IT IS HEREBY CERTIFIED THAT

1. The name of the corporation is:

CHILDREN OF GOD RELIEF FUND, INC.

2. The corporation is a corporation as defined in subparagraph (a)(5) of Section 102 (Definitions) of the Not-For-Profit Corporation Law.

3. The purpose or purposes for which the corporation is formed are as follows:

To solicit funds for the aid, assistance, care and support for persons afflicted with AIDS in Kenya, Africa, including but not limited to HIV positive orphans, women with children, but no resources, and AIDS patients themselves.

4. In furtherance of its corporate purposes, the corporation shall have all the general powers enumerated in Section 202 of the Not-For-Profit Corporation Law, together with the power to solicit grants and contributions for the corporate purposes.

5. Nothing herein shall authorize this corporation, directly or indirectly, to engage in or include among its purposes, any of the activities mentioned in Not-For-Profit Corporation Law, Section 404(b)-(v).

6. The corporation shall be a Type B corporation pursuant to section 201 of the Not-For-Profit Corporation Law.

8. Notwithstanding any other provisions of these articles, the corporation is organized exclusively for one or more of the purposes as specified in Section (501)(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, and shall not carry on any activities not permitted to be carried on by a corporation exempt from Federal income tax under IRC Section(501)(c)(3) or corresponding provisions of any subsequent Federal tax laws.

9. No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of any member, trustee, director, officer of the corporation, or any private individual (except that reasonable compensation may be paid for services rendered to or for the corporation), and no member, trustee, officer of the corporation or any private individual shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any of the corporate assets on dissolution of the corporation.

10. No substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be carrying on propaganda, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation (except as otherwise provided by Internal Revenue Code section(501)(h), or participating in, or intervening in (including the publication or distribution of statements), any political campaign on behalf of any candidates for public office.

11. In the event of dissolution, all of the remaining assets and property of the corporation shall after necessary expenses thereof be distributed to another organization exempt under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, or corresponding provisions of any subsequent Federal tax laws, or to the Federal government, or state or local government for a public purposes, subject to an order of a Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of New York.

12. In any taxable year in which the corporation is a private foundation as described in section 509(a) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, the corporation shall distribute its income for said period at such time and manner as not to subject it to tax under section 4942 of the Code and the corporation shall not (a) engage in any act of self-dealing as defined in section 4941(d) of the Code retain any excess business holdings as defined in section 4943(c) of the Code (c) make any investments in such manner as to subject the corporation to tax under section 4944 of the Code or

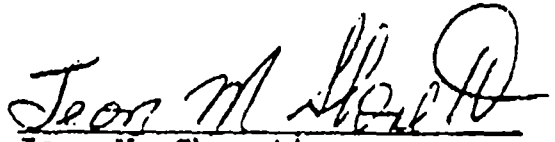
(d) make any taxable expenditures as defined in section 4945(d) of the Code or corresponding provisions of any subsequent Federal tax laws.

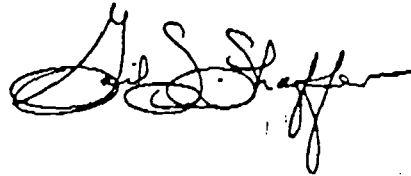

CHILDREN OF GOD RELIEF FUND

BY-LAWS

ARTICLE I

GENERAL

1. The name of the Corporation is the Children of God Relief Fund.
2. The Corporation is registered in New York State as a not for profit corporation.

ARTICLE II

PURPOSE

The purpose for which the Corporation is established is to raise funds to permit the Children of God Relief Institute (COGRI) to accomplish the following:

1. The provision of facilities for accepting and caring for infants and children in distress who are known or suspected to be Human Immuno-deficiency Virus (HIV) Positive.
2. The provision of facilities where the COGRI will strive to maintain an atmosphere of loving and professional care for the infants and children, and to train suitable persons to act as care-givers.
3. To integrate the same facilities with, and assist those of the community at large regarding HIV and Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) education, counseling and guidance/treatment.
4. To receive funding and/or material, resources locally and from abroad to aid and abet any program in its scope.
5. To work in concert with the appropriate Kenyan Governmental Ministries, Departments or Services to effect the overall goal of collaborative efforts to fight Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome in Kenya.

