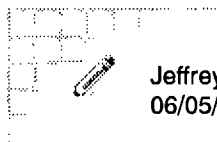

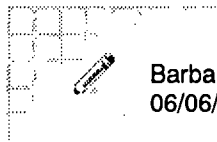

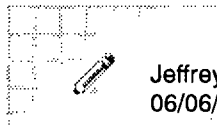

**Harold T. Shapiro Remarks
The White House
June 9, 1997**

Mr. President:

On behalf of the members of the National Bioethics Advisory Commission, I am pleased to present the report you requested on legal and ethical issues that have been raised by the sudden potential of being able to clone human beings by a technology with rather remarkable characteristics.

As you will understand, this has been an unusually challenging assignment, in part because of the complexity and difficulty of the issues, in part because conflicting values are at stake, in part because Americans disagree on the implications of this new technology for the social and cultural values they hold dearest, in part because it is difficult to decide when our liberties should be restricted, and in part because of our ambitious timetable.

In preparing our report, we have made every effort to consult widely with ethicists, theologians, scientists, physicians, and as many citizens as possible with interests and concerns in this area. But it is clear that the potential ability to clone human beings through the technique known as somatic cell nuclear transfer raises many important scientific, legal and moral issues that require further review and consideration.

Indeed, the Commission itself is unable to agree at this time on all the ethical issues that surround the potential cloning of human beings in this manner. On one key ethical issue, however, we are unanimous. It seems clear to all of us, given the current state of science in this area, that any attempt to clone human beings via somatic cell ^{nuclear} transfer techniques is uncertain in its prospects, is unacceptably dangerous to the fetus, and thus is morally unacceptable. We believe there is widespread moral consensus on this issue. We therefore recommend that the current moratorium on attempts to create children in this manner be continued and that you immediately ask for voluntary compliance in the private sector while federal legislation banning the use of these techniques for creating children is formulated and considered.

While we have been able to agree on this and certain other recommended actions, we feel strongly that most of the legal and moral issues raised can only be resolved by a great deal more deliberation and education. We hope that the sections in our report that outline the scientific, religious, ethical and legal issues that are raised by these new scientific developments, by clarifying certain issues and highlighting others, will form a useful basis for these ongoing deliberations and the broad public education we believe is so essential.

We have been impressed by the widespread lack of knowledge about genetics and the science involved in cloning that has been revealed in the public and media responses to the cloning of Dolly the sheep. We believe strongly that the government should continue actively to encourage public education in this area of science and in other areas of science that impinge on important cultural and social values so public deliberation on these issues

can be as informed as possible. This is especially critical in a pluralistic and democratic society such as ours.

As I indicated, these are exceedingly difficult issues, especially in a society where individuals hold various religious and moral perspectives. They are issues that go to the very nature of what it means to be human, and to the very heart of what people think of as their families and their individuality. They are, in short, issues worthy of intensive and widespread debate. We have greatly appreciated the opportunity to begin what we hope will be a continuing dialogue, and we hope you will find our report both helpful and as responsive as possible in the time that was available to us.

To serve as Chair of the National Bioethics Advisory Commission:

Harold T. Shapiro, Ph.D., of New Jersey, is the President and Professor of Economics and Public Affairs, Princeton University, and is a world-renowned educator and economist. He is a member of numerous honorary professional societies including the Institute of Medicine and has been awarded many honorary degrees. Dr. Shapiro serves on advisory boards to several public organizations and corporations and is a past member of the President's Council of Advisors on Science and Technology (1990-1993). He earned a B-Comm. from McGill University, and M.A. and Ph.D. in economics from Princeton University, all with honors.

To serve as members of the National Bioethics Advisory Commission:

Patricia Backlar of Oregon, is Senior Scholar at the Center for Ethics in Health Care, Oregon Health Sciences University, where Ms. Backlar specializes in issues concerning individuals with severe and persistent mental disorders. She attended Vassar College, McGill University and Yale University, and holds a certificate in health care ethics from the University of Washington School of Medicine.

Arturo Brito, M.D., of Florida, is Assistant Professor of Clinical Pediatrics at the University of Miami School of Medicine. Dr. Brito is also the Medical Director of the Pediatric Mobile Clinic of Miami. Dr. Brito earned his M.D. at the University of South Florida and interned at Emory University in pediatrics.

