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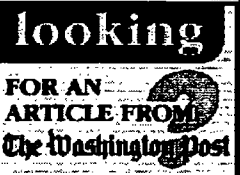
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Clinton Asks Chileans to Keep Faith

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) -- In a land where memories of dictatorship still are painfully fresh, President Clinton is warning the democracies of Latin America that it is time to translate political freedom into tangible benefits.

"Some Latin democracies have not been that way all that long, and we cannot afford to have conditions in which ordinary people ... lose faith," Clinton told American and Chilean business executives on the first day of his four-day visit to Santiago.

He planned to reinforce that message in an address to the Chilean Congress today in the port city of Valparaiso.

In a sign of how recently Chile reclaimed its democracy, former dictator August Pinochet remains a senator for life under the constitution he put in place before being voted out of office in 1990.

Pinochet, 82, has been in poor health, and Chilean officials said Thursday it was unlikely he would attend today's speech by Clinton. Chile's lower house of Congress earlier this month rejected a motion to impeach the former strongman, reflecting the deep political divisions over Pinochet among Chileans.

His success in turning Chile into a model of economic reform in Latin America has made him a popular figure with large segments of Chilean society and throughout South America.

National security adviser Sandy Berger said Pinochet's presence or absence would have no bearing on the president's speech. Either way, Berger said, Clinton planned to take note of "the history of this country and the extraordinary courage of the Chilean people in regaining their democracy after several decades of turmoil."

Clinton's message to the Chileans was that democracy must deliver tangible results if it is to endure and flourish. Those benefits, the president says, should include a rising standard of living, press freedom, an honest judiciary and respect for human rights.

The private group Human Rights Watch said Chile "still suffers from two of the most persistent human rights issues plaguing the region: impunity for past abuses and restrictions on freedom of expression."

In a toast to Chilean President Eduardo Frei at Thursday night's state

dinner, Clinton praised the resilience of the Chilean people during 17 years of dictatorship.

"In the darkest days ... when dissent was suppressed, when people were denied a meaningful vote and true leaders denied the chance to lead, the Chilean people never abandoned hope that one day things would get better," he said.

He praised Frei for trying to extend the benefits of the democracy to all his people.

"You've worked hard to ensure that your growing prosperity will benefit not just the few, but everyone," Clinton said.

Earlier Thursday, Clinton and Frei signed a series of agreements to ease trade disputes and promote advances in fighting drugs, protecting the environment and encouraging education.

Clinton had hoped to be able to deliver to Chile permanent membership in the free-trade agreement that now links the United States with Canada and Mexico -- a promise he made four years ago.

But the president has been unable to win from Congress "fast track" trade negotiating authority needed -- with U.S. labor and environmental groups leading the opposition.

"Be patient with us. ... Just stay with us. We'll get there," he said.

The president underscored his interest in seeing prosperity reach all Chileans by visiting the working-class neighborhood of San Miguel in South Santiago, where thousands of residents lined the Gran Avenida to cheer him.

Across town, police used tear gas and water cannons to disperse an anti-Clinton crowd of several thousand students who were blocking traffic and burning American flags.

Clinton visited a ceramics factory and sat down for a roundtable with a handful of Chileans who have used government supported social programs to gain training and start businesses.

"I've grown enormously as a person," said Wilma Rivera, a seamstress who runs a tailoring shop.

Even in such friendly settings, Clinton's difficulties back home were not forgotten entirely. As Clinton was meeting with the Chileans, Paula Jones was announcing that she would appeal the dismissal of her sexual harassment lawsuit against the president.

The president said he had more important things to think about.

"I spent my day today with people who are interested in human problems and human promise and not so interested in politics," he told reporters. "And I don't think I ought to be commenting on politics while I'm here."

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Clinton Speaks to Chilean Congress

VALPARAISO, Chile (AP) -- President Clinton cheered Chile's reclaiming of its democracy and called it a model for Latin America for the 21st century. But he told lawmakers on Friday a "second generation of reforms" is needed across the region for democracy to spread its roots.

