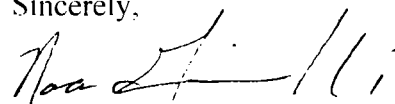
Your role in this exchange will be to discuss how AIDS has influenced foreign policy, and what future steps the White House plans to take to address the situation abroad.

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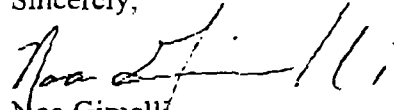

On behalf of the Council on Foreign Relations, we would like to invite you to participate in a panel discussion on the impact of the global AIDS pandemic on US national security. We anticipate this event for April or May and would work with you to arrange a mutually convenient date.

Council members would welcome your views on the critical issues surrounding the international AIDS epidemic. 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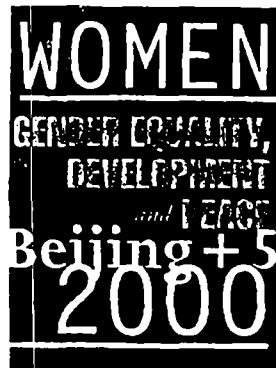
