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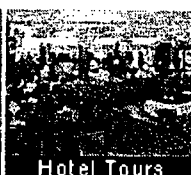
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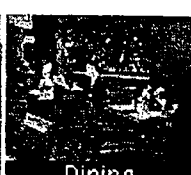

Veronica Gutierrez sent a caller to us to request time on the Wellness agenda. His idea is to create a category of tax-deductible foods and prevention-type programs that are paid for out-of-pocket, but eligible for tax-deductions. He says that he already has successfully approached various legislators and will continue to vet his ideas to governors and policymakers. However, since their reception has been favorable, he thought (and I gather that Veronica agreed) that he should present his ideas to the Commission to possibly add their weight to this policy recommendation.

Since he is a Commissioner-referral, I am sending him to you. HOWEVER. I have told him that the agenda is likely already full and invited him to participate in public comment. Barring that (he is concerned about travel costs), I recommended that he send us his proposal in writing, including a discussion of the details (like, who would decide what foods and programs get to be tax-deductible, what are the more immediate fiscal ramifications on the federal tax programs, how will this be implemented, how would this affect entitlement programs, etc etc). His proposal would be reviewed and submitted to the Commissioner for their consideration.

He seemed happy with that, but will probably call you anyway.
