PRESIDENT CLINTON VICTORIOUS AS HOUSE PASSES ASSAULT WEAPONS BAN

- Standing with the law enforcement community, the vast majority of American citizens, and the national interest, the House of Representatives yesterday voted 216 to 214 to pass Administration-backed legislation banning the future manufacture of semiautomatic assault weapons.
- Led by Rep. Charles Schumer (D-NY), House supporters of the ban were able to reverse momentum against the legislation and produce a victory.
- Also instrumental in persuading House members to support the legislative ban was the persistent leadership of President Clinton and members of his Cabinet, led by Attorney General Reno and Treasury Secretary Bentsen.
- The bipartisan anti-crime vote is a triumph for every American who desires safe streets, and particularly for those who know first-hand the tragedy that semiautomatic assault weapons can cause. Parents who've lost children, individuals who've lost spouses, police officers who've lost partners -- all know that taking assault weapons off of the streets and out of the hands of violent criminals means saving lives.
- The House members who supported this legislation, as President Clinton noted right after the historic vote, "demonstrated extraordinary courage in the face of extraordinary political pressure to walk away."
- As part of a larger, comprehensive Administration anti-crime strategy, the House's action brings the nation closer towards controlling violent crime on America's streets.

HOUSE TO VOTE ON CRITICAL ANTI-CRIME LEGISLATION

- Today, the House votes on a crucial piece of crime control legislation: a ban on semiautomatic assault weapons. A victory in the House today will mean safer streets and saved lives.
- Every year, semiautomatic assault weapons kill children, spouses, parents, and police officers. They are the weapons of choice for violent criminals. Designed for battlefield combat, assault weapons have no place on our streets, in our neighborhoods or on our schoolyards.
- Among the ban's staunchest supporters are law enforcement officials -- men and women who put their lives on the line day in and day out to keep our communities safe. Opponents of the ban cannot expect these brave individuals to risk their lives in the fight against crime, yet deny them the help they desperately need.
- The legislative ban supported by the Administration is carefully crafted to specifically safeguard hunter's rights. In fact, over 650 hunting and recreational guns -- including 60 semiautomatic rifles -- are explicitly exempted from the ban.
- Moreover, not all semiautomatic firearms are covered by the ban; only semiautomatic assault weapons -- weapons designed for military combat -- are prohibited.
- House members must decide today whether to stand with the overwhelming majority of their constituents and the law enforcement community, or to vote the way the gun lobby wants them to vote. Those who choose to stand with the American people and with law enforcement will be making their voices heard in the fight against crime.

Weapons Ban Clears Committee With Unexpected Backing From Hyde

WASHINGTON (AP) Proponents of a ban on assault-style weapons got the unexpected support Thursday of Rep. Henry Hyde, R-Ill., as the House Judiciary Committee approved a measure to prohibit 19 such firearms.

"I can see a lot of danger in their proliferation," Hyde, a senior Republican on the committee, told reporters after he became the sole GOP member voting for the bill that passed 20-15. Two Democrats opposed it. Committee Chairman Jack Brooks of Texas and Rep. Rick Boucher of Virginia.

The full House could vote on it as early as next week, although its primary sponsor, Rep. Charles Schumer, D-N.Y., has said he prefers to wait another week. It could take that long, he said, for President Clinton and others to round up the 15-20 votes still needed to pass the measure.

A Justice Department official said the administration has told the House leadership it would like to have more time, but expects to be ready for a vote at the end of next week.

Brooks wasted no time getting the bill through committee. Schumer's subcommittee passed it just two days earlier.

The Clinton administration is putting on a series of media events to prompt phone calls to Congress supporting the measure.

Attorney General Janet Reno and Treasury Secretary Lloyd Bentsen have played prime roles.

On Thursday, at a firing range to demonstrate the firepower of some of the weapons, they were joined by Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy. The former Mississippi congressman has appeared in a National Rifle Association ad entitled, "I am the NRA," and was the keynote speaker at its 1990 convention, an aide said. The NRA strongly opposes the ban.

The measure would stop the manufacture, sale and new possession of 19 specified semiautomatic assault-style weapons, bar production of copycat models and limit detachable magazines to 10 rounds.

At the same time, it would spare 650 named rifles and shotguns. Banned guns now legally in private hands also would be exempted, although people transferring those weapons to others would have to file a federal form.

