SUBJECT: POLICY PROJECT VISIT TO KENYA HIGHLIGHTS THE DUAL CHALLENGES
FACED BY KENYA IN EXPANDING ITS FAMILY PLANNING PROGRAM AND COMBATING
AIDS

1. SUMMARY. POLICY PROJECT STAFF RECENTLY VISITED KENYA (JOHNSTON VISIT, 01/27-02/08/97) TO CONTINUE THE POLICY ANALYSIS TRAINING BEING UNDERTAKEN BY THE PROJECT. TWO PURPOSES OF THE TRIP WERE (A) TO FACILITATE THE FORMATION OF A WORKING GROUP TO REVIEW AND UPDATE THE NATIONAL FAMILY PLANNING PROJECTIONS AND CONSIDER THE PROGRAM IMPLICATIONS OF TRENDS IN METHOD MIX, AND (B) TO CONDUCT A WORKSHOP FOR THE KENYA AIDS NGO*S CONSORTIUM ON A TECHNICAL UPDATE ON HIV/AIDS. CHALLENGES FACING KENYA INCLUDE: EXPANDING KENYA*S FAMILY PLANNING PROGRAM TO MEET THE NATIONAL GOALS OF INCREASING CONTRACEPTIVE PREVALENCE AT A TIME WHEN KENYA*S REPRODUCTIVE AGE POPULATION IS INCREASING VERY RAPIDLY; AND AT THE SAME TIME EXPANDING TO A NATIONAL LEVEL THE HIV/AIDS INTERVENTIONS THAT HAVE BEEN INTRODUCED AT A SMALLER SCALE, TO HALT THE INCREASE IN THE PREVALENCE OF HIV/AIDS. WE FEEL SOME OF THE ACTIVITIES AND ISSUES DISCUSSED BELOW MAY BE OF INTEREST TO OTHER MISSIONS. END SUMMARY.

2. DURING THE WEEK OF JANUARY 27-31, THE POLICY PROJECT HELD A WORKSHOP TO INITIATE A WORKING GROUP TO REVISE AND UPDATE KENYA*S FAMILY PLANNING PROJECTIONS, AS ONE OF THE MAJOR TOOLS FOR MONITORING AND EVALUATING THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE NATIONAL IMPLEMENTATION PLAN FOR FAMILY PLANNING. THE GROUP IS COMPOSED OF MEMBERS FROM THE DIVISION OF FAMILY HEALTH, THE NATIONAL COUNCIL FOR POPULATION AND DEVELOPMENT, LOCAL NGO'S AND STAFF MEMBERS FROM USAID AND UNFPA. THE GROUP CONDUCTED AN INITIAL REVIEW OF DATA FROM SURVEYS, SERVICE STATISTICS, AND THE CONTRACEPTIVE LOGISTICS MANAGEMENT SYSTEM AND WILL MEET ON A REGULAR BASIS TO ANALYZE TRENDS IN METHOD MIX AND THE IMPLICATIONS FOR PROGRAM IMPLEMENTATION. ONE OF THE PRINCIPAL TOOLS FOR THIS ANALYSIS WILL BE THE SPECTRUM MODEL, DEVELOPED BY THE POLICY PROJECT, WHICH INCORPORATES ASPECTS OF THE PREVIOUS DEMPROJ, FAMPLAN, AND AIM MODELS, AND WHICH IS CURRENTLY BEING EXPANDED TO INCLUDE A REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH COMPONENT.

3. FROM FEBRUARY 4-6 THE POLICY PROJECT SPONSORED A WORKSHOP FOR THE KENYA AIDS NGO*S CONSORTIUM ON A TECHNICAL UPDATE ON HIV/AIDS. THE OBJECTIVES OF THE WORKSHOP WERE TO BRING CONSORTIUM MEMBERS UP-TO-DATE ON AVAILABLE INFORMATION ABOUT THE HIV/AIDS EPIDEMIC WORLD-WIDE AND IN KENYA; TO REVIEW LESSONS LEARNED ABOUT SUCCESSFUL STRATEGIES IN CARE AND PREVENTION; AND TO GIVE CONSORTIUM MEMBERS A CHANCE TO SHARE EXPERIENCES AND LESSONS THEY HAVE LEARNED, AND TO SHARE THEIR IDEAS ABOUT THE CHALLENGES AHEAD AND THE POLICY ISSUES THAT NEED TO BE ADDRESSED. REPRESENTATIVES FROM 40 MEMBER NGO ORGANIZATIONS ATTENDED, ALONG WITH SEVERAL MINISTRY OF HEALTH REPRESENTATIVES, OTHER GOVERNMENT DEPARTMENTS AND DONORS. THE WORKSHOP HIGHLIGHTED THE NEED TO FIND COST-EFFECTIVE WAYS OF SCALING UP THE SMALL SCALE INITIATIVES TO DATE IN ORDER TO HAVE A NATIONAL LEVEL IMPACT.