"There are still too many citizens who exercise their right to vote, but, after the election is over, feel few benefits from the decisions made by their officials," Clinton told the National Congress.

Gen. Augusto Pinochet, the Chilean military dictator ousted in 1990 after 17 years of authoritarian rule, chose not to attend. Pinochet, 82, is a "senator for life" in the Congress.

Clinton, in a well-received speech in the spacious marbled-lined congressional chamber, did not mention Pinochet but said a strong democracy "honors its soldiers for their commitment to defend the people, not rule them."

And, in another pointed reference, Clinton declared: "I know here I am in a roomful of people who love freedom." It drew a loud round of applause.

Clinton came to this bustling port city on the Pacific to address the National Congress on the eve of a 34-nation summit of Western Hemisphere leaders. He called the second Summit of the Americas the next step "in our united efforts to build strong democracies that deliver for all of our peoples."

A few hours after Clinton spoke a light earthquake struck the area. It was felt in Valparaiso and Santiago 100 miles inland, but White House aides with Clinton in Vina, near Valparaiso, said he did not feel the temblor.

Clinton later paid an afternoon visit to the town of Casablanca, about 19 miles southeast of Valparaiso. Thousands of villagers crammed into the town square to welcome him and youngsters hung out of trees, waving at the president. Clinton went to an elementary school for an informal discussion with townspeople.

Fidel Castro's Cuba is the only remaining nation in the hemisphere without a democratically elected government -- and the only one excluded from the weekend session.

"Freedom's victory now has been won throughout the Americas. With a single exception, the day of the dictators is over," Clinton said. "The 21st century will be a century of democracy."

The summit is to be held in Santiago, the Chilean capital. Valparaiso is the seat of Congress.

"As Chileans understand perhaps more clearly than any of their fellow Americans, there must be a second generation of reforms beyond free elections and free markets," Clinton said.

He listed improvements in education, environmental protection, worker rights protections, the independence of judges and the professionalism of police.

"Leaders must ensure that the political system, the legal system, the economic system are not rigged in favor of those who already have much, but instead give everyone a stake in shaping the future."

It had not been known beforehand whether Pinochet would attend the joint session. Pinochet took over in a 1973 coup and ruled with an iron hand until he was removed from office in an election in 1990. However, he stayed on as head of the military until just last month. He sent a note to the Senate citing health reasons for not attending the address.

Afterwards, Jim Steinberg, Clinton's deputy national security adviser, said it would not have mattered had Pinochet been in the audience. "From our perspective, the president came to give the strong message he was prepared to give whether Pinochet was there or not."

Before his address, Clinton shook hands with Juan Pablo Letelier, a legislator who is the son of Orlando Letelier, a Chilean diplomat who was assassinated in Washington in 1976 in a car bombing.

An investigation of the bombing that killed Letelier and an aide led to the convictions in Chile of the former head of the nation's secret police in Pinochet's government and an aide.

When Pinochet was voted out of office, "freedom-loving people everywhere in the world cheered and cheered," Clinton said.

"No one loves freedom more than those who have had it and lost it. No one prizes it more than those who lost it and regained it."

In introducing Clinton, Senate President Andres Zaldivar said Chile was thankful for a strengthening relationship with the United States, which he called "deeply rooted in the international defense of freedom and of human rights of all people."

Manuel Munoz, a 51-year-old carpenter who finds work only sporadically, spent Friday pulling beer and soda cans out of wave-battered rocks off Chile's sun-splashed Pacific coast only miles from the National Congress.

He said he had no time or patience to watch Clinton's address to the National Congress, but said he would welcome anything world leaders could do to end his poverty.

"Whether we have free trade across the Americas or not, it's all the same to me. Look what I have to do just to make a living," said Munoz, hoisting a plastic trash bag full of cans.

"I put up cabinets and make furniture whenever I can get work. But life is difficult," he said, adding he only made \$280 in a good month.

Samuel Avaria, 23, said he was too young to remember the worst of the military dictatorship, but said he felt promises being made by leaders ahead of the hemispheric summit were unlikely to be fulfilled.

