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JAMES R. DIXON, POLICE OFFICER

A 21 year police veteran, Officer Dixon is noted for his duty to the youth of this community. For the past 10 years, Officer Dixon has been assigned to working with youth crime prevention and correction. Seven years ago, Officer Dixon research, planned, and founded the Drug Abuse Resistance Education project here in Temple. Totally on his own, he helped raise funds and support so the curriculum based, well renowned project could be implemented into the schools. Over the past 7 years Officer Dixon has been responsible for training 4,755 children in the DARE 5th grade curriculum and another 19, 840 children in Pre-DARE and other drug/alcohol prevention activities. In addition, he founded what is now know as two major summer projects here in Temple. 9 years ago, knowing many of the poorer, at-risk children had no summer activities, he garnered support and put together a free summer swim project for the kids of Temple's disadvantaged areas. Each and every Friday during the summer (for the past 9 summers) Officer Dixon spends his day and evening at a Temple swimming pool, cooking 500 hot dogs a day, supervising the childrens free swims and serving a meal and drinks to the children. Since this has begun, he has personally cooked over 50,000 hot dogs for disadvantaged children, and supervised over 24,750 disadvantaged children during this time. Three years ago, he also started the first in the Heart of Texas Summer camp for kids. Based upon the curriculum of Dare, Officer Dixon's DARE TO BE GREAT summer camp serves children who will be going into middle school. The aim of the camp is to provide recreational and education to children who otherwise would not be able to have any type of summer activity. The camp, made up of 90% at-risk kids and 10% main stream kids, provides education and physical recreation for a week long period of time. Three camps are held each summer with each having been at capacity so far. The camps stress leadership and drug free lifestyles. This is an all inclusive camp with the children being provided with meals, snacks, materials, and t-shirt. Basically the only thing the children have to do is show up. In addition, to this he also is very involved in community. He is active in the Temple Schools Mentor program where he spends his time in helping a child with learning problems, he is active in his church, he sponsors three baseball /softball teams for boys and girls in Temple, he is active in the Exchange Club of Temple and is immediate past president, was the Charter President of the Central Texas Lodge Fraternal Order of Police and has served as a Lodge officer of some sort for each year of the Lodge's existence, and is member of the Board of Directors for Temple Youth Baseball and the March of Dimes of Central Texas. Randy Dixon has received a multitude of recognitions from his peers and the community. He has received 28 commendations for his

work with the youth and has been recognized by every local organization at least once in his career for his work with the youth in helping them grow and prosper free of the perils of substance abuse and crime. Personally, Officer Dixon is married and has two boys, ages 14 and 10. He is a native of Temple, a graduate of Temple High and Temple Junior College and has continued his educational desires amidst his work and will be graduating with his Bachelors Degree this May.

It is our pleasure to nominate him on behalf of our Lodge. WE feel he is deserving and exemplifies what a police officer should be. Not only an enforcer of the law but a protector of the young as well.

The above quote is only one example of the many comments that an individual like Reginald Brown evokes from persons he has been involved with and made an impression upon. For one cannot interact with Reggie Brown and not come from that interaction with some kind of impression.

The high visibility of his position as a law enforcement officer, of course, keeps him on his toes. In Baton Rouge, aside from his other interests, the name Reginald Brown is first and foremost synonymous with "sheriff's office." For, during the early part of his career under the late Sheriff Al Amiss, wherever one saw Reggie, he was adorned in his green sheriff's uniform with all the trimmings, and accompanied by a green sheriff's office squad car. This scenario is one that Reggie says he had always hoped to be a part of. "I had been a volunteer civil defense worker for 20 years and had held various other positions before I began work in the sheriff's office," he says today. "But what I really wanted to be," he recalls, "was a law enforcement officer. I went to take the civil service test for a job with the Baton Rouge Police Department back in 1967, but because of the physical standards and requirements that were required then - one had to have a certain height and weight proportion - I could not qualify. This requirement turned me away from law enforcement at that time. Later, these rules were struck down."

This was only the beginning of the many interactions Reggie would have with individuals of influence and power in the Baton Rouge community. Since that initial interaction with the former governor, his life has been filled with a myriad of activities of one sort or another. And, the majority of that activity, be it work related or otherwise, has revolved around service to the community.

Through his involvement in the Baton Rouge community, Reggie has touched many lives and gained many friends, associates and acquaintances. His personality is one that always bubbles with enthusiasm and a keen concern for the needs of those he comes in contact with, and those who contact him for assistance. His knowledge and expertise is immense. He is one of vast energy; never known to say "no."

