Repeal of the Assault Weapons Ban
March 22, 1996**

Thank you Secretary Rubin. Thank you to the law enforcement leaders present for all your hard work in passing life-saving legislation last year banning assault weapons:

- ◆ Bud Meeks of the National Sheriffs Association
- ◆ Jim Pasco of the Fraternal Order of Police
- ◆ Dan Rosenblatt of the IACP
- ◆ Vic O'Boyski of the Federal Law Enforcement Officers Association
- ◆ Art Reddy of the International Union of Police Associations
- ◆ Chris Donnellan of the International Brotherhood of Police Officers
- ◆ Hubert Williams of the Police Foundation
- ◆ Wendell Franz of the National Black Police Association
- ◆ Colonel Mitchell of the Maryland State Police; and
- ◆ Thomas Frazier, Chief of the Baltimore Police Department,

as well as all the other law enforcement officers here today.

Simply put, a repeal of the Assault Weapons Ban is **unconscionable**.

That's why every major national law enforcement organization in America fought to rid our streets of these killing machines.

And with his hard work and leadership, that's what President Clinton did, despite skeptics who said a ban wouldn't work.

Well, the skeptics were wrong. In just one year after the assault weapons ban took effect, the number of banned assault weapons traced to crime dropped **18%**.

This means fewer assault weapons are aimed at America's police, and citizens.

Sadly, some assault weapons manufactured before the ban are still taking the lives of innocent citizens and dedicated law enforcement officers.

In Chicago just over one year ago, Rookie Officer Daniel Doffyn, was killed by a known gang member armed with a TEC-9 assault pistol.

FBI Special Agent William Christian, killed in the line of duty last year with a MAC-11 assault pistol.

While an assault weapons ban came too late for these brave officers and Steve Sposato's wife Jody, we'll never know if they would still be with us if the ban came sooner.

We'll also never know how many people we've saved so far because fewer weapons are on the streets.

But what we do know is that this Administration has been taking tough action against crime.

In 1994, the Attorney General established the Anti-Violent Crime Initiative. In the AVCI's first year alone, we charged well over 4,000 defendants with federal firearms violations and gained convictions in 85% of those cases.

In addition, the Clinton Administration has continued Project Triggerlock, begun in the Bush Administration. During Project Triggerlock, over 27,500 defendants have been charged with federal firearms violations.

We've already funded 33,000 new police officers on the streets, and have reduced the number of assault weapons traced to crime by 18%.

Every Member of Congress claims to support the nation's dedicated law enforcement officers, yet some have voted to cut the funds for more cops on the street, and are now seeking to replace them with more assault weapons on the street.

Those who talk about how they support law enforcement can walk the walk today by voting to preserve an effective crime control law.

And now I'd like to introduce Colonel David Mitchell of the Maryland State Police. Colonel Mitchell and his officers know all too well the devastation that criminals inflict with these weapons.

Look around this room. You can see a very clear choice between President Clinton's values and the values of the Republicans in Congress. The Congress wants to take these brave men and women off our streets -- and replace them with these weapons.

That's dangerous. That's radical. That's wrong. And it will not stand.

Two years ago . . . after a long, long fight . . . President Clinton -- along with Congressman Chuck Schumer , Senator Dianne Feinstein, and others -- did right by our neighborhoods and families.

They took deadly assault weapons off our streets, and put tens of thousands of police officers on our streets.

And you know what happened? It's working. Violent crime is down. The murder rate is down. Robberies are down.

But now -- with the legislation they're trying to pass this afternoon -- a small band of Congressmen wants to march us in the opposite direction. Their logic is straight out of *Alice in Wonderland* . If removing assault weapons and adding police officers has made crime decline, then why would anyone possibly want to start adding assault weapons and removing police officers?

I want to know where they got this crazy idea. Who'd they ask?

Did they ask you?

No. Police officers don't agree. Mayors don't agree. Lots of Republicans don't agree. And let me tell you, Steve Sposato -- whose wife's life was taken by an assault weapon, and all the families victimized by crime -- sure don't agree.

So let's tell it like it is: plain and simple, this is an IOU to the NRA.

Speaker Gingrich even said he cut a deal with the Washington gun lobby. So he put a silencer on this bill and thought that would muffle the cries of outrage from our people and our police. Well, he's wrong -- dead wrong.

These guns serve a single purpose: to kill human beings. Hunting deer is a sport. Hunting people is a sin.

