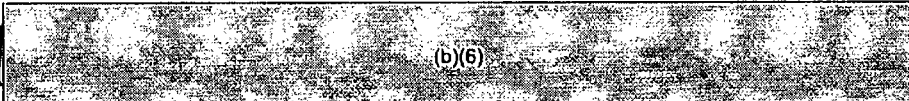

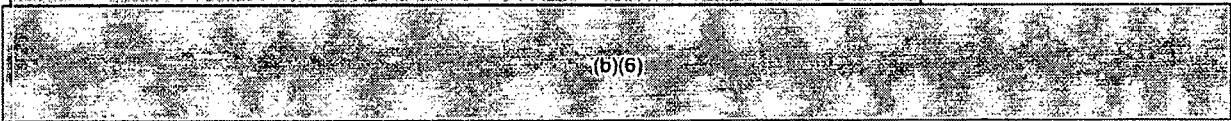

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Biography

HANNA HOLBORN GRAY

The Harry Pratt Judson Distinguished Service Professor of History,
The University of Chicago

Hanna H. Gray was President of the University of Chicago from July 1, 1978 through June 30, 1993, and is now President Emeritus.

Mrs. Gray is a historian with special interests in the history of humanism, political and historical thought, and politics in the Renaissance and the Reformation. She taught history at the University of Chicago from 1961 to 1972 and is now the Harry Pratt Judson Distinguished Service Professor of History in the University of Chicago's Department of History.

[003] [REDACTED] (b)(6) She received her B.A. degree from Bryn Mawr in 1950 and her Ph.D. in history from Harvard University in 1957. From 1950 to 1952, she was a Fulbright Scholar at Oxford University.

She was an instructor in Bryn Mawr in 1953-54 and taught at Harvard from 1955 to 1960. She returned to Harvard as a Visiting Lecturer in 1963-64.

In 1961, she became a member of the University of Chicago's faculty as Assistant Professor of History. She became Associate Professor in 1964.

Mrs. Gray was appointed Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences and Professor of History at Northwestern University in 1972. In 1974, she was elected Provost of Yale University with an appointment as Professor of History. From 1977 to 1978, she also served as Acting President of Yale.

She has been a Fellow of the Newberry Library, a Fellow of the Center of Behavioral Sciences, a Visiting Scholar at that center, a Visiting Professor at the University of California at Berkeley, and a Visiting Scholar for Phi Beta Kappa. She is also an Honorary Fellow of St. Anne's College, Oxford.

Mrs. Gray is a member of the Renaissance Society of America. She is a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and a member of the American Philosophical Society, the National Academy of Education, and the Council on Foreign Relations of New York. She holds honorary degrees from a number of colleges and universities, including Oxford, Yale, Brown, Columbia, Princeton, Duke, Harvard, and the Universities of Michigan and Toronto.

She is a trustee of Bryn Mawr College, the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, the Howard Hughes Medical Institute, and the Marlboro School of Music, and is a Regent of the Smithsonian Institution.

In addition, Mrs. Gray is a member of the boards of directors of J.P. Morgan & Company, the Cummins Engine Company, Atlantic Richfield Company, Ameritech, and the Council on Foreign Relations.

Mrs. Gray was one of twelve distinguished foreign-born Americans to receive a Medal of Liberty award from President Reagan at ceremonies marking the rekindling of the Statue of Liberty's lamp in 1986. In 1991, she received the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian award, from President Bush. She received the Charles Frankel Prize from the National Endowment of the Humanities and the Jefferson Medal from the American Philosophical Society in 1993.

Her husband, Charles M. Gray, is a Professor in the Department of History at the University of Chicago.

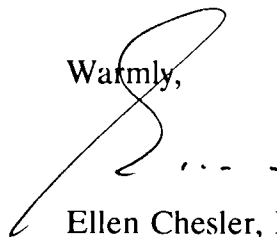

Greetings from the Graduate Theological Union in Berkeley!

I write with reference to the recent appointment by President Clinton of a 15-member National Bioethics Advisory Commission (NBAC), chaired by Harold Shapiro of Princeton University.

Only one member of the Commission, James Childress of the University of Virginia, is an expert in the field of religious studies and bioethics. I want to propose that Professor Karen Lebacqz of the Graduate Theological Union be added to the Commission.

Dr. Lebacqz is a member of the GTU faculty and has distinguished herself in the fields of religious studies and bioethics. She is a well-known author, directs our program in Bioethics (which is affiliated with the Stanford University School of Medicine), and has conducted scholarly research at the intersection of public health, bioethics, religion, law, and women's studies. She would be an invaluable addition to the Commission, as this interdisciplinary perspective seems now to be missing.

