Background Memo

You will speaking to 16 private sector advisors to the U.S. Delegation to the International Conference On Population and Development (ICPD). These advisors represent diverse groups including the Alan Guttmacher Institute, the Rockefeller Foundation, the Centre for Development and Population Activities, National Audubon Society, International Women's Health Coalition, the National College of Negro Women, and the National Council of Churches.

Last year, you met with the ICPD and you indicated you would like to continue to work with them to ensure that the United States fulfills its commitment to ICPD implementation. This meeting was requested as follow

-up to your last meeting.

The ICPD advisors would like to speak to you about reestablishing the United States as a reliable supporter of programs to improve the health of women and children and to address the problems of population growth worldwide. In particular, these advisors are interested in discussing the presidential finding on international population program funding delays which is to be presented to Congress no later than Feb. 1, 1997.

Following is background information on the finding and other key issues for your meeting.

Background

During the 104th Congress, Clinton/Gore Administration accomplishments on family planning and choice suffered repeated Republican attack. Through a combination of budget cuts and

administrative restrictions, support for family planning and reproductive health programs has been substantially reduced. Most recently in the 1997 Foreign Ops Appropriations Act, conservative Republicans cut international population program funding and inserted "metering" or delays in disbursement of international family planning funds. The metering was inserted into the appropriations language to thwart Republican efforts to reinstate the Mexico City Policy language President Clinton overturned at the beginning of the Administration.

By February 1 of this year, the President must submit a finding to Congress on the effects of the cuts and delays on international family planning programs. The finding, which is in final draft form and will soon be transmitted from USAID and the State Department to the President, will detail the negative consequences of cuts and metering on international family planning programs. The White House will release the finding late in the month, possibly Jan. 30 or Jan. 31. A communications and

report release strategy has not yet been determined.

Following the transmittal of the President's report, Congress will vote no later than Feb. 28, 1997 on the finding by joint resolution. A positive Congressional vote would release FY '97 funds in March rather than in July. (This is not new money. The funds are already appropriated, but have been held back through statutory language placed in the '97 Foreign Ops Appropriations bill by Republicans.)

Rep. Chris Smith (R

-NJ) may introduce a concurrent bill to release the federal family planning funds only on the condition that no money goes to organizations that use their own funds to provide abortions or lobby for changes in abortion law. Rep. Smith's action would resurrect the Mexico City policy debate and would link support for family planning to increasing abortion. This is not the fight women's groups want for this vote. They want to keep family planning separate from the abortion debate. Rep. Chris Smith (R

-NJ) is also expected to charge that international family planning programs use federal funds to provide or promote abortion. These accusations are false. Using federal funds to provide or promote abortion is illegal.

Other Relevant Issues

? This is the first reproductive health vote in the new Congress and will be one of the only votes on family planning services. The vote on whether or not to accept the President's findings will be controversial and the vote's outcome is unclear to date.

? On Wednesday, January 29, the Rockefeller Foundation will release a report titled, "High Stakes: The United States, Global Population and Our Common Future." The report will present why population assistance has worked for the past 30 years and why American leadership is essential to its continued success. The report examines the implications of

## ADMINISTRATION ACCOMPLISHMENTS

### FAMILY PLANNING AND REPRODUCTIVE RIGHTS

#### *Making Abortion Rare*

- Fighting Teen Pregnancy Teen pregnancy is a national epidemic. To confront this problem, the President called for a National Campaign Against Teen Pregnancy, asking leaders in all areas of national life to join in promoting individual responsibility and economic opportunity for America's young people. The President's welfare reform law provides funding for community-based initiatives to end teen pregnancy, as well as a National Clearinghouse to provide communities with information on successful strategies..
- Funding Family Planning The ten percent of women of childbearing age who use no contraception account for more than half of the unintended pregnancies in this country. Most of the remaining unintended pregnancies are caused by inconsistent or incorrect use of contraceptives. To help prevent unwanted pregnancies, the President has consistently requested budget increases for the federal Family Planning Program for each year he has been in office. Among other reproductive health and education services, this program makes family planning information and contraception available to millions of women who might not otherwise get reproductive health care.
- Facilitating Adoption In addition, the President signed legislation to improve the adoption process by preventing discrimination against interracial adoptions and reducing the time that children have to wait in foster care and, more recently, signed an adoption directive to further increase adoption and reward states that do so.

#### *Keeping Abortion Safe and Legal*

- Ending the Gag Rule Women faced with unwanted pregnancies must make difficult decisions, but they shouldn't have to make them alone. President Bush instituted a "Gag Rule" that prevented women who go to federally funded clinics -- primarily poor women -- from getting the information they needed to make informed choices. President Clinton put an end to the "Gag Rule" in his first week as President so that women can get appropriate information and counselling.
- Ensuring Clinic Safety The President signed the Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances Act to fight violence and intimidation targeted by anti-choice extremists against women and their doctors, now more important than ever before given the recent bombings.
- Ending the RU-486 Import Ban RU-486 is a drug that terminates pregnancy without surgery. The President revoked the import ban imposed on RU-486 by the Bush Administration. Now RU-486 has been approved by the Federal Drug Administration and will be marketed nationwide within a year.

