- Ray McGrath: Vice President of IBPO. Attended event in support of stimulus bill and asked you for autograph of his inauguration invitation. big supporter.
- Johnny Mack Brown. Personal note: very conservative new president of NSA. According to your scheduler for today, Lee Saterfield, Brown "practically raised her."
- Johnny Hughes. Big Bush supporter who opposed you in campaign. Did an event with DA's against you. Completely unpredictable.

The Police Foundation is a private, non-profit institution dedicated to improving American policing and the ability of the police to control crime, maintain order, and deliver services to citizens. To accomplish its mission, the foundation conducts research and experimentation to test the practices and policies of police agencies and offers technical assistance programs to police agencies. The President of the Police Foundation is Hubert Williams, who for eleven years served as director of the Newark, New Jersey Police Department.

HR 4092 – Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act

The Administration strongly supports prompt passage of H.R. 4092, which embodies the central elements of the President's anti-crime legislative agenda. This critical legislation will enable the Federal Government to play a significantly enhanced role in the Nation's fight against the crime and violence that plague too many of our communities.

Passage of H.R. 4092 will assist the States and localities in their efforts against violent crime -- particularly in the critical areas of police, prisons, and prevention. In addition, H.R. 4092 will provide necessary tools to Federal law enforcement officials, improving their effectiveness in combating violent crime. The bill will expand and advance proven crime prevention programs in an unprecedented way.

H.R. 4092 contains key elements of the President's anti-crime program, including:

- o A Substantial Start Towards Putting an Additional 100,000 Police Officers on Our Streets, Engaged in Community Policing. This is the centerpiece of the President's anti-crime program. Putting more officers on the street -- working with communities -- is the best way to prevent crime and illegal drug use, to ensure that criminals are apprehended when crimes occur, and to return to our citizens the sense of security that has been taken from them.
- o Launching a "Smart and Tough" Approach to Youth Crime and Violence. This bill focuses our efforts to combat youthful violence with:
 - Proven and extensive crime prevention programs, to give kids something to say "yes" to (discussed below);
 - Boot camps for youthful offenders, as a second-chance for kids who get off-track;
 - Drug courts to get drug users turned around before they commit more serious crimes;
 - A ban on juvenile gun possession; and
 - For hardened young criminals, the authority to try 13-year olds as adults for serious violent offenses.
- o Measures to Stiffly Punish Violent Crime. In addition to the vital prison program discussed below, the bill contains several measures to ensure that violent offenders cannot continue to prey upon our communities. These include:
 - The President's "three strikes and you're out" life imprisonment provision, which is targeted on the career violent offenders who do so much violent harm.
 - Reinstating the Federal death penalty for the most heinous offenses, including the killing of Federal law enforcement officers.

- o Significant and Innovative Crime Prevention Programs that Give Our Young People Something to Say "Yes" To. While we must -- and will -- insist upon personal responsibility, and punish those who commit crimes regardless of their circumstances, we must also do what we can to keep young people from beginning to engage in crime. Among the prevention programs in the bill that the Administration strongly supports are:
 - The President's "YES" program (Youth Employment and Skills), to give employment opportunities to kids in hard-hit, high-crime areas;
 - "Ounce of Prevention" programs to keep schools open after hours and to expand after-school activities, like Boys and Girls clubs, that keep kids off the streets; and
 - Innovative alternatives like Midnight Sports and Police Partnerships with Youths.

Prevention programs make sense, and are an important part of any balanced attack on the crime and violence that plague our cities, towns, neighborhoods, and rural communities. The Administration supports the full authorization level for critical prevention programs contained in H.R. 4092.

- o Assisting the States in Building and Operating More Prison Cells, to Get More Violent Offenders and Criminal Aliens Off Our Streets. It is incumbent upon the Federal Government to aid States that are struggling to make sure that violent criminals are not being released prematurely for lack of space. The Federal Government has built the prisons necessary to ensure that Federal offenders are not being prematurely released, and this Administration is committed to maintaining the necessary capacity. However, none of us will be safe until the States can do the same.
- o Stopping Violence Against Women. The bill includes a plan, strongly supported by the President, to increase penalties and prevention efforts aimed at domestic violence and sexual assaults that make American women unsafe in their homes or on the street.
- o Other Initiatives. Among the other Administration-supported provisions of H.R. 4092 are those that would promote victims' rights, prevent child abuse, provide a "safety-valve" from mandatory minimum sentences for non-violent offenders, and increase penalties for hate crimes.

While the Administration does not agree with every program or provision in H.R. 4092, it firmly believes that, taken as a whole, the bill is a balanced approach to the problem of crime, and contains many much-needed crime-fighting measures. The Administration looks forward to working with the House to obtain prompt passage of this important legislation.

