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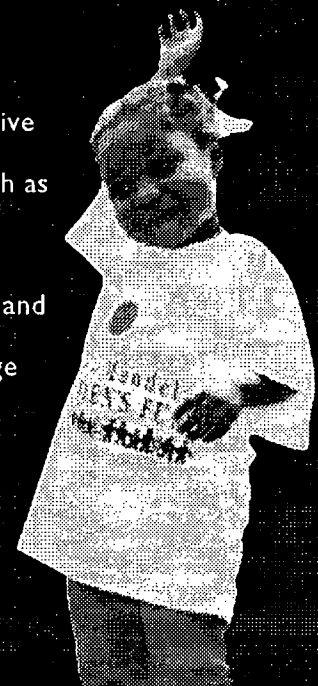
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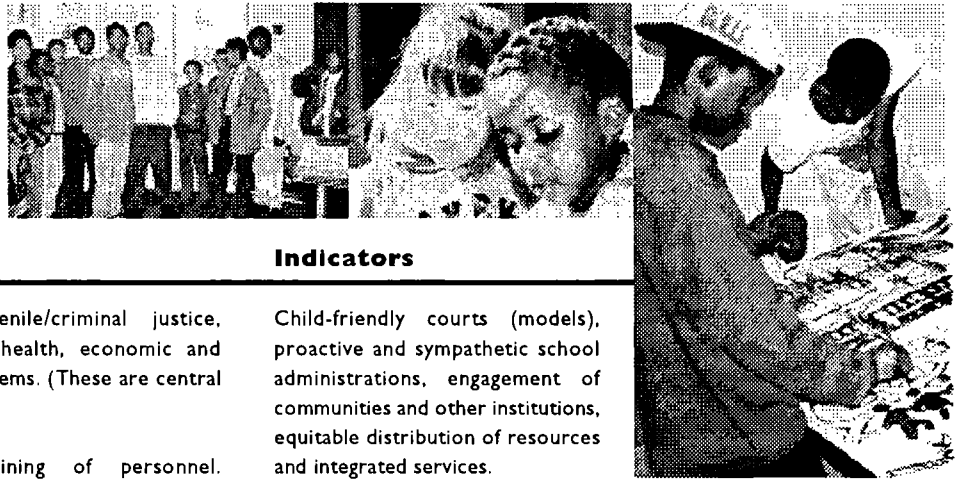

- Programmes and projects should seek to empower youth, especially those who live in seriously disadvantaged circumstances.
- Funding should preferably be directly received and managed by proposed recipients and not through funding agencies.
- The Fund seeks to build long-term relationships with prospective beneficiaries and would therefore not want to fund one-off events such as conferences.
- We wish to promote sustainability among recipients of our funds and therefore strongly encourage projects and programmes to have a range of committed donors. Where we provide seed funding for new initiatives, we will encourage and assist recipients in seeking additional funding sources.





Strategies

Indicators

Target institutions: Juvenile/criminal justice, education and training, welfare, health, economic and financial, community and family systems. (These are central in the life of a child.)

Intervention areas: Training of personnel. Contributing towards the development and the testing of new models with reasonable chances of success; promotion of partnerships among diverse sectors and; supporting the implementation of progressive policies.

Child-friendly courts (models), proactive and sympathetic school administrations, engagement of communities and other institutions, equitable distribution of resources and integrated services.

Intervention areas: ECD programmes focusing on the training of teachers; non-formal learning initiatives that contribute towards the development of communities in rural areas or underresourced urban areas; catch-up or bridging programmes; and skills development targeting vulnerable youth who are at risk of turning to crime or other unproductive lifestyles.

- Young people being integrated into the main stream in terms of both schooling and work;
- Viable job creation and social schemes developed for and by young people.

Intervention areas: Strategically placed organisations such as community radio stations, schools, clinics, non-governmental organisations and community-based structures will be encouraged to provide essential information to communities. Further, these organisations would be enabled to promote access to institutions, opportunities, service resources and information relevant to youth and children. This programme will at all times strive to be integrated into existing services.

- Empowered communities through improved access to information, opportunities, services and resources.
- Collaboration interagency cooperation and collaborative initiatives.

Target areas: Children affected by HIV/Aids, children suffering from abuse and the effects of violence and street children.

Strategy: Research and develop innovative models in critical areas for purposes of generating and testing new approaches which can be replicated.

- Innovative integrated community-based models.
- Better care and support for children within a holistic continuum of services.
- Management of child abuse, and equitable allocation of resources.
- Public education and community mobilisation around child care and protection.

Intervention areas: Education programmes on disability; community support programmes involving and empowering communities and parents to support and integrate disabled children; and integration of initiatives promoted within communities.

