Re: Random notes on Vienna

1. Several points about the Saturday excursion to Melk and Durnstein:

(a) Mrs. Herma Kirchsclaeger, wife of the Austrian President, will accompany RSC to Melk and Durnstein. Also going will be Mrs. Pahr, the wife of the Foreign Minister, whom I assume will ride with Mrs. Vance. Both ladies speak English, and there will also be an interpreter with your party.

(b) After discussing the train trip yesterday with Susan Watkins, we have dropped it in favor of returning to Vienna by motorcade. The trainride actually would have taken longer, and it is not attractive -- passes through lots of industrial slums.

(c) After much discussion, Susan feels that she must recommend lunch at the Hotel Schloss Durnstein rather than at another local restaurant. Through no fault of hers, plans for RSC to have lunch there had already proceeded without our approval through the Austrian Protocol Office and our Embassy Control Officer. Susan feels that if we refuse to have lunch at the Hotel Schloss, it might create a small diplomatic incident. In addition, she did some comparative menu-shopping and found that the Hotel Schloss isn't much more expensive than the other alternatives, and is a lot more attractive. She ate there yesterday -- said the clientele was a mixture of tourists and local people. I back her recommendation.

(d) Although you won't actually visit the premises of the wine cooperative (very dark; narrow, steep stairs), there will be samples of the local wines at the church courtyard festivities for RSC to taste.

2. The President's working dinner with Brezhnev on Saturday evening will not be at the Residence -- note the U.S. Embassy as originally outlined. That means that RSC would have her first opportunity to meet Brezhnev around 7:30 Saturday evening. I'm sure that, regardless of what other dinner option she may choose, she will want to delay leaving the Residence until after the Russians arrive. Incidentally, the inn in the Vienna Woods that we mentioned the other day is only about a 20-minute drive from the Residence -- not 45. Susan highly recommends it.

3. For what it's worth, Madeline, the Austrian Police maintain that they need an hour's notice on any Amy excursions.

4. Mary, the hotel where you and the official party will stay is not air-conditioned.

5. Ambassador Wolf is pushing for RSC to present some kind of award to an American-born actress, Ruth Brinkman, for her contributions to promoting Anglo-American culture in Austria. Ms. Brinkman is married to an Austrian and started an English-speaking theatre in Vienna. Not only do they perform American and British plays, they also go around to local schools. Queen Elizabeth gave Ms. Brinkman the OBE or some such thing a few months ago. Ms. Brinkman has been invited to Mrs. Wolf's tea, and some kind of little presentation could be made privately at that time. I'm not crazy about this idea, but suppose it could be done conveniently and privately either before or after Mrs. Wolf's reception on Sunday afternoon. What do you think?

6. The Mayor of Vienna wanted to host a small official luncheon for RSC after church and the Spanish Riding School performance Sunday. I told Susan to decline gracefully -- the request just surfaced today.

That's all I can think of for now. A new revised schedule is attached.

Places Mrs. Carter will be visiting in Austria

MELK

Situated in the Wachau region on the Danube River, upstream from Vienna, this Lower Austrian town of Melk has been a major attraction for many centuries. Called Nomare by the Romans, it served as a border fortress against the Hungarians. Duke Leopold I of the Babenbergs conquered it in 976. Nine years later he founded the famous abbey into which the Benedictines moved in 1089. The abbey is a masterpiece of Austrian Baroque. Designed by Architect Jakob Prandtauer, it was built between 1702 and 1736 on solid rock some 185 feet high overlooking the Danube. Approximately 1,200 priceless manuscripts, some about 1,000 years old, and 80,000 treasured books are kept in the abbey's library. Benedictines, currently housed in the abbey, care for the spiritual needs of nearby parishes and maintain a prestigious secondary school on the premises.

