COMMUNICATION AND DATA CAPABILITIES FOR THE
PRESIDENT'S TRIP TO SANTIAGO AND VALPARAISO, CHILE
15 APRIL - 20 APRIL 1998

1. The President will be making two stops on his trip to Chile: **Santiago and Valparaiso**. These cities are the same time zone as Washington DC.

3. Some Tips on Communications:

- Documents can be sent to the traveling party via the Situation Room for processing and transmission to the WHCA Communications Center at the trip site or aboard Air Force One anytime.
 - If on the NSC computer system, E-mail these to @SDO and @WHSR both with passing instructions that provide a specific sense of your time criteria (e.g. "Pass to Jim Steinberg- he needs by 4:00pm EST for SRB Meeting with Chilean FM").
 - If not on the NSC system, deliver a copy of the document with passing instructions and a disc to the Situation Room.

- WORD documents move faster than graphics/scanned documents but in either case, **this method is slower than direct E-mail because of operator processing time at both ends and the added time it takes to locate and deliver the message at the trip site.** The advantage of this method is positive operator involvement in getting the document to the intended recipient whenever and wherever. It is useful to alert the intended recipient via a phone call but not essential.
- The Situation Room can also send documents via facsimile to the trip site and Air Force One. **This is the slowest form of data transmission and takes about one minute per page.** Clear passing instructions and specific time criteria are important. Like the case above, if you alert the intended recipient that a document is headed their way, they can inform the WHCA Communications Center of their whereabouts to speed delivery.
- After hours communications pose a number of problems for those documents sent from the Sitroom to the WHCA Communications Center at the trip site. **Please include in the passing instructions specific guidance as to whether or not to awaken the intended recipient or such other guidance suitable to this circumstance.**
- SVTS is available only in Santiago and should be scheduled through the Situation Room Communication Assistant.
- NSC Systems Trip Officers and Communication Assistants are available to assist with set-up, operations and problem-solving of the NSC LAN and SVTS.

4. A WORD ABOUT NSC E-MAIL. THIS SERVICE WILL BE AVAILABLE IN SANTIAGO ONLY AND E-MAIL CAN BE SENT TO RECIPIENTS THERE EXACTLY AS WOULD BE DONE IF THEY WERE HERE. REMEMBER, HOWEVER, THAT TRIP EVENTS REGULARLY REQUIRE THE TRAVELING PARTY TO BE AWAY FROM THE NSC OFFICE. CONSEQUENTLY, THEY WILL NOT GET A MESSAGE UNTIL THE NEXT TIME THEY LOG-ON AND REVIEW THEIR INBOX.

IF YOU NEED TO BRING SOMETHING TO THEIR ATTENTION, CC: @COMM AND INDICATE NEAR THE TOP OF THE TEXT THAT THIS IS TIME SENSITIVE AND NEEDS TO BE BROUGHT TO THE ATTENTION OF THE RECIPIENT. BOTH THE SITROOM COMM ASSISTANT AND/OR COMM ASSISTANT AT SANTIAGO WILL INTERVENE TO NOTIFY THE ADDRESSEE OF IMPORTANT E-MAIL AND ARRANGE FOR IMMEDIATE DELIVERY IF WARRANTED.

DECLARATION OF SANTIAGO

II SUMMIT OF THE AMERICAS

We, the democratically-elected Heads of State and Government of the countries of the Americas, have met in Santiago, Chile, in order to continue the dialogue and strengthen the cooperation we began in Miami in December 1994. Since that time, significant progress has been made in the formulation and execution of joint plans and programs in order to take advantage of the great opportunities before us. We reaffirm our will to continue this most important undertaking, which requires sustained national efforts and dynamic international cooperation.

The strengthening of democracy, political dialogue, economic stability, progress towards social justice, the extent to which our trade liberalization policies coincide, and the will to expedite a process of ongoing Hemispheric integration have made our relations more mature. We will redouble our efforts to continue reforms designed to improve the living conditions of the peoples of the Americas and to achieve a mutually supportive community. For this reason, we have decided that education is a key theme and is of particular importance in our deliberations. We approve the attached Plan of Action and undertake to carry out its initiatives.