Meanwhile, leaders began gathering in Santiago for Saturday's start of the Summit of the Americas. Peruvian President Alberto Fujimori said the force of the Chilean economy was an inspiration to the rest of Latin America.

"I have no doubt that this event will be a success, a success inspired by what Chile has done to strengthen its economy," Fujimori said.

The Peruvian leader expressed disappointment, however, that Castro would not be attending. He said Castro "should be allowed to come here to express his views and listen to the criticism of him."

Paraguayan President Juan Carlos Wasmosy also called Cuba's exclusion "most regrettable."

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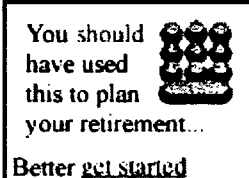
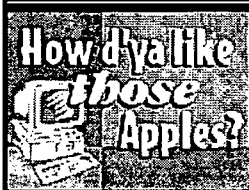
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Clinton Assures Americas on Trade

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) -- Leaders of the hemisphere's 34 democracies, charting plans for a free-trade zone from Alaska to Cape Horn, won a pledge Saturday from President Clinton to redouble efforts to win crucial fast-track trade-negotiating authority from Congress.

"I assure you that our commitment ... will be in the fast lane of our concerns," Clinton told the second Summit of the Americas, brushing aside his inability to win support for the initiative from U.S. lawmakers and, more particularly, from his own Democratic Party.

But the other nations, while sympathetic to Clinton's plight, were forging ahead, with or without the United States. "We are not starting from zero," Brazilian President Eduardo Frei told the summit meeting. He cited free-trade pacts rapidly being forged among Latin American neighbors.

Although trade was the centerpiece, the leaders moved first toward something less politically controversial, embracing a \$6.1 billion three-year package to help improve education.

Summit partners have set a 2010 goal for 100 percent of the hemisphere's children to have access to at least a primary-school education; 75 percent for high school.

Most of that would be in loans by international lending agencies, but \$130 million would come from U.S. programs, said U.S. officials, who announced the program in advance of Sunday's final summit communique.

In all, the hemispheric summit was announcing some \$45 billion in loans over the next three years for poverty reduction, health services, helping small businesses and education.

Touching on the education theme, Clinton said too many countries put their emphasis on supporting "higher education for the few." Instead, he said, the aim should be to improve the quality of education for all.

Clinton, host of the first Summit of the Americas in Miami in 1994, was the opening speaker for the second one.

"The journey from Miami to Santiago has been filled with progress toward our goals," Clinton said buoyantly. "There is much to be

proud of. The economy of the region has grown 15 percent. Last year, average growth was 5 percent and inflation was the lowest in 50 years."

But, Clinton said, not enough of the those in this "thriving market of 800 million people" were sharing in the economic good times.

"We must take further steps to lift people from poverty and spread the benefit of progress to every member of society," Clinton said.

But the self-congratulatory declarations by some of the summit participants obscured some major irritants. Latin American countries remain resentful toward the U.S. practice -- mandated by Congress -- to unilaterally certify each year which countries are "worthy" allies in the war against drugs.

The summit is expected to adopt a measure calling for more coordination on anti-drug efforts, but the move won't affect the disliked U.S. certification practice, Clinton aides conceded.

Colombian President Ernesto Samper said he would insist on the creation of a multilateral body to evaluate nations' efforts to combat illegal drugs.

"Colombia was victimized by decertification (by the United States) for more than two years," Samper said. "Since then, we have opposed whenever possible unilateral certification."

Under U.S. law, the State Department must certify a country is cooperating in the war on drugs before a nation qualifies for foreign aid, a process some Latin American countries consider high-handed.

There are also differences on Cuba. Some nations want Castro included in the next summit, to be held in Canada. The Clinton administration has opposed Cuban participation under its present communist government.

U.S. officials reacted coolly to reports that Canadian Prime Minister Jean Chretien would go to Cuba to meet with Castro.

