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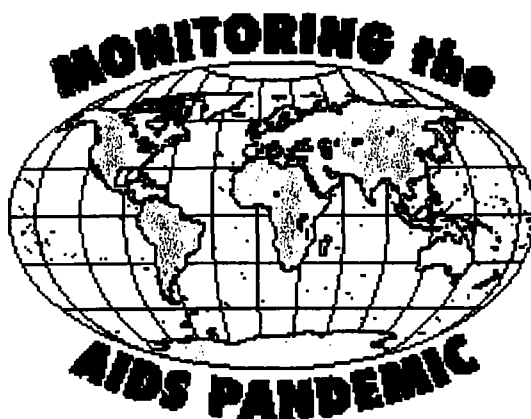

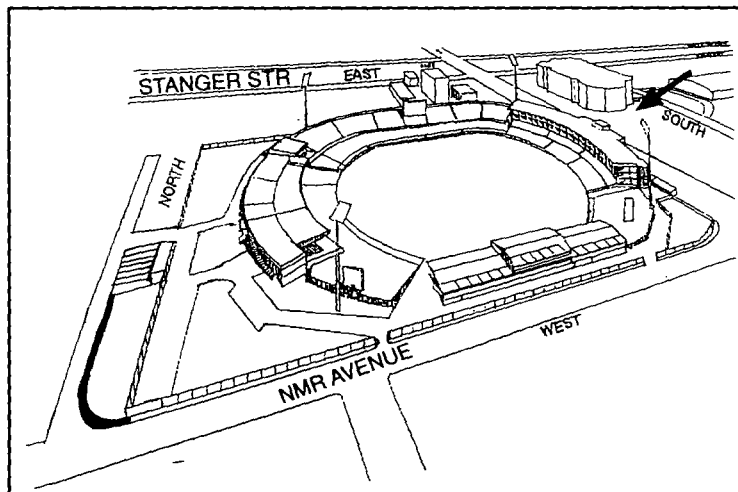

With deep respect for the many challenges he faces, I salute President Mbeki's pledge last night to intensify South Africa's efforts against HIV/AIDS. I want to reaffirm the United States' partnership in the growing effort to expand prevention programs, prevent mother to child transmission and to provide the best possible care and treatment for people living with HIV/AIDS. We must act quickly. We have a brief window of opportunity to turn the tide here in South Africa and elsewhere but that window is closing fast. Every single day brings an avalanche of new infections especially among the poor.

This is a pivotal moment in the fight against HIV/AIDS as the pandemic increasingly grips families and communities across the globe. Poverty is indeed a primary AIDS issue. However, we must not forget the negative impact that racism, homophobia and gender inequity continue to have on our efforts to save lives. It is true that we will never win the battle against HIV/AIDS unless we reduce poverty. But it is also true that even in the absence of poverty, we still have HIV/AIDS. We must dramatically step up our prevention efforts now.

BRIEF ON THE NATIONAL GUIDANCE AND EMPOWERMENT NETWORK OF PHA IN UGANDA (NGEN+)

1.0 What is NGEN+?

This is a Network of people living with HIV/AIDS in Uganda. It was established in 1996 with an overall goal of bringing together People Living with HIV/AIDS to take part in HIV prevention and AIDS care efforts.

2.0 The goal of NGEN+

Bringing together People Living with HIV/AIDS and empowering them to participate in HIV prevention and AIDS care activities in the country.

3.0 Background of NGEN+

For many years, HIV had been looked at as a disease for the wrecked of the earth. People with HIV were shunned, discriminated and stigmatised every day of their life.

Apart from the culture, this condition was precipitated by religious moralism which created bad attitude and made sex a dirty thing. Many people who found themselves HIV infected were living in a world where they did not belong!. There was no body they could talk to and that made HIV/AIDS one of the most debilitating disease the world has ever had. There was lack of focus and hope which made people even more dangerous to the community. They could easily spread the virus out of frustration.

