THE HONORABLE MADELEINE KORBEL ALBRIGHT

CHAIR AND HEAD

Madeleine Korbel Albright was appointed by President Clinton on January 21, 1993 as the United States Permanent Representative to the United Nations. President Clinton elevated this position and made the Ambassador a member of his Cabinet and a member of the National Security Council. She presented her credentials at the United Nations on February 6, 1993.

Prior to her appointment, Ambassador Albright was the President of the Center for National Policy. The Center is a non-profit research organization formed in 1981 by representatives from government, industry, labor and education. Its mandate is to promote the study and discussion of domestic and international issues.

As a Research Professor of International Affairs and Director of Women in Foreign Service Programs at Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service, she taught undergraduate and graduate courses in international affairs, U.S. foreign policy, Russian foreign policy, and Central and Eastern European politics, and was responsible for developing and implementing programs designed to enhance women's professional opportunities in international affairs.

From 1981 to 1982, Ambassador Albright was awarded a fellowship at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars at the Smithsonian Institution following an international competition in which she wrote about the role of the press in political changes in Poland in the early 1980's.

She also served as a Senior Fellow in Soviet and Eastern European Affairs at the Center for Strategic and International Studies, conducting research in developments and trends in the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe.

From 1978-1981, Ambassador Albright was a staff member on the National Security Council, as well as a White House staff member, where she was responsible for foreign policy legislation.

From 1976 to 1978, she served as Chief Legislative Assistant to Senator Edmund S. Muskie.

Awarded a B.A. from Wellesley College with honors in Political Science, Ambassador Albright studied at the School of Advanced International Studies at Johns Hopkins University, received a Certificate from the Russian Institute at Columbia University, and her Masters and Doctorate from Columbia University's Department of Public Law and Government.

Ambassador Albright has three daughters.

THE HONORABLE CAROL M. BROWNER

CO-CHAIR

Carol Browner will serve as a delegate to the United States Fourth World Conference on Women. She has been the Administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency since 1993. Her mission is to promote public health by protecting the nation's air, water, and soil.

Since arriving at EPA, Ms. Browner has launched the agency in an important new direction by promoting a firm commitment to environmental goals, along with common sense, innovation, and flexibility in reaching those goals. Her priority is preventing pollution – not waiting to clean it up – and she is working with Congress to improve the nation's major environmental laws.

As head of EPA, Ms. Browner is charged with protecting the nation's air and water from harmful pollution, overseeing the disposal of garbage and hazardous waste, cleaning up contaminated sites under the Superfund law, and establishing rules for pesticide use and food safety.

She is working to "reinvent" environmental protection, to achieve the very best public health and environmental protection for the least cost. In July 1994, Ms. Browner announced Common Sense Initiative, a new industry-by-industry approach to environmental regulation that moves beyond the old piecemeal approach that dealt with air, water, and land pollution one at a time. In March 1995, President Clinton, Vice President Gore, and Ms. Browner announced a package of 25 regulatory reforms to cut paperwork and simplify environmental rules.

Ms. Browner ended decades of "water wars" by negotiating water quality standards for San Francisco Bay. She established broad protection for the Great Lakes. She took enforcement action against a record number of polluters – while also offering a new level of compliance assistance to businesses.

She issued tough new controls over hazardous waste incinerators. Under the community right-to-know law, she expanded the Toxic Release Inventory requiring industry to inform the public of toxic emissions. She issued the Chemical Manufacturing Rule, which will reduce smog-producing chemicals by one million tons per year.

In the international arena, EPA played a key role in negotiating the environmental side agreement to the North American Free Trade Agreement. EPA worked to develop the Administration's Climate Change Action Plan to slow global warming and the Administration's proposal to ban the overseas export of hazardous wastes.

Ms. Browner knows environmental regulation both from the Washington perspective and from the state viewpoint. From 1991-1993, she was Secretary of the Department of Environmental Regulation for the State of Florida, one of the nation's largest environmental agencies. She won praise for dealing effectively with complex issues involving wetland protection, hazardous waste disposal, and Everglades cleanup. She then served as Legislative Director for Senator Al Gore, Jr.

Ms. Browner grew up in south Florida, where the Everglades were a bike ride away. Her parents, college professors at Miami-Dade Community College, gave her her first lessons in politics and an appreciation for the natural world.

She graduated from the University of Florida in 1977 and then earned a degree from its law school. She served as General Counsel for the Florida House of Representatives Government Operations Committee in 1980. Ms. Browner then worked for Citizen Action, a grassroots consumer group, in Washington, DC, where she met her husband, Michael Podhorzer. They have a son, Zachary, and live in Maryland.

"I want my son to be able to grow up and enjoy the natural wonders of the United States in the same way that I have," Ms. Browner said at her swearing-in ceremony in January 1993. "I believe that we will now be able to make the investment in our economy that we so desperately need, yet preserve the air, land, and water."

THE HONORABLE DONNA E. SHALALA

CO-CHAIR

Donna E. Shalala, U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services (HHS), has been a scholar, public manager and public servant for her entire career.

As chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison from 1988 to 1993, she was the first woman to head a Big Ten University. Prior to that, she served as president of Hunter College at the City University of New York for eight years, and as Assistant Secretary for Policy Development and Research at the Department of Housing and Urban Development during the Carter Administration.

A leading scholar on the political economy of state and local governments, Dr. Shalala has held tenured professorships at Columbia, CUNY, and Wisconsin.

From 1975 to 1977, she served as director and treasurer of the Municipal Assistance Corporation, the organization that helped reverse New York's financial collapse. She has been a director of the American Stock Exchange, TIAA-CREF and M and I Bank of Wisconsin.

In 1992, Business Week named her one of the top five managers in higher education. An expert on Total Quality Management, she is considered one of the most experienced and successful public managers in the United States.

Secretary Shalala has a longtime interest in international affairs. From 1962 to 1964, she served in the Peace Corps in Iran. In 1987, she studied in Japan as a Leadership Fellow of the Japan Society. She is member of the Council on Foreign Relations, the Trilateral Commission, the National Committee on U.S.-China Relations, and the Japan Society. She served as a Director of the American Ditchley Foundation, the Institute for International Economics, the International Women's Health Coalition, and the Salzburg Seminar. She heads the U.S. delegation to the World Health Assembly. With the Russian Minister of Health, she co-chairs the U.S.-Russia Health Committee under the Gore-Chernomydin Commission.

Since taking the helm at HHS, Secretary Shalala has shifted the focus of the Department to the everyday needs of all Americans. She is a leader in the Administration's efforts to reform the nation's welfare system and improve health care while containing health costs. She is also carrying out management restructuring and reform at HHS, under the Vice President's initiative to "reinvent government" aimed at improving efficiency and service to citizens.

**THE HONORABLE TIMOTHY E. WIRTH

Timothy E. Wirth is Under Secretary of State for Global Affairs. He also served as Counselor of the Department of State since April 1993.

