Controlling Release of FRY Frozen Assets
under Plan B

One of the most important implementation issues underlying the Contact Group's Plan B offer to Milosevic is how to manage release of frozen assets. If the international community fails to handle this issue properly, Milosevic could get a massive infusion of cash that he can use to rectify his economy's most pressing problems or -- if the worst happens in Croatia or Bosnia -- finance a Serbian spring offensive. In the longer term, a maladroit release of assets will also give Milosevic significant advantage over the other Yugoslav successor states by helping him increase his creditworthiness while saddling others with a disproportionate share of outstanding Yugoslav debt.

Blocked assets include bank deposits, credits, debts, real estate and tangible property. We have a good idea of what is frozen in the U.S., but it is less clear how much is held by other governments as many were not as rigorous as we were in seizing assets in the first place and some have since allowed the Serbs to draw on frozen accounts to buy humanitarian goods.

Issues to address in releasing blocked assets include

- determining ownership (successor state issues are not yet settled)
- paying depositors, creditors, and other claimants (the Yugoslav institutions and firms whose assets were frozen owed a lot of money to a lot of people -- including numerous U.S. citizens and firms; those creditors have valid claims for payment if assets are unfrozen)
- payment of war reparations and other penalties

The U.S. Government should seek a thorough international inventory of frozen assets as a first step to their orderly distribution. Then, there should be a meeting of financial and banking experts to discuss how to unblock assets with due provision for the rights of successor states and creditors. We should continue to insist on resolution language mandating that assets not be released until ownership is resolved and legal rights of successor states, creditors, and other claimants are protected.

Remember that Milosevic is a banker. He will find it hard to object to such a process, while he certainly will be quick to take advantage of any openings we give him. So long as our approach requires that claims of others be adjudicated, the time frame for releasing frozen assets is relatively long, which tends to deny Milosevic short-term access for purposes we might find objectionable and preserves some leverage for settling other issues.

INFORMATION PAPER

1. Purpose. To provide information on the status of United Nation's efforts to strengthen UNPROFOR and a recommendation on the way ahead.

2. Key Points.

- The Deputies Committee has reiterated its support for strengthening UNPROFOR but requested more information on UN intentions, objectives, rationale, and operational impact.

- The UN's objective is to implement the Cessation of Hostilities (COH). The rationale is that the COH is the best mechanism for achieving a negotiated political settlement in Bosnia. If the COH fails, UNPROFOR withdrawal may follow. The operational impact of this uncertainty between strengthening and withdrawal is that the UN is accepting some offers made pursuant to the Hague initiative, but holding on others. Therefore, the UN intends to wait on the outcome of Cessation of Hostilities implementation (agreed zones of separation and heavy weapons exclusion zones) before committing to strengthening UNPROFOR with more robust capabilities. The UN does not support using more robust means to ensure the delivery of humanitarian aid.

- The UN has accepted offers of transport helicopters for the mobility they have long desired. Transport helos have been offered by UK (6 LYNX, 6 GAZELLE, and 3 CHINOOK), and France (4 PUMA and 6 GAZELLE). Netherlands transport helos are not required by the UN at this time according to UNDPKO.

- The UN has also accepted all offers of UNMOs (100 requested, 128 offered).

- The US offer of night vision devices has been formally accepted (USUN 040129Z Jan 95).

- The UN has agreed to accept the 58 oversnow vehicles offered by Sweden.

- The UN is requesting more information from nations which offered engineering equipment. France offered 300 combat engineers and Indonesia has offered an engineering battalion. The UN has formally requested more information from the USG on the 20 bulldozers, 10 roadgraders, and 50 dump trucks we offered, specifically with regard to spares (data provided to UN on 17 Feb 95). The UN probably assumes they will need all

items mentioned above whether the strengthening or withdrawal scenario occurs.

- Regarding infantry, mech infantry, and APC offers, the UN has put a "hold" on accepting offers until a clearer picture emerges on COH implementation. "Hold" means the UN is planning to accept the offers if the COH or similar peace plan is implemented. They are gathering information, but not committing to accept the offers until they know if UNPROFOR will withdraw or remain.

