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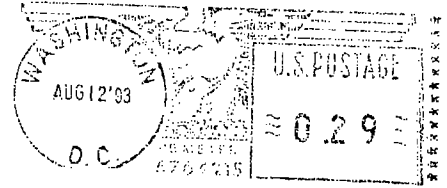

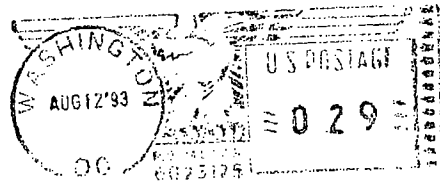

Dear Secretary Pena:

I am writing you with respect to Dockets 48743 and 48744, which involve the possibility of granting authority for Raleigh/Durham Airport to be designated as a U. S. gateway to London and to authorize American Airlines to serve the London route. It is extremely important to both the economic development of North Carolina and of the strengthening of a nationally decentralized international air transport system that these authorizations be given.

The granting of authority to American Airlines to serve London from Raleigh/Durham is extremely important to the financial success of the Raleigh/Durham hub. Indeed, it seems clear to me that the granting of a Raleigh/Durham-London route would absolutely cinch the survival of the Raleigh/Durham hub, and would thereby guarantee that an important new international gateway, not only to London and Paris, but in time, to other European cities, would be put on absolutely firm footing. If that were done, it would provide over time many more options for U. S. citizens wishing to travel to Europe with a minimum of delay, as well as to Europeans wishing to come to the United States. It seems absolutely clear that the national interest is greatly served by proliferating international gateways, and especially those in areas of low population density and airline traffic density because that makes the process of travel much more pleasurable and less burdensome.

The certification of Raleigh/Durham as a London gateway and the authorization of a route to London from Raleigh/Durham for American is extremely important, therefore, not just for travelers to and from London, but also for the strengthening of a decentralized air transportation system for the United States. Regional airline hubs become much more financially feasible for

domestic travel if they are also provided with connecting international routes. That is why the matter of a London route is so critical for Raleigh/Durham, and not only because of the attractiveness of a London route by itself.

There is this to be said specifically for the London route, however, and that is that such a route is extremely important for the continued industrial growth of this region, and because of the great extent to which such a route would facilitate growth of collaborative efforts between universities and research institutes located in this region with our natural collaborators in the U.K. and Europe. The growth of science and technology here, whether in research institutes or in universities and their affiliated hospitals, would be greatly enhanced by London authority for American Airlines, and it is clear, too, that the very substantial presence here of major U.K.-based industries, especially Burroughs-Wellcome and Glaxo, would become even more important for North Carolina and the United States by virtue of more convenient air service that would facilitate more growth here.

There are many compelling reasons, therefore, for designating Raleigh/Durham as a London gateway and in authorizing American Airlines to have such a route. Such a route would, by taking advantage of the industrial, research, university, scientific, and medical strengths of this area, ensure that such a route between Raleigh/Durham and London would lead to much stronger growth in scientific/intellectual collaborations and in international trade than would such a route given to any other region of the country. That enhanced growth would benefit not only this region, but the United States as a whole. Moreover, because a London-Raleigh/Durham American route would guarantee the future existence of the Raleigh/Durham hub, all air travelers in the United States would benefit by having available for the foreseeable future a strong, viable option for both domestic and international travel.

I strongly urge you, therefore, to approve these authorizations.

Dear Mr. Fleishman,

On April 8, the Raleigh/Durham community asked the U.S. Department of Transportation for authority to have Raleigh/Durham designated as a U.S. Gateway to London and to have American Airlines authorized to serve that London route. American has filed in support of the community and is eager to initiate service to London this summer.

Over the past several years, we have asked government officials to create new international service to London including a route from Raleigh/Durham. Unfortunately, United Kingdom officials have rejected all such attempts and the U.S. government has not been able to overcome these obstacles.

As a result of the Department of Transportation's approval of British Airways' \$300 million investment, USAir has been ordered to give up its three existing authorities to London. If Raleigh/Durham is to remain a competitive hub, and provide important economic stimulus for the area, London authority is critical. If Raleigh/Durham does not obtain London authority now, it is unlikely to get it for some time.

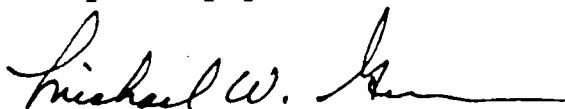
The establishment of London service will help promote the Raleigh/Durham area as a center of international importance, attracting more visitors and trade, increasing convention business and providing jobs associated with these activities. A London route is essential if Raleigh/Durham is to remain competitive with hubs that have international services, particularly Charlotte, where British Airways has been given expanded authority by DOT. DOT should not allow these routes to be transferred to communities -- such as

Chicago and Detroit -- which already have multiple carrier service to London. Preference must be given to cities without London service. Moreover, DOT should not allow the only North Carolina service to London to be held by a foreign carrier -- British Airways. Maintaining a U.S. carrier as a competitor to London is good for the State and the country.