4. THE CHALLENGES FACING KENYA IN EXPANDING ITS FAMILY PLANNING PROGRAM HAVE THREE MAJOR COMPONENTS. FIRST, IT MUST INCREASE FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES TO MEET THE QUOTE UNMET NEED UNQUOTE FOR FAMILY PLANNING, WHICH HAS BEEN DOCUMENTED IN THE DHS SURVEYS. SECOND, BECAUSE OF THE VERY HIGH FERTILITY EXPERIENCED IN THE LATE 1970*S (WHEN KENYA*S TFR REACHED THE UNPRECEDENTED LEVEL OF 8.1 CHILDREN PER WOMAN), KENYA IS NOW EXPERIENCING THE MOST RAPID INCREASE IN THE REPRODUCTIVE AGE POPULATION

THAT ANY COUNTRY HAS EVER EXPERIENCED. FOR INSTANCE, THE POPULATION OF WOMEN AGED 20-24 WILL INCREASE FROM 1.1 MILLION TO 1.5 MILLION IN JUST FIVE YEARS. TO EVEN MAINTAIN A CONSTANT CONTRACEPTIVE PREVALENCE RATE WOULD REQUIRE A MAJOR EXPANSION IN FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES. THIRD, THE NATIONAL LEADERS CONFERENCE ON POPULATION IN 1989 SET AN AGGRESSIVE NATIONAL GOAL TO REACH A CONTRACEPTIVE PREVALENCE RATE OF 43 PERCENT OF ALL WOMEN USING MODERN CONTRACEPTIVE METHODS BY THE YEAR 2000, A GOAL WHICH HAS BEEN RECONFIRMED IN THE PARLIAMENTARY SESSIONAL PAPER ON KENYA'S NATIONAL POPULATION POLICY WHICH HAS RECENTLY BEEN APPROVED BY THE CABINET AND IS AWAITING ADOPTION EARLY IN 1997 BY THE FULL PARLIAMENT. KENYA HAS MADE SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS IN THE PAST DECADE IN INCREASING THE CPR, BUT WITH THE UNPRECEDENTED RATE OF INCREASE IN REPRODUCTIVE AGE POPULATION, AND AGGRESSIVE NATIONAL GOALS, THE CHALLENGES AHEAD REQUIRE A RENEWED COMMITMENT, AND MAJOR INCREASES IN THE RESOURCES DEVOTED TO FAMILY PLANNING.

5. ADDED TO THIS IS THE MAJOR CHALLENGE OF CONFRONTING THE HIV/AIDS EPIDEMIC. AMONG PREGNANT WOMEN ATTENDING ANTE-NATAL CLINICS IN NAIROBI THERE HAS BEEN A STEADY AND RAPID INCREASE IN HIV SEROPREVALENCE FROM 5.8 PERCENT IN 1990 TO 24.6 PERCENT IN 1995. IN ORDER TO GET A NATIONAL ESTIMATE, HIV SEROPREVALENCE DATA FROM 13 ANTE-NATAL CLINIC SITES LOCATED THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY HAVE BEEN ADJUSTED FOR SEVERAL FACTORS INCLUDING URBAN/RURAL DISTRIBUTION, EXCLUDING A PROPORTION OF THE POPULATION THAT IS NOT SEXUALLY ACTIVE, AND ADJUSTING THE AGE DISTRIBUTION TO REPRESENT THE TOTAL ADULT POPULATION AGED 15 YEARS AND OVER. BASED ON THIS ANALYSIS, THE PREVALENCE OF HIV INFECTION AMONG THE ADULT POPULATION IN KENYA (AGED 15 YEARS AND OLDER) HAS INCREASED FROM 3.1 PERCENT IN 1990 TO 7.5 PERCENT IN 1995. WE DO NOT KNOW WHAT THE TREND WILL BE IN THE FUTURE, BUT OTHER COUNTRIES IN THE REGION HAVE REACHED MUCH HIGHER LEVELS OF NATIONAL HIV PREVALENCE. THERE IS CERTAINLY THE POTENTIAL OF CONTINUED RAPID INCREASE IN HIV PREVALENCE IN KENYA, UNLESS EFFECTIVE INTERVENTIONS TO PREVENT HIV INFECTIONS ARE ADOPTED RAPIDLY AT A NATIONAL SCALE.

