SUBJECT: Deputies Committee Meeting: Enhanced USG Response to the Global AIDS Epidemic

In February, Sandy Thurman and I convened an Interagency Working Group on expanding our role in the global HIV/AIDS crisis. The meetings included representation from State (including USUN), USAID, DOD, Joint Staff, Treasury, Commerce, CIA, DOL, DIA, HHS (including NIH and CDC), OVP, OMB, USTR, NEC, NSC and OSTP. (note: Peace Corps is now being added.) We have been working closely with Gayle and Nora on the IWG which has substantial Africa equities.

The IWG has prepared a Consensus Document, which summarizes the current context of the expanding epidemic, extent of USG HIV/AIDS activities, funding issues, and "next steps" for USG action which can be agreed at the A/S level (penultimate draft attached).

A number of issues and actions discussed by the IWG would benefit from the Deputies buy-in to help move implementation quickly. A few others would require decisions. We would like your comments on, and approval of, this outline before we draft the DC discussion paper this week.

1. Coordination and Leadership issues

--Structure and Coordination of USG HIV/AIDS Programs: We will propose that Deputies approve the IWG recommendation to expand staffing of Sandy Thurman's office.

--Enhanced International Leadership: Details of the "Presidential Envoys for AIDS Cooperation" (PEACs) initiative will be laid out for discussion and approval. Possible deliverable for the US-EU Summit; and or G-8.

--Cooperative HIV/AIDS efforts with other nations: - Next steps to ensure economic burdensharing, especially in the planning for the US-EU Summit and G-7/G-8. We will be prepared to outline the macro-level costs of specific interventions, such as prevention and care, preventing mother-to-child transmission, provision of antibiotics in Africa, etc.

--Competing budget initiatives for AIDS funding: Gaining support for the Administration's additional \$100 million increase while dealing with Congressional

interest in a variety of other, even larger, earmarked increases for AIDS. WH Legislative Affairs and ONAP are taking the lead on this, and will have recommendations in advance of the DC.

2. Security Issues:

--**DOD engagement:** South Africa, Nigeria, Rwanda, Zambia, Cambodia, Ghana and Eritrea are a few of the countries already requesting DOD assistance for mil-mil AIDS prevention activities. Funding of \$10 million is in the President's FY 2001 budget request, although reprogramming FY 2000 funding for this purpose is an option needing discussion by the Deputies. The future earmarking of DOD/State IMET funding for AIDS training Should also be discussed, and we believe that Deputies should task DoD to develop a comprehensive, global plan for tackling HIV-AIDS in our mil-mil relations.

--**Intelligence amplification:** Will propose that Deputies approve a specific mandate for intelligence community reporting on the extent and impact of the epidemic.

--**UN Peacekeeping:** Next steps for ensuring mandatory HIV/AIDS prevention efforts for all UN Peacekeepers.

3. Economic and Humanitarian Issues

--**Finance:** Consider how to increase speed of HIPC countries accessing debt relief funding for AIDS control activities. Ensuring increased World Bank (IDA) funding of the President's AIDS and vaccine initiatives. Consider the pros and cons of, and possible options for expanding targeted debt relief to non-HIPC countries, such as Nigeria, that have both significant debt and AIDS problems. There is considerable disagreement on this issue. The decision for the Deputies is whether the issue is important enough to explore new debt initiative or other financial instruments.

--**Enhancing Access to needed medicines:** Establish an IWG tasked with making recommendations to enhance the developing world's access to needed medicines. A group, chaired by HHS and USTR are already working to followup the announcement made by the President in Seattle. Next steps will be outlined.

--**Business Community outreach:** The VP has publicly committed to hosting a meeting of U.S. business leaders whose firms are active in Africa. The meeting will call for corporate resources and ideas to 1) protect the international workforce from HIV/AIDS, 2) joint efforts to stop the spread of global AIDS, especially from mother-to-child. Leon will be prepared to provide further details.