- Serving Military Families Women in the military and in military families deserve the finest health care available. The President assured that comprehensive family planning services are available to these women by reversing the ban on abortion services at military hospitals.
- Repealing the Mexico City Policy The President reversed 12 years of attacks on reproductive choice for women around the world when he repealed the Mexico City policy that banned funding to international organizations that promoted comprehensive family planning. And at the International Conference on Population and Development in Cairo, the United States forged a partnership with more than 150 nations around a platform of action to promote gender equality and reproductive health. The platform also recognizes the importance of addressing the threat posed to women's health by unsafe abortions.
- Implementing the Hyde Amendment The Department of Health and Human Services implemented a Congressionally ordered change to the Medicaid program to include abortion services for poor women whose pregnancies result from rape or incest as well as to save the life of the women.

report release strategy has not yet been determined.

Following the transmittal of the President's report, Congress will vote no later than Feb. 28, 1997 on the finding by joint resolution. A positive Congressional vote would release FY '97 funds in March rather than in July. (This is not new money. The funds are already appropriated, but have been held back through statutory language placed in the '97 Foreign Ops Appropriations bill by Republicans.)

Rep. Chris Smith (R

-NJ) may introduce a concurrent bill to release the federal family planning funds only on the condition that no money goes to organizations that use their own funds to provide abortions or lobby for changes in abortion law. Rep. Smith's action would resurrect the Mexico City policy debate and would shift the debate away from family planning to abortion, thereby endangering the moderate vote needed to release the family planning funds per the President's finding.

#### Other Relevant Issues

1. In general, I think that IPAS' intentions of bringing our message to the First Lady are on the up and up, and that colleagues in the field would not behave inappropriately. I think the "intent" is probably meant as desire-goal.

FYI - postabortion care consists of 3 components: 1) the emergency treatment for women suffering complications of abortion (either from a spontaneous abortion, eg miscarriage, or unsafely induced outside the health system.),

2. offering information, counseling and services in postabortion family planning for women who desire to postpone or limit future pregnancies; and

3) links to other reproductive health services.

If you are concerned, please communicate directly with Bertha or Charlotte, or let me know if you would like me to do so.

2. Federal Funding. Bertha's message could be confusing. IPAS does indirectly receive federal funding through subcontracts, for example project I am working on in Peru. My understanding is that in Uganda we have not received US federal funding.

It appears that the Senate may be close to reaching unanimous consent on  
its  
Labor/HHS appropriations bill without further complications, such as  
negative  
amendments affecting the HIV/AIDS community.

In House consideration of Labor/HHS appropriations, however, a host of  
amendments may be offered as early as Monday, Sept. 8, that concern  
HIV/AIDS  
funding and programs. AIDS Action and other national HIV/AIDS groups agree  
that  
representatives should be asked to vote "NO" on each of these amendments:

1. Rep. Tom Coburn (R-OK) may offer an amendment to prevent the use of  
federal  
funds to implement or promote syringe exchange programs. This amendment  
would  
eliminate the authority of the Secretary of Health and Human Services to

determine appropriate use of federal funds for these programs (see Sept. 3 AIDS Action Network Alert).

Vote "NO": Science should drive policy, not politics. Available evidence overwhelmingly suggests that syringe exchange programs reduce HIV transmission and do not increase injection drug use. Any legislation that limits the ability of local agencies to operate syringe exchange programs presents a serious obstacle to containing the epidemic.

2. Reps. Tom Coburn (R-OK) and Richard Burr (R-NC) may offer an amendment to increase AIDS Drug Assistance Program funding by \$51 million. Supporters of this amendment argue that the increase would come from cuts in administrative costs for the following programs: \$2.4 million from the Health Care Policy and Research account, \$22.7 million from the refugee and entrant assistance account, \$4.8 million from the Health and Human Services Department (HHS) General Management account, and \$5 million from the HHS policy research account.

Vote "NO": Although additional funding for ADAP is needed, the majority of the offsets for this amendment come from other public health programs or other programs that provide important services. In addition, Rep. Coburn, the primary sponsor of this amendment, continues to work aggressively to eliminate the Health and Human Services Secretary's authority to lift the ban on federal funding for syringe exchange programs. Neither AIDS Action nor, to the best of our knowledge, any other AIDS group is working with Rep. Coburn to initiate and develop this amendment.

3. Rep. Mark Souder (R-IN) may offer an amendment to transfer \$5 million from Title X family planning to the Ryan White AIDS Pediatric Demonstration program - Title IV.

Vote "NO": This amendment is a clear attack on family planning programs. Although additional funding is needed for Title IV, we do not support transferring funding from other important public health programs. Moreover, family planning services are a necessary component of comprehensive HIV prevention efforts.

4. Reps. Tom Coburn (R-OK) and Gary Ackerman (D-NY) may offer an amendment



to  
prohibit the use of federal funds to conduct "blind" HIV tests of newborns.  
"Blind" HIV testing is used solely to determine the incidence of HIV  
infection  
without identifying or reporting the subject from whom the sample is taken.

Vote "NO": This amendment attempts to prohibit blind seroprevalence  
studies of  
newborns. Although there have been no such studies in operation for over 2  
years, many states may still consider implementing them for surveillance  
purposes.

? New Proposed Expenditure Form for HCFA-64.E - Numbers of Adults. The Workgroup agreed to add another proposed report Form HCFA-64.E for Numbers of Adults Served. The lines on this proposed form be the same as proposed for the form related to numbers of Children served in the medical assistance program. There would be only two columns in the age breakout section: Adults age 19 - age 64, Adults age 65 and above.

? Budget Report Form. The Workgroup agreed require only one report form for title XXI budget information. The proposed Children's Health Insurance Program Budget Report for the Title XXI Program would consist of only 1 page containing 8 lines and 3 columns. The lines would reflect 4 lines for each of the (two) fiscal years being reported, 1 line for each quarter of the

fiscal year. The columns would reflect total computable, Federal share, and State Share, respectively.

