PROPOSED PRESIDENTIAL ANNOUNCEMENT  
ON INTERNATIONAL DEMAND REDUCTION ACADEMY

The United States plans to establish an International Demand Reduction Training Academy in response to the growing international concern over the threat posed by illicit substance abuse to the safety and well-being of all citizens. This "first of its kind" academy would serve as a training and research institute for improving global demand reduction services with a focus on reducing illicit substance abuse and drug-related crime and violence.

The Academy's curriculum will focus on drug prevention, education, treatment, and rehabilitation methods. A pilot course, designed to test and refine the training academy concept, will take place in Roswell, New Mexico this summer. Participants in this initial course will be drawn from the Western Hemisphere.

We are confident that the multinational relationships forged at the Academy will help mobilize and strengthen international cooperation and opinion against all aspects of the illicit drug trade and related criminal behaviors.

RE: Proposal for President's Clinton's Trip to Chile

One of your staff suggested I write you regarding a proposal for President Clinton to visit a World Vision program in Santiago, Chile during his upcoming visit April 16-20. World Vision is the largest, privately funded Christian relief and development organization in the world. The organization, founded in 1950, has more than half a million donors in the United States who represent a wide spectrum of the Christian church.

There are two programs to which World Vision would like to invite the President to visit in Santiago:

- o Huamachuco ("Waa-maa-CHOO-ko") is an area development program in the Renca district of Santiago, approximately a 20-minute drive from downtown. The program includes more than 1000 children and their parents; many of whom are heads of households. The children attend specialized computer classes, have access to a library and enjoy age-appropriate recreational activities. While they are in school or participating in these programs, their mothers are enrolled in beautician, embroidery, cooking, or other classes, which enable more than 70 percent of them to become self-sufficient. Many of the women (b)(6) [003] (b)(6) have been victims of domestic violence.
- o Cencodel ("SIN-ko-dell") is a program for approximately 14 drug addicts and dozens of children located about 40 minutes (by car) away from downtown Santiago. The adult clients in the program are provided medical care and counseling services for a variety of addictions, including cocaine. The children are in specialized classes and are provided health care. It is administered by a Pentecostal pastor.

I am confident the President would find either program enlightening and would provide him opportunities to reinforce several of his important policies here in the U.S., including bringing the Internet and computer knowledge to young children. On behalf of the Women's Leadership Conference of the Americas (WLCA), we are pleased to present the enclosed *Communiqué*, directed to the hemisphere's heads of state who will meet at the second Summit of the Americas in Santiago, Chile, on April 18 and 19, 1998. The WLCA is a network of 90 top women leaders from the United States, Canada, and seventeen countries of Latin America and the Caribbean—including former presidents, prime ministers, business executives, women's rights activists, and other non-governmental leaders—dedicated to promoting policy and institutional changes that will improve opportunities for all women. This group is urging the region's governments to adhere to the commitments made four years ago at the first Summit in Miami, and at other international forums. They are demanding that governments focus important attention on increasing women's opportunities in the workforce by strengthening education; advancing women to positions of power and influence; and stopping the brutality of violence against women.

On releasing the *Communiqué* in Managua, former Nicaraguan President Violeta Chamorro declared, "The lack of opportunities for women in our society weakens the legitimacy of democracy. No country can exclude the talent and creativity of the female population without affecting the essential values of democracy." According to WLCA Co-Chair and Costa Rican Congresswoman Sonia Picado, "The Summit of the Americas is going to be a meeting of powerful, political men with an amazingly small representation of women. For that reason it is imperative that women's voices be heard at the Summit."

We have published the *Communiqué* with a report on the proceedings of the first meeting of the network, convened in July 1997 by the WLCA's sponsoring organizations—the Inter-American Dialogue and International Center for Research on Women (ICRW). We hope you will find that this *Communiqué* is a constructive contribution to the Summit process, and we urge you to join us in promoting a place on the agenda for investing in women.

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**WOMEN LEADERS DEMAND ACTION ON WOMEN'S RIGHTS  
AT SECOND SUMMIT OF THE AMERICAS IN SANTIAGO, CHILE**

*Washington, DC:* Ninety prominent women leaders from throughout the Americas criticized the hemisphere's governments for failing to get off the mark and carry out the promises they made four years ago at the first Summit of the Americas in Miami. Today members of the blue ribbon Women's Leadership Conference of the Americas (WLCA) called on the heads of state of the hemisphere to focus vital attention on "increasing women's opportunities in the workforce by strengthening education; advancing women to positions of power and influence; and stopping the brutality of violence against women." WLCA members insisted "it is vital that governments monitor, measure, record and report on their successes and failures in these areas."

