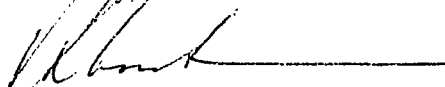

is responsible for more than two million deaths each year in sub-Saharan Africa, a figure ten times greater than the number of lives lost to war within the same region. Even more alarming is the fact that HIV prevalence rates in Africa continue to accelerate. It is anticipated that life expectancy in the African countries hardest hit by the epidemic will drop to age thirty within the next decade.

Many sub-Saharan African countries are only beginning to see the impact of these high levels of HIV prevalence. AIDS has reduced the number of economically active adults, leaving few to support the remaining population. Because AIDS takes the lives of people in their most productive years, the demographics of many countries are being altered. As a result, a new population of impoverished orphans has emerged.

In response to this crisis, the **Africa Now!** summit has been organized to build alliances among African and United States leaders.

Africa Now! will mark the first time that key African leaders have met in the United States with such a diverse group of experts to forge a stronger agenda on AIDS in Africa.

The **Africa Now!** summit has four goals:

- To initiate dialog among international leaders about the United States's role in addressing AIDS in Africa by comparing existing U.S. efforts with a survey of African priorities
- To further advance the efforts underway by agencies such as the United Nations and the United States government
- To create a framework document entitled "Principles of Collaboration to Confront AIDS in Africa," complimenting the UN's International Partnership Against AIDS in Africa
- To formalize a post-summit campaign to help address AIDS in Africa and to document the summit's findings

Africa Now! has been structured as a forum fostering an open atmosphere conducive to exchanging information. The chair will introduce topics and roundtable discussions will follow. Participants will have opportunity to identify how we can shift from raising awareness about AIDS in Africa to creating viable solutions *now!*

The invited participants include prominent United States and African leaders, government and community leaders, and members of academia. Also involved in the meeting are leaders from private corporations, philanthropic foundations, and multilateral institutions.

