Energy Dept. Official Discusses Sale of Petroleum Reserve in California

Oct. 17--Local oil producers learned a little more about how the sale of Elk Hills Naval Petroleum Reserve will be conducted at a meeting Wednesday with the Department of Energy.

But the information was still somewhat limited.

More than 100 local producers, contractors and those interested in Elk Hills met at the Red Lion Inn to hear what Assistant Secretary of Fossil Energy Patricia Fry Godley had to say about the sale. Legislation to sell the 48,000-acre field near Taft was signed last February and mandates the government to sell its 78 percent interest by February 1998.

This was the second meeting the DOE has held since announcing last week that it plans to sell Elk Hills in pieces rather than as a whole field. The first meeting was in Houston on Tuesday.

"I think the meeting cleared up a lot of questions people had, however, I don't think the DOE is in a position to give a lot of detailed information about how the sale is going to take place," said David Gilbert, California Independent Petroleum Association's Kern County representative. "We are gratified that the DOE has recognized the sale should be structured so independents can have a chance to bid on the field by breaking it up and selling it in smaller percentages rather than selling it as a single entity to one company."

Representatives of Chevron, which currently owns an aggregate 22 percent of Elk Hills, were concerned about the number and size of the segments to be sold. DOE announced it would likely sell a large chunk that would be considered an operatorship interest and smaller pieces as non-operating working interests. Of particular interest to Chevron at Wednesday's meeting was DOE's announcement that it would also consider selling off the field's surface facilities separately.

Surface facilities include a cogeneration plant, gas processing plant and crude-oil-gathering facilities.

"That's one of our No. 1 concerns," said Carnie Block, vice president and general manager of Chevron's California production operations. "Breaking up the surface facilities could have a major impact on the overall operations of the field."

Godley acknowledged Chevron's concerns but didn't give any specific information on that topic.

She said the government wants to determine first whether selling the

facilities separately would bring more money.

But Chevron's concern was that without knowing whether the facilities were included in the sale, potential bidders would likely discount their bids for the mineral rights and that devaluation might exceed the value of the bids for the surface facilities.

Also of great interest to audience members was a pending agreement between the DOE and Chevron on what Chevron's relationship will be with the new owner or owners.

Godley stressed numerous times that the DOE is involved in what she deemed "very cooperative" negotiations with Chevron to come up with an operating agreement. But, again, she didn't have specifics on what that agreement will look like. She hoped it would be signed and in place for potential bidders to examine by the time the "data rooms" are opened. Data rooms hold information on oil fields about the field's ownership, history, reservoirs, well information and more. The DOE's timeline shows data rooms will likely be opened at Elk Hills from May through July 1997.

Solicitation of bids will likely go out in April 1997.

Five independent appraisers, yet to be hired, are expected to submit their estimates of Elk Hills' worth to the DOE by September 1997. Those appraisals will not be made public, nor will the bids, Godley said.

"It is my intention to make that information fully available to the public at a time when it wouldn't influence the sale," she said. "Opening the appraisals to the public beforehand would kind of be like me putting my house on the market and saying, 'I'm willing to sell it for \$140,000. What are you willing to bid?'"

Godley said both the Bakersfield meeting and the one in Houston produced good questions and comments, and she intended to hold more such meetings as the sale process moves forward.

Continued consideration of H.R. 2107 - Department of Interior and Related Agencies FY 1998 Appropriations bill. At press time, a number of amendments remained to be debated.

At press time, the Senate took the following action on H.R. 2107:

- o Rejected (39-61) Hutchison amendment to give 75% of NEA funding to States through block grants, 20% to NEA for national grants, and 5% to NEA for administrative costs.
- o Adopted (voice vote) Enzi amendment to place a 1 year moratorium on the ability of the Secretary of the Interior to approve new tribal gambling compacts if the compacts have not been approved by State governments.
- o Rejected (35-63) Kyl amendment to increase, by \$4.8 million, funding for BIA law enforcement activities against gang violence. The offset would come from the Woodrow Wilson Center for Scholars.
- o Rejected (59-30) Bumpers amendment, which addressed hardrock mining issues. It would have imposed a 5 percent royalty on hardrock minerals extracted from public lands, and it would have also imposed a fee on the production of minerals on land patented under the mining laws. The royalty and fees would go to the Abandoned Mine Reclamation Fund to reclaim land damaged by mining. It would also continue the moratorium on processing new patent applications for mining on Federal lands, and continue the restriction on oil and gas exploration on the continental shelf.

o Adopted (voice vote) Bingaman amendment that stops further sales of petroleum from the strategic petroleum reserve. This would be offset by tapping potential excess proceeds from the Elk Hills Naval Petroleum Reserve.