DÜRNSTEIN

Dürnstein is nestled in a bend of the Danube in Austria's Wachau region, halfway between Linz and Vienna. England's King Richard The Lion-Hearted, returning from the Third Crusade in 1193, was reportedly captured and kept prisoner in the castle of the Kuenring Knights. The ruins of the castle look down on Durnstein from the mountain top directly behind the city. Legend says that Richard was traced by the singer Blondel, who effected his release after payment of a large ransom. The baroque parish church of Durnstein was built by Architects J. Munggenast and Matthias Steindl between 1721 and 1728. Durnstein attracts tourists, connoisseurs of wine and painters. Two monasteries, the Town Hall and many other buildings ranging from the Romanesque to the Baroque are monuments to Central European architecture.

Having just returned from a survey trip to Vienna, I wanted you to know the options I saw for your separate schedule in Austria.

Attached are:

- (1) Proposed schedule
- (2) List of sites on schedule with brief descriptions of those sites
- (3) List of other possibilities for your schedule

Should any of these in attachment (3) be of particular interest to you, I can of course incorporate them into the schedule.

Everything is tentative until the President's schedule is set, however, there is one item on the proposed schedule that I will need an answer on as soon as possible.

The Spanish Riding School (Lippizaner horses) gives two regularly scheduled performances on Sunday at 10:45 am and 7:00 pm. I have proposed that you attend the 7:00 pm performance. Due to the heavy demand for tickets, I must let the Austrian government know as soon as possible if you would like to attend that performance.

There is also the possibility of having a special performance performed in your honor. (It has been done in the past for other visiting dignitaries.) If you would rather see the Lippizaner horses on Saturday, I will need to know so that I can make a request to the Austrian government for the special performance.

After my short time in Austria, I have concluded that the Austrians are primarily proud of their music and their wine. (There is also a saying in Vienna that when an Austrian is born he dreams of becoming a Choir Boy, a Lippizaner horse rider and a retired government worker!)

There are numerous Gothic buildings of note, museums and parks. My recommendations are those that are listed in the schedule.

I should say that I did visit the home of Sigmund Freud and don't recommend that you go there unless it is merely for the symbol of saying that you were interested enough to go. There is nothing to see. Most of Dr. Freud's furniture and belongings are in London with Anna Freud and what is left is not much. There are a few display cases with the original editions of the books of Dr. Freud in German in 3 small rooms.

Mrs. Barbara Esham will be Amy's control officer if Amy accompanies you on the visit. Mrs. Esham has a daughter who is 11 years old.

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DESCRIPTIONS OF ITEMS ON PROPOSED SCHEDULE

VIENNA, AUSTRIA

MELK, AUSTRIA: When Babenbergs, Austria's first dynasty came to the country in 976, they erected their first residence on the cliff where today there stands one of the grandest Baroque Abbeys, the masterpiece of Jakob Prandtauer, one of the most expansive monasteries in the world, with staterooms, library and church (altar by Antonio Beduzzi) all with magnificent frescoes by Paul Troger and Michael Rottmayr.

At the end of the 11c, Leopold III von Babenberg handed over his castle to the Benedictines, who converted it into a fortified abbey. The Abbey of Melk is the apogee of Baroque architecture in Austria.

WACHAU: A stretch of the Danube between Melk and Krems, Lower Austria, where the river passes through high hills. The area has many castles - from which the knights used to control river traffic - but otherwise consists of small towns whose main occupation is wine growing and processing.

DÜRNSTEIN: The castle, 500 ft. above the town, is where Richard the Lionhearted of England was held prisoner in 1193.

The Hotel Schloss Durnstein was originally the castle of the family who owned this area of the Wachau and controlled traffic on the river from this castle. The view from the terrace is delightful.

WINZERGENOSSENSCHAFT (Durnstein Wine Cooperative): The wine cellar was built by the local priest in 1692 and then sold in 1815 to private interests. In 1938 the cooperative was formed with 250 members. Today 900 members belong to the cooperative. The cellars hold 10 million liters of wine and cognac. Many consider the white wine of the region to be the superior wine of Austria.

