI was elected the 263rd Supreme Pontiff of the Roman Catholic Church on June 21, 1963, succeeding Pope John XXIII. As Pope he possesses supreme legislative, executive, and judicial power within the Vatican City.

The Secretary of State, presently Jean Cardinal Villot, is the second ranking official at the Vatican. His responsibilities include conducting diplomatic relations for the Holy See.

The Pope delegates the internal administration of the Vatican City to the Pontifical Commission for the State of Vatican City which is assisted by the Administration of the Patrimony of the Apostolic See. Cardinal Villot is President of both these commissions. He is assisted by Sergio Cardinal Guerri, Pro-President of the Pontifical Commission for the State of Vatican City. Everyday affairs of the Vatican City are managed by a layman, Marchese Giulio Sacchetti, Special Delegate of the Pontifical Commission for the State of Vatican City.

Judicial power is handled by a local tribunal in cases of the first instance; appeals go to the Sacred Roman Rota and then to the Supreme Tribunal of

SUBJECT: Possible Meeting with Cardinal Arns

The human rights situation in Brazil has not changed very much since you met Cardinal Arns in Rio in April. The major human rights issue in Brazil continues to be the pace at which Brazil will proceed towards a restoration of the rule of law. In this effort, Arns believes that the government is moving too slowly; there are other liberals in Brazil who are more satisfied with the pace.

The election campaign has grown more complicated since April. While General Figueredo is still the likely candidate to be the next President, there is still a possibility that Figueredo may lose sufficient support from within the military as well as among the people that either Geisel would replace him or another candidate--General Euler has been suggested as one--might be selected when the Electoral College meets on October 15, 1978.

You may want to ask Cardinal Arns about three subjects:

- How he sees the pace of political democratization in Brazil at this time and his hope and expectation for the future.

- How he views President Carter's trip in April; whether it facilitated democratization.

- What he thinks we ought to be doing towards Brazil in the future.

STATEMENT BY THE PRESIDENT

The President issued the following statement concerning the death of Pope Paul VI:

"I was deeply saddened to learn of the death of Pope Paul VI, a man whose life and works have served me personally as a source of great moral inspiration. As a man of peace and profound spirituality he will be greatly missed, not only by all Roman Catholics, but by all people, whatever their religious convictions.

"Of Pope Paul's many contributions, two stand out for me at this sad moment. First, his untiring efforts in the ecumenical movement; not only was he inspired in the cause of humanity to pursue greater unity of purpose within the Catholic Church, but also among all other faiths. Second, Pope Paul's world travels, at no small expense to his own physical well being, exemplified his role of pilgrim, carrying the message of peace and love to the far corners of the world, including an inspiring visit to the United States.

"During his fifteen years as Pontiff, the voice of Paul VI served as a clear moral beacon to a troubled world. With his passing, we have all been deprived of a strong voice for reason, for moderation, and for peace."

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Lawrence Joseph Cardinal Shehan

Born in Baltimore, March 18, 1898, Cardinal Shehan graduated from The North American College in Rome in 1923. He was ordained a Roman Catholic priest in 1922 and was pastor at St. Patrick's church in Washington, D.C. from 1941-45. In Bridgeport, Connecticut, he was named first Bishop in 1953, Archbishop of Baltimore in 1961 and served as such until he was elevated to Cardinal in 1965. He served as a Consultor, Post-Conciliar Commission for Revision Code of Canon Law; President of the Permanent Commission for International Eucharistic Congresses, 1969-73; and as Papal Legate for the 40th International Eucharistic Congress.

John Francis Cardinal Dearden

Archbishop of Detroit

Born in Rhode Island in 1907, Dearden did his theological studies in Rome and was ordained in 1932. He was then posted in Cleveland and became titular bishop of Sarepta in 1948. In 1950, he was named bishop of Pittsburgh and held that office until nominated to his present position in 1959. Dearden was named to the College of Cardinals in 1969. He is a member of the Congregation for the Sacraments.