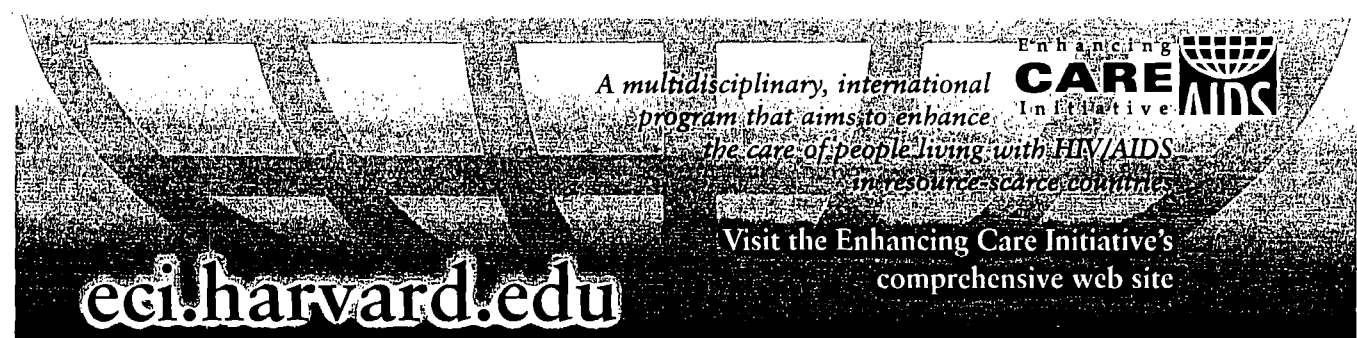

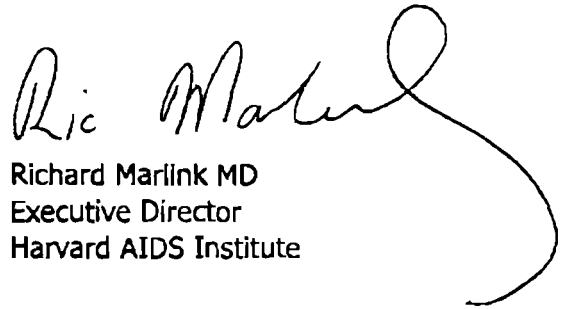

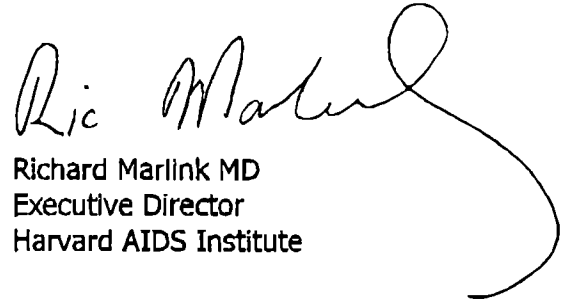

Principles of Collaboration when Confronting AIDS in Africa

We, the participants of **Africa Now! A Leadership Campaign to Define African Priorities for AIDS**, including heads of state and leaders representing African and United States interests, public and private, meeting in Cambridge, Massachusetts, November 12 through November 14, 2000,

Recognizing the impact of HIV and AIDS on human health, and the social and economic burden this epidemic places on sub-Saharan Africa, commit ourselves to the goals of the United Nation's International Partnership Against HIV and AIDS in Africa (IPAA).

In keeping with these goals and in the spirit of collective responsibility,

We urge all African leaders to:

- Reaffirm their leadership role, and to address the HIV and AIDS epidemic in an open and frank manner, ensuring high priority is given to the issue across all sectors and within all facets of each nation's development agenda.
- Facilitate partnership building at the local, regional, and international levels, and strengthen inter-country collaborative efforts to build capacity, using shared human, financial and technical resources and information networks.
- Expand national efforts to address the HIV and AIDS crisis, focusing on reducing the spread and impact, and the delivery of services to those infected and affected.

We urge all United States leaders to:

- Demonstrate commitment to confront AIDS in Africa through partnerships with African nations, and through urgent support for HIV and AIDS interventions as a critical part of overall development for Africa, guided by National Strategies for HIV and AIDS.
- Intensify efforts with African Nations to mobilize human, technical, and financial resources, and promote debt relief for Heavily Indebted Poor Countries as a critical avenue for resource mobilization.
- Foster mechanisms that dramatically reduce the spread and impact of the epidemic, and that improve access to anti-retroviral and HIV related pharmaceuticals in developing countries, in addition to the infrastructure for safe drug access.

In fulfillment of these goals we call upon both African and United States leaders to sign on to the following "Principles of Collaboration when Confronting AIDS in Africa":

1. African priorities must be in the forefront and African leadership the guiding force for collective African and United States efforts against HIV and AIDS in Africa.
2. Sustainable solutions to combat the epidemic must be derived through the long-term commitment of both African and United States leaders, with mutual accountability and transparency.
3. Partnerships created to address the epidemic within each African nation must benefit the public health and well being of individuals within that African nation.

Thus let us join hands in the spirit of our common humanity, to fight our common enemy, and ensure that every woman, man, and child in Africa has access to the resources to make choices regarding their health and to participate in the prosperity of the new millennium.

We thereby commit ourselves to the achievement of the goals via the Principles of Collaboration stated herein.

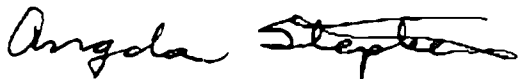
The topic I would like to interview Sandy Thurman about is how the international AIDS pandemic has become a national security concern to the United States. This is for a *National Journal* story to be published next month.

As in the past, we hope to open our program with a global view, highlighting the intensity of the pandemic in underdeveloped areas of the world, but stressing as well the common threads within the outbreak among all populations of economically and sociologically deprived groups, even in highly advantaged nations. This year would include a brief focus on the history of HIV/AIDS from both the medical and social science worlds.

The Mass. Medical Society and the Lemuel Shattuck Hospital, a Massachusetts Department of Public Health facility, are joined by the Harvard AIDS Institute, the Massachusetts Public Health Department, Boston Public Health Commission, the New England regional branch of the US Public Health Administration, the University of Massachusetts Medical School and nearly 20 other AIDS-focused agencies, including Fenway Community Health Center, as sponsors of this annual conference.

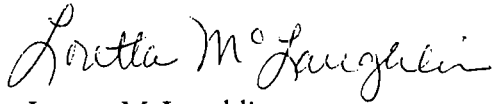

PROGRAM INTRODUCTION:

HIV/AIDS continues to expand relentlessly in most economically deprived nations and is still intensifying within disadvantaged groups in the developed world. Today, expensive anti-HIV/AIDS drugs permit far longer survival time for patients who have access to modern health care, who can tolerate the drugs, and who are able to comply with the rigorous regimen for taking them. However, toxic

reactions and co-infections are now a major cause of suffering for many of these people who have access to the drugs. Tragically, however, effective treatment remains beyond the means of the vast majority of HIV/AIDS sufferers across the world. This pandemic will continue unabated well into the 21st century without more aggressive outreach, prevention, treatment, and research.