Assault weapons have no place in on our streets or in our schoolyards. We will not let them return. President Clinton will veto this bill, and keep these tools of terror off our nation's streets and away from our nation's schoolyards.

REMARKS FOR THE WHITE HOUSE BRIEFING ON THE ASSAULT WEAPONS BAN - March 22, 1996 - Arthur J. Reddy, International Union of Police Associations

The latest efforts by some Members of Congress to overturn the ban on assault weapons is too serious to view as just another exercise in power politics or a symbolic gesture toward gun control advocates. It is a real life and death issue to my brother and sister officers in law enforcement.

I have devoted my entire career to public safety, serving for thirty three years on the Los Angeles Sheriff's Department before retiring to continue that service as an officer in the International Union of Police Associations. If I were to take any other position than to strongly support banning assault weapons and to urge all decent thinking Members of Congress to stand just as firm, I would do a disservice to the 80,000 men and women our union represents and the thousands of other law enforcement officers in this nation.

Do not be misled by claims that the ban has not had a measurable affect on crime. Crime statistics are measured over long periods of time, not the months that have passed since the assault weapons ban took affect. Crime statistics are measured in cold statistical terms of deaths per thousand populations, not by listing the names of those stricken down in the line of duty.

Instead of statistics let me cite the names of some police officers, who until this past year served the public safety, laughed with friends, and gave comfort and joy to their families. Officer Keith Konopasek of the Oakland, California Police Department was shot to death in the line of duty by an assassin wielding an AK 47. Lieutenant Herbert Stovall of the Peralta Community College Police Department in California was also struck down by an AK 47, a weapon which has no purpose other than to kill human beings. Officer Jim Wilson of the Omaha, Nebraska Police Department was struck down by eleven, I repeat eleven, high powered, high velocity, rapid fire rounds from what was either an SKS or an AK 47.

ASSAULT WEAPONS BAN REMARKS - P.2

Many of my friends and colleagues own and use sporting firearms for legitimate recreation. They all know, and they all agree, there is nothing in the assault weapons ban that endangers their ability to compete in marksmanship matches or to hunt game. The firearms in their possession were made for legitimate sporting use and remain untouched by this ban.

Unlike legitimate, legal sporting firearms, assault weapons have one single purpose, to kill human beings, and the human beings at risk are on a real front line where real bullets are fired, not some verbal front line in a debate in the halls of Congress. I have given you but three names. I challenge each of you to go the Law Enforcement Officers Memorial on the evening of May 13th this year. I challenge you to attend the candle light vigil and stare in the faces of veteran officers and rookies alike as they bid farewell to trusted partners. I challenge you to look honestly into the faces of young widows, bereaved mothers, stricken fathers, and confused and frightened children and tell me eye to eye that these weapons of human destruction should not continue to be banned as the 103rd Congress and this Administration in its wisdom has done.

Ask yourself, how many names will we have to add to the gray walls of our memorial because of the misguided and cynical self interest of those who seek to overturn this ban. Your answer is only as good as your resolve to continue the ban.

Ready, aim, fire!

The limited 1994 federal ban on assault-style weapons has made every American safer, at no cost to taxpayers or individual liberty. So why are House Republicans ramming through a repeal today? There's no good reason, and here's why:

► **The ban is justified.** Fewer than 1% of all firearms in private hands are assault-style weapons. But since 1990, they've accounted for 6.5% of all gun traces by federal agents. In five months last year, they were used to murder at least eight police officers.

► **The ban is working.** In the first eight months of 1995, the number of assault-style weapons used in crimes fell by 18%

over the same period in 1994.

► **The ban is popular.** Public support is 70% — among gun owners, 60% — according to USA TODAY/CNN/Gallup polls.

► **The ban is carefully limited.** It prohibits the manufacture and sale only of a limited number of assault-style weapons. All such existing guns are grandfathered in; 670 hunting rifles are exempted by name.

So why try to repeal it?

In the 1993-94 election cycle, the National Rifle Association spent \$5.6 million on behalf of pro-gun candidates, mostly Republicans. That now appears to have been money well spent — at least if you are the citizen who is holding the semiautomatic weapon, and not the citizen who is staring down its blood-dark barrel.