SCHÖNBRUNN PALACE: Summer residence of the Hapsburgs, original building 1669 by J. B. Fischer von Erlach, altered 1744-1749 by N. Pacassi. Magnificent gala-rooms with famous pictures. Famous baroque garden by F. von Hohenburg, with "Gloriette," Zoo and "Palmenhaus".

Coach museum with state coaches, equipages and sleds of the Hapsburgs.

ST. STEPHEN'S CHURCH: Most important building of Gothic in Austria, building history from 1150 to today. Though heavily damaged in 1945 by fire-bombs, it was reconstructed with money from all the provinces of Austria. The South tower is Vienna's most famous landmark and the North tower contains the giant bell "Pummerin".

HOFBURG: Winter residence of the Hapsburgs. The enormous complex embraces the style of many eras and contains the Castle Chapel (where the Vienna Boys Choir sings at Sunday Mass), the Spanish Riding School, Crown Jewels, Imperial Apartments, National Library and numerous museums.

It is my recommendation that you visit the Great Hall of the Austrian National Library at Hofburg which is a magnificent room of Baroque architecture and decoration. The museum has a fine collection of old manuscripts and the library has indicated that they would be willing to set up a few of the original music manuscripts of Beethoven, Mozart, Schubert, Strauss etc. for you to view in the Great Hall.

The other halls at the Hofburg can be seen, but many of them are similar to those you will see elsewhere. (The Imperial Apartments are similar but not as spectacular as those at Schönbrunn Palace.)

If time permits in the schedule, we can include one of the museums. I would recommend the Museum of Musical Instruments containing many of the old instruments that were played by the musical giants such as Beethoven.

SPANISH RIDING SCHOOL: The performance of the Lippizaner horses is one of the main attractions of Vienna. The feats you will see performed date back to the second half of the 16th century.

AUGARTEN PORCELAIN FACTORY: Though I did not have a chance to see the factory, I am told that it quite interesting. Augarten porcelain is lovely and the Austrian people are very proud of this porcelain.

VIENNA BOYS CHOIR: The school and residence of the boys in this famous choir is located next to the Augarten Porcelain factory on the Augarten Palace grounds. The choir only performs at Mass at the Chapel on the Hofburg grounds on Sunday mornings. However, you could attend a rehearsal at the school and hear a few selections.

DEMEL'S or the HOTEL SACHER: The tortes and pasteries of Vienna are famous and stopping for tea at either of these landmarks of Vienna is part of the life of Vienna.

ADDITIONAL SIGHTS IN AUSTRIA

SOS CHILDRENS VILLAGE: The first SOS Childrens Village was founded in Austria. It is a village of homes, each with a house mother, that houses 10-12 orphan children and gives preference to children with psychological or even physical disorders resulting from the loss of their natural family. The first village was founded in 1949 at the time of dire need.

Though there are a number of these villages throughout the world, there are none in the United States. Mrs. Wolf, the wife of the Ambassador, has put forward the idea that you visit the village with the thought that it might help in establishing a village in the U. S.

It is my recommendation that you do not go to the village. There is nothing to "see" as such and it would take half a day out of the Vienna schedule. I am a bit afraid that you might be put in the position of promoting the establishment of these villages which we do not know enough about.

Home of Sigmund Freud

Historical sites associated with the "greats" of classical music:

- Ludwig van Beethoven Shrine
- Beethoven Memorial House
- Haydn Museum
- Mozart Memorial Room in the "Figaro House"
- Franz Schubert Museum
- Johann Strauss Flat

In most cases only a few rooms at these sites are open to the public. A visit would in most cases be seen as a gesture indicating interest in music (though you are going to the opera). There is not much to see in these sites, but if you were to chose one I would recommend the Beethoven house. (Franz Schubert was the only one of these composers who was a native of Vienna.)