The Senate approved a similar measure last November as part of its broader crime bill.

The House deliberately left it out of the crime bill that passed last week.

However, Brooks and key senators do not want to begin the House-Senate conference to resolve differences between the two crime bills without the House voting first on assault-style weapons.

The last House vote on restricting such firearms, in October 1991, lost by 70 votes, 247-177. Espy and Hyde opposed it.

Hyde said he decided Wednesday night to support the ban after reviewing documents detailing numerous recent crimes, including some in Chicago, that involved weapons that would be banned. The information was supplied by Sen. Dianne Feinstein, D-Calif., who wrote the Senate measure.

"I'm sensitive to the right of people to own a weapon," Hyde said. "You have the right to defend yourself, especially in times when law and order seems to be very much under siege. But the proliferation of weapons whose only purpose is to kill a lot of

people in a hurry seems to me not to be justified."

Rep. Bill McCollum, R-Fla., contended that "there is no functional distinction" between the weapons that would be banned and those exempted.

"Criminals today are laughing at what we're doing here," commented Rep. George Gekas, R-Pa., saying they "know they will be able to find ... the banned weapons on the black market."

New York, May 4, 1994In an unusual maneuver yesterday, State Senate Majority Leader Republican Ralph Marino sent an urgent letter to five Republican New York State Congresspeople in Washington asking that they support the federal assault weapon ban. The letter was sent to U.S. Representatives Hamilton Fish, Jr., Benjamin Gilman, Sherwood Boehlert, Jack Quinn and Amory Houghton Jr., all of whom are either undecided.

The letter reads, "I have repeatedly said that a federal ban on these weapons is the only way we can prevent dangerous criminals from using them in criminal activities. In New York State, most of these weapons that are used illegally are brought in from other states. Therefore, a federal ban is the only realistic solution. In addition, we need tougher penalties for criminals who use these and other weapons illegally."

Senator Marino's letter was sent following a meeting with members of New Yorkers for Gun Control, including Ralph Hubbard, also VP of Parents of Murdered Children of New York State and Tina Johnstone, whose husband died of gun injuries.

(Last week, Republican Susan Molinari of New York City announced that she would vote for the assault weapon ban, reversing her position from a previous vote in 1991.)

I write to urge you to support passage of H.R. 4296, the Public Safety and Recreational Firearms Use Protection Act. As the debate sharpens before Thursday's vote, I hope you will consider four key points that powerfully make the case for H.R. 4296.

First, the legislation would not affect our ability to hunt. As the President recently wrote, "The proposal I support specifically safeguards hunters' rights; it explicitly protects more than 650 hunting and recreational rifles from the ban." The bill even includes a grandfather clause to protect owners of existing assault weapons; no American owning one of these weapons will have it taken away.

The legislation is carefully drawn. It would ban 19 particular assault weapons, all of which are semiautomatic, accept detachable magazines, and have at least two of these five features: pistol grips, to allow stable shooting from the hip; folding stocks, which make them easier to conceal; a threaded barrel for attachment of a silencer or military device; a bayonet mount; or grenade launchers. These are not sporting weapons. As you know, I have hunted all my life -- and I qualified as an expert on the range in the military and fired guns on the front lines during World War II. A few days ago, I went to the range and fired the AR 15, one of the 19 guns at issue. I assure you that the AR 15 and the other weapons that would be banned are not for hunting. They are for killing.

Second, criminals understand the purpose of these weapons. As the enclosed advertisement for the Street-sweeper makes clear, these guns are not sold to hunters and sportsmen. Their ability to deliver several rounds per second and to take large magazines of ammunition makes them ideal for violent crime, especially gang warfare and the drive-by shootings and mass murders occurring in restaurants, playgrounds and workplaces around our nation. Although the 19 weapons comprise only 1% of all guns owned in this country, they are used in violent crime 84% of the time. In other words, if more of these guns are produced and distributed, we can expect a disproportionate rise in their use to commit crimes. They are the weapons of choice for violent criminals.

More importantly, when criminals brandish these guns, they outgun our police -- whose weapons necessarily combine safety and accuracy with firepower for the security of our citizens. This point is repeatedly driven home. In San Francisco last summer, a gunman carrying two TEC-9s killed eight people and wounded six others. And five years ago, a gunman wielding an AK-47 slaughtered five elementary school children. And an AK-47 also was used last year to gun down two people outside CIA headquarters. As the attached list of law enforcement organizations supporting the legislation

attests, we must stop arming criminals to the teeth and give our cops a fighting chance to stop crime.

