VP Labor Announcements
Wednesday, February 19, 1997

OVERVIEW

Yesterday the Vice President met with the Executive Council of the AFL-CIO and made several pledges on behalf of the administration. These pledges include:

Restatement of past veto threats. He restated the President's commitment to veto any bill that undermines the collective bargaining process or permits company unions filled with employers' hand-picked representatives. He also reiterated last year's veto threats on any attempt to repeal Davis-Bacon or the Service Contract Act, or any legislation that guts OSHA or MSHA.

Seek Federal Procurement changes. Additionally, the Vice President announced that we would seek amendments to the federal procurement regulations to ensure that companies who do business with the federal government have a satisfactory labor record and employment practices and policies.

Specifically the proposed procurement changes would:

- 1) the government will not reimburse for costs incurred for anti-union expenses incurred by a federal contractor like trying to persuade employees not to unionize.
- 2) stop reimbursement to contractors for costs incurred to defend against unfair labor practice allegations that are in litigation.
- 3) allow government contracting officers to consider a company's labor record when evaluating a company before it issues a contract.

Executive Order on project labor agreements. The Vice President also announced that President Clinton will issue an Executive Order that encourages federal agencies to consider using project labor agreements for any construction contracts they manage.

Comp-Time veto threat. We believe strongly that there should be a link between expanding Family and Medical Leave Act and any flextime legislation that Congress considers. Any flextime proposal must address our principles of choice for employees, real protection against employer abuse, and preservation of basic worker rights. The Vice President announced that President Clinton will veto any comp-time bill that does not meet our principles. More specifically, he said that the President will not sign any legislation that obliterates the principal of time-and-a-half for overtime or that destroys the 40 hour work week.

1. Propose amendments to federal procurement regulations.

Federal law provides that the government should maintain a position of neutrality in labor disputes between unions and federal contractors. Nevertheless, under current federal contracting policies, contractors may be reimbursed for the costs of resisting unionization efforts and litigating against unfair labor practice charges, and remain eligible to receive new contracts.

Here are the changes that we're going to propose to fix this:

- a. Amend the FAR to cease reimbursement to contractors for costs incurred to defend against unfair labor practice allegations that are in litigation.**

The Federal Acquisition Regulations (FAR) currently do not permit federal contractors to be reimbursed for the costs of defending criminal and certain civil proceedings brought by the government, nor for penalties resulting from those proceedings. In the case of civil proceedings, reimbursement is disallowed, however, only where a monetary penalty could have been imposed. Since the National Labor Relations Act does not include monetary penalties, the current regulations have often been construed to permit reimbursement of defense costs associated with unfair labor practice proceedings initiated by the General Counsel of the NLRB.

Proposal: Amend the FAR to make clear that any and all costs relating to defending unfair labor practice charges and complaints brought by the NLRB General Counsel are not allowable, both in evaluating bids for fixed price contracts as well as reimbursement for cost reimbursement contracts.

Taxpayers' dollars should not be used to "tilt the playing field" in favor of employers against unions and employees. Eliminating this reimbursement will bring treatment of NLRB litigation costs in line with other kinds of litigation costs.

- b. Amend the FAR to cease reimbursement for costs incurred to try to persuade employees not to unionize.**

The FAR currently provides that costs incurred by a contractor in maintaining satisfactory labor relations between the contractor and its employees, including costs of shop stewards, labor management committees, employee publications, and other related activities, are allowable costs. Under this provision, contractors have sought and been reimbursed for activities that undermine rather than promote satisfactory labor relations. On occasion, the costs that are being paid for by the taxpayers are for persistent anti-union organizing activity.

Proposal: Amend the FAR to provide that contractor costs incurred for activities related to influencing employees respecting unionization are specifically unallowable.

Taxpayers should not be subsidizing an employer's efforts to defeat union organizing activities when it is clear that these activities are not designed, and do not have the effect of, "maintaining satisfactory labor relations." A number of other statutes explicitly prohibit the use of government funds to promote, assist, or deter union organizing activities, such as the Job Training Partnership Act, the National Community Service Act, Head Start, and Medicare. Accordingly, there is precedent for this kind of provision. Auditors with responsibilities in these other statutory areas have had to determine whether an employer's labor relations costs were or were not allowable, so it can be done.

- c. **Amend the FAR to allow government contracting officers to consider, when deciding whether a contractor is a "responsible" contractor (a term of art under the existing FAR), the bidder's record of labor and employment policies and practices.**

The FAR provides that a prospective government contractor must be found to be a "responsible contractor" before being awarded a government contract. "Responsibility" requires that a prospective contractor be capable of performing the contract, that it has a satisfactory performance record, and that it has satisfactory "integrity and business ethics".