Additionally, the Form 37.3 would be revised to add one new line (line 34) at the bottom of the form: ?Medicaid Expenditures for Sections 1920A, 1905(u)(2) and (3) Eligibles.? States would complete this one line to indicate the aggregate projected expenditures associated for these groups. This information would already be included in lines 1-33, and merely provides a breakout related to the population served.

The AP Workgroup agreed that there would be no special collection of numbers of eligibles on the budget form.

? Redistribution Formula - Draft All-State Letter. The Workgroup agreed that the Draft All-State Letter should be revised to remove the discussion on the specific method/formula for redistributing the unused allotment funds at the end of the 3-year period of availability. This formula/method would be determined at a later date.

? Family Planning and Indian Health Services. The Workgroup agreed to wait for an opinion from OGC before making a definitive decision on how expenditures for family planning and the IHS services provided to individuals covered under the presumptive eligibility, ?1905(u)(2) and (3) provisions should be treated; specifically, what should the FMAP be for such expenditures, and should the amount of such expenditures be applied against the allotments?

? Presentation at Steering Committee. The Workgroup agreed that the first Drafts of the report forms and the All-State letter would be presented at the Wednesday, October 1, 1997 Steering Committee Meeting.

Hello,

In an attempt to make this kids' implementation process somewhat smoother, I am hoping that you can help lead the discussion of technicals. I fear that I have been coming into these Tuesday meetings and jamming people with concerns / discussions. Thus, I would greatly appreciate it if you all could look into the following.

Given the fact that the opportunity to do any technical amendments is about to end, it is really important that we have an expedited, decision making meeting on Tuesday on whether or not it is imperative to move forward with technicals. EQUALLY IMPORTANT, we need to decide what we say about these issues publicly if we do not do technicals (e.g., what we said about the 3 state MOE).

The list of items that I have as crucial includes:

1. 50% issue: Depends on how many states are affected;
2. Quarterly expenditure issue: Depends on whether OMB lawyers think that we can interpret the law this way; if not, we probably have to have a technical.
3. 10% on total / direct services: If this is the only technical, it possibly could wait. However, since admin costs are important in the first year, we may want to consider this.
4. 3 state MOE: If we can talk with Julie James, who appears to be the only one objecting, we should probably try (we stated in our q and a that we would revisit this) since next year will be too late.
5. Reporting form issues: The following complicate the financial forms:
  - u(3) kids not counting toward allotment
  - Treatment of Indians and family planning

There are also the state-specific fixes (RI, TN) but I am afraid that if we try to advance these, we open up the WA / Gorton issue in a way that we could not fend off.

Could you also check out the DSH IMD issue / need for a technical? OMB seems to think that HHS is going there, but we have not been told officially.

I think that I have spoken to you about each of these, but I just want to make sure that we are all working off of the same list. It would be ideal if the Dept. can come in with a recommendation on how to proceed.

Today, marks the 25th anniversary of Roe v. Wade, the landmark Supreme Court decision that affirmed every woman's right to choose whether and when to have a child. President Clinton is committed to ensuring this right, and in doing so, to protecting two of our nation's most deeply-held values, personal privacy and family responsibility.

**PREVENTION AND FAMILY PLANNING.** During the last five years, the Administration has worked hard to reduce the need for abortions and to prevent unintended pregnancy by making comprehensive family planning and sex education programs more widely available. The President's FY 1999 budget calls for:

- **Increased Funding for Title X.** The proposal will increase Title X Family Planning grants by \$15 million -- a 46% increase since FY1992.
- **Medicaid and Other Services.** The proposal will provide almost \$500 million in federal funds to Medicaid to support family planning services. Additionally, the Maternal & Child Health Block Grant, the Social Services Block Grant, and the Preventive Health Block Grant will provide \$100 million to state and local communities for family planning services.
- **Prevention Education and Research.** The proposal will provide about \$200 million for the National Institutes of Health's research on infertility, contraception, and related matters, and CDC's programs to educate teenagers about sexual development and abstinence. Additionally, Health and Human Service's teen pregnancy prevention and related youth programs will continue to engage the Girl Power! education initiative in sustained efforts to promote pregnancy prevention among girls 9- to 14-years-old.

**A COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH TO FAMILY PLANNING.** Under the President's proposal nearly 5 million clients each year at more than 4,700 family planning clinics nationwide, would have access to a comprehensive set of family planning services including contraceptive services, pregnancy testing, sexually transmitted disease screening and treatment, and education and outreach.

**SUPPORTING INTERNATIONAL FAMILY PLANNING.** The Administration is strongly committed to international family planning efforts. The President has blocked several Congressional attempts to prohibit funding for international family planning groups that use their own funding to lobby on behalf of abortion rights or perform abortions. Under the President's Budget, bilateral assistance provided through AID and assistance to the United Nations Population Fund will grow to \$425 million in FY 1999, a 32% increase over FY 1992.

Yesterday, Chris and I thought through a bit more about the schedule on quality. I am forwarding you Chris's response to Ron's inquiry on this. As of this morning Bruce said there will likely be an event on the Federal govt. reports on the 20th.

With regard to tobacco, I would recommend checking with Bruce. There is \$100 million in FY1999 on enforcing the 1996 FDA regulations to reduce teen smoking. (\$1.2 billion over five) and \$100 million (\$400 million over five) on CDC smoking prevention. Chris thinks that announcing more spending initiatives that come from tobacco revenue may only raise the cynicism in the press about how this is not real money and that you will not likely get much credit. However, it might be good to highlight tobacco -- maybe something that shows that some of the groups are on board.