--**USG task force to focus on the challenges of delivering services (and drugs) to reduce mother-to-infant HIV transmission.** In his recent speech to the African Summit the President emphasized his support of this initiative. Consider options and costs to move forward.

SUBJECT: Global AIDS Crisis IWG Consensus Paper

Thank you for sharing with me the revised version of the IWG Consensus Paper on expanding the USG role in controlling the international HIV/AIDS epidemic. The document provides a useful roadmap to our actions in the months ahead. I am pleased that you also view it as a work in progress. Indeed, I believe that it will grow and evolve considerably as we begin to give this issue the attention it warrants -- both here in Washington and at our posts overseas. You should be aware already of the tremendous response we have received from our Ambassadors in Africa in response to my request to each of them to draft a country specific HIV/AIDS strategy that they will oversee.

In reviewing the Consensus Paper, I have some concerns on both substance and process that I would like you to factor into this initiative as we move forward.

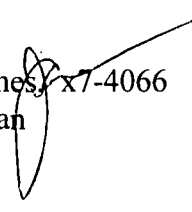
- **Decision Making:** It is not clear to me from the paper how decisions on outstanding issues will be made. I believe that this should be explicit so that everyone involved understands the process.
- **Private Sector Mobilization:** I believe that we need to add a concept for motivating the private sector to make substantial investment in HIV/AIDS prevention. Organizing a roundtable series with U.S. companies and encouraging them to concert their efforts to invest in combating HIV/AIDS would be a useful further step. In this regard, I want to call your attention to the excellent plan that Chevron produced for the U.S.-Angola Bilateral Consultative Commission to be held in Luanda on May 4-5.
- **Options Papers:** I feel very strongly that we can do much more in the areas of pharmaceutical availability and Debt for AIDS swaps. My staff will be working on options papers on these two issues to feed into the IWG process.

- Presidential Envoys: I believe that the PEACs idea has great merit and would like to see us overcome the bureaucratic hurdles and move ahead as quickly as possible with this proposal, certainly by the time of the G8 summit in July. If we miss that deadline, we would lose a tremendous opportunity provided by the final G8 summit of the Administration.

Enhancing the Response to the HIV-AIDS Pandemic in sub-Saharan Africa

USAID

Of a total HIV/AIDS budget of \$125 million in FY 1999, USAID is expending \$74 million (60%) in sub-Saharan Africa, funding HIV/AIDS prevention and mitigation programs in 24 sub-Saharan countries. An additional \$7 million is being expended in Africa from the *Supplemental Fund for Children Affected by AIDS*. The USG provides nearly 50% of development assistance monies for sub-Saharan Africa and has invested over \$650 million dollars in Africa for HIV/AIDS since the beginning of USAID support in 1986.

In addition to this substantial effort, the following activities represent new, or expanded initiatives to accelerate and enhance the response to the pandemic, especially in the most severely impacted countries, most of which are in sub-Saharan Africa:

1. **FY 2000 Budget Request:** In the Bureau Budget Submission, for FY 2000, USAID has requested increased funding at \$127 million. The additional \$2 million is intended to increase the scale of our program in India from one to two Indian States, Tamil Nadu and Maharastra.
2. **Increased USAID Funding:** Based on our experience with the successful programs in Uganda and Senegal, a minimum of \$2.00 per adult per year is necessary to mount an basic HIV primary prevention program, that includes a selected set of care and support interventions to enhance the prevention agenda. Thus, a minimum of \$500,000,000 would be required for the African sub-continent. It should not be the sole responsibility of the USG to contribute this sum. Other donors, lending agencies, host country governments, and corporations must also increase their financial contributions. An additional \$20 million/year for the USAID HIV/AIDS budget would focus on sub-Saharan Africa and would achieve the following (These proportions would vary in each country based on the phase of the epidemic and the level of the response, thus far): Approximately 30% would be devoted to reduce mother-to-child HIV transmission and for orphan support. 30% would be devoted for expanded programs for African youth, who now represent the most critical vulnerable population for primary prevention interventions. 40% would be expended for "prevention-to-care" continuum activities that link voluntary HIV testing and counseling to decreasing risk behaviors in HIV negative individuals and basic support and care for HIV positive persons.
3. **Debt Relief:** USAID will assist with exploring debt relief options. We are currently working with the Department of Treasury and other relevant organizations to explore the innovative use of debt relief, rescheduling or swap mechanisms in order to increase host country resources.
4. **Storm Warning Initiative:** USAID will devote an additional \$750,000 for regional activities for six southern African countries (Malawi, South Africa, Zambia,