- Demonstrate the impact of HIV/AIDS on medical, social, and ethical practices.
- Examine the prospects for the development and dissemination of an HIV/AIDS vaccine.

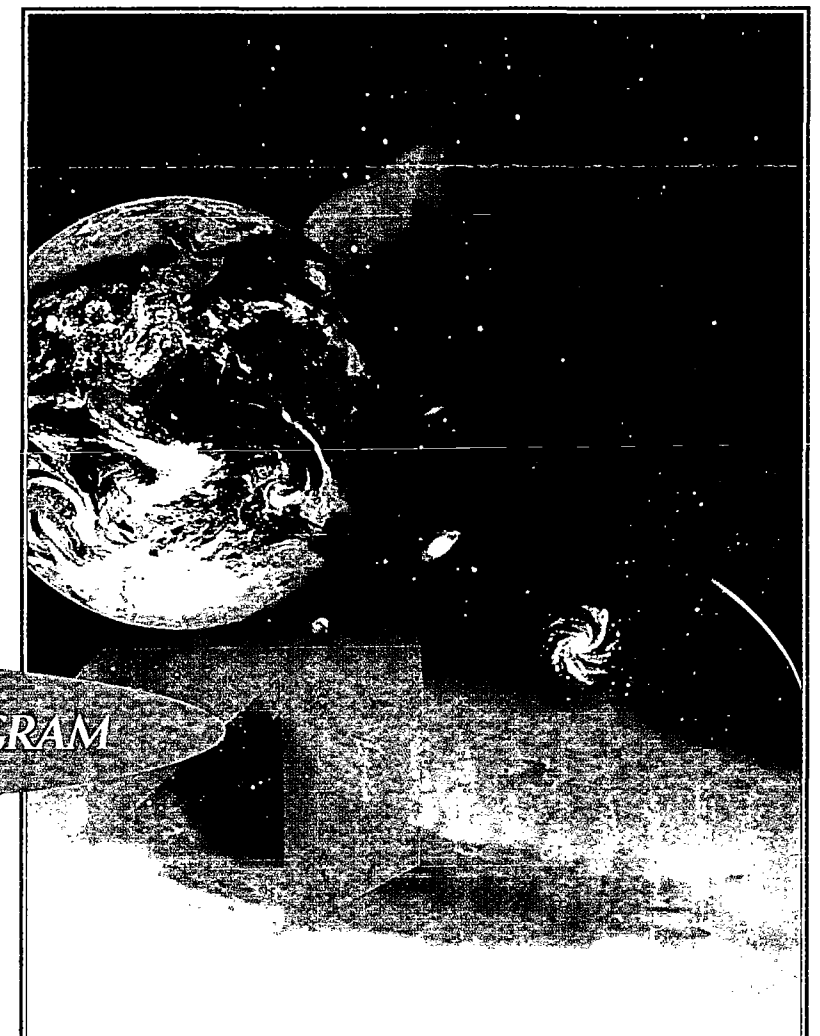

- Identify concerns of living and dying through patients' perspectives of the virus and treatment

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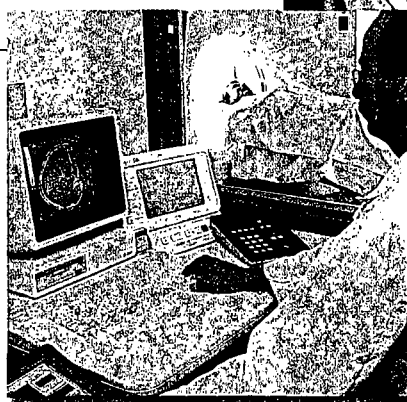
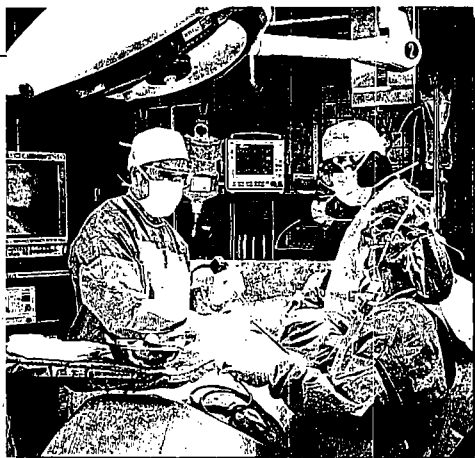