Keep the Assault-Weapons Ban

For more than a year, Republican leaders in Congress have looked for the right moment to try to repeal the ban on assault-style weapons enacted in 1994. The law commands overwhelming public support, so there has not been an especially convenient time. Now the Republicans have abruptly scheduled a vote in the House today, without any hearings or votes by the Judiciary Committee or its relevant subcommittees, in the hope that supporters of the ban do not have time to rally their forces. The leadership's action is an outrageous attempt to placate the gun lobby and must be defeated.

The floor vote was bound to happen sooner or later. Speaker Newt Gingrich promised the National Rifle Association in 1994 that he would overturn the assault-weapons ban after it was passed by only one vote in the House. Opponents see the ban as contrary to the right to bear arms, but that is a specious argument. The law bars the manufacture, import and sale of 19 specific assault-weapon models that are used almost exclusively by criminals, gangs and drug dealers. The ban is supported by the National Association of Police Organizations and other police groups. According to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, it has already cut

the number of assault weapons involved in crimes.

If it passes in the House, the repeal is likely to be defeated in the Senate and certain to be vetoed by President Clinton if it ever gets to the White House. For Bob Dole, the Senate majority leader and likely Republican Presidential nominee, the measure poses an awkward but crucial test of leadership. Mr. Dole has also promised to seek the repeal, and he repeated the pledge while courting conservatives in his Presidential campaign. But he also seems to realize that repealing it would undercut his attempts to portray himself as a centrist.

Supporters of the repeal may well win in the House, but even if they do, opponents should try to make it by as small a margin as possible so that it is clear that a veto by President Clinton cannot be overridden. The freshmen Republicans, in particular, ought to give serious thought to supporting local law enforcement officials instead of the National Rifle Association.

In the year of a Presidential campaign, the Republican Party should not become so beholden to the gun lobby and its campaign contributions that it arrogantly ignores what has been learned about law enforcement and the spread of guns.

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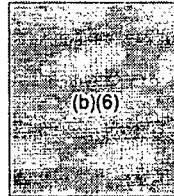
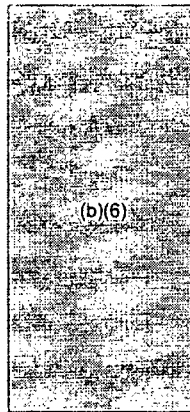
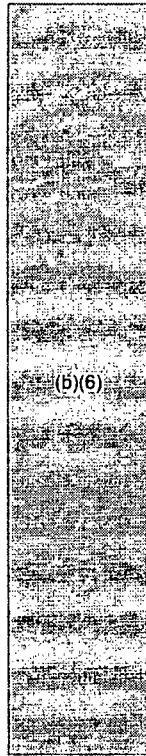

THE LAW

ASSAULT WEAPONS BAN

The assault weapons ban prohibits the manufacture of 19 specific military-style assault weapons and others with specific combat features, "copy-cat" models, and certain high-capacity ammunition magazines. Since its effective date of September 13, 1994, the ban has kept countless military-style weapons off America's streets and is now also generating criminal prosecutions.

The assault weapons ban is an invaluable tool in deterring the manufacture and proliferation of combat-style firearms that are designed to kill as many people as quickly as possible.

FACT SHEET: THE BAN ON ASSAULT WEAPONS

WHEN IT BECAME LAW: September 13, 1994, as part of President Clinton's Violent Crime Control Act.

HOW IT WORKS: The law bans the manufacture of 19 military-style assault weapons, assault weapons with specific combat features, "copy-cat" models, and certain high-capacity ammunition magazines of more than ten rounds. The law also protects the rights of hunters by specifically exempting more than 650 types of hunting and sporting weapons by name.

HOW IT IS SAVING LIVES: After the ban took effect, the number of assault weapons traced to crimes dropped a full 18 percent -- even though they had been steadily rising before the ban was enacted.

HOW A SIMILAR BAN WORKED IN THE PAST: One year after the Bush Administration banned the importation of certain assault weapons, the number of imported assault weapons traced to crime fell by 45 percent (even as while the number of domestic assault weapons traced to crime remained the same). [Source: Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms]

THE WEAPONS OF CHOICE FOR CRIMINALS: Although assault weapons account for only one percent of privately-owned firearms in this country, they are eight times more likely to be used in crime than other guns. [Source: Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms]

THE THREAT TO LAW ENFORCEMENT: More than one-third of all police who were killed by guns between January 1, 1994 and September 30, 1995 were killed by illegal assault weapons. Q/A -- ASSAULT WEAPONS BAN

Q: What proof do you have that the assault weapons ban is working?