These demands were made in a *Communiqué* released today in Washington by the Women's Leadership Conference and directed to the second Summit of the Americas, which will take place in Santiago, Chile, on April 17 to 19. The WLCA is a network of top women leaders from the United States, Canada, and seventeen countries of Latin America and the Caribbean—including former presidents, prime ministers, business executives, women's rights activists, and other non-governmental leaders—dedicated to promoting policy and institutional changes that will improve opportunities for all women.

On releasing the *Communiqué* in Managua, former Nicaraguan President **Violeta Chamorro** declared "The lack of opportunities for women in our society weakens the legitimacy of democracy. No country can exclude the talent and creativity of the female population without affecting the essential values of democracy." According to WLCA Co-Chair and congresswoman from Costa Rica **Sonia Picado**, "The Summit of the Americas is going to be a meeting of powerful, political men with an amazingly small representation of women. For that reason it is imperative that women's voices be heard at the Summit."

The assembled women noted the progress of the past decade, but lamented that women's opportunities are still limited, and they are blocked by poverty, violence, and inadequate education. Women remain mostly excluded from the top rungs of power. In Latin America and the Caribbean women make up over half of the electorate, but they hold only 11% of cabinet posts and seats in national legislatures. Women comprise one-third of the official work force, but are virtually absent from senior management and clustered in lower paid occupations. Forty percent of women in the hemisphere suffer domestic violence at some point in their lives.

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## PREFACE AND ACKNOWLEDGMENTS

The Leadership Council for Inter-American Summitry, established in 1997, is an independent, non-partisan initiative composed of citizens from throughout the Americas working in private business, legislatures, academia, public policy institutes, the scientific community, and other civic organizations. While many members have held high public office, none is currently employed in the executive branch of government. The Leadership Council is united in its aim to strengthen the forces fighting for effective democratic governance, market-oriented economic reforms, and social justice. These same goals are embedded in the declarations issued at the 1994 Summit of the Americas in Miami. The Leadership Council believes that periodic summits that gather the Western Hemisphere's heads of state and government can make a significant contribution toward achieving these goals but that significant reforms are required in the summitry process if its promise is to be fully realized. It is in that hopeful spirit that the Leadership Council issues this report.

The Leadership Council seeks to serve as a bridge between experts outside the executive branch of governments and the officials who organize the summits, between organized civil society and the public sector, and, in the spirit of inter-American summitry, between the northern industrialized nations and the southern developing nations of the region. The Council's membership includes individuals active in the civil society of their nations, as well as individuals with extensive experience at senior levels of government and in summit meetings in the Americas, the Asia Pacific region, and the industrialized world.

Council members have had many conversations with officials responsible for the preparation of the second Summit of the Americas, scheduled for April 1998, in Santiago, Chile. We especially wish to express our gratitude to Thomas "Mack" McLarty III, Counselor to the President of the

United States and Special Envoy to the Americas; Richard Brown, Senior Summit Coordinator, U.S. Department of State; Genaro Arriagada, Advisor to the President of Chile for the Summit of the Americas; and Juan Montalvo, General Coordinator of the Summit of the Americas in Chile.

The work of the Leadership Council was informed by two series of detailed working group reports that surveyed implementation of the recommendations of the Miami *Plan of Action*—the original and independent survey. We wish to thank the working groups for their pioneering work in monitoring and follow-up. This project, directed by Richard E. Feinberg and Robin L. Rosenberg, was made possible through the encouragement and support of the Ford Foundation.

The members of the Leadership Council wholeheartedly endorse this report's content and tone and support its principal recommendations, even as each member may not agree with every phrase. Members subscribe as individuals; institutional affiliations are for identification.

# A WESTERN HEMISPHERE COMMUNITY OF PROSPEROUS DEMOCRACIES

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The first Summit of the Americas provided us with a cogent vision of a community of democracies united by the dream of economic integration with social justice. The Leadership Council for Inter-American Summitry affirms that the Miami vision remains valid today. The challenge is to fulfill its promise by correcting the shortcomings of the Miami process.

The Leadership Council for Inter-American Summitry strongly believes that summits can make a difference in the lives of the peoples of the Americas. As the Summit of the Americas in Miami in December 1994 demonstrated, summits can create a political process whereby the hemisphere can agree upon shared values and a common agenda; summits can codify norms and rules to guide the behavior of governments and civil society; and summits can place new issues on the international agenda and catalyze collective action behind consensus goals.

### Evaluation of the Miami Process

Based upon its own independent survey in late 1997, the Leadership Council found that progress on key initiatives agreed upon in Miami was on average modest. More has been accomplished than the public is aware of, but progress has fallen short of the promise of Miami.