At press time, the Senate took the following action on H.R. 2107:

- o Rejected (39-61) Hutchison amendment to give 75% of NEA funding to States through block grants, 20% to NEA for national grants, and 5% to NEA for administrative costs.
- o Adopted (voice vote) Enzi amendment to place a 1 year moratorium on the ability of the Secretary of the Interior to approve new tribal gambling compacts if the compacts have not been approved by State governments.
- o Rejected (35-63) Kyl amendment to increase, by \$4.8 million, funding for BIA law enforcement activities against gang violence. The offset would come from the Woodrow Wilson Center for Scholars.
- o Rejected (59-30) Bumpers amendment, which addressed hardrock mining issues. It would have imposed a 5 percent royalty on hardrock minerals extracted from public lands, and it would have also imposed a fee on the production of minerals on land patented under the mining laws. The royalty and fees would go to the Abandoned Mine Reclamation Fund to reclaim land damaged by mining. It would also continue the moratorium on processing new patent applications for mining on Federal lands, and continue the restriction on oil and gas exploration on the continental shelf.

- o Adopted (voice vote) Bingaman amendment that stops further sales of petroleum from the strategic petroleum reserve. This would be offset by tapping potential excess proceeds from the Elk Hills Naval Petroleum Reserve.

Per your request (for Rep. Andrews), attached (and in the text of this e-mail) are brief descriptions of a variety of other auction mechanisms now used in Federal programs. Caroline Chang, one of our summer interns, helped put it together based on information provided by the auctions technical group and other OMB and agency contacts.

The list is not exhaustive. Not included on the list is the most common competitive bidding process used by the government -- the normal Federal procurement process set forth in the Federal Acquisition Rules.

### Examples of How Auctions Are Used in Federal Programs

Treasury Securities -- Treasury auctions bills, notes, bonds and inflation-indexed notes and bonds in a sealed-bid auction. Bidders bid an interest rate and loan volume they would like at that rate. But no bidder can win more than a certain percentage of the total put up for bid. Noncompetitive bidders can submit pre-auction bids for a given volume for which they'll accept the auction-determined interest rate. Treasury usually uses discriminatory-price auctions by giving each bidder the rate they bid, but it has also experimented with uniform auctions in which all winners get the highest winning rate.

HUD Loan and Real Estate Asset Sales -- HUD and FHA auction defaulted mortgages, and bidders may bid on any number of mortgages. Because any

combination or all of the auctioned items can be bid on together, there is likely overlap in the mortgage packages submitted by each bidder. To address this problem and to be able to determine which combination of bids would optimize value for the government, an Auction Optimization Model<sup>8</sup> was developed by AT&T Bell Laboratories. The computer model is used to select the winning bids based on total revenue for the government.

**Health Education Assistance Loans (HEAL)** -- HHS conducts a sealed-bid auction in which bidders bid an interest rate and loan volume they would like at that rate. The low bidder and all other within a certain tolerance of the low bid win the right to make loans. In the case of single winners, schools would not have a choice in that given year and might have to deal with different lenders in each year. In the case of multiple winners, each bidder would have to compete to make as many loans as they can, though it would probably be less than their originally bid volume.

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- **EPA Pollution Rights** -- EPA's acid rain program holds an annual auction of a Special Allowance Reserve of approximately 2.8 percent of total allowances, conducted by the Chicago Board of Trade. In addition to providing an additional means of obtaining allowances (each equal to one ton of annual SO2 emissions), the auction also importantly establishes a market price signal. Allowances are sold from the Reserve before private holdings are sold. Anyone -- including public interest and environmental groups -- can participate in the bidding on and trading of allowances. Spot (for that year) and advance (not usable for seven years) allowances for SO2 emissions are available through the auction, and allowances may be bought, sold, banked, or retired. This auction appears to use discriminatory pricing rather than uniform pricing.
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- **Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)** -- The USDA solicits bids from producers for enrollment of acres into the CRP. Bids are accepted based on a formula that accounts for the environmental benefits for each dollar from enrollment (i.e., if a bid is accepted, the government pays farmers rental payments for 10 years to idle their land and put a conserving cover crop on it).
- **Timber Sales** -- The Forest Service auctions off the rights to timber companies to cut designated areas in National Forests. After an offer of sale describing the timber and the sale terms is publicized, a sealed-bid process takes place. Non-price related terms of the sale, including environmental concerns, are all set by the government, so the highest bidder wins the auction.
- **Export Enhancement Program (EEP)** -- The USDA establishes prices and bonus levels based on their estimates of the going market rates, and then accepts bids from exporters. However, rather than bidding against each other in a true-market scenario, exporters are really only bidding against the government-set price and bonus level, and they have the option of coming back with successive new bids until they hit the USDA-determined price levels.
