1. AMEMBASSY LUSAKA WARMLY WELCOMES VISIT OF DR. SANDY THURMAN, DIRECTOR OF THE WHITE HOUSE OFFICE FOR NATIONAL AIDS POLICY (ONAP), AND A SMALL GROUP OF COLLEAGUES TO ZAMBIA O/A JANUARY 28-30 TO LOOK AT WAYS IN WHICH THE USG CAN HELP ALLEVIATE THE PLIGHT OF ZAMBIAN CHILDREN AFFECTED BY THE HIV/AIDS EPIDEMIC. THE POST IS PLEASED TO GRANT COUNTRY CLEARANCE.

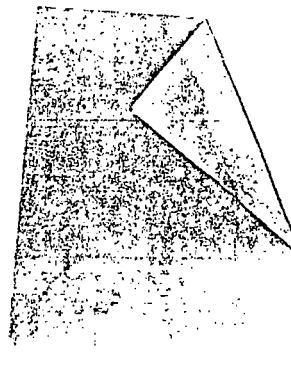
2. THE CONTROL OFFICER FOR THE VISIT WILL BE USAID DIRECTOR WALTER NORTH. HE CAN BE REACHED AT 260-1-254-303 (OFF), 260-1-264-845 (HOME), 260-1-254-532 (FAX), EMAIL ADDRESS WNORTH@USAID.GOV.

3. POST NOTES OTHER ACTIONS IN PARA 7 OF REFTEL AND WILL PROVIDE OTHER INFORMATION BY SEPTTEL.

4. THE TRAVELLERS MUST BE IN POSSESSION OF UP TO DATE MEDICAL AND MEDEVAC INSURANCE, AND CARRY SUFFICIENT TRAVELLERS CHECKS TO COVER ALL REQUIREMENTS WHILE IN ZAMBIA. THERE ARE CURRENTLY NO CHECK CASHING FACILITIES AVAILABLE IN LUSAKA FOR SHORT TERM VISITORS.

5. ENTRY REQUIREMENTS: ALL VISITORS MUST HAVE A VALID

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PASSPORT AND A VALID VISA. VISAS MAY BE ACQUIRED AT LUSAKA INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT. IMMUNIZATION RECORD IS REQUIRED OR ENTRY INTO ZAMBIA. NO SPECIFIC VACCINATIONS ARE REQUIRED; HOWEVER, YELLOW FEVER IS NECESSARY IF ENTERING FROM AN ENDEMIC AREA. OTHER RECOMMENDED VACCINATIONS ARE TYPHOID, TETANUS, DIPHTHERIA, RABIES AND HEPATITIS A AND B. MALARIA PROPHYLAXIS IS STRONGLY RECOMMENDED AND SHOULD BE STARTED TWO WEEKS BEFORE ARRIVAL. TRAVELLERS ARE ADVISED TO CONSULT M/MED OR THEIR PHYSICIANS FOR ADDITIONAL INFORMATION ON IMMUNIZATION.

6. LUSAKA'S CRIME THREAT IS RATED CRITICAL BY THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE. MUGGINGS, PURSE SNATCHINGS, CARJACKINGS, AND RESIDENTIAL BREAK-INS OCCUR REGULARLY. THERE HAS ALSO BEEN A VISIBLE INCREASE IN STREET CRIME IN DOWNTOWN LUSAKA, SO MUCH SO THAT IT IS ADVISABLE TO AVOID THIS AREA IF POSSIBLE.

7. NEVER WALK THE STREETS AFTER SUNSET UNLESS IT IS NECESSARY. ALTHOUGH THE STREETS AROUND THE HOTELS NORMALLY USED BY VISITORS - INTERCONTINENTAL, PAMODZI, AND HOLIDAY INN - ARE GENERALLY SAFE AND PROTECTED BY CONTRACT GUARDS, CRIMINAL ELEMENTS ARE IN THE AREA, AS EVIDENCED BY A NUMBER OF CAR THEFTS AND PURSE SNATCHINGS AT THESE HOTELS. NEVER LEAVE MONEY, JEWELRY, PASSPORTS OR OTHER VALUABLE ITEMS IN YOUR HOTEL ROOM. UTILIZE THE HOTELS SAFE DEPOSIT BOXES OR LEAVE IMPORTANT ITEMS WITH YOUR CONTROL OFFICER OR STORAGE AT THE EMBASSY.

