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## *BLUEPRINT FOR ANTI-CRIME LEGISLATION*

Presented to  
PRESIDENT BILL CLINTON  
April 14, 1994

Founded in 1985, the Law Enforcement Steering Committee (LESC) is a nonpartisan coalition consisting of the Federal Law Enforcement Officers Association, the Fraternal Order of Police, the International Brotherhood of Police Officers, the Major City Chiefs, the National Association of Police Organizations, the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives, the National Sheriffs' Association, the National Troopers Coalition, the Police Executive Research Forum, and the Police Foundation. These groups represent over 500,000 law enforcement officers nationwide. The LESC is a model of unprecedented cooperative effort between law enforcement research organizations, police management, and labor, dedicated to the advancement of legislation and policies that will ensure the safety and security of our country's people.

Over the past eight years, LESC members have worked diligently on law enforcement issues of mutual concern and have been able to articulate to the White House, the Congress, and the American people our ideas for achieving a safer society. We have expressed our concerns over the increase in violence and crime, the easy access criminals have to weapons, and the need for more support for professional law enforcement.

For too many years, crime control--and legislative means of achieving it--has been undermined by partisan politics and pressure from special interest groups. In the meantime, violence has exploded in our communities, making peace officers' jobs increasingly dangerous and frustrating.

While we fully recognize that anti-crime initiatives in the legislation pending before Congress do not present a panacea for crime, they are a solid beginning toward a comprehensive approach to making our nation's streets safe and secure. The members of the LESC stand firmly behind many major provisions of the legislation, including those that would enhance police presence in the community and that would confine violent criminals until they are no longer a danger to our communities.

Members of the LESC met with congressional and Administration leaders in 1992 in an effort to forge a compromise and enact a comprehensive crime bill. We were very disappointed when that effort failed, and are committed to working with policy makers to ensure this crime bill does not suffer the same fate. This year, the case for strong, effective crime legislation is so compelling that no such effort should be needed. The nation's police and the citizens they are sworn to protect have no doubt that crime is threatening the quality of life in our communities. Nonetheless, the LESC offers its assistance in securing sensible, effective legislation to address what has become the public's number one concern. The LESC feels that the following items are key elements to any package of crime legislation:

- **Funding for 100,000 additional police officers** -- There is a broad consensus among the law enforcement community that additional personnel dedicated to community policing will assist some agencies in reducing crime, and is essential in our efforts towards working with the community to take back our streets.

• **Community Policing** – New policing strategies in which police are in close contact with residents of the community and in which the police and residents become partners in solving community problems offer the best hope for improving the quality of life for all citizens we serve. While change will be difficult, it seems that traditional responses alone have not been enough.

• **Funding for more prisons, jails and boot camps** – The current state and local prison systems are overflowing and in serious need of repair. Arrests mean nothing unless we can back them up with the threat of doing jail time, but criminals cannot be kept behind bars if there is no available prison space. Criminals must know that if they commit a crime, they will serve the full sentence. Boot camps are a pragmatic approach to dealing with juvenile, non-violent offenders for whom training and guidance can serve to turn their lives around. Youths can receive education, discipline, and drug treatment through these innovative programs. If law enforcement can deter young people from a life of crime, then American society will be the winner.

• **Protecting our youth** -- Children, our most precious resource, have become both the victims and the perpetrators of the violence sweeping this country. One in 25 high school students carry a gun to school and over 30% of students responding to a survey said they have been physically threatened. We need to make every effort to ensure that our schools are crime and gun-free. We must support programs that help all of our children stay crime and drug-free, and that offer opportunities for productive employment and meaningful lives.

• **Assault weapons prohibition** -- The easy availability of assault weapons wreaks havoc daily on the streets of America. These dangerous weapons, with their rapid rate of fire, ease of handling in close quarters, and military features, are simply not sporting weapons. As long as assault weapons are sold legally, the public and law enforcement will continue to be at great risk.

• **National Commission to Support Law Enforcement** – Comprised of members from all aspects of law enforcement, including management, labor, federal law enforcement agencies, academia, together with Members of Congress, the members of the LESC believe a commission to support law enforcement will be an excellent forum for sharing law enforcement resources and intelligence. A partnership such as this will help ensure that law enforcement at every level has the tools it needs to conduct a coordinated, national approach to fighting crime.

• **Research on issues affecting the cop on the street** – To help effectively address the problems of crime and disorder in the community, the LESC feels that there needs to be a sufficient level of research funding that directly benefits the cop on the street.

The LESC supports a crime bill that encompasses these and other issues contained in the crime bill. The LESC is committed to standing with President Clinton and his Administration in pressing for prompt enactment of such a bill by the Congress.