Third, a ban on these 19 assault weapons would make a difference in the fight to stop crime. After we banned the import of certain assault weapons in both 1989 and 1993, as shown in the enclosed graph, their use in crimes relative to the use of guns manufactured domestically dropped considerably. A comprehensive ban on all versions of these deadly 19 weapons, therefore, would have a substantial impact. Critics of the ban say that more police and lengthier prison sentences are the answer -- and they're partially right. That's why the crime bill funds marked increases in community police and prisons. But this funding is only part of the answer -- we also must give our police a fighting chance to do their jobs, and we must stop the flow of weapons of destruction onto our streets.

Fourth, a vote for this legislation makes political sense. Roughly 75% of the American public favors the ban. As the President said yesterday, "No good member of the House or Senate, no Republican or Democrat, no rural legislator should ever fear losing their seat for voting for this bill." The evidence indicates that any opposition to this bill is not grass roots based; it is orchestrated by special interests.

This legislation is a serious, well-balanced approach to a particularly tragic aspect of the American crime problem: the wide availability of a small group of weapons made for killing people. As Members are rapidly recognizing, including, among others, [NAME], the bill is a key part of a comprehensive anti-crime effort. I join the President and the Attorney General in fully supporting its passage in the House and inclusion of comparable language in the conference report on H.R. 3355, the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994.

ATF produced the attached one-pager explaining the situation in Tennessee regarding the Brady Law. It boils down to the following:

Current Tennessee law does not qualify as a Brady alternative because it only bars handgun possession by *violent* felons but allows other felons to possess handguns. Brady requires alternative state systems to disqualify gun ownership by anyone convicted of a felony, consistent with the 1968 Gun Control Act.

Last winter, when it became apparent that Tennessee would not be exempt from Brady, ATF worked with Tennessee state officials to draft legislation that would disqualify all felons and thus be an acceptable state alternative to Brady. That legislation has been passed by the state legislature and awaits the governor's signature. **Once he signs it, and we have no indication that he will not, Tennessee will become exempt from Brady on July 1 of this year.**

TENNESSEE AND THE BRADY LAW

The Brady law amended the Gun Control Act of 1968 (GCA) to provide for, on an interim basis, a 5-day waiting period on the transfer of a handgun by a Federal firearms licensee to a nonlicensee. This interim provision provides for a variety of alternatives to the 5-day waiting period. One of these alternatives is where the law of the State requires that before any licensee completes the transfer of a handgun to a nonlicensee, an authorized government official verify that the information available to such official does not indicate that possession of a handgun by the transferee would be in violation of law (e.g., "point-of-sale"), 18 U.S.C. § 922(a)(1)(D).

Under the GCA, it is unlawful for a person convicted of any crime punishable by a term of imprisonment exceeding 1 year (felony) to possess a firearm. Thus, at a minimum, if the State system did not disqualify persons prohibited by disabling convictions from possessing handguns, the system did not meet the requirements of the Brady alternative system.

After the Brady law was enacted, ATF reviewed the relevant State laws and determined that Tennessee only disqualified persons convicted of violent felonies from possessing handguns, yet allowed persons convicted of other felonies to possess handguns. Tenn. Code Ann. § 39-17-1316(a). Since a person convicted of a nonviolent felony may be prohibited by the GCA from possessing a handgun, the Tennessee system did not meet the requirements of the alternative to the Federal 5-day waiting period.

ATF assisted Tennessee State officials in drafting legislation which would disqualify all felons from obtaining a handgun and would be an acceptable alternative to the Federal 5-day waiting period and background check. This legislation has been approved by the State legislature and is awaiting the Governor's signature. This legislation will place Tennessee within the "point-of-sale" alternative of the Brady law. It has an effective date of July 1, 1994.

Semiautomatic assault weapons are the "weapons of choice for drug dealers, gangs, and terrorists," wrote the President, "[a]nd every year they kill children and police officers, mothers and fathers."