John J. Cardinal Carberry

Archbishop of St. Louis

Primarily a scholar, Cardinal Carberry is the recipient of advanced degrees in theology, canon law and civil law. He was ordained a priest in 1929 and appointed titular bishop of Elis in 1956, subsequently became bishop of Columbus, Ohio and, in 1968, archbishop of St. Louis. The following year he was made cardinal by Pope Paul. He is President of the Center of Applied Research in the Apostolate. He is a member of the Congregation for the Evangelization of Nations.

Luis Cardinal Aponte Martinez

Archbishop of San Juan

Born in Lajas, Puerto Rico in 1922, Cardinal Aponte Martinez was a student at St. John's Seminary in Boston and graduated in 1950. He was ordained a priest in 1950 and served as a pastor in several churches in Puerto Rico from 1950-1960. He served as auxillary bishop of Ponce, P.R., from 1960-1963 and as archbishop of San Juan from 1964 to the present. He was elevated to cardinal in 1973 and presently serves as the Chancellor of the Catholic University of Puerto Rico.

Patrick Aloysius Cardinal O'Boyle

A retired cardinal, Cardinal O'Boyle was born in Scranton, Pennsylvania on July 18, 1896. He graduated from St. Joseph's Seminary in New York (1921), and the N.Y. School for Social Work (1931). He was ordained a Roman Catholic priest in 1921 and served at St. Columa's Church from 1921-26. After serving on the boards of several charities throughout the 1940's, he was consecrated archbishop of the Diocese of Washington, D.C. on January 14, 1948, from which he retired in 1973. He was elevated to cardinal on June 26, 1967 and he resides in Washington.

John Cardinal Wright

Born in Boston July 18, 1909, Cardinal Wright graduated from Boston College in 1931, and studied at St. John's Seminary, 1932. He also attended Gergorian University of Rome, 1936 (S.T.D., 1939) and has received more than 20 honorary degrees from American and Canadian colleges and universities.

He was ordained a Roman Catholic priest in 1935. He was named first bishop of Worcester, Massachusetts, 1950-1959; bishop of Pittsburgh from 1959-1969; elevated to cardinal in 1969 and has been prefect of the Vatican Congregation of Clergy.

He is the author of National Patriotism in Papal Teaching, 1939; The Pope and the War, 1944; The Christian and the Law, Words in Pain; The Church: The Hope of the World; and many articles on Catholic teaching.

Terence Cardinal Cooke

Archbishop of New York

Most of Cardinal Cooke's life as a priest has been spent in the New York area, but he is a graduate of Catholic University in Washington. After ordination in 1945, he worked in parishes in the Bronx and in New York State and also for a time Assistant Director of the Catholic Youth Organization. He then went on to become secretary to Cardinal Spellman and also became bishop in 1965. Nominated bishop of New York in 1968, Cooke was created cardinal the following year. His Vatican responsibilities include the Congregation for Bishops, for Oriental Churches and for the Evangelization of Nations.

James Cardinal McIntyre
Archbishop of Los Angeles

Born on June 25, 1886, Cardinal McIntyre worked in private industry until being ordained a priest of the Roman Catholic Church in 1921. He was an assistant at St. Gabriels Church in New York City from 1921-23; appointed assistant in Chancery Office, 1923; and then Chancellor, 1934. He was appointed Domestic Prelate in 1936 and served as an auxiliary Bishop in New York. He was ordained as titular Bishop Cyrene in 1946 and has served as the Archbishop of Los Angeles from 1948.

John Cardinal Krol
Archbishop of Philadelphia

Cardinal Krol is 68 years old. After studies in theology and law, he was ordained a priest in 1953. Much of his early work was in the mid-west and he was consecrated bishop, becoming an auxiliary bishop of Cleveland in 1953. Krol was elevated to the College of Cardinals in 1967 and has since been a member of the Congregations for Evangelization of Nations, for Oriental Churches, and for the Doctrine of Faith. He has also been much interested in media, and has variously been chairman of the National Catholic Office for Radio and Television, the twin Office for Motion Pictures and the Catholic Communications Foundation. Amongst his many distinctions, Cardinal Krol was Undersecretary for the Second Vatican Council; he is the recipient of numerous awards and decorations.