SHATTUCK CHILD CARE CENTER

The Shattuck Child Care Center, located on the hospital grounds, provides an educational and social environment which is both stimulating and satisfying for children between the ages of 15 months and six years. Licensed by the Massachusetts Office for Child Care Services for the care of 33 children, the center is staffed by two directors and six full-time OCCS qualified lead teachers. The Child Care Center offers a variety of group and individual experiences and activities designed to encourage a better understanding of self and the world through academic, scientific, artistic and perhaps most importantly, humanistic exploration and expressions. HOSPITAL VOLUNTEER SERVICES

The Lemuel Shattuck Hospital is supported by a caring volunteer staff made up of community members dedicated to the mission of helping those in need. Other Caring Programs & Services

YOUTH SERVICES PROGRAM

This program is designed to focus on the special needs of troubled youth. It offers psychiatric and neuropsychological assessment services to adolescents involved with the Massachusetts Department of Youth Services (DYS). This program was established to address the behavioral health needs of juvenile offenders. The program helps address the public health problem of youth violence and is consistent with the hospital's strong mission to serve the disadvantaged. BOSTON ALCOHOL DETOXIFICATION PROJECT

The Boston Alcohol Detoxification Project at Lemuel Shattuck Hospital provides treatment to clients age 18 years and older who are in need of medically monitored detoxification from substances of abuse. The Boston Detox team provides pro-active community outreach to the neighborhoods and approaches chemical dependencies as chronic, progressive, yet treatable diseases. Services provided include assessment and treatment of chemical dependencies, transitional care to help patients move to long-term stability, and transitional support services to help prevent relapse. LIVING AND RECOVERING COMMUNITY (LARC)

The Living and Recovering Community is a 30 to 90 day intensive residential program which offers comprehensive substance abuse stabilization and case management/housing search services for men and women living with HIV/AIDS who are in recovery. Managed by Victory Programs, LARC provides mental health services, substance abuse services, transitional housing, HIV/AIDS education, and primary healthcare. ROXCOMP METHADONE ASSISTANCE TREATMENT PROGRAM (MAT)

This program provides clinically appropriate, high quality, methadone treatment for opiate-addicted injection drug users, giving them the chance to begin and continue a successful recovery. Together with the Roxbury Comprehensive Community Health Center, the Lemuel Shattuck Hospital is able to address the problem of substance abuse, offer primary care services and work to stop the spread of HIV among substance abusers. SHATTUCK SHELTER

THE FRIENDS OF THE SHATTUCK SHELTER, LTD

The Friends of the Shattuck Shelter, LTD (The Friends) and The Shattuck Shelter-Center for the Homeless have formed a uniquely creative and effective public-private partnership. The Friends, a private nonprofit founded in 1984, is made up of committed community and business leaders who have created a compelling mission of service. That mission includes the development and implementation of a continuum of critical programs for homeless people that move them out of homelessness, as well as advocacy that attacks the root causes of homelessness. The Friends fundraising has provided hundreds of thousands of dollars to support the programs and services of The Shattuck Shelter. Together The Shattuck Shelter and The Friends have made their mission a reality, developing and implementing one of Boston's largest and most innovative continuum of programs for homeless people and those at risk of homelessness. The Friends now serve over 350 people each day throughout Massachusetts through contracts with local, state and federal agencies.

HISTORY

It was a bitterly cold day in 1983, when The Lemuel Shattuck responded to another public health challenge, homelessness. The 100 bed Shattuck Shelter was set up in the hospital's auditorium. Today, The Shattuck Shelter-Center for the Homeless provides an integrated continuum of critical programs that more than 325 homeless people rely on each day. The Lemuel Shattuck Hospital ensures they have access to quality health-care through daily medical and behavioral health clinics, social services and referral to community resources. The Shattuck Shelter contact number is: 617-522-8110, ext. 229.