The concern has been raised that, although violations of the NLRA and other laws may become grounds for non-responsibility determinations under the FAR, more commonly, a contractor has no such finally adjudicated violations, and there are instead pending charges -- sometimes many of them -- that will take time to wend their way through the administrative process at the NLRB, the EEOC or through the courts. Sometimes the allegations are never adjudicated; for example, most unfair labor practice complaints are ultimately settled. Absent an actual civil violation, agencies will not find a contractor non-responsible. (This corresponds to the standard applied by procuring agencies in other areas of law; civil complaints in any area virtually never are grounds for non-responsibility determinations, and the very few known examples of civil complaints serving as grounds for such determinations involve civil complaints before courts rather than administrative agencies.)

Proposal: Add to the FAR language indicating that the responsibility determination must take into account whether the bidder has a "satisfactory record of labor and employment policies and practices". Make labor relations and employment practices and policies along with other considerations such as whether the contractor has ever engaged in income tax evasion or has shown evidence of ties to organized crime part of the business ethics and integrity test. Additionally, make labor relations and employment practices and policies part of the capability test.

The existing FAR already allows contracting officers to weigh the bidder's "business ethics", its "integrity" and its "capability" to perform the contract.

Labor relations and employment conditions are an equally important and appropriate consideration, and the Administration ought to say so clearly in the FAR in a meaningful way, which argues for the formulation favored by the AFL-CIO, rather than the alternative offered by OFPP.

Litigation Risk: Justice advises us that the amendment is not, of course, risk free, but there are good arguments in support of it, even in light of the striker replacement lawsuit. For example, (1) the proposed amendment, unlike striker replacement, would not bar any contractor from being awarded a government contract, rather the contracting officer would be given the authority to take labor relations into account in making a responsibility determination; (2) the amendment addresses conduct under a variety of federal statutes -- OSHA, Employment Discrimination, and other employment statutes -- and is therefore not seeking to displace the NLRA, but rather to ensure compliance with existing federal statutes and regulations; (3) the concepts of "responsible contractor" and "business ethics" and "capability" are already in the regulations and the amendment simply amplifies the meaning of these concepts; and (4) the proposed amendments address conduct, if shown to have occurred, that Congress has determined by statute to be unlawful or improper, unlike striker replacement where legislative efforts failed.

1. **Executive order encouraging the use of project labor agreements**

Project labor agreements, also known as "pre-hire agreements," are specially negotiated agreements between a project owner or construction manager and one or more labor organizations. The agreements are reached at the outset of a project in order to ensure efficient, timely and quality work; establish fair and consistent labor standards and work rules; supply a skilled, experienced and highly competent workforce; and assure stable labor-management relations throughout the term of the project. These agreements have long been used for public and private construction projects that involve a large volume of work, extend over a substantial period of time, include a substantial number of contractors, and entail substantial costs. It is well established that these agreements are effective and may be lawfully used in both the private and public sector for construction industry projects.

Position: Issue an Executive Order that directs Executive departments and agencies authorized to implement or fund a project for the construction of a federal facility to determine on a project-by-project basis whether a project labor agreement will promote labor-management stability; advance the public interest in economical, efficient, quality and time project performance; and assist project compliance with applicable legal requirements governing health and safety, equal employment opportunity, and labor standards. **The Executive Order would not require the use of a project labor agreement on any particular project.**

Project labor agreements are useful and lawful, but federal agencies may not be aware of their availability and have not been using them in a significant way.

Issuing an Executive Order would make clear that federal contracting agencies have this authority and should consider using such agreements in appropriate circumstances.

2. Standing up for flex time principles and supporting expansion of the FMLA

The two comp time bills currently being considered on the Hill -- both Republican-sponsored -- fail to address FMLA expansion, and provide fewer guarantees of employee choice and fewer protections against potential abuse than your flex time bill, which was sent to Congress last September.

Specifically, the bills do not exclude vulnerable workers; do not include special protections for workers whose employers go bankrupt; do not guarantee real choice for employees; among other shortcomings. The Ashcroft comp time bill in particular has provisions that would effectively eliminate the 40-hour week. The labor movement strongly opposes the Republican comp time bills, and finds these Ashcroft provisions to be particularly offensive.