8. TRAVEL TO MILITARY AREAS AND PHOTOGRAPHING MILITARY FACILITIES ARE PROHIBITED. PHOTOGRAPHY OF AREAS OTHER THAN TOURIST ATTRACTIONS MAY BE CHALLENGED BY AUTHORITIES. AMERICANS SHOULD ALSO BE AWARE THAT IF THEY ARE ARRESTED, ZAMBIAN AUTHORITIES ARE OFTEN SLOW TO INFORM THE U.S. EMBASSY.

9. IN LIGHT OF THE RECENT TERRORIST ATTACKS ON U.S. EMBASSIES IN EAST AFRICA, YOU ARE ENCOURAGED TO MAINTAIN A LOW PROFILE, BE ALERT TO POSSIBLE SURVEILLANCE, AND BE SUSPICIOUS OF UNUSUAL ACTIVITIES. IT IS IMPORTANT TO AVOID ROUTINES WHICH MAKE YOUR MOVEMENTS AND WHEREABOUTS PREDICTABLE.

1. EMBASSY WARMLY WELCOMES THE VISIT OF MS. SANDY THURMAN AND HER DELEGATION AND GRANTS COUNTRY CLEARANCE TO SOUTH AFRICA FROM JANUARY 24-27, 1999. POST ENTHUSIASTICALLY SUPPORTS THIS FACT FINDING

MISSION TO RESEARCH WAYS IN WHICH THE ADMINISTRATION CAN ASSIST AFRICAN CHILDREN ORPHANED BY AIDS AND LOOKS FORWARD TO WORKING CLOSELY WITH THE DELEGATION TO ENSURE ITS SUCCESS.

2. POST ACKNOWLEDGES SPECIFIC ACTION REQUESTS NOTED IN PARAGRAPH 7 OF REFTEL AND WILL FORWARD RELATED INFORMATION VIA SEPTELS.

3. VISAS: ALL BEARERS OF U.S. DIPLOMATIC AND OFFICIAL PASSPORTS NEED A VALID VISA TO ENTER SOUTH AFRICA.

4. THREAT ASSESSMENT: POLITICAL VIOLENCE HAS SIGNIFICANTLY DECREASED IN MOST AREAS OF SOUTH AFRICA SINCE THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A DEMOCRATICALLY-ELECTED GOVERNMENT. THROUGHOUT MOST OF SOUTH AFRICA, THE POLITICAL SITUATION IS STABILIZING AS THE COUNTRY CONSOLIDATES ITS TRANSITION TO NON-RACIAL DEMOCRACY FOLLOWING PEACEFUL LOCAL GOVERNMENT ELECTIONS IN JUNE 1996, LEVELS OF POLITICALLY-RELATED VIOLENCE HAVE DECLINED SIGNIFICANTLY IN KHAZULU-NATAL, ALTHOUGH SUCH VIOLENCE STILL ERUPTS ON OCCASION. AREAS OF INTERMITTENT UNREST INCLUDE BULWER, DONNYBROOK AND IMPENDLE IN THE MIDLANDS, THE GREATER PORT SHEPSTONE AREA ON THE SOUTH COAST, AND THE GREATER MANDINI AREA ON THE NORTH COAST.

5. ALTHOUGH FOREIGNERS HAVE NOT BEEN SPECIFICALLY TARGETED FOR POLITICAL VIOLENCE, SOME HAVE BEEN

CAUGHT UP IN GENERAL DISTURBANCES. THE SOUTH AFRICAN GOVERNMENT IS ESTABLISHING NEW INSTITUTIONAL STRUCTURE AND TAKING OTHER STEPS TO CONTROL THE VIOLENCE. THE AREAS MOST FREQUENTED BY TOURISTS,

SUCH AS GAME PARKS AND BEACHES, ARE NOT, TO DATE, AFFECTED BY POLITICAL OR FACTIONAL VIOLENCE, BUT AMERICAN CITIZENS SHOULD MONITOR LOCAL MEDIA FOR INFORMATION ON PLANNED OR RECENT DEMONSTRATIONS. SUCH DEMONSTRATIONS SHOULD BE AVOIDED, AS SOME HAVE RESULTED IN VIOLENT CONFRONTATIONS.