I am writing to ask that you support the Raleigh/Durham community/American Airlines application for Raleigh/Durham-London route authority. You can make a difference in helping the community obtain this important route authority. I urge you to write to Secretary Federico F. Peña at 400 400 7th Street, SW, Washington, DC 20590. Fax number: (202) 426-7202. Your letter should reference Dockets 48743 and 48744.

I hope you will join us in this effort and I look forward to the initiation of Raleigh/Durham-London service.

In conversations with Jim Trengrove, senior producer of The MacNeil-Lehrer Newshour, he suggested that the recent efforts by the Rhode Island Marine Trades Association (RIMTA) to revitalize the boating industry by repealing the State's 7% sales tax on boats might be of some interest to the President.

In 1990, an ill-advised luxury tax on boats was put into effect. It was supposed to tax the rich, but instead it put thousands of boat workers on unemployment lines and almost sunk an industry. A bipartisan effort by Republicans and Democrats has led to the legislation necessary to repeal that tax, which as I understand it, the President supports.

It would be good news for small businesses around the country to know that the President supports the repeal of the "luxury tax" as well as the major step Rhode Island has taken to rebuild its boating industry after the disastrous effects of the luxury tax. Our Governor and State Legislature made this happen in spite of our economic condition here in Rhode Island and the New England.

The Governor is scheduled to have the official signing of the bill on Thursday, August 5, 1993 at 9:00 a.m. The bill has a sunset provision which would reinstate the State sales

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tax on boats if the luxury tax is not repeal by October 1, 1993. It would be a tremendous boost for New England's small businesses, particularly the boating industry, to have the President witness the signing. Many boat builders would be glad to know that they have hope for getting their jobs back throughout the country.

I understand how busy the President's schedule is but I hope he might be able to attend this ceremony. All small businesses especially those in our industry will be extremely uplifted by his interest.

Daniel S. Mariaschin is Director of International, Governmental and Israel Affairs for B'nai B'rith.

Mr. Mariaschin has spent nearly all of his professional life working on behalf of Jewish organizations, beginning in 1973 as Community Relations Associate with the Jewish Community Council of Boston. Two years later he was named director of the New England office of the American Zionist Federation and Zionist House in Boston.

In 1977, Mr. Mariaschin joined the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith as director of its Middle East Affairs Department. From 1979 to 1986, he served as assistant to ADL's national director, the late Nathan Perlmutter, and as director of its National Leadership division, responsible for ADL's nationwide program of leadership development.

He then became director of the Political Affairs Department of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAC), where he supervised political action activities and grassroots organization programs.

Prior to joining B'nai B'rith, Mr. Mariaschin served as director of communications

and principal spokesman for former Secretary of State Alexander M. Haig, Jr. during his 1987-88 presidential campaign.

Mr. Mariaschin has written numerous articles and reviews on national security issues for such publications as The Wall Street Journal, The Los Angeles Times, The Chicago Tribune, The Washington Times and Newsday. He appears frequently as a foreign affairs analyst on television and radio programs. He has lectured on foreign and defense affairs at the U.S. State Department's Foreign Service Institute, the Defense Intelligence College, the Marine Corps Command and Staff College and at other military installations around the country.

He has also worked as a radio announcer and news commentator and has lectured widely in the U.S. and abroad. Raised in New Hampshire, Mr. Mariaschin received his Bachelor of Arts degree in history from the University of New Hampshire and his Master's degree in Contemporary Jewish Studies from Brandeis University. In May 1990, Mr. Mariaschin was honored with the American Jewish Communal Leadership Award from Brandeis University.

Kent Schiner has long been a leader in the Jewish community and in B'nai B'rith. A highly successful insurance executive, with a rare talent for management and a keen business sense, he was elected International President of the world's largest Jewish organization in August 1990. Mr. Schiner served B'nai B'rith as Senior International Vice President from 1984 through 1988. A Chartered Life Underwriter and a Chartered Financial Consultant, Mr. Schiner is a recipient of the Georges S. Robertson award, the highest local award in the insurance industry. He has served as president of the Maryland State Association of Life Underwriters, and in 1990 was elected into the M.S.A.L.U. Hall of Fame. He is a Board Member of the Baltimore Estate Planning Council. In industry as in B'nai B'rith he has achieved distinction through his tireless efforts and his ability as a highly effective team leader.

Mr. Schiner displayed an extraordinary talent for leadership early in life. Training soldiers for combat during the Korean War at the age of eighteen, he was one of the youngest men ever promoted to the rank of sergeant in the United States Marine Corps. He and his wife, Barbara, live in Baltimore, Maryland, and are extremely active in community life. He has served on the Baltimore Jewish Council, on the Board of Beth Israel Synagogue and as Vice President of the Maryland Ballet Company. The Schiners have three grown children, Jodi, Brian, and Jay, all of whom are also active in B'nai B'rith.
