Thank you for agreeing to speak at the conference: *Should Government Cover Traditional Indian Medicine?* This two-day conference will bring together major federal, state, and tribal stakeholders in governmentally sponsored health care and Indian health care to review the practical and ethical implications of governmental coverage of traditional indigenous medicine (TIM). The meeting will be held in Phoenix, Arizona, on September 7-8, 2001. We are, also, tentatively planning a reception for the evening of September 6, 2001. There are three things you need to send us as soon as possible in the enclosed envelope:

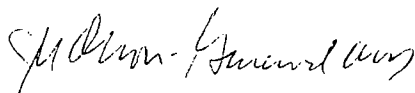
1) a resume or CV if you have not done so already. And please fill out two enclosed forms:

About this conference...

Expert panelists from the Indian Health Service (IHS), Health Care Finance Administration (HCFA), various Medicaid programs, and representatives of different Native American nations and their indigenous healers will discuss the experiences to date in integrating traditional Indian healing into the formal health care system. Speakers will examine the obstacles to Medicaid and IHS reimbursement for these services.

Increasing numbers of the over 550 federally recognized American Indian nations are taking over their own health care system under Public Law 93-638, the Self-Determination and Education Assistance Act. As they assume direct responsibility for their health systems, each tribe is rethinking its components, including a role for their own well-developed health care beliefs and practices. But the absence of conventional information about indigenous health care beliefs and practices confounds policy development for the government-funded health care delivery system.

This conference will bring together HCFA and IHS administrators and Native leaders and healers to consider the work that has been done in this area to identify ethical and practical implications of third party coverage and to consider a coordinated policy about coverage among governmental health care sponsors.
