Dear Administrator:

Because of our work together in the Administration to give working women a voice, I wanted to let you know about an exciting program the AFL-CIO Working Women's Department is spearheading this year.

The AFL-CIO Working Women's Department is launching **Ask a Working Woman**, an unprecedented outreach program to ask working women what is important to them. The program will involve a national survey, a 20-city tour with worksite visits and community leadership meetings, and a September 5-7 national conference in Washington, DC.

At the AFL-CIO Executive Council meeting last February, we had a kick-off press conference to talk about the **Ask a Working Woman** project, which was launched because working women are finding it harder than ever to juggle work and family responsibilities, and many are ready to take action to make things better for themselves and for their families. The AFL-CIO, with 5.6 million women members, can be a powerful voice for working women, and the new AFL-CIO leadership intends to make that happen.

Through the **Ask a Working Woman** project, we hope to help working women -- who are still searching for a voice and a way -- to show the important role that they *can* and *do* play in helping to solve the many issues confronting working families today. Our priority for the next few months will be to get the **Ask a Working Woman** survey out to a million working women. We want to hear from women in every walk of life--every job, region, industry, union and unrepresented -- what they want to see changed in their jobs and for women in general.

Through the Spring, we will conduct a tour in about twenty cities led by AFL-CIO Executive Vice President Linda Chavez-Thompson and other AFL-CIO Executive Council members to meet and talk with women, face to face, at their workplace and in their communities. And in the Fall, we will bring everyone together for a September 5-7 national conference in Washington, DC to map out an agenda for working women.

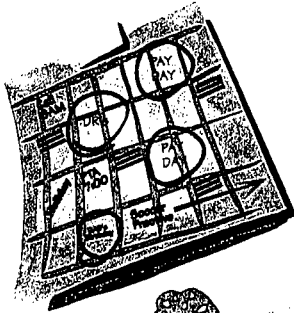