With respect to FMLA, Democrats in both houses have introduced bills to expand the current law. Several bills are consistent with the Administration's proposal to expand FMLA for an additional 24 hours for the purposes of routine medical care for children and elderly parents or school related activities. Other Democratic bills would lower the threshold of FMLA applicability from 50 to 25 employees, a provision that was not included in your bill. Predictably, while most Republicans oppose FMLA expansion, the bills have support from women's groups and the labor movement. Small businesses, including some represented on your Conference on Small Business, have concerns about lowering the threshold for applicability. The Democratic legislative strategy is to try to add FMLA expansion to the Republican bills while criticizing their comp time components.

In light of this strategy, the labor movement has urged that the Administration threaten to veto any bill that does not (1) link FMLA expansion and flex time, and (2) improve the comp time provisions to provide real choice and real protections for employees (as in your flex time bill).

Everyone on the economic team and inside the White House believe that you should propose your flex-time bill linked with FMLA expansion. Everyone also agrees that you should give a clear veto threat to any comp-time or flex-time that does not meet your principles -- which center around ensuring true employee choice and preventing coercion. The principles for an acceptable flex time bill would be the following:

- **Real guarantees of employee choice to earn and use their flex time.**

The underlying issues are:

- allow employees to use flex time unless it would cause the employer “substantial and grievous injury”
- limit employers’ ability to cash out employees’ flex time

● **Real protection for employees against potential employer abuse**

The underlying issues are:

- exclusions for the most vulnerable workers
- special protections for workers whose employers go bankrupt or shut down unexpectedly
- strong remedies for violations

ISSUE FOR DECISION:

The sole issue for you to decide is whether or not you should issue a veto threat to any bill that does not include FMLA expansion.

The NEC weighed three options and discussed them at length:

Option 1: Threaten to veto even any flex-time bill if it does not include FMLA expansion.

Option 2: Threaten to veto any comp-time that does not meet your principles, but not tie your veto threat to inclusion of FMLA expansion.

Option 3: Threaten to veto any comp-time bill that does not meet your principles, but make expanding family leave as a principle.

Position: The President decided that Option 2 was the right approach.

Pros:

- Flex-time is popular and affects tens of millions of workers and we should not limit our ability to sign it because FMLA expansion was not included.

3. Position on Beck legislation aimed at limiting the use of union dues in political activity

The Republicans in Congress have made clear that they will try to attach a "Beck provision" to some piece of legislation that you want to sign. This provision (named after a Supreme Court case) would prevent a union from using compulsory dues for political purposes unless a union member specifically authorizes such use. It goes much further than current law, which allows a union to use dues for political activity except when a union member specifically objects and demands reimbursement. Unions correctly believe that the Republican Beck provision (there may be a Democratic version that simply codifies current law) would gravely interfere with their political activity. They would like the President to threaten a veto of such legislation.

Position: State strong opposition to Beck legislation, no matter what it is attached to, but refrain from making a veto threat. There seemed to be unanimity that this was the better approach. It will make clear your vehement opposition to this legislation and will fortify Congressional Democrats in trying to defeat it. It will not, however, back you into a corner in the event Republicans succeed in attaching the Beck provision to some essential bill -- whether the campaign finance bill or otherwise.

4. Restating last year's veto threats on (i) TEAM legislation (ii) Davis-Bacon legislation and (iii) legislation to weaken OSHA.

Last year, you indicated you would veto the TEAM bill and the other two legislative proposals. It is proposed that the Vice President would restate your position in Los Angeles, with language that leaves room for improvements in TEAM legislation that you may conclude somewhere down the road that you may wish to sign.

5. Welfare reform and minimum wage -- no announcement

The AFL-CIO will press the Vice President to take a position on whether worker protection statutes -- particularly the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) -- apply to welfare recipients participating in work activities under the new welfare law. Bruce Reed and Ken Apfel of OMB have been running an interagency process (involving DOL, HHS, USDA, and others) to hammer out an answer to this question. The trick is to figure out how to apply the minimum wage law to workfare participants without imposing large new costs on states. Bruce and Ken are confident that a solution can be worked out that goes a fair way toward satisfying the unions, yet does not upset many governors. But they are a few weeks away from presenting this proposed solution to you. And everyone seems to agree that if the Vice President announces an Administration position favorable to the unions at the Council meeting, both the governors and the Congress could react very negatively. There is a danger that such an announcement would make a complex and studied welfare implementation decision look like a

mere gift to the unions.

Position: There was consensus that it would be best if the Vice President did not raise the minimum wage issue at the Council meeting. Nevertheless, members of the Vice President's staff could give John Sweeney some private assurances that the Administration will soon put out its position and that the key questions -- most notably, whether workfare participants count as "employees" for purposes of the minimum wage law -- will come out his way. When asked about the issue, the Vice President should make a strong statement of principle that workers shouldn't be paid a subminimum wage, whether or not they come off the welfare rolls. But he should also be careful to note that the Administration is still in the process of developing its final positions on the complex issues arising from the intersection of the labor laws and welfare law.