"That of course is his decision. We would very much hope him to emphasize the importance of democracy in Cuba when he visits there," said Mack McLarty, counsellor to the president and special envoy to Latin America.

Although Cuba has an embassy here, it did not even have an observer accredited to the summit.

Alberto Fujimori, Peru's leader, said Cuba's exclusion was "unfair because the country is no threat to anybody."

"The Cuban president should be allowed to come here to express his views and listen to the criticism of him," he said.

Despite Clinton's upbeat tone, the formal launching of the free-trade negotiations was clouded by his inability to get the go-ahead from Congress.

Making this more embarrassing is that most of the opposition to fast-track authority comes from Clinton's own Democratic party. Labor unions and environmental groups oppose further expansions of the North American Free Trade Act (NAFTA) which now links the United States, Mexico and Canada.

"The United States may not yet have fast-track legislation but we will," he said.

Frei, in his welcoming remarks as host, said he hoped the weekend meetings would "give a definitive push toward the creation of a hemispheric community."

But he also noted that Chile and many of its neighbors had already entered into free-trade agreements. For instance, Chile recently signed such a pact with Canada. Brazil, Argentina, Uruguay and Paraguay already have such a trading block among themselves and with Chile.

Frei said that steps toward linking Latin American economies have been "frankly spectacular."

The leaders met at a long table in a large ballroom under crystal chandeliers in the Sheraton Hotel here, with flags of all attending nations behind them. They took a lunch break in a restaurant on a hill with a commanding view of this sprawling city and the snow-capped Andes Mountains behind it.

Clinton was to meet separately with the leaders of Mexico, Brazil, Canada and Argentina.

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) -- How do you get 34 heads of state to sit still long enough to say "cheese"?

President Clinton and the other leaders at the Summit of the Americas found taking their official portrait no easy task -- they squirmed like schoolboys at the class photo shoot.

On a Santiago hilltop -- the Andes Mountains obscured behind them in a pall of smog -- the democratically elected leaders of the Americas dutifully lined up on bleachers in their summit suits.

"Wave! Wave!" the photographers shouted.

But wait, someone was missing: President Carlos Menem of Argentina.

Just as the cameras were about to be snapped, Menem bounded up the bleachers, slicking back his jet black hair, a sheepish grin on his face.

Flashes popped and cameras clicked as the solemn photo went down to the history books.

Strolling away from the hilltop photo shoot, someone in a crowd thrust a saxophone into Clinton's hands. He held it aloft, a twinkle in his eyes as he admired its graceful design.

Would he break with summit protocol and give the horn a toot? World leaders watched and waited, but Clinton paused, held his breath. Then he handed the instrument back.

Moments later another hand appeared in the throng, offering Clinton a blue-bound volume of the Kama Sutra, the ancient Hindu love manual.

Clinton scanned the title, eyed the jokester, then laughed out loud before moving along to a working lunch of summit leaders.

Chileans seemed fascinated by the tight security around Clinton. The headline in one tabloid declared that the hotel where he was staying

looked like it was under a state of siege.

On television Saturday morning, one commentator remarked on how the Secret Service leaves a limousine door open as the automobile rolls along beside Clinton when he walks the ropes to greet a crowd, ready to shove him back in at a moment's notice.

Another TV commentator pointed out how far away the public and the press were kept from Clinton as he arrived at the summit -- an understandable measure, she noted, "because so many U.S. presidents have been attacked, and several have been killed."

Then he and her partner began ticking off a list of attempts and assassinations.

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) -- Although President Clinton eventually talked briefly with U.S. reporters about the Paula Jones case, the news media following him in Chile was not given much opportunity to pose questions.

At one point, a difference of opinion between the governments of the United States and Chile produced a conflict over a photo session with Clinton and Chilean President Eduardo Frei.

White House officials insisted the event was only intended for still and TV cameras -- but offered to let a reporter into the room if he or she promised not to ask questions.

Presidential spokesman Barry Toiv said that asking questions would have offended the Chilean government -- and might have jeopardized press coverage for the rest of Clinton's four-day visit.