Mr. Wirth was elected U.S. Senator from Colorado in 1986 and served until 1992. His Senate Committee assignments included Armed Services; Budget; Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs; and Energy and Natural Resources. Prior to his election to the Senate Mr. Wirth represented the Second Congressional District of Colorado for twelve years. As a Congressman, he was Chairman of the Subcommittee on Telecommunications, Consumer Protection and Finance of the Energy and Commerce Committee. In 1992 he served as national co-chair of the Clinton-Gore presidential campaign.

In 1969-70, Mr. Wirth served as Deputy Assistant Secretary of Education at the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW). He was awarded a White House fellowship in 1967-68 and served as Special Assistant to Secretary of HEW, John Gardner. Mr. Wirth served in the U.S. Army Reserve from 1961-1967.

Mr. Wirth has served on the board of Denver Planned Parenthood, was a founding board member of Denver Head Start, and served on the Board of Visitors of the United States Air Force Academy. He is a member of the Colorado Hispanic Agenda.

MARJORIE MARGOLIES-MEZVINSKY

DEPUTY CHAIR

Marjorie Margolles-Mezvinsky is the Director of the United States Delegation to the United Nations Fourth World Conference on Women.

Ms. Margolles-Mezvinsky served as the United States Representative from Pennsylvania's 13th Congressional District in the 103rd Congressional session. She is the first woman ever elected in her own right to the U.S. House of Representatives to represent Pennsylvania.

A graduate of the University of Pennsylvania and a CBS News Foundation Fellow at Columbia University, she began her career as a television journalist at WCAU-TV in Philadelphia, PA.

From 1971 until 1991, Ms. Margolles-Mezvinsky was with NBC and its owned and operated stations in both New York City and Washington, DC. She was a contributing correspondent to the Today Show, Sunday Today, A Closer Look, CNBC, and Real Life with Jane Pauley. Her reporting has won five Emmys as well as numerous other awards.

Following her award-winning series on the plight of Southeast Asian war orphans, Ms. Margolles-Mezvinsky became the first unmarried U.S. citizen to adopt a foreign child. Lee Heh arrived from Korea in 1970 and was joined four years later by Holly from Vietnam. She chronicled their experiences in the 1976 best-seller, They Came to Stay, the first of four books she has written. Her most recent book, written in 1993, is entitled A Woman's Place ... the Freshmen Women Who Changed the Face of Congress.

In 1975, Ms. Margolles-Mezvinsky married Congressman Edward Mezvinsky, who served on the House Judiciary Committee during the Watergate investigation. Between their combined family of 11 children, and the refugee families they've been sponsoring since their marriage, their household has taken care of 25 children.

During her term in the House, Ms. Margolles-Mezvinsky sat on the Committee on Energy and Commerce, with subcommittee assignments on Oversight & Investigations and Telecommunications and Finance. In addition, she was a member of the Committee on Small Business and the Committee on Government Operations.

Ms. Biggins has been recognized by Georgia Trend magazine as one of the 100 most influential Georgians. She serves on several Trustees including Spelman College, the Southern Center for International Studies, the Metropolitan Atlanta Community Foundation, and the Alabama Shakespeare Festival. In addition, Ms. Biggins has been selected by the Governor of Georgia to serve on the Commission on Privatization of Government Services.

Ms. Biggins holds a master's degree from Georgia State University and bachelor's degree from Spelman College. She is a member of the International Business Fellows Program.

THE HONORABLE GERALDINE A. FERRARO

VICE CHAIR

Geraldine A. Ferraro earned a place in history as the first woman vice-presidential candidate on a national party ticket. Ms. Ferraro was first elected to Congress from New York's Ninth Congressional District in Queens in 1978 and served three terms in the House of Representatives. Her committee assignments in Congress included the Public Works Committee, Post Office and Civil Service Committee, and Budget Committee, where she was a strong voice against the Reagan Administration's economic policies. Ms. Ferraro also served on the Select Committee on Aging where she was an advocate for the elderly, fighting proposed cuts in Social Security and Medicare.

In Congress, Ms. Ferraro spearheaded efforts to achieve passage of the Equal Rights Amendment. She also sponsored the Women's Economic Equity Act, which ended pension discrimination against women, provided job options for displaced homemakers and enable homemakers to open IRAs.

Ms. Ferraro was appointed the United States Ambassador to the United Nations Human Rights Commission by President Clinton in 1994 and currently serves in that position. She served as a public delegate in February 1993 and was also the alternate United States delegate to the World Conference on Human Rights held in Vienna in June 1993. An active participant in the nation's foreign policy debate, she serves as a Board member of the National Democratic Institute of International Affairs and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.

Before entering politics, Ms. Ferraro taught elementary school in the New York City Public Schools for five years. During that time, she also put herself through Fordham Law School at night. After spending thirteen years at home raising her three children, she joined the Queens County District Attorney's Office. There, she started the Special Victims Bureau, supervising the prosecution of sex crimes, child abuse, domestic violence and violent crimes against senior citizens.

Ms. Ferraro has honorary degrees from a number of colleges and universities nationwide. In New York City she has been honored by Marymount Manhattan College and Fordham University School of Law, her two alma maters, as well as the College of Staten Island. She currently serves as a board member of the Fordham Law School Board of Visitors, the New York Easter Seal Society, the Board of Advocates of the Planned Parenthood Federation of America, the Board of Advisors of the National Breast Cancer Research Fund and the Pension Rights Center. She serves on the Boards of New York Bancorp and Questech, Corp.

In addition to numerous articles, Ms. Ferraro has written two books, Ferraro, My Story, which recounts the '84 campaign, and Geraldine Ferraro: Changing History.

Ms. Ferraro was born in Newburgh, New York on August 26, 1935. She and her husband, Realtor John Zaccaro, have three children, Donna, John and Laura.

THE HONORABLE THOMAS H. KEAN

VICE CHAIR

Tom Kean will serve as a delegate for the United Nations Fourth World Conference on Women. He is President of Drew University, Chairman of the New American Schools Development Corporation, and Chairman of the National Environmental Education and Training Foundation. The former Governor of New Jersey, Mr. Kean was a former adviser to President George Bush on education, the environment, housing, volunteerism and other national policy issues.

Mr. Kean is shaping Drew into one of the nation's leading small universities. U.S. News & World Report noted his success in 1991 by listing Drew among five "up-and-coming" universities nationwide. Mr. Kean stresses the primacy of teaching for all faculty, the creative use of technology in the liberal arts, and the growing importance of international education. He created a \$10,000 annual award for outstanding teaching, a \$2 million fund for minority scholarships, and a middle-income scholarship award. He added new faculty in African, Asian, Russian and Islamic studies. Mr. Kean is promoting a plan to offer all sophomores an opportunity for study abroad without charge beyond tuition. From his arrival in 1990 to the end of 1992, the Drew endowment's market value grew from \$79 million to \$94 million, a 20% increase.

Rated among America's five most effective governors by Newsweek in 1986, Mr. Kean was noted for tax cuts that spurred 750,000 new jobs, a federally replicated welfare reform program, landmark environmental policies ranging from mandatory recycling to wetlands protection, and leadership on volunteerism. As a result of his aggressive promotion of volunteerism, Mr. Kean was named Chairman of the Points of Light Foundation Advisory Committee by President Bush. He also delivered the keynote address at the 1988 Republican National Convention, launching him to national prominence. In addition, he drew praise for his education reforms in successive State of the Union addresses by President Reagan and President Bush.