Since our meeting in Miami, we have seen real economic benefits in the Americas resulting from more open trade, transparency in economic regulations, sound, market-based economic policies, as well as efforts by the private sector to increase its competitiveness. Even as countries in our region have been tested by financial and other economic pressures, and as countries in other regions have experienced serious economic setbacks, the overall course in the Americas has been one of faster economic growth, lower inflation, expanded opportunities, and confidence in facing the global marketplace. A major reason for this positive record has been our countries' steadfast and cooperative efforts to promote prosperity through increased economic integration and more open economies. New partnerships have been formed and existing ones strengthened and expanded. A positive role is being played by sub-regional and bilateral integration and free

trade agreements. We are confident that the Free Trade Area of the Americas (FTAA) will improve the well-being of all our people, including economically disadvantaged populations within our respective countries.

Hemispheric integration is a necessary complement to national policies aimed at overcoming lingering problems and obtaining a higher level of development. In its broadest sense, a process of integration based on respect for cultural identities will make it possible to shape a common, interwoven set of values and interests that helps us in these objectives.

Globalization offers great opportunities for progress to our countries and opens up new areas of cooperation for the hemispheric community. However, it can also heighten the differences among countries and within our societies. With steadfast determination to reap its benefits and to face its challenges, we will give special attention to the most vulnerable countries and social groups in the Hemisphere.

Education is the determining factor for the political, social, cultural, and economic development of our peoples. We undertake to facilitate access of all inhabitants of the Americas to preschool, primary, secondary, and higher education, and we will make learning a lifelong process. We will put science and technology at the service of education to assure growing levels of knowledge and so that educators may develop their skills to the highest level. The Plan of Action that accompanies this Declaration defines the objectives and goals we intend to achieve and the actions that will make them a reality. In order to meet our goals within the agreed timeframes, we reaffirm our commitment to invest greater resources in this important area, and to encourage civil society to participate in developing education.

The decisions adopted by our Ministers of Education at the Conference held in Mérida, Mexico, last February, reflect our desire to promote specific joint initiatives designed to improve access to education, with fairness, quality, relevancy, and effectiveness. In order to consolidate and lend continuity to our decisions, we have instructed that another Conference be held in Brasilia, Brazil, in July of this year.

Today, we direct our Ministers Responsible for Trade to begin negotiations for the FTAA, in accordance with the March 1998 Ministerial Declaration of San

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José. We reaffirm our determination to conclude the negotiation of the FTAA no later than 2005, and to make concrete progress by the end of the century. The FTAA agreement will be balanced, comprehensive, WTO-consistent and constitute a single undertaking.

We note with satisfaction the preparatory work by the Ministers Responsible for Trade over the past three years which has strengthened our trade policies, fostered understanding of our economic objectives and facilitated dialogue among all participating countries. We appreciate the significant contribution of the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB), the Organization of American States (OAS), and the United Nations Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC), acting as the Tripartite Committee.

The FTAA negotiating process will be transparent, and take into account the differences in the levels of development and size of the economies in the Americas, in order to create the opportunities for full participation by all countries. We encourage all segments of civil society to participate in and contribute to the process in a constructive manner, through our respective mechanisms of dialogue and consultation and by presenting their views through the mechanism created in the FTAA negotiating process. We believe that economic integration, investment, and free trade are key factors for raising standards of living, improving the working conditions of the people of the Americas and better protecting the environment. These issues will be taken into account as we proceed with the economic integration process in the Americas.

The region has made significant advances in both monetary and fiscal policy as well as in price stability and liberalizing our economies. The volatility of capital markets vindicates our decision to strengthen banking supervision in the Hemisphere and to establish regulations relating to disclosure and reporting of banking information.