- The UN Department of Peace Operations has informed the USUN that the UN is "unable to accept our offer" of 14 AH-1s and 5 OH-58s, per UN FAX dated 16 Feb 95.

- The spread sheet attached displays all offers made by UNPROFOR troop contributors since the CHODs met at the Hague in December 94.

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FUNDING UNPROFOR WITHDRAWAL: CHOICES AND DYNAMICS

SHAPE has prepared a document, NATO Withdrawal Budget Estimates (1995), dated 31 January 1995, that provides preliminary cost estimates for the implementation of SHAPE/AFSOUTH OPLAN 40104, *DETERMINED EFFORT*, a NATO-conducted withdrawal of UNPROFOR from Croatia and Bosnia-Herzegovina. The OPLAN does not consider evacuation of assets currently stationed in the Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia.

According to the SHAPE estimate, OPLAN 40104 will take six months to execute, involve a multi-national force of approximately 70,000 ground, air and naval personnel, and cost approximately \$1.9B at minimum. This cost estimate breaks down as follows: about \$515M for NATO common costs (i.e., common procurement and O&M costs); \$1.4B in national costs (personnel, equipment and sustainment costs for all troop-contributing nations); and \$37.2M for the evacuation of 31,000 UNPROFOR personnel, 9,400 vehicles and related equipment.

Organizations involved in military operations in and around the former Republic of Yugoslavia have not developed a single, common, standardized funding mechanism for defraying costs because of the current division of operational control. Funding arrangements have been primarily threefold: (1) "blue helmet" operational costs paid through the UN's assessment system; (2) NATO members "paying their own way" for costs associated with their forces supporting the UN Security Council mandate (e.g., SHARP GUARD and DENY FLIGHT); and (3) NATO using its Military Budget to pay NATO common costs.

A detailed funding mechanism for UNPROFOR withdrawal, that can be agreed to by the various organizations involved, will have to be devised to ensure the success of the operation. There are four possible options (all costs use OPLAN estimates as a base).

UN Funding Option: This option would entail the UN paying for all costs associated with the operation to include military and civilian elements engaged in planning, execution or support. It uses the standard UN peacekeeping assessment process which assesses member states for a percentage share of the total operational costs. U.S. share would be 30.4%, or approximately \$590M plus the incremental costs for forces and other support paid up front, less any reimbursements. Each country contributing to the operation would be required to pay incremental costs up front and be reimbursed by the UN for personnel and other support later.

"Pay-Your-Own Way" Option: This option entails each participating nation, organization, and non-governmental organization, paying its own evacuation costs without the expectation of reimbursement from another organization. The cost to the U.S. would be contingent upon the level of support the U.S. furnished (number of personnel, airlift, CAS, etc.). UN members, including the U.S. may also be assessed for the cost of evacuating the non-NATO troops UNPROFOR troops if this costs was borne by the UN. The estimated cost to the U.S. using this approach is \$600M to \$1B for incremental costs associated with operational support..

NATO Funding Option: NATO members would be obligated to pay the entire cost of the operation. It currently pays for only common costs in FRY through its Military Budget. NATO accounts have never been used before to carry the full cost of a military operation. One approach to funding the operation would be to use the NATO national cost share formula to set the assessment rate for each NATO member (U.S. share 25% or approximately \$490M plus the incremental costs for operational support minus any reimbursements). This approach assumes also that non-NATO UNPROFOR nations would not be assessed by NATO for the accrued costs. Each NATO nation contributing forces and support would pay its own incremental costs up front. Later reimbursement by NATO is problematic.

"Hybrid Option": This option uses two approaches. Non-NATO UN member states pay for a portion of the total cost of the operation at their regular UN peacekeeping rate (non-NATO UN member assessments total 32% of the UN peacekeeping budget). These costs would be paid into a UN fund that would be used to fund the cost of non-NATO forces in the operation and UN administrative and support costs. NATO nations would pay the other portion and not be assessed by the UN, but pay under the NATO national cost share formula described above. The cost to the U.S. under this approach would be approximately \$330M plus incremental operational support costs less reimbursements. If the operational cost was allocated based on the proportion on NATO and non-NATO troop strength, the U.S. cost may be reduced to \$225M (plus incremental support costs less reimbursements) since 54% of the UNPROFOR troops are non-NATO.