Mr. Kean, a former history teacher, promoted nearly 40 reforms to the state's public education system. Often referred to as the "education governor," he guided New Jersey in becoming the first state to adopt "alternative routes" to teacher certification. Today, as a result of his leadership, well-qualified professionals without education degrees have the opportunity to teach in New Jersey schools. Mr. Kean also raised teacher salaries and increased standards for students. Scores on students' basic skills tests, as well as on the SAT, climbed steadily during his tenure. In 1989, New Jersey became the first state to take over urban schools that repeatedly failed students.

New Jersey colleges and universities made significant progress with Mr. Kean's leadership. He signed legislation granting autonomy to the state colleges, releasing them from bureaucratic tangles and giving each the freedom to design programs to serve the unique needs of its students and faculty. He offered substantial State investment through a competitive grants process, which required each school to clearly define its mission and set bold plans to achieve its goals. The colleges responded with vigorous new approaches in areas like cooperative education, critical thinking, and global education. These innovations, and the challenge grants program itself, have drawn nationwide praise. Mr. Kean also promoted these ideas as chair of the Education Commission of the States and as the National Governors' Association's lead governor on education.

Mr. Kean is the Chairman of Educate America and serves on the board of several other education-oriented organizations including the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities, Carnegie Corporation of New York, and Campus Compact. His corporate board assignments include Beneficial Corporation, Bell Atlantic, and Amerada Hess. He holds a B.A. from Princeton University, an M.A. from Columbia University Teachers College (where he is a trustee), and honorary degrees from some 20 schools, including Syracuse and Columbia.

Mr. Kean's autobiography, The Politics of Inclusion, was published by The Free Press in 1988. His wife is the former Deborah Bye of Wilmington, Delaware. The Kears live in Livingston, New Jersey. They have twin sons, Tom and Reed, and a daughter, Alexandra.

Bonnie J. Campbell will serve as a delegate to the United States Fourth World Conference on Women. She is the Director of the Justice Department's Violence Against Women Office which leads the Administration's effort to implement the Violence Against Women Act, along with the Department of Health and Human Services. Ms. Campbell will oversee the Justice Department's efforts to combine tough new federal criminal laws with assistance to states and localities to fight violence against women.

Ms. Campbell has been working on behalf of victims of crime and to fight violence against women for many years. Elected Attorney General of Iowa in 1990, she was the first woman to hold that office in her state. During her tenure she devoted substantial effort to preventing and fighting domestic violence. She increased public awareness through a statewide domestic violence prevention campaign and solicited private donations and free television, radio and newspapers advertising to increase awareness of this serious violence that threatens so many people.

As Iowa's Attorney General, Ms. Campbell was instrumental in getting the legislature to strengthen Iowa's domestic abuse statute, and to increase the funding for victim compensation programs and shelters. She also authored an anti-stalking law that passed in 1992, which was one of the nation's first.

Before her election to the Office of Attorney General, Ms. Campbell practiced law in Des Moines from 1984 to 1991. She also served as the Chair of Iowa's Democratic Party from 1987 to 1989. Ms. Campbell ran unsuccessfully for Governor of Iowa in 1994.

Originally from upstate New York, Ms. Campbell earned both her bachelor's degree, summa cum laude, and her law degree from Drake University. She and her husband, Edward, now live in Washington, DC.

JUDITH E. HEUMANN

GOVERNMENT DELEGATE

On June 29, 1993, Judith E. Heumann was sworn in as President Clinton's Assistant Secretary for Special Education and Rehabilitative Services in the U.S. Department of Education. She took the oath of office in the Berkeley (California) City Council Chambers to acknowledge the city where the world's first independent living center and the world's first disability policy think tank, the World Institute on Disability (WID), were established. As deputy director, Ms. Heumann managed the independent living center from 1975 to 1982, and for ten years she served as vice president of WID, which she co-founded in 1983. From 1982 to 1983 Ms. Heumann was special assistant to the executive director of the California State Department of Rehabilitation, a position to which she was appointed by former Governor Jerry Brown.

Since having polio at the age of eighteen months, Judy Heumann has known discrimination firsthand. She was able to begin her career as a teacher in the New York City school system only after she sued the Board of Education, which had turned her down for a teaching position because she could not walk. One of the first to recognize that discrimination against disabled people was a civil rights issue, she has championed the cause of equality for disabled people around the nation and around the world. She has worked tirelessly to change laws, policy, and perceptions about people with disabilities. While serving on U.S. Senator Harrison Williams' staff, she helped develop legislation that became the Education for All Handicapped Children Act (P.L. 94-142) and worked on the development of regulations for Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act. Later, she helped draft federal and state legislation that led to the creation of more than 200 independent living centers nationwide. In 1979 Ms. Heumann was appointed by Governor Brown to serve on the California Commission on Special Education, a post she held until 1983. Recognized nationally and internationally as an advocate for self-determination for disabled people everywhere, Ms. Heumann has served on the boards of various organizations and received numerous awards, including the Henry B. Betts Award in 1990, in recognition of her outstanding efforts to improve the quality of life for people with disabilities. She also is a well-known authority and speaker on disability issues. With her appointment to the Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services (OSERS), this longtime activist is now in charge of federal programs serving almost six million disabled children, youth, and adults. Assistant Secretary Heumann manages a budget of over \$5.5 billion and oversees the Office of Special Education Programs, the Rehabilitation Services Administration, and the National Institute on Disability and Rehabilitation Research. She has strongly committed herself to aligning these programs with President Clinton's and Education Secretary Riley's agenda: to promote the inclusion, independence, and empowerment of disabled people throughout society.

Among Ms. Heumann's top priorities is to ensure that OSERS programs are more accessible to disabled individuals from minority and culturally diverse backgrounds. To increase the number of such applicants who receive OSERS research and training funds, she is opening up the peer review process and redirecting outreach activities. Ms. Heumann is also committed to program accountability and to spreading the word about model programs that work. Equally important, she is working with Department and Administration officials to ensure the full participation of disabled people in Goals 2000: Educate America Act, school-to-work legislation, and other federal initiatives, and she is committed to education and rehabilitation reform in OSERS programs and priorities. To accomplish these goals, she is working to establish a dialogue with practitioners, family members, disabled people, and others. She encourages people to share their experiences, participate in public meetings, comment on proposed regulations, and become involved in the education, rehabilitation, and community reform movement.

Ms. Heumann pledges to do as much as she can to make the government and the nation see that disabled people are an integral part of the whole fabric of our country. "I will feel that I have accomplished my goal if we stop seeing the needs of disabled people as being special and different, and disabled people become integrated, productive members of our communities," she says. She has articulated her vision of OSERS as "working aggressively and collaboratively to create a society in which all disabled people can obtain the knowledge and skills necessary to achieve the goals they set for themselves."

Ms. Heumann graduated from Long Island University in 1969 and received a masters degree in public health administration from the University of California at Berkeley in 1975.