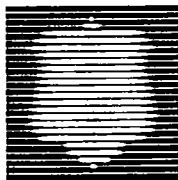

Founded in 1985, the Law Enforcement Steering Committee (LESC) is a nonpartisan coalition consisting of the Federal Law Enforcement Officers Association, the Fraternal Order of Police, the International Brotherhood of Police Officers, the Major City Chiefs, the National Association of Police Organizations, the National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives, the National Sheriffs' Association, the National Troopers Coalition, the Police Executive Research Forum, and the Police Foundation. These groups represent over 500,000 law enforcement officers nationwide. The LESC is a model of unprecedented cooperative effort between law enforcement research organizations, police management, and labor, dedicated to the advancement of legislation and policies that will ensure the safety and security of our country's people.

Over the past eight years, LESC members have worked diligently on law enforcement issues of mutual concern and have been able to articulate to the White House, the Congress, and the American people our ideas for achieving a safer society. We have expressed our concerns over the increase in violence and crime, the easy access criminals have to weapons, and the need for more support for professional law enforcement.

For too many years, crime control--and legislative means of achieving it--has been undermined by partisan politics and pressure from special interest groups. In the meantime, violence has exploded in our communities, making peace officers' jobs increasingly dangerous and frustrating.

While we fully recognize that anti-crime initiatives in the legislation pending before Congress do not present a panacea for crime, they are a solid beginning toward a comprehensive approach to making our nation's streets safe and secure. The members of the LESC stand firmly behind many major provisions of the legislation, including those that would enhance police presence in the community and that would confine violent criminals until they are no longer a danger to our communities.

Members of the LESC met with congressional and Administration leaders in 1992 in an effort to forge a compromise and enact a comprehensive crime bill. We were very disappointed when that effort failed, and are committed to working with policy makers to ensure this crime bill does not suffer the same fate. This year, the case for strong, effective crime legislation is so compelling that no such effort should be needed. The nation's police and the citizens they are sworn to protect have no doubt that crime is threatening the quality of life in our communities. Nonetheless, the LESC offers its assistance in securing sensible, effective legislation to address what has become the public's number one concern. The LESC feels that the following items are key elements to any package of crime legislation:

● **Funding for 100,000 additional police officers** -- There is a broad consensus among the law enforcement community that additional personnel dedicated to community policing will assist some agencies in reducing crime, and is essential in our efforts towards working with the community to take back our streets.

● **Community Policing** -- New policing strategies in which police are in close contact with residents of the community and in which the police and residents become partners in solving community problems offer the best hope for improving the quality of life for all citizens we serve. While change will be difficult, it seems that traditional responses alone have not been enough.

● **Funding for more prisons, jails and boot camps** -- The current state and local prison systems are overflowing and in serious need of repair. Arrests mean nothing unless we can back them up with the threat of doing jail time, but criminals cannot be kept behind bars if there is no available prison space. Criminals must know that if they commit a crime, they will serve the full sentence. Boot camps are a pragmatic approach to dealing with juvenile, non-violent offenders for whom training and guidance can serve to turn their lives around. Youths can receive education, discipline, and drug treatment through these innovative programs. If law enforcement can deter young people from a life of crime, then American society will be the winner.

● **Protecting our youth** -- Children, our most precious resource, have become both the victims and the perpetrators of the violence sweeping this country. One in 25 high school students carry a gun to school and over 30% of students responding to a survey said they have been physically threatened. We need to make every effort to ensure that our schools are crime and gun-free. We must support programs that help all of our children stay crime and drug-free, and that offer opportunities for productive employment and meaningful lives.

● **Assault weapons prohibition** -- The easy availability of assault weapons wreaks havoc daily on the streets of America. These dangerous weapons, with their rapid rate of fire, ease of handling in close quarters, and military features, are simply not sporting weapons. As long as assault weapons are sold legally, the public and law enforcement will continue to be at great risk.

● **National Commission to Support Law Enforcement** -- Comprised of members from all aspects of law enforcement, including management, labor, federal law enforcement agencies, academia, together with Members of Congress, the members of the LESC believe a commission to support law enforcement will be an excellent forum for sharing law enforcement resources and intelligence. A partnership such as this will help ensure that law enforcement at every level has the tools it needs to conduct a coordinated, national approach to fighting crime.

● **Research on issues affecting the cop on the street** -- To help effectively address the problems of crime and disorder in the community, the LESC feels that there needs to be a sufficient level of research funding that directly benefits the cop on the street.

The LESC supports a crime bill that encompasses these and other issues contained in the crime bill. The LESC is committed to standing with President Clinton and his Administration in pressing for prompt enactment of such a bill by the Congress.