Alexander M. Capron, LL.B., of California, is co-director of the Pacific Center for Health Policy and Ethics at the University of Southern California. Professor Capron specializes in legal-medical issues and biomedical ethics. He is a member of the Institute of Medicine, a founding Fellow of the Hastings Center and a past member of the Human Gene Therapy Subcommittee of the NIH Recombinant DNA Advisory Committee. Professor Capron received his B.A. with high honors from Swarthmore College and his LL.B. from Yale University.

Eric J. Cassell, M.D., of New York, is Physician to In-Patients at The New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center. For five years, Dr. Cassell directed the Cornell University Medical College Program for the Study of Ethics and Values in Medicine. Dr. Cassell received a B.A. from Queens College, an M.A. from Columbia University, an M.D. from New York University School of Medicine and is board certified in internal medicine.

R. Alta Charo, J.D., of Wisconsin, holds joint assistant professorships in the University of Wisconsin Medical and Law Schools. A Fellow of the Hastings Center, Ms. Charo has also held government appointments in the Office of Technology Assessment and the U.S. Agency for International Development. Ms. Charo earned an A.B. in biology, cum laude, from Harvard-Radcliffe College and a J.D. from Columbia University School of Law.

James F. Childress, Ph.D., of Virginia, is the Edwin B. Kyle Professor of Religious Studies and Professor of Medical Education at the University of Virginia, where he is also the co-director of the Virginia Health Policy Research Center. Dr. Childress is the author of numerous articles and several books on biomedical ethics and is former vice-chairman of the National Task Force on Organ Transplantation. He received his B.A. from Guilford College, B.D. from Yale Divinity School and M.A. and Ph.D. from Yale University.

David R. Cox, M.D., Ph.D., of California, is Professor of Genetics and Pediatrics at the Stanford University School of Medicine. Dr. Cox is a world-renowned expert on genetic diseases associated with defects in chromosome 21, including Down Syndrome and ataxia-telangiectasia. He is a member of the American Society of Human Genetics, the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Federation for Clinical Research and the Human Genome Organization. Board certified in both pediatrics and human genetics, Dr. Cox received his A.B. from Brown University, and M.D. and Ph.D. in genetics from the University of Washington.

Rhetaugh Graves Dumas, Ph.D., of Michigan, is the Vice Provost for Health Affairs, The University of Michigan and is the former Dean of The University of Michigan School of Nursing, and Deputy Director of the National Institute of Mental Health. Dr. Dumas is known for her clinical research in the area of psychiatric nursing and is a member of the American Nurses Association and a past president of the American Academy of Nursing. Dr. Dumas earned a B.S.N. at Dillard University, an M.S. from the Yale University School of Nursing and a Ph.D. in Social Psychology from the Union Institute, Cincinnati, Ohio.

Ezekiel J. Emanuel, M.D., Ph.D., of Massachusetts, is Assistant Professor of Medicine, Social Medicine and Clinical Epidemiology at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, Harvard Medical School. A member of the Ethics Group under the President's Health Care Task Force, Dr. Emanuel is the author of many articles on medical ethics, focusing particularly on decisionmaking in terminal care. He holds a B.A. from Amherst College, M.Sc. from Oxford University, M.D. from Harvard Medical School and Ph.D. from Harvard University and is board certified in internal medicine and medical oncology.

Laurie M. Flynn of Virginia, is the Executive Director of the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill. A consultant to child welfare organizations, federal, state, and county governments, Ms. Flynn is also the author of numerous publications on family mental health services. She earned a B.A. in philosophy from the University of Virginia.

Carol W. Greider, Ph.D., of New York, is Senior Staff Scientist at the Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory. Dr. Greider is an internationally known expert in molecular biology whose research focuses on the structure and function of telomeres, chromosomal components whose role in aging and cancer development is just beginning to become clear. In addition to studies at the George-August Universität in

Gottigen, West Germany, she was awarded a B.A. in biology from U.C. Santa Barbara and a Ph.D. in molecular biology from U.C. Berkeley.

Steven H. Holtzman of Massachusetts, is Chief Business Officer of Millenium Pharmaceuticals, Inc., a company using genetics, genomics and bioinformatics to identify genes responsible for common major diseases and in their work on human biology directed toward drug development. Mr. Holtzman's academic background includes a Rhodes Scholarship leading to a B.Phil., in addition to a B.A. in philosophy from Michigan State University. Mr. Holtzman chairs the Ethics Panel of the Biotechnology Industry Organization.