The strength and meaning of representative democracy lie in the active participation of individuals at all levels of civic life. The democratic culture must encompass our entire population. We will strengthen education for democracy and promote the necessary actions for government institutions to become more participatory structures. We undertake to strengthen the capabilities of regional and local governments, when appropriate, and to foster more active participation

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in civil society.

Respect for and promotion of human rights and the fundamental freedoms of all individuals is a primary concern of our governments. In commemorating the fiftieth anniversary of the American Declaration of the Rights and Duties of Man and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, we agree on the need to promote the ratification and implementation of the international agreements aimed at preserving them and to continue strengthening the pertinent national and international institutions. We agree that a free press plays a fundamental role in this area and we reaffirm the importance of guaranteeing freedom of expression, information, and opinion. We commend the recent appointment of a Special Rapporteur for Freedom of Expression, within the framework of the Organization of American States.

Confident that an independent, efficient, and effective administration of justice plays an essential role in the process of consolidating democracy, strengthens its institutions, guarantees the equality of all its citizens, and contributes to economic development, we will enhance our policies relating to justice and encourage the reforms necessary to promote legal and judicial cooperation. To that end, we will strengthen national entities involved in the study of the administration of justice and expedite the establishment of a hemispheric center for studies on this subject.

We will combat all forms of discrimination in the Hemisphere. Equal rights and opportunities between men and women and the objective of ensuring active participation of women in all areas of national endeavor are priority tasks. We will continue to promote the full integration of indigenous populations and other vulnerable groups into political and economic life, with due respect for the characteristics and expressions that affirm their cultural identity. We will make a special effort to guarantee the human rights of all migrants, including migrant workers and their families.

Overcoming poverty continues to be the greatest challenge confronted by our Hemisphere. We are conscious that the positive growth shown in the Americas in past years has yet to resolve the problems of inequity and social exclusion. We are determined to remove the barriers that deny the poor access to proper nutrition, social services, a healthy environment, credit, and legal title to their property. We will provide greater support to micro and small enterprises, promote core labor standards recognized by the International Labor Organization (ILO), and use new

technologies to improve the health conditions of every family in the Americas, with the technical support of the Pan-American Health Organization (PAHO), achieving greater levels of equity and sustainable development.

With deep satisfaction, we note that peace, an essential value for human coexistence, is a reality in the Hemisphere. We underscore that Central America has become a zone of peace, democracy, and development and we recognize efforts to eliminate antipersonnel mines and to rehabilitate their victims. We will continue to foster confidence and security among our countries through such measures as those mentioned in the Santiago and San Salvador Declarations on Confidence- and Security-Building Measures. We encourage the pacific settlement of disputes.

We will lend new impetus to the struggle against corruption, money laundering, terrorism, weapons trafficking, and the drug problem, including illicit use, and work together to ensure that criminals do not find safe haven anywhere in the Hemisphere. We are determined to persevere in this direction.

In forging an alliance against drugs and applying the Hemispheric Anti-Drug Strategy, we welcome the start of formal negotiations at the May 4 meeting of Inter-American Drug Abuse Control Commission (CICAD) to be held in Washington within the framework of the Organization of American States (OAS), to establish an objective procedure for the multilateral evaluation of actions and cooperation to prevent and combat all aspects of the drug problem and related crimes, based on the principles of sovereignty, territorial integrity of States, shared responsibility, and with a comprehensive and balanced approach.

We will strengthen national, hemispheric, and international efforts aimed at environmental protection as a basis for sustainable development that provides human beings a healthy and productive life in harmony with nature. The commitments undertaken at the Miami Summit and the Summit on Sustainable Development held in Santa Cruz de la Sierra, Bolivia, provide a solid basis for strengthening our actions. As parties to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, we underscore the importance of working together to further fulfillment of the agreement reached at the Conference in Kyoto, Japan, and to promote its ratification in our countries. Moreover, we will work closely to make preparations for a Conference of the Parties to be held in November of this year in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

We acknowledge that the development of energy links between our countries and the intensification of trade in the energy sector strengthen and foster the integration of the Americas. Energy integration, based on competitive and transparent activities, and in compliance with national conditions and objectives, contributes to the sustainable development of our nations and to the improvement of the quality of life of our people with minimum impact on the environment.