Judy Heumann lives in Washington, DC and is married to Jorge Plineda.

THE HONORABLE MADELEINE MAY KUNIN

GOVERNMENT DELEGATE

Since being sworn in over two years ago as Deputy Secretary of Education, Madeleine Kunin (pronounced Q-nin), the former Governor of Vermont, has played an integral policymaking role at the U.S. Department of Education and in the Clinton Administration at large.

Using the political and policy skills and the creativity and reforming ability she honed as a leading state legislator, Lieutenant Governor, and as the first woman Governor of Vermont, Ms. Kunin has been a dynamic source of change and improvement since taking office.

Working closely with President Bill Clinton and Education Secretary Richard Riley, she has played an important role in the string of education reforms that were successfully enacted into law, including the Innovative Goals 2000: Educate America Act, the School to Work Opportunities Act, and the Safe Schools Act. She also helped develop the Administration's innovative direct lending program, which has simplified the student loan process, saved taxpayers billions of dollars and helped increase access to higher education.

In an Administration known for working to "reinvent government" Ms. Kunin has been in charge of the reform and streamlining of the Education Department's management structure, which has improved services and saved billions of dollars. Her work in this regard has received consistent praise, typified by the Washington Post's comment that the Department is developing "new ways of doing business" including improved morale, more efficient programs, and better monitoring.

There was little doubt, after President Bill Clinton was elected, that Governor Kunin would have a prominent place in the new Administration. She is the only woman governor in the nation to have served three terms, and has continued to be a leading voice nationally on issues involving reform and equal rights for women. During her tenure in office, teacher salaries in Vermont moved from a rank of 49th in the nation to 26th, access to kindergarten was guaranteed, and early childhood programs were expanded. She also achieved significant advancements in school finance reform, business-education partnerships, and vocational education reform.

Near the end of the presidential campaign, Clinton chose Ms. Kunin as one of three members of the search committee for Vice President. She was appointed Deputy Secretary of Education in January of 1993.

Since being appointed, she has continued to play a prominent role in a broad range of areas. She is the founder and former president of the non-profit Institute for Sustainable Growth, an international organization active in environmental education and management.

Victor Marrero was appointed by President Clinton in May, 1993 as United States Representative on the Economic and Social Council of the United Nations, a public office with the rank of Ambassador and part of the United States Mission to the United Nations. Before this appointment he had been engaged in the private practice of law in New York City since March 1982. He began as a partner of the Manhattan firm of Tufo & Zuccotti in 1986. His specialty was land use, development and environmental law.

Prior to his private practice, Mr. Marrero had been in public service in federal, state and city governments. Among the offices he held were: Under Secretary of the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development by appointment of President Jimmy Carter in 1979; Commissioner of the New York State Division of Housing and Community Renewal and Vice Chairman of the New York State Housing Finance Agency (1978-79); Chairman, New York City Planning Commission (1976-77); First Assistant Counsel to the Governor of New York (Hugh L. Carey, 1975); Special Counsel to the New York City Comptroller (Harrison J. Goldin, 1974-75); Executive Director, New York City Department of City Planning (1973); Assistant Administrator, New York City Model Cities Administration (1970-72); and Assistant to the Mayor (John V. Lindsay, 1968-70). In addition, while engaged in private practice, Mr. Marrero served on a part-time basis as a member of two other public agencies: The New York Conciliations and Appeals Board (by appointment of Mayor Edward I. Koch, 1983-84) and the New York City Rent Guidelines Board (by appointment of Mayor David N. Dinkins, 1990-93).

Throughout his professional career, Mr. Marrero has been actively engaged in numerous civic, educational, charitable and professional organizations. Among these, he has served as a member of the Board of Directors/Trustees of the following public and private organizations: The New York Public Library (1990-present); the State University of New York (by appointment of Governor Mario M. Cuomo, 1985-1993); The Defense and Education Fund (Founder and first Chairman of the Board, 1972-74, 1981-93); Coro Foundation (1990-93); Fund for New York City Public Education (1989-93); Association of the Bar of the City of New York: Vice President and Member of the Executive Committee, Member of the Judiciary Committee, Delegate to the New York State Bar Association House of Delegates; Committee for Modern Courts (1989-93); New York Lawyers for the Public Interest (1988-91); Phoenix House Foundation (1978-83); Educational Broadcasting Corporation, WNET (1981-84); Central Park Conservancy, (1981-88); Regional Plan Association (1982-86), New York City Partnership (1989-93).

**KAREN NUSSBAUM

Karen Nussbaum will serve as a Delegate for the United Nations Fourth World Conference on Women. Ms. Nussbaum is the Director of the Women's Bureau at the U.S. Department of Labor. The Women's Bureau was created in 1920 "to formulate standards and policies which shall promote the welfare of wage-earning women." For her entire life, Ms. Nussbaum has done just that.

In nominating Ms. Nussbaum to direct the Women's Bureau, President Clinton declared her "uniquely qualified" to serve as chief advocate for the nation's 58 million working women, based on her outstanding record as a leader, policy expert, and tireless spokesperson for women in the workforce.

Ms. Nussbaum is best known for her work with "9to5," the National Association of Working Women. She co-founded 9to5 in 1973 and led it for 20 years. In 1981, Ms. Nussbaum also became president of District 925 of the Service Employees International Union (SEIU). District 925 is a national union of office and professional employees. As a union leader, she served on the SEIU International Executive Board and headed up the union's 170,000-member Office Workers Division.

In June 1993, she became the Women's Bureau's 13th Director. Issues like child care and family and medical leave - and fair treatment and respect for all working people - are not merely matters of policy but are personal concerns for Ms. Nussbaum, herself a working parent.

A native of Chicago, she currently lives in Washington, DC with her husband and three children.

Jan Piercy has extensive experience in economic development and management, both domestically and internationally. She has specialized in recruiting management teams for organizations in the public, private and non-profit sectors.

As Senior Vice President of Shorebank Corporation in Chicago, IL, Ms. Piercy played a key role in creating and expanding bank holding company-based programs to promote economic development in urban and rural areas. This model has proven successful in its original location and in replications in other U.S. sites. Shorebank also has assisted the Polish American Enterprise Fund to re-introduce small business lending in Poland and has advised groups from numerous countries, from South Africa to Costa Rica. Ms. Piercy managed capitalization efforts which have raised millions of dollars in equity capital to fund specific adaptations of the Shorebank model.

In the mid-1980's, Ms. Piercy participated in efforts which successfully established the earliest micro-enterprise loan funds in the United States, a method of peer lending originated in Bangladesh. Early in her career, Ms. Piercy directed the Public Management Program at Cornell University's Graduate School of Business and Public Administration and later at Stanford University's Graduate School of Business. Throughout her career, Ms. Piercy has served as board member, trustee, and consultant to numerous organizations working to promote economic development, democracy building and women's broader participation in public affairs, including the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation, OEF International and the National Women's Education Fund.