A: After steadily rising until the ban took effect, the number of assault weapons traced to crimes dropped a full 18 percent in the year after the ban took effect.

This is consistent with the Bush Administration's experience banning the importation of certain assault weapons. One year after that ban the number of imported assault weapons traced to crime fell by 45 percent -- even as while the number of domestic assault weapons traced to crime remained the same.

Q: How many prosecutions have there been?

A: We don't have a current breakdown, but the bill is about keeping weapons off the street. Prosecutors often prefer to charge defendants on other charges -- like the case of Francisco Doran, who used an assault rifle to fire at the White House.

Q: Isn't this a lot of excitement about a very small share of all guns and of all crimes?

A: Although these weapons account for only one percent of privately-owned firearms in this country, they represent eight percent of the guns traced to criminal activities.

Q: What exactly is banned?

A: The law bans the manufacture of 19 military-style assault weapons, assault weapons with specific combat features, "copy-cat" models, and certain high-capacity ammunition magazines of more than ten rounds. The law also protects the rights of hunters by specifically exempting more than 650 types of hunting and sporting weapons by name.

Q: What about the bill's "Armed Violent Criminals Initiative" requiring new task forces, requiring the designation of an Assistant U.S. Attorney in each district to handle gun cases, and other steps to fight gun violence?

A: I'm afraid that they haven't checked on what we are doing lately -- the Attorney General announced her Anti-Violent Crime Initiative two years ago doing just those types of things, and it is having an effect. What we need along side that is an assault weapons ban that will also save lives.

AG RENO STATEMENT ON REPEAL OF THE ASSAULT WEAPONS BAN

As Congress attempts to repeal the assault weapons ban, AG Reno made the following statement at a press availability:

"When I came to Washington three years ago, one of the first things I did was to sit down with America's law enforcement leaders and ask them what their priorities were.

"Without hesitating, they told me what assault weapons are doing to their communities and how rank and file police have come to fear criminals with these killing machines -- and how frustrated they were that special interests are preventing them from taking effective action.

"Assault weapons have become the weapons of choice for violent criminals, drug dealers, gangs and dangerous maniacs everywhere. They have been used on schoolyards, at airports, in bank lobbies, on trains, in traffic, and in front of the White House. They have no legitimate sporting purpose, and you won't find them in a duck blind or at the Olympics. And more than one-third of all police officers who are killed by guns are killed by illegal assault weapons.

"But then in 1994, with the support of President Clinton, every major police organization and an overwhelming majority of the American people, Congress enacted an historic ban on the manufacture of assault weapons. Without a doubt, the assault weapons ban is saving lives. For in just one year after the ban became law, the number of assault weapons traced to crime dropped 18 percent.

"The assault weapons ban has worked, and it is unconscionable to think that special interests in Congress should or could roll it back now. The price of going back is too high -- even though the ban is working, nine police officers lost their lives last year to these killing machines.

"This is a contest between the special interests and the public interest. That's an easy choice: we are standing up for the American people -- and President Clinton will veto any repeal attempt of this ban as it exists today."

**Proposed Remarks of Assistant Secretary (Enforcement)
James E. Johnson
on the Retention of the Assault Weapons Ban
March 21, 1996**

Congressman Schumer, thank you for asking me to appear before you today to discuss this important issue. As you know, last week I was confirmed as Assistant Secretary of the Treasury for Enforcement. Before taking this post, I served as Deputy Chief of the Criminal Division in the United States Attorney's office in the Southern District of New York. I was an Assistant United States Attorney for six years. As a federal prosecutor and in my current role, I have been, and continue to be, privileged to play a small part in fulfilling a fundamental duty of government: to protect the men, women and children of this Nation from crime and violence.

I am privileged to join the Clinton Administration which has worked tirelessly to promote this same goal. Working closely with you and many of your colleagues, this Administration has pursued initiatives such as the 1994 Crime Bill, which will place 100,000 more police on the streets, and the Brady Law, which has stopped 44,000 people with criminal records from buying guns. To date, as you know, these measures have been instrumental in the fight against crime.

The Assault Weapons Ban is another important anti-crime initiative. If we are to fulfill our obligation to protect our people, we must have laws which help us fulfill that obligation. It serves no purpose to put these guns in the hands of criminals at the risk of our citizens' lives.