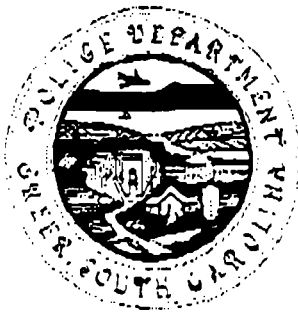

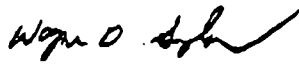

MEDAL OF VALOR
TO
POLICE OFFICER LOWELL D. NEINAST

On Friday, September 18, 1992, at 7:45 AM, a highly disturbed man went to Piney Point Elementary School at 8900 Pagewood. Dressed in all black clothing and armed with two semiautomatic pistols, he walked into the school's main office and demanded to see the principal. Two days earlier, the man had been told that his son was failing his classwork and he was extremely angry about it.

When told that the principal was not in her office, he went into a rage, firing one shot from a 9mm pistol, narrowly missing a nearby school employee. The frightened woman ran to the teachers' lounge where Officer Lowell Neinast was preparing for a DARE Program presentation. The gunman quickly left the building, but unfortunately, he returned a few minutes later.

Officer Neinast ran to the school's front entrance and arrived there just as the man returned. Seeing the officer in the lobby, the man fired four shots through the glass doorway, striking Officer Neinast once in the left shoulder and again in the right side. Stunned by the impact of the bullets, he painfully retreated to a nearby hallway.

When he turned a corner he saw several frightened students and teachers standing there. Although seriously wounded, he went quickly down the hallway shoving them into classrooms and telling them to hide under the desks. When a teacher and two small boys remained in the hall, Officer Neinast quickly pushed them ahead of him, shielding them with his own body as they moved toward an open classroom. The gunman entered the hallway and fired seven more shots, one hitting the radio holder on Officer Neinast's pistol belt.

After entering the classroom, Officer Neinast assumed a defensive position, but the gunman left the building and took refuge in a temporary classroom outside. Other officers quickly responded to the crisis and began a cautious search for the suspect after learning from Officer Neinast where he was located. After a tense period of time and the wounding of another police officer, the suspect threw down his weapons and surrendered.

With no regard for his personal welfare, Officer Neinast willingly placed his life in jeopardy to protect the lives of many students and teachers. His commitment to the preservation of human life and public safety extends far beyond the call of duty and his bravery beyond our society's demands.

In recognition of his extraordinary courage and heroism during a time of great personal danger, and for his determination to protect the lives of others at any cost, the Houston Police Department is proud to present the Medal of Valor to Officer Lowell D. Neinast this 16th Day of November 1992.

I am submitting information re: Kathleen Ruggiero, somewhat capsulated, but broad enough to give you insight into the tremendous impact this woman has made to the community and to individuals.

PERSONAL/FAMILY

Kathy [REDACTED] (b)(6) and moved with her family to Florida as an infant. She was educated in the Dade County Public Schools, graduated from Miami Dade Community College and has attended St. Thomas University. For the last 26 years she has been a resident of the City of North Miami Beach, and in that duration has raised a family (sometimes as a single parent). [003]

If you ever wonder how much time there is in a day, to know Kathy is to know there is always time for the family. She is the nurturing mother of 6 children: Tony, a Police Officer & Eagle Scout; Robert, an Eagle Scout working in retail & applying to the Police Academy; Michelle, a mother, working in the medical field; Kevin, an Eagle Scout and senior in High School; Joseph, an active pre-schooler and baby James, an abandoned cocaine baby burned in a dumpster, that Kathy has cared for since his hospital release approx. 2 years ago.

Additionally, Kathy has extended her love for people and her skills as a nurse to caring for the older members of her own family and over the years the care of 24 foster children, many with special medical/emotional needs. At any given time, her yard and home is filled with people, many she has touched positively, whose lives she has made whole again.

PROFESSIONALLY

Since 1984, Kathy has been a Detective with the North Miami Police Department and prior to that a Trooper with the Florida Highway Patrol (one of the first women) and prior to that a nurse for 17 years.

Since May 1993, Det. Ruggiero has been the single-member of the Police Juvenile Unit, and actively works over 150 criminal and dependency cases. In addition to investigative work, on an ongoing basis Det. Ruggiero provides for children and their families the services needed to move forward with their lives: counseling, shelter and living relocation, assistance in dispute resolution, and monetary help. She has been known to accompany women and children sexual battery victims through the system and process for help, beyond her job duties and often on her own time.

