PanAfrica Business and Investment Summit
Bringing Business and Opportunity To Nashville

Nashville – Nashville will play host to a gathering of leaders from more than eleven African nations offering Tennessee business leaders opportunities to tap existing and emerging markets in Africa.

Now in its sixth year, the PanAfrica Business and Investment Summit will be held in Nashville at the Doubletree Hotel November 11-13, 1999. The Summit's theme, "Building Partnerships Between Africa and the U.S. in the 21st Century" adequately describes an event considered one of the most ambitious efforts at establishing Tennessee as a conduit to trade between Africa and the United States.

Since the first PanAfrica Summit was held in Nashville in 1994, the event has gained momentum each year. Last year's Summit proved especially advantageous for the Tennessee Valley Infrastructure Group (TVI Group), a Chattanooga-based consortium that includes companies from Oak Ridge, Trenton and Murfreesboro. The TVI Group builds what the company calls "a utility in a box"; transportable containers that can provide basic water purification, electricity, telecommunications and healthcare services useful for small to medium-sized communities. "The Nigerian ambassador linked us with Mobile Oil-Nigeria. As a result, we are now working with them to put in units in Nigeria as they privatize their utility sectors," says TVI Group President Richard Ector.

The Summit will feature workshops that will:

- examine the key factors of successfully conducting trade between African nations and Tennessee business enterprises;
- involve participating African dignitaries as resources in establishing partnerships;
- share information and insights gained by participants who have first-hand experience with international business partnerships; and
- provide participants with a checklist to help them gauge their readiness to do business in Africa.

Tennessee government officials have been quick to recognize the PanAfrica Summit's potential for increasing trade between Tennessee and Africa. Governor Don Sundquist delivered a welcome address at the Summit last year and is interested in embarking upon a trade mission to Africa that would include the commissioner of economic

development, agricultural commissioner, as well as Tennessee business leaders and legislators with interests in Africa.

The Summit's impact is also being felt in areas that extend beyond business development. According to Dr. Leonard Madu, the PanAfrica Summit's president, partnerships have been established in areas ranging from law enforcement to higher education. Madu cites the creation of the Hassan Adamu Distinguished Professorship at Tennessee State University in Nashville earlier this year as an example of the promise the Summit has for strengthening Tennessee/Africa business relations.

"Relationships established at one level at the PanAfrica Summit often extend to another," says Madu. Explaining that a science and technology student exchange program between Tennessee State University and the University of Science & Technology, Yola, Nigeria is the result of an invitation to visit Nigeria extended to TSU President Dr. James Hefner by one of that country's ambassadors at last year's summit. Madu also hopes a relationship established between the Metropolitan Nashville Police Department and its counterpart in Gambia meets with success.

In addition to serving as a medium for American companies to showcase their products, services, and technologies, the conference will serve as a forum for internationally known figures to weigh in on efforts to tackle socioeconomic issues that affect businesses worldwide.

Former congressman Ronald V. Dellums (D-California) will facilitate a special workshop highlighting the effects of the AIDS/HIV pandemic on business development in Africa. In the workshop, Dellums will outline details of his "AIDS Marshall Plan for Africa", a plan that calls for the U.S. to appropriate \$1 billion over a five-year period to curtail the spread of HIV/AIDS in Africa through treatment, education and research.

"Mr. Dellum's plan has already been introduced to Congress in the form of a bill," says Charles Stevenson, director of government affairs for the Washington office of Healthcare International Management Company. "We are optimistic."

Ron Dellums serves as president of Healthcare International Management Company. The company establishes relationships between underserved communities and health maintenance organizations and is a facilitator of the PanAfrica Business and Investment Summit.

"The PanAfrica Summit's goal is to strengthen both economic and cultural exchange between the U.S. and Africa," says Madu, "leading to strong alliances that result in growth for Tennessee companies."