SALLY A. SHELTON

Sally A. Shelton was sworn in on June 9, 1994, as Assistant Administrator for Global Programs of the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID). As head of the Global Bureau, Ms. Shelton manages the Agency's repository of scientific and technical expertise. The bureau has five centers that address the agency's global strategic objectives: Population, Health and Nutrition; Environment; Economic Growth; Democracy and Governance; and Human Resource Development. Ms. Shelton also oversees the Office of Women in Development. USAID is the government agency that administers economic and humanitarian assistance worldwide.

Before joining USAID, Ms. Shelton was a Senior Fellow and an Adjunct Professor at Georgetown University's Center for Latin American Studies. She also was an adviser to several multinational corporations on international trade and investment strategies.

From 1979 to 1981, Ms. Shelton was the U.S. Ambassador to Granada, Barbados, and several other Eastern Caribbean nations. Prior to this, she was Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Inter-American Affairs, served on the U.S. Mission to the United Nations and was Legislative Assistant for international affairs to then Senator Lloyd Bentsen. She has been a Senior Economic Consultant to the World Bank and Vice President of Bankers Trust Company, New York, responsible for developing countries' debt.

Ms. Shelton also served as a director of two companies: Valero Energy Corporation, a Fortune 500 company involved in oil refining, and Baring Brothers & Co. Ltd's Puma Fund, a closed-ended investment fund traded on the London Stock Exchange.

She has been a member of several non-profit boards of directors and various organizations including the Council on Foreign Relations, International Planned Parenthood Federation and the National Democratic Institute for International Affairs.

Ms. Shelton was a Fulbright Scholar at the Institut des Sciences Politiques in Paris and has a master's degree in international relations from Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies in Bologna, Italy, and Washington, D.C. She has a bachelor's degree from the University of Missouri where she graduated Phi Beta Kappa with honors in French.

She has lectured at several universities, both in the United States and abroad. She has been a fellow at the Center for International Affairs at Harvard University and has taught U.S. foreign policy decision-making at the John F. Kennedy School of Government.

Mr. Stewart is the Assistant Legal Adviser for Human Rights and Refugees in the Office of the Legal Adviser, U.S. Department of State, with principal responsibility for advising the Bureau of Population, Refugees and Migration (PRM). In this capacity he has been directly involved in recent efforts to obtain Senate advice and consent to ratification of various human rights treaties. He also served as principal legal adviser on the U.S. delegation to the second World Conference on Human Rights in Vienna in 1993.

Since joining the Office of the Legal Adviser in 1976, he has served in a variety of assignments including Assistant Legal Adviser for Law Enforcement and Intelligence (1986-88), Assistant Legal Adviser for International Claims and Investment Disputes (1983-86), Administrator for Iranian Claims (1981-83), Special Assistant to the Legal Adviser (1980-81), and prior to that as Attorney Adviser in both the United Nations and the Economic and Business Affairs areas.

BISA WILLIAMS-MANIGAULT

Bisa Williams-Manigault is a career Foreign Service Officer with the U.S. Department of State currently assigned as Adviser to the U.S. Mission to the United Nations in New York (USUN). At USUN, Bisa covers a broad range of economic issues often focussing on but not limited to African development, population, and the environment. She has also served as the Mission's principal focal point regarding non-governmental organizations' interaction with the UN. She was a U.S. Government negotiator at the UN's Global Conference on the Sustainable Development of Small Developing States (SIDS) in Bridgetown, Barbados (1991), the International Conference on Population and Development (ICPD) in Cairo, Egypt (1994), the World Summit for Social Development (WSSD) in Copenhagen, Denmark (1995), and at the last two preparatory meetings for the Fourth World Conference on Women (FWCW).

Ms. Williams-Manigault joined the Department of State in 1984 and was assigned to Conakry, Guinea, West Africa as General Services Officer. Following Guinea, she was posted to Panama City, Panama as political officer, then to Washington to work in the Department's Bureau of African Affairs as Country Officer for Sierra Leone and Cape Verde and Deputy Country Officer for Liberia. In the middle of that tour, she was sent back to Panama as an official monitor of that country's national elections (1989). Later that year, she returned to Panama as one of two State Department officials in a four-person team sent to facilitate orderly re-establishment of civilian authority in the immediate aftermath of U.S. military action there ("Operation Just Cause"). For her contributions to the success of U.S. efforts following "Operation Just Cause," Bisa received a special commendation from the Acting Secretary of State Lawrence Eagleburger. She was subsequently reassigned to Panama in 1990. Immediately prior to USUN, Ms. Williams-Manigault served as Special Assistant to the Secretary in the Office of the Coordinator of Assistance to the New Independent States of the former Soviet Union where she concentrated on technical and health assistance for the Central Asian republics. Over the years, she has received two group Superior Honor awards, two individual Meritorious Honor awards, a Certificate of Appreciation, a Meritorious Step Increase (pay incentive) and various letters of commendation.

A cum laude graduate of Yale University where she was also awarded the Pickens Prize for academic excellence and scholarship in the field of African-American studies, Ms. Williams-Manigault received her Master of Arts in Comparative Literature from the University of California, Los Angeles. She taught in the English and Romance and Classical Languages departments of Rice University in Houston, Texas before joining the Foreign Service. Bisa speaks French, Spanish, and Portuguese and has rudimentary knowledge of Chinese.

MARIA ANTONIETTA BERRIOZABAL

PUBLIC MEMBER

Maria Antonietta Berriozabal was named as Public Member of the U.S. Delegation to the United Nations Final Preparatory Meeting for the Fourth World Conference on Women to be held in Beijing in September 1995.

Ms. Berriozabal is the daughter of Mexican immigrants and a native of Laredo, Texas. She was raised in San Antonio, where she attended parochial school. She obtained her BA in Political Science from the University of Texas at San Antonio in 1979 after accumulating most of her college credits in part-time and evening classes over a period of 20 years.

For thirteen years after her high school graduation, she worked in various secretarial, managerial and administrative positions in political, governmental, and social service agencies.

After completion of her undergraduate degree, she was selected as the District Office Manager of the San Antonio 1980 Census Office, where she managed a workforce of over 1,400 employees.

In the Spring of 1981, Ms. Berriozabal was elected to the San Antonio City Council. She was the first Hispanic woman ever elected to serve in such a post in a major Texas city.

Realizing the need to build networks with elected officials throughout the country, Ms. Berriozabal served on the Board of the National League of Cities (NLC), the Advisory Council of NLC and as President of the Hispanic Elected Local Official (HELO) of the National League of Cities.

In 1991 Ms. Berriozabal ran for Mayor of San Antonio. Her campaign attracted national attention. She led an initial eleven candidate field with 30% of the vote. Her campaign emphasized human capital investment as a major economic development thrust.

In the Fall of 1991 Ms. Berriozabal was awarded a Fellowship from the Institute of Politics at the John F. Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University. She developed and led a study group entitled: "Women, Minorities and Public Policy: A New American Agenda".

Ms. Berriozabal has a deep conviction that women are a powerful force in building community and building cities. She is one of the pioneers in establishing women's networks, particularly for Hispanic women. In 1972 she joined 25 other San Antonio women in founding the Mexican American Business and Professional Women's Club. She is the founder and President of the Board of Hispanas Unidas, a non-profit Texas corporation whose purpose is to serve Latinas across social, political and economic lines through scholarships for non-traditional women students and biennial conferences.