She represents the North Miami Police as the Public Information Officer on major cases and the herculean task of communicating the deaths of fellow Police Officers. Kathy also voluntarily serves (for the past 6 years) as Advisor to the Police Dept. Explorer Post (youths interested in law enforcement), insuring the Post continues.

In addition to her regular work demands, extensive follow-ups, Information Officer detail and Volunteer Advisor to Explorers; Det. Ruggiero, works year round off-duty to generate a supplemental income which she distributes to the community, through donations and numerous undertakings.

CIVICALLY

Kathy has been a super-charged volunteer to many South Florida agencies for years, literally touching the lives of thousands of people. She is active with numerous agencies, volunteering her time, money, and resources. The YMCA, North Miami Sr. High Mentor Program, Battered Women, Special Olympics, Guardian Angel Litem, Haitian Refuge Center, Environmental groups, homeless services, Cancer Society, are some of the agencies she is currently actively involved with.

Of special note, Kathy's own children have been involved in Scouting for many years, including three sons who have each received the prestigious rank of Eagle Scout. In addition to being active in her son's troops, Kathy has served for many years and continues as a sponsor to two troops of handicapped scouts here in South Florida, spending her vacation on an annual summer trip to North Carolina with her handicap scout troop.

At any given time, there is a car in front of her home with collected & donated items for women and children. Once full, she or a family member deliver the car load to SafeSpace, the shelter for battered women/children. On an ongoing basis, she works with battered women and prostitutes, to get them back into society productively.

During the holiday season, Thanksgiving, Chanukah and Christmas, Kathy and her family emulate the very spirit of the times: love and giving. She coordinates the Angel Tree contributions through community organizations and individually with her family does a food and clothing drive for the needy, volunteers at her Church and personally makes up and distributes for the needy "care baskets": this past year distributing over 250 Thanksgiving Baskets.

Kathy has been recognized professionally numerous times, and recently was selected North Miami Police Officer of the Year for 1993, (the first woman to receive this award). In a commendation letter from a school principal relating to Kathy's involvement after the tragic death of a student, Kathy was characterized as "one who makes the difference in the lives of children and her contribution was an inspiration for "shared ownership". Kathy is known as a professional dedicated to the duty of service to others, for her caring and being a nurturing individual with compassion.

On any given day, Kathleen Ruggiero demonstrates a devoted willingness to make a difference in the lives of so many, especially those vulnerable members of our community. She goes beyond any known constraints making a difference in meeting so many critical needs that face us in society.

Officer Alejandro Mendez is a 6-year veteran of the Miami Police Department. He is 26 years old. Officer Mendez is married to Barbara Mendez and has a beautiful daughter "Amanda" who is 2 1/2. Officer Mendez is currently assigned to the Motorcycle Division, where he patrols the north end of the city which consists of the Liberty City, Little Haiti, and Overtown area. During this assignment his main duties are traffic and D.U.I. enforcement along with backing up patrol officers with calls for service.

Officer Jose Perez is a 7-year veteran of the Miami Police Department. He is 29 years old. Officer Perez is married to Terry Perez and has two Beautiful daughters "Tatiana" age 5 and "Monica" age 3. Officer Perez is currently assigned to the K-9 Detail, where he and new partner (K-9) Lobo assist in apprehending dangerous offender who resist arrests. When he is not helping catch other officer's bad guys Officer Perez is out on the street continuing his proactive work surveilling and arresting drug dealers in Little Havana.

Officer Mendez and Perez were partners in the Little Havana area for over 3 years. Dedication, enthusiasm and a burning desire to rid the streets of drug dealers and make their area a safer place to live and work.

The officers achievements have been numerous. They have been noted as "the drug dealers worst nightmare" and the "two man anti-crime task force".

While working the afternoon together out of the Miami Police South District Station, Officers Mendez and Perez made an astonishing 965 arrests in one year, nearly 400 of those felony apprehensions, often involving armed offenders.