- Integration of children with disabilities into the larger community of children.
- Existence of community support institutions and programmes; and
- Existence of appropriate measures and facilities.

Intervention areas: Initiatives that mentor young people (with promise) in the arts, sports, science and culture; involvement of young people in finding and implementing solutions around their issues; entrepreneurs in the field of children; and initiatives that develop the leadership skills of children and young people.

- The emergence of new initiatives led and championed by the young for the benefit of children, youth and communities at large.
- A meeting of the minds – networks of young people across social and economic barriers.
- Case studies and publications.
- Replicable projects and programmes.

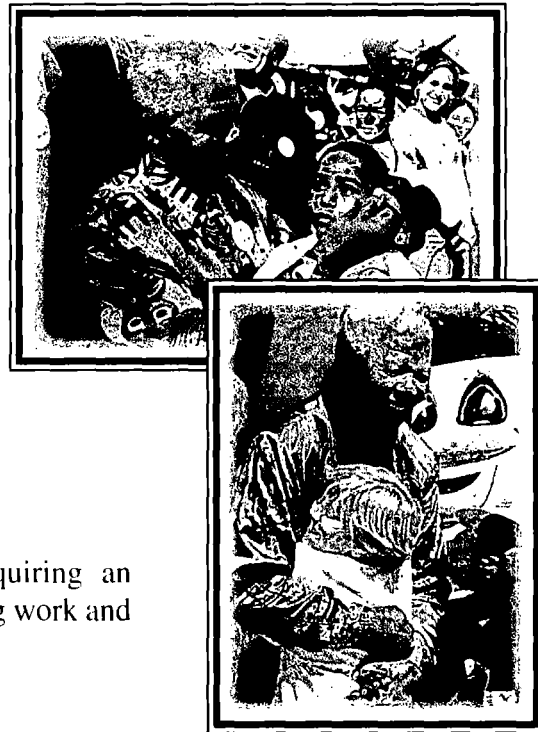
Our Purpose

Our focus is on children who find themselves in particularly difficult circumstances and who are abandoned, abused, exploited, have been deprived of educational opportunities or who are in conflict with the law.

Our Focus Areas

The NMCF has special interest in funding projects and organisations that work with children and young people who are:

- neglected, orphaned, abandoned and homeless;
- educationally deprived through poor past schooling;
- unemployed;
- disabled;
- sexually abused;
- at risk of habitual delinquency and requiring an appropriate environment aligned to a strong work and learning ethic;
- in dire straits.



Our Grantmaking Policy

- Children and youth of all races shall be the central beneficiaries of the Fund;
- The NMCF will strive in all its activities to be inclusive and to have balanced participation with regard to race and gender;
- In all its activities the NMCF will strive to empower youth who live in seriously disadvantaged circumstances;
- All funding requests will be assessed in terms of our funding criteria and procedures. This assessment may include an interview with the applicant and a visit to the project concerned;
- We prefer to deal directly with the proposed recipients of our funds and not through funding agencies;
- We seek to build long-term relationships with recipients and will do our best to ensure open and honest communication between the recipient and ourselves;
- We strongly encourage the funding of projects jointly with others.

Our Financial Policy

Our Financial Policy is designed to achieve the twin objectives of providing a reasonable flow of funds to be available for current grantmaking while still creating an increasing base for future sustainability of the Fund and its grantees.

Each year the Management Trustees Committee (MTC) sets by resolution the financial parameters of the Fund to achieve the above objectives.

In addition the following Key Ratios govern the amount of overheads to grant funding and funds raised:

The Nelson Mandela Children's Fund was established in 1994 to fund and support both new and already-existing programs that enhance the rights of disadvantaged children by strengthening their opportunities to integrate into mainstream society. The NMCF emphasizes sustainability and constant engagement in its beneficiaries, by and maintaining that funds be directly received and managed by the beneficiaries.

Their focuses last year were on children who were neglected, orphaned, abandoned, homeless, educationally deprived, unemployed, disabled, sexually abused, at risk of habitual delinquency, and children with HIV/AIDS. In addition, they stress the importance of the overall empowerment of youth of all races.

The NMCF's grants last year totaled 16,218,000 Rand, or approximately \$2.6 million, distributed to a total of 699 programs throughout South Africa. The Nelson Mandela Children's Fund is an independent trust that prides itself on its nonpartisan and creative approach to children's issues.

DURBAN -- On the last morning of the XIII International AIDS Conference in Durban, South Africa, the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) and the Nelson Mandela Children's Fund (NMCF) announced a \$5 million partnership to mobilize community support for children infected with and affected by HIV/AIDS.

As a result of this new funding, orphans and vulnerable children will receive special assistance through a three-to-five year project aimed at strengthening family and community-based care as vital weapons to fight the HIV/AIDS epidemic in South Africa. Parents and care-givers will get help to develop income-generating activities aimed at keeping their families together while coping with financial strains associated with the illness.

