OFFICER FITZPATRICK IS A 28 YEAR OLD, 4 YEAR VETERAN OF THE INDIANAPOLIS POLICE DEPT. OFFICER FITZPATRICK IS MARRIED AND HE AND HIS WIFE STACY ARE EXPECTING THEIR FIRST CHILD IN MAY. ORIGINALLY FROM FRANKFORT KENTUCKY, OFFICER FITZPATRICK ENLISTED IN THE U.S. AIR FORCE UPON GRADUATION FROM HIGH SCHOOL. DURING HIS TENURE IN THE AIR FORCE OFFICER FITZPATRICK MADE A DECISION TO PURSUE A CAREER IN LAW ENFORCEMENT. He graduated from Clark High School and attended LakeLand College and Calumet College. He currently attends Indiana University Northwest where he studies Criminal Justice. During his education, Fred was active in numerous sports, Student Council, and was Senior Class President. He also served as football Coach for five (5) years at Bishop Noll Institute and currently is the Assistant Varsity Coach for the Clark Pioneer's for the last six (6) years.

Fred was appointed as a Hammond Police Officer on August 19, 1978. During this time, he has participated as a Field Training Officer and on August 19, 1986 he was promoted to the rank of Corporal. In 1987 he received training in D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) and was appointed to the rank of Sergeant. Fred then catapulted to the rank of Captain of the Uniform Division on April 8, 1993.

During his career with the Police Department, Fred has accumulated numerous awards and commendations from various organizations and Law Enforcement Agencies. The Detroit Urban League's Health and substance abuse department recently partnered with IBM to provide a substance abuse prevention program to at risk adolescents in the city of Detroit. This program Drugs Destroy Dreams (DDD) is volunteer driven and has at its core four committees steering the program to its goal of preventing the onset of experimentation with alcohol/drugs/tobacco.

John Autrey responded to a call for volunteers to implement the DDD program. He served on the community mobilization committee which is charged with the responsibility of mobilizing the community to join in the fight against the deadliest killer of all times drugs!

This Committee was floundering at the time of Lt. Autray joining, he immediately saw a need for structure within the committee and began a sub-committee for the purpose of designing a charter for the committee. Within this framework, the committee was able, after several bi-monthly meetings during the period of four (4) months to mobilize a committee of twenty two (22) members, with the special assignment of understanding the basic philosophy if you are not doing something about the problem of drugs, you too are a part of the drug using/abusing public!

During the two year period of which Lt. Autrey was active within the program. He recruited others to serve with him. He assisted the facilitating (teaching) committee in expanding the curriculum with the addition of a module on violence reduction prevention. The facilitating committee would then call upon Lt. Autrey, who was the chair of the community mobilization committee to come to the classrooms, churches &/or community based organizations to assist with the sensation on violence reduction prevention.

The impact of the presence of a police officer of such rank within the community allowed adolescents to interact with law enforcement officers at a human level. Mr. Autrey, is committed to his job and we found him loyal to the community mobilization committee and dedicated on the facilitating (teaching) committee.

One of the many unusual experiences within the community presentations was during the time of the Malice Green incident; the students were very angry, hostile & enraged however Mr. Autrey, presented for the session to provide the support necessary for open communication between the public, youth & law enforcement during trying times.

We feel that Lt. John Autrey, is deserving of this honor because in spite of his position/station in life, he is giving back to the community/ and to that part of the community that is so deserving of something positive from adults. Deservedness comes in many forms and we feel that Mr. Autrey is worthy of this award because he continues to serve his community professionally and personally.

His accomplishment could thus be summarized as follows:

- Leadership for the Mobilization Committee Members
- Support for facilitating other committees
- Recruitment of additional volunteers
- Provision of Law enforcement presence
- Providing mentorship in community prevention for young African American Males
- Providing a bridge between law enforcement, school and the community
- Being very punctual and enthusiastic in all program activities
- Providing access to community resources (like tiger ballgame tickets, Lions tickets etc) for program participant
- Addition of violence reduction curriculum to Drugs Destroy Dreams (DDD) S.A. Prevention.
- Development of a charter document for Community Mobilization Committee.