6. FOR THE AVERAGE VISITOR WHO DRIVES, TRAFFIC ACCIDENTS MAY BE AS GREAT A HAZARD AS THE MORE PUBLICIZED CRIME PROBLEM. VISITORS SHOULD USE GREAT CAUTION WHEN DRIVING, GIVEN THE RELATIVELY HIGH RATES OF SPEED ALLOWED ON MAJOR THOROUGHFARES, POOR LIGHTING ON RURAL ROADS, PEDESTRIANS AND SLOW-MOVING VEHICLES ON ROADS, AGGRESSIVE DRIVING BEHAVIOR AND INSUFFICIENT REGULATORY CONTROL REGARDING DRIVER LICENSING AND VEHICLE MAINTENANCE.

7. VISITORS SHOULD BE AWARE THAT NON-POLITICAL CRIMINAL ACTIVITY, SOMETIMES VIOLENT, IS REPORTED ON A REGULAR BASIS. CRIMINAL ACTIVITY IN SOUTH AFRICA IS PERCEIVED AS A SERIOUS PROBLEM BY THE PUBLIC AND GOVERNMENT. VISITORS SHOULD USE APPROPRIATE CAUTION IN THE DOWNTOWN AREAS SURROUNDING HOTELS. CRIMINAL ACTIVITY, SUCH AS PICKPOCKETING, ASSAULT, ARMED ROBBERY, AND CAR THEFT, IS PRESENT IN AREAS SURROUNDING THESE HOTELS, ESPECIALLY IN MAJOR CITIES SUCH AS JOHANNESBURG, CAPE TOWN, PRETORIA AND

DURBAN. VISITORS SHOULD USE ALL AVAILABLE MEANS TO GUARD PERSONAL IDENTIFICATION NUMBERS ASSOCIATED WITH CASH CARDS. CREDIT CARD FRAUD IS ROUTINELY REPORTED BY EMPLOYEES AND VISITORS Alike. VISITORS SHOULD KEEP IN MIND THAT INCREASED ANTI-CRIME EFFORTS IN CITY CORES HAVE ALSO MADE THE SUBURBS OF MAJOR METROPOLITAN AREAS, SUCH AS JOHANNESBURG, DURBAN AND CAPE TOWN, INCREASINGLY ATTRACTIVE TARGETS FOR CAR HI-JACKING AND ROBBERY. TRAVELLERS SHOULD USE CAUTION WHEN DRIVING IN THE FORMER INDEPENDENT HOMELANDS OF TRANSKEI AND Ciskei. SOME AREAS, SUCH AS TRANSKEI'S "WILD COAST", HAVE SIGNIFICANT LEVELS OF CRIME, ASSOCIATED WITH A BREAKDOWN OF REGIONAL SECURITY AND MEDICAL SERVICES. THIS SITUATION, THOUGH IMPROVING, HAS CAUSED PROBLEMS FOR FOREIGN TRAVELLERS TO THE AREA.

8. UPON ARRIVAL IN SOUTH AFRICA, OFFICIAL VISITORS SHOULD CONSULT WITH THE REGIONAL SECURITY OFFICE REGARDING AREAS OF TRAVEL RESTRICTION WITHIN SOUTH

AFRICA. CERTAIN CONDITIONS MUST BE MET BEFORE OFFICIAL TRAVEL INTO THESE AREAS IS SANCTIONED BY CHIEF OF MISSION PRETORIA.

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(APRIL 1-5).

4. MEMBERS OF THE PRESIDENTIAL DELEGATION WILL NUMBER BETWEEN 15 AND 20. THOSE CONFIRMED ARE: SANDY THURMAN, DIRECTOR OF ONAP; MIKE ISCOWITZ, CONSULTANT FOR ONAP; PAUL DE LAY, USAID/G/PHN. THOSE UNCONFIRMED INCLUDE: CONGRESSPERSONS KILPATRICK, CALLAHAN, PORTER, KOLBE, PAYNE, HOUGHTON AND LEWIS, AND SENATORS COCHRAN, LANDRU, FRIST, AND LUGAR. We then made a site visit to Kalafong Hospital in a township in Pretoria to visit a home and hospice for children infected or affected by HIV/AIDS. We were briefed by the team of doctors, nurses, priests, community health workers and volunteers. We then toured the facility and played with the children for a while. Looking back, I would make the "presentation" shorter and the walk about and play time longer. We then had cocktails at the HIV/AIDS Directors house followed by dinner with "players" in the HIV/AIDS world in South Africa.