This approach will not fully satisfy members of the AFL Council, who would prefer a clear and public statement of the Administration's position at or prior to the Council meeting, but it will minimize the likelihood of a backlash from governors and/or Congress, by giving the Administration time to refine its position so as to make it more palatable to the states and by issuing the position in a non-political setting.



Chinese government bank made substantial transfers of funds to Trie

A Justice Department-FBI task force probing foreign campaign donations to the Democratic Party has focused on wire transfers through a New York branch of the Bank of China to an Arkansas businessman and longtime friend of President Clinton's.

Federal law enforcement sources yesterday confirmed that investigators, trying to determine if Beijing steered funds to U.S. political candidates, have targeted a series of wire transfers to Charles Yah Lin Trie, whose \$640,000 in questionable contributions to the president's legal-defense fund was returned last year.

The law enforcement sources described the transfers as "substantial." The Wall Street Journal, which first reported the existence of the transfers yesterday, said government investigators reported they were in increments of \$50,000 and \$100,000 and occurred in 1995 and 1996.

It was during that period when Mr. Trie, a former Little Rock restaurateur who befriended Mr. Clinton when he was governor of Arkansas, was significantly involved in fund raising for the president and the Democratic Party.

The Democratic National Committee has since returned \$187,000 he personally contributed and

plans to return another \$458,000 he helped raise from others. The DNC said the donations appear to have had foreign sources, which would make them illegal.

Mr. Trie, who now runs Daihatsu International Trading Co. out of Little Rock, reportedly is in Asia and unavailable for comment. His lawyer, Reid H. Weingarten, did not return calls for comment, but has denied any wrongdoing by his client.

The Chinese government, through its embassy in Washington, also has denied any wrongdoing.

The Bank of China is owned by the Chinese government.

Thomas Fung, assistant general manager at the New York branch of the Bank of China, yesterday said Mr. Trie was not a bank customer. He noted that the bank "handles thousands of wire transfers every day" and had no information about any involving Mr. Trie.

"I am not in possession of that information and am not sure how to find it through a computer check without some specific dates of when they supposedly occurred," he said, adding that federal authorities had not been in contact with bank officials about the transfers.

Michael Cardozo, executive director of the president's legal-defense fund, said he returned the Trie donations after his staff found

similar handwriting on different checks and sequentially numbered money orders from people in different cities.

The legal-defense fund was created in 1994 to raise money for the Clintons' legal bills in the White-water probe and a pending civil lawsuit on charges of sexual misconduct against Mr. Clinton by former Arkansas state employee Paula Corbin Jones.

Mr. Trie's ties to questionable campaign and legal-defense funds and to numerous and often-unexplained White House visits have thrust him into the spotlight and cast him as a focus of the task force probe.

It was Mr. Trie who took Chinese arms dealer Wang Jun in February 1996 to a White House "coffee," where the two men — along with other DNC fund-raisers — met with the president.

Mr. Wang, a former officer in the People's Liberation Army and chairman of Poly Technologies, was identified last year by the U.S. Customs Service as the source of 2,000 AK-47 automatic weapons delivered to drug lords and gangs operating in the United States.

Mr. Trie, in a letter to the president, also took issue with Mr. Clinton's decision to send U.S. aircraft carriers through the Taiwan Strait during a Chinese-Taiwanese crisis last year.

White House nears Senate ratification of treaty banning chemical weapons

After months of wrangling with Republicans, the White House is now within reach of winning Senate ratification of an international treaty banning chemical weapons, a senior administration official said yesterday.

John Holum, director of the Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, said he was hopeful the Senate would schedule debate and a vote on the Chemical Weapons Convention before April 29, when it takes effect regardless of U.S. action.

The treaty bans the develop-

ment, production and use of all kinds of chemical arms.

The April 29 deadline is important, Mr. Holum said, because failure to become a party to the treaty by that date would preclude the United States from participating in the inspection teams that will be looking for violators in the field.

Mr. Holum, speaking with reporters in a telephone news conference, expressed relief that Republican Sen. Jesse Helms of North Carolina, chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and a leading critic of the treaty, had agreed to hold a hear-

ing on it.

Mr. Helms announced last week after meeting with Secretary of State Madeleine Albright that he planned to hold the hearing on April 9. No date has been set for a vote by the full Senate, but Mr. Holum sounded hopeful.

"We're clearly within reach of a favorable vote," he said.

