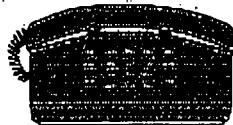

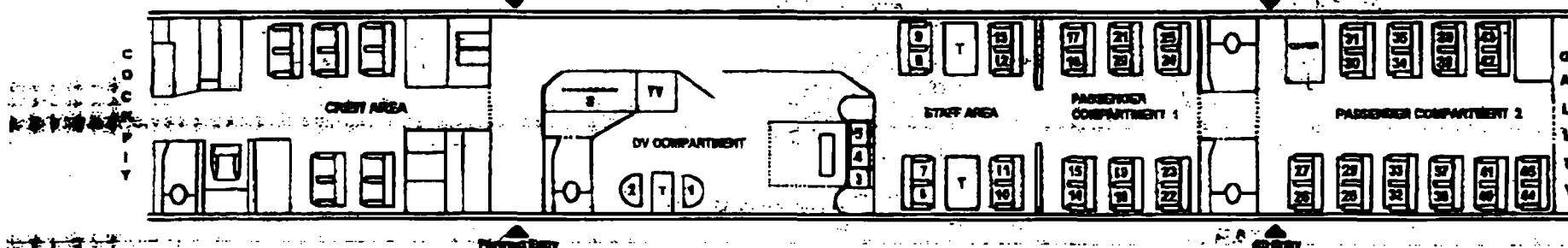

THE AIDS CRISIS IN SOUTHERN AFRICA

HOW SHOULD WE RESPOND?

Primary Prevention of HIV is More Important than Ever: Globally, the most sustainable way to care for HIV affected individuals and communities is to help them curtail the spread of the virus. Eighty percent of the 23 million people living with HIV/AIDS (PLHA) in sub-Saharan Africa today acquired HIV infection through heterosexual activity. Even in the absence of an effective HIV vaccine, we already have a set of tools to provide men, women and young people with the information, skills and materials they need to reduce their sexual risk through abstinence, mutual sexual fidelity with an HIV negative partner, and/or use of barrier methods (male and female condoms). These tools include carefully targeted mass media campaigns to help to change social norms and reduce stigma surrounding HIV and AIDS, advocacy and policy dialog to mobilize political and financial support for HIV and STI services, and intensive face-to-face education and communication, ranging from peer outreach and education to community theater that communicates key facts to groups at highest risk, in terms that make sense locally.

Provided by media, Non Governmental Organizations (NGOs) and in private and public clinics and hospitals, correct information and motivational messages do convince youth and adults to attempt to stay safe. However, less than 10% of Africans at risk have access to technically sound, safe, voluntary HIV counseling and testing (VCT). This shortage of VCT services is all the more important in high prevalence settings, because HIV testing, combined with appropriate counseling, is one of the most effective methods to achieve a perception of personal risk, that is critical to sustained behavior change. VCT services also provide the best entry point for interventions to prevent mother to child transmission of HIV (MTCT) since confidentiality can be maintained, and appropriate counseling about breast feeding and prevention can be provided for HIV negative mothers and their partners (see below)

Since existing Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs), such as gonorrhea, chlamydia or syphilis, can dramatically increase the efficiency of HIV transmission, effective STI treatment, including risk reduction counseling and partner referral, is also among the most effective means to reduce HIV transmission.

Unfortunately, programs that help to reduce HIV risk behavior and to prevent and treat STIs are woefully underfunded in Africa. USAID, combined with all of the other international donors and national government resources, reach only 10% of the at-risk population.

Care for Those Who are Already Infected with HIV: Complementing prevention with selected care interventions is an important task of effective national HIV/AIDS programs. Appropriate care and support services increase the impact of prevention programs and reduce the suffering of individuals, families and communities. Sustainable care and support services that can be provided in an equitable manner despite severe resource shortages include linking clients of VCT services to psychosocial support networks (often linked to faith networks); provision of treatments for opportunistic infections, especially tuberculosis which is the leading killer of HIV infected persons in Africa; and developing means to permit effective and compassionate care of people with advanced HIV disease utilizing a home based care approach.