Recognizing the importance of, and positive role played by hemispheric institutions, particularly the Organization of American States (OAS), we instruct our Ministers to examine the strengthening and modernizing of these institutions.

We reaffirm our will to continue strengthening intra-hemispheric dialogue and cooperation within the framework of friendship and solidarity that inspires our nations.

THE PRESIDENT'S TRIP TO CHILE

Focus on the Americas. State visit to Chile and Santiago Summit are culmination of year-long, intense focus on Americas -- including state visits to Washington by Frei and Chretien in Feb. 1997; POTUS trip to Mexico, Central America and Caribbean in May 1997; and POTUS trip to Venezuela, Brazil and Argentina in Oct. 1997. Also next step in process POTUS began in Miami in 1994 with first Summit of the Americas: bringing Americas together around democracy, open markets, and cooperation against common threats.

=> POTUS determined to make most of quiet revolution in the Americas. Today, 34 of 35 nations embrace democracy and free markets. Decades of civil war and coups have given way to peace and stability. 42% of all U.S. exports went to FTAA countries in 1997 and U.S. exports growing faster than to any other region. 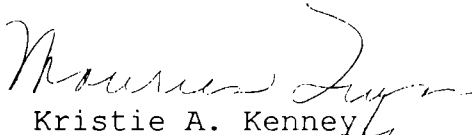

SANTIAGO: VISIT TO BUSINESS COLLEGE FOR COMMUNITY EVENT

You and President Frei will arrive in your limos and meet Mrs. Clinton and Mrs. Frei, who will arrive separately after attending a different event. The four of you will be greeted by the Mayor of San Miguel and the leadership of the college.

You will then proceed on foot down an open air, exterior walkway until you reach the glassed-in room on the left where the discussion with the community leaders takes place. The 8-10 participants will share stories of how they have been empowered through their development of micro-enterprises and how, as a result, they have been able to contribute to their community.

There is pool press coverage. President and Mrs. Frei will accompany you at this event. There will be simultaneous interpretation. You will depart after about 45 minutes of discussion.

Background

The business college is located in the municipality of San Miguel, a working-class area in the southern part of metropolitan Santiago. It is operated by the Fundacion San Pablo, a not-for-profit group which operates a number of schools in that area. The college offers a variety of technical and vocational training courses for both adults and youth focusing on business management, accounting, computer skills and marketing.

SANTIAGO: SPEECH TO BUSINESS LEADERS AT MUNICIPAL THEATER

You arrive at the Municipal Theater and enter through a side door. You will proceed to a waiting room where there will be a photo op with the 12 members of the board of the U.S.-Chile American Chamber of Commerce (AmCham), followed by another photo op with the seven sponsors of the event (six U.S. companies and one U.S.-Chilean joint venture). You will then enter the stage from the side. Other speakers have not yet been determined, but may include President Frei and AmCham President Alex Fernandez. Your podium will be on stage for your use.

Background

The Municipal Theater is the heart of Santiago's cultural life, hosting opera, ballet and major concerts. The building, constructed between 1853 and 1857, was designed by French architect Brunet des Baines (the same architect who designed the ex-Congress building). The building was reconstructed after a fire gutted the interior in 1870. After an earthquake in 1906 it was rebuilt by a different French architect, who relied upon des Baines' original designs.

The theater has seating for approximately 1,200 people (including press).

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SANTIAGO: FORMAL ARRIVAL CEREMONY AT LA MONEDA PALACE

You arrive with Mrs. Clinton by motorcade and stop at the Puerta O'Higgins (north entrance) of the presidential palace, La Moneda. (The large open Plaza de la Constitution on the other side of the car is the usual site of arrival ceremonies.) You will be met at the gate by President and Mrs. Frei. President Frei will lead you through to the other side of the portico. Mrs. Frei and the First Lady will follow.

