PHASE I AWARDS

- **Total Awards.** The program distributed 392 awards, totaling \$200.2 million, to help hire or rehire 2,779 additional law enforcement officers. This \$200 million under Phase I represents less than 3 percent of the total \$8.8 billion available under the COPS Program.
- **Community Policing Strategies.** With these funds, jurisdictions will implement a variety of strategies to engage in community policing to prevent crime, promote problem solving, and enhance public safety. These range from initiating community policing activities in targeted areas, using foot patrols, school-based crime resistance programs, police mini-stations, or neighborhood resource centers; to expanding the nature and scope of existing community policing activities; to transforming an entire department's law enforcement philosophy to community policing.
- **Geographic Distribution.** Jurisdictions in all 50 states and Puerto Rico received awards under the Phase I program.
- **Large Jurisdictions.** 68 jurisdictions with populations of 150,000 or above received awards totaling approximately \$96.5 million. These include grants of \$3 million to the Los Angeles County Sheriff and the Honolulu Police; grants of about \$2.5 million and \$2.1 million to the Puerto Rico Police and the New York City Transit Authority respectively; and 64 grants of \$2 million or less.
- **Small jurisdictions.** 324 jurisdictions with populations under 150,000 received awards totaling approximately \$103.7 million.
 - 19 awards to jurisdictions of 100,000 to 150,000
 - 62 awards to jurisdictions of 50,000 to 99,999
 - 83 awards to jurisdictions of 25,000 to 49,999
 - 76 awards to jurisdictions of 10,000 to 24,999
 - 79 awards to jurisdictions of 1,000 to 9,999
 - 5 awards to jurisdictions under 1,000.
- **Police Departments.** 332 municipal and county police departments received Phase I awards. These departments serve populations ranging from more than one million to 294.
- **Sheriffs' Departments.** 46 county sheriffs' departments received funds directly from this program. In addition, two California cities will contract for law enforcement services with a county sheriff, and two other sheriffs will receive awards as part of a consortium.

- **Indian Tribal Groups.** Six Indian tribal groups received awards in Arizona, Minnesota, Montana, Oklahoma, South Dakota, and Washington.
- **State and Commonwealth Police Departments.** The Vermont State Police and Puerto Rico Police Department received awards. The Puerto Rico Police Department serves an island population of about 3.6 million.
- **Consortia of Law Enforcement Agencies.** Three consortia received awards. One was a consortium of three police departments in Nebraska; one was a consortium of a sheriff and three police departments in Oregon; and one was a consortium of a sheriff and a police department in Washington.
- **Transit Police Department.** The New York City Transit Authority received funding for 28 officers to help protect riders on the New York bus system.
- **Increased Federal Share.** Among the 29 awardees requesting an increase in the federal share per officer, more than half (16) were granted an increase. Requests were considered only after an application was selected for funding.

ELIGIBILITY AND RULES

- Only the 2,506 applicants to the Police Hiring Supplement Program (PHSP) that were not funded were eligible for Phase I of the COPS Program.
- The 249 successful PHSP applicants were excluded from this phase of the COPS Program. In addition, four jurisdictions were excluded because they received substantial community policing grants from the Bureau of Justice Assistance at the conclusion of the PHSP (Boston, San Diego, Philadelphia, and Knoxville).
- No other law enforcement agencies, regardless of need, were eligible to receive these funds. Applications received under the PHSP after December 1, 1993, were not considered.
- No supplemental information from eligible applicants was accepted or reviewed as part of the selection process.
- The total amount expended for Phase I was limited to \$200 million of the \$1.3 billion appropriated for fiscal year 1995, plus approximately \$221,000 unspent from the PHSP.
- Under Phase I, grant funds can be used only for the salaries and fringe benefits of hired or rehired sworn law enforcement officers over a three-year period. Funding for overtime is prohibited.

**COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING SERVICES (COPS)

- For each officer funded under Phase I, the federal share may not exceed the greater of:
(1) 75 percent of the total salary and benefits over the life of the grant, up to a maximum of \$75,000; or (2) 50 percent of the total salary and benefits over the life of the grant.
Jurisdictions could request an increase in federal share based on extraordinary economic hardship.

SELECTION PROCESS

- The selection process under Phase I was similar to that used in the PHSP.
- All 2,506 applications remaining from the PHSP were reconsidered based on their original reviews and scores. The review and scoring process was based on Public Safety Need (40 percent), Community Policing Strategy (30 percent), Implementation Plan (10 percent), Continuation and Retention Plan (10 percent), and Additional Resource Commitments (10 percent).
- The Department made final selections from a pool of eligible applicants based on high scores and crime rates.
- To ensure an equitable distribution of awards, the Department also considered geography and other factors, including population size, severity of need based on violent crime, and economic distress. In addition, the Department gave special consideration to sheriffs in Phase I.