BREAST IMPLANT LAWSUIT

Dow Chemical told to pay \$14 million

A Nevada jury has ordered Dow Chemical to pay \$14.1 million in compensatory and punitive damages to a woman who alleges she suffered serious illness stemming from silicone breast implants.

The decision makes Dow Chemical—which owns half of the maker of the implants, Dow Corning, in a joint venture with Corning Inc.—potentially liable for billions of dollars of breast implant claims. The 13,000 women who had targeted the now-bankrupt Dow Corning may look instead to deep-pocketed Dow Chemical for compensation. Dow Chemical will appeal the decision.

In the first suit to go to trial in which Dow Chemical was the sole defendant, a Washoe District Court jury in Reno, Nev., found the company was responsible for debilitating autoimmune illnesses that Charlotte Mahlum suffered from leaking breast implants. The jury awarded her \$4.1 million in compensa-

tory damages and \$10 million in punitive damages. Mahlum received her implants following a mastectomy in 1985 and had them removed in 1993.

Mahlum originally sued both Dow Chemical and Dow Corning. The court let her case continue against Dow Chemical after Dow Corning's bankruptcy filing in May made it impossible to try a case against it. Dow Chemical General Counsel John Scriven says the company will file a motion with the Reno trial judge to "set aside the verdict on the grounds that the jury's decision was not supported by evidence." Indeed, Dow Chemical maintains there is not scientific proof the implants cause health damage attributed to them. Scriven vows his company will pursue "every legal avenue available to overturn the verdict, up to and including an appeal to the Nevada Supreme Court."

The Reno verdict does not especially alarm Harvey S. Stober, a senior analyst

with the New York City-based stockbrokerage firm Dean Witter Reynolds. He says that only if Dow Chemical loses on appeal to the judge will the case "set a dangerous precedent." Dow Chemical's stock dropped 2½ to \$68½ in the two trading days over which the jury's two-part decision was revealed.

The second largest U.S. chemical maker after DuPont, Dow Chemical has tried to stay above the ever-changing implant situation and had largely succeeded until the past nine months. Ever since the Food & Drug Administration put a moratorium on breast implants in January 1992, Dow Chemical has insisted with some success that it should not be responsible for actions of a firm, Dow Corning, in which it is merely a shareholder.

But last February, a Houston jury found Dow Chemical liable for 20% of a \$5.2 million award to Gladys Laas, for neurological damages attributed to leaking implants, with Dow Corning responsible for 80% (C&EN, Feb. 27, page 7). Other implant recipients and the financial community began to wonder if Dow Chemical would be forced to share the blame in other implant cases. The jury said Dow Chemical lent "encouragement and assistance" to Dow Corning because Dow Chemical conducted early silicone research for Dow Corning, and Dow Chemical distributed implants outside the U.S. through an Italian subsidiary.

However, the judge who presided in that case overturned Dow Chemical's liability without explaining why (C&EN, April 3, page 6). Dow Chemical had argued that the jury did not have enough evidence to find it liable. Dow Corning became responsible for the total award.

After Dow Chemical dodged the Houston jury bullet, it may have thought its liability would be limited to loss of its \$374 million investment in Dow Corning when the silicone maker filed for bankruptcy (C&EN, May 22,

page 6). But then the \$4.2 billion global settlement to compensate implant recipients for alleged damages began to unravel. The settlement included implant and material makers Bristol-Myers Squibb, Baxter Health Care, 3M, and Dow Corning. It did not include Dow Chemical, which never made implants.

The federal judge overseeing the settlement said in June that the fund was not large enough to compensate eligible women among the 248,500 U.S. women who had applied for compensation. Efforts to salvage a settlement including Bristol-Myers Squibb and Baxter Health Care, but not Dow Corning, are still under way. In April, the same federal judge also decided breast implant suits against Dow Chemical could go to trial under the laws of some states.

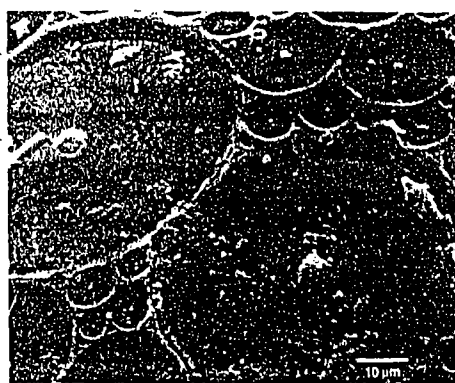
Simple method makes cell skeleton mimics

No sooner was Halloween over last week than a team of materials chemists at the University of Toronto announced discovery of a quick and simple method for making "skeletons in the beaker." The "skeletons" are self-assembling inorganic materials whose elaborate shapes and patterns mimic those in the exoskeletons of single-cell marine organisms like diatoms and radiolaria.