In July 1994, Secretary of State Warren Christopher appointed Mrs. Berriozabal as United States' Representative to the Organization of American States' Inter-American Commission of Women (CIM). Comision Interamericana de Mujeres (CIM) established in 1928, was created expressly to ensure recognition of the civil and political rights of women in the Americas. CIM delegations from 33 member nations are now preparing for the UN World Conference on Women which will be held in Beijing, China in 1995.

In September 1994 Ms. Berriozabal was Alternate Chair of the U.S. Delegation to the Sexta Conferencia Regional de la Mujer in Mar de Plata, Argentina. Under the auspices of C.E.P.A.L. (Comision Economica para America Latina y el Caribe), the Conference was one of five United Nations world regional conferences preparing for the Beijing Conference.

Ms. Berriozabal currently serves on the following committees and boards: Chair of the Board, National Hispana Leadership Institute (Washington, DC); Board of Trustees, McAuley Institute, (Silver Springs, MD); Board Member, National Catholic Reporter Publishing Company (Kansas City, MO); Founding Member, Texas Higher Education Council; Member, Texas Advisory Committee to the U.S. Civil Rights Commission; President of the Board, Visitation House, a shelter for homeless women and children; and Member, Congregation Sisters of Divine Providence Development Board. Through her service on boards and commissions and through her activism and advocacy, Ms. Berriozabal continues to be involved in issues and projects affecting the lives of all families and children with keen emphasis on leadership development and economic development as key instruments for change. She is a speaker locally and nationally on issues of personal and economic empowerment of women and minorities, social justice issues, leadership development for women with a focus on Latinas in the U.S., cultural diversity and education.

Among her recognitions are her selection as one of "One Hundred Influentials" by Hispanic Business magazine in 1989. She received the "Jessie Bernard Wise Woman Award" in 1990 from the Center for Women Policy Studies in Washington, DC. In the fall of 1993, she received the Benita Humanitarian Award from the Missionary Catechists of Divine Providence in San Antonio, Texas for her work in the areas of housing, economic and employment development for women and minorities. The J.C. Penney Company honored Ms. Berriozabal with their "Spirit of Truth" Award in December 1993. The Mexican American Bar Association of Bexar County presented her their 1994 Community Service Award in October 1994.

In March of 1994, Ms. Berriozabal presented testimony on quality of life and urban planning before The Independent Commission for Population and Quality of Life, United States and Canada consultation in Washington, DC. She is part of an interfaith and interdisciplinary group of North Americans working with the Park Ridge Center for the Study of Health, Faith and Ethics reviewing documents on population, consumption and environment. These two groups provided testimony at the UN Population and Development Conference in Cairo in September 1994.

Ms. Berriozabal is married to Dr. Manuel Berriozabal, Professor of Mathematics at the University of Texas in San Antonio and Founder and Coordinator of the Texas Prefreshman Engineering Program. They are members of St. Ann's Catholic Church in San Antonio, Texas.

DOROTHY V. LAMM

Dottle Lamm was a U.S. Delegate to the International Conference on Population and Development in Cairo in September of 1994. She also serves as an on-going public member of the U.S. delegation to the UN Commission on the Status of Women. In this capacity, last fall she attended three of the five 1994 world regional conferences (Africa, Latin America and Europe) which prepared delegates and NGOs for the UN Fourth World Conference on Women to be held in Beijing, to which she is an official U.S. Delegate.

Ms. Lamm and her husband, former three-term Governor of Colorado, Richard D. Lamm, have been interested in population, reproductive health and reproductive rights since they travelled the poverty stricken areas of Peru and Bolivia on their honeymoon in 1963.

As a psychiatric social worker, Ms. Lamm has counseled unwed mothers, worked in public welfare, and has been a therapist for families of emotionally disturbed children. As a Denver Post columnist since 1979, she has written and spoken extensively promoting the status of women, population stabilization and reproductive rights. In addition, she has taught three courses at the University of Denver—one on "Sex Roles and Society" and two on "Population and Public Policy."

She currently serves on the board of CEDPA (Centre for Development and Population Activities) and on the NARAL (National Abortion and Reproductive Rights Action League) Foundation.

The Lamms have two grown children.

ARTHENIA L. JOYNER

PUBLIC MEMBER

Arthenia L. Joyner has been making significant contributions to her community for more than half of her life; in fact, her first bold thrust occurred while yet a teenager. Convinced that Blacks were victims of blatant discrimination, she protested vehemently during her sophomore year at Florida A&M University and was arrested. Although she participated actively in the Civil Rights movement in her hometown while attending high school, she completed her studies and pursued a law degree. She has practiced law longer than any Black female in the State of Florida.

Ms. Joyner has been an active participant in politics all of her life. She chaired the Shirley Chisholm Presidential Campaign in Hillsborough County, Florida in 1972. More recently she co-chaired the campaigns for Lawton Chiles for Governor and Bill Clinton for President in Hillsborough County, Florida. She is the first African American to be appointed to the Hillsborough County Aviation Authority and currently serves as chairman. Governor Lawton Chiles appointed her in August 1991 to a four-year term. She was appointed by United States Senator Bob Graham to the Federal Judicial Nominating Commission for the State of Florida and is the former Chair of the Judicial Nominating Commission for the Thirteenth Judicial Circuit.

In 1994, President William J. Clinton appointed Ms. Joyner as a member of the United States Delegation to the United Nations Fourth World Conference on Women to be held in Beijing, China in the fall of 1995. In that capacity she has attended four World Regional Women's Conferences in Indonesia, Argentina, Austria and Africa. She was also appointed by President Clinton as a U.S. Delegate to the International Conference on Population and Development in Cairo, Egypt in 1994.

Ms. Joyner received her B.S. and J.D. degrees from Florida A&M University. She is the recipient of numerous awards including the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives; 1993 Criminal Justice Person of the Year; George Edgecomb Bar Association's 1993 Francisco Rodriguez Award; 1990 Executive Woman of the Year; Governor's Distinguished Black Floridian Award; Ebony Magazine's 100 Most Influential Black Americans, 1985; America's Top 100 Black Business and Professional Women by Dollars and Sense Magazine, 1985; Who's Who Among Black Americans. Her professional affiliations include the National Bar Association where her colleagues elected her President in 1984; the American Bar Association, Hillsborough Association of Women Lawyers, Florida Chapter of the NBA and The George Edgecomb Bar Association. Dr. Laila Al-Marayati is currently President of the Muslim Women's League (MWL). In addition to other activities, the League has been addressing human rights issues, particularly the atrocities afflicting the Muslims of Bosnia-Herzegovina. MWL is a founding member organization of the Women's Coalition Against Ethnic Cleansing, comprising over 20 women's religious and civic groups. In March 1993, Dr. Al-Marayati led a delegation to Zagreb, Croatia, where the Coalition determined how Americans could assist rape survivors and other refugees fleeing Bosnia. Based on the findings of the trip, the Coalition raised over \$20,000 to support the relief efforts of two women's groups in Croatia. Since that time, Dr. Al-Marayati has participated in numerous press conferences and forums to inform the American public about the genocide in Bosnia.