The 19 kinds of banned assault weapons are not hunting or sporting weapons. They have great value, however, for criminals who seek to outgun law enforcement and hold our neighborhoods hostage.

Similarly, large capacity magazine clips present a serious threat to public safety. They enable criminals to fire continuously and indiscriminately before reloading.

The assault weapons ban is working to help reverse this trend by stopping the spread of the dangerous, military-style weapons used by criminals. Indeed, preliminary figures indicate that the number of requests for traces of semi-automatic weapons linked to crimes has decreased in the year since the passage of the Assault Weapons Ban.

Congressman Schumer, I would like to thank you again for asking me to appear before you today and for reminding us of a vital fact: a repeal of the Assault Weapons Ban will not make America safer. To the contrary, it will constitute a step backward. Keeping the ban helps to stop the proliferation of these weapons; Repealing it could add tens of thousands of newly manufactured assault weapons to our streets.

We must continue to protect our citizens and law enforcement from the violent criminals who, for too long, have had access to ever-increasing firepower. It is our duty. The assault weapons is vital to this mission.

GETTING GUNS AND THUGS OFF THE STREETS

Protecting Puerto Rico:

- *In the first conviction under the assault weapons ban nationwide, on May 4, 1995, in Puerto Rico, Otoniel Rivera Miranda pleaded guilty to possessing a semiautomatic assault weapon, specifically a Norinco model MAK-90, 7.62 millimeter.*

On July 31, 1995, Rafael Noriega Millán and six members of his gang pleaded guilty in Puerto Rico to assorted gun offenses. Rafael Noriega Millán, the king pin of a gang involved in firearms dealings, bought "assault weapons" in Miami and sold them to Puerto Rican gangs that were involved in such violent crimes as drug trafficking, carjackings and bank robberies. Two Millán gang members were convicted of possessing assault weapons, and one of them was convicted of possessing a machine gun, a converted TEC-9. The purchaser of the weapons in Miami pled to a conspiracy count and, according to ATF, the Penichet Gun Shop, where the assault weapons were purchased, has been closed down. ATF videotaped several transactions there of assault weapons being sold to undercover agents.

Protecting Texas:

- *In the Northern District of Texas, Peter Koh of Fort Worth pleaded guilty to making a telephone bomb threat and possessing a semi-automatic rifle in connection with activities involving a bomb threat to the Fort Worth Independent School District. Sentencing is scheduled for November.*

LOOKING AHEAD

The ban on assault weapons will continue to dry up the supply of these killing machines on the streets. The assault weapons ban in the VCCA will make these weapons of choice for killers harder and harder to obtain.

The gun lobby doesn't like the term "assault weapon" applied to semi-automatic guns like the MAC-11 or the AK-47. It conjures up the wrong image. So, in the interest of clarification, let's call them what they really are: cop killer guns.

For a simple mugging, an assault weapon is overkill. Against a single, unarmed opponent, it doesn't much matter what kind of firearm you have; a cheap, highly concealable .22 caliber revolver will work as well as any other gun. But if your intended target is a police officer, firepower becomes a major consideration. Against a well-armed opponent, criminals opt for a battlefield weapon equipped with an ammunition magazine holding 30 or more rounds.

Last November, a suspect walked into police headquarters in Washington, D.C. armed with a MAC-11, he opened fire on local police and federal law enforcement officers. They never had a chance. Before killing himself, the gunman murdered a D.C. police sergeant and two FBI agents.

In March of this year, when Tampa police pursued two robbery suspects, one of the suspects opened fire on two of the officers with an SKS rifle equipped with a 30-round magazine. Both officers were critically wounded, one was shot in the chest, the other shot twice in the leg. At least 19 shots were fired.

On April 20 of this year, police in Haddon Heights, N.J., responded to complaints that a man was molesting a 3-year-old child. After discovering that the suspect had a prior arrest record for illegal weapon possession, the police attempted to search his house for weapons. After a long standoff with police, a police officer and an investigator were dead, and another

police officer was shot four times. The suspect was armed with an AK-47. Witnesses reported that more than 100 shots were fired.

Then on April 26, a Prince George's County police officer, John Novakowski, was shot while sitting in his cruiser outside a liquor store. Eleven or more shots were fired. Police suspect that a MAC-11 assault pistol, converted to automatic fire, was the murder weapon.

Two days later, in Littleton, Colo., a distraught gunman opened fire at a supermarket, killing three people, including his wife and a sheriff's sergeant. A fourth person was wounded in the leg. Police reported that the assailant was armed with an assault rifle and three other guns.