Bette O. Kramer of Virginia, is the founder and first president of the Richmond Bioethics Consortium, a community-based organization providing education and development support to institutional ethics committees, and educational opportunities to the general public. Active in a variety of health-related activities, such as the Blue Cross/Blue Shield Critical Care Task Force, Ms. Kramer also has professional experience as a security analyst. Ms. Kramer earned a B.A. in economics at Wellesley College.

Bernard Lo, M.D., of California, is Professor of Medicine and Director of the Program in Medical Ethics at the University of California, San Francisco, where he teaches a required course on medical ethics, law and economics. Dr. Lo has served as a member of a number of public advisory committees including an OTA project on Life Sustaining Technologies in the Elderly. He received an A.B., summa cum laude, in physics from Harvard College; a M.A. from the University of Sussex in comparative literature; an A.M. from Harvard University in the history of science and an M.D. from Stanford University.

Lawrence H. Miike, M.D., of Hawaii, is the Director of the Department of Health, State of Hawaii, which includes the Nation's 3rd largest public hospital system. Previously, Dr. Miike worked for the U.S. Congress. His studies led to the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Compensation Act, AIDS policies, and action on health care for American Indians and Alaska Natives. Dr. Miike holds a B.A. from Amherst College, a degree in medicine from U.C. San Francisco, and a law degree from U.C.L.A.

Thomas H. Murray, Ph.D., of Ohio, is Professor of Biomedical Ethics and Director of the Center for Biomedical Ethics at the Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine. Dr. Murray's research focuses on ethics in medicine and science, including ethical aspects of health policy; the care of newborns and children, occupational health, and genetic engineering. Dr. Murray earned a B.A. at Temple University in psychology and a Ph.D. in social psychology from Princeton University.

Diane Scott-Jones, Ph.D., of Pennsylvania, is Associate Professor in the Department of Psychology, Temple University. Dr. Scott-Jones is a Fellow of the American Psychological Association, who submitted her nomination, and a co-author of the

Association's ethics guidelines. She is also a member and past chair of the Ethics Committee of the Society for Research in Child Development. Her research involves the role of family in supporting children's scholastic achievement. Dr. Scott-Jones holds a B.S. and M.A. in psychology from Appalachian State University, and a Ph.D. in development psychology from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

Cloning Announcement

In March President Clinton asked the National Bioethics Advisory Commission (NBAC) to review the ethical and scientific issues associated with the technology used to clone Dolly the sheep. NBAC will complete its review Saturday in a public meeting, and present its report to the President Monday.

In its draft final report, NBAC concludes that it is morally unacceptable for anyone to attempt to create a child using the technology that created Dolly the sheep. NBAC bases this conclusion on safety concerns, finding that the technology is "likely to involve substantial risk to the potential child." NBAC also concludes, however, that other forms of "human cloning" -- such as the cloning of DNA sequences, cell lines, and tissues (which do not involve the creation of entire human beings) -- are scientifically important and not ethically problematic. NBAC chose not to address the creation of embryos; its draft report neither sanctions nor condemns the cloning of embryos.

NBAC's draft final report calls for carefully-worded national legislation prohibiting anyone from "attempting to create a child through somatic cell nuclear transfer techniques." The Commission recommends a sunset provision and further review of the issues by an oversight body prior to the sunset date. The Commission will vote on this recommendation at its public meeting Saturday, and the President is scheduled to announce legislation implementing NBAC's proposal in a White House ceremony Monday, June 9th.

Board certified in both pediatrics and human genetics, Dr. Cox received his A.B. from Brown University, and M.D. and Ph.D. in genetics from the University of Washington.

Rhetaugh Graves Dumas of Michigan, is the Vice Provost for Health Affairs, the University of Michigan. Formerly Dean of The University of Michigan School of Nursing, and Deputy Director of the National Institute of Mental Health, Dr. Dumas is known for her clinical research in the area of psychiatric nursing. She is a member of the American Nurses Association and a past president of the American Academy of Nursing. Dr. Dumas earned a B.S.N. at Dillard University, an M.S. from the Yale University School of Nursing and a Ph.D. in Social Psychology from the Union Institute, Cincinnati, Ohio.