6. To maintain communications with other national and international bodies that have similar interests, for example World Health Organization, World Medical Association, Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome Groups, etc.
7. To employ, engage, initiate and support persons qualified to do research on AIDS related problems , particularly as they relate to the Kenyan situation specifically. This may entail the establishment of a research facility/ laboratory for independent work but in collaboration with other governmental and/or private facilities of the same nature and goal.
8. To employ, engage and develop professional staff on all levels to be responsible for the day to day care of the children as well as some who may want/need to move to other areas of Kenya.
9. To establish and run the hospitals for AIDS, HIV and terminally ill patients.
10. To purchase, lease and erect/construct buildings and properties to be used as hospitals, clinics, homes and all related activities on a non-profit making basis.

ARTICLE III

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

1. Function of the Board of Directors. The affairs of the Corporation will be managed by a Board of Directors which will be responsible for the attainment of its corporate purposes.
2. Salary and Expense. No director shall be paid any compensation for services in such capacity, but may be reimbursed for expenses actually incurred in performance of duties in connection therewith.
3. Composition of the Board of Directors. The initial Board of Directors shall be composed of the following individuals, designated in the Articles of Incorporation; namely,

Patricia Kiefer
William M. O'Reilly

4. The Board of Directors shall be composed of twelve (12) members to be selected at the first meeting of the Board of Directors. Directors shall serve for an initial term of one year. Thereafter, at each annual meeting, or as soon as practicable thereafter, successors shall be selected for terms of one year. Directors will be eligible for reelection. A majority of the duly selected members of the Board of Directors, present and voting, if a quorum thereof, will be sufficient to elect. Directors will hold office until their successors are elected and take office.
5. Vacancies. Any vacancy which occurs on the Board of Directors may be filled for the unexpired term by the remaining directors at an annual or special meeting.
6. Annual Meeting. The Board of Directors shall hold an annual meeting in the month of September each year. The Secretary shall notify each director by mail of each meeting thirty (30) days prior thereto.
7. Special Meetings. Such meeting shall be at the will of the President, or on the request to the President of a majority of the directors. The President, in either event, shall issue a notice in writing to each director, advising of the place and time of the special meeting, fifteen (15) days prior thereto. Said notice shall contain a statement of business to be transacted at such special meeting, and no action will be taken thereat except on matters included in the notice.
8. Quorum. A majority of the duly elected members of the Board of Directors shall constitute a quorum.
9. Proxy. A Director, unable to attend any annual or special meeting, may give his proxy in writing for such meeting to another director, or to a person not a director except that if the proxy is not a director, his participation in the proceedings shall be subject to ratification by the Board. A proxy will be effective only for the meeting relative to which it is executed.
10. Committees. The Board of Directors may, as it may deem appropriate, establish committees, from among its directors or otherwise, to assist it in carrying out designated parts of the activities of the Corporation, and may define the powers of such committees as in each case may be appropriate.

ARTICLE IV

OFFICERS

1. Enumeration, Election, Status. The Board of Directors, at each annual meeting, following the election of directors, shall from its membership, elect for terms of one year, a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. No officer will be paid any compensation for services in such capacity, but may be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred in connection with official duties. Vacancies in any office may be filled for the unexpired term by the Board or by the Executive Committee, subject to ratification through the mails by a majority of the remaining members of the Board.
2. The President. The President presides at meetings of the Board of Directors and of the Executive Committee. Under the supervision of the Board of Directors, he will have general control over the activities of the Corporation and perform all other duties required by these By-laws.
3. Vice President. The Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in the latter's absence and such other duties as may be requested by the President.
4. Secretary. The Secretary will keep minutes of the meetings of the Board of Directors. He/she will have charge of the records of the Corporation, attend to correspondence and perform such other duties as may be required by these By-laws.
5. Treasurer and Fiscal Affairs. The Treasurer will receive and be responsible for all monies of the Corporation under a fiscal policy to be approved by the Board of Directors. He will be responsible for keeping the financial records of the Corporation and will prepare a report for submission to each annual meeting, or whenever requested by the President. He may be required to give bond in a sum fixed by the Board of Directors, the expense of which is to be borne by the Corporation.