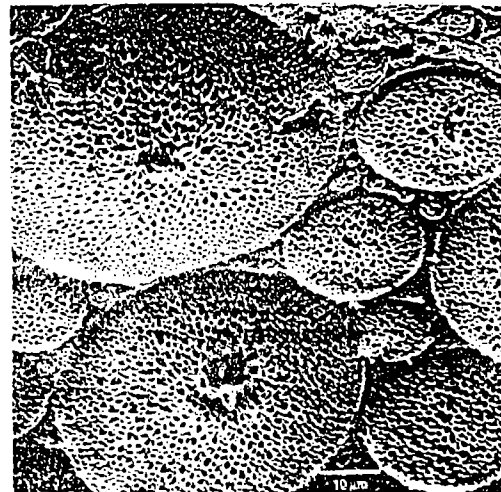
Besides aiding understanding of how nature builds skeletal structures, the work could lead to materials with novel electronic, optical, or other properties, says Toronto materials chemistry professor Geoffrey A. Ozin. Such materials might have an important impact on computer chips, bone replacement materials, industrial catalysts, separation technology, and "smart" materials that respond to changes in their environment. One chemist familiar with the work calls it "extremely exciting."

Nature uses simple, abundant minerals such as silica, calcium carbonate, and calcium phosphate to construct "an extraordinary array of exquisite architectures," Ozin notes. These architectures are seen in bones, teeth, seashells, sea urchins, corals, opals, and the microskeletons of single-cell organisms. The multi-level complexities of these structures have both delighted and puzzled scientists.

But despite much effort, chemists

haven't come close to matching nature's architectural feats. One of the biggest challenges is how to control the complexity and shape of such so-called hierarchical materials.

Now, the tide is beginning to turn, says Ozin, thanks to a "new materials synthesis paradigm" that he, graduate student Scott Oliver, and other coworkers have developed over the past three years. The method can "mimic nature's dexterity for sculpting biominerals" with intricate structural features that span three size realms—the nanoscopic (less than 10 Å), mesoscopic (10 to 1,000 Å), and macroscopic (more than 1,000 Å).

Overall, Ozin says, many of the artificial skeletons his group has generated bear a striking resemblance to naturally occurring structures, such as the delicate "lacelike" microskeletons of diatoms and radiolaria, the exquisitely sculpted spicules of marine sponges, the quiltlike patterns seen in sea urchins, and the star-dodecahedral patterns of certain rushes.

Ozin's new approach to materials synthesis is detailed in several papers—the first of which was published last week [*Nature*, 378, 47 (1995)]. Co-authored with Oliver, Alex Kuperman, Neil Coombs, and Alan Lough, the paper describes synthesis of well-ordered, stacked aluminophosphate structures using self-assembled organic vesicles (hollow sacs) as templates.

The recipe, notes *Nature* chemistry editor Philip Ball in the same issue, "sounds alarmingly simple: throw together phosphoric acid and pseudo-boehmite (a hydrated aluminum oxide) in tetraethylene glycol in the presence of an alkylamine; heat, dry, and [crystal-

lize]." The millimeter-sized aluminophosphate spheroids produced show intricate surface features like disks, ridges, pores, platelets, and honeycomb arrays.

Ozin believes that the alkylammonium dihydrogen phosphate bilayers, which initially form, interact with the tetraethylene glycol to produce contiguous arrays of vesicles around which the aluminophosphate is deposited. The bowl-shaped craters on these spheroids, he thinks, are the imprints of vesicles packed together like soap bubbles. And the finer scale patterns may arise from precipitation of aluminophosphate into specific domains in the vesicle walls. But this explanation is still speculative.

Although heating is a necessary step in the chemistry detailed in the *Nature* paper, Ozin tells C&EN that subsequent papers will describe room-temperature reactions with a number of other chemical systems.

Praxair makes hostile bid for CBI Industries

Praxair has made a hostile \$2.1 billion bid for Oakbrook, Ill.-based CBI Industries, parent to carbon dioxide maker Liquid Carbonic. The cash tender offer to CBI stockholders comes after failure of six months of merger negotiations between the two and of a bid to CBI's board of directors.

Liquid Carbonic is the largest carbon dioxide business worldwide. Praxair is a power in the air separation business but lacks carbon dioxide capabilities. Its only major stake in carbon dioxide