BACKGROUND

- The Justice Department created the PHSP in response to Congressional passage of the **Supplemental Appropriation Act of 1993**, which provided \$150 million to help pay for the salaries and fringe benefits of sworn law enforcement officers.
- Under the PHSP, the Department received 2,760 applications from all 50 states and several territories for grants to hire or rehire new officers. This competitive, discretionary grant program concluded in May 1994.
- The Department made a total of 249 awards under the PHSP, totaling approximately \$150 million, to help hire or rehire 2,020 additional law enforcement officers.
- The response to this limited program demonstrated the magnitude of unmet needs for more officers on America's streets. Under the PHSP, money was available to fund fewer than one in 10 of all applications received.

- The President and Congress responded to public demands for safer streets by enacting the **Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994** in September 1994.
- To expedite the hiring of more law enforcement officers, Congress directed the Department to spend up to \$200 million of the \$1.3 billion appropriated for FY 1995 to fund additional proposals from the 2,506 applicants to the PHSP that were not funded.

**PRESIDENT CLINTON ANNOUNCES NEW CRIME BILL GRANTS
TO PUT POLICE OFFICERS ON THE BEAT**

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- Just a dozen days after money became available, President Clinton today announced the first round of police hiring grants under the new crime bill, an important step toward his goal of putting 100,000 police on America's streets. More than \$200 million in grants were awarded to communities in all 50 states and Puerto Rico, including 332 police departments, 46 sheriffs' departments, six Indian tribal groups, and several other law enforcement agencies. The crime bill authorizes money to increase the number of police in America by twenty percent.

At a White House ceremony today, President Clinton, accompanied by Vice President Al Gore and Attorney General Janet Reno welcomed mayors and chiefs of police from many of the jurisdictions receiving grants.

"Today's announcement comes only a month after the crime bill was signed into law, and less than two weeks after the money became available at the beginning of the fiscal year," said Reno. "By wedding new money and existing applications, we were able to cut red tape and put police on the street more quickly."

(MORE)

The grants announced today will help jurisdictions hire 2,770 new officers. Coupled with previous police hiring grants, these awards bring the total number of new officers funded under President Clinton to nearly 4,900 in more than 600 communities across America. Over the next year, up to 10,000 additional officers will be funded.

The crime bill's Cops on the Beat program, signed into law by President Clinton last month, provides \$8.8 billion in competitive grants for state and local law enforcement agencies to hire community policing officers and to implement community policing.

Community policing is designed to complement traditional policing by forging effective, innovative crime prevention partnerships between law enforcement and the community. "This money is a down payment on a safer America," said Reno. These officers will help America's communities, large and small, to increase their police forces and create problem-solving partnerships to fight crime," Reno said today.

PHASE I AWARDS

Three hundred and ninety-two jurisdictions, located in all 50 states and Puerto Rico, received awards in this phase. Sixty-eight awards totaling almost \$104 million were made to jurisdictions with populations of 150,000 or above. These included \$3 million grants to the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department and the Honolulu Police, \$2.5 million to the Puerto Rico Police, a \$2.1 million grant to the New York City Transit Authority Police, and awards of \$2 million or less to 64 cities and counties.

Three hundred twenty-four awards totalling more than \$96 million were made to jurisdictions with populations of less than 150,000. These included 19 grants to

(MORE)

jurisdictions with populations of 100,000 to 150,000; 62 to jurisdictions of 50,000 to 99,999; 83 to jurisdictions between 25,000 and 49,999; and 84 to jurisdictions of under 25,000 population.

Jurisdictions receiving awards today include:

- the New York City Transit Authority, which will use 28 new officers to patrol buses in addition to subways;
- Navassa, North Carolina, which will use the grant to start a police department;
- Whittier, Alaska, population 294, surrounded by glaciers and accessible only by rail or ship, but prone to significant seasonal drug and crime problems;
- the Lummi Indian Reservation Nation in Washington, which will use the grant to assign full-time officers to fight escalating domestic violence and youth crime; and
- many jurisdictions that will deploy community policing officers on foot, on bicycles, in schools and in public housing projects.

GRANT SELECTION PROCESS

The law enforcement agencies funded today demonstrated a significant public safety and economic need, along with a sound strategy to explain how hiring additional sworn officers would develop or expand community policing. These agencies also outlined how they planned to use additional resources from the community to support their efforts, as well as how they intended to continue community policing and retain the new positions after the grant expires in three years.