The President and another of the elected officers of the Corporation shall sign all contracts, checks, drafts and other instruments of disbursement or evidence of indebtedness, except that the Board of Directors may authorize a single signature on such documents up to a stated monetary limit.

No indebtedness shall be incurred by the Corporation except on the authorization of the Board of Directors.

The Board of Directors shall engage a qualified accountant, or firm of accountants, to establish a fiscal system suitable for the operation of the Corporation, to periodically review the fiscal affairs of the Corporation, and make an annual report to the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE V

FINANCIAL PROVISION

No part of the income of the Corporation shall inure to the benefit of any private individual, and no director, officer or employee shall receive, or be lawfully entitled to receive any pecuniary benefit, profit or compensation of any kind therefrom, except reasonable compensation elsewhere authorized in these By-laws for service rendered in effecting one or more of its purposes.

In event of the liquidation or dissolution of the Corporation, the assets remaining after all debts have been satisfied, shall be conveyed to a corporation qualified for exemption from taxation under the Internal Revenue Code to be used for purposes as nearly as practicable analogous to those for which this Corporation was created.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS OF BY-LAWS

These By-laws may be amended by a majority of the members of the board of Directors, present and voting at any annual or special meeting, if a quorum, provided that notice of intention to seek such change was transmitted by the President to each director, in writing, not less than thirty (30) days prior to said meeting.

The Chairman then stated that it was in order to consider authorizing the Secretary of the Corporation to procure corporate books for the Corporation. Upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, that the Secretary of the Corporation be and she is hereby authorized and directed to procure the necessary and proper corporate books for the Corporation.

The Chairman then stated that the Treasurer should be authorized to pay all fees and expenses incident to and necessary for the organization of the Corporation. After discussion and upon motion duly made, seconded and carried the following resolution was unanimously adapted:

RESOLVED, That the Treasurer be and is he hereby authorized to pay all fees and expenses incident to and necessary for the organization of the Corporation.

The Chairman stated that it was in order to consider adopting resolutions designating Riggs National Bank of Washington D.C., as the institution in which the funds of the Corporation are deposited. On motion duly made, seconded and carried the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Be It Resolved, that Riggs National Bank of Washington D.C., be, and it is hereby designated a depository of this Corporation and that funds so deposited may be withdrawn upon a check, draft, note or order of the Corporation.

Be It Further Resolved, that all checks, drafts, notes or orders drawn against said account be signed by any two of the following:

except that all checks, drafts, notes or orders drawn against said account for \$500.00 or less may be signed by any one of the foregoing, whose signature shall be duly certified to said Bank, and that no checks, drafts, notes or orders shall be valid unless so signed.

Be It Further Resolved, that said Bank is hereby authorized and directed to honor and pay and checks, drafts notes or orders so drawn, whether such checks, drafts, notes or orders be payable to the order of any such person signing and/or countersigning said checks, drafts, notes or orders, or any such persons in their individual capacities or not, and whether such checks, drafts, notes or orders are deposited to the individual credit of the person so signing and/or countersigning said checks, drafts, notes or orders, or to the individual credit of any of the other officers or not. This resolution shall continue in force and the said Bank may consider the facts concerning the holders of said offices, respectively, and their signatures to be and continue as set forth in the certificate of the Secretary, accompanying a copy of this resolution when delivered to said bank or in any similar subsequent certificate, until written notice to the contrary is duly served on said Bank.