Last September, President Clinton signed into law a ban on the future manufacture and importation of assault weapons like the AK-47 and the MAC-11 used in these cop killings. Congress also banned the further manufacture of the large-capacity ammunition magazines that were used in all these shootings.

That ban came too late to save the lives of the police officers mentioned above, but it can save lives of other officers. After President Bush banned the importation of assault rifles in 1989, the number of such weapons traced to crimes dropped sharply the following year. Similarly, after California banned assault weapons in 1989, cities such as Oakland reported a sharp drop in the number of assault weapons being confiscated by police.

The 1994 ban on assault weapon production is not a miracle cure for gun violence, but it will reduce the firepower of criminals and in time save the lives of police officers and the American public. First, however, it must be given a chance to work.

So what's wrong with that?

If critics of the ban are convinced it's not working, why don't they join in an effort to strengthen the law? The answer is simple—they don't want it to work. They don't patrol our streets, and they don't care how many law enforcement officers and civilians are killed, they just want the ban repealed.

Opponents of the assault weapon law also like to portray the ban as an anti-gun conspiracy. And that's dead wrong. Police, like most Americans, are not anti-gun. Law enforcement can count hunters, target shooters, and Olympic gold medalists among our ranks. The ban is not about anyone's right to own a gun, it's about reasonable limitations on the kind of firepower that gun manufacturers can produce. simply put, Who needs a MAC-11 to go hunting or to defend their home?

Virtually every major national law enforcement organization—including the National Association of Police Organizations, which represents more than 180,000 sworn law enforcement officers—worked for years to pass the ban on these cop killer guns. And we're not about to give up now.

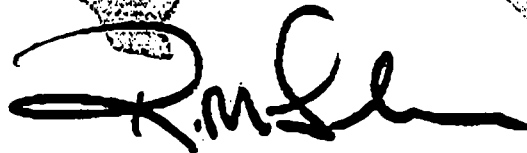

**Police Chiefs Support Assault Weapons Ban and
Urge House Not to Repeal**

Washington, DC—Members of the Police Executive Research Forum (PERF), an association of progressive police chiefs who represent more than 40 percent of the nation's citizens, are concerned over the House of Representatives plan to vote on a repeal of the assault weapons ban. In 1994, PERF members overwhelmingly supported the ban, which became law as part of the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994.

"As police chiefs in America's cities, where the tragic effects of gun violence are all too apparent, PERF members are outraged that Congress is considering a repeal of the assault weapons ban," said PERF Executive Director Chuck Wexler. "This law seeks only to limit ownership of guns whose primary purpose is to kill and injure people as quickly and easily as possible—guns that are used increasingly in violent crimes. It makes sense that police and law-abiding citizens would want to keep these deadly weapons off the streets. PERF urges the House to keep the assault weapons ban as law."

The assault weapons ban required domestic gun manufacturers to stop production of semi-automatic assault weapons and ammunition clips holding more than ten rounds for civilian use. Law enforcement and military personnel are not affected by the ban. Imports of assault weapons not already banned by Presidents Bush and Clinton were also halted.

The assault weapons ban was supported by nearly every major police organization, and by a majority of American citizens. PERF believes that reasonable gun legislation, such as this ban, can keep weapons out of the hands of criminals without infringing upon the rights of law-abiding citizens.

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INTRODUCTION:

Representative Schumer, other distinguished members, my name is Dan Rosenblatt and I am Executive Director of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP), the world's largest and oldest non-profit, executive level law enforcement association. The IACP represents over 14,730 chief law enforcement executives, superintendents, directors, managers and commissioners from across the country and from eighty-one countries around the world. I am here today representing the IACP on behalf of our President, Mr. David G. Walchak, Chief of Police in Concord, New Hampshire -- as he is on association business overseas.

IACP HAS MORE IMPORTANT THINGS TO DO:

Ordinarily, I am honored to be given the opportunity to come before Congress and offer testimony, on behalf of our nation's law enforcement community, concerning issues of critical importance to our citizens safety, protection, freedom and liberty. But I must tell you that I resent having to be here today. The IACP has plenty of other work to do -- from planning an upcoming IACP Summit on Youth Violence in April which will bring together police, criminal justice professionals, social workers, teachers and many others to address the issues of teen violence, victimization, juvenile delinquency and gang related violence, to continuing our cooperative efforts to collect police use of force data with state chief associations and the U.S. Department of Justice to utilize in formulating better training and education for police officers, to working to improve the Image & Ethics of Police through several venues to include legislative efforts to identify and "weed out" bad cops by improving background checks and uncovering prior police employment histories.