It was therefore found necessary to build a Network of people living with HIV in order for them to find people they could relate with and share the problem. Networking among People Living with HIV/AIDS has turned out to be a very important forum and it is already yielding fruits in terms of people accepting their HIV/AIDS status and acting as a real face for HIV/AIDS and as agents of positive change in the fight. This has given Ugandans more understanding of the problem. They now know that HIV/AIDS is real, it does not discriminate, every one is vulnerable to it, it is a danger to both the old and the young, and the best way to fight is to get everybody change their behaviour, and attitude towards people infected with the disease.

Therefore, bringing together all people with HIV/AIDS in Uganda will go along way to stem the rapid spread of HIV especially in the rural community. For the Network to succeed, it needs support nationally and internationally and in all forms.

It is with this background that we wish to renew our commitment and collaboration with the UNAIDS which has supported as greatly in the promotion of greater involvement of People Living with HIV/AIDS in Uganda.

4.0 Objectives of NGEN+

- 4.1 Mobilise PHA in Uganda into local level Networks so as to create a common voice to advocate and lobby for an improved quality of life eg in care given by Non-Governmental Service Organisations and Government Institutions.
- 4.2 Empower positive persons to share experiences, skills and power in order to promote positive living among themselves and prevention practices. This is intended to expand survival options.
- 4.3 Promote self esteem and confidence and create a sense of belonging among positive persons in Uganda.
- 4.4 Work with Government Departments and other Non-Government Departments involved in HIV prevention and AIDS care, and the private sector.

5.0 How NGEN+ operates

NGEN+ works through a National task Force comprising of ten volunteers. The Task Force is headed by a National Coordinator assisted by a Project Manager and a Secretary.

The District Networks are headed by a District Coordinator assisted by a Secretary, and a District Core Group with officers as the specific District Members may wish.

The National task Force and the District Core Group are not static. The members are free to leave when they need and others are invited depending on the need available and their unique skills.

6.0 Activities and Achievements.

6.1 Establishing Networks of people living with HIV/AIDS

As of May, 1999, NGEN+ has been able to mobilise PHA in fifteen (15) Districts. The Districts include Kampala, Mukono, Masaka, Mubende, Luweero, Mpigi, Soroti, Kumi, Tororo, Jinja, Kabale, Kabarole, Lira, Kalangala and Rukungiri.

Mobilising PHA involves training them on issues like positive living, communication skills, networking, lobbying and advocacy, information on HIV transmission and prevention, and management of the disease.

6.2 *Prevention campaigns*

NGEN+ is involved in prevention campaigns in the Uganda Armed Forces (UPDF), the Uganda Police, and the Uganda Prison Services. By end of June, 1999 ninety two (92) establishments all over the country, of all the forces mention above would have been reached with prevention campaigns and message of hope for those who are infected.

6.3 *Lobbying and advocacy*

Lobbying and advocacy for an improved quality of life has continued to be at the forefront. NGEN+ is engaged in a dialogue with the Ministry of Health over increased accessibility and subsidy of the High Active Anti-Retroviral Therapy (HAART), and treatment for the most common opportunistic infections.

7.0 *Conclusion*

There is no doubt the support UNAIDS and UNDP have extended to NGEN+ has led to all its achievements and success. Fifteen (15) District Networks of PHA have been established. However, Uganda has forty five (45) Districts all of which have people with HIV who need to be reached. NGEN+ has the capacity to change the attitudes of the people of Uganda, which would enhance the gradual stemming of the rapid spread of HIV in this country. More support is needed, more lobbying and advocacy to help in accomplishing the mission of mobilising PHA in all the 45 Districts into Networks. The District Networks will subsequently spill over to the subcounties, parishes and villages. We feel this is one of the ways in which Uganda in its multisectoral approach, will continue to take lead in the fight against HIV/AIDS in Sub Saharan Africa.