There was next a discussion of compensation, if any to be paid to the directors or officers of the Corporation. It was unanimously agreed that for the present that no director or officer of the Corporation should be compensated for serving as such.

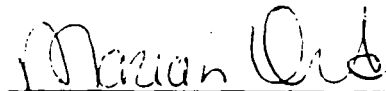

RESOLVED, that the proper officers of the Corporation be and they are hereby authorized to complete, execute and file with the State of New York applications for certificates of authority to transact business therein.

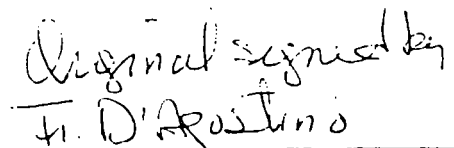
The Chairman stated that it was in order to establish a fiscal year. On motion duly made, seconded and carried the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

1. Nature of operations

The Children of God Relief Fund, Inc. (the Fund) was organized on May 22, 1991, as a not-for-profit corporation in the state of New York. The sole purpose of COGRF (the Fund) is to support the Children of God Institute (COGRI). The Children of God Relief Institute (the Institute) is a related organization that conducts counseling and support activities for mothers and children with the HIV and AIDS virus in Kenya at a Hospice/Orphanage called Nyumbani in Nairobi. The Fund is primarily a fund raising organization for the benefit of the Institute. These financial statements include only the activity of the Fund and do not reflect the operations of the Institute.

2. Summary of significant accounting policies

The significant accounting policies used in the preparation of these financial statements are as follows:

Basis of accounting

These financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Classification of net assets

To identify the observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the Fund, the accounts of the Fund are maintained in two separate classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily and permanently restricted, based on the existence or absence of donor-imposed restrictions.

- Unrestricted net assets represents resources that are not restricted, by donor-imposed stipulations. They are available for support of the Fund's general operations.
- Permanently restricted net assets represent contributions and other inflows of assets whose use by the Fund is limited by

donor-imposed stipulations that neither expire by passage of time nor can be fulfilled and removed by actions of the Fund pursuant to those stipulations.

Cash and cash equivalents

The Fund considers all highly liquid, temporary investments which are readily convertible to cash to be cash equivalents. This includes all debt securities with original maturities of ninety days or less.

Investments

Investments are carried at fair value as determined by an independent market valuation service using the closing prices at the end of the period. Investments in mutual funds are carried at net asset value. Gains and losses realized on disposal of the investments are computed based on average cost.

Revenue recognition

Contributions, whether unrestricted or restricted, are recognized as revenue when received and classified in the appropriate net asset category. Proceeds from the fund-raising events, net of direct benefit expenses paid by the state committees, are recorded in the period in which the event occurs.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities as of December 31, 1996 and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

4. Financial statement display

Effective January 1, 1996, the Fund adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations." SFAS No. 117 required a change in the display of financial statements from those based on fund accounting to a display based on the concept of "net assets".

5. Tax Status

The Fund is exempt from federal income taxes under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and from state income taxes. The Fund has no provision for income taxes since it had no unrelated business income in 1996.

6. Related parties

The Fund transferred a total of \$34,000 to the Institute for the year ended December 31, 1996.

Dear Sandy,

Dr.Hartsock has informed me that you are going to Africa next week. In connection with this visit may I inform you about an important initiative which I am currently working on.

According to UNAIDS prognosis by the year of 2000 there will be 5 mln children infected by their mothers in Africa. It is known that treatment of pregnant women by AZT during the last trimester of pregnancy can significantly reduce the transmission of virus from mother to child. If the international community provides Africa with an adequate amount of AZT we will give geopolitical hope for the population of African continent.

Russia has its own AZT which is in medical practice already for several years. It is 1,5-2 times cheaper than Glaxo-Wellcome AZT («Retrovir»). Russia possesses practically unlimited possibilities to scale up the azidation stage of AZT production technology. This stage is very dangerous because of explosive potential and toxic by-products. These problems have been decided by Russian defense enterprises which are in the process of conversion.