NATO and the UN have been discussing cost sharing arrangements for funding a potential withdrawal operation for several months, with no tangible results. Indeed, in recent correspondence to NATO SYG Claes, UN SYG Boutros-Ghali stated his assumption that, in the case of an UNPROFOR withdrawal, NATO would bear the costs. NATO Permanent Representatives were sharply critical of this position, and agreed that SYG Claes would tell Boutros-Ghali that funding arrangements for such an operation were to be the subject of future negotiations between the two organizations.

While NATO has set no specific timetable for entering into these negotiations, military planning factors and operational timing requirements may play a significant role in determining the final funding scheme. They therefore merit serious consideration in the overall context of this evolving situation.

SACEUR indicates that he must have a pre-positioned command and control/logistics infrastructure in place to execute the OPLAN. His preference is that this operating base be established prior to execution of any withdrawal operation, and in light of agreed ministerial political, military and financial guidance (i.e., formal funding arrangements). SHAPE planners estimate that it will take about three to four weeks to establish the pre-positioned support structure after a political decision to execute has been rendered by NATO Ministers.

However, if SACEUR must establish his operating base on a contingency basis (i.e., as outlined in OPLAN 40104, but without final agreement between NATO and the UN on some issues, like funding arrangements), the US government (as a NATO and UN member) may have no alternative but to accept a *de facto* funding arrangement (*a la* "Pay-Your-Own-Way"), which would leave us little hope or expectation of being reimbursed for accrued costs.

Since the Croatian government has declared 31 March the expiration date of the UN mandate there, planning, negotiations and decision making on formal funding arrangements between NATO and the UN must begin soon, lest events foreclose available options.

Dear Mr. President:

We are writing to urge immediate action by you on the war in Bosnia. While diplomats talk in the wake of former President Carter's visit to the region, there is strong reason to believe that the Bosnian Serbs will continue to reject peace. If the war in Bosnia resumes full scale, we do not believe the situation will continue as it has for the last three years. UNPROFOR's already weakened position will become even more untenable, and pressure for its withdrawal will increase.

In the event of either significant Serbian escalation or of UNPROFOR withdrawal, the case for ending the international arms embargo of Bosnia becomes even more compelling. We trust that, in such circumstances, your Administration would move expeditiously to end the United Nations embargo. Should that not be possible, however, we would expect the Congress to vote to unilaterally end participation by the United States in the embargo.

In any event, the United States has an obligation to prepare for the most likely scenarios in Bosnia. If the embargo is to be ended, either multilaterally or unilaterally, we will want to see direct U.S. involvement in the conflict held to a minimum. The surest way to minimize direct U.S. involvement after the embargo is ended is to act now to train the pro-government forces in strategy and tactics and the use of some of the weapons they are likely to obtain.

Such training would reduce the risk to the pro-government forces of any preemptive Serbian offensive, and would be an alternative to sending U.S. forces into Bosnia to provide training after the embargo is ended. Such training should be provided outside of Bosnia in order to avoid any risk to U.S. trainers. We understand that such training can be provided at a small fraction of the cost we currently are paying for the U.N. peacekeeping operation in Bosnia, and that it could be completed in less than six months. We also understand that the government of Bosnia and Hercegovina would welcome such training, and indeed already has submitted a formal request to you in this regard.

There can be no question about your authority to direct the provision of such training. Section 1404 of the 1995 Defense Department Authorization Act (the so-called Nunn-Mitchell provision) required the Administration to present options to the Congress for training the pro-government forces in Bosnia. Other provisions of law, including section 503 of the National Security Act of 1947, give you authority to deliver such training. Further, the provision of such training by the United States would not violate existing Security Council resolutions or relevant principles of international law.