Zimbabwe, Tanzania, and Mozambique) There are four basic components for this initiative: targeting cross border transport corridors, improving policy dialogue tools, enhancing sharing of "lessons learned, and improving region wide HIV surveillance.

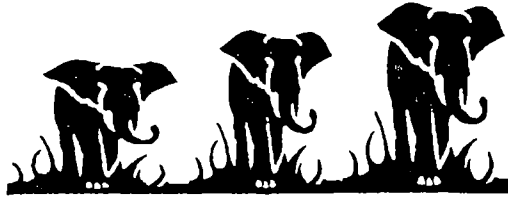
5. **The African Partnerships Initiatives:** Working closely with UNAIDS (new partners-CEOs and Foundations), USAID will focus on four critical areas: assist in the development of a Technical Support Platform to increase technical assistance capacity; explore increased resources through dialogue with U.S. based Foundations; enhance the U.S. Diplomatic initiative by linking with the efforts of other Ambassadors; and improving the exchange of best practice and lessons learned within the region.
6. **Diplomatic Initiative:** In collaboration with the Department of State, USAID is currently finalizing specific African country analyses to determine strengths and gaps in the existing country response and talking points for U.S. Ambassadors on selected aspects of economic impact talking points.
7. **Follow-on activities to the African/African-American Summit:** To be determined upon the return of the U.S. Delegation.
8. **Advocacy Role:** USAID will accelerate efforts to use our role at numerous fora (Binational Commissions, SADC, OAU, Great Lakes Initiative on AIDS, etc.) to address the critical issues of political commitment, allocation of sufficient resources and dealing with stigma and discrimination.

SUBJECT: Input for the Interagency HIV/AIDS Paper

We appreciate the opportunity to provide input for an interagency paper on HIV/AIDS, which will form the basis for a report with recommendations to the President in June. Specifically, we were asked to comment on: (1) State's activities to respond to the HIV/AIDS epidemic in sub-Saharan Africa; and, (2) suggestions for possible additional funds, and how these new resources could be used to shape a strengthened and more coordinated USG response to the epidemic. When reviewing the HIV/AIDS epidemic in Africa, the option of doing nothing simply is not there. We welcome your efforts to build consensus among key agencies and departments for USG follow-up to your recent trips to Africa.

With regard to State's activities, back in 1995 the Department of State's US International Strategy on HIV/AIDS laid out a strategy of three broad goals: prevent new HIV infections; reduce personal and societal impact; and mobilize national and international efforts. In 1999 AID will spend \$74 million in Africa (out of a worldwide budget of \$125 million) on AIDS programs. A recent multi-agency review of the HIV/AIDS strategy highlighted numerous successes, as well as areas for future action. One of the most significant areas for improvement is "strengthening political commitment by governments to more actively address HIV/AIDS and its impacts." Accordingly, the Secretary of State instructed all ambassadors to urge heads of state, foreign ministers, labor ministers, economic ministers, and others as appropriate to openly address the HIV/AIDS pandemic in their own countries and the adverse economic, social, political and security impacts; urge

other governments to increase spending or to reallocate funds to prevent the spread of HIV/AIDS and to strengthen AIDS research efforts; emphasize the importance of National AIDS Action Plans involving all relevant government agencies, ministries, non-government organizations, and the private sector; and to encourage foreign leaders to support the Joint UN Programme on AIDS.