- "I know the difference between a firearm used for hunting and target shooting and a weapon designed to kill people," the President wrote, who himself has been a hunter since he was 12 years old. Semiautomatic assault weapons "have no place on a deer hunt, in a duck blind, or on a target range -- and they certainly don't belong on our streets, in our neighborhoods or on our schoolyards."
- The Administration-supported legislative ban specifically safeguards hunters' rights. Over 650 hunting and recreational guns are explicitly exempted from the ban.
- Moreover, not all semiautomatic firearms are covered by the ban; only semiautomatic assault weapons -- weapons designed for military combat on the battlefields of war -- are prohibited. Hunters, wrote President Clinton, "know the difference between a hunting rifle and weapon that was designed for the battlefield," and he urged hunters to make that difference known to members of Congress.

Slaughter: Ban assault weapons

Rep. Louise M. Slaughter today joined police and medical officials to make a last-minute pitch for banning assault-style weapons.

"These weapons were taken from arrests in Rochester, N.Y.," Slaughter said during a news conference in the emergency room at Strong Memorial Hospital. Six weapons that would be banned under a proposed amendment to House legislation were displayed nearby on a gurney.

"This is not a situation where I will sit around the Congress of the United States

and do nothing," Slaughter said.

A vote could come as early as Thursday on a crime bill in the House. The Senate has already approved a version of the bill that includes a ban on certain assault-style weapons. Slaughter said supporters of a similar ban in the House are about 10 to 15 votes short.

Slaughter was scheduled to meet with President Clinton and congressional leaders later today to plan strategy. Clinton has stepped up pressure for the bill recently.

Slaughter is supporting an amendment that would ban the production of

19 different types of weapons and so-called "copycat" versions of those guns. Those guns already in circulation would be exempted.

She said 670 sporting guns also would be specifically exempted.

The congresswoman and police and medical officials acknowledged that crime incidents involving assault-style weapons capable of spraying bullets are relatively few in the Rochester area.

Van White, special counsel to the mayor on crime and violence initiatives, said that while the banned weapons only make up about 0.5 percent of the total

guns available, they represent 9 percent of firearms used in crimes.

"Clearly it's not a major problem yet," he said. "But as our national representative, the congresswoman has to be concerned about what could get here."

Acting Rochester Police Chief Thomas Conroy also voiced support.

"I've been a lifelong hunter, but I can't think of a thing I'd hunt with assault weapons," Conroy said.

Slaughter said she believes the bill strikes an appropriate balance between protecting the interests of gun owners and preventing crime.

THE MESSAGE FROM AMERICA: BANNING SEMIAUTOMATIC ASSAULT WEAPONS MEANS SAVING LIVES

- The overwhelming majority of Americans supports a legislative ban on semiautomatic assault weapons. Why? Because a ban will save lives, pure and simple. It will take weapons designed for military combat off the streets and out of the hands of violent criminals. In nearly every part of America, the evidence is clear:
 - * A legislative ban would prohibit the Springfield M1-A1 assault rifle -- one of the weapons used by two men last Thursday in a gun battle following a bank robbery in Wisconsin. The gun battle resulted in the murder of a Waukesha, Wisconsin police officer.
 - * The ban would also outlaw the AK-47 -- the weapon chosen by four drug traffickers who engaged in a gun battle with Federal agents outside their drug manufacturing site in Pushmataha County, Oklahoma in 1990.
 - * Also prohibited would be the Intratec TEC-22 and semiautomatic assault pistols manufactured by Norinco -- weapons used by six young men last year to rob seven Ohio banks in six months.
 - * Had a legislative ban been in place in December, 1992, it might have saved the life of a teacher at Atlantic Shores Christian School. There, a student, using a Cobray M-11/9 semiautomatic assault pistol, went on a killing spree, murdering one of his teachers and seriously wounding another.
- Critics are quick to argue that semiautomatic assault weapons represent less than 1 percent of privately-owned firearms. Yet these same assault weapons account for 8 percent of the firearms traced to criminal activities -- a number which has been on the rise in recent years. As the weapon of choice for violent criminals, assault weapons make up a disproportionately high number of crime-related firearms.
- We already know that when the Bush Administration banned the importation of certain assault weapons, the number of imported assault weapons traced to crime declined by 45% in the first year, while the number of domestic assault weapons traced to crime remained the same. We can achieve the same dramatic impact on the number of domestically manufactured assault weapons traced to criminal activity by passing the legislative ban.