Food and waterborne diseases are the number one cause of illness in travelers. **Travelers' diarrhea** can be caused by viruses, bacteria, or parasites, which are found throughout Southern Africa and can contaminate food or water. Infections may cause diarrhea and vomiting (*E. coli*, *Salmonella*, *cholera*, and parasites), fever (*typhoid fever* and toxoplasmosis), or liver damage (hepatitis). Make sure your food and drinking water are safe. (See below.)

Malaria is a preventable infection that can be fatal if left untreated. Prevent infection by taking prescription antimalarial drugs and protecting yourself against mosquito bites (see below). Most travelers to Southern Africa should take mefloquine to prevent malaria. Risk for malaria exists all year in the northern part of Botswana, rural areas of South Africa, all nonmountainous areas of Swaziland, and all areas of Zimbabwe except the cities of Harare and Bulawayo. There is no reported risk for travelers visiting Lesotho and St. Helena. For more detailed information about risk in specific locations, see **Malaria in Southern Africa**.

A certificate of yellow fever vaccination may be **required** for entry into certain of these countries if you are coming from a country in tropical South America or sub-Saharan Africa. (There is no risk for yellow fever in Southern Africa.) For detailed information, see **Comprehensive Yellow Fever Vaccination Requirements**.

Dengue, filariasis, leishmaniasis, onchocerciasis, and trypanosomiasis (sleeping sickness) are other diseases carried by insects that also occur in this region. Protecting yourself against insect bites (see below) will help to prevent these diseases.

Schistosomiasis, a parasitic infection, is found in fresh water in this region. Do not swim in fresh water (except in well-chlorinated

swimming pools) in Southern African countries. Because motor vehicle crashes are a leading cause of injury among travelers, walk and drive defensively. Avoid nighttime travel if possible and always use seat belts. (Please see the [Making Travel Safe](#) page for further recommendations on swimming and driving.)

CDC Recommends the Following Vaccines (as Appropriate for Age):

See your doctor at least 4–6 weeks before your trip to allow time for shots to take effect.

- Hepatitis A or immune globulin (IG).
- Hepatitis B if you might be exposed to blood (for example, health-care workers), have sexual contact with the local population, stay longer than 6 months, or be exposed through medical treatment.
- Rabies, if you might be exposed to wild or domestic animals through your work or recreation.
- Typhoid, particularly if you are visiting developing countries in this region.
- As needed, booster doses for tetanus-diphtheria, measles, and a one-time dose of polio vaccine for adults. Hepatitis B vaccine is now recommended for all infants and for children ages 11–12 years who did not complete the series as infants.

To Stay Healthy, Do:

- Wash hands often with soap and water.
- Drink only bottled or boiled water, or carbonated (bubbly) drinks in cans or bottles. Avoid tap water, fountain drinks, and ice cubes. If this is not possible, make water safer by BOTH filtering through an “absolute 1-micron or less” filter AND adding iodine tablets to the filtered water. “Absolute 1-micron filters” are found in camping/outdoor supply stores.
- Eat only thoroughly cooked food or fruits and vegetables you have peeled yourself. Remember: **boil it, cook it, peel it, or forget it.**
- If you visit an area where there is risk for malaria, take your malaria prevention medication before, during, and after travel, as directed. (See your doctor for a prescription.)
- Protect yourself from insects by remaining in well-screened areas, using repellents (applied sparingly at 4-hour intervals) and permethrin-impregnated mosquito nets, and wearing long-sleeved shirts and long pants from dusk through dawn.
- To prevent fungal and parasitic infections, keep feet clean and dry, and do not go barefoot.
- Always use latex condoms to reduce the risk of HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases.

To Avoid Getting Sick:

- Don't eat food purchased from street vendors.
- Don't drink beverages with ice.
- Don't eat dairy products unless you know they have been

- pasteurized.
- Don't share needles with anyone.
- Don't handle animals (especially monkeys, dogs, and cats), to avoid bites and serious diseases (including rabies and plague). (For more information, please see the Animal-Associated Hazards on the Making Travel Safe page.)
- Don't swim in fresh water. Salt water is usually safer. (For more information, please see the Swimming Precautions on the Making Travel Safe page.)