6. KENYA IS THUS CONFRONTING THE DUAL CHALLENGES OF EXPANDING FAMILY PLANNING SERVICES AND COMBATING THE AIDS EPIDEMIC. IT MUST BE NOTED THAT THE EXPANDING FAMILY PLANNING PROGRAM RELIES HEAVILY ON METHODS SUCH AS ORAL CONTRACEPTIVES, INJECTABLES, NORPLANT, IUD'S, AND STERILIZATION, NONE OF WHICH PROTECT AGAINST STD'S AND HIV. KENYA MUST ACT QUICKLY TO EXPAND STD/HIV/FP INTEGRATION QUOTE BEST PRACTICES UNQUOTE, WHERE THEY CAN BE SHOWN TO BE FEASIBLE, PRACTICAL AND COST-EFFECTIVE, TO HAVE A NATIONAL-LEVEL IMPACT IN MEETING THE FAMILY PLANNING AND AIDS PREVENTION CHALLENGES. INCREASING ACCESS TO FEMALE CONTROLLED BARRIER METHODS OF FAMILY PLANNING, TO PROMOTING DUAL METHOD USE, AND TO OTHER BEHAVIORAL CHANGE INTERVENTIONS MUST ALSO BE CONSIDERED. PERHAPS THE MAJOR CHALLENGE WILL BE IN MOBILIZING THE LOCAL AND INTERNATIONAL FINANCIAL RESOURCES THAT WILL BE REQUIRED TO SUCCESSFULLY CONFRONT THESE CHALLENGES.

I would like to do a COW or trend on Total Fertility Rate and Infant Mortality Rate changes, 1960 to present, (if it hasn't been done already).

The latest WDR shows continued rapid changes in both between 1980 and 1995.

The world (weighted) TFR fell from 3.7 to 2.9 (2.1 is replacement). The low-income economies fell from 4.3 to 3.2, or excluding China and India, from 6.3 to 5.0.

World infant mortality fell from 80/1,000 births to 55/1,000 births in just 15 years. Low- income country infant mortality fell from 98 to 69 (or 116 to 89 excluding China and India).

Amazingly, in the middle east, infant mortality was cut nearly in half in that period, and the TFR moved from about 6 to about 4, or half the "distance" to replacement.

These are absolutely remarkable accomplishments. There are two directions a longer article could go: causes and economic implications. The causes could be a bit tricky on the fertility side, since this was a period of declining US aid in family planning assistance (it makes little difference, I guess). I would have to look at the literature a bit more.

One economic implication is that developing countries should grow faster since declining fertility should, in principle, raise the ratio of the working-age to dependent population below what it would have been in the absence of the decline, and increase per capita income in a mechanical fashion. It could also free up resources to invest in capital rather than feeding etc. kids, although the evidence on that one is pretty weak. There is also thought to be a beneficial effect of allowing more labor market participation by women.

The US is one of the few countries that experienced fertility increase from 1.8 to 2.1.

And as you know, the traditionally high-fertility European countries (Ireland, Italy, Spain, Portugal) have very very very low fertility, as low as 1.2 (as does Germany).

There is a whole lot one could do with this.

Cordelia,

To minimize transaction costs here are the residual points I would have made.

(1) We should make more explicit the post-1993 progress. It is mentioned but not highlighted. The charts should be amended where possible to reflect the current record.

(2) The section on the President's policies on children's tax credit, eetc, child care and other "family friendly" policies might be integrated with the trend discussion to show an easing of burden.

(3) As we discussed some consideration of kids being endogenous should be added. Kids are both a user of resources and a source of "consumption" so we want to be careful not to imply fewer kids solve everything.

(4) Sorting some of the results by income can provide further rationale for low income family assistance in child care, tax credits etc.

(5) I thought other time use data showed a substantial (from a very low base) increase in male "housework" time. Is this not true or is there some evidence for sharing. As we would like (I assume) to encourage this some helpful notes to this effect might be worth finding.

(6) While elder care may be small we do talk a lot about it in policy terms. The discussion minimizes the issue to a large degree. Some quantifying of the cost or perhaps an increased trend to this effect might be helpful.

(7) The issue of flextime is very sensitive with many of our constituents. I would urge care in writing this section.

(8) The line of causality from increase child support to increased involvement is at best unclear and likely to run the other way. I would delete the reference to abortion as that is not how we advocate family planning management.

Hopefully these are helpful.