John Cardinal Cody
Archbishop of Chicago

Cardinal Cody has been a priest since 1931 and a bishop since 1954. His earlier bishoprics include Kansas City in Saint Joseph's and New Orleans. Since becoming cardinal in 1967, Cody has been particularly active, and his offices include the Congregations for Divine Worship, Evangelization of Nations, and the Clergy. His wide ranging interests include forestry and scouting (He is member of the regional board of the Boy Scouts of America.)

William Wakefield Cardinal Baum

Archbishop of Washington

Born in Dallas in 1926, the eloquent Cardinal Baum has been a priest since 1951. After his ordination he served in parishes throughout Missouri until he was consecrated bishop of Springfield-Cape Girardeau in 1970. In 1976 Baum was elevated by Pope Paul VI to the rank of cardinal. As such he sits on the Congregation for Catholic Education and on the Secretariat for non-Christians. Cardinal Baum is also a prominent ecumenist: he has been Executive Director of the Bishops Commission on Ecumenical and Religious Affairs, member of the Joint Working Group of the Catholic Church and Working Council of churches and a member of the Mixed Commission of Representatives of the Catholic Church and Lutheran World Federation. Cardinal Baum has published a book, The Teaching of Cardinal Cajetan on the Sacrifices of the Mass.

Maria Pia Fanfani

Wife of Amintore Fanfani, President of Italian Senate, Former Prime Minister.

Mrs. Fanfani will be on hand to greet Mrs. Carter, in an unofficial capacity, when the delegation arrives in Rome. We understand she would like to call on Mrs. Carter unofficially at the Residence. The Italian Foreign Ministry, concerned with the reactions of other delegations, is not enthusiastic, but we would not consider it inappropriate for Mrs. Carter to receive her.

Mrs. Fanfani, who is in her fifties, is well known for her ebullient spirits and personal warmth. She is attractive and dynamic, and noted for her talents as an artistic photographer. She has done some very good photographic work on Washington. Mrs. Fanfani entertained the President's aunt, Mrs. Dolvin, last year in Rome. She is unpretentious and would enjoy developing a "first name" relationship with Mrs. Carter.

Timothy Cardinal Manning

Archbishop of Los Angeles

Born in Cork, Ireland in 1909, Cardinal Manning came to the United States in 1928 and was naturalized in 1945. He was ordained a priest of the Roman Catholic Church in 1934 after attending St. Patrick's Seminary in California. He was Assistant Pastor at the Immaculate Conception Church in Los Angeles from 1934-35 and was consecrated a Bishop in 1946. He has served as Archbishop of Los Angeles from 1946 to the present. He was created a Cardinal in 1973 and he resides in California.

BIOGRAPHIC SKETCH

SIN, Cardinal Jaime L. (Philippines)

Cardinal Sin was born in New Washington Aklan (Panay) on August 31, 1928 the seventh of nine children. He studied for the priesthood at the San Vincente de Ferrer Seminary and was ordained in 1954. He rose steadily in his career being named Archbishop of Manila in 1974 over the heads of many more senior candidates. In April 1976 he was elevated to Cardinal.

Cardinal Sin has been generally considered a middle-of-the-roader with lines out to both the conservative and liberal wings of his church. He has become increasingly critical of the Marcos government, particularly its human rights record.

Cardinal Sin, while consistently trying to retain some leverage with Marcos by not identifying himself too closely with the opposition leaders, issued on April 13, 1978, an open letter urging the citizenry to come forward if they had witnessed fraud in the April 7 Interim Legislature election and calling upon the Election Commission to punish the guilty regardless of position. Marcos called on him after the election and assured him that an investigation will be made into the fraud charges.

In one celebrated case this year, Sin arrived at the airport to enplane for Rome, to be told that his name was on the list of those not permitted to leave the country. After urgent calls to the Presidential Palace, Sin was permitted to depart, and Marcos later apologized for the incident.

Vice President Mondale met with Cardinal Sin, along with other opinion leaders -- including members of the opposition -- during his trip to Manila in early May 1978.
