Guidelines for Functions Held in
the Executive Residence

Attached is a list of guidelines for planning and conducting briefings and receptions in the Executive Residence. The Social Office will be meeting soon with some of your mid and lower-level staff to review them.

I would appreciate your support.

GUIDELINES FOR FUNCTIONS HELD IN THE EXECUTIVE MANSION

In response to many recent questions regarding use of the Executive Residence, the following guidelines have been compiled for your review and compliance.

USE

- 1) A briefing and/or reception can be held in the House only if either the President or the First Lady is attending the event.
- 2) The Residence can only be used for official functions after public tour hours, which take from 8A.M. to 2:30 P.M. during June, July and August, and until 1:30 P.M. the other months.

SPONSORING OFFICE PARTICIPATION

- 1) Each staff office will assign one person to act as the liaison with the Social Office for each event.
- 2) The staff office liaison will meet with the Social Office at early event planning sessions, if possible, so that key preliminary logistical decisions can be made correctly early on.
- 3) The sponsoring office should request press coverage if desired.
- 4) The Social Office will brief the senior or mid-level person in the staff office on all arrangements to assure that all planning reflects the event objectives.
- 5) The staff liaison will meet with the Social Secretary, Gretchen Poston, one hour before the event to walk through the scenario.
- 6) The staff office liaison must notify the Social Secretary before any last-minute scenario or logistical changes are made.
- 7) A senior representative of the staff office sponsoring the event should attend the briefing or reception to meet the guests.
- 8) No staff, except the staff office liaison and senior staff, should be standing in the cross hall on the Ground or State floors before or during a briefing. If staff have to attend, then they must enter the briefing room as soon as they arrive and stand along the rear or side walls. The cross halls must be kept clear for the President, First Lady and Secret Service.

SUPPLEMENTARY PERSONNEL

- 1) Social aides are fully briefed one hour before each event and are the only persons responsible for ushering guests. Staff are not permitted to seat guests or give directions to the Social aides.

This also means that the staff must not interfere with the internal operations of the Residence staff. Additionally, any compliments, suggestions or complaints concerning the Residence staff should be conveyed through Gretchen Poston.

SUBSTITUTE LOCATIONS

- 1) All Rose Garden events automatically are moved to Room 450, OEOD in the event of rain.
- 2) The First Family's Theatre will be restricted in the future because of the new availability of optional briefing rooms which are being restored (including the Treaty Room) in the OEOD. Briefings held in the Theatre are for under 70 persons and must end before 3:00 P.M.

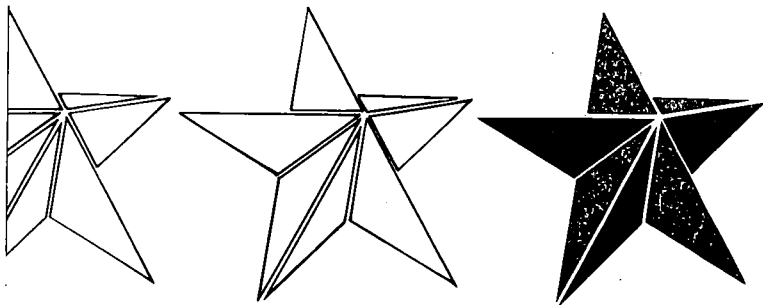

"... THERE IS NO EFFORT UNDERWAY TO MAKE A CHALLENGE IN AN AGGRESSIVE WAY ON THIS PARTICULAR ISSUE. BUT WE ARE CONCERNED THAT THERE BE A CONTINUAL RECOGNITION THAT OUR CLAIM AND OUR INTENTION AND OUR RECOGNITION IS FOR THREE MILES, AND BEYOND THAT WE DO NOT HAVE ANY SPECIFIC RECOGNITION FOR THOSE COUNTRIES IN TERMS OF THEIR CLAIM BEYOND THAT LIMIT."

Dear Mr. President:

I have carefully considered your thoughtful letter of July 6. I appreciate your raising these concerns with me in the cordial and open manner that is a hallmark of US-Bolivian relations.

First of all, Mr. President, let me congratulate you and Bolivia's armed forces for your leadership in returning your country to democratic rule. When your government came to office last November, its firm decision to undertake the return to constitutional rule was applauded by my country and Bolivia's friends everywhere. This decision put your country, and its armed forces, in consonance with the Andean region's movement toward democracy, which we see as an important trend for the entire hemisphere. We have been deeply impressed with the way your government carried out the first stage of the electoral process, which merits the respect and admiration of all of us in the Americas. The successful completion of this process with the August 6 inauguration will place Bolivia back in the ranks of democratic countries of the region as well as enhance Bolivia's international standing and capacity to achieve its social, economic, and diplomatic objectives.

On the matter of tin, this is being urgently studied, and I will let you know through Ambassador Boeker what we will be able to do to meet your concerns. Let me assure you that the United States will manage any eventual disposals so as to safeguard against disruption of the tin market and the economic position of producers, including Bolivia. Any sales plans will be developed on the basis of full consultation with the Bolivian government with other producers as well as with the International Tin Council and will be designed, to the best of our abilities, to avoid undue disruption of the international tin market. In addition, my government will work through the international financial institutions and with Bolivia's new leaders to help the new government raise the financial support necessary to back a sound stabilization program.