Biography

I, Rosilyn Diane (Morrison) Allen, was commissioned as a police officer with the Kansas City, Missouri Police Department in October, 1983. I worked assignments as a patrol officer at the inner-city stations until my promotion to detective in 1987. I accepted a tour of duty in an undercover assignment with the Narcotics Unit in the hopes of fighting the recent influx of "crack" cocaine in our communities. Even though the war on drugs did not end, several battles were won with many successful investigations resulting in conspiracy convictions. In September, 1988, I transferred to the Homicide Unit where I assisted in the investigations of numerous murders, many of which were solved through good interviews, interrogations, and perseverance. For my "tireless investigative efforts and talents for interviewing witnesses and interrogating suspects" I was honored to receive a Certificate of Commendation from the Chief of Police and the Board of Police Commissioners. In 1991, I was again honored by the nomination for "Officer of the Year" and received a Special Citation Award from Parade Magazine and the International Association of Chiefs of Police for solving eight (8) homicides the previous year.

In October of 1991, I attained the rank of Sergeant and have since worked in the Patrol Divisions and in the Narcotics Unit as a supervisor. I am presently assigned to the Research and Technology Division where I hope to enhance my administrative knowledge in law enforcement and continue to work in this field toward a safer tomorrow for all.

OFFICER DONALD S. SCHWARTZ,

Donald S. Schwartz Minneapolis Police Dept.

Don is a police officer with the Minneapolis Police Department and has a K-9 partner named "Matrix". He is a twenty-year veteran of the police department.

Officer Schwartz has, in the past year, shown extreme courage, high motivation, extreme self-discipline, professionalism, and to say the least, heroism.

Officer Schwartz resides in the City of Minneapolis, and has a take-home squad car. On November 21, 1992 at approximately 3:45 a.m., he and his partner were on their way home, in fact, he was almost in his driveway, when he heard a call in the second precinct involving a large fight with possible shots fired. With only a one-person squad responding, Officer Schwartz answered up and responded to assist. After arriving with another officer, they began to investigate the problem. They were approaching a home when the suspect opened the front door of his residence and shot Officer Schwartz at point blank range in the chest area with a .41 magnum. Officer Schwartz was holding a shotgun in his hand, and the round went into the stock of his shotgun and bounced off the trigger guard and entered his left hand. The suspect fired at least one more round at Officer Schwartz, and four more rounds at other officers. Even though seriously wounded, Schwartz recovered to the side of the suspect's house where he was able to inform the dispatcher that he had been shot. Then with total disregard for his own safety, he continued to assist other officers by positioning himself at the rear of the suspect's house, to prevent a possible escape by the suspect. Schwartz, by now, was forced to disregard his shotgun due to his wound and the damage to the weapon, and instead armed himself with his service automatic.

Fortunately, other officers were able to convince the suspect to come out and surrender.

Officer Schwartz's extraordinary heroism and bravery involving conspicuous risk of life were in the highest traditions of being a police officer. Because of his professionalism under the most severe conditions, he was awarded the Minneapolis Police Department's highest award, which is the Medal of Honor.

Officer Schwartz is a member of the Emergency Response Unit of MPD, and member of the combined FBI/Minneapolis S.W.A.T. Team. He is a certified instructor, and provides training in street survival to not only his department, but he has been involved in training over twenty-five other agencies in high-risk tactics as well. He is a member of the Critical Incident Management Team and when a fellow cop is in trouble, he's there. His colleagues say he does all of this because he really cares about cops. He once told a partner that he doesn't take the sergeant's test because he wants to remain on the street

with "the real cops."

He has received numerous commendations each year for his fine police work. He is one of only two officers who have been given a commendation for their work as an FTO. In 1991 he was given the Chief's Award of Merit for his work as a member of the security planning committee for the International Special Olympics. This was over two and a half years of planning meetings, most of which was time he volunteered.