(MORE)

The applicants were chosen from the 2,506 not funded under the Department of Justice's 1993-94 Police Hiring Supplement program or from the Bureau of Justice Assistance earlier this year. Although the money was drawn primarily from crime bill appropriations, the Department used the Supplement program's selection process to determine who would receive awards.

GRANT FUNDING

In order to make funds available for many jurisdictions, today's awards include an overall cap on the amount of the award. The federal share for each officer may not exceed the greater of 75 percent of the total salary and benefits over the three-year life of the grant, up to a maximum of \$75,000; or 50 percent of the total salary and benefits for the life of the grant. Phase I recipients may spend grant money only on salaries and benefits.

Provisions were made to reduce or waive the local share requirement for jurisdictions requesting and documenting extraordinary economic hardships. Sixteen of today's award recipients will receive waivers.

FUTURE AWARDS

The crime bill authorizes a total of \$8.8 billion for police hiring grants, approximately \$200 million of which was announced today. An additional \$1.1 billion in grants will be announced over the next twelve months. Applications and program criteria are expected to be available later this Fall, and every jurisdiction in the nation will be eligible whether or not they have applied for or received a grant.

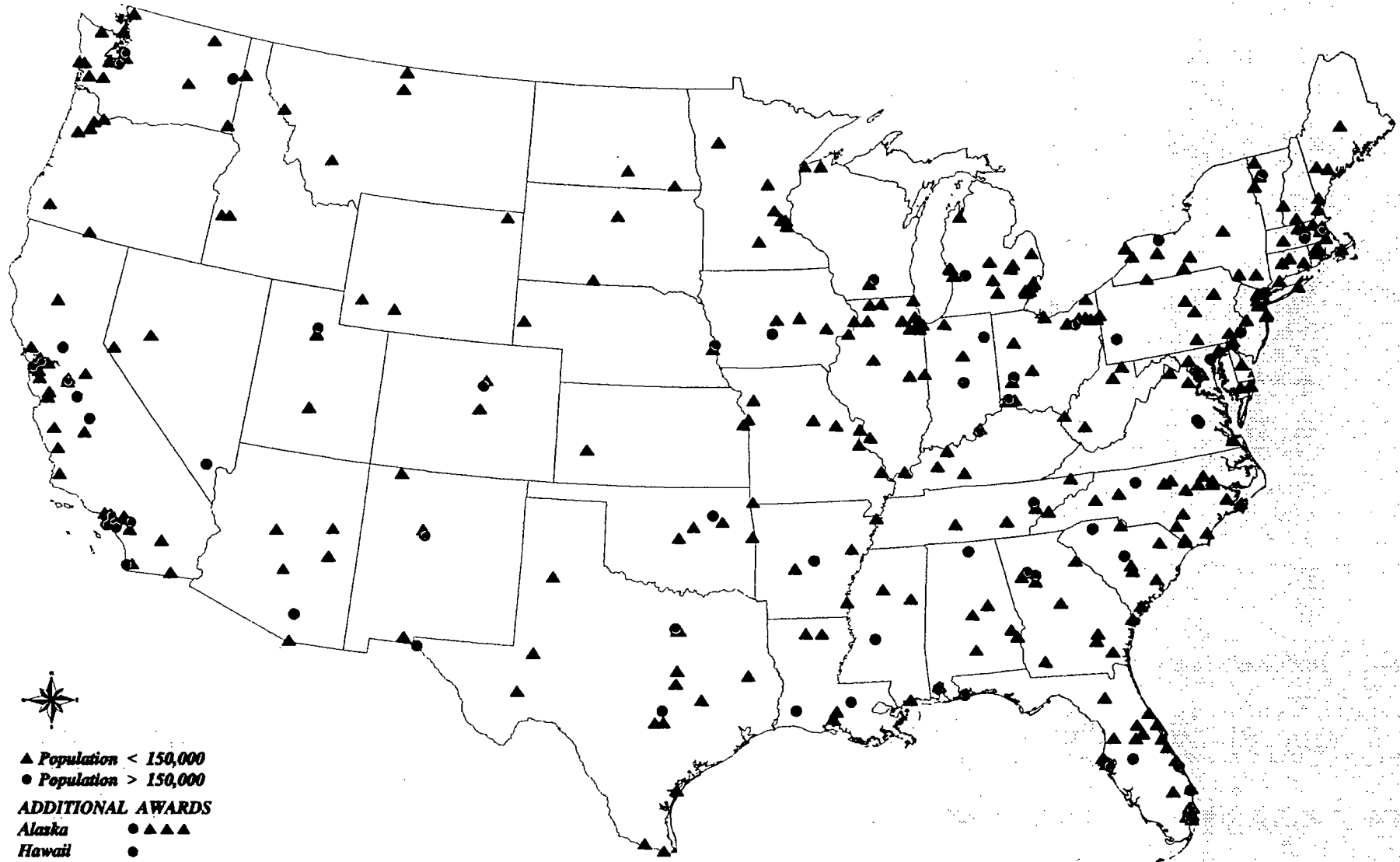

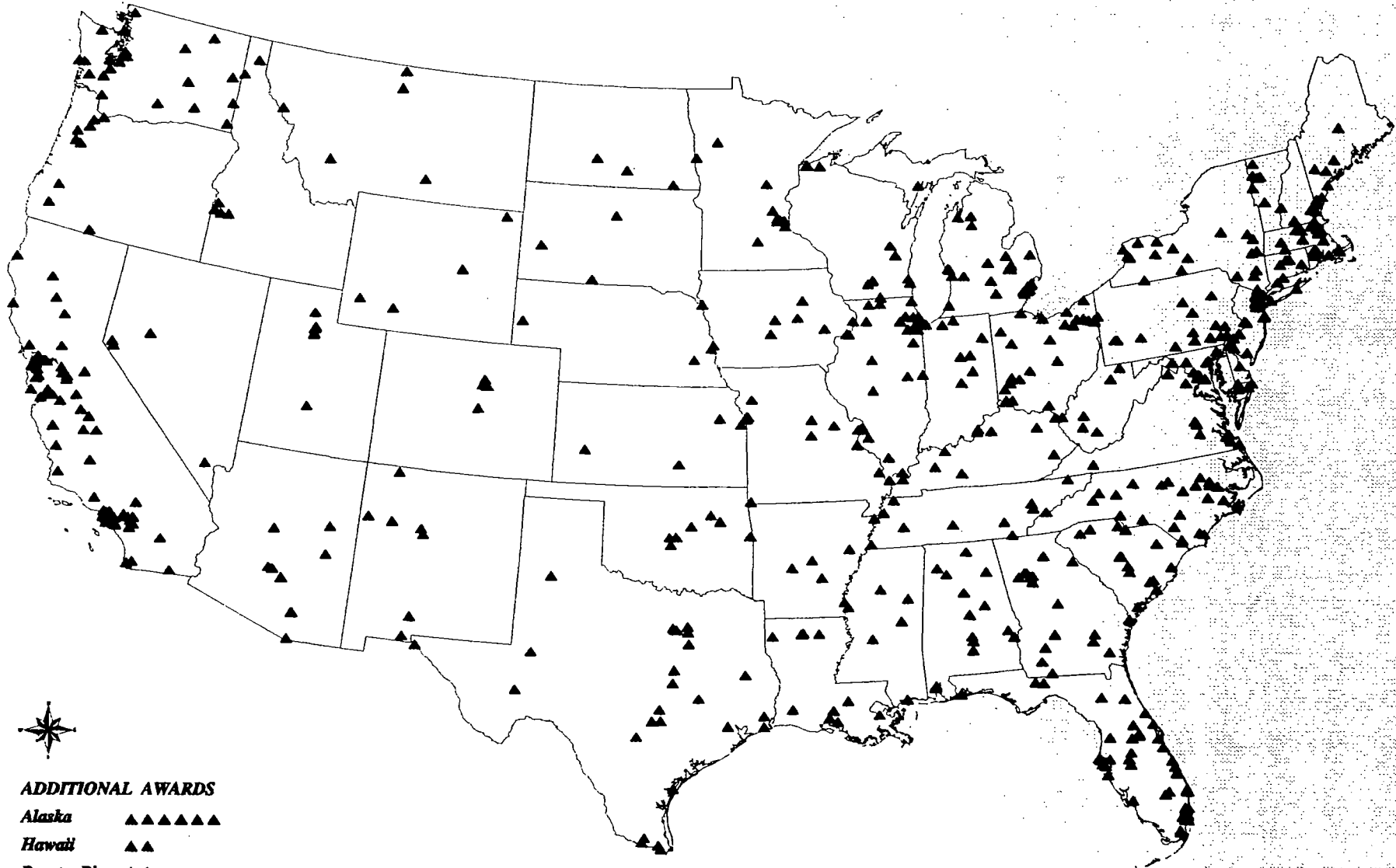
NEW POLICE FROM THE CRIME BILL