The Leadership Council found a number of flaws in the Miami process. There were far too many initiatives and action items. Some initiatives lacked the essential elements of good public policy — measurable goals, timetables, priorities, and accountability. Leaders failed to allocate sufficient technical and financial resources for some initiatives. Many governments did not have the requisite institutional and financial capacities to carry out some of the action items. The regional organi-

zations, notably the Organization of American States (OAS) and the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB), sought to implement some initiatives but allowed other mandates to slip. Monitoring mechanisms were not fully developed.

### The Substantive Agenda

The Leadership Council has seven challenges facing the hemisphere that are credible and effective for summitry:

- the hollowing out of democratic institutions (notably in the areas of corruption and narcotic trafficking)
- the weakness of civil societies
- persistent poverty and worsening inequality
- failing schools
- environmental degradation
- sluggish export performance and low savings rates, and
- the insufficiency of inter-American institutions.

### Recommendations for the Santiago Summit of 1998

The Council offers recommendations for inclusion in the Santiago Summit Plan of Action, as worthy responses to each of these seven challenges. These recommendations are intended to underscore the importance of taming the summit process, that is, regarding realism, focus, selectivity, timetables, tangible targets, and accountability.

#### *Democracy, Education, Environment, and Poverty*

To strengthen democratic institutions, the Leadership Council finds that the Inter-American Convention Against Corruption represents a major accomplishment of hemispheric diplomacy. The Santiago Summit should transform the Convention

into a realistic work plan and mandate the OAS to establish an independent, expert Inter-American Commission on Corruption to promote implementation of priority goals.

The Leadership Council recommends that the Santiago Summit regularize the participation of non-governmental expertise and the private sector throughout the summitry process. The proposed summit secretariat should issue an annual report tracking transparency-related initiatives.

To yield a more equitable distribution of the fruits of government, the Santiago Summit should accelerate educational reform, seek reduction in diseases that disproportionately attack the poor and weak, strengthen labor ministries to enhance their capacity to enforce code labor standards, and seek to assure an enabling environment that provides equal opportunity for entrepreneurial talent. Priorities for educational reform include reaffirming the Miami commitment to ensure universal completion of quality primary education by the year 2010, establishing standards and quantifiable indicators for basic skills, and promoting early access to new technologies, such as the worldwide web and distance learning through such media as television.

To address environmental degradation, leaders should select a manageable number of items from the Miami and Santa Cruz, Bolivia, Summits for priority attention. Good candidates include sustainable water management, especially in urban areas; sustainable forest management; and the reduction of air pollution.

### *Trade Integration and Financial Stability*

The Leadership Council is concerned that the Miami Summit's 2005 date for completion of negotiations for the Free Trade Area of the Americas (FTAA), rather than serving to spur negotiations, has become an excuse for delay. To reignite the sense of urgency, the Council proposes that the Santiago Summit accelerate the target date for completion of negotiations to 2002. As the leaders agreed in Miami, trade negotiators should still seek concrete progress by the end of the century.

Since Miami, some governmental and private-sector leaders have failed to build public support for free trade and the FTAA. We urge leaders, particularly in the big markets of the United States and Brazil, to engage in concerted efforts to build the public case for the FTAA. Specifically, the U.S. administration must mobilize sufficient political support to gain fast-track authority that encompasses regional trade agreements. The government of Brazil should explain to its citizens that the FTAA is in the national interest and is compatible with MERCOSUR's basic objectives.

In the Miami Summit, free trade was implicitly linked with democratic freedoms. At Santiago, the Leadership Council believes that the time has come for the Western Hemisphere to announce clearly that only democratic nations will be welcome to participate in the formation of the Free Trade Area of the Americas.

The recent turmoil in Asian financial markets has illuminated the importance of financial market reform in developing countries. The Leadership Council urges finance ministers to meet at least annually to exercise self-surveillance of national macroeconomic policies and of international economic trends as they affect the region. This new regional forum — which might be labeled the Inter-American Financial Council — could assess steps being taken at the national and international levels to build market confidence and to avoid contagion from the current financial volatility in East Asia.

### **Seven Steps Toward More Effective Summitry**

At this stage in the development of inter-American relations, priority must be given to institutional mechanisms that can insure compliance with Summit accords. The Leadership Council proposes seven steps to improve the process of summitry in the Americas.

- Initiatives should be responsibly crafted to contain practical goals, quantifiable targets, and realistic timetables.