Senate opponents argue that the treaty is unverifiable and would contribute to a false sense of security about the threat abroad from chemical weapons. So far, 160 nations have signed the treaty and about 70 have ratified it.

AFL-CIO targets 19 House members

Early ad effort puzzles lawmakers

Congress, which has been criticized for not doing much of anything this year, apparently has done enough to irk the AFL-CIO, which is running campaign-style ads in 19 congressional districts held mostly by Republicans.

The country's largest labor organization began airing the TV and radio ads on Monday, pressing lawmakers to end corporate tax breaks and support President Clinton's plan to spend more money on school construction.

The AFL-CIO ads have perplexed Republicans, who note that Congress has yet to vote on either issue.

"It's a very bizarre turn of events," said Rep. Charles Bass of New Hampshire, who won his race last year even though the AFL-CIO spent \$485,000 to try to oust him. The labor group again is targeting him.

"I've never voted on these issues," Mr. Bass said. "If this is the way the unions spend their members' money, I think those employees are going to be fed up. I'm just glad to see they're wasting their money early this time."

AFL-CIO President John Sweeney acknowledged the approach is different.

"Right now, we sense what some people call a vacuum in Congress," he said. "It's ... a status quo that really favors corporate special interests and works against working families."

The ads target 12 Republicans and seven Democrats. Six of the Democrats are members of the conservative "Blue Dog" coalition that irritated union chiefs by supporting a Republican-led bill that would let workers take time off instead of overtime pay.

The ads purport that school construction suffers because tax laws let U.S. companies reduce liability for income earned abroad.

One of the GOP House members targeted — Rep. Todd Tiahrt of Kansas, who won a brutal race last year — said the ads caught him "totally by surprise."

Mr. Tiahrt said he was working in his district, talking to FBI agents about violent crime, when he got word the ads were running.

"I spent the rest of my day doing television interviews. It totally distracts me from the job that I was

hired to do," said Mr. Tiahrt, who was the focus of negative union ads in 1996.

"They are very directly saying that I'm turning my back on children to send our jobs overseas," he said. "Here we are barely getting over the last election. Is it my job to run for office all the time?"

He is planning a fund-raiser to counter the damage. "I just can't take a bath from an interest group coming in," he said.

The ads show a decaying school building and a young mother complaining, "Instead of spending our money to fix America's schools, Washington gives it away in special tax breaks."

The ads target lawmakers who won their seats by slim margins in 1996 and may be key swing votes, said Peggy Taylor, the AFL-CIO's legislative affairs director.

In last year's campaign, unions spent at least \$35 million attacking Republicans as destroyers of Medicare, a charge the GOP called false and sensational.

Former GOP presidential candidate Bob Dole also complained about the union ads throughout the campaign, saying they particularly hurt his campaign in Florida.

AFL-CIO officials insisted those campaign ads were designed to hold lawmakers accountable for their votes on the minimum wage, education and Medicare.

Corporate Special Interests Determine Outcome of 1996 Elections

New Report Cites Need For Public Financing of Congressional Races

Washington - Contributions by corporate special interests to Congressional candidates were decisive in determining the outcome of key 1996 House and Senate races, according to a new report released today by Citizen Action, the nation's largest independent watchdog group.

According to the report, *It's The Money: Campaign Contributions and the 1996 Elections*, Republicans were able to keep control of Congress not only because they raised \$20 million more than their Democratic counterparts, but because they raised significantly more money in strategic battleground races -- maintaining the seats of most freshmen incumbents and obtaining a net gain in open seat races. The report is based on filings with the Federal Election Commission through November 25, 1996.

Overall, corporate special interest PACs and large individual donors poured \$459 million into House and Senate campaigns giving Republican candidates \$285 million (62%) and Democratic candidates \$174 million (38%).

"This report confirms once again what most Americans believe -- that, more and more, elections are determined by the highest bidders," said Ira Arlook, Citizen Action Executive Director. "Clearly, raising more money than your opponent is the best ticket to election night victory. With the average voter becoming less important than big contributors, our democracy is under siege. It is time to put voters back in the driver's seat. It is time to tell Congress we need a fair system of public financing of Congressional elections," declared Arlook.

According to the report, money made the biggest difference in the most closely contested House races. In races considered "marginal," by various political experts (Charles Cook, Stuart Rothenberg, Politics Now, etc.) prior to the elections, Republicans won when they had an overwhelming money advantage and lost when there was rough parity with their Democratic opponents. In those districts, which were similar in their demographics, prior partisan voting, and

where the candidates had the same sharp differences on the important issues, the key component between victory and defeat was money.