What You Need To Bring with You:

- Long-sleeved shirt and long pants to wear whenever possible while outside to prevent illnesses carried by insects (e.g., malaria, dengue, filariasis, leishmaniasis, and onchocerciasis).
- Insect repellent containing DEET (diethylmethylnolamide), in 30%–35% strength for adults and 6%–10% for children. Unless you are staying in air-conditioned or well-screened housing, purchase a bed net impregnated with the insecticide permethrin. (Bed nets can be purchased in camping or military supply stores.)
- Over-the-counter antidiarrheal medicine to take if you have diarrhea.
- Iodine tablets and water filters to purify water if bottled water is not available. See Do's above for more detailed information about water filters.
- Sunblock, sunglasses, hat.
- Prescription medications: make sure you have enough to last during your trip, as well as a copy of the prescription(s).

After You Return Home:

If you have visited an area where there is risk for malaria, continue taking your malaria medication weekly for 4 weeks after you leave the area.

If you become ill after your trip—even as long as a year after you return—tell your doctor where you have traveled.

**SURGEON GENERAL TO HOST PRESS CONFERENCE IN SOUTH AFRICA
TO BRING HIV/AIDS IMPACT HOME TO U.S.**

**Press Conference with Leading Federal Health Officials Held to be held
on July 9, 2000**

Durban, South Africa, July 2000 -- Surgeon General David Satcher will host a July 9 press conference with leading Federal officials on the devastating impact of HIV/AIDS on the United States, especially among communities of color. The press conference, which will be a precursor to week long events during the 13th International AIDS Conference, will take place from 1 to 2 p.m. in the Inzinga Room of the Durban Hilton at 12-14 Walnut Rd. The event will provide the media, HIV/AIDS researchers, practitioners, and consumers with an opportunity to interact with leading Federal health officials as they reveal important information on the latest medical research and treatment advances and discuss ground-breaking initiatives on access to care concerning HIV/AIDS.

"It is essential to engage in a conversation on the impact of HIV/AIDS throughout the world and in the U.S., where the epidemic continues to grow," Satcher said.

Joining Satcher will be: Ms. Sandra Thurman, Director of the White House National Office of AIDS Policy; Dr. Eric Goosby, Director, Office of HIV/AIDS Policy (OHAP); Dr. Anthony Fauci, Director of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases (NIAID), National Institutes of Health (NIH); Dr. Joseph O'Neill, Associate Administrator for AIDS, Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA); Dr. Helene Gayle, Director, National Center for HIV, STD and TB Prevention (NCHSTP); Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

At a time when HIV/AIDS is taking a tragic toll on populations around the globe, the U.S. is experiencing a crisis of epidemic proportions among communities of color. From July 1998 to June 1999 alone, 46% of AIDS cases reported were among African American adolescents/adults and 20% were among Hispanic adolescents/adults. To address the staggering statistics and raise national awareness of the problem, Dr. Satcher urged the Federal delegation traveling to South Africa to not only participate in discussions exploring the global outlook on HIV/AIDS, but also on ways to prevent the increasing problem domestically. "The HIV/AIDS epidemic is not only a devastating global problem, but also a domestic problem, and we must continue to use every means available to educate, motivate and mobilize communities to fight HIV/AIDS," Satcher

said. This press conference will help increase national awareness and consciousness of HIV/AIDS because it is not over - AIDS continues to affect everyone in all of our communities at home." 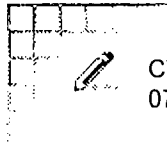