- Initiatives should be assigned to mechanisms with adequate technical and financial resources, and leaders should mandate that existing regional institutions, notably the OAS and IDB, be fully integrated into the summitry process.
- Governments should appoint a senior official to coordinate summit planning and implementation.
- Networks of functional ministries should be solidified.
- The participation of the private sector and other non-governmental organizations should be regularized.
- Monitoring responsibilities should be assigned for each initiative to an official regional mechanism with adequate capacity.
- Most important, Summits should be institutionalized. Inter-American Summits should be held every two years. In interim years, ministers of foreign and economic affairs should meet to monitor the transformation of talk into action. Leaders in Santiago should establish a small, permanent Summit Secretariat to better coordinate, monitor, and assess the implementation of summit agreements.

### **Centerpieces for Santiago**

The Leadership Council proposes that at Santiago the heads of state and government focus on four of the initiatives we have proposed as summit centerpieces whose implementation would improve the well-being of millions of our citizens:

- acceleration to 2002 for completion of negotiations for the Free Trade Area of the Americas — with participation open to democratic nations only;
- formation of an Inter-American Financial Council to improve regional economic cooperation and enhance market confidence;
- creation of an Inter-American Commission on Corruption to spur implementation of the Convention Against Corruption; and
- institutionalization of summitry through biannual summits and a summit secretariat. Together, these centerpiece initiatives would assure the success of the Santiago Summit and revitalize summitry in the Western Hemisphere.

### **Thursday Message event - Chile**

#### **Outcome of discussion:**

-- Ann Lewis' strong vote was for an economic event, which Mack and Maria endorsed. Her view was that trade is really what is on everyone's mind, and the fact that we aren't where we want to be on Fast Track, etc., is no reason to run away from the issue. The consensus proposal (Mack, Dobbins, Streett, Lewis, Echaveste) was to move the AmCham event to Thursday and make that our big message event for the day -- but to marry the message with a visit with the NGO reps (either US or US/Chilean combined, if Frei joins us) from the People's Summit, to underscore that our commitment to free trade includes a commitment to bring everyone along. (This is similar to what we did in Brazil -- Sao Paulo bus. cmtty + Mangueira school.)

- The idea would be to meet with the NGO reps first (in a roundtable format, perhaps) -- so POTUS can say: I hear your concerns; I understand your point of view; I'm about to meet with business leaders and my message to them will be the same as my message to you: I'm committed to free trade, but equally determined to find way to reap the benefits of free markets without abandoning the social contract. Committed to making sure that as the global economy creates greater wealth, it does not produce growing disparities between the haves and have-nots, or threaten the global environment, etc...

-- Then the POTUS would address the AmCham -- venue as yet undetermined (stock exchange has nice symbolism but probably too small for desired audience of 300-500) -- and deliver a strong economic/trade/open markets message, including: "I've just met with leaders from the labor, environmental and non-governmental community, and I want to reaffirm to you what I said to them: (repeat message)."

-- Issues outstanding: (1) Who is the US delegation to the People's Summit and will meeting with them generate more heat than light (Interam will check this); (2) Will Frei join us if we do meet with

NGOs (Mack's office will check this); (3) Where to hold the event (Scheduling will check this).

#### Other ideas discussed:

- Dobbins raised the education, stock exchange, El Nino/forecasting and NGO proposals outlined in yesterday's InterAm e-mail.
- Streett raised a number of the ideas we heard from the DCM yesterday, including a school that has a teacher exchange program in Lois Capps' district. General agreement that if we do education on Saturday, no point in a school event on Thursday.
- Cunningham suggested visiting a legal assistance center -- an idea Mack liked because of the 2nd generation quality and the tie in to the Justice Studies Center coming out of the SOA.

#### **Education-and-technology event on Saturday**

Agreement on the value of injecting a note of excitement into the Summit by holding an education-and-technology event on Saturday, PROVIDED THAT (1) Univision will accept our specs, (2) it is within our budget, and (3) it is technologically foolproof. The event we propose would have the following specs:

- several classroom sites, in the U.S., Chile, Mexico, and Argentina
- one question from each site and then several responses by different leaders
- varied age groups at each site (high school, junior high, elementary)
- questions will be coordinated by Univision in each classroom site
- answers by heads of State, with Frei moderating responses
- [Mack, Maria, Ann, and Stephanie will have a conference call with Cisneros this afternoon to see if Univision will allow Frei to moderate]
  - questions will be prepared by the each class as a group in advance and then asked by a single child at each site
  - Univision will instill in each class a sense of the importance of the event and will vet the questions as appropriate
  - questions will address education, not other topics
  - questions will be directed to "the leaders" not any specific leader
  - the first question will come from a site other than the U.S., and Clinton would respond to that question.
  - event will be LIVE, unless costs and technological barriers are too high. In that case, questions will be pre-taped, and leaders' responses will be live
  - other media will have real-time, unrestricted, access to the broadcast if they are not actually present