Ezekiel J. Emanuel of Massachusetts, is Assistant Professor of Medicine, Social Medicine and Clinical Epidemiology at the Dana-Farber Cancer Institute, Harvard Medical School. A member of the Ethics Group under the President's Health Care Task Force, Dr. Emanuel is the author of many articles on medical ethics, focusing particularly on decisionmaking in terminal care. He holds a B.A. from Amherst College, M.Sc. from Oxford University, M.D. from Harvard Medical School and Ph.D. from Harvard University and is board certified in internal medicine and medical oncology.

Laurie M. Flynn of Virginia, is the Executive Director of the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill. A consultant to child welfare organizations, federal, state, and county governments, Ms. Flynn is also the author of numerous publications on family mental health services. She earned a B.A. in philosophy from the University of Virginia.

Carol W. Greider of New York, is Senior Staff Scientist at the Cold Spring Harbor Laboratory. Dr. Greider is an internationally known expert in molecular biology whose research focuses on the structure and function of telomeres, chromosomal components whose role in aging and cancer development is just beginning to become clear. In addition to studies at the George-August Universitat in Göttingen, West Germany, she was awarded a B.A. in biology from U.C. Santa Barbara and a Ph.D. in molecular biology from U.C. Berkeley.

Steven H. Holtzman of Massachusetts, is Chief Business Officer of Millenium Pharmaceuticals, Inc., a company using genetics, genomics and bioinformatics to identify genes responsible for common major diseases and in their work on human biology directed toward drug development. Mr. Holtzman's academic background includes a Rhodes Scholarship leading to a B.Phil., in addition to a B.A. in philosophy from Michigan State University. Mr. Holtzman chairs the Ethics Panel of the Biotechnology Industry Organization, who submitted his nomination as a

representative of the biotechnology industry.

Bette O. Kramer of Virginia, is the founder and first president of the Richmond Bioethics Consortium, a community-based organization providing education and development support to institutional ethics committees, and educational opportunities to the general public. Active in a variety of health-related activities, such as the Blue Cross/Blue Shield Critical Care Task Force, Ms. Kramer also has professional experience as a security analyst. Ms. Kramer earned a B.A. in economics at Wellesley College.

Bernard Lo of California, is Professor of Medicine and Director of the Program in Medical Ethics at the University of California, San Francisco, where he teaches a required course on medical ethics, law and economics. Dr. Lo has served as a member of a number of public advisory committees including an OTA project on Life Sustaining Technologies in the Elderly. He received an A.B., summa cum laude, in physics from Harvard College; a M.A. from the University of Sussex in comparative literature; an A.M. from Harvard University in the history of science and an M.D. from Stanford University.

Lawrence H. Miike of Hawaii, is the Director of the Department of Health, State of Hawaii, which includes the Nation's 3rd largest public hospital system. Previously, Dr. Miike worked for the U.S. Congress. His studies led to the National Childhood Vaccine Injury Compensation Act, AIDS policies, and action on health care for American Indians and Alaska Natives. Dr. Miike holds a B.A. from Amherst College, a degree in medicine from U.C. San Francisco, and a law degree from U.C.L.A..

Thomas H. Murray of Ohio, is Professor of Biomedical Ethics and Director of the Center for Biomedical Ethics at the Case Western Reserve University School of Medicine. Dr. Murray's research focuses on ethics in medicine and science, including ethical aspects of health policy; the care of newborns and children, occupational health, and genetic engineering. Dr. Murray earned a B.A. at Temple University in psychology and a Ph.D. in social psychology from Princeton University.

Diane Scott-Jones of Pennsylvania, is Associate Professor in the Department of Psychology, Temple University. Dr. Scott-Jones is a Fellow of the American Psychological Association, who submitted her nomination, and a co-author of the Association's ethics guidelines. She is also a member and past chair of the Ethics Committee of the Society for Research in Child Development. Her research involves the role of family in supporting children's scholastic achievement. Dr. Scott-Jones holds a B.S. and M.A. in psychology from Appalachian State University, and a Ph.D. in development psychology from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

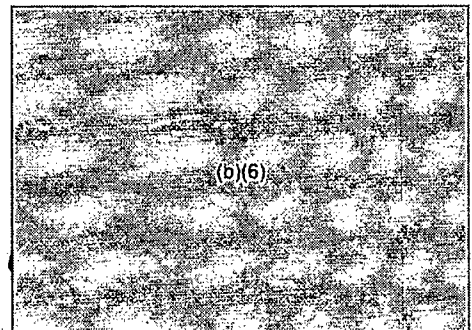