One other idea that we thought might be good is to do an event -- perhaps with the First Lady - that highlights what a good budget this is for women. They are very pleased with the overall health package particularly, the research budget, genetic anti-discrimination, Medicare cancer clinical trials, health care bill of rights, Medicare buy-in for ages 55 to 65, and family planning. And, of course, you could broaden it a bit to include child care -- as they are thrilled with that issue.

Anyways, that might be a way to get one more lift from some of the budget initiatives and would be great to get women's groups excited about the budget and the VP. Let me know.

By the way, congrats on the great coverage on the research stuff.

This report from the Departments is due to the VP on February 19th. I believe we can and should hold off on an event until the end of the month. (That coincides with the next Quality Commission meeting in D.C., which takes place -- I think -- on the 25-26th of February). I do not think, however, that we can wait much longer than that for our next big quality event.

In addition, Rahm is pushing me to do some Executive Order/Actions on quality over the next 5 days or so. We are looking at some ideas and will keep you informed of developments.

Thirdly, the two Democratic Caucuses (Dingell/Gephardt-led in the House and Kennedy/Daschle-led in the Senate) are developing their own bills. If we like them, we could perhaps join them in an endorsement event when they introduce the bills. I assume that these bills will be ready in the next three weeks or so. The only concern, however, amongst some will be that endorsing Democratic bills may undermine the bipartisan status that the quality initiative has so far attained. Regardless, we need to decide whether we want to be in this story and, assuming we do, to what extent and what role the VP will play.

And lastly, the final Commission report is due on March 30th. However, the key meeting which will lock in the positions of the members is going to be held on March 11th and 12th. This probably should be the timeframe we shoot at for another major quality event. The question that remains is what will the event be? It is highly unlikely that the Commission will resolve the major outstanding issue: whether any consumer rights should have remedies and, if so, what they are and how are they enforced. The business and labor community is extremely nervous about this issue and oppose excessive reliance on litigation. Our moderate Dems, the moderate Republicans, and the whole Republican Leadership adamantly oppose moving in this direction. There are other issues as well, but I don't want to bore you here about this.

Needless to say, however, there are clearly many issues to discuss vis a vis the VPOTUS' interaction with the Commission. At this time, I do not have a final recommendation. I want to do a little more investigating into developments on the Hill before trying to figure out the best positioning role for the VP.

We should talk soon, but hopefully this gives you an idea of the range of possible events (and timing therein) that may be of interest to you and the VPOTUS.

Although some of the Medicaid rules were waived in this demonstration, the State must cover family planning services so long as the program is a Medicaid program. The State has not yet applied for the new Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP). Under that program, States have two options to receive extra Federal funds: to expand through Medicaid or to expand through a non-Medicaid program. The L/HHS bill is expected to go to the House Rules Committee tomorrow (Tuesday), and we would like to get your input on a possible Castle/Greenwood amendment, which is substantially different from current bill language (Section 220).

Please review the new language (in blue) and let us know if the current SAP language is strong enough. We would appreciate your comments/edits to the draft SAP language this morning, if possible, given that the bill is expected to go to House Rules tomorrow.

Proposed Castle/Greenwood amendment:

Section 220. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law; no provider of services under title X of the Public Health Service Act shall be exempt from any State law requiring notification or the reporting of child abuse, child molestation, sexual abuse, rape, or incest.

(b)(1) The Secretary of Health and Human Services (In this section referred to as the "Secretary") shall require that each family planning project under section 1002 of title X of the Public Health Service Act --  
(A) expressly informs all minors who seek the services of the project that abstinence is the only certain way to avoid pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and infection with the human immunodeficiency virus;  
and

(B) ensures that all individuals who provide counseling services to minors through the project are trained to provide to minors counseling that encourages the minors --

(i) to abstain from sexual activity  
(ii) to avoid being coerced into engaging in sexual activities; and  
(iii) to involve their parents in the decision to seek family planning services;

(2) The Secretary, acting through the Deputy Assistant Secretary for Population Affairs, shall carry out the following with respect to family planning projects referred to in paragraph (1):

(A) The Secretary shall develop and disseminate to the projects protocols for providing the counseling described in paragraph (1)(B), including protocols for training individuals to provide the counseling.



(B) The Secretary shall ensure that such protocols include protocols specific to younger adolescents.

(C) In developing protocols under subparagraphs (A) and (B), the Secretary shall consider the results of research under title XX of the Public Health Service Act.

Current bill language (reflects Istook amendment adopted 7/14 in House Committee):

Section 220. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law; no provider of services under title X of the Public Health Service Act shall be exempt from any State law requiring notification or the reporting of child abuse, child molestation, sexual abuse, rape, or incest. (b) None of the funds appropriated in this or any other Act for any fiscal year for carrying out title X of the Public Health Service Act may be made available to any family planning project under section 1001 of such title if any provider of services in the project knowingly provides contraceptive drugs or devices to a minor, unless-

(1) the minor is emancipated under applicable State law;

(2) the minor has the written consent of a custodial parent or custodial legal guardian to receive the drugs or devices;

(3) a court of competent jurisdiction has directed that the minor may receive the drugs or devices; or

(4) such provider of services has given actual written notice to a custodial parent or custodial legal guardian of the minor, notifying the parent or legal guardian of the intent to provide the drugs or devices, at least five business days before providing the drugs or devices.

