Title X -- Family Planning

- * The FY 2000 Budget requested \$240 million for Title X - Family Planning, \$25 million (+12%) above the FY 1999 level. The Administration was successful in securing \$239 million (+11%) in FY 1999, only one million shy of the request. This was the largest percentage increase since FY 1993 and the largest dollar increase since FY 1980.
- * Under the Clinton Administration, Federal support for family planning has been steadily rising; since 1993, Title X - Family Planning funding has increased by 38 percent.
- * While ensuring the congressional language that directs HHS to allocate at least 90 percent of the appropriated funds for clinical services is adhered to, the Title X program will address the following priorities in FY 2000:
 - Expansion and enhancement of the quality of clinical reproductive health services through partnerships with entities that have related interests and that work with similar priority populations;
 - Expansion of comprehensiveness of reproductive health services, including STD and cancer screening and prevention, HIV prevention, education and counseling, and substance abuse screening and referral;
 - Increased emphasis on services to adolescents, with an emphasis on postponement of sexual activity and more accessible provision of contraceptive counseling and services;
 - Increased services to hard-to-reach populations by partnering with community-based organizations and others that have a stake in the prevention of unintended pregnancies;
 - Increased services to males, emphasizing shared responsibility for preventing unintended pregnancies.

Background Information.

- * Title X - Family Planning services are provided to over 4.5 million clients; it is a small, yet integral, part of a package of Federal, state, and local funding streams that collectively provide family planning services. The largest contributor is Medicaid, but Medicaid only provides reimbursements for contraceptive services. Medicaid does not directly fund family planning clinics. Furthermore, Title X serves a population largely unserved by Medicaid including teens, nulliparous women, and the working poor.
- * Title X is the only Federal program specifically devoted to supporting family planning services.
- * Title X's 4,600 family planning clinics are the framework for the national network of family planning service delivery. Prevention and treatment services, such as providing

contraception, pregnancy testing, STD screening and treatment, and education and outreach are provided.

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