In the closest races won by Republicans, money from corporate special interests and money from Republican campaign committees in the last crucial weeks of the campaign, helped seal the Republican's majority in the House. Thus, in the 10 closest races won by Democratic candidates where the margin of victory was *less* than 3% (except in the two Texas run-off elections), the Democrats raised on average \$94,000 less than their Republican opponents. On the other hand, in the 10 closest races won by Republican candidates where the margin of victory was less than 2%, the Republicans raised an average of \$372,000 (56%) more than their Democratic opponents.

Corporate special interest PACs contributed over \$139 million to House and Senate candidates (\$97.8 million to Republicans and \$41.4 million to Democrats) during the 1995-1996 election cycle, 65% of the \$215.6 million contributed by all PACs to all candidates. Corporate special interest campaign contributions were three times the \$46.3 million contributed by labor PACs which gave \$42.6 million to Democrats and \$3.7 million to Republicans.

Large individual donors contributed \$320 million to Republican and Democratic congressional candidates -- \$187 million (59%) to Republicans and \$132 million (41%) to Democrats. Of the \$144 million contributed to Senate races, Republican candidates received \$88 million (61%) while Democrats received \$56 million (49%). Of the \$176 million contributed to House candidates, Republicans collected \$100 million (57%), while Democrats collected \$76 million (43%).

A preliminary analysis of large donor contributions which has identified the interest of approximately 20% of the donors shows donors affiliated with corporate interests gave \$72.6 million to House and Senate candidates, of which 60% was contributed to Republican candidates. Donors affiliated with labor interests gave a mere \$42,000 (0.06% of the total contributed by donors affiliated with corporate interests) of which 29% was contributed to Republicans.

"When money rather than issues determines who wins and who loses and election, then something is very wrong with the system," said Arlook. The American people are fed up with a system that rewards big contributors at the expense of average citizens. This report provides ample evidence that Congress must completely overhaul the existing dysfunctional system of financing election campaigns that are so dependent on corporate special interests," concluded Arlook.

Of all the money contributed and spent by the various interests on the 1996 elections (Presidential and Congressional), the top ten contributed over \$300 million in campaign and soft money. The top ten were: Republican Party PACs with \$53.8 million; banks, securities and financial interests with \$48.1 million; Democratic Party PACs with \$43.4 million; health industry interests with \$39.2 million; lawyers and lobbyists with \$37.3 million; farming and agricultural interests with \$20.4 million; communications and electronics interests with \$17.9 million; transportation interests with \$17 million; energy and natural resource interests with \$16.5 million; and single issue and ideological interests with \$15.5 million.

It's The Money: Campaign Contributions in the 1996 Election

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The 1996 elections once again demonstrated that money is key in American politics. According to post-election reports filed by candidates with the Federal Election Commission, candidates in both House and Senate races who raised more money than their opponents won in 92% of the contests. The phenomenon clearly benefits incumbents who generally are outspent only when they face an independently wealthy, self-financed candidate. This year, it was a major factor in helping Republicans maintain control of the House of Representatives, since Republican candidates running in key strategic races and toss-up races were able to raise more money than their Democratic opponents. Perhaps most troubling, however, is the fact that the bulk of the money used to finance Congressional victories comes from groups and wealthy individuals who usually expect something from Congress in return.

The House

According to the post-election FEC reports, House candidates who raised less money than their opponents won in just 37 out of 435 races, giving the larger spenders a startling 92% success rate. It was also surprising how few of the House contests could truly be called competitive from a fundraising standpoint. In all but 48 districts across the country, one candidate outspent the other by more than 25%.

The clearest beneficiaries of this trend were incumbents. Incumbents were reelected in 302 out of 323 House districts and raised more than opponents in 291 of these races. Moreover in cases where the incumbents won, they raised more than three times as much as their opponents. Successful incumbents raised an average of \$761,000, while their opponents raised an average of \$221,000. Just 21 incumbents were beaten during 1996, and in almost half of these races they were defeated at least in part because the challenger raised more than the incumbent. These were statistically the highest spending races and often featured challengers willing to commit huge amounts of personal resources: the average successful challenger spent \$1,051,000, just slightly less than the average unsuccessful incumbent, who spent an average of \$1,100,000. In twelve of these races, candidates from the two major parties raised an average of \$2 million combined.