(c) Each provider of services under title X of the Public Health Service Act shall each year certify to the Secretary of Health and Human Services compliance with this section. Such Secretary shall prescribe such regulations as may be necessary to effectuate this section."

Current SAP language:

Family Planning. The Committee bill requires family planning grantees either to receive written parental consent or provide advance notification to parents before giving contraceptives to minors. Mandating parental consent could discourage sexually active minors from seeking health care and reproductive counseling services and thus lead to more unintended pregnancies, more abortions and more sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV, among our nation's youth.

H.R. 4274 -- DEPARTMENTS OF LABOR, HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES, EDUCATION, AND RELATED AGENCIES APPROPRIATIONS BILL, FY 1999  
(Sponsors: Livingston (R), Louisiana; Porter (R), Illinois)

This Statement of Administration Policy provides the Administration's views on H.R. 4274, the Labor, Health and Human Services, Education, and Related Agencies Appropriations Bill, FY 1999, as reported by the House Appropriations Committee. Your consideration of the Administration's views would be appreciated.

Due to the very serious funding and language issues present in the Committee bill, discussed below, the President would veto the bill in its current form.

The only way to achieve the appropriate investment level for programs funded by this bill is to offset discretionary spending by using savings in other areas. The President's FY 1999 Budget proposes levels of discretionary spending for FY 1999 that conform to the Bipartisan Budget Agreement by making savings through user fees and certain mandatory programs to help finance this spending. In the Transportation Equity Act, Congress -- on a broad, bipartisan basis -- took similar action in approving funding for surface transportation programs paid for with mandatory offsets. We want to work with the Congress on mutually-agreeable mandatory and other offsets that could be used to increase funding for high-priority discretionary programs, including those funded by this bill. In addition, we hope that the House will reduce funding for lower priority discretionary programs and redirect funding to programs of higher priority.

#### Department of Education

The Committee bill cuts \$2 billion from the President's overall request for education program funding. As a result, the bill does not adequately support the Nation's efforts to raise student achievement, make schools safe, and improve the capabilities of teachers. High priority programs inadequately funded include:

Goals 2000. Funding for Goals 2000 is cut \$255 million below the President's request, which would reverse momentum in all 50 States to raise academic standards and deny 6,000 schools serving over three million students the funds needed to implement innovative education reforms.

Title I (Education for the Disadvantaged) Grants to Local Educational

Agencies. The Committee bill cuts \$392 million from the request, which would leave nearly 520,000 students in high-poverty communities without the extra help they need to master the basics and develop the capability to reach high academic standards.

Eisenhower Professional Development. The Committee's \$50 million reduction would leave over 100,000 teachers without the training they need to help them teach to rigorous academic standards.

America Reads. America Reads is denied the \$210 million provided in last year's Bipartisan Budget Agreement for children's literacy, which would prevent thousands of young children from receiving the extra help they need to learn to read well and independently by the end of the third grade.

Safe and Drug-Free Schools and Communities. The Committee's \$50 million reduction would deny funding for School Coordinators in nearly one-half of the Nation's middle schools needed to implement effective drug and violence prevention programs.

After School programs (21st Century Community Learning Centers). A \$140 million cut to this program, part of the President's child care initiative, would result in 3,000 fewer centers and no services to nearly 400,000 children.

Education Opportunity Zones. The Committee bill does not provide the requested \$200 million, which would deny high-poverty urban and rural districts the extra assistance they need to implement effective reforms with tough accountability for performance.

Technology in Education. The Committee's \$137 million reduction from the request would make it increasingly difficult for States to meet school children's education technology needs, especially in training teachers to integrate educational technology into their curriculum effectively.

School-to-Work. School-to-Work is cut by a total of \$100 million (between the Departments of Education and Labor) below the President's \$250 million request, which would seriously hamper all States' efforts to help young people of all backgrounds move from high school to careers or postsecondary training and education.

Bilingual Education. The Committee has cut by \$25 million the President's plan for training teachers to help limited-English proficient children.

Work-Study. Roughly 57,000 needy students would be denied the opportunity to work to finance their college education because of the Committee's \$50 million reduction.

Higher Education Initiatives. No funds are provided for three Presidential initiatives for which the President has requested \$237 million: High Hopes, to help prepare students at high poverty middle schools for college; Learning Anytime Anywhere Partnership grants for pilot projects using distance learning technology; and, teacher recruitment and preparation programs.

Civil Rights Enforcement. Ensuring that civil rights laws and regulations are adequately enforced is a fundamental responsibility of government. The Committee fails to provide the increase of \$6.5 million (for a total of \$68 million) requested by the Office for Civil Rights in the Education Department and reduced by \$2.4 million the request for \$67.8 million for the Labor Department,s Office of Federal Contract Compliance. Both activities should be restored to the full requests.

In addition to inadequate funding for priority education programs, the Administration is concerned with several language provisions of the Committee bill that would severely restrict the Administration,s ability to continue the development of programs designed to raise academic standards.

National Tests. The Administration strongly objects to the language limitation and \$15 million funding cut that would bring a halt to the President's efforts to help States and parents raise academic standards through a voluntary national test. The Committee bill,s language would prohibit the development, implementation, and administration of the tests unless explicitly authorized. The language prohibition should be deleted and the funding restored.

Unfocused Block Grants. The Administration strongly objects to language that would, in effect, turn the Goals 2000 and the Eisenhower Professional Development programs into block grants by allowing those funds to be used under the broad Title VI block grant authority. Title VI has no performance or accountability standards. The language should be deleted so that these Federal funds can address national needs and continue to be guided by strong accountability measures.

