Melanne Verveer is Assistant to the President and Chief of Staff to the First Lady. As a member of the White House senior staff, she advises the President and implements a wide range of substantive policies, budget priorities, and communications strategies. She is the senior advisor to Mrs. Clinton and oversees the work of her office.

Verveer serves as the First Lady's chief assistant for all international activities, participating in global convenings, as well as White House meetings to address critical challenges such as the AIDS pandemic, the TB crisis, and the promotion of NGO development and sustainability in the emerging democracies. She has also worked with Mrs. Clinton exploring ways to enhance elite and grassroots support for America's global leadership and federal budget commitments for international affairs. Verveer works closely with the NSC, State Department and USAID and consults with foundations, the World Bank, UN agencies, representatives of governments, and non-governmental organizations.

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Verveer planned the First Lady's historic goodwill missions, including her trips to Southeast Asia, Russia, Northern Ireland, Central Europe, Africa and Latin America. She was also instrumental in developing the framework for US leadership at the UN 4th World Conference on Women in Beijing in 1995, and took the lead in establishing the President's Interagency Council on Women, which the President created to facilitate the federal government's implementation of the UN Conference Platform for Action.

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