At this time, MWL is concentrating on publishing a document which would clarify common misconceptions about Muslim women. This effort is a pivotal step for Muslim women as they redefine their roles in the Muslim world. Members of the League participate in many conferences to speak on these matters.

Dr. Al-Marayati has been an active member of the Islamic Center of Southern California for many years. She was elected to a three-year term to the Board of Directors at the Islamic Center, concluding in 1995. Her first important position was Editor of The Minaret, the Islamic newsmagazine published by the Center for international distribution and she continues to contribute articles on health matters. She has been a youth counselor for the past fifteen years and currently specializes in issues related to adolescent sexuality.

She is in private practice as a gynecologist in Southern California and is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Los Angeles County/USC Women's and Children's Hospital.

Lynn Cutler recently completed 12 years (three terms) as Vice President of the Democratic National Committee (DNC). She is currently a Senior Vice President of The Kamber Group, a Washington, DC communications firm, where she is continuing to play a part in national politics. Ms. Cutler has been a senior consultant at the firm since 1985.

First elected to the Democratic National Committee in 1981, Ms. Cutler served as the DNC's liaison to statewide and local elected officials. She also oversaw the DNC's outreach to women and to the Jewish community.

She is a frequent political commentator and appears on "Crossfire," "CNN & Co.," and many other radio and television shows.

A teacher by training, Ms. Cutler entered into politics in 1962 because of the issues surrounding America's children. In 1974, Ms. Cutler was elected the first woman supervisor in Black Hawk County, Iowa. She was elected to a second four year term in 1978, and chaired the Board of Supervisors for two years. In 1980 and 1982, she ran for United States Congress in Iowa's third congressional district, losing by a narrow margin.

In 1977, President Carter appointed Ms. Cutler to the United States Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations where she utilized her experience and knowledge of different levels of governance. She was chosen Vice Chair of the Commission in 1978.

While at the Democratic National Committee, Ms. Cutler worked to improve intergovernmental relations through her efforts to communicate with the National Associations of State Treasurers, Secretaries of State, Attorneys General, the National Conference of Lieutenant Governors, the National Democratic Officials, and the National Conference of Democratic Mayors.

Ms. Cutler coordinated the DNC Women's Division and helped to establish Women's Vote Task Forces nationwide in the 1984 presidential campaign. She also co-directed the "Women for Clinton/Gore" effort.

In 1986, Ms. Cutler organized "Business Women and the Political World: New Partnerships," a landmark conference attended by women from across the country which featured then Texas Treasurer Ann Richards and State Representative Carol Mosely Braun.

Ms. Cutler serves on the board of directors of the National Endowment for Democracy, the National Scleroderma Foundation, the National Health Policy Council and the Democratic Senatorial Campaign Committee's Women's Council. She is also a founder and advisory board member of Back to Business, an effort formed to be supportive of President and Mrs. Clinton.

Ms. Cutler is a founder of Democratic Women 2000 and is also Majority Council member of Emily's List. She serves on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Counties (NACo), the National Association of Regional Councils (NARC), the Iowa State Association of Counties, and also presided over Women of NACo (WON) for two years.

Ms. Cutler provides outreach to the Jewish community through serving on the Advisory Board of the American Jewish Committee of Washington, DC, as well as through her membership in the American Jewish Congress' Commission for Women's Equality, the North American Jewish Forum, and the Jewish Fund for Justice. She also serves on the Board of Directors for the National Jewish Democratic Council, a grassroots organizing group.

MARIE C. WILSON

Activist, author, and expert on many of the issues at the crux of the feminist agenda today, Marie C. Wilson is in her tenth year as President of the Ms. Foundation for Women. As the leader of the only national multi-issue women's fund in the United States, Ms. Wilson has offered critical leadership in the areas of economic empowerment, reproductive rights, and health and safety for women and girls. She is the architect of pioneering training and employment programs, has held elected office, and has raised and administered millions of dollars for the Ms. Foundation's ongoing campaign for gender equity.

In 1994, Ms. Wilson unveiled two of her greatest efforts to date on behalf of women and girls. She co-authored the critically acclaimed "Mother Daughter Revolution: From Good Girls to Great Women," a ground breaking blueprint for creating powerful new relationships between mothers and daughters and for changing society. This year Ms. Wilson also unveiled the Ms. Foundation's Healthy Girls/Healthy Women Campaign, a public-education and policy project that studies how preventative health measures for girls can make health the norm for their adulthood.

On April 28, 1993, Ms. Wilson led the charge of millions of girls into the work place on the first-ever Take Our Daughters To Work Day. Now an annual event, the project was celebrated as a crucial show of support for the self-esteem of adolescent girls everywhere.

Born and raised in Georgia, Ms. Wilson began her professional life as a school teacher in Des Moines, Iowa. It wasn't long before her first-hand experiences in education and motherhood earned her an appointment as the Director of Women's Programs at Drake University in 1979. In this capacity, Ms. Wilson designed and instituted innovative programming to prepare women to enter the work force, drafted legislation to provide safe and affordable child care, investigated and funded cutting-edge issues as employment re-entry training, minority career development, job sharing for older women, and flexible work time.

Ms. Wilson served as Vice President and Director of Education and Human Resources for the Iowa Bankers Association and as a Member-at-Large to the Des Moines City Council. During her term, she turned her attention to making her city a community that supported families through its housing and work place policies.

Ms. Wilson's tenure at the Ms. Foundation, beginning in 1984, has been a study in the sort of economic responsibility she fosters in others. During her presidency, the Foundation has expanded dramatically in size and programming--its annual budget has grown from \$400,000 to \$5 million under her leadership. Ms. Wilson has initiated trail-blazing programs in health, safety, domestic violence, economic justice and development and girls at the Foundation. Some include: Women's Voices, a bipartisan, multi-cultural policy guide designed to highlight the issues

that unify women across race, class, age and geography, and the Reproductive Rights Coalition Fund, which established state-by-state support coalitions that emphasized the importance of organizing in the states at a time when reproductive rights were treated almost exclusively as a national issue.

Ms. Wilson has led the way in creating jobs. She has generated more than \$2 million for the first funding collaborative on women's economic development. Many of Ms. Wilson's other grant-making and technical assistance programs, founded upon the idea that women have much to teach one another, have now become popularized as ways to place enterprising women--from community activists to micro-business managers to artists--in contact with each other.

HRC REMARKS AT BREAKFAST FOR DELEGATES TO 4TH WORLD CONFERENCE ON WOMEN - AUGUST 8, 1995

It's great to have you here, in the beautiful Indian Treaty Room. I apologize; I'd hoped to have you all over in the house, but it is public tour time, and there is no way we could fit this large a group without disrupting the tours. And so I'm very sorry. If any of you have not had a tour of the White House, let me know and we will fix that forthwith.

This is an extraordinary group of people. I hope you all know that about yourselves and about each other. And it is so exciting for me to stand here and look out at all of you and know what extraordinary leadership you are going to bring to this effort.