Special Education (Individuals with Disabilities Education Act -- IDEA). The bill contains two objectionable IDEA riders. One would undermine the due process protections and parental rights for disabled students who are regarded as violent. The other would, in effect, allow States to discontinue special education services for youth ages 18 to 21 in adult prisons, violating the principle that all disabled youth ages three to 21 have a right to a free, appropriate public education and undermining the Department of Education,s ability to enforce the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. Both provisions would unnecessarily re-open IDEA before last year's bipartisan reauthorization has had a chance to be implemented and fairly assessed. Both provisions should be stricken.

Bilingual Education. While we agree with the Committee on the need for some reforms to Bilingual Education, we are opposed to any provision that would set an absolute limit on student participation in bilingual education or alternative programs. Such a step would deny help to students who need it and violate the civil rights of Limited English Proficient students to an equal education. Because of individual differences, students will vary in how long it takes to develop English proficiency. We are also opposed to provisions

that  
would establish a two-year goal for becoming proficient in English, since research has shown that this timetable is unrealistically short.

**Internet Access in Schools and Libraries.** The bill contains objectionable language that would deny Federal funds to schools and libraries that have not installed software on their computers to block Internet access to indecent materials to minors. While the Administration strongly supports efforts to ensure that schools and libraries protect minors from indecent materials, it objects to such overly prescriptive language. Most local education agencies have already developed their own acceptable-use policies, many of which are not based on software. Instead, the Administration favors less burdensome and restrictive language that would require that schools and libraries develop their own acceptable-use plans at the local level and certify their implementation.

#### Department of Labor

**Summer Jobs Program.** The Administration strongly opposes the Committee's elimination of the \$871 million Summer Jobs program, which could finance 530,000 summer jobs for economically disadvantaged youth. The unemployment rate for teens continues to far exceed the overall unemployment rate. The Summer Jobs program plays a vital role in supporting employment among these teens, especially among African-American youths -- approximately 25 percent of summer jobs held by African-American 14-15 year olds come through this program -- and serves as a valuable introduction to the world of work. We urge the House to restore the full request for this program.

**President's Youth Opportunity Areas Initiative.** The Committee provides no funding for the President's Youth Opportunity Areas initiative and rescinds the \$250 million appropriated last year for this program. This program would address the problem of pervasive joblessness in high-poverty neighborhoods by making large investments in these areas to effect community-wide change and help 50,000 out-of-school youth. We strongly oppose elimination of this program, which is an essential component of the Administration's Empowerment Zones/Enterprise Communities initiative. We urge the House to provide full funding as requested.

The Administration has strong concerns with the inadequate funding levels provided for the following Labor programs:

**Adult Job Training.** The Committee has provided none of the requested increases for the Dislocated Worker (\$100 million) and low-income adult (\$45 million) job training programs. Freezing these programs would mean that some 67,000 fewer workers in need of assistance would be helped.

**Worker Protection.** The Committee has cut nearly in half the requested increase for programs that protect our workers on the job. For example, the Committee mark for the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) redirects resources to State consultation and is nine-percent below the requested level for Federal enforcement, while funding for the Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA) is frozen at the 1998 level and

virtually no funding is provided for implementing the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996. We urge the House to restore financing for such critical workplace protection programs.

**Unemployment Insurance.** The House Committee mark does not fund the \$90 million requested for the Unemployment Insurance (UI) integrity initiative. This initiative was authorized in the Balanced Budget Act of 1997 and would, over five years, achieve \$763 million in mandatory savings assumed in the Bipartisan Budget Agreement. Failure to fund this initiative would mean a continuation of errors in benefit payments and UI taxes.

**Child Labor.** The \$3 million increase to combat international child labor abuses is inadequate in light of the magnitude of the problem, and provides only a small fraction of the \$27 million requested.

The Committee bill contains several objectionable language riders addressing regulatory issues in the Department of Labor. These include language imposing new, unnecessary, and burdensome review procedures before the Department can issue Black Lung regulations, a new requirement for OSHA to conduct duplicative peer review panels for its new regulations, and a continuation of the rider that prohibits MSHA from enforcing training requirements at certain mines, which have a growing numbers of deaths. These riders would make it more difficult for the Department of Labor to carry out its programs and should be dropped.

The Administration objects to the continuation of last year's rider that prohibits the use of funds for supervising the Teamster's election, despite a court order requiring the Federal Government to pay for a supervised election.

#### Department of Health and Human Services

The Administration appreciates the Committee's efforts to provide much needed funding for important programs crucial to the healthy lives of all Americans. Unfortunately, the Committee has not provided adequate funding for several important programs of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). In addition, the Committee bill contains several language provisions that are troubling to the Administration.

**Abortion.** The Administration urges the House to strike sections 508 and 509 of the Committee bill, which would prohibit the use of funds for abortion. The President believes that abortion should be safe, legal, and rare. These provisions would continue to limit the range of conditions under which a woman's health would permit access to abortion services. Furthermore, section 509 requires a physician to make a legal determination that these conditions have been met. The Administration proposes to work with the Congress to address the issue of abortion funding.

**Head Start.** The Committee funds Head Start at \$4.5 billion, \$160 million below the President's request -- denying slots to up to 25,000 low-income children in FY 1999 and undermining efforts to serve one million children by the year 2002. Head Start has a track record of success in readying



disadvantaged children for school, supporting working families by helping parents to get involved in their children's lives and providing services to the entire family. We urge the House to restore Head Start funding to the President's requested level.