At the portico you turn and wait for the First Ladies, then receive and acknowledge a salute from the Cordon Commander (police line the left side of the entranceway). Then you and President Frei will turn around and proceed along a red carpet to the foot of the steps at the far side of the Patio de las Naranjas (the first inner courtyard) where you will stop and turn around again. There will be musical honors as you walk past the three-platoon honor guard from the military academy, Mrs. Clinton and Mrs. Frei will follow and then wait with you and President Frei as the band plays the Chilean and American national anthems.

Then you will all move back across the courtyard, crossing again in front of the honor guard. The Presidents will proceed up the stairs on the left to President Frei's second floor office. The First Ladies break off and go to the right for separate meetings.

Background

Located in downtown Santiago, the Presidential Office Building, known as La Moneda, was constructed from 1784-1799 to house a mint; it was the largest building constructed in the Spanish colonies in the 18th century.

It was renovated in 1846 to become the private residence of Chile's presidents and continued as such until 1958. The building subsequently was restored to its original style to serve as the seat of government; it now houses key offices of the presidency. There is no official residence in use for the presidents of Chile; they live in their private residences. Then-President Salvador Allende committed suicide here during the September 11, 1973 coup, while the palace was besieged by Pinochet's troops.

REMARKS TO BUSINESS LEADERS
SANTIAGO, CHILE
APRIL 16, 1998**

I am pleased to be joined by a strong American delegation – the Secretary of State, the Attorney General, the Secretary of Education, the Secretary of Commerce, the Secretary of Energy, the National Security Advisor, the U.S. Trade Representative, my Special Envoy for the Americas, our Director for National Drug Control Policy, and [how many] distinguished Members of Congress – [WHO].

Their presence reflects the importance we attach to our growing relationship with Chile. I'm told that when this city was first founded in 1541, it was called Santiago del Nuevo Extremo [new-AY-vo ex-TREH-mo] – Santiago of the New Frontier. Now, on the verge of the 21st century, this place is once again a window through which we can see tomorrow's horizon, with a vibrant society and thriving middle class, a flourishing open economy and a commitment to liberty. All of you are helping to build that bright future for your country and our region as a whole.

The Summit of the Americas that President Frei will host this weekend is testament to the promise before us. Never have the Americas been so united in values, interests and goals. Chile and the United States are seizing this promise, as the scope of our partnership shows – fighting poverty... improving the quality of justice systems... reducing the harm from El Nino... stemming the spread of dangerous weapons in Iraq... promoting peace among our neighbors.

Nowhere are the opportunities greater, and the promise of our partnership more evident, than in helping the nations and the people of the Americas succeed in the global economy.

When it comes to sound economic reform, Chile has set a standard for the hemisphere – with prudent fiscal and credit policies, tough supervision of the financial sector, open trade and investment and, most important, a commitment to lift its people's lives. Between 1990 and 1997, economic growth averaged 7 percent a year. Inflation dropped from almost 30 percent to 6. The level of Chile's domestic savings is unparalleled in Latin America. And millions of Chileans rose out of poverty.

Chile stands at the vanguard of a new American revolution, as nations cast off the failed policies of the past and point their markets toward the future. Many challenges remain, to be sure, but progress is unmistakable. Markets are opening up. Trade barriers are coming down. Nations have reined in runaway inflation. When I visited last year, Brazil's Finance Minister told me their inflation was 5 percent, the same as a few years earlier – but now it is 5 percent a year, not 5 percent each week. And in Central America, where deadly conflicts raged for three decades, peace and stability have taken hold. Growth and integration are taking off.

As a result, Latin America and the Caribbean have just enjoyed one of their best economic years

in decades, combining an average growth rate of more than 5% with the lowest rate of inflation in 50 years.

This growth has spurred, and been spurred by, an explosive increase in commerce within this hemisphere and the world. And it's not just goods that are flowing across our borders. Between 1991 and 1996, the number of minutes for telephone calls from the United States to South America nearly tripled. In that same period, the number of planes that left Miami for Central and South America surged by 20 percent. Young people from our countries are studying in each other's schools and colleges in ever increasing numbers. These exchanges of people and ideas, as well as goods and services, enrich our societies, our cultures and our way of life.