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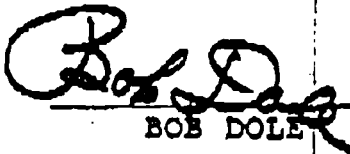

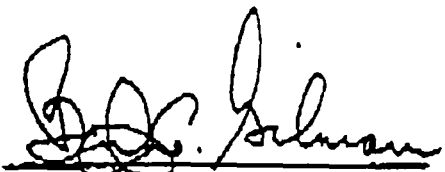
We believe you should take this step in order to be better prepared for the likely next phase of the war in Bosnia and in order to reduce the likelihood that U.S. forces will become directly involved in that war. It is important to note, however, that a program of training the pro-government forces in Bosnia would give the United States additional leverage in the ongoing negotiations with the Bosnian Serbs. Beginning a training program now would make clear to the Bosnian Serbs our determination to bring about a just and sustainable peace, and would underscore to them the probable cost of prolonging the conflict.

In other words, in the hands of able diplomats, a policy of training the pro-government forces for war could prove to be a powerful instrument for bringing about peace.

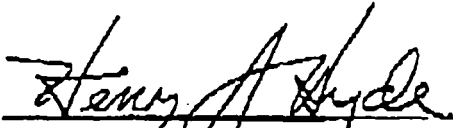
For all these reasons, we urge you to initiate promptly a program of military training for the pro-government forces in Bosnia and Hercegovina.

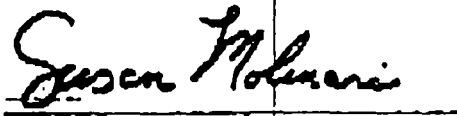

Summary of Conclusions

1. Principals met to review the U.S. position on additional sanctions relief for Milosevic in return for Serbian recognition of Bosnia, Croatia and other former Yugoslav republics within their existing borders. While they agreed that mutual recognition, in itself, will not lead to political settlements, the possibility that recognition might alter the strategic equation and head off a new war in Croatia justified the risks of our support. Therefore, Principals authorized our Contact Group representative to agree to offer a total suspension of sanctions on the FRY in return for mutual recognition, subject to the following conditions:

A. Conditions proposed by State:

- that Milosevic's recognition of Croatia, Bosnia, Macedonia and Slovenia in their internationally recognized borders be genuine and unequivocal;
- that sanctions be suspended for 2-month periods, with a positive vote by the UN Security Council required to renew each time;
- that the sanctions enforcement regime against the FRY remain in place, so that sanctions can be reimposed on short notice;
- that the "outer wall" of sanctions be kept in place, i.e. measures going beyond UNSC resolutions: no assistance from the IFIs or the EU; no granting of a UN seat to the FRY; and no readmission to OSCE (for our part, we would not recognize the FRY at this time);
- that there be a significant toughening up of the monitoring regime on the Bosnia/Serbia and Croatia/Serbia borders, including several hundred more monitors plus equipment such as radars to help deal with the helicopter problem;
- that there be continued firm adherence by Milosevic to the Contact Group plan for Bosnia;
- that Milosevic endorse the principles in the Zagreb-4 peace plan for Croatia, i.e. the reintegration of the occupied areas under Croatian sovereignty, with autonomy for historically Serb-majority areas; and
- that nothing be done to in any way affect the commitment to the War Crimes Tribunal.

B. Additional conditions added by Principals:

- that before we pursue Milosevic's recognition of Croatia, we insist that Tudjman agree to extend UNPROFOR's mandate in return for recognition.
- that the sanctions relief not go into effect until after the inter-Serbian border is more tightly closed and the Europeans have deployed the additional monitors required; and

- that we secure Tudjman's agreement to terminate economic relations with the Krajina Serbs, since this could undermine the effects of Milosevic's cut-off of support to the Krajina and permit the Bosnian Serbs to receive support through the back door.

2. Principals directed our Contact Group representative to put down a marker that, if this initiative fails and the war resumes, our partners will reciprocate our flexibility by supporting the kinds of coercive measures against the Bosnian Serbs that they agreed to previously but never implemented. We would not, however, make their commitment to such measures a quid pro quo.

