Community Intensive Supervision Program. Alternative to incarceration for serious juvenile offenders. Nine-month comprehensive program. (412) 578-8210.

Operation Weed and Seed. A comprehensive, multi-agency program designed to coordinate the delivery of social services and criminal justice activities. Community-oriented policing units work along side citizens and business in the targeted neighborhood, increasing citizen and police interaction and communication. Amount: \$1,100,000.

Wynnewood

National Night Out. Develops police-community partnerships and community-based programs to empower neighborhoods and to help reduce crime, violence and substance abuse. This program involves over 8,600 communities in all 50 states. Amount: \$150,000.

Doylestown

Bucks County School-Based Juvenile Probation Program. Provides on-site juvenile probation officers to help reduce absenteeism and expulsions among student probationers. Program goals are to improve overall school and community performance and to reduce out-of-home delinquency residential placement. Amount: \$123,284.

Harrisburg

Targeted Outreach. Designed to reduce the number of minorities in the juvenile justice system. Program aims to encourage high-risk minorities to participate in educational, physical and social vocational programs offered by the Boys Club. 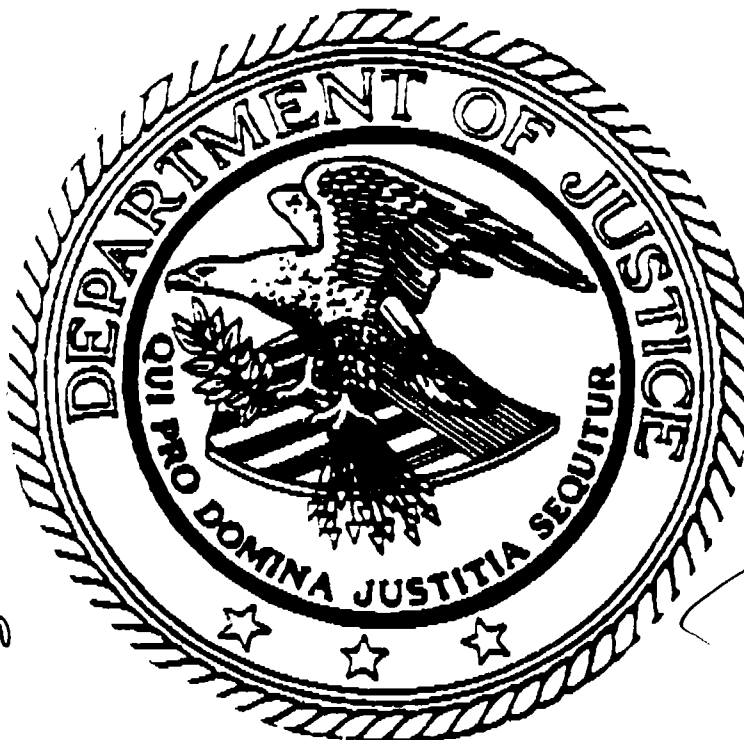