Just as integration means flows of products, people and information, it also means flows of capital. This region has worked hard to strengthen its financial systems while continuing to reap the benefits of foreign investment. It was just one month after our Miami Summit in 1994 that the Mexican peso crisis struck. But Latin America learned the right lessons, deepening its reforms instead of closing its doors. Mexico is back and is now my country's second largest export market. Asian leaders look to Latin America for advice on financial reform.

Argentina fundamentally restructured its banking system. Mexico is breaking new ground on financial transparency, such as publishing economic and financial data on the Internet. Chile, Mexico, Argentina, Peru and Colombia subscribe to the IMF's new standards on openness. Last December, our Finance Ministers committed in Santiago to tighten banking supervision; fight money laundering; and provide new credit to the smallest entrepreneurs.

Of course, we know there is more to do to consolidate these gains. But Latin America has found its voice, its confidence and its seat at the international table.

The United States is delighted by our neighbors' progress. Our futures are joined like a cord that gains its strength from many threads that are tightly intertwined. Today, more than 40% of our exports go to our hemispheric neighbors. Our exports in this region are growing more than twice as fast as anywhere else in the world. Each year, we sell more to Chile than to India; more to Brazil than to China. And with three of our four top energy suppliers in the Americas, this hemisphere literally fuels our growth.

The United States will continue to support emerging economies worldwide. We have, after all, just 4 percent of the world's people. We can only maintain our own standard of living if countries like Chile grow. Your prosperity lift ours just as a healthy U.S. economy lifts yours. If there are more good jobs here with higher incomes, if more people have a chance to reach their full potential, then you can be an even stronger partner, not only for us but all around the world.

America will also keep leading for open markets. Because when workers, farmers and business people gain access to new markets, it means new jobs – and when consumers can benefit from lower-cost imports, that means more money in their pockets. In turn, these mean better education and health care for their families and a more secure retirement. In the last five years, the United States has concluded more than 220 [TK] market-opening agreements. [I'm pleased to say President Frei and I have just concluded one more: an Open Skies agreement between our

two nations – our first in South America. Between 1991 and 1996, the number of planes leaving Miami for Chile soared 179%. Now our business travelers, tourists and families will enjoy more choice and lower prices.]

At our Summit this weekend, we'll take the next step toward open trade in our hemisphere as we launch comprehensive negotiations for the Free Trade Area of the Americas. The FTAA will embrace 800 million consumers from Alaska to Argentina. It will create opportunities for producers throughout the Americas – and new jobs and higher living standards for our workers. It will eliminate tariffs, which are four times higher in the rest of the hemisphere than in the United States. It will help lock in the market reforms throughout the hemisphere which are so crucial to continued growth. I'm especially pleased that, for the first time ever, a special committee has been created to expand the role of environmental and labor groups in our trade deliberations. All stakeholders will have access to the process. Their voices and concerns will be heard.

As our trade within the hemisphere expands, the benefits for America's workers, companies and consumers make clear why Fast Track trading authority remains an essential priority. This tool will help us shape our trade agenda to maximize our interests and ideals – not only in the Americas but around the world. I am committed to work with Congress to build support for Fast Track. But make no mistake: Even before we secure Fast Track, our agenda of opening markets and creating jobs will stay in the fast lane. So will our engagement with this hemisphere, where so much of our destiny lies.

Even as we seize the opportunities of the new economy, all our nations must do more to ensure that its benefits and burdens are shared fairly. With the greatest respect to President Kennedy, a rising tide doesn't necessarily lift all the boats, unless we make a special effort to make it so. Without wise policies and strong institutions in this fast-paced global economy, people without the right training and skills could be stranded on yesterday's shore – while those without the tools to navigate change could sink in its surging waves. If people lose faith that democracy and free markets will help them improve their lives, the public support that is the backbone of democracy could weaken and even collapse. So even as we encourage more business contracts, we must not renege on the social contract. We need to find ways to give everyone a place in the future we are building.