Today we will visit two sites in Soweto before departing for Durban. I'll send an up-date when we return from Durban on the 7:00AM flight on Wednesday. The party is staying at the Royal Hotel in Durban -- telephone - 031 304-0331 or fax - 031 304 5055, if anyone wants info sooner than Wednesday am.

While I greatly appreciate the work that has been put into the schedule you have prepared for my visit to Zimbabwe, and all of the participants look quite interesting, I am particularly concerned that we are not fulfilling the mandate

of the President in making appropriate visits to a variety of sites in preparation of the Congressional visit.

While I fully understand that not all of our requested sites are funded by the US government, it is imperative that we visit:

1. At least one farm program (preferably the Farm Orphans Support Trust, as requested previously);
2. Mutare to visit the Old Mutare Mission Station Clinic and Orphanage run by the Methodist Church; and
3. The Families, Orphans, Children under Stress (FOCUS) program.

I appreciate the necessity to make courtesy calls to Mayors and other dignitaries and to take time for press opportunities, unfortunately, with such limited time I am afraid that fulfilling the President's request must be our priority.

If revising the schedule means longer days and quick lunches and dinners, I have no objections to this.

This message is from Ambassador McDonald and myself. Thank you for communicating with us and we very much welcome your visit.

We appreciate your concerns; however, feel compelled to share our perspective.

Early on when the visit was discussed w/ myself (Amb McDonald) and USAID/Washington communicated w/ USAID/Zim, we stressed that we did not have an orphans program here. We were told that was okay because in Zimbabwe the policy issues would be at the forefront of the agenda. Specifically, trying to get high level GOZ support for a more active engagement on the AIDS problem. Hence, while we will have some knowledgeable people on the orphan issue and one site visit that involves orphan care, the overall agenda is focussed more on understanding the problem and the USG/USAID response in collaboration with other donors.

As we understand that this visit is in preparation for a tentative CODEL, we believe that it is important that you see USG-funded activities as Members of Congress will want to know how foreign assistance funds are being used.

With respect to your preferences which you express as "imperative" we have a number of concerns.

*None of the sites you propose are funded by the USG. In fact, one of the sites has in the past refused any USAID funding.

*In order to visit these sites we would need to make an advance visit and there is limited time left to do this before your arrival on Sunday. This is true for all the proposed sites, but especially for any church related activities as we would need to assure clear separation of church and state.

*All the sites are near or in Mutare which is approximately four hours from Harare. We have selected Bulawayo and Gweru as the appropriate site visits given that we know them and are providing support for them. Given the distances and logistics it is not possible to do both. In fact, a Mutare trip would take more than one day thereby crowding out any other activities.

*From a funding perspective, we do not recommend visiting sites that might generate expectations about future funding. We would need to make sure they are consistent with our overall strategy objective of encouraging behavior change before encouraging them that there may be some follow-up.

*From a protocol perspective, there are no courtesy calls with Mayors. However, they do need to be aware that a high level visitor is coming to their city and be allowed the opportunity to join the delegation. This shouldn't take any significant time from the agenda and in fact they are likely to be helpful on logistics support.

*With respect to press opportunities, we agree that this is not the focus, and while two tentative press opportunities are allowed in the agenda, these are not scheduled yet and we will need to play it by ear as freedom of the press is under severe attack with three journalist having been illegally detained. However, we do think it is important to publically express U.S. concern about the HIV/AIDS problems and demonstrating our good partnership with the Ministry of Health will be important.

*This agenda has been carefully crafted with our key counterpart, Dr. Marowa of the NACP. Making changes on the agenda could be problematic especially if he is not familiar with these groups or for some reason has concerns about visiting them. It is very important to safeguard our excellent relations with him.

Ambassador McDonald will try and reach you this evening to discuss your concerns. Both USAID and the Ambassdor collaborated closely on the agenda and the Ambassador has visited all of the sites which are proposed for your visit. We believe that this will be a very good use of your time and the best preparation for a possible CODEL. Both of us understand that you have some points that you want to cover in your visit to Zimbabwe and we look forward to working this out to everyone's satisfaction. Thanks.