His dedication to the enforcement community doesn't end when he goes home. He is always volunteering at community events. He is very proud of his profession and feels that officers need to get more involved in the community.

Don has a wife, Barbara and two children, Zachary age ten, and Eva, age six.

His twenty years of service and dedication to law enforcement has given him the respect and friendship of officers from all across the country. His colleagues simply refer to him as a "cop's cop."

CINCINNATI EXCHANGE CLUB NAMES "POLICE OFFICER OF THE YEAR"

Mayor Roxanne Qualls is pleased to announce Cincinnati Police Officer Scott Krauser has been named "1993 Police Officer of the Year" by the Cincinnati Exchange Club. This exceptional honor is given annually to one officer who has distinguished himself/herself in the field of police work.

P.O. Krauser will be recognized for his achievement during a noon luncheon sponsored by the Cincinnati Exchange Club. The luncheon is being held Wednesday, February 9, 1994, at the Clarion Hotel located at 141 W. 6th St.

Scott has been selected for this award because of his work ethics and dedication to duty in his current assignment as a patrol officer in District Four. This past year he became aware that suspected drug dealers on his beat were consistently hiding their drugs nearby rather than risk hiding the drugs on their person. Scott received permission to conduct surveillance and used his knowledge of the area to watch these individuals during drug transactions. After determining their method of operation, Scott and other police officers, were able to make numerous arrests for Aggravated Trafficking in Crack Cocaine.

This is typical of the daily effort put forth by Officer Krauser. His exceptional proficiency in the field has led to his selection to serve as a Field Training Officer (F.T.O.) for the next group of Recruits to graduate from the Police Academy. His quality of work and concern for the community truly exemplify the Community Oriented Policing philosophy the Police Division has adopted.

On Friday, March 5, 1993, Miss Mary Rinehart was alone in her home in Olympian Village, Missouri. Her ex-husband, who she had an exparte against, called her and requested sex from her and threatened to kill her.

At about 2:40 P.M., the ex-husband broke into the house. She dialed 9-1-1, but before it was answered, the ex-husband pulled the phone from the wall and put a handgun to her head and threatened to kill her.

The ex-husband then drug her to an upstairs bedroom where she assumed she was going to be raped first before being killed.

Though the phone had been disconnected, 9-1-1 had already identified the location of the call and had dispatched Deputy Dennis Lassing to an unknown type of call other than a hang up.

The ex-husband had found a shotgun in the bedroom that the victim kept available for her protection. The ex-husband picked the gun up and reared it back as if to beat her with the weapon. At that very moment, Deputy Lassing knocked on the door. The suspect put the weapon down and brought the victim downstairs to the door to answer it. He again threatened to kill her and the police if she didn't handle the situation properly.

Sensing that it took too long to answer the door after hearing whispering from within, Deputy Lassing positioned himself better for safety. When the door was slightly opened, he could see the victim and a hysterical look on her face. Upon seeing Deputy Lassing, she blurted out, "He has a gun!" and glanced with her eyes behind the door.

Deputy Lassing immediately sized up the danger that existed for him and the victim, especially since the suspect's intentions and cover had just been disclosed. Deputy Lassing took fast mental and physical action by slamming the door all the way open, pinning the suspect behind the door. Deputy Lassing subdued the suspect and removed him from behind the door. A fully loaded, .22 caliber semi-automatic was recovered.

Because of his commendable actions, the Department will be issuing him an appropriate award for his distinguished efforts.

Deputy Lassing is 32 years old and a 7 year member of the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department. He also has a brother with the Festus Police Department. Deputy Lassing's father was also a career law enforcement officer with the Jefferson County Sheriff's Department who has since passed away, but sure would be proud.

On arrival you immediately caught sight of a male struggling to hold an unconscious child above the water line.