# 100 Island cops going on the road to D.C.

## Meeting with Clinton to show support for tough crime bill

In a show of solidarity, Staten Island law enforcement officers will meet with President Clinton tomorrow in the hopes of garnering support for a tough crime bill.

Nearly 100 New York City law enforcement officers will meet on Staten Island tomorrow morning and embark on a day-long trip to Washington D.C. that includes a

morning press conference with the president on the White House lawn.

At least 40 New York Police Department detectives and a total of about 60 Transit and Housing Police officers will meet with Clinton, along with 300 additional officers from across the nation.

Clinton supports the crime bill which, among other things, calls for the death penalty for anyone

convicted of killing a law enforcement officer.

Bipartisan opposition has been blamed as the reason the four-year-old bill has not yet made it through Congress; both Democrats and Republicans have drawn up several versions of the bill.

The New York area officers will meet around 5:30 a.m. in front of the 122nd Precinct stationhouse

in New Dorp, where they will board a bus and begin their crime-fighting journey.

Thomas Scotto, president of the National Association of Police Organizations, which represents the three New York area police groups, will meet in private with the president along with other law enforcement delegates from across the nation.

"It's a display of unity to tell Congress that we want a crime bill passed immediately," said Scotto, an Annadale resident who also is president of the Detectives Endowment Association.

"The crime bill has been battered over four years, been battled back and forth in a pingpong ball between Democrats and Republicans,"

"We're disgusted it's partisan bickering... Voting to Congress to knock it out. We want a crime bill."

Clinton also will present several presidential awards to officers. New York received the presidential award from Richard Moe, who is at the Manhattan North Apprehension Unit, Police Officer Michael

Per our discussion on Friday, March 11, the Law Enforcement Steering Committee (LESC), representing over 450,000 law enforcement officers throughout the country, would like to meet with President Clinton to discuss the anti-crime legislation pending in Congress.

The LESC is also planning a March on Crime and we would like to invite President Clinton to join with us in the event. The March on Crime would ideally take place as the full House of Representatives considers anti-crime legislation after Easter recess the week of April 11. If the House consideration is scheduled for before Easter recess, then we could proceed with the march as a Conference Committee on crime convenes.

The March on Crime would consist of law enforcement officers from the different LESC groups marching up to the Capitol and holding a press conference calling upon Congress to pass a crime bill immediately to help the police fight the war on crime.

With crime still topping the polls as the number one issue of concern, we believe that a march by the nation's police demanding a crime bill would focus a great deal of attention on legislators to pass a bill promptly. Obviously, police clamoring for a crime bill is a good hook and would generate great media coverage.

We believe that a March on Crime would be a tremendous event for the Administration to stand with police supporting the President's crime bill.

The LESC consists of the following groups: Federal Law Enforcement Officers Association, Fraternal Order of Police, International Brotherhood of Police Officers, Major City Chiefs, National Association of Police Organizations, National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives, National Sheriffs' Association, National Troopers Coalition, Police Executive Research Forum, Police Foundation.

Again, we would like President Clinton's participation in both or one of the above mentioned events on crime and look forward to your favorable consideration.

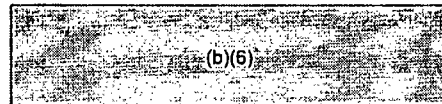

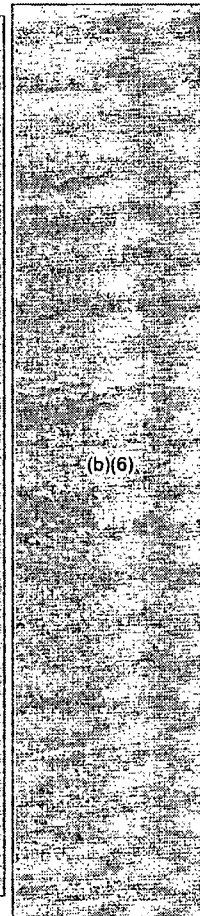
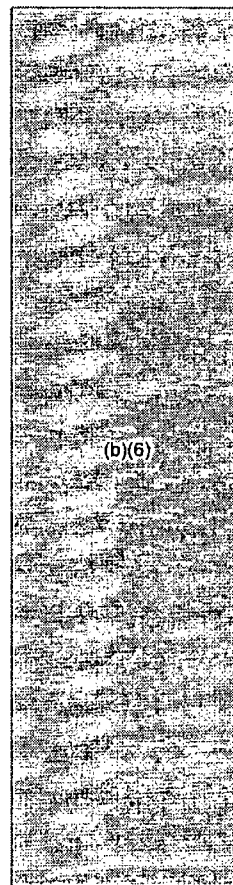