From the first day to the last day together these two officers were arresting robbers. On one occasion an armed robbery occurred five blocks from where the officers were patrolling. Upon arriving at the scene, two elderly victims (husband/wife) had been shot (one in the fact, the other in the leg). After fire rescue arrived these Officer proceeded to canvas the area. The offender who fit the description was observed on foot with gun in hand. Officer Perez gave chase on foot as Officer Mendez circled the block and cornered in the Offender. The offender was held at gun point and arrested. A loaded 357 Magnum was taken from the offenders hand. This offender was found guilty and is

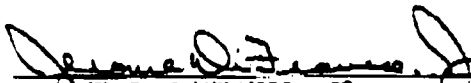

Earl Wayne Mayberry, Jr., Sergeant, Covington Police Department, Covington, Louisiana, aggressively and tenaciously responds to dispatched calls and exhibits a willingness and a desire to provide the community with better services. He listens to the community, he is compassionate, he is professional, and most of all, he treats everyone equally and fairly. He performs outstandingly on a daily basis, no matter what circumstances are presented to him. On one such occasion in December 1993, Sgt. Mayberry persuaded a distraught man threatening suicide with a weapon to seek medical help. On his own initiative he made telephonic contact with the individual and convinced the individual to speak with him outside the house. He then convinced the individual to lay down his weapon and that he needed medical assistance, and to speak with a member of the coroner's staff. Shortly thereafter, without any force being used, the individual surrendered, agreeing to seek medical help. Prior to this act of bravery, Sgt. Mayberry was selected as the outstanding law enforcement officer for 1993 in western St. Tammany Parish.

SENIOR PATROL ROBERT MARTINEZ, JR.

While assigned to the Organized Crime and the Hispanic Crime Units, Senior Patrol Officer Robert M. Martinez was able to enlist the cooperation of Interpol and the attorney general of the Republic of Mexico in an effort to extradite fifteen Mexican nationals suspected of committing murders in Texas. Gaining Mexican cooperation is an especially notable achievement, as Mexico does not normally allow the extradition of criminals. As a member of the highly acclaimed Hispanic Crime Unit, Officer Martinez was responsible for investigating all robbery and homicide cases that involved Mexican national, and was able to clear about two hundred robberies in which the victims were undocumented workers. In 1989, he also helped form Citizens Helping Austin Neighborhood Gang Environment (CHANGE), a citizens' group dedicated to reducing gang activity in the community.

In honor of Officer Martinez's professionalism in dealing with crime in the Hispanic community, Las Fiestas Patrias of Austin passed a resolution declaring September 16, 1988, Robert Martinez Day. His son, Robbie Martinez, Jr. also an officer with the Austin Department, died in a car accident in the spring of 1989, after which the city council officially renamed a street Martinez Street, in the section of town where the elder Martinez grew up. It is a tribute to a distinguished career dedicated to making Austin a better and safer place.

Officer Martinez is the Austin Police Department's most highly decorated police officer.

This letter is in reference to Officer Robert M. Eury's saving the life of a 16 year old girl.

Officer Eury and his family were driving north Sunday, November 22, 1992, along St. Martin Road, Albemarle, NC at about 5:50 PM on their way to evening church services in Albemarle, when they came upon the aftermath of a car accident.

Only moments before, a southbound 1980 Honda driven by Stacy Lynn Brewer lost control in a curve and slammed into a large pine tree. The collision with the tree crushed the driver's door and collapsed the roof, pinning Miss Brewer inside.

By the time Eury stopped his car, a couple of people from a nearby home were standing by the car.

Eury knew the situation was critical as soon as he saw Miss Brewer slumped over in the car. She was bleeding badly from cuts on her face and she had turned blue because her breathing had stopped.

Calling upon his police training, Eury immediately tried to establish an open airway for Miss Brewer to breathe. After Eury lifted her head back, Miss Brewer gasped and then began to breathe again.

Eury found a piece of hard-rock lemon candy in her mouth and removed it.

Soon, paramedics with Oakboro First Responders arrived and Eury let them take over. Eury then returned to his family at his car and they continued their journey to Albemarle.

Highway Patrolman Jim Leopard, who helped investigate the accident, said Eury's quick actions saved the teen's life.

"There were several people at the accident before Robert arrived, but none of them had done anything to help her," Leopard said Monday. "After Robert helped her, he just about had blood from one end of his body to the other."

Leopard also commended Eury for his many drug arrests. "You've got a good officer here, no doubt," Leopard told councilmen.

Sheriff Joe Lowder thank Eury on behalf of Stanly County, adding that Eury

HEAD START, KINDERGARTENS, AND SCHOOLS FOR DISABLED, MENTALLY IMPAIRED, AND LEARNING DIFFICULTIES ARE OF PARTICULAR INTEREST.