This pattern also apparently helped the Republican party maintain a narrow control of the House of Representatives. In three categories of races that observers identified as key to determining control of the House of Representatives, Republican candidates either posted large spending advantages or matched their Democratic opponents. For example, in districts defended by Republican freshmen elected in 1994, Republican candidates spent nearly twice as much as their Democratic opponents. Republican candidates also spent an average of 40% more than Democratic candidates in 27 open seat contests where the Republican candidate won. Finally, Republicans committed substantial resources to the races labeled "toss-ups." Republican candidates spent an average of over

It's The Money: Campaign Contributions in the 1996 Election

Based on a comprehensive analysis of contributions to the 1996 election campaigns of candidates for the House and Senate, it is clear that money plays an ever-increasing role in determining the outcome of elections. While issues and demographics continue to be important, the combination of incumbency and a large campaign treasury have become the most important determinants of electoral success. The 1996 campaigns for seats in the U.S. Senate and U.S. House of Representatives set another record for the amount of money raised and spent by all candidates. While the following analysis examines the sources of campaign contributions, it also suggests that House Republicans held onto a slim House majority because of candidates who were able to maintain a huge fundraising advantage in the closest races.

The huge amounts of money raised by candidates and the political obligations such contributions impose on the victors has led to a deterioration of representative democracy. A greater number of our elected representatives have become more responsive to the economic interests of their contributors than the interests and needs of their constituents. This, in turn, has led to public cynicism and a call for the complete overhaul of the current system of financing America's Congressional campaigns.

The House of Representatives

The phrase "Money Wins" has become a distressingly accurate description of our political system. During the 1996 elections, 398 House candidates who raised more money than their opponents won their races. This trend obviously benefits incumbents, who have greater access to special interest money. However, a close analysis of the key races in this year's contest suggests that enough money in the right places helped the Republican party maintain its narrow control of the House of Representatives. Republicans enjoyed wide fundraising advantages in the "toss-up" districts and districts defended by Republican freshmen elected in 1994. They also ran even in the "open seat" races that Democrats needed to win in order to regain control. Democrats kept up with, and usually surpassed Republican fundraising in Democratic incumbent districts, but generally maintained smaller advantages and failed to raise the funds necessary to compete in enough Republican incumbent districts and open seat districts.

Incumbents

The incumbent reelection rate in 1996 increased slightly from 1994, but remained about the same as it has been throughout the 1980s and '90s. One of several reasons for the high incumbent reelection rate is the ability of a sitting Congressperson to raise money while in office and maintain large campaign war chests from year to year. For example, the average 1996 campaign for a House

and beat two additional Democratic incumbents. Meanwhile, Democrats defeated just 13 freshman Republicans, and held only 20 of their 29 open seats. Strategically, the opportunities existed as late as October: 41 of the 60 "toss-up" districts identified by the *Cook Political Report* shortly before the election were represented by Republicans. However, Democrats picked up 12 of these 41 seats. In the end, Democrats made gains, but Republicans emerged with a 10 seat majority.

The common thread tying the Republicans' successes together was the ability of Republican candidates to put superior resources into their "must win" campaigns. For example, the average Republican freshman raised over \$1 million and outraised the challenger by roughly a two-to-one margin. Meanwhile, in the Democratically-held open seats, Republicans built an average advantage of \$175,000 in the 9 districts they eventually won.

Another way to look at the outcome is to examine the races that made a difference between Democratic and Republican control. For instance, the 10 tightest races won by Republicans were decided by a combined total of 18,900 votes. However, in these same 10 races, Republicans held an average fundraising advantage of \$372,000 per race. By comparison, the 10 closest races won by Democrats were decided by a combined total on 42,287 votes. Democratic candidates in these races were actually at a disadvantage. The average Democrat in this group trailed the Republican candidate by \$94,000.

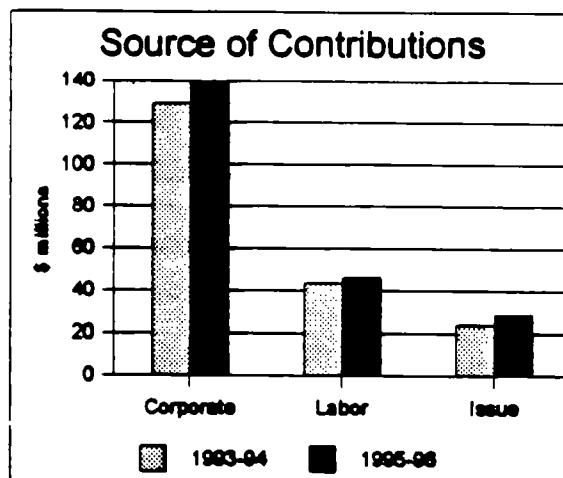
THE SENATE

The fundraising story in the Senate was similar to that in the House: Senate candidates who raised the most money usually won, and incumbents usually raised the most money. Of the 34 Senate contests, 30 were won by the candidate who raised the most money. The average fundraising advantage for these candidates was \$3.1 million. Of the remaining four races, three were won by incumbents and the fundraising advantage in two of the contests were less than 2%. A greater percentage of the Senate races were financially competitive: Senate candidates in 10 states raised

Sources of Money

If fundraising plays a crucial role in so many campaigns for both the House and Senate, then the question of who provides the money becomes a very important issue for American democracy. Approximately \$1.3 billion was raised by all candidates between January 1, 1995 and November 25, 1996. Just over \$222 million came from political parties and PACs, \$681 million was contributed by individuals (\$289 million from large donors) and another \$173 million was financed by candidates.