AIDS is not an isolated health issue. Over the past two years, USAID has been determining how to incorporate HIV/AIDS prevention programs into other projects. Wednesday's site visits will be to two USAID programs to discuss how they aim to do this through community approaches. (1) The Thekwini Business Centre, supported by USAID through the Ntinga Microenterprise Support Project, is looking at new ways to target and prevent HIV/AIDS through entrepreneurial business programs. (2) The area of Cato Manor was heavily affected by forced removals imposed during apartheid that caused families to become displaced and prevented cohesive development efforts. Several groups organised by the Cato Manor Development Association (CMDA) will speak about their housing and community development actions, highlighting their pilot efforts to also address HIV/AIDS. USAID supports the CMDA through the Project Preparation in developing housing on several

sites. CMDA is a multi-sectoral organisation committed to the redevelopment of the Cato Manor area undertaking housing, micro-business, recreational and other training activities. The Built Environment Support Group (BESG) is a housing/urban NGO supported under an AID umbrella grant that is undertaking housing activities that will provide an environment for care of HIV/AIDS orphans; the Durban Unicity Commission is involved with the HIV/AIDS database project that USAID is funding that will be useful as the newly created unicity is in the process of restructuring.

A drive-through the community will follow the group discussions.

Site summary sheets of these two projects are in the process of being updated. Final versions will be made available upon Ms. Thurman's arrival in South Africa. The updated Ntinga site sheet is attached for additional background along with the Project Preparation Trust (Cato Manor), but the latter is still being edited.

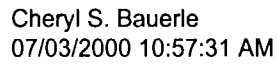

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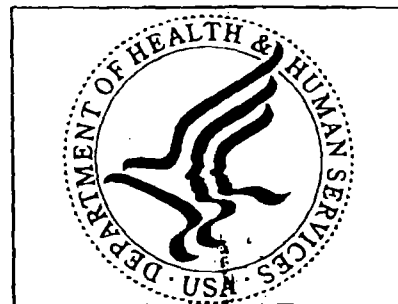

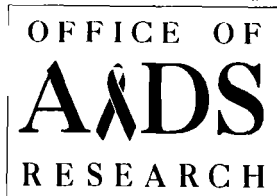
The XIII International AIDS Conference will be held at the new, beautiful, high-tech, fully air-conditioned International Convention Centre Durban, which is located near Durban's central business district, minutes from hotels and the beach and approximately 20 minutes from the airport.

The Centre consists of three floors with the main halls located on the ground level. There are three main halls that seat approximately 6,000 people when all walls are opened. Hall I has an amphitheatre that can seat 1,800. There are 23 additional meeting rooms of varying sizes. The top level of the Centre houses the hospitality suites, meeting rooms and the press rooms. The medical center, central kitchen and gift stop are located on the lower level as well as a bank, foreign exchange facilities and ATMs.

Registration for the International AIDS Conference will be at the entrance of the ground level and VIP drop off will be located on the lower level.

10,000 participants are expected to attend the conference and provisions have been made outside the Convention Centre to accommodate this size of a group. The Plenary Session will be held in the three main halls of the Convention Centre and closed circuit will be used to televise throughout the Centre and Exhibit Hall.

The Welcoming Ceremony will be held in the Cricket Stadium directly across from the Centre and various university and government buildings located nearby will house additional sessions.

on the International Partnership against AIDS in Africa

- Africa is the worst affected area of the world by HIV/AIDS – and AIDS is now the leading killer in Sub-Saharan Africa;
- In Africa, infection levels are highest, access to care is lowest, and social and economic safety nets are unraveling;
- About 23.3 million Africans south of the Sahara are HIV infected -- almost 70% of the world's total in a region that is 10% of the world's population;
- The progression of the disease has outpaced all projections. WHO projected in 1991 that by 1999 there would be 9 million infected and nearly 5 million cumulative deaths in Africa. The resulting estimates in 1999 are 2 – 3x higher, with 23.5 million infected individuals, and 13.7 cumulative deaths;
- In 1998 in Africa, 200,000 people died as a result of war – AIDS killed 2.2 million people;
- Life expectancy in southern Africa (which rose from 44 years old in the early 1950s to 59 in the early 1990s) is set to drop to just 45 years old between 2005 and 2010 because of AIDS; and,
- Between 12 and 13 African women are currently infected for every 10 African men. Girls aged 15-19 are around 5 – 6x more likely to be HIV-positive than boys their own age.