EMERGENCY SERVICES**Substance Abuse Street Outreach**

Seven days a week, outreach teams are on the streets of Boston helping homeless people survive and building trusting relationships that will lead them toward the mental health, medical, substance abuse and housing services they so desperately need.

EMERGENCY SHELTER

The Shattuck Shelter houses more than 200 people each night, providing a safe place to sleep, nutritious meals and an integrated case management program that ensures each guest receives individually targeted services, including mental health, substance abuse, employment and housing.

THE TRANSITION OUT OF HOMELESSNESS**Stabilization Services**

Since 1987, the Stabilization Program (19 beds) has provided four to six weeks of intensive substance treatment specifically targeted to individuals who have had great difficulty remaining drug and alcohol free.

WORK CONTRACTS PROGRAM

This program (30 beds) offers employed individuals living in the Shattuck Shelter the opportunity to receive enriched case management services and maintain employment. The goal is to move these individuals into housing within six months.

TRANSITION TO INDEPENDENT LIVING PROGRAM (TIL)

The TIL Program is a long term residential program (35 beds) that focuses on employment, substance abuse and mental health treatment, education and daily living skills. Comprehensive case management helps prepare these individuals for the successful transition back into the community.

SHATTUCK SHELTER

HIV/AIDS AND WELLNESS

The Green Door Project

The program goal is to ensure homeless individuals have access to information about HIV testing, HIV testing itself and referral for the medical and social services they may need. Green Door provides services at sites throughout the Boston community.

Life Lines

Working with over 150 agencies statewide that serve homeless men and women, Life Lines provides educational training for staff and consumers; local, regional and statewide capacity building for HIV/AIDS services, and distributes critical harm reduction materials to homeless individuals and the programs that serve them.

IMPACT EMPLOYMENT SERVICES

IMPACT works with over 1000 homeless men and women and those at risk of homelessness each year. IMPACT prepares them for their job search, and provides job matching and support during the job search. IMPACT maintains a Training Programs data base for individuals whose goals for employment need to include training.

TRANSACCESS

This program provides transportation-related assistance to those at high risk of homelessness: welfare recipients who are required to find employment or lose benefits. TransAccess and its partners help develop transportation that connects low income communities to areas rich in employment opportunities.