To express as clearly as possible to the Bolivian people our goodwill and deep appreciation of the country's orderly return to constitutional rule, I am asking my wife, Rosalyn, to represent me at the inauguration of Bolivia's newly-elected president on August 6.

As you approach the final stage of Bolivia's return to constitutional rule, Mr. President, a process which you have so steadfastly overseen, let me wish you and your people full success in this historic venture, and all the best to you personally in the future.

Bolivia Seeks U.S. Economic Aid

LA PAZ, Bolivia, July 12 — Plans to transfer power next month from Bolivia's military rulers to a democratically elected government are putting President Carter's human rights policy on the spot, according to politicians and diplomats here.

Bolivia, the poorest country in South America, expects substantial U.S. economic aid in return for holding free elections and scrapping 15 years of military rule.

However, U.S. diplomats here say that despite promoting human rights and democracy in Central and South America for the past two years, the United States is not in a position to offer Bolivia the amounts of new economic assistance or other rewards that Bolivians anticipate.

"There is still some flexibility (in U.S. aid programs), but not what we need," said one high ranking American diplomat here. "It's a part of our human rights policy where our mechanisms are not where our mouths are."

Yet without this aid, most Bolivian politicians — from Marcelo Quiroga Santa Cruz on the left to Waldo Cerruto on the right — believe that a democratic government will be unable to cope with the country's economic crisis, which threatens political stability here.

As it is, governments in Bolivia tend to rise and fall with the seasons. There was a military coup last summer, and another one late last fall.

Now, however, many Bolivians appear to be fed up with military rule. Both Bolivian and foreign observers believe that if the new democratic government is overthrown, another military regime could run into armed opposition.

For these reasons and because many people here believe the Carter administration was instrumental in persuading the military here to hold elections, many Bolivian politicians will blame the United States if they are forced, once in

office, to take severe austerity measures, which they believe would foment unrest.

"It is in the interest of the United States to support Bolivia," Quiroga Santa Cruz said in an interview. "This is the first country to go through this process. It's very important because it will set a precedent."

The scheduled elections will make Bolivia the first South American country since 1973 to trade a military dictatorship for a democracy.

But Bolivia's economic plight and its history of revolving-door governments has aroused a measure of pessimism.

Middle class Bolivians, even those who are disgusted with the military and want a return to democracy, have begun to prepare for what they believe will be inevitable violence after the new elected government is installed Aug. 6.

They have begun to stock up on sugar, wheat, crackers, kerosene for cooking and bottled water because many of them see strikes, violence and possibly a civil war in the making. Unless the United States provides immediate aid of up to \$100 million quickly, some Bolivians believe, the economy will deteriorate within weeks or months after the new government assumes power.

While some American diplomats here express concern, the official view of the embassy seems to be that, whatever the Bolivians may think and expect from the United States, there were never any promises made.

The Carter administration does want Bolivia to become a democracy on Aug. 6, these diplomats say, and Rosalynn Carter will probably lead an official delegation to demonstrate this concern.

However, a massive and quick transfusion of unrestricted aid seems to be out of the question. Bolivia already received up to \$60 million a year from the United States, one of the largest aid programs in the hemisphere.

If the new democratic government takes office as scheduled, the United States, according to American diplomats here,

will probably respond with some additional assistance, and help refinance Bolivia's \$2.5 billion foreign debt.

Interest on this debt, according to the Bolivian government and diplomatic observers, will account for almost \$300 million of the country's expected \$400 million balance of payments deficit this year.

To make matters worse for Bolivia's floundering economy and the United States' image here, the U.S. House of Representatives has passed a bill that would authorize the sale of 35,000 tons of tin from U.S. strategic stockpiles. The Senate is now considering the measure, which has the administration's backing.

It has been estimated that the sales could undercut the price of tin by \$1 a pound, which would cost Bolivia \$100 million dollars a year. Tin is Bolivia's main export.

"There will not be democracy in Bolivia with sales from the buffer stock," said Jose Luis Roca, a leading Christian Democrat politician and senator-elect.

Gen. David Padilla, Bolivia's outgoing military president, sent a letter to President Carter this week asking the administration to stop the tin sales if they are approved by Congress.

Padilla said that the sales will have "the gravest effects on the Bolivian economy and could interfere, weaken and ultimately frustrate" the country's return to democracy. The White House has yet to respond to Padilla's letter.

Antonio Sanchez of Lozada, a former finance minister and Bolivian ambassador to the United States, has calculated that his country will need about \$250 million in unrestricted foreign aid over the next three years to overcome its current balance of payments crisis and get its economic house in order.

Although he personally does not expect the United States to contribute significantly to an aid package of this dimension, he is convincing the money must come from somewhere if Bolivia is to avoid severe problems.