I believe strongly that this Fourth World Conference on Women holds great promise. And I believe that that promise can be at least partially fulfilled because of United States leadership. Many of you are here because of your various capacities in the private sector or the not-for-profit world. You have stood for the proposition that we all have a say in how women and girls are treated and how they are able to lead their lives throughout the world. We have to, in this country, recognize that many of the [] issues that will be discussed at the conference are ones that also have continuing relevance for our women and girls as well. We are not going to make a distinction between "those women" and "our women" I hope, but instead try to bring together all women's interests and issues so that their common experiences and needs can be understood and pursued.

There are issues about how to provide educational opportunity, how do we ensure access to the full range of health services that women need, how do we provide incentives and income-generating activities for women and how do we ensure women's full political participation in their societies? All of those are issues for us, as well as people in other parts of the world.

We also have a great stake in promoting a human rights agenda that does not marginalize women's rights. I have said, over and over again, that women's rights are human rights. They are not distinguishable and we should stop treating them as if they were.

So with respect to the issues that we believe are most relevant to what will happen in the next ten, twenty, thirty years on behalf of women, we come out with very strong opinions, based on the American experience, a willingness to learn and

listen from other experiences, but I hope, with a very strong commitment to making common ground.

Our overall message should be one that focuses on women as agents of change, as active and full participants in their societies, as people being able to meet the challenges of today and tomorrow. Therefore I think it is critical for the United States to lead, and to give leadership not only at the Conference, but afterwards and into the future. This is something that I feel very strongly about, it is certainly something that the President feels strongly about and obviously all of you do as well.

When I had my marvelous trip to South Asia with my daughter, I was impressed over and over again at the ways that women [] were taking control, step by step, over their own lives. I think that's contagious, if we are agents of that contagion. I think that if we continue to speak out for women's rights, everywhere, the lessons that I saw being acted out in places like India and Bangladesh will spread. And I saw that when I went to Denver recently and visited a project which is working to provide women on welfare with an equal amount of opportunity and the skills to pursue them, I felt as though I had been transported back to that village in Bangladesh where I listed to women say that they were going to take power over their own lives, that they were going to make a better life for themselves and their children, that they were going to overcome the obstacles that they confronted. Being brave enough in India or Bangladesh to send a daughter to school, being brave enough in Pakistan to seek family planning assistance, being brave enough to stand in the long lines that are often necessary to obtain the services one needs for oneself and one's family, is all part of what we want to focus on. And I think we have a great opportunity to continue educating the American public about what women and girls are up against around the world and draw some analogies with our situation back here at home.

Because this conference gives us the platform not only to play the leadership role that I know we will play, but also to communicate more practically with women back here in the United States. This is, after all, the seventy-fifth anniversary year of women having won the right to vote in America. We will be celebrating that about a week before the conference begins in Beijing. It is a sense of deja-vu all over again, to some extent, to go back and read some of the comments and speeches that early suffrage leaders gave, in the nineteenth and early twentieth century. And it is also a sense of disappointment, when we realize that many of us have not been willing to take advantage of even the most fundamental right, that is the right to vote in our own country. So much of what I see coming out of this conference and the months following it is to try to recreate some sense of mission and commitment in the lives of women and girls. Even if we are only able to increase the percentage of women who vote in the next election, even that to me is a

significant step in women being willing to take responsibility for themselves.

We also hope to build on the previous commitments made at United Nations Conferences at Rio and Vienna, at Cairo and Copenhagen. These have been very important conferences. They have outlined significant steps that societies are willing to take and should be pressured to take on behalf of men, women and children. So we will be doing all we can with respect to the previous commitments that the United States have signed on to; to affirm those, and to use them as a base upon which whatever comes out of Beijing can be constructed.

It is critical, for example, that we focus on a life cycle approach to health and the whole range of health concerns that women - including reproductive health, but making it clear that that is part of the overall life cycle of women. If little girls, in many parts of the world, are denied medical assistance, so that they die at a disproportionately higher rate because if they make it to infancy they are not taken care of, that is a serious health issue. If women are not given the kind of assistance that they need with both pregnancy and the other diseases that may affect their reproductive cycle as well as diseases that may interfere with their whole [] that is a health issue.

So there are many people who wish to discount this Conference or purposefully mischaracterize it - that is nothing new, that happens about ten times an hour in Washington - and it is part of our job to make it clear that being for women and girls is neither being against men and boys, nor is it being against families. Those are the most absurd, shop-worn arguments that the far Right always digs up and throws at us whenever we start talking about women and girls. If we were to have a meeting about men and boys, you would not hear that. So it is part of our responsibility to make very clear that this Conference is, yes, about women and girls, in part to give women the tools they need to be fully functioning members of their own families, their neighborhoods, their communities and their societies. And I think we should be very strong in stating that position over and over again. And I am tired of people who have done nothing to promote the rights and responsibilities of women and girls in this country, let alone around the world, and try to act as though those of us who care about the future of our daughters and our granddaughters and ourselves are in some way undermining some utopian ideal that never existed.

We also take human rights issues very seriously. As Madeline Albright said last week in Congress - something that should not have needed to be said - it is precisely because we do take human rights seriously in this administration that we must be in Beijing, with a strong and active voice. So this is a very important effort to have, to take part in. We're delighted not only that you are going to be in Beijing, but also to implement

the platform for action by relating the messages that come out of Beijing to millions of Americans.

This is not a partisan issue. I don't think, as I've said many times before, that education and health care are Republican or democrat, conservative or liberal. It is human. It is an issue that every one of us should do all we can to ensure we and those we love have access to, so we should start trying to expand those opportunities to all women and girls.

So I hope that as we prepare for this Conference, and as each of you thinks about your own participation and the role you will play, that you will also consider how to get the message out more effectively here at home. So this becomes not only a conference that has an impact, but one instead that has a wide-ranging, rippling effect, that has a life of its own and continues to grow and take root here in America and around the world.

I have told women that I have talked with around the world that what I would love to see come out of Beijing is a one page document - I don't care if there is a nine hundred page document behind it. But a one page document that in very clear language states the kind of agenda for change that every single woman can understand, that can then be translated into as many languages as we possibly could achieve to be used as an organizational tool in communities throughout the world. Obviously, it would be simple, but they are simple matters that we should be focused on. Matters of access to education and health care, full participation of women. That itself could be a revolutionary statement, and a revolutionary plan of action, if it were achieved. Other people can spend their time doing an exegesis of every comma and period; that is for people who have no interest in the agenda of change, but rather try to block it.

What I want to see is something very clearly stated, that every single one of us can use, could fold up, and could see make a difference in people's lives. It would be something like the sixteen principles of the Grameen bank, which some of you know so well. They range from the very practical - "we will build and use pit latrines" - to the very difficult and challenging - "we will not let dowry enter into our marriage relations of our children" - to the extraordinary idealistic - that we will become self-sufficient and make a difference in our lives and our families'. That is what I hope will come out of Beijing - something that is clear, unequivocal, and serves as a basis for action. And I'm delighted that all of you will be part of this conference and part of making this message known throughout the world. Thank you very much.