3. Principals directed that talking points be prepared for dealing with the press and for briefings on the Hill. (Action: State/NSC)

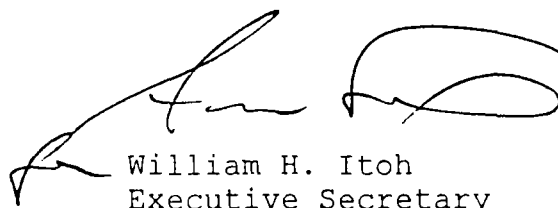

Summary of Conclusions

1. Principals reviewed the progress of efforts to renew negotiations on a political settlement, options for responding to the French proposal for an international conference, and prospects for achieving mutual recognition of all former Yugoslav Republics as a means of further isolating the Bosnian and Krajina Serbs. They agreed that recognition by Belgrade of Bosnia and Croatia, if genuine, would be a positive step toward resolving the Balkans conflict, although not a panacea. Principals approved a renewed effort with Milosevic aimed at achieving meaningful mutual recognition of all former Yugoslav Republics.

(Action: State) (S)

2. Principals discussed options for handling the French proposal for an international conference to promote cross-recognition and launch new negotiations. They agreed that a

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conference would only be useful if it is well prepared and produces positive results. Principals agreed that State should engage Contact Group partners to shape the conference agenda, making clear the conditions for U.S. support and participation.

(Action: State) ~~(S)~~

3. Principals reviewed options for suspending sanctions against Belgrade in return for cross-recognition of all former Yugoslav Republics, continued endorsement of the Contact Group plan, continued closure of the FRY border to all but humanitarian supplies for Pale and Knin, and support for the Zagreb-4 plan. They authorized discussions with Contact Group partners aimed at developing a common position on the degree of sanctions relief we would be willing to trade for recognition. Principals approved the Plan B alternative in the OVP paper as the starting position for achieving a common position, with flexibility to accept further compromises short of the full EU position. (Action: OVP/State) ~~(S)~~

4. Principals reviewed the status of NATO military planning to support UNPROFOR withdrawal from Bosnia and Croatia. They agreed that, while we should continue to press Croatia to retain at least a reduced UNPROFOR presence, our planning should assume that the Croatian decision will not be reversed. Therefore, Principals agreed to support NATO's Phase I prepositioning of communications equipment to establish a theater communications architecture that will support UNPROFOR withdrawal from Bosnia or Croatia, as well as implementation of a peace plan should a peace agreement be reached. Principals directed that talking points be prepared for calls to appropriate Congressional staff informing them of the Administration's support for Phase I prepositioning. (Action: State and NSC) ~~(S)~~

5. Principals also agreed that the U.S. could inform NATO Military Authorities of the forces the U.S. would provide to an UNPROFOR withdrawal operation from Bosnia, while reaffirming that their actual deployment would be contingent on a final review of the plans and consultations with Congress. (Action: JCS) ~~(S)~~

6. Principals discussed extending to Croatia the President's decision, in principle, to commit U.S. ground forces to a NATO operation supporting UNPROFOR withdrawal from Bosnia. They agreed to recommend to the President that he authorize U.S. participation in a NATO operation to support UNPROFOR withdrawal from Croatia should it become necessary. They directed that a decision memorandum for the President be prepared that includes the concept, rough size, and duration of the mission. (Action: NSC with JCS input) They also directed that a legislative strategy be prepared for consulting with the Congress if the

President approves the recommendation. (Action: State and NSC)

7. Principals discussed the status of efforts at the United Nations to strengthen UNPROFOR in Bosnia. Reiterating their support for the strengthening measures adopted at the December Chiefs of Defense meeting in The Hague, they requested that the Deputies review the issue and make a formal recommendation on next steps. (Action: JCS) ~~(S)~~

8. Principals discussed a longer-term strategy in the event diplomacy fails to achieve a negotiated settlement and UNPROFOR withdraws from Bosnia and Croatia. They requested more comprehensive planning on options to contain the conflict should fighting rekindle, with special emphasis on strengthening forces in Macedonia to deter expansion of the war. (Action: OSD)
Principals also requested an analysis of the impact on the region should current UN forces in Macedonia be reinforced or replaced.