**Child Care.** The Administration urges the House to provide the additional \$174 million requested for a child care initiative that will improve the availability of affordable, quality child care for working parents. This initiative would provide States with resources to enhance child care health and safety standards enforcement, give child care workers scholarships to improve their skills, and increase our commitment to understand better and evaluate how our Nation's child care system is working. Likewise, we ask that the Committee restore funds to the President's requested level for a \$5 million program designed to assist States in developing support systems for families of children with disabilities.

**Organ Donation.** The Administration strongly opposes two provisions of the Committee bill that would suspend two HHS rules pertaining to organ donation: a HCFA rule that seeks to expand the number of organs available for donation through more vigorous procurement efforts; and, a Health Resources and Services Administration rule that would require the national organ transplant network to develop policies that would allocate organs based on patients, medical need, not their geographic location.

Other troublesome HHS-related funding and language issues, with which the Administration has serious concerns, include the following:

**National Household Survey on Drug Abuse.** The Committee mark eliminates funding for data collection activities of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, including the National Household Survey on Drug Abuse, which is our single best source of information on youth drug use and youth smoking and is important for evaluating the impact of substance abuse prevention, treatment, and enforcement efforts.

**Family Planning.** The Committee bill requires family planning grantees either to receive written parental consent or provide advance notification to parents before giving contraceptives to minors. Mandating parental consent could discourage sexually active minors from seeking health care and reproductive counseling services and thus lead to more unintended pregnancies, more abortions and more sexually transmitted diseases, including HIV, among our nation's youth. [Need to discuss.]

**Needle Exchange.** The Committee includes a total ban on the use of funds appropriated in this Act for needle exchange programs rather than making the use of funds for such programs conditional upon the certification of the Secretary of Health and Human Services.

**Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA).** Although the Committee has fully funded the President's program level request for HCFA Program Management (with the exception of the Medicare+Choice information campaign), no action has been taken on the \$265 million in new discretionary HCFA user fees. We urge the House to enact the President's requested user fees to finance HCFA activities and to ensure that

sufficient resources remain available for education and other priorities.

**Bio-Terrorism.** The Administration urges the House to provide the full \$111 million requested to improve HHS, ability to respond to attacks of biological and chemical terrorism.

**Health Disparities.** The Committee has failed to include \$30 million requested for demonstration projects to address racial and ethnic health disparities in infant mortality, cancer, diabetes, heart disease and stroke, HIV/AIDS, and immunizations.

**Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP).** The Committee would eliminate funding for LIHEAP. Over 36 percent of LIHEAP households have elderly residents, 32 percent have disabled residents, 27 percent have children under the age of six, and 27 percent are the working poor who do not receive any other public assistance. The Administration urges the House to restore funds to the President's requested level.

**Foster Care and Adoption Assistance.** The Committee bill fails to provide the Administration's request for a \$200 million contingency reserve. This language is critical to ensure grant awards should the definite appropriations be insufficient for authorized eligible expenditures in either Foster Care or Adoption Assistance. The House should restore funding to the requested level of \$200 million, or approximately four percent of total program costs.

**Office of AIDS Research.** The Committee bill does not appropriate a specific amount for AIDS research through a single appropriation for the National Institutes of Health's (NIH,s) Office of AIDS Research. The single appropriation would help NIH plan and target research funds effectively, minimizing duplication and inefficiencies across the 21 institutes and centers that carry out HIV/AIDS research.

**Prevention Research.** The Committee has provided only \$10 million of the \$25 million requested for the Centers for Disease Control to expand research in ways to prevent disease and reduce the need for medical care.

**Medicaid Drug Coverage.** The Committee bill would prohibit HCFA from paying for a specific pharmaceutical agent under Medicaid except for post-surgical treatment. We oppose the use of the appropriations process to make selective coverage determinations and judgments regarding how best to treat specific medical problems. Further, the provision is unnecessary because the Secretary already has authority to limit coverage for pharmaceutical agents if prescribed inappropriately, and States already have broad latitude to limit the use of drugs under Federal law through drug utilization review and prior authorization programs.

**Social Services Block Grant.** The Administration opposes a provision that would restrict State authority to transfer Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) funds to SSBG in FY 1999 up to the amounts transferred by individual States in FY 1998. Enacting such a provision so late in FY1998 would inequitably limit State flexibility for the future.

**General Departmental Management.** A provision of the bill would require

that HHS' Office of the Secretary contract with the National Academy of Sciences (NAS) for an \$890,000 study on repetitive tasks in the workplace. This provision duplicates current NIH efforts with NAS in this area.

#### Social Security Administration

The Committee bill does not provide \$19 million for administrative expenses, contingent on the authorization of a user fee for services provided by the Social Security Administration to attorneys who represent claimants for benefits. These services include withholding money from certain past due benefits and issuing payments to certain claimant representatives. The Administration continues to support enactment of this user fee and appropriation of the anticipated collections for administrative expenses.

In addition, the Committee bill does not provide \$50 million for administrative expenses for the conduct of additional non-disability Supplemental Security Income (SSI) redeterminations of eligibility. These resources and the resulting redeterminations are essential to ensuring the integrity of the SSI program and reducing unnecessary benefit payments. Failure to provide this funding would result in serious staffing shortfalls.

#### Other Issues

National Labor Relations Board (NLRB). The Committee provides funding for the NLRB at the FY 1997 level. This would result in a loss of over 100 staff, an increase in case backlogs, and could result in furloughs and office closings. This reduction would cripple an agency key to protecting workers, rights on the job, and we urge the House to restore the NLRB to the requested level.