Former South African President Nelson Mandela and NMCF founder said, "AIDS is a problem beyond the capacity of any one community or any one province to solve on its own, or even any one nation alone." Mandela expressed concern that young people are at the heart of South Africa's future, yet are most at risk. He stressed, "We rely on their capacity for vision and on the courage that has been shown by people living with HIV/AIDS to give our nation the lead it needs to rise to this challenge. Let us care for those living with HIV/AIDS and the orphans, and give them support, with love and compassion."

Highlighted during the XIII International AIDS Conference was the staggering susceptibility to HIV/AIDS faced by women and children. USAID released a study finding that by 2010 at least 68 percent of the 44 million orphans in the world will have lost a parent to AIDS. The orphan crisis is most acute in sub-Saharan Africa.

Without specific targeted assistance to these groups most at-risk from the pandemic, children could be forced to curtail childhood activities such as school to take care of sick relatives. Family resources are also being stretched to exhaustion as increased medical expenses and lack of income from lost jobs or inability to work outside the home take a dangerous toll.

Ms. Sandra Thurman, Director of The White House Office on National AIDS Policy, said at the grant signing ceremony, "With this project, USAID connects the hearts of the American people with South Africans through the Nelson Mandela Children's Fund. The U.S. support of the Nelson Mandela Children's Fund microfinance program underscores the fact that AIDS is not just a health issue, but a fundamental development and economic issue as well."

PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN THE US AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT (USAID) AND THE NELSON MANDELA CHILDREN'S FUND.

Please refer to your letter to Mr. Nelson Mandela (May 26, 2000) requesting him to attend the ceremony, scheduled for June 15, 2000, at which the agreement between our organization and USAID was to be signed. The US Secretary of Treasury, Lawrence Summers and you were to have officiated on behalf of the US government.

Mister Mandela's office has informed us that he has a long-standing commitment in Umtata, Transkei and will unfortunately not be able to travel to Johannesburg or Pretoria to attend the ceremony. It would have been possible for him to host the ceremony at his home in Qunu, Eastern Cape. We understand however, that Mister Summers' tight schedule makes it impossible for him to travel to the Eastern Cape on that day.

We regret that circumstances prevents us from having someone as senior as Secretary Summers at the signing ceremony. The fact that he made himself available for such an event in the first place is to us an indication of how much importance your government attaches to our partnership.

Mister Mandela's office has however indicated his availability on the morning of July 14 2000 to sign the agreement with you, most probably in Johannesburg. I will soon confirm the exact time and venue.

May I take this opportunity to thank you for your support in making the partnership a reality? I should also place on record the praise that all our staff has had for Caroline Connolly who is due to leave South Africa soon. She, together with Dr. Ken Yamashita and the rest of the very professional USAID team, headed by Mister Stacy Rhodes made it possible for us to develop a vision for fighting AIDS that could change the lives of children in South Africa.

and members of their community. Because so many young and productive people are dying, efforts to eradicate poverty may be adversely affected. Government, not just ours, but all over the world, cannot fight this disease by itself. If we are to combat the spread and the impact of AIDS, we need concerted efforts by people from all walks of life.

The signing of this agreement between the US government and the Children's Fund is timely. A partnership is beginning, and its aim is to look for practical ways to help children affected and infected by AIDS. It will seek to mobilize local communities, give them the resources and the skills to devise responses that they think are correct and that they would be willing to take responsibility for.

I welcome this partnership and trust that it will lead to a meaningful response to the plight that vulnerable children find themselves in.

These practical efforts must of course be supported by the awareness that unless the spread of HIV is curbed, the problem will get worse.

I therefore call on young people to consider three things before they become sexually active.

One: start later.

Two: be monogamous

Three: be safe.

The *United States Government* and the *Nelson Mandela Children's Fund* are poised to join forces to meet the complex challenges of children living in a world of AIDS. This unique partnership marks a milestone in our shared struggle to turn the tide on AIDS and will impact countless lives for generations to come.

On July 14, 2000, the Honorable Nelson Mandela, Founder and Chairperson of the Nelson Mandela Children's Fund (NMCF), Ms. Sandra Thurman, the White House Advisor on HIV/AIDS, Mr. Delano E. Lewis, United States Ambassador to South Africa, and Mr. Achmat Dangor, Chief Executive Officer of the NMCF, will officially sign a grant agreement as part of the expanding partnership between the United States and the Republic of South Africa in the fight against AIDS. This grant will provide approximately \$5,000,000 over a three to five year period to the NMCF. The USAID-funded program of the NMCF will focus on community-based care and support for orphans and vulnerable children and help families affected by the epidemic establish income-generating micro-enterprise.