We must start with our children, who are the future, by assuring they have a world-class education – the best path out of poverty. And we must give every child a chance to go to school by getting them out of the workplace. The United States is working with Central America to launch a new initiative to combat child labor while helping parents find good jobs. And earlier this year, I asked Congress to increase ten-fold our investment in combating child labor worldwide. Today, I ask other countries to join that fight.

We must deepen democracy, including a free press and an honest, efficient judiciary. More than any other form of government, democracy honors all its people with rights, respect, a chance to get ahead and a voice in the decisions that affect their lives. We must insist on strong protections for workers so that trade enhances living standards instead of undermining them. We must reduce the gap between rich and poor – which is wider in Latin America than any region in the

world. We must fight the corruption, drugs and crime that erode the fabric of our societies. And we must invest in the future by protecting our environment, so the price for growth is not poisoned rivers and polluted air.

Harnessing the forces of globalization to work for all our citizens is a challenge for countries worldwide. I discussed it with leaders in Africa as they work to establish the foundations of democracy and broad-based growth. It will be a major focus of our Summit of the Americas, where, now that free market democracy is in place, we are taking on the next generation of reforms to make democracy deliver for all our people. It will be at the top of the agenda next month at the G-7 Summit in Birmingham, where the industrialized democracies are working to prepare their people for the 21st century. We all stand to gain from working together – and we have much to learn from each other.

Earlier today, I went with President Frei to a neighborhood in South Santiago, where we met with community leaders engaged in grassroots reform. We talked about every day issues like education, health care and jobs – the things that matter most to working families from Santiago to San Francisco. I heard from them about [examples of real concerns, real projects]. And I learned how Chileans at every level of society are working to widen the circle of opportunity and help their country succeed.

I want our nations to work together to meet these challenges head-on. I'm especially impressed by President Frei's commitment to improve and expand access to education. In the new economy, education is the leading economic indicator. The key to your future is what you know. What you can learn is your hope. America's balanced budget includes the biggest new investment in education in more than 30 years. Chile has doubled its social spending since 1990, largely for education, with more classrooms, longer school days and better access for disadvantaged kids. Now, with our new agreement on education, we'll increase our exchanges of students and teachers; develop higher standards for learning and teacher training; and work to bring technology into every classroom, so every child has access to the same universe of knowledge, no matter how poor their background or how remote their school.

[We're also working to preserve our environment for future generations. One of the most severe challenges we face is the threat of global warming. I applaud President Frei for affirming today that all countries – developing and developed alike – should have emissions targets. As the largest emitter of greenhouse gases, the United States has a special responsibility to take strong action – and we are. But every country must do its part to solve this global problem. That does not mean that emerging economies must abandon their goals for growth. It means charting an energy course for the future that allows strong growth and environmental protection to go forward hand in hand.] [TBD]

Our cooperation in the Summit of the Americas has helped pave the way from Miami to Santiago and set clear goals for the future. Through bold commitments to improve education, support for a special rapporteur on freedom of expression, a center to strengthen justice systems, a new Hemispheric Alliance Against Drugs and additional steps to alleviate poverty, the Santiago Summit can make a real difference in our people's daily lives.

If we keep working to deepen democracy, promote prosperity and expand opportunity, we need

not fear the future. For can make the 21st century the best our people have ever known. But even as we reach for new horizons, let us hold to our most cherished ideals – liberty, justice, equality and dignity for all.

In 1811, as Chile struggled for independence, it chose July 4 – America's Independence Day – to dedicate its national flag. At a celebration held by U.S. citizens in Santiago, the American flag and the new Chilean banner were raised together in many public places, entwined with one another. Today, the partnership that image represents can fulfill its potential at last. As never before, our nations' goals and dreams are intertwined. Let us work together to make them real for tomorrow's generation. Let us make the Americas a model of hope and unity for the world.

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