Protecting Infants-Reducing Mother to Child Transmission: Mother To Child Transmission is the second most common cause of HIV infections in the world, accounting for about 10% or 600,000 of new infections annually. Of 10 children born to a mother with HIV infection, it is estimated that two will be infected during pregnancy or delivery, one will be infected through breastfeeding, and seven will remain uninfected. We now have new tools available that can reduce HIV transmission to the infant, but numerous ethical and technical barriers to making these tools widely available. Delivering these interventions, requires putting VCT services in place, as well as protections against stigma and discrimination, because so few women know their HIV status when they enter antenatal care, and because women may be abused by their partners and communities if their HIV status becomes known. While every life is precious, it is important to remember that, if this intervention is to have a public health impact (which aims to bring the greatest health benefit to the largest number of people), its benefit will not come from the relatively small number of newborns protected from HIV infection, but instead, from the power of making HIV testing and counseling available for pregnant women and their partners. It is critical to remember that even in the most severely affected countries, seven out of every ten pregnant woman who receive screening will **not** be infected with HIV. If this woman and her partner can be provided with effective counseling, she may never become infected in the future, thus preserving her life, as well as her future children.

Children Orphaned by AIDS: Children who have lost one or both parents to AIDS have especially great need for our help. This is not only for humanitarian reasons, but also because orphans represent an extremely vulnerable population by virtually all measures - nutrition, health, educational attainment, economic welfare, and so on. They are more likely to acquire infection as economic pressures push many into exchanging sex for money or food. Given the enormous scale of the problem, there are both financial and technical reasons USAID's response to orphans focuses at the

community level and strives to keep children in their communities, through fostering and a number of other approaches. Research in sub-Saharan Africa indicates that for cultural, economic, and psychosocial reasons, placing infants and children in institutions (such as orphanages) should always be a last resort.

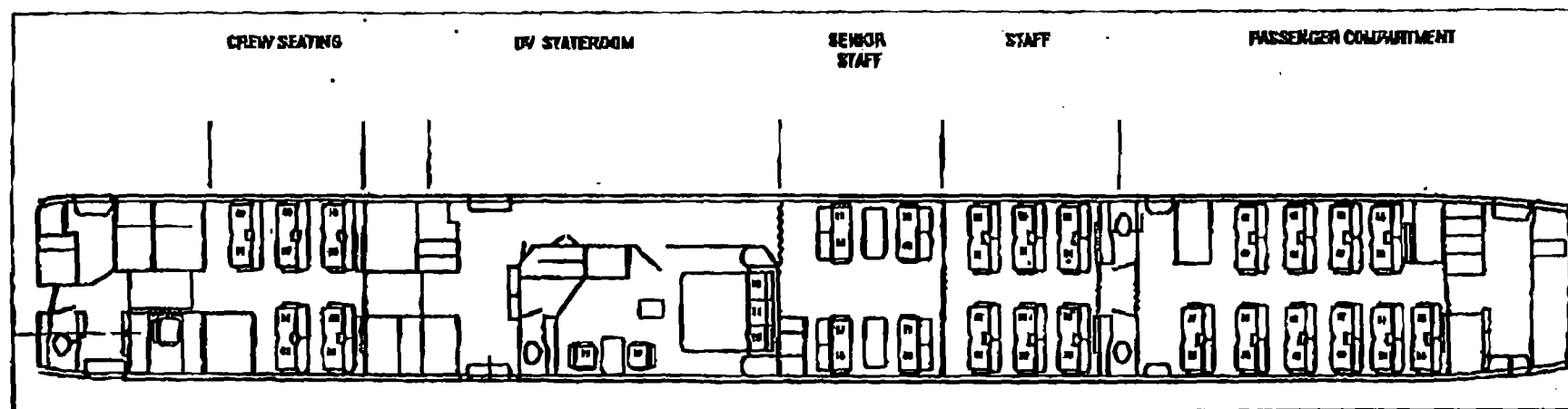
What do we do now?

- We must increase resources for programs that reduce primary sexual transmission of HIV. Using these resources, we must build the capacity for communities and governments to respond to this pandemic over the long term.
- Stronger, more coordinated and broadly based advocacy to increase political commitment from African governments and other leaders is critical. It not only garners the necessary resources, but even more important, it creates a conducive and enabling environment for the delivery of critical prevention and support to those populations that need them the most.
- Resources for mother-to-child HIV prevention efforts and for orphan support must be additive to those for primary prevention. It does not make sense to damage campaigns to protect men and women from becoming infected in the first place, in order to pay for protecting newborns and to support orphans.