PERMANENT HOUSING

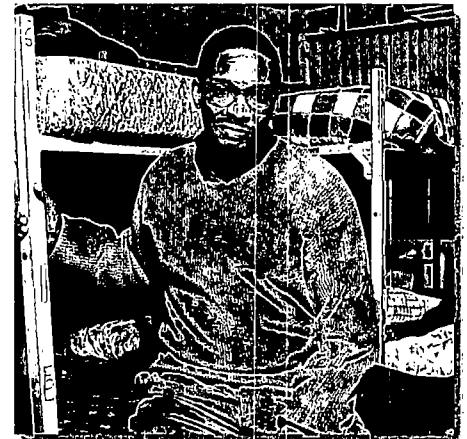

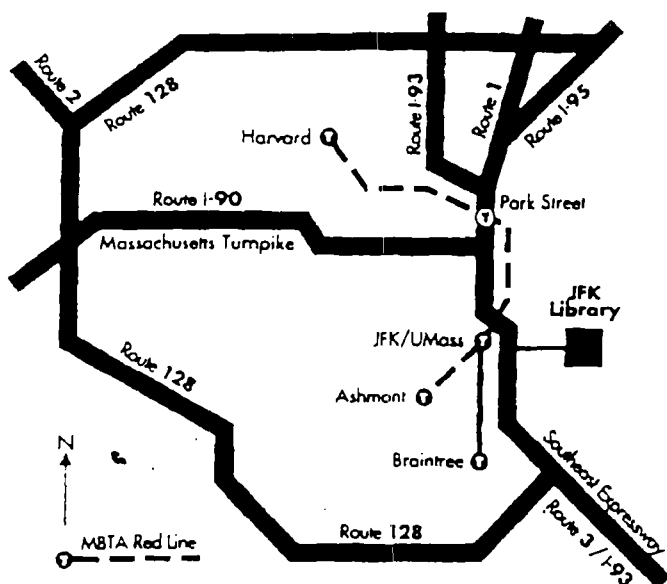

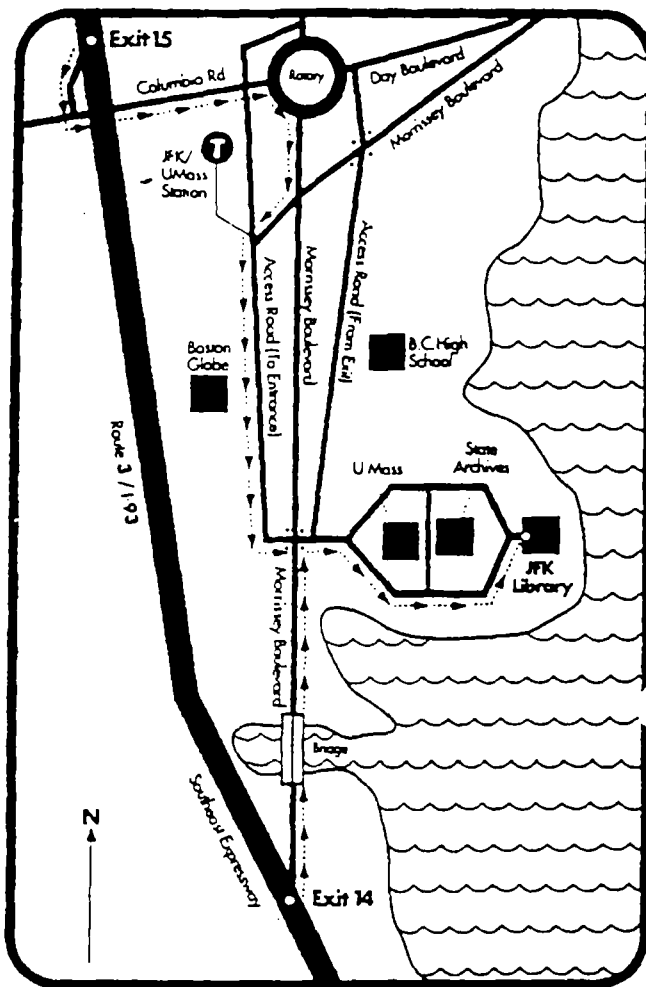

In 1981, the CDC reported the first cases of an illness which later would be called acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS). A generation later, HIV/AIDS has become one of the worst health problems in the history of mankind. 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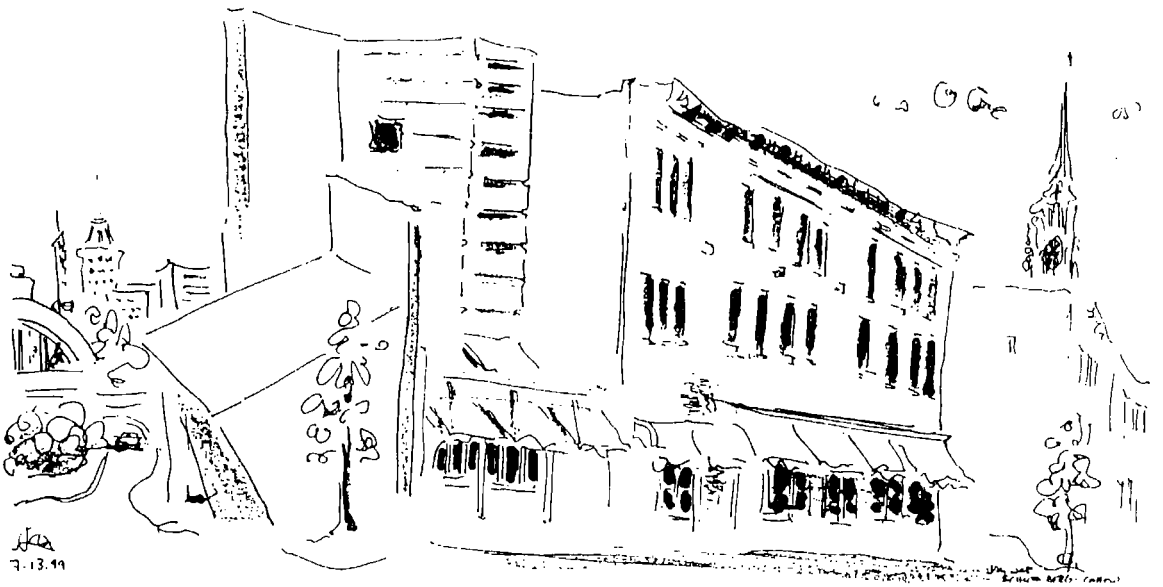