I think Russia and US can collaborate to bring cheaper AZT to Africa. I hope this information will be useful to you during your trip. I also think that collaboration in this area can complement the collaboration on HIV vaccine which we are trying to organize.

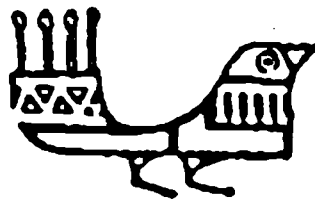

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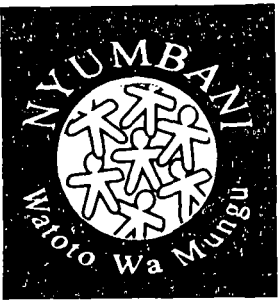

How nice to hear your voice this morning. It was so cheery and full of hope, it just lifted my spirits. While I don't believe in miracles every day, I thank you for the call.

My brother Angelo and Senator DeConcini met with Richard McCall during the summer of 1996. DeConcini later met with Brian Atwood. Both were encouraging by indicating that what NYUMBANI is doing deserves support and surely falls within the guidelines of USAID.

An earlier proposal in 1994 and backed by Senator Patrick Leahy (a fellow grad of St. Michael's in Vermont with Angelo) and DeConcini had met with unsuccessful results.

I was asked by Angelo to try my hand at submitting a new proposal. It took about four weeks and I submitted it to all sorts of people for their approval. I finally got it to Angelo and he presented it to the USAID mission in Kenya. Enclosed please find a copy of the letter we received. It stated that their thrust was with condoms and not for children. It also suggested that we submit the proposal state-side.

A committee of DeConcini, Fr. Bill George, SJ, (of Georgetown University) approached Victor Barnes & the new Division Chief of Office of Health and Nutrition at USAID. We were told that they would look into it.

Later we were encouraged to contact Ms. Sally Shelton Colby who granted us a full review with her staff in her offices. We were asked to submit two other forms to Katherine M. Jones, Chief, Child Survival Division at USAID.

Nyumbani Orphanage is a project of The Children of God Relief Fund, Inc., a 501(c)(3) tax-exempt organization registered in the State of New York as a not-for-profit corporation. Employer Identification Number: 13.3615655. Contributions are tax deductible to the extent allowed by law.

I enclose a copy of those forms: USAID Form 424 (-this contains the October, 1996 proposal) and USAID Form 1550-2, Private Voluntary Organization. Attached is the E-mail I received from Ms. Jones on August 25, 1997.

Sometime in September I received a call from Anthony Haupt who was most pleasant and quite informative. His recommendation is that we should re-apply in Kenya through the Children of God Relief Institute. He said that he would return our proposal.

So that is where we now stand. I really did not know where to proceed until I received your heartening call this morning. (I hope you do not read any pressure in that last comment, please.) It was just so nice to hear from someone who is interested in pursuing our options. Our hope has gone up a few notches.

I stand ready to answer any of your questions by phone or in person, and to help in preparing any other material you suggest.

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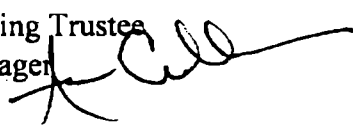

Shamwari sanctuary for abused captive wild animals

Born Free makes a home

By ATHANE MOOLMAN

CONSERVATIONISTS yesterday celebrated the opening of a unique sanctuary for abused captive wild animals in the Eastern Cape.

The Shamwari Born Free Conservation and Education Centre was launched at the popular Shamwari Game Reserve near Paterson.

The event also celebrated another 6 000 hectares of property being added to the existing Shamwari reserve.

Addressing foreign and local media and honoured guests, Virginia McKenna, the former actress and co-founder of the Born Free Foundation said Shamwari chief Adrian Gardiner's vision for the Centre is a sanctuary for exploited animals that would give wild creatures a place where they could end their days in dignity.