USAID/Zimbabwe had set up what we considered a very interesting visit for Thurman following your guidance that "although the focus for the trip is children "affected" by HIV we should include sites that demonstrate USAID's emphasis on primary prevention, particularly for women." Unfortunately, it seems Ms. Thurman had already made some decisions about her visit to Zimbabwe and wants to change the program. From your earlier comments, seems clear that you didn't know anything about pre-existing commitments with the Methodist Church for site visits in Zimbabwe. AS U.S. AMBASSADOR TO THE REPUBLIC OF ZIMBABWE

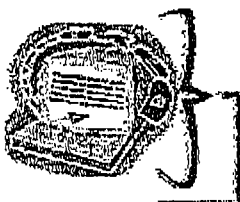
President Clinton today announced his intent to nominate Tom McDonald to be the U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of Zimbabwe.

Mr. McDonald, of Cleveland, Ohio, has practiced with Arter & Hadden since 1983, serving as Partner in the firm for the last ten years. He works in the areas of litigation and government relations. In addition to his national law practice, Mr. McDonald has significant experience in democracy-building projects. He has a life-long commitment to African affairs. His international assignments have included four missions to Africa. Mr. McDonald was an election observer in South Africa in 1994 and an election monitor in Uganda in the same year. In February, he served as an advisor to the U.S. Information Agency in Kenya, working on election reform issues. Previously, he served as the Senior Election Law consultant to the National Democratic Institute in Cambodia for two months in 1995. He was a member of the Presidential Delegation to observe the election in Bosnia in September 1996.

Mr. McDonald earned a B.A. from the School of Public and International Affairs at the George Washington University in 1976 and a J.D. Degree from the University of Minnesota in 1979.

New US ambassador will tread softly

HARARE - The new US ambassador to Zimbabwe, Tom McDonald, says his goal is to work with the American business community "so that matters can be solved informally and quietly instead of being improperly dealt with in the newspapers".

He may have had in mind the debacle only a year ago when Mugabe told McDonald's (black) predecessor, Johnny Carson, "go to hell" for protesting that tender procedures were twisted to give Malaysia's YTL the contract to upgrade Hwange Thermal Power Station.

Mugabe had "responded favourably" to his approach, McDonald told the American Association of Business in Zimbabwe.

Yet on the same day, Mugabe met a delegation from Beijing headed by Ordinance and Industry Minister Zhang Zunju and recalled that during the 1972-80 war to overthrow white rule in former Rhodesia, Beijing "stood by us, when today other people who today claim to be our friends stood aloof".

"We notice in the Third World that those who yesterday dominated us politically desire to dominate us using their economic strength to achieve political ends," Mugabe said.

"We hope that we can rely on China as the largest nation in the world to resist some of these manoeuvres and manipulations.

"Zimbabwe is experiencing that kind of interference and sets of manoeuvres to destabilise our political stability and perpetuate their economic dominance.

We will need support from you," he told Zhang.

McDonald, a former partner with a respectable law firm in Cleveland, Ohio, may be wondering what he did to deserve this tirade, given the eyebrows he raised in human-rights circles when on his appointment to the position he described Zimbabwe as "one of Africa's success stories".

After two months in Zimbabwe, he told US businessmen he regarded developing personal relations with Mugabe to solve bilateral problems as a "key goal".

"Stay positive - three months of bad news cannot undo 17 years of success," he urged the businessmen.

He said that Washington wanted to see that the successes since 1980 were "not spoilt because of high unemployment, high inflation, devaluation of the Zimbabwe dollar and a general sense that the government is moving in the wrong direction".

Zimbabwe had an educated workforce, an adequate infrastructure and transportation system and a growing consumer market.

"I know it's a tall order but if the government can put its financial house in order, carry out an even-handed land reform programme and begin to open up its political system, the achievements Zimbabwe has known for the last 17 years will continue into the next century," said McDonald.

His second goal, he said, was increasing US exports and investment with emphasis on partnerships with black Zimbabwean entrepreneurs.

McDonald acknowledged Zimbabwe's economic-reform programme had "slowed, at times stalled" over the past three years and new challenges had risen with the weak currency, the recent food riots, the lack of transparency in major government tenders and the implementation of land reform.

He urged dialogue and compromise with commercial farmers. "We believe the best way is one that does not disrupt working and productive farms or threaten the agricultural sector's contribution to Zimbabwe's economy."

With an eye on his host chairman Amr Tewfik of IBM'S new local subsidiary - who has had major problems with the authorities over work permits - McDonald agreed that importing skills was "very

bureaucratic and obtuse - there are allegations of requests for payoffs as well".