Section 516 amends the National Labor Relations Act to require the NLRB to adjust its dollar jurisdictional standards for inflation on October 1, 1998, and every five years thereafter. This change would deny workers in some small businesses the protection afforded to others to organize and bargain collectively. This change to substantive law raising the jurisdictional thresholds more than five-fold should not be done through the appropriations process, but only after hearings and debate.

Corporation for National and Community Service. The Administration is deeply concerned about the Committee's \$27 million reduction to the request for the Corporation for National and Community Service. This reduction freezes the Corporation's Senior Service program at the FY 1998 level and cuts VISTA \$5 million below FY 1998. These reductions would deny more than 500 VISTA members the opportunity to serve in low-income communities Nation-wide and would reduce the number of seniors serving their communities by 15,000. The Administration urges the House to fully fund the Corporation at the \$279 million level proposed in the FY 1999 Budget.

Corporation for Public Broadcasting. The Administration strongly objects to the lack of funding provided for the President's initiative to assist

public broadcasters in converting to digital technology. The transition to digital technology promises to create tremendous opportunities for expanded and enhanced educational and public service programming while promoting innovative technology applications. Providing the Corporation with funding in FY 1999 will allow public broadcasting to convert to digital technology on a schedule similar to that of commercial stations. This will facilitate fundraising efforts and allow public broadcasters to participate in the establishment of digital standards.

Railroad Retirement Board (RRB). The Committee bill does not include language to provide the RRB with authority to offer voluntary separation incentive payments (or buyouts) through the end of calendar year 1998. RRB's experience has shown that reducing employment through buyouts is much less disruptive to agency operations than conducting a reduction-in-force. The Administration urges the House to provide this buyout authority.

The Committee bill includes language prohibiting the RRB Inspector General from using funds for any audit, investigation, or review of the Medicare program. The Administration believes that this language should be dropped. RRB has statutory authority to administer a separate contract for RRB, Part B Medicare claims. As long as RRB has authority to negotiate and administer a separate Medicare contract, the RRB Inspector General ought not to be prohibited from using funds to review, audit, or investigate activity related to that contract.

Armed Forces Retirement Home (AFRH). The Subcommittee provides FY 1999 funding at the requested dollar level, but does not provide the necessary multi-year authority or requested advance appropriations to contract for the medical facility at the Mississippi Home. Without the advance appropriation or last year's language, AFRH will have to reallocate these funds away from the Mississippi Home to the Washington Home for smaller, lower-priority capital projects that are ready for contract.

Here is what I have found regarding WIC, Title X, and MCH and their coverage of smoking cessation services for pregnant women and women at risk for pregnancy. I will probably add a paragraph at the beginning saying that the most important thing we can do is to ensure that pregnant women who receive prenatal care through the Medicaid program receive smoking cessation counseling. Any thoughts?

WIC -- The WIC program provides supplemental foods, nutritional support, and nutrition and health education to low-income pregnant, post-partum and breast-feeding women and children up to age 5 who are determined to be nutritionally at risk. While health education and referrals are covered under WIC, direct medical services are not. The Anti-Drug Abuse Act of 1988 requires WIC agencies to inform individuals about the dangers of drug abuse and refer participants for treatment or counseling. WIC regulations define &drugs and other harmful substance abuse8 to include tobacco. In addition, the House Committee report accompanying the FY94 Agriculture Appropriations bill required the WIC program to provide information to women regarding the dangers of tobacco use and exposure to ETS. The WIC program has prepared extensive printed materials for program providers and participants on tobacco. (These materials do not mention NRT).

Title X -- The Title X program funds grants to providers for family planning services and other reproductive health care. The program does

not fund prenatal care, but some Title X providers have other sources of funding that allow them to provide on-site prenatal care or other health services. Reproductive health services, including prescription contraceptives, are available on a sliding fee scale to women who are not covered by Medicaid, private insurance or other form of health coverage.

Neither the Title X statute nor the program guidelines mention smoking cessation. The guidelines do state that because family planning programs are the only source of health information and medical care for many women, & programs should, whenever possible, provide health maintenance services such as screening and general health education and counseling directed toward health promotion and disease prevention. These additional services should promote the client,s general state of health, and, in turn, the health of their infants and children.<sup>8</sup> Smoking cessation could thus fall within the scope of this guidance.

Title X has been unauthorized since 1981, and it is unlikely to be reauthorized any time soon for political reasons. HHS is currently in the process of revising its guidelines, but this is expected to be a very long and tedious process, with no targeted release date as of yet. However, we could ask the Secretary to send a letter to grant recipients, urging them to provide on-site counseling or referrals for smoking cessation services to women seeking Title X services.

MCH -- The Maternal and Child Health Program provides grants to states to provide direct medical care, health education services and other public health assistance and services to pregnant women and children through age 22. The direct medical care component is largely designed to fill service gaps (serving those populations who are not served by other programs such as Medicaid or CHIP). As the result of new a new MCH guidance for FY1999 and 2000, state grantees are expected to meet 18 federal performance measures, and may set between 7 and 10 state performance measures of their own. My contact at the MCH Bureau believes that most states have set performance measures for smoking cessation. However, they will not know the precise number of states until January (this is when they will centralize their performance measure information for all of the states), and they will not have data regarding state success in meeting these measures until much later (June 1999). We could announce in January the number of states that intend to provide cessation services to pregnant women, and in June the data regarding how successful these states were at meeting their goals. In addition, we could send a letter to the State MCH directors, stressing the importance of providing smoking cessation services to this population.