Not wishing to abide by such restrictions to such a time-honored practice in the United States as shouting questions at politicians, reporters elected not to send anyone in. A U.S. network TV camera crew also pulled out in sympathy.

"We tried to work that out, but we didn't," Toiv said. "And I understand why they chose not to go in."

Reporters had more success getting Clinton to chat about his eating and sleeping habits.

After the president visited the San Reno storefront bar and restaurant, he stopped to talk with a local reporter who asked what he had eaten and whether he was tired after his redeye flight from Washington.

Just a Coke, he said to the former question. To the latter: "I'm going to go back and get a little nap, and then I'll be fine tonight."

Then, as long as he was stopped, Clinton answered questions from Washington reporters about the Jones' matter and Kenneth Starr's investigation.

"I shouldn't be commenting on domestic politics while I'm overseas," he said.

That's a new rule for the president, who regularly discusses issues back home while visiting foreign countries.

Salmon and grapes and mushrooms were on the table during the U.S.-Chilean meeting -- but not for consumption.

All three came up as the subject of trade disputes.

U.S. Trade Representative Charlene Barshefsky said the two sides felt "those issues were proceeding in an appropriate manner" toward resolution.

Presidential adviser Mack McLarty had a novel way of assessing the president's reception in Chile. He noted that as Clinton's motorcade passed a building site in Santiago, about 200 construction workers waved in greeting.

"That's a pretty good poll," McLarty said. "Usually, they're not too timid about expressing opinions."

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Clinton Aide Is Everywhere in Chile

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) -- As the two-day Summit of the Americas came to end, Thomas F. McLarty skirted the red carpet leading to Air Force One and quietly darted up the steps while the cameras focused on President Clinton.

It was just as "Mack" McLarty wanted it, an understated ending to what may have been his last big hurrah as one of Clinton's closest advisers.

McLarty has been at Clinton's side through good times and bad over the past five years, culminating in a successful stint as the president's envoy to the Americas.

The man who once was Clinton's classmate in Miss Mary's kindergarten back in Arkansas was everywhere at the weekend summit that brought together 34 heads of state from throughout the hemisphere.

National security adviser Sandy Berger joked that circulating the summit with McLarty felt a little like accompanying Gen. Douglas MacArthur on his triumphant return to the Philippines.

McLarty, the man with the tough-guy nickname that belies his easy manner, knew everyone.

"He actually introduced those I didn't know to me by name," Berger said.

McLarty was at Clinton's side as the president met with foreign leaders. He was at the president's table for dinner at El Madronal; it was McLarty at the briefing lectern gently batting away criticism of the U.S. position on Cuba and on various trade disputes.

Also, it was McLarty at every turn giving credit to his boss, the president, for making stronger hemispheric relations a high priority.

"At bottom, what we have seen at this summit is a strengthening of relationships between the countries of this hemisphere," McLarty declared Sunday at a press briefing.

Relationships are McLarty's specialty.

The tender loving care he has paid to Latin America over the past year and a half -- meeting with everyone from Guatemalan rebel

commanders to Latin American schoolchildren -- has been warmly received in a region that often feels neglected by its neighbor to the north.

"It's a great thing to have him in charge of Latin America because he's got direct access to the president," said Genaro Arriagada, former chief of staff to Chilean President Eduardo Frei and a special ambassador in charge of organizing the summit. "He's one of the few people who can just grab the phone and reach him."

Chatting with foreign correspondents, Arriagada mentioned his breakfasts with McLarty at the White House and the solicitous treatment he had received from the president's adviser, adding, "the fact that he doesn't speak Spanish doesn't really matter."

McLarty, dubbed "Mack the Nice" by some, may have been just too nice for his first job in the Clinton administration.

He started as Clinton's chief of staff but shifted to the role of adviser and confidant after some said he was not tough enough and lacked the Washington experience to run the White House operation.

At the time, McLarty suggested the job was not the right fit for him.

Now, the former chief executive office of Arkla Inc., one of America's largest natural gas companies, is widely expected to be headed back to private business.

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