THE 104TH CONGRESS HAS MORE IMPORTANT ISSUES TO DEBATE:

Furthermore, this Congress has many more important issues to deal with and very limited time left on the legislative calendar to get it done -- from providing tribal law enforcement with adequate funding for 1996 through the Interior Department Appropriations, providing a commission to study the issues surrounding the proliferation of legal gambling, providing continued funding for 1996 through the DOJ for various state and local law enforcement initiatives combating crime, gang and drug-related violence, to reforming Habeas and providing law enforcement with adequate tools through appropriations and anti-terrorism legislation to fight worldwide organized crime, terrorism, and international drug trafficking.

LAW ENFORCEMENT SUPPORTS THE BAN:

Law enforcement came to Capitol Hill united in support of the Assault Weapons Ban as part of the 1994 Crime Bill, a sensible gun regulation which has proven to decrease police vulnerability to death and injury in the performance of the job. The hearings were held, the debate was fierce, and the ban was passed into law, and, while the critics said that police officers were not threatened by these guns, these guns have become the weapons of choice among the youngest and most violent in our society - and they use them against cops! Now, when studies are beginning to show that the law is working by squeezing out the available supply of these military style, assault weapons in the legal and illegal black markets (and jacking up the costs), opponents are attempting to repeal the law. There is still a huge pool of these weapons out there, but it is diminishing, and will continue to if we allow the law to work.

In February 1995, the IACP leadership reaffirmed its support for the Assault Weapons Ban by

stating, "As there is no legitimate sporting or hunting purposes recognized for certain semi-automatic, military-style guns, the IACP supports efforts to eliminate the proliferation of these weapons that police face each day. Therefore, the IACP will strenuously resist any attempt to repeal or diminish the assault weapons ban provided for by the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1995." (P.L. 104-322)

THE AMERICAN PUBLIC EXPECTS BETTER THAN THIS:

It is time for this 104th Congress to move on. You need to stop rehashing this same issue over and over again. As you know, President Clinton has promised a veto -- which the IACP and law enforcement stands firmly behind -- and you do not have the votes to override a veto, let alone overcome Senator Feinstein's promise to filibuster any attempts at repeal in the Senate. The American public supports the Assault Weapons Ban. You must move on and let this sensible gun regulation continue to protect police and law abiding citizens alike.

STATEMENT OF SERGEANT MARTY PFEIFER NATIONAL FRATERNAL ORDER OF POLICE

March 21, 1996

I am Marty Pfeifer, a sergeant with the Metropolitan Police of the District of Columbia. I am here as a representative of the National Fraternal Order of Police

More importantly, I was a friend of a cop named Hank Daly for many years. Hank never wanted to be thought of as a hero -- he was just a cop doing his job and doing it well. Then one day about a year and a half ago Hank and two young FBI agents, Martha Dixon Martinez and Michael Miller, were murdered by a criminal with a Tec-9 assault pistol while they were working at police headquarters. The TEC-9 assault pistol is one of the guns that the NRA would like to see more of on our streets. Last April, Corporal John Novabilski of the Prince George's County Police Department was assassinated as he sat in his patrol car. A month later FBI Agent William Christian was killed by the same man as he sat in his car. The weapon? A MAC-11, also banned by the 1994 Assault Weapons law that the NRA would repeal.

I could go on and on, but the evidence speaks for itself. Statistics from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco & Firearms establish that assault weapons comprise less than one half of one percent of all privately held weapons, yet they account for about 8.5 percent of all weapon traced in crime. In other words, assault weapons are 17 times more likely to be used in crime than conventional weapons.

There are over 5,000 more Hank Daly's out there on the streets of the District of Columbia every day - often risking their lives in an increasingly dangerous effort to protect the citizens of the District of Columbia from violent crime. They wear different uniforms, Metropolitan Police, Capitol Police, Park Police, Secret Service Uniform Division; they serve in ATF, the FBI, DEA, and other agencies -- but they all work for you.

All we ask for is your support -- and one thing you can do for us is continue to support the assault weapons ban. We need to do whatever we can to get guns like the one that killed Hank and the others, off the streets of our cities.