## BLUEPRINT FOR ANTI-CRIME LEGISLATION

Presented to

PRESIDENT BILL CLINTON

April 14, 1994



Founded in 1985, the Law Enforcement Steering Committee (LESC) is a nonpartisan coalition consisting of the Federal Law Enforcement Officers Association, the Fraternal Order of Police, the International Brotherhood of Police Officers, the Major City Chiefs, the National Association of Police Organizations, the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives, the National Sheriff's Association, the National Troopers Coalition, the Police Executive Research Forum, and the Police Foundation. These groups represent over 500,000 law enforcement officers nationwide. The LESC is a model of unprecedented cooperative effort between law enforcement research organizations, police management and labor, dedicated to the advancement of legislation and policies that will ensure the safety and security of our country's people.

Over the past eight year's LESC members have worked diligently on law enforcement goals of mutual concern and have been able to articulate to the White House, the Congress, and the people our ideas for achieving a safer, crime free and drug free, law abiding, and harmonious American society. We have expressed our concerns over the increase in violence and crime, the increasingly easy availability of weapons to criminals and the need for more effective and professional law enforcement.

For too many years, crime control and legislative means of achieving it have been undermined by partisan politics and pressure from special interest groups. In the meantime, violence has spiraled in our communities and peace officers find their jobs to be increasingly dangerous and frustrating.

While we fully recognize that initiatives in the crime bills pending before Congress do not represent a panacea for crime, they are a solid beginning toward a comprehensive approach to making our nation's streets safe and secure. The members of LESC stand firmly behind many major provisions of the legislation, including those that would enhance police presence in the community and that would confine violent criminals until they are no longer a danger to our communities.

Members of the LESC met with Congressional and Administration leaders in 1992 in an effort to forge a compromise and enact a comprehensive crime bill. We were very disappointed when the effort failed.

As you may know, members of the LESC have met with Congressional and Administration leaders in the past in attempts to forge a compromise in order to enact a comprehensive crime bill. This year, the case for strong, effective crime legislation is so compelling that we would think that no such effort would be needed. Nonetheless, we are offering any assistance that may be helpful in securing sensible, effective legislation to address what has become the public's number one concern, and we feel that the following items are key elements to any package of crime legislation:

- **Funding for 100,000 additional police officers** – There is a broad consensus among the law enforcement community that additional personnel dedicated to community policing will assist many agencies in reducing crime, and is essential in our efforts towards working with the community to take back our streets.
- **Community Policing** – It is clear that new policing strategies in which police are in close contact with residents of the community and in which the police and residents become partners in solving community problems offer the best hope for improving the quality of life for all citizens we serve. While change will be difficult and may even require additional resources, it seems that traditional responses alone have not been productive.
- **Funding for more prisons, jails and boot camps** – The current state and local prison systems are overflowing and in serious need of repair. Arrests mean nothing unless we can back them up with the threat of doing jail time, but criminals cannot be kept behind bars if there is no available prison space. Criminals must know that if they commit a crime, they will serve the full sentence. Boot camps are a pragmatic approach to dealing with juvenile, non-violent offenders for whom training and guidance can serve to turn their lives around. Youths can receive education, discipline, and drug treatment through these innovative programs. If law enforcement can deter young people from a life of crime, then American society will be the winner.
- **Protecting our youth** – Children, our most precious resource, have become both the victims and the perpetrators of the violence sweeping this country. One in twenty-five high school students carry a gun to school and over 30% of students responding to a survey said they have been physically threatened. We need to make every effort to ensure that our schools are crime and gun-free, and we must support programs that help children stay crime- and drug-free.
- **Assault weapons prohibition** – The easy availability of assault weapons wreaks havoc daily on the streets of America. These dangerous weapons, with their rapid rate of fire, ease of handling in close quarters and military features, are simply not sporting weapons. As long as assault weapons are sold legally, the public and law enforcement will continue to be at great risk.
- **National Commission to Support Law Enforcement** – Comprised of members from all aspects of law enforcement, including management, labor, federal law enforcement agencies, academia and Members of Congress, the members of the LESC believe this commission to be an excellent forum for sharing law enforcement resources and intelligence. A partnership such as this will help make sure that law enforcement at every level has the tools it needs to conduct a coordinated, national approach to fighting crime.
- **Research on issues affecting the cop on the street** – To help effectively address the problems of crime and disorder in the community, we feel that there needs to be a sufficient level of research funding that directly benefits the cop on the street.

The LESC fully supports a crime bill that encompasses these and the many other issues contained in the crime bill, and we are committed to standing with the Administration in pressing for prompt enactment of such a bill by the Congress.