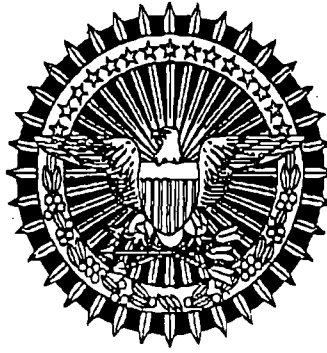
Thus, the State Department, as the lead US foreign affairs agency, has led efforts to develop bilateral and multilateral partnerships on HIV/AIDS, asking all diplomatic posts to raise awareness with host-government officials. This has resulted in HIV/AIDS now being addressed at the highest levels of government and across the spectrum of political bodies as well. We plan to continue this effort.

Most recently, at the first ever U.S.-Africa Ministerial (March 1999) and U.S.-SADC Forum (April 1999), we held discussions with senior African officials from across the continent on HIV/AIDS. Discussions focused particularly on the impact of HIV/AIDS, and the importance of pursuing solutions that address the social, economic, political and security aspects of HIV/AIDS. We agreed at the Ministerial to deepen our partnership with African countries in the areas of collaborative research on HIV/AIDS, effective and affordable treatment, and also to cooperate on efforts to build African capacity to better monitor the prevalence of the disease. At the SADC Forum, the U.S. and SADC countries agreed to pursue collaborative efforts to develop a unified AIDS policy in southern Africa.

In our view total USAID spending on AIDS in Africa needs to be increased by at least \$20 million (additive to total budget, not an earmark requiring cuts in other important areas.) With these funds AID could undertake a much more aggressive three pronged program of working with youth, adults and children. Infection rates are much lower with young people, where there is still time to change habits to avoid even higher AIDS rates in the future. Programs could be undertaken through schools, youth clubs and the media to educate young people about the risk of AIDS and what they can do to protect themselves. Turning to adults, more voluntary testing would be useful. Experience has shown that after testing, whether the results are positive or negative, behavior changes to a

life style less likely to infect the individual and others. Increased funding would also allow AID to begin programs to reduce suffering in adult victims of AIDS. Finally, many African children are suffering greatly from AIDS either because they are orphans or were born HIV positive. Local community support is limited for these children, and thus the U.S. should start programs to help these innocent victims working through NGOs.

\$20 million is not a lot of money, but a budget increase in this range would allow AID to significantly increase its programming. Given the scope of the AIDS tragedy in Africa, the U.S. should do much more to help.

International HIV/AIDS Analytical Working Group Scope Paper

Deputies have requested that further analysis be undertaken to help inform consideration of international policy objectives with respect to HIV/AIDS. As a starting point, we would like to organize in a paper the best available information on a number of basic questions regarding the path of the pandemic and its potential sensitivity to various policy goals and resource input scenarios. Following is a draft outline of such a paper, which is intended to provide a baseline of information for participants in the interagency process as well as serve as a vehicle for identifying topics ripe for further research.

Goals and Targets

- What goals/targets would correspond to a halt in the expansion of the pandemic in hard-hit developing countries? A reversal (modest vs. substantial proportions)?
- To what extent do existing international targets (e.g., UNAIDS and USAID) correspond to these objectives? What level of (improvement in) health care infrastructure do they assume?
- What specific goals/targets with respect to aspects of prevention, treatment, and care have been employed in individual countries or regions that have succeeded in halting or reversing the expansion of the path of the disease? Is it appropriate to extrapolate from these to international goals and targets? To what extent do they correspond to existing international targets?
- What is the relative sensitivity of outcomes to the addition of resources in the following areas? How are outcomes influenced by the mix of resources among them?
 - Prevention, including mother-child transmission.
 - Health care intervention, including infrastructure.
 - Support for orphans.

Resources

- Estimate current annual levels of:
 - US assistance for prevention, care, treatment, orphan support, and research.
 - EU, Japan, and other OECD country assistance.
 - Developing country resources (assess range).
- Estimate global and regional resource gaps for different targets (e.g., halting the expansion of the pandemic vs. reversing it vs. making as much of an impact as is practicable given the constraints of culture, poverty, distance, etc.).