**WHITE HOUSE AIDS CZAR LEADS PRESIDENTIAL MISSION TO AFRICA:
RESPONDING TO CRISIS OF CHILDREN ORPHANED BY AIDS**

WASHINGTON, DC - Sandra Thurman, Director of the White House Office of National AIDS Policy, announced that she will be leading a Presidential Mission to southern Africa departing on March 27, 1999 to look at the needs of children orphaned by AIDS.

According to the US Agency for International Development, by the year 2010 more than 40 million children will be orphaned by AIDS--more than 90% of these will live in sub-Saharan Africa. This growing tragedy challenges African nations and their international partners to join together in a much needed response.

This past World AIDS Day, December 1, 1998, President Clinton announced a new \$10 million emergency initiative to address this issue. He also directed Ms. Thurman to lead a delegation of Congressional members and administration officials to visit southern Africa and report back with their observations and recommendations on the crisis of children orphaned by AIDS.

Joining Ms. Thurman on this trip will be Representatives Barbara Lee, Sheila Jackson Lee, and Carolyn Kilpatrick. In addition, key staff from the offices of Representative Pelosi and Senators Hatch, Helms, and Kennedy will be participating.

Community members joining this delegation include:

David Dinkins (international activists and former Mayor of New York)
Rory Kennedy (documentary producer)
Bill Harris (children's health expert)
Jacob Gayle (UNAIDS liaison to the World Bank)
Bishop Edwin May (United Methodist Church).

The delegation will travel to Uganda, Zambia and South Africa. Participants will meet with persons directly affected by the AIDS epidemic, including children orphaned by AIDS and those that are struggling to care for them. In addition, meetings have been scheduled with senior administration officials from each of the three countries, their US ambassadors, and those who are working on behalf of USAID and other government agencies to provide assistance to those in need.

The delegation will return on April 5, 1999.

- ❖ There are over 5,500 funerals a day in Africa for people who have died of AIDS.
- ❖ By 2010, more than 40 million children will be orphaned by AIDS; 95% in sub-Saharan Africa.

AIDS IS REVERSING DECADES OF PROGRESS IN SUB-SAHARAN AFRICA AND STANDS AS AN OBSTACLE TO ALMOST EVERY DEVELOPMENT OBJECTIVE.

- ❖ In the coming decade, AIDS will reduce life expectancy in sub-Saharan Africa by 20 years, bringing life expectancy in South Africa from 60 to 40 years, in Zimbabwe from 65 to 39 years, in Uganda from 54 to 43 years, and in Zambia from 56 to 37 years.
- ❖ In the coming decade, AIDS will double infant mortality (infants under the age of 1) in many sub-Saharan Africa countries and triple child mortality (children ages 1 to 5).

AIDS WILL NOT ONLY BRING UNFATHOMABLE HUMAN SUFFERING BUT WILL JEOPARDIZE THE ECONOMIES, THE STABILITY, AND CIVIL SOCIETY OF MANY SUB-SAHARAN AFRICAN NATIONS.

- ❖ According to *The Economist*, a recent study in Namibia estimated that AIDS cost the country almost 8% of GNP in 1996. Another analysis predicts that Kenya's GNP will be 14.5% smaller in 2005 than it would have been without AIDS, and the per capita income will be 10% lower.
- ❖ A report released by the World Bank last week states: "The question is, will this pandemic destroy the developing nations' hard earned economic gains or will governments get their act together in time? Clearly time is running out."
- ❖ Reports are that HIV/AIDS has hit professionals hard in sub-Saharan Africa, with a serious impact on civil servants, engineers, teachers, miners, and military personnel. According to one World Bank study, 34% of people with post-secondary education were HIV+, compared to 18% of those with a primary education, and civil servants were more than three times more likely to be HIV infected as farmers. Increased insurance and training costs, and disruption due to sick and bereavement leave is seriously affecting both the private and public sectors. Because advancement into management often requires an HIV test, fear of being fired often makes skilled workers remain in low level positions.
- ❖ It has been reported that most sub-Saharan nations have a high HIV prevalence in their militaries, including an estimated 80% in Zimbabwe. US military officials have raised this as a serious stability concern. Uganda, the AIDS success story, turned its epidemic around because President Museveni realized during the revolution that a high percentage of his soldiers were HIV+. When he became President he lead an all out war on the virus.