"Zimbabwean government pressure for indigenisation is a reality we must all face. Efforts to force local partners or dictate terms are unacceptable," he said. Investors should see benefits from "mentoring and partnering" black Zimbabweans. Faster privatisation of parastatals could present good opportunities for US investors.

McDonald said US Secretary of State Madeleine Albright and he had a "candid and productive" meeting with Mugabe during her January visit.

But experienced local diplomats know that even tactful candour risks offending Mugabe.

The Byrd amendment (the repeal of which in 1976 massively increased the pressure of sanctions on Ian Smith) roused the public fury of the US congressional black caucus through the 1960s, but there can be no comeback on Mao Tse Tung's cynical importation of cheap Rhodesian chrome in the face of sanctions, because the deal was never acknowledged.

Likewise, Zimbabwe's losses in the 1983 arms-for-tobacco barter deal with Beijing are as invisible as the obsolete MiG21 jets it received.

Unlike Zhang, McDonald has the handicap of coming from an open society where the past, the present and the future cannot be manipulated to suit political expediency.

AN IMPRESSIVE STEP ONTO A GLOBAL STAGE

He was a Cleveland attorney when he stepped through the carved double doors onto the elaborate, inlaid-wood floor of the State Department's Treaty Room. Within minutes, he was, and is destined to remain, an American diplomat.

The crowd was hushed as Charles Kinn, State Department assistant chief of protocol, administered the oath of office to Tom McDonald, the former Arter & Hadden partner who is now U.S. ambassador to Zimbabwe.

Juan Berquette, the soft-spoken 12-year-old who's been Tom's little brother for the past two years, held the Bible as the oath was administered. The 100 or so Ohioans and State Department officials who crowded the room were hushed.

"For me, there is no higher calling than the call to serve one's country," Tom told the crowd of family and friends. "I have been asked to represent overseas all that is right in these United States, and while we can occasionally seem a cynical people, I in fact know Americans to be generous, energetic, entrepreneurial, hopeful and wise.

"I would not stand before you today if Americans weren't this and so much more."

With a youthful demeanor belying his 43 years, Tom spoke with the grace, style and sincerity so necessary to someone who will represent this country at that lofty level. Juan and Tom's wife, Anmarie, stood with him as he momentarily struggled with the words he had worked so long and hard to have the opportunity to say.

Few in the crowd knew that when he praised his "petite but tenacious mother, who built a career at a time when women were supposed to be home," that he had just days before been at her bedside after she had fallen seriously ill. You see, he's not one to complain very much.

In early December, the McDonalds will leave a host of friends in this city and depart for Harare, the capital of Zimbabwe. They've sold their cars, rented their Ohio City home and have left his law practice behind, all in the name of public service.

And not without substantial financial sacrifice and a certain degree of risk, considering the fact that the country is ruled by Robert Mugabe, a former leader of the rebel military force that fought to overthrow the white government of the country once known as Rhodesia. Zimbabwe is a country struggling to balance the potential of tourism and business development on one hand with the planned seizure of 12 million acres of mostly white-owned farmland on the other.

According to an Associated Press story last week, President Mugabe is trying to seize the farmland in order to fulfill his government's early promise to resettle some 170,000 peasant families. He wants Britain to compensate the former landowners because they are descendants of British colonial families.

Britain has refused. Thus begins a hot issue that is likely to burn for quite a while and create all sorts of diplomatic challenges for the new American ambassador.

But it is a challenge he's well prepared for, as we were reminded last week as he closed with a simple yet earnest entreaty: "I reach out to Americans with one hand and Zimbabweans with the other."

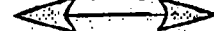

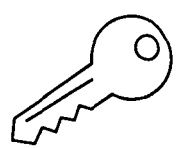

HIV/AIDS Prevention and Mitigation: Expanding to a Multisectoral Approach for Africa

Rationale:

The growing HIV/AIDS epidemic threatens to halt or reverse social and economic gains in Africa. Many interrelated social, economic, political, and cultural factors combine to impede development. Development assistance must overcome global threats from a multitude of sources, among them poverty, population growth, rapid urbanization, and emerging diseases. Few of these threats pose more of a strategic challenge for development in Africa than does HIV/AIDS. The growing epidemic is a transnational challenge that directly or indirectly affects (or is affected by) economic growth, democratic governance, the environment, population, and health. HIV/AIDS programs in Africa now must focus not only on preventing transmission of the virus, but also on mitigating the adverse, multisectoral consequences of the disease.