The vast majority of PAC money is contributed by corporations. During the 1995-96 election cycle, corporate PACs gave a total of \$139.2 million, or 65% of the total PAC contributions. PACs representing labor unions gave \$46.2 million, about 21% of the total. PACs representing parties and single-issue groups contributed the remaining 13%, or about \$1.4 million in 1995-96. Since the last election cycle, corporate contributions have increased 7%, from \$129.3 million, and labor PAC contributions have increased about 6%, from \$43.6 million. Both groups also gave a larger percentage of their contributions to Republican candidates than they did in 1993-94. In 1995-96, corporations gave 70% of their contributions to Republicans, up significantly from 1993-94, when they gave Republicans 43% of their contributions. Labor gave 8% of its money to Republicans in 1995-96 compared to 4% in 1993-94.



Breaking down the groups further, the leaders in contributions to members of Congress include banks, securities and financial institutions, which gave \$19.5 million in 1995-96; health care PACs, which gave \$17.1 million; transportation PACs, which gave \$14.3 million; and agriculture PACs, which contributed \$13.2. The largest labor PAC subgroup is unions representing public employees, which ranked seventh, contributing \$11.8 million.

Of course, direct contributions to candidates comprise a small portion of the total special interest support of candidates. Groups and corporations can also contribute to presidential campaigns, political parties through both hard and soft money, and can carry out independent expenditures and communications. When including contributions to presidential campaigns, independent expenditures, and soft money contributions, the largest groups of PACs by far are the Party PACs. In 1995-96, Republican Party PACs contributed \$61.9 million to Republican candidates, while the Democratic Party PACs contributed \$44.7 million to their candidates.

In addition, contributions to candidates from individuals are roughly triple the amount of PAC contributions. Disclosure requirements for contributions from individuals are much less stringent than

possible to candidates, this segment could increase significantly if the current caps are lifted or relaxed.

Individual contributions from these interests and other large economic sectors could also balloon if Congress passes one of several campaign finance reform plans. Some versions of campaign finance reform would eliminate PACs, but leave individual contribution rules untouched. This could encourage business executives to contribute individually rather than through a PAC. This would have serious consequences since the only limits under this scenario are the number of people who can be organized to bundle contributions. Furthermore, the weak disclosure rules would guarantee that a significant amount of the money now subject to the clear and exhaustive disclosure faced by PAC contributions would not be identified.

A growing form of political participation among groups is the independent expenditure. The legal framework of independent expenditures is in a state of flux due to recent court rulings and the development of new advertising tactics by outside groups. An independent expenditure in the most literal sense is a communication that urges the election or defeat of a candidate, but is prepared without the cooperation, consent or consultation of the candidates. Independent expenditures fall outside the limits applied to direct contributions to candidates, but must be reported and disclosed when undertaken by a PACs or party committee. Closely related to independent expenditures are corporate communications, in which a corporation or membership organization sends communications to its stockholders or members. These costs must be disclosed only if they exceed \$2,000 per year and expressly advocate the election or defeat of a particular candidate.

Based on the small fraction of this type of communication that must be disclosed, independent expenditures and communications are increasing significantly. In 1994, the Republican and Democratic parties were the only significant groups reporting independent expenditures. In 1994 political committees reported \$46 million in independent expenditures. However, through the third quarter filing in 1996, committees reported over \$60 million in independent expenditures and communication costs. Most of the growth has come within party committees. However, groups making large independent expenditures in 1996 included the National Right to Life PAC (\$3.1 million), the National Rifle Assn. (\$1.3 million), Communications Workers of America (\$1.2 million) and The League of Conservation Voters (\$1.2 million).

The need for meaningful reform has never been stronger. The political will appears to be growing, but it is too often sidetracked by plans that are driven by bad intentions or simply have unintended consequences. When devising a campaign finance system, care must be taken to insure that all problems are addressed and that changes do not create new problems. Citizen Action advocates campaign finance reform that will remove the influence of special interests, restore the role of the voter in government, and encourage a greater political discourse uninhibited by the need to raise money.