- ❖ A South African anti-crime institute has linked the growing number of children orphaned by AIDS to future increases in crime and civil unrest. Without appropriate intervention, many of the 2 million children projected to be orphaned by AIDS in South Africa will raise themselves on the streets, often turning to crime, drugs, commercial sex, and gangs for survival. This not only effects social stability but dramatically increases their risk of HIV.

THE AIDS PANDEMIC IN SUB-SAHARAN AFRICA FORESHADOWS WHAT LIES AHEAD IN ASIA, INDIA, AND THE NEWLY INDEPENDENT SOVIET STATES.

- ❖ According to UNAIDS, the worst is yet to come -- and sub-Saharan Africa provides a window on what that other parts of the world will look like. Given that the virus takes about nine years to develop into full blown AIDS, Asia and India are seen as harboring time bombs just waiting to explode.

DETERMINED LEADERSHIP AND PARTNERSHIPS HAVE MADE, AND CAN CONTINUE TO MAKE, AN EXTRAORDINARY DIFFERENCE -- AND SAVE MILLIONS OF LIVES.

- ❖ Uganda has been the world leader in demonstrating that even a country with limited resources and low levels of literacy could turn the tide on a burgeoning epidemic. President Museveni demonstrated bold leadership early on and made every government ministry take the problem seriously, and develop and implement its own plan for reducing stigma and transmission, and caring for those who become sick.
- ❖ Uganda created an enabling environment for donors, such as the US, to assist in this effort. The US invested \$40 million in HIV prevention in Uganda and HIV rates among pregnant women dropped from 30% in 1991 to 15% in 1995 to 8% in 1998. This is a result of education from top officials (called *the big noise* in Uganda); sex/health education (peer counseling) in the schools, churches, everywhere else; the availability of HIV counseling and testing; and the aggressive treatment of STDs.
- ❖ Countries such as Zambia, Malawi, Uganda, and Kenya have begun to develop initiative programs to care for the growing number of children orphaned by AIDS. In the longstanding African tradition, communities are finding creative ways to support the village in its efforts to raise its children, but many of these villages are already overwhelmed by the growing number of orphaned children.
- ❖ Through micro-finance programs like FINCA (Foundation for International Community Assistance), women are receiving loans, starting small businesses, and with increased household incomes, taking in children orphaned by AIDS. With support of non-governmental organizations, communities are coming together to deal with school fees, nutritional assistance, immunization and oral hydration, counseling, and the range of other needs that arise for orphaned children. These efforts are low cost strategies designed to empower women, protect children, and support extended families and communities in carrying for their own. For a small fraction of the cost of one orphanage bed an entire community of vulnerable children can receive care. The problem is that only a very small number of children receive even this modest level of support.
- ❖ Luckily, as captured in song by young AIDS educators in Uganda, *It is never too late to lead*. The crisis of children orphaned by AIDS is a horrible but still unfolding tragedy. It will continue to worsen throughout the next decade even if there are no new infections. We know this is coming, we know what works, and this knowledge beckons us to act.

SUBJECT: Designation of Presidential Mission to Africa

Purpose

To request your approval of a Presidential Mission to Africa led by Sandra Thurman and to include Members of Congress, community leaders, the Administration, and media.

Background

This past World AIDS Day, December 1, you joined Secretary Albright, USAID Administrator Atwood, and ONAP Director Thurman to announce \$10 million in emergency funding for AIDS orphans. This focus was predicated on a USAID report which estimated that the number of children orphaned by AIDS would exceed 40 million by the year 2010 (90% of which are in southern Africa). In addition, you requested that Ms. Thurman lead a delegation to southern Africa to assess the problem of AIDS orphans in that region, to heighten public awareness of their plight, and return with recommendations for future action.

Ms. Thurman is proposing a seven-day trip to include stops in South Africa, Uganda, and Zambia both to observe areas where the needs of children orphaned by AIDS are at a crisis level, as well as to visit other areas where US-funded programs are helping to address the problem.

This mission will provide an important opportunity for Members of Congress to see first-hand the magnitude of this problem, to build an appreciation of the effective role that US-funded programs can have, and to observe other community-based responses worthy of future support.

Recommendation

That you designate the trip to southern Africa led by ONAP Director Thurman, March 27 to April 5, a Presidential Mission.