The HIV/AIDS epidemic in Africa is a major impediment to sustainable development. The World Health Organization (WHO) estimates that AIDS soon will exceed measles and malaria as a leading cause of death among children under five years of age in Africa. At the current levels of HIV infection, it is inevitable that AIDS-related deaths during the next five years will reverse the previously favorable trend in life expectancy at birth, child mortality, and adult mortality.

Unlike most infectious diseases in Africa, HIV/AIDS affects the urban elite as well as the rural poor, generally during their most economically productive years. An increase in deaths among young adults of the magnitude predicted will have substantial adverse effects on economic, political, and military/security stability throughout Africa. AIDS will cause increased

stress on fragile African economic infrastructures as labor productivity declines, particularly in agricultural, labor-dependent economies. Trade, foreign investment, and tourism will be adversely affected. Health systems and social coping mechanisms already have become overburdened.

As a development agency, USAID is concerned that HIV/AIDS threatens to halt or reverse the recent social and economic gains (including child survival and human resource development) made in many African countries. Other infectious diseases, such as tuberculosis, are becoming active in persons with weakened immune systems and are reaching epidemic levels. Enormous health care costs and escalating demands on health care infrastructures are beginning to be felt. But the negative impact extends far beyond the health sector. AIDS must be addressed as much more than just a medical problem.

Multisectoral Impact:

The labor force of affected countries, from the educated elite to the subsistence farmer, may be decimated. The Food and Agricultural Organization (FAO) estimates that one quarter of the farms in the most affected African countries will fail as a result of the crippling impact of AIDS on the work force. Per capita incomes could certainly decline. As traditional social support networks are stretched beyond capacity, families will be disrupted, children will become orphaned, and the aged will be left without support.

Poor health of the labor force, especially women in the informal sector, impedes broad-based economic growth. According to a December

1993 report by the United Nations Development Program (UNDP), 55 percent of those infected with HIV in sub-Saharan Africa are women, who are infected at a significantly younger age than men. More than half of those women are under 25, and a large proportion are infected during adolescence.

Additionally, African data indicate that recent high rates of sexually transmitted diseases among childbearing-age women will cause a rapid increase in HIV infection, and a dramatic rise in fetal death and infant mortality. WHO has projected that by 1995, HIV-related adult mortality will have doubled or tripled and child mortality will have increased by 50 percent in Africa's most affected cities.

Because AIDS kills young adults in their most productive years, the development impact also will be felt within the cadre of trained human capital. Investments in education and training will be squandered as the young and educated become infected. As HIV/AIDS saps the economic strength of affected countries, high rates of AIDS and HIV infection among police and military personnel will threaten internal and regional security. The demobilization of military/security forces may further exacerbate the epidemic in Africa, when HIV-infected soldiers return home and spread the virus. AIDS may undermine political stability in countries where key officials succumb to the disease and potential successors struggle for power.

An Expanded Approach:

The effective use of integrated interventions, a hallmark of the new USAID development strategy, is essential in addressing the complex HIV/AIDS issue because the disease targets the people who are most active in the development process. Increasingly, bilaterally supported programs in maternal/child and reproductive

health and family planning play a critical role in mobilizing local efforts and resources for HIV/AIDS prevention.

Innovative approaches should be taken to incorporate "HIV/AIDS Prevention and Mitigation" activities into other USAID Mission programs, such as education, human resources development, private sector, democratic governance, agriculture, and other development sectors. In the absence of an effective drug or vaccine, the term "HIV/AIDS Prevention and Control" is a misnomer — we cannot yet "control" AIDS. Consequently, we must develop strategies which utilize our health/population and other sectoral activities to "prevent" the transmission of HIV wherever possible while concurrently employing all of our development sectors to "mitigate" the adverse, multisectoral impact of premature adult death due to AIDS on the economy and society.

HIV/AIDS will remain a major crisis in Africa. Most of the continent's political leadership now appreciate the multisectoral effects and growing adverse developmental impacts of the disease. USAID's operational approach to HIV/AIDS programs in Africa involves working closely with other bilateral and multilateral donors (such as UNAIDS, UNDP, WHO, UNICEF, and the World Bank), host country governments, development agencies, universities and academic organizations, the private sector, PVOs, and indigenous, grassroots NGOs to develop these expanded strategies.

Limiting the spread of HIV and mitigating the multisectoral impact of AIDS is an essential investment in sustainable development.