"I wish that George Adamson (the real life person who successfully returned Elsa the lion to the wilderness) and my husband, Bill Travers, (who played the role of George in the film Born Free) could be here today to see this centre and what it represents," said Mrs McKenna, who starred with her husband in the legendary 1960s film.

World-renowned conservationist Dr Ian Player, who yesterday declared the Shamwari Born Free centre open, described the move as a landmark

Elsewhere in the reserve, rescued "Spanish" Raffi was resting in the shade after he and his partner Anthea were moved to a new camp set to the Shamwari Born Free Conservation and Education Centre.

"Adrian Gardiner is helping to restore a landscape that has been raped, humiliated and ignored by farmers who destroyed the valley of bushveld for a few seasons of wheat.

"The Xhosa and Bushmen who once roamed this land, must be applauding as they see him (Gardiner) bring their earth back to life.

The Born Free Foundation and Shamwari first joined efforts in March when they co-operated in the extraordinary transfer of two maltreated "Spanish" lions to a tranquil life in the Eastern Cape.

Lions Raffi and Anthea spent five years caged as tourist exhibits above a Spanish island disco bar before being rescued by the foundation and brought "home" to Africa with the help of Shamwari.

Mrs McKenna said the relationship between the two organisations grew through three-way discussions between her son, Born Free Foundation chief executive Will Travers and Shamwari boss Adrian Gardiner.

The result was a joint operation to save animals who are caged and held in appalling conditions.

The facility will be run as a day centre that com-



bines animal rescue, environmental conservation and education and cultural heritage.

Schoolchildren, tourists and other day visitors will be able to see the rescued animals — of which Raffi and Anthea are the first felines — during game drives.

Visitors will also be offered conservation education to understand the importance of animals not only to the well-being of people but to the planet as a whole.

The centre features a colourful display of traditional beadwork from various African tribes.

A traditional arts and crafts programme is planned to be developed with local communities.

The brightly-painted centre on the outskirts of Shamwari reserve also boasts a Born Free display, a sumptuous restaurant and an arts and curio shop.

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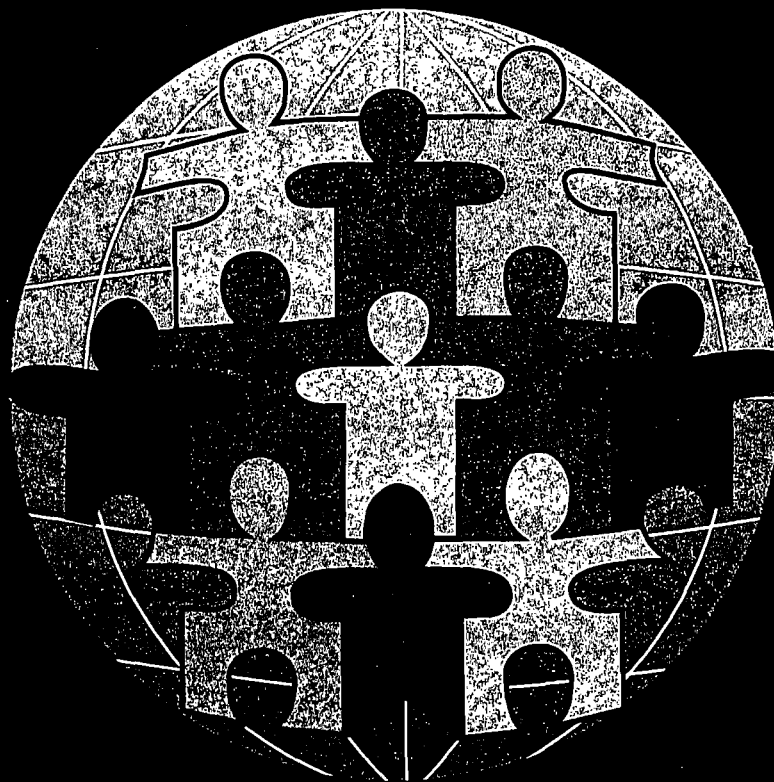
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