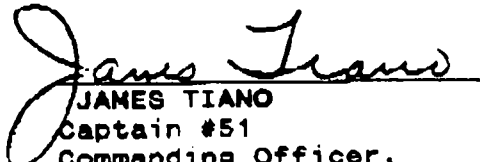
The male yelled to you for help as he lost his grip on the child and both individuals sank below the surface of the water.

The victims, as well as yourself, suffered from hypothermia and required hospitalization.

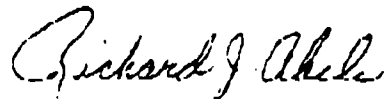

Noteworthy Highlights

- On June 17, 1991 Officer John and two other Officers entered a burning building at 132 School St., Norwich in a effort to rescue several occupants of the building who were in need of assistance. Due to the efforts of Officer John and others a woman and her two young children were removed from danger without suffering any injury. Officer John required medical attention for smoke inhalation.
- On August 22, 1992 Officer John confronted and apprehended an armed man during a domestic incident. As a result of his swift, decisive and courageous action he was able to effect the arrest without any injuries being sustained by any of the parties.

- On May 23, 1993 Officer John, while on duty on the Departments patrol boat, encountered a capsized boat in the Thames River. He observed the boat owner in the water, who was in need of immediate help and in danger of drowning. At great risk to his own personal safety John dove into the water and rescued the victim.
- On November 24, 1993 Officer John was recognized for his drug interdiction efforts after he single handedly made twenty-two (22) narcotics arrests during the first ten (10) months of 1993. His efforts resulted in the seizure of a substantial amount of illegal narcotics, drug related funds and a number of illegal weapons.
- On April 8, 1994 Officer John was selected by the Chief, Staff and Officers of the Norwich Police Department to receive the 1994 Norwich Police Officer of the Year Award from the Richard E. 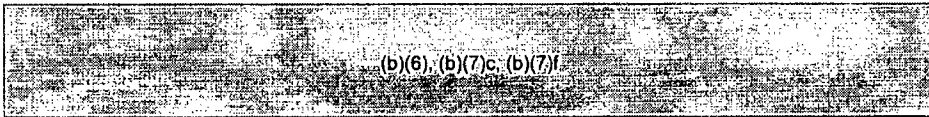

Under the umbrella of the FBI's Safe Streets initiatives, WMFO has "adopted" three elementary schools (Bancroft, Savoy and Young) in Washington, D.C., and will adopt its fourth school (Hendley Elementary) in November, 1994. Four times a month, WMFO employees teach a 60 minute block of instruction to 6th graders under the course title "Junior Special Agent." The main objective is to instill Hope, Confidence and Self-Esteem within the children. The secondary purpose of this course is to assist in strengthening the students' oral and written skills in fun and creative ways and to provide positive role models. Mock field offices are established in each school. The program enables students to take part in FBI events such as special tours, Christmas parties, and physical fitness testing. Upon graduation students are presented with badges and certificates.

A Junior Special Agent Alumni Association was created in November, 1993 for graduates of the program. Students of junior high age are also allowed to join and participate in the bimonthly meetings. Students hold elections of officers, play games and participate in organized sports. More than 90 FBI field office volunteers participate in COP which includes mentoring/tutoring students.

On March 3, 1993, Captain Frank Schafer Jr. and Lieutenant John McGroarty of the Essex County Police Department, Newark, N.J., responded to a report of two (2) children that had fallen through the ice on a local lake. Upon their arrival they observed the two youths submerged to their chests about 25 yards apart and approximately 50 yards from shore. Both youths were unresponsive to all verbal and physical communication. The officers immediately entered the water, swam toward the stranded victims, breaking the ice as they proceeded. As the officers reached the first victim, Captain Schafer retrieved him and relayed him to Lieutenant McGroarty and both officers brought him to shore. The officers re-entered the frozen lake, proceeded to the second youth and effected the second rescue. Both children were transported to area hospitals that resulted in little or no lasting effects of their experience.
